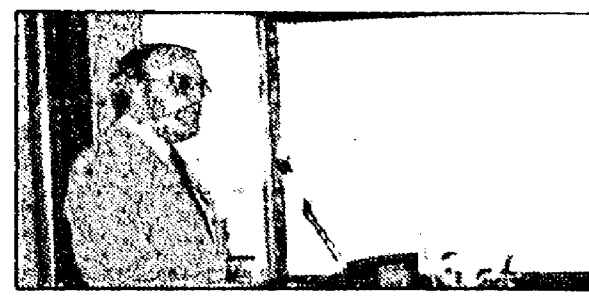

Hall urges special session

"I would 'guesstimate' by the time we get to Santa Fe next January the state will be busted," predicted State Representative Ben Hall Friday.

Hall said a special legislative session is desperately needed to keep the State of New Mexico solvent.

Governor Tony Anaya is apparently dead set against a special session, said Hall.

Although Governor Anaya has revealed a plan he says will keep the state afloat financially, Hall and other Republican members of the House who caucused last week in Albuquerque aren't convinced his strategy will work.

Some think the proposal to be "don't think he can do it," said Hall. But a constitutional question is added.

Hall and the Attorney General of the State, Fred Hunter, might intervene if they question the constitutionality of Governor Anaya's recommendation.

Neither of them, however, said the law that Hall said he would be the president.

In a letter to state legislators, Anaya proposed a \$100 million deficit at the end of this fiscal year. Since the 1985-86 fiscal year, he authorized Anaya and he'll transfer \$10 million from operating funds to the deficit.

The letter also outlined other measures he has proposed to provide a deficit of \$100 million. He said the state has a deficit of \$100 million, and he said the state has a deficit of \$100 million.

Among provisions in the governor's proposals are plans to transfer an additional \$10 million from operating reserves to the general fund, to carry over an estimated \$4.7 million in unappropriated surpluses and transfer \$20.5 million from an accelerated highway construction project.

Anaya said he'll also carry over an estimated \$17.5 million in agency savings or reversions, identify new revenues and look for "selective cuts" in state budgets.

The governor reminded legislators of cuts already made in state government, including the deletion of 400 positions from state government.

Hall said Governor Anaya has also asked individual departments to cut budgets by two percent.

But Hall said the governor's plan just won't cover the shortfalls the representative have projected.

As of July 1, the State of New Mexico's monthly expenses will amount to \$122 million, and projected revenues will amount to no more than \$98 million a month, said Hall.

The way we read the numbers, we will not have enough money to cover warrants issued in July," noted Hall.

A package proposed by Republican representatives includes rolling back the Education Reform Bill for a year, and limiting food and medical rebates to those families at or below the poverty level.

"We wouldn't have to pay those two items out, and that would help our cash flow," said Hall.

However, Anaya rejected those

proposals, and according to his letter, is determined to implement the public school reform act including the teacher pay raise of \$2,200 per teacher.

Hall said with a special session, legislators could avert some serious financial difficulties by implementing the letter's two suggestions, and the governor's two percent cuts.

Although current problems were partially caused by New Mexico's reliance on oil and gas revenues, for a huge proportion of revenues, Hall said state lawmakers could not have predicted last January that oil prices would toppe to \$20 a barrel price.

Hall said expert advice from the Legislature and the governor and gas prices would be less than \$20 a barrel.

After handling the short-term problems, Hall said state lawmakers should focus on the state's future.

"We need to get the state back in line with the rest of the state," said Hall.

Although some lawmakers have already talked about cutting taxes to take care of continuing deficits, Hall said he opposes raising taxes. He recalled a 1980 income tax increase of \$10 million.

Hall's opponent, the best that for New Mexico's future, that would be a special session in June.

"I can understand why a governor doesn't want a special session," said Hall. "We don't have the power to force a special session," he added.

Hospital's economic benefits outlined

"We feel this hospital has a major impact on the economy of the town," Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Hospital (RHVH) administrator Ken Moore said at a meeting of the RHVH Board of Trustees last Thursday.

Moore said the hospital has an annual payroll of about \$7 million.

In addition, RHVH pays about \$236,000 to businesses in the area for goods and services, Moore said.

Moore told the hospital board he did not feel the public was aware of the economic impact RHVH had on the community.

The RHVH Auxiliary seems to be an organization that has an economic impact on the hospital itself.

Ruth Moore, outgoing RHVH Auxiliary president, submitted her final report to the board on Thursday.

Moore left the hospital auxiliary with a treasury balance of about \$72,000.

In her term as president the "pink men and ladies," as they are

popularly known, gave RHVH a blood pay analyzer, a fetal monitor, special microfilm equipment and furniture and equipment for a new birthing room.

The RHVH Auxiliary was among the nominees for a special volunteer service organization award from Governor Tony Anaya, Moore said.

The hospital auxiliary organizes several blood drives in the year to benefit RHVH.

Board president Roy L. "Pink" Jones thanked Moore for the job she had done as RHVH Auxiliary president, and welcomed the new president, Sally Avery, to the board.

In other business the board lamented the anguish caused by a hip injury to 90-year-old "pink lady" Gladys Knox. Jones asked that Knox not be forgotten by her friends during her recovery from hip surgery.

Discussed sending some of the members of the board to the ninth annual meeting of representatives from small and rural hospitals, which will be conducted in June in Chicago, Illinois.

Heard the Mesquero Apache Tribal Council was still engaged in selecting a representative to fill the Tribe's newly created position on the hospital board.

Discussed the new status of board member Dr. Roger A. Beechie. After May, Beechie will assume a medical position with the state at their medical facilities in Fort Stanton.

Beechie said he will commute to the various facilities at Fort Stanton, beginning in June, but would still reside in Ruidoso. Beechie said he would retain his position on the RHVH board.

When Beechie vacates his medical office in June, Dr. Diane Gulbas will use the facility to begin her Ruidoso practice.

Beechie said Gulbas was a bright, attractive and capable physician, who would make an excellent addition to the medical community in Ruidoso.

Last Friday, exactly 13 months and a day after the death of Thomas P. "Cotton" McKnight, bodies were discovered in the kitchen floor of their Phoenix ranch home.

Bussey said he would live up to seeing the murder of murderers pay for the crime.

A sister of the slain woman, Bussey said, was also with the knowledge that her sister's killer remained free.

Bussey had about 200 signatures on a petition to force a grand jury to intervene in the murder case. She said she plans to present the petition to District Judge Richard A. Parsons late this week.

Although she isn't sure what will happen next, Bussey said she intends to pursue any means available to keep the murder investigation open. Although he was unavailable for comment, Bussey said Cotton's brother Donald Frank "Pancho" McKnight is helping circulate the petition.

But not all family members agree with Bussey's tactics. Joe W. McKnight, Cotton's father, wrote letters to several

newspapers, recently "The News," May 10, raising some questions. He asked if Bussey was trying to kill the existing evidence, and if so why.

Since Bussey revealed her belief last year that she knows who murdered her sister, McKnight questioned if she is withholding evidence.

The elder McKnight wondered why the State Police were in and out, and then in the investigation again. In a telephone interview Sunday, McKnight said he is glad to have the State Police back on the case.

He reiterated his lack of confidence in the Lincoln County Sheriff's Office, and finds the direction their investigation has taken to be absurd.

McKnight told the News that he and another person are the two prime suspects in the murder case.

McKnight said sheriff's investigators, who he says suspect him, could easily check on his whereabouts preceding the murders.

The senior McKnight said the Sheriff's Office has done extensive ballistics testing on weapons belonging to him and another per-

son. He said he can't remember the name of the person who was in the murder weapon.

McKnight said that the weapon, which is a collector's item, has never left the safety box in Albuquerque where it is stored.

While McKnight has approved the State Police, he said he doesn't agree with the FBI's investigation. He said he doesn't want the FBI to be involved in the case.

The murder investigation has been bogged down for months, law enforcement officials said. The past year and a half, McKnight said, have been a waste of time.

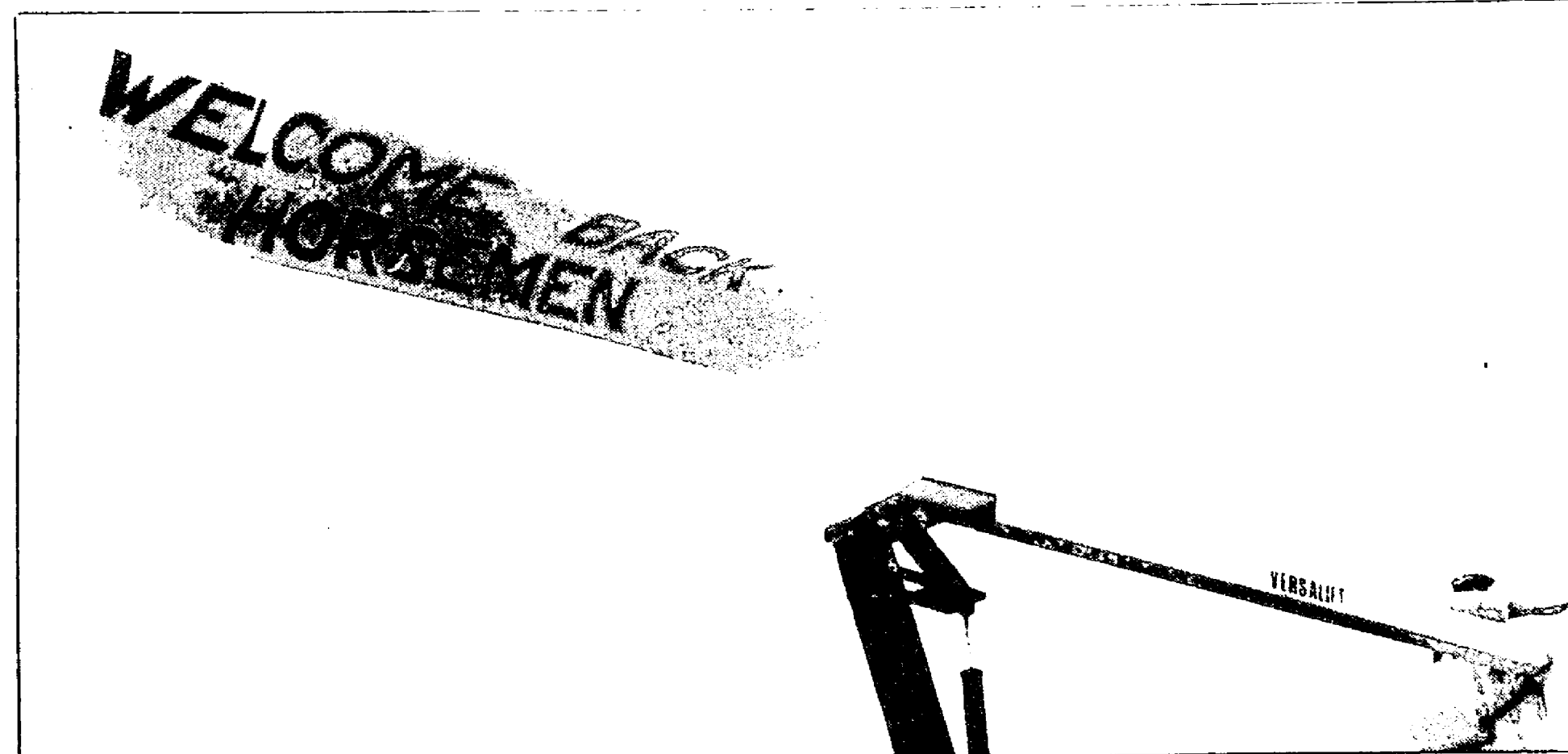
The Lincoln County Sheriff's Office repeatedly said that it has no evidence to back up its claim. But the State Attorney General took the case from the sheriff's hand last September.

The State Police were on the scene the day the grisly discovery was made and remained on the investigation for a short time, and according to one source were removed from the case at the request of the Sheriff's Office. Last

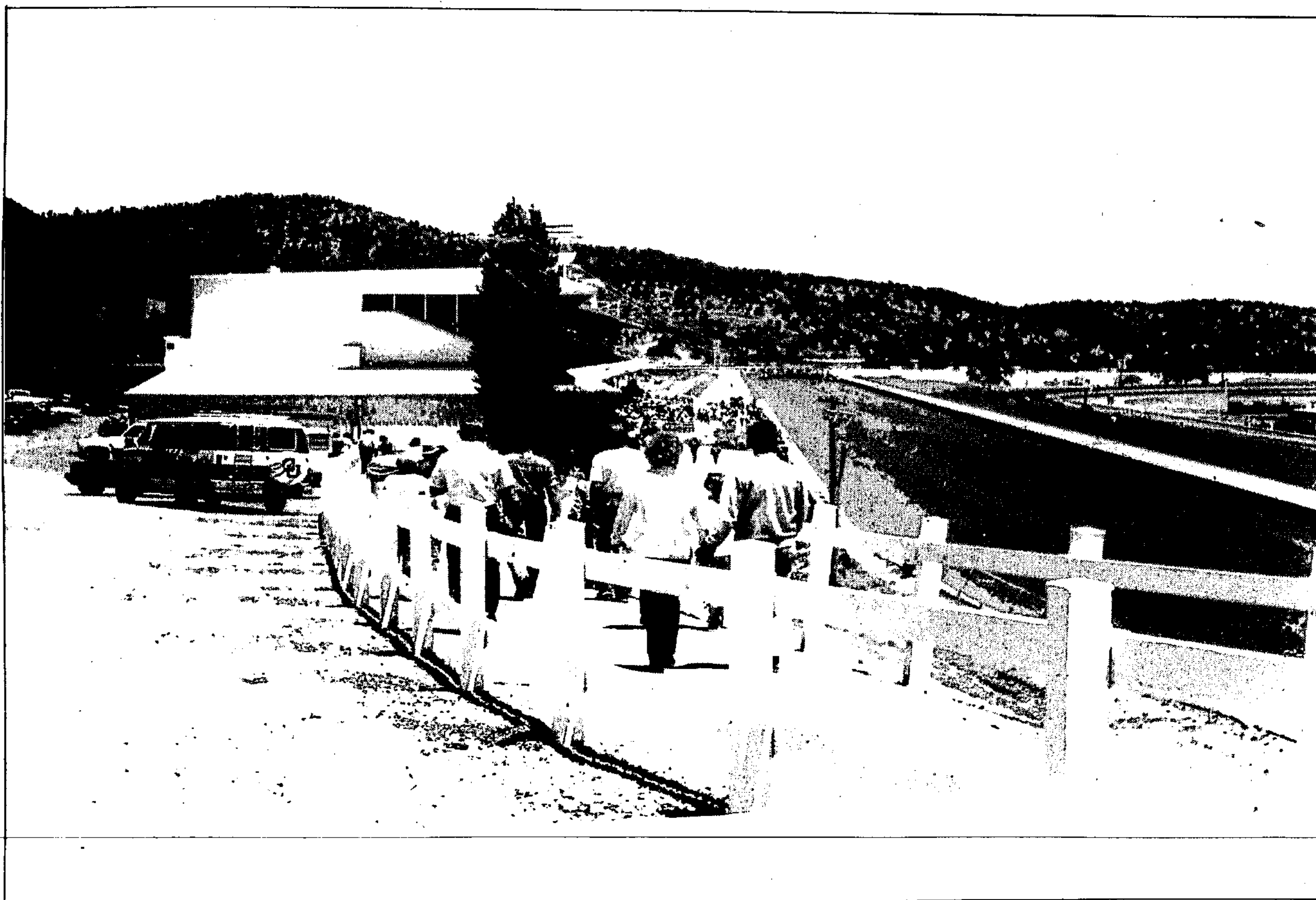

Cool Saturday temperatures don't stop Kansas trials

Red-hot quarter horse trainer Jerry Lazenby fired back for another top qualifying run in Saturday's time trials for the Kansas Futurity at Ruidoso Downs and will now saddle the top two contenders for the \$600,000 stake on June 1.

Lazenby's Gilda Ryon stepped the fastest time among 116 2-year-olds who faced off in the final 12 trial divisions for the Kansas Futurity. The daughter of Windy Ryon raced to a whisker win in Saturday's 6th race (18th Kansas trial division) with jockey Bo White aboard. The filly stopped the timer in 17.750 seconds over a track listed as sloppy following an early morning rain shower.

Larkin Ease finished a nose behind Windy Ryon to post the second-fastest time (17.770). Jacky Martin had the riding assignment for trainer Jack Brooks. It was one of four wins for Martin who combined with Brooks to also qualify the fourth-fastest contender Vital Dash (17.910).

Dwayne "Sleepy" Gilbreath's Lets Go Crazy was the only other hopeful in Saturday's trials guaranteed a spot in the rich Kan-

sas Futurity. The Dash For Cash filly took Saturday's 4th race with Alex Baldillez Jr. at the reins. The final time was 17.910.

Reflections Of Belle and Ronas Ryon tied for the final berth after winning both of their divisions in 17.920 seconds. A drawing Sunday morning was to determine which of the two horses will advance to the final.

Lazenby served notice to the mountain track's training colony on Friday when he sent out Shy Gringo, the fastest contender among the five horses who qualified from the first 12 trial divisions for the Kansas Futurity.

Here are the nine horses who advanced to the Kansas Futurity from Friday's and Saturday's time trials: Shy Gringo (17.740), Marthas Six Moons (17.785), The Smith Kid (17.815), Bedouin Prince (17.950), Wrangler Time (17.950), Gilda Ryon (17.750), Larkin Ease (17.770), Lets Go Crazy (17.860), and Vital Dash (17.920).

The 10 fastest contenders down Ruidoso's 400-yard straightaway will advance to the final on May 31.

Off to the races

Trainer Lazenby blazes to hot weekend

The powerful team of trainer Jerry Lazenby and jockey Terry Layton made their presence felt again on the Southwest horse racing circuit saddling and riding the top qualifier in trials for the Kansas Futurity run Friday at Ruidoso Downs.

Ruidoso Downs opened its 29th season of racing on Friday spotlighting the first 12 trial divisions for the Kansas Futurity - the opening leg of the mountain track's juvenile Triple Crown events for quarter horses.

A total of 116 2-year-old dashers faced off in the dozen heats with the five fastest horses advancing to the final of the \$600,000 Kansas Futurity on June 1. The remaining field for the Grade I stake was determined from another 12 divisions slated for Saturday's program at Ruidoso Downs.

Lazenby sent Layton out aboard Shy Gringo in Friday's 7th heat to watch the Easily Smashed colt breeze to a 2-length victory down Ruidoso's newly refurbished 350-yard straightaway. The final time of 17.740 seconds stood up through another five divisions as the fastest of the day.

The Texas-bred colt is owned by the Shy Gringo Partnership, which leases the horse to T. Roberts, and Don and Wayne Wright of Ft. Worth.

Lazenby and Layton are quickly becoming a major force in high-

dollar stakes in New Mexico. They ran first and second in the \$165,000 West Texas Futurity at Sunland Park in March, and then came back to collect runner-up money in the \$210,000 Sun Country Futurity at the same track a month later.

Following in the footsteps of Lazenby and Layton in Friday's Kansas Futurity trials at Ruidoso Downs came the duo of conditioner Robert Dimmitt and rider Larry Layton (no relation to Terry Layton). They qualified both the second and third fastest contenders for the Kansas with Marthas Six Moons and The Smith Kid. Marthas Six Moons raced to a 1 1/2-length victory in the nightcap, while The Smith Kid captured the second division on the program.

Bedouin Prince, who finished a length back of The Smith Kid, clocked the fourth fastest time. Veteran rider Larry Byers had the riding assignment for J.B. Montgomery. Wrangler Time daylighted competition in Friday's 11th heat to nab the final qualifying spot with Jimmie Hunt aboard for trainer Brent Davidson.

The five qualifiers from Friday's Kansas Futurity trial divisions with their final times: 1st - Shy Gringo, 17.740; 2nd - Marthas Six Moons, 17.785; 3rd - The Smith Kid, 17.815; 4th - Bedouin Prince, 17.950; and 5th - Wrangler Time, 17.950.

Jockeys and trainers begin season with quick quarter horse challenges

Quarter horse lovers were delighted last weekend at Ruidoso Downs as largely untested quarter horses tried to earn their way to better and bigger challenges.

On Friday and Saturday the young quarter horses squared off in trials for the Kansas Derby.

Jockey Alex Baldille Jr. had 30 mounts and rode seven of them to

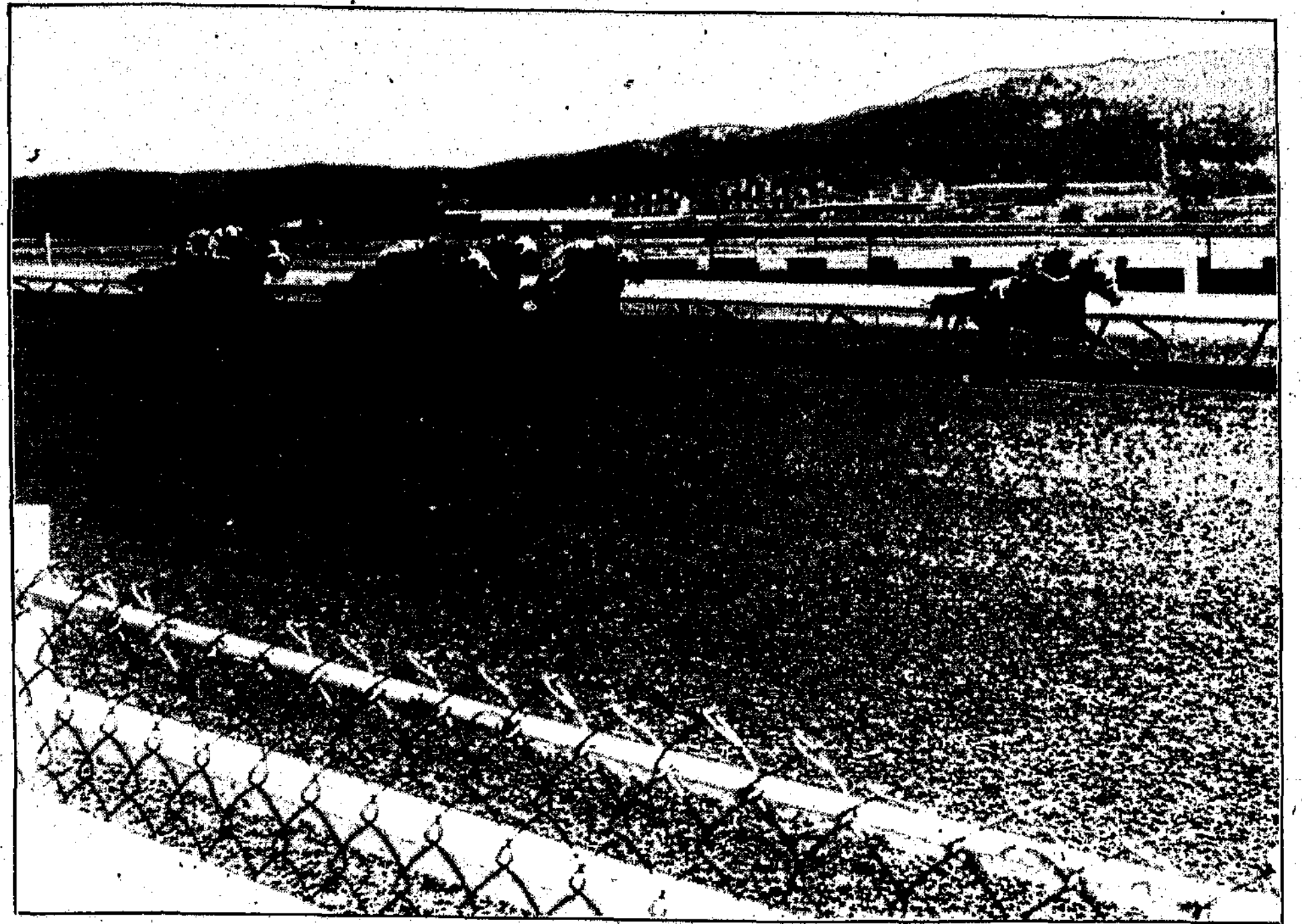
first, eight of them to second and four horses to the third position.

Jockeys Jacky Martin, Jeff Williams and Jerry Nicodemus had outstanding results last weekend at Ruidoso Downs as well.

Baldille had a money percentage of .633, and was named jockey of the week for his seven wins on the weekend.

Trainer C. Dwayne Gilbreath had 27 starts and produced five first place winners, eight second place finishers and four third place finishers to be named Ruidoso Downs trainer of the week.

Ruidoso Downs will be open Friday, Saturday, Sunday and Monday—Memorial Day.



Sunday heats up

Sunday's trials for the Kansas Derby were loaded with excitement from the first race to the last. Both the horses and the track seemed to round into form

as the warmer weather on Sunday turned out the crowds and improved the condition of the brand new track surfaces.

Hot blooded Kansas Derby hopefuls chase after chances for big bucks

Fillies swept the top three qualifying positions in Sunday's trials for the Kansas Derby at Ruidoso Downs with Savy Edition emerging as the leading contender for the Grade 1 stake.

A total of 94 sophomore quarter horses faced off in 10 divisions for the \$283,000 Kansas Derby. The 10 fastest horses advanced to the final of the 400-yard dash slated for May 31 where the winner will earn nearly \$100,000.

Savy Edition, a Texas-bred miss owned by John Baughman of Seguin, Texas, posted a three-quarter length win in Sunday's 6th heat to earn the No. 1 qualifying spot. The daughter of The First Edition stopped the timer in 19.795 seconds over a fast track with jockey Rudy Bustamante aboard. Johnny Bustamante trains Savy Edition.

Renowned quarter-horse pilot Jerry Nicodemus returned off a six-month layoff from an injury to steer Champion Dashing Phoebe to victory in Friday's 2nd division. The final time (19.325) was good enough for the No. 2 qualifying position. Dashing Phoebe raced over a track listed as good from previous rain showers. The surface was upgraded to fast for the 4th through 12th races. The Dash For Cash filly car-

ries the colors of the San Jose Cattle Co. of Pleasanton, Texas.

Reach Together, the filly who finished second to Savy Edition, earned the third fastest time (19.875) under rider Danny Campbell. Arnold Simmons Jr. trains the daughter of Raise Your Glass for AOS Enterprises of Austin, Texas.

The trainer/rider team of Dwayne "Sleepy" Gilbreath and Alex Baldille Jr. combined to qualify four of the remaining seven finalists - Six Popper (4th), Sixarun (5th), Dash S Shadow (7th) and Cash Fever (8th).

Baldille fired back to qualify the ninth-fastest contender - Hot Wave - who captured the 7th trial for trainer Neil Garcia.

Splitting Gilbreath's four qualifiers was Sticks And Stones, an Easy Jet colt who clocked the sixth-fastest time in winning the 3rd division. Jeff Williams was up for trainer Donald Stewart.

Oklahoma rancher Walter Merrick rounded out the field with Loquendi. Merrick bred, owns and trains the daughter of L.Natural who was ridden by Roy Brooks in capturing Sunday's 4th race.

The action kicks off with trials for the Rio Grande Kindergarten Futurity on Friday. Saturday's card features a double-header as quarter horses meet in the \$8,500-added Mr. Jet Moore Allowance Stake, while thoroughbreds match strides at 5 1/2 furlongs in the \$15,000-added Barliss Handicap.

The ladies take center stage on Sunday, when fillies and mares face off down Ruidoso's 350-yard straightaway in the \$8,500-added Gotogether Handicap. Monday's special holiday card presents two stakes events - the Memorial Day Handicap at three-quarters of a mile (\$15,000-added) and the 870-yard Fine Loom Handicap (\$8,500-added).

Warriors overcome bad breaks; do well at state

Ruidoso High School's boys and girls track teams survived some poor weather conditions and bad luck to record good performances in the state AAA-division meet Friday and Saturday at Albuquerque's Wilson Stadium.

Ruidoso finished seventh in the boys division, scoring 16½ points. The young Warrior girls did not score any points, but had some fine times, led by the sixth-place 1,600-meter relay team.

Heavy rain postponed some of Friday's trials to Saturday. The events that did not have trials Friday were decided by times in different heats Saturday.

Ruidoso's boys scored in six events.

Jeff Willingham placed second in the discus with a 167-7 toss. Gabe Tam was third in the 1,600 meters (4:31.61) and fifth in the 3,200 meters (9:47.27). Verlon Edwards tied for third in the pole vault with a 12-6 effort, the 800-meter relay team took third with a school-record 1:31.87 time, and Brian Davis took fifth in the 200 meters in 23.0.

The Warrior total probably would have been even higher if it had not been for some misfortune in the relays and 1,600 meters.

Tam was boxed in several times during the 1,600 meters Friday evening. He put on a strong closing rush to nip Wingate's Jasper Copey at the wire. Zuni's Albert Chopito won in 4:29.33.

"Yes, I was boxed in several

times," admitted Tam after the race.

The Warrior junior came back Saturday night to record a personal best in the 3,200 meters.

But bigger misfortune befell the Warrior 400-meter relay team. The baton was dropped on the first exchange after Ruidoso was in good position on the opening leg.

The Warriors had run a seasonal best of 44.18 in the trials Friday, and might have gone under 44.0 in the finals.

On the final leg of the 800-meter relay, several runners cut in front of Davis after the final exchange.

The speedy junior fell back into fifth place but put on a strong closing spurt to gain third place.

Michael Williamson, Matt Evans and Chuck Daniels were the other runners in the two relays.

Willingham, who has a best of 175-7 this season, had to compete in cold, rainy weather on the Manzano High School field next to the stadium.

He cinched second place with his second throw in the trials. Kirtland Central's Randy Eltsosie won with a 171-11 throw.

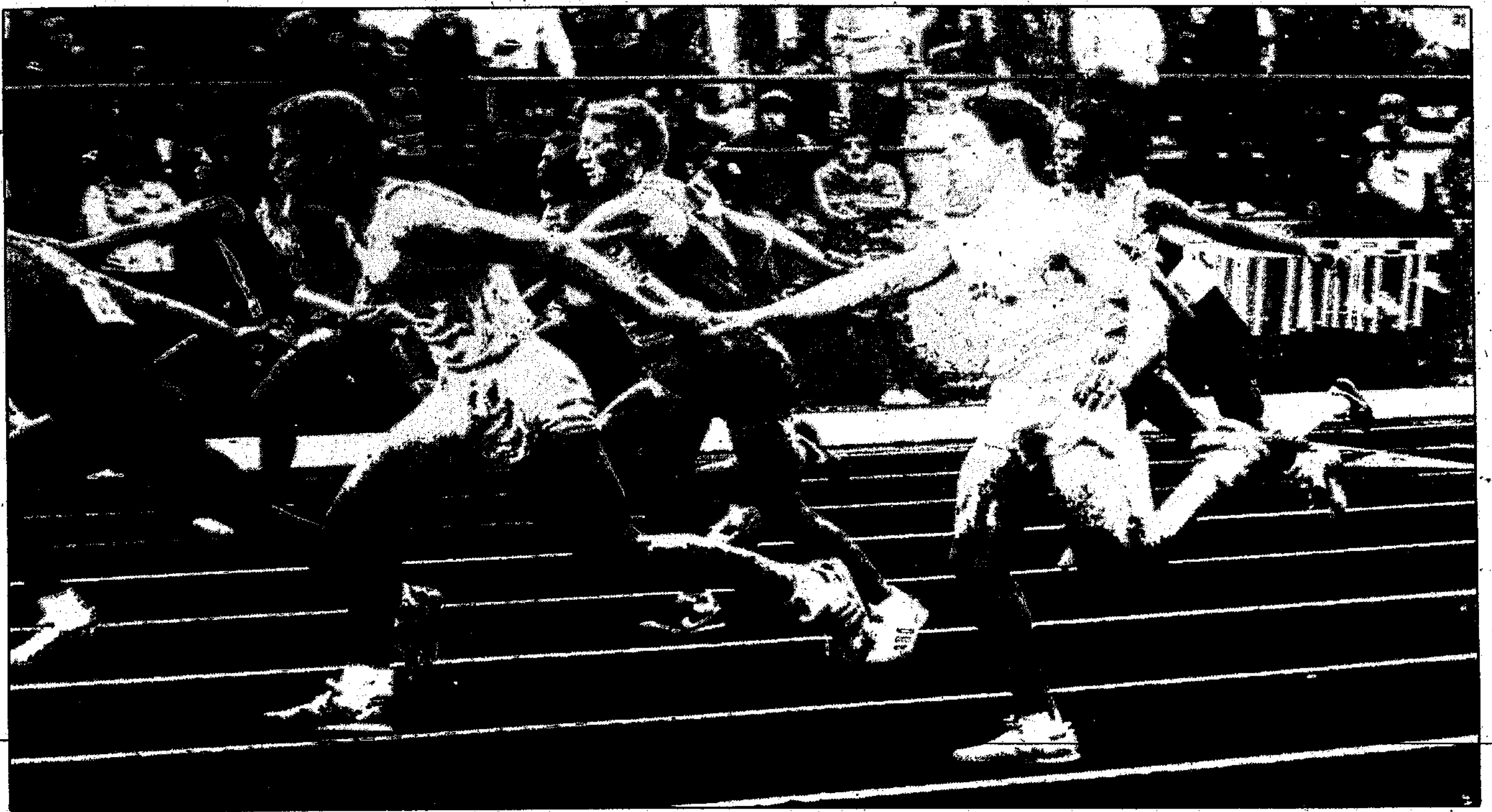
Edwards almost won the pole vault.

Ruidoso's Chuck Daniels (right) hands the baton to Matt Evans in the 800-meter relay at the state track meet Saturday.

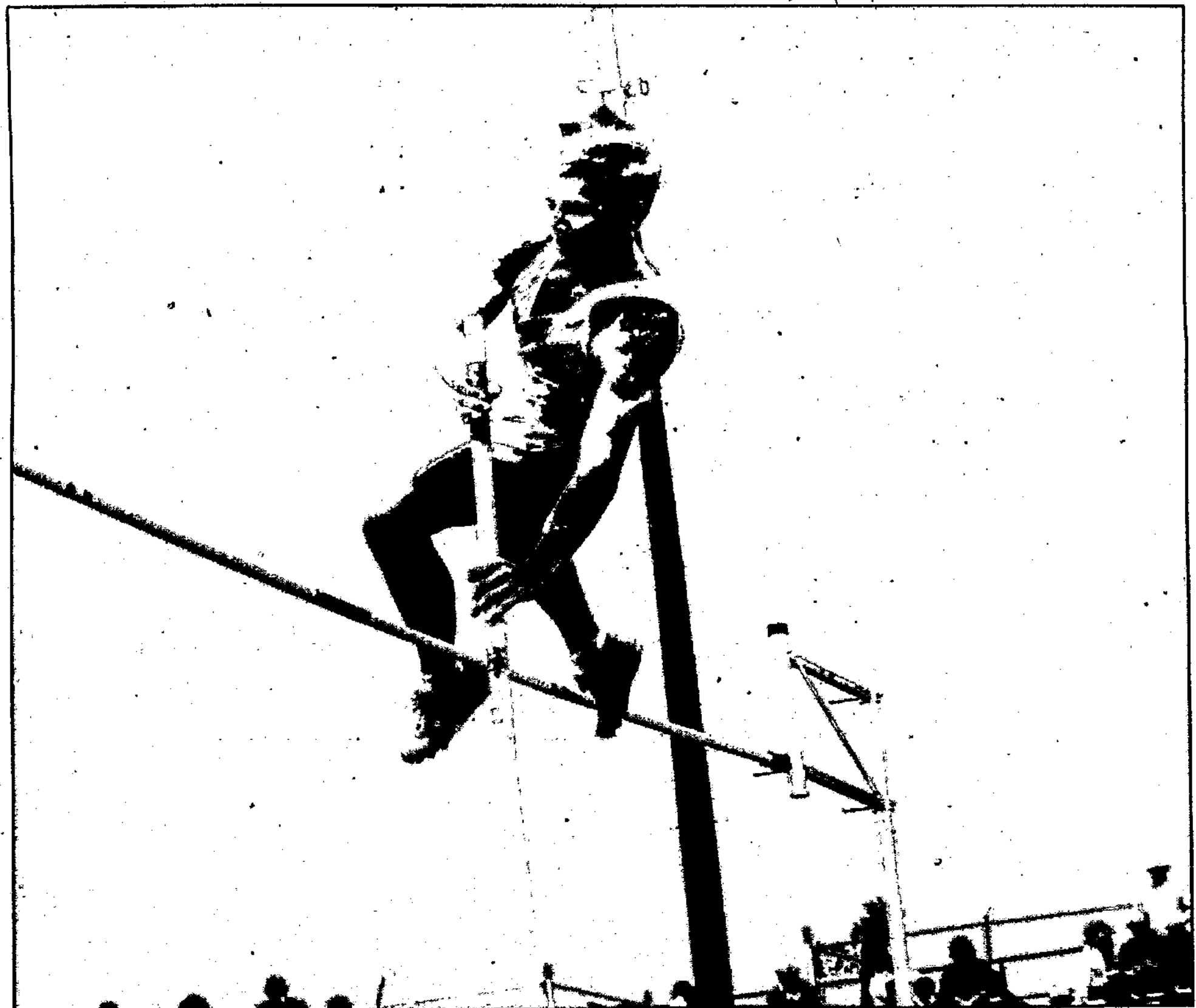

The volleyball players are anxious to return to the hardwood and do better. They should be very active during the summer.

So it won't be long before the practice field and hardcourts are again alive with the sounds of activity.

The Warriors are anxious to make 1986-87 even better than 1985-86 was.

"I think they all did well for the most part."

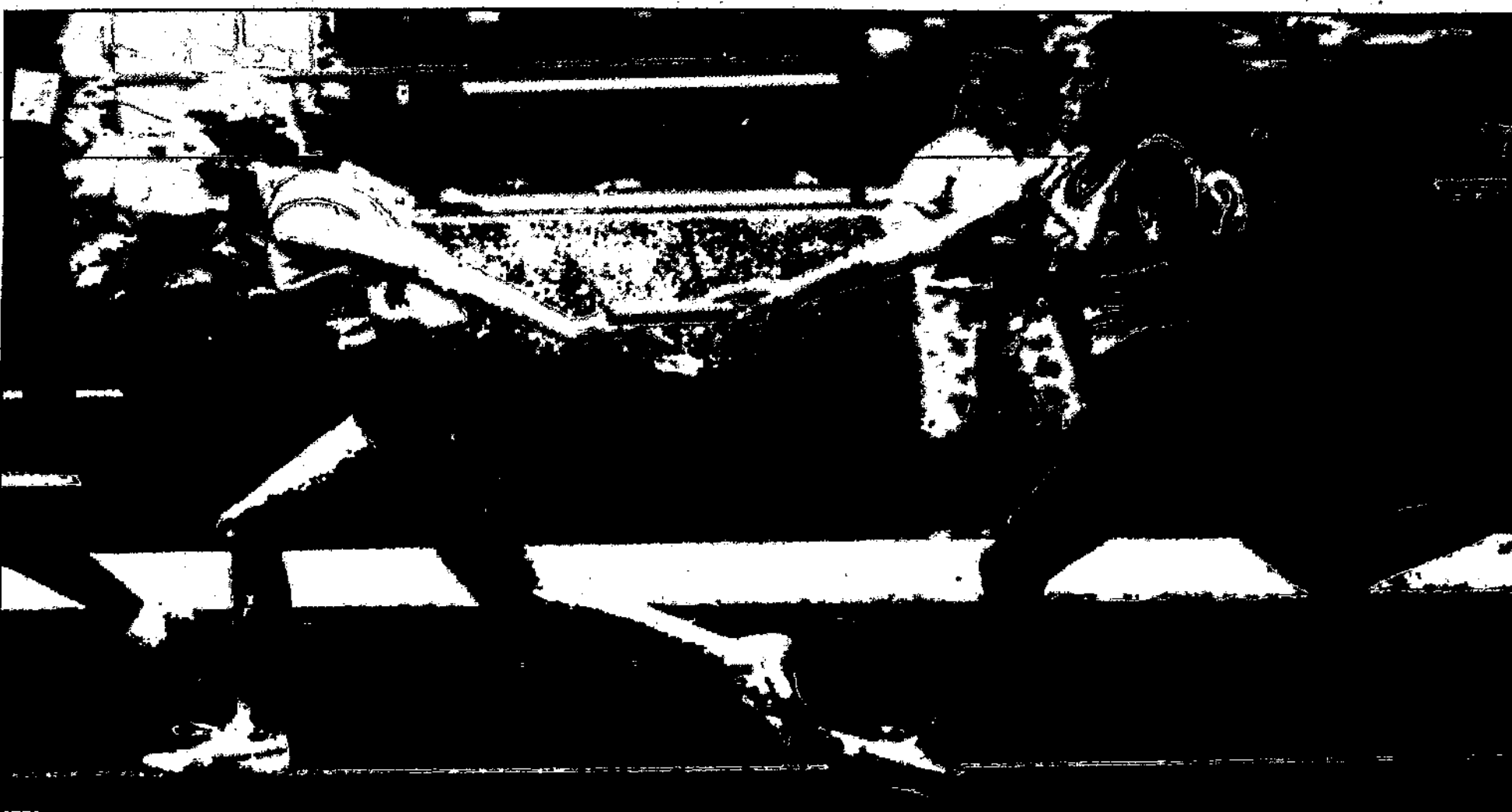
"Yes, I saw some good things," said Warrior head girls coach Jim Hofstad. "We improved our times and I really feel we're going to beat some people next year."

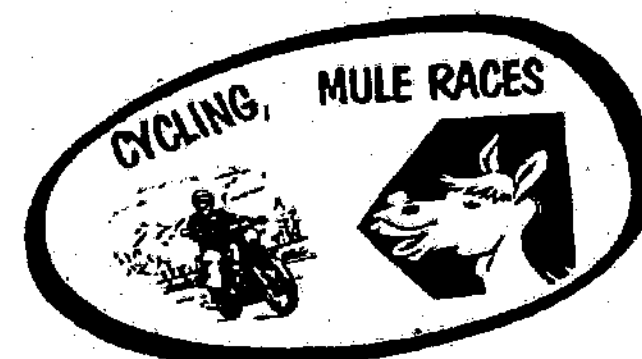

Edward Penfield

Services were held in the Lincoln Community Church and the Lincoln Cemetery on May fifteenth for Edward Penfield who was called home by Our Lord on May eleventh.

Father Burdette Stampely, in charge of services, read selections from the Episcopal Prayer Book, from which Edward himself had often read during his many years as a lay reader in the Episcopal Church.

Included was a selection from Saint John:

"Let not your heart be troubled...."

And also the twenty-first psalm:

"I to the hills will lift mine eyes, from whence cometh my help."

Edward was a dear friend of the Storm family; and I want all his friends and loved ones to know that I was not at the services because I had not heard about either his being called home or his services.

Edward was born in Lincoln May 28, 1911 to Mr. and Mrs. John Penfield and had lived there all his life except for time at the New Mexico Military Institute and in World War II.

In World War II he was an interpreter with the First Army, being fluent in Spanish, French and German. He was in the Normandy invasion, landing at Omaha Beach on D-Day plus five. He served the entire length of the war.

Shortly after returning home he fell ill with tuberculosis which he had contracted in Europe; and was hospitalized in November of 1945 at Fort Stanton, which at that time was a tuberculosis hospital for merchant seamen from all over the world. The hospital was sponsored by the Episcopal Church. In addition to merchant seamen, the hospital also accepted American Veterans.

In the hospital Edward stayed two and one half years; and although with only one lung, remained active, cheerful and helpful.

Betty Shrecengost, his life long across-the-street neighbor, said of Edward:

"He touched so many lives, and did it so easily. It came natural to him to be a friend to anyone in need."

Before World War II Edward had served as county clerk; and after leaving the hospital, he worked several years as clerk of the district court.

Edward had many gifts, but the greatest was his ability to cheer and inspire you. And the pioneer charm of the village of Lincoln abided deep in his nature.

Since its beginning he was active in The Day in Old Lincoln and the historical pageant, "The Last Escape of Billy the Kid".

Having known many of the pioneer figures of Lincoln County history, he was well versed in events of the early days.

He rewrote several scenes of the pageant and made a hand in the sound booth, playing the voices of John Tunstall, Governor Wallace, Buckshot Roberts, Colonel Dudley, and others, at different times through the years.

His gift shop in the front of his native home, next to the John Tunstall Store, was for the last several years a favorite stopping point in Lincoln.

Edward has left his mark upon his native village of Lincoln; he holds a fond spot in the hearts of all his neighbors. Lincoln County has received great benefit from the life of its native son, Edward Penfield.

He will always remain like a brother to us. We are grateful to God that he recovered from his dire illness and lived so many happy years among us. And now we rejoice that Edward has been welcomed by Our Lord, whom he served long and faithfully.

The applicable CUSIP numbers will be printed on the Bonds; provided that an incorrect CUSIP number printed on any Bond or the absence of any CUSIP number on any Bond shall not constitute cause to refuse delivery of the Bonds.

The Bonds will be awarded to the best bidder considering the interest rate or rates specified and the premium offered, if any, and subject to the right of the Board to reject all bids. If there are two or more equal bids at not less than par and accrued interest which are the best bids received, the Board shall determine which bid is to be accepted.

The purchaser must pay accrued interest from the date of the Bonds (July 1, 1986) to the date of delivery. The Bonds will not be sold for less than par and accrued interest. The validity and legality of the Bonds will be approved by Madril, Sperling, Roehl, Harris & Sisk, P.A., Albuquerque, New Mexico, Bond Counsel, whose approving opinion, together with the printed Bonds and a complete transcript of the legal proceedings, including a certificate stating that no litigation affecting the Bonds is pending, will be furnished to the purchaser without charge.

In the opinion of Bond Counsel, under existing law, interest on the Bonds is exempt from federal income tax. The District will covenant to take such action as may be required of the District for the interest on the Bonds to be and remain exempt from federal income tax, and not to take any action which would adversely affect such exemption, under the federal tax laws that apply to the Bonds, and also under H.R. 2835, as passed by the House of Representatives on December 17, 1985 and currently pending in the Senate, with the effective date stated in certain provisions thereof listed in the March 14, 1986 Joint Statement by the leaders of the House Committee on Ways and Means and the Senate Committee on Finance and the Secretary of the Treasury (the "Bill"), except to the extent that such covenant, as it applies to the Bill, need not be complied with (based upon an opinion or opinions of nationally recognized bond counsel), in order for the interest on the Bonds to continue to be exempt.

The District will provide a supplemental opinion of Bond Counsel, based upon covenants and representations of the District, to the effect that the Bonds are obligations to which the Joint Statement applies, and that, under the Bill, the Bonds would not be "nonessential function bonds" and would be obligations to which Section 103(a) of the Internal Revenue Code as amended by the Bill would apply. The District will also provide a supplemental opinion of Bond Counsel, based upon covenants and representations of the District, to the effect that the Bonds are obligations to which the Joint Statement applies, and that, under the Bill, the Bonds would not be "nonessential function bonds" and would be obligations to which Section 103(a) of the Internal Revenue Code as amended by the Bill would apply.

On May 7, 1986, the Senate Committee on Finance (the "Committee"), adopted a comprehensive tax reform plan, including proposals relating to tax-exempt obligations. That bill, which is currently pending in the Senate, would, if enacted, amend the Internal Revenue Code as amended by the Bill. The Committee proposals generally would not apply to tax-exempt obligations issued prior to the date of enactment of such legislation. Under the Committee proposals, interest on tax-exempt obligations would not directly constitute a preference item subject to the alternative minimum tax generally applicable to individuals and corporations. For taxable years beginning after 1986, under the Committee proposals, one-half of the reported profits of a corporation not otherwise included in the minimum tax base would constitute a preference item subject to the alternative minimum tax of 20%.

It cannot be known whether or in what form the Bill, the Committee proposals or other tax reform proposals which are currently pending or may be introduced in Congress may be enacted into law, or what extent they may affect any of the foregoing, or whether and to what extent their effective dates would apply, the interest on which is excluded from gross income for federal income tax purposes. One or two more discharging wells are proposed, depending on the performance of the double-pump systems in each well to recover floating petroleum products from the water table. The discharging wells are located in the NE1/4NE1/4SE1/4 of Section 25, Township 11 South, Range 13 East, on land owned by Bill McCarty Construction Co., Inc. These additional pumping wells are proposed to contain a double-pump system that is essentially the same as the one employed currently at well R-1. The new system would utilize a deep depression pump much the same as in R-1, but the upper pump could either be a large diameter floating skimmer pump or a submersible, as in R-1. Therefore the well construction details are proposed as follows: The upper 30 feet of steel well casing and screen could be as much as a 24 inch diameter. From 30 to 60 feet below land surface the casing and screen might be 8 5/8 inch diameter steel. The anticipated withdrawal rates for each well may be on the order of 190 acre feet per year. With a possible three wells in operation there would be a total diversion of as much as 570 acre feet per year.

The discharge from the depression pumps in each of these wells is proposed to be reinjected into an existing well up-gradient of the product plume. This well, H-7, located in the NW1/4NE1/4SE1/4 of Section 25, Township 11 South, Range 13 East, is owned by the Village of Ruidoso as a supplementary water supply well. Since the contamination of well H-7-27-S nearby, located in the NW1/4NE1/4SE1/4 of Section 25, Township 11 South, Range 13 East, this well has not been used. The Village has granted permission to use H-7 and/or H-7-27-S as injection wells. If either or both of these wells cannot support the flows needed to create a circulation cell with the depression pump discharge piped directly into these wells then two other alternatives are proposed. Either another injection well will be drilled in the NW1/4NE1/4SE1/4 of Section 25, Township 11 South, Range 13 East and will not exceed 10 feet in depth; to handle the additional flow. If the hydraulics of this system work out such that we cannot inject the same amount of water as is discharged and still maintain hydraulic containment of the floating product, then a portion of the discharge water may be directed into the Village sewerage system, as is already being done at the site with the well R-1 discharge.

The quantity of water to be diverted is approximately 570 acre-feet per annum. This amount will be discharged via 2 or 3 pumping wells and reinjected on site through injection well(s) and/or an infiltration gallery. This discharge/injection circulation cell scheme is proposed to enhance recovery of floating petroleum products that have contaminated the alluvial aquifer at the site. The place of use of the discharge waters from the depression pumps will be diverted into an injection well(s), and/or an infiltration gallery, or possible a small slip-stream into the Village sewerage system with an outfall into the Rio Ruidoso downstream from the site. Most of the discharge water, is proposed to be reinjected on site. Nonetheless,

all of the discharge water will remain in the Rio Hondo Drainage Basin.

Pumped water will either be returned to the aquifer near the site by injection wells and/or an infiltration gallery or returned to the Ruidoso River downstream from the site. 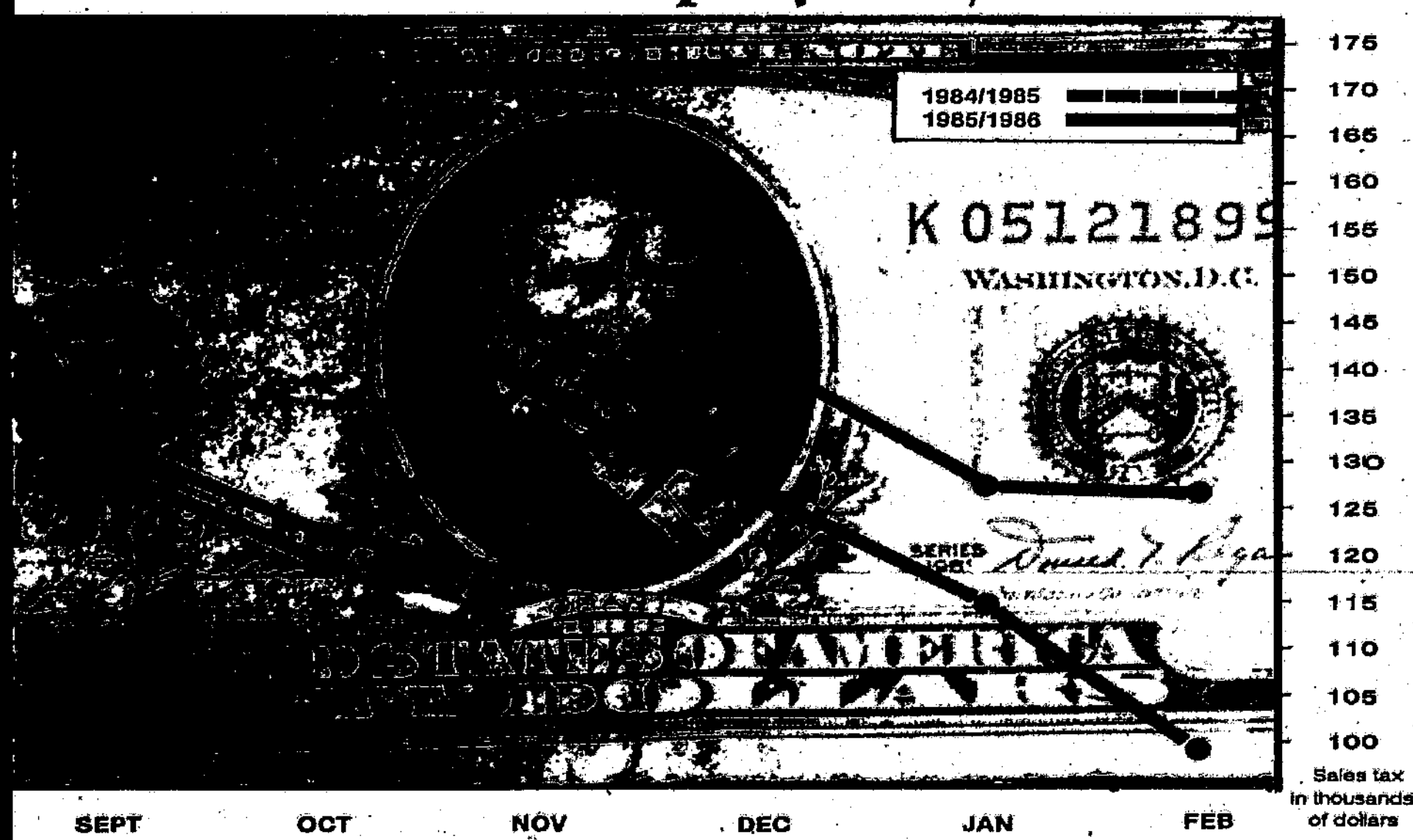

The Capitan Board of Trustees recommended a change for village animal control and adopted a policy for the Motor Vehicle Department (MVD) at their regular meeting.

The recommended changes for village animal control would make the animal control officer a deputy, authorizing him to issue citations. Offenses will carry minimum fines of: first offense—warning, second—\$15 fine, third—\$25 fine. If an animal is impounded, the fees will be \$5 for pickup by officer and \$3 a day kennel fee.

The new amendment to the animal control ordinance would state "any one owner, owning three or more dogs within the village, must have a kennel environment for the animals." The animals cannot be chained or tied in yards, acceptable kennels will have to be provided for them.

Mayor Benny Coker, Trustees Dave Strickland, V. Kelly Beavers, Norm Renfro and David Rouleau discussed the issuance of kennel licenses and a fee schedule for

owners with three or more dogs. Trustees decided to set fees during public hearings at a later date.

Reviewing the job Donna Runnels has done as billing clerk and MVD clerk, Coker opened discussion with a note from the state auditor. In his opinion employees of small municipalities are required to do more than one job at a time and should not expect additional pay. "It comes very close to double dipping," he said.

Coker praised Runnels for the excellent job she had done during the trial period. "At this time we have to decide whether or not to continue her in this position or to hire a part-time MVD clerk, or exactly how we will handle this situation," he stated.

Trustees agreed to, "continue Runnels in her present capacity (water billing and MVD), if work load is too great we'll change DVM hours and consider a pay raise when other employee pay raises are considered. If she chooses not to continue at both jobs we'll hire a part-time DVM clerk."

In other business, the trustees:

Obligation Bonds.

—Appointed to the cemetery board Dorothy Smith, Frances Shaw and Julian Romero.

—Appointed to the water board Dave Strickland, Greg Hausler, Jack Pogue and Rex Fields.

—Appointed to the health and sanitation board David Rouleau and Gilbert Montoya. There will be more appointees at a later date.

—Amended to an ordinance a registration fee for dances, balls and fandangos (the law dates from 1936).

—Agreed to pay overtime bill from Smith Machinery.

—Declared May 26 Memorial Day observance.

—Heard Renfro request that the village check into adding a rider to the insurance policy to cover the Smokey Bear Parade.

There will be a special village trustees meeting at 3 p.m. Wednesday, May 28, to open engineer bids for the well and a meeting at 7 p.m. to accept a bid.

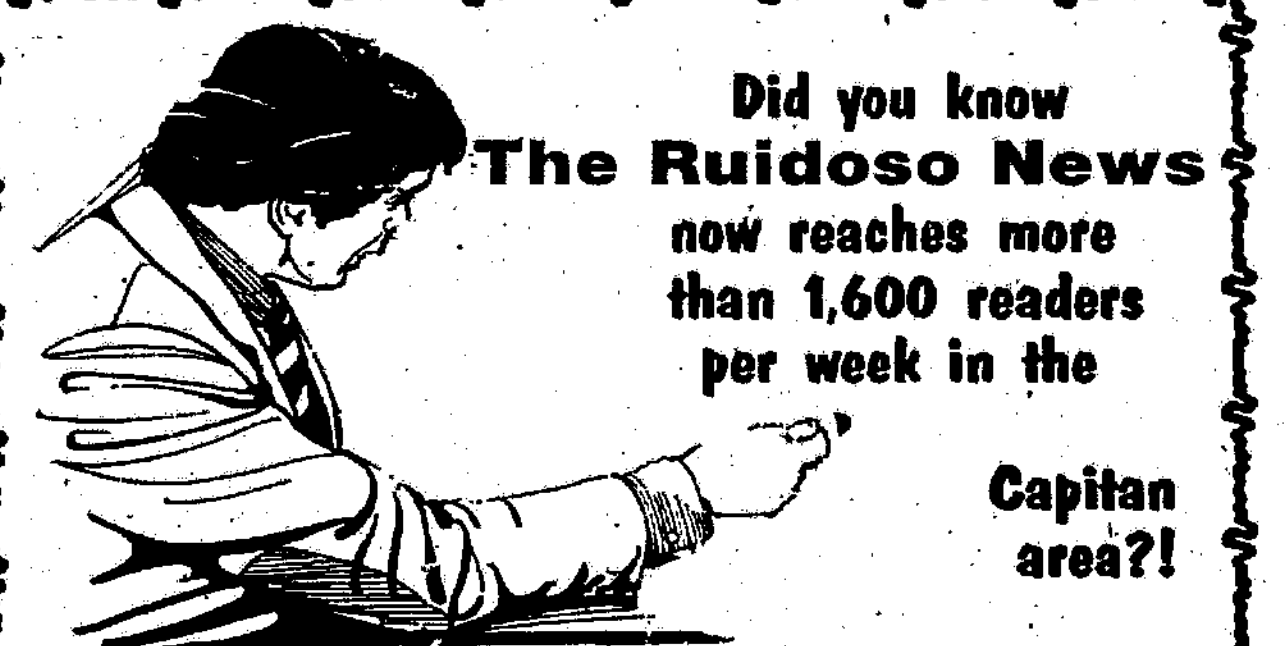

September they were called back, and apparently have continued their investigations.

James Weldon, 12th Judicial District Attorney (DA), also conducted an independent study of the case, but refused to issue an indictment on evidence presented by the Sheriff's Office. His office, too, was released from the McKnight case last September when the Attorney General (AG) stepped in.

Bussey and her family are skeptical if the AG is actually conducting an investigation.

When contacted by telephone, members of the AG's staff have had no comment on the case.

Since Judge Parsons placed a gag order on all the investigating departments, members of the DA's staff and the sheriff's staff are constrained from talking of the murder

case.

"The AG has some very, very efficient men working on the case," said McKnight Sunday. He said some other individuals also are working on the case.

But McKnight predicts no resolution until "we get a new sheriff's department in Lincoln County."

"It's (the Sheriff's Office) the most terrible thing that's happened to Lincoln County in years," averred McKnight.

Since he has spoken out so strongly against the sheriff, McKnight said he won't be coming to Lincoln County unless he can obtain a permit to carry a gun.

So Bussey continues her efforts to get the murder case resolved, and McKnight waits for a change in administration to see a resolution.

Both say they are ready to see the murderer or murderers brought to justice.

Airport administration agreement is made official

It's official—Fred Heckman and the Sierra Blanca Airport Commission (SBAC) Thursday accepted an agreement naming Heckman as contract administrator for the construction of the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport (SBRA).

SBAC unanimously approved the agreement that could amount to as much as \$90,000 a year for its former chairman.

Heckman was selected last month pending a review of his proposal by Steve Sanders, the commission's legal advisor.

According to the contract, Heckman will charge the commission \$60 per hour (plus gross receipts tax) for up to 1,500 hours per year. The contract also calls for reimbursing Heckman for travel, subsistence and out-of-pocket expenses.

"I had a little misunderstanding of that in my mind," noted Ken Nosker, commission chairman. He questioned Sanders of the breakdown between Heckman's services and his administrative staff.

Although the original proposal did include a breakdown of \$30 for Heckman's time and \$30 for administration, Sanders explained that Heckman won't keep track of his administrative staff's hours, but

will bill the \$60 for each hour he works.

Nosker questioned if Heckman will be paid the \$60 and per diem when he travels on SBAC business.

Sanders replied yes, that was his understanding of the agreement.

In an interview last month after Heckman was tentatively selected, Nosker explained his understanding of the contract to The News. He said Heckman would be paid \$30 an hour for his time and \$30 for administration, and opined that both charges wouldn't be billed for every hour billed.

"Anytime Heckman submits a bill for our approval, we've got a right to question it," remarked Commissioner Conrad Buchanan Thursday.

He noted that the commission couldn't have a better-informed administrator, and praised Heckman for his knowledge and abilities.

"Heckman has a unique ability for seeking and finding funds," said Buchanan.

Nosker reported Thursday that State Highway Commissioner Bill Lee notified him of a \$600,000 allocation for a feasibility study of access roads to the SBRA. He said Lee asked for the commission's recommendation on the access road alignment.

Commissioners passed a resolution favoring the road alignment from the 1976 Master Plan. That

plan sets the road along the ridge of the Fort Stanton Mesa and comes out on State Highway 37. Members agreed to send a letter of thanks to Lee for his help.

Nosker said right of way for about two-thirds of the proposed alignment has been offered at no charge by property owners. He said much of the remaining portion already is on county roads.

Suzanne Cox, county manager, reported that the SBAC regular fund, derived from each member's \$500 a year contribution, has a balance of \$5,893. She said the five members (Ruidoso, Ruidoso Downs, Capitan, Lincoln County and the Mescalero Apache Indian Tribe) are up-to-date on payments. Cox said the improvements fund has a balance of \$198,513, and outstanding bills of \$69,600.

The commission authorized Heckman to review and pay the bills, and approved his suggestion of implementing a purchase order system to avoid spending funds already allocated.

Nosker praised Cox for her efficiency and ability in her capacity as SBAC fiscal agent, and Buchanan asked how continuity can be secured in that office.

Cox said she maintains complete records so that if a change does occur in county management the business of her office will continue

County struggles to get Gavilan striped

Lincoln County Commission Chairman Bill Elliott said Friday that the county and state are working on a joint powers agreement to stripe Gavilan Canyon Road.

"It's aggravating that it's taking so long," said Elliott who hopes to have a definite agreement by early June.

He said the striping should cost the county nothing since the state still owes money for gravel.

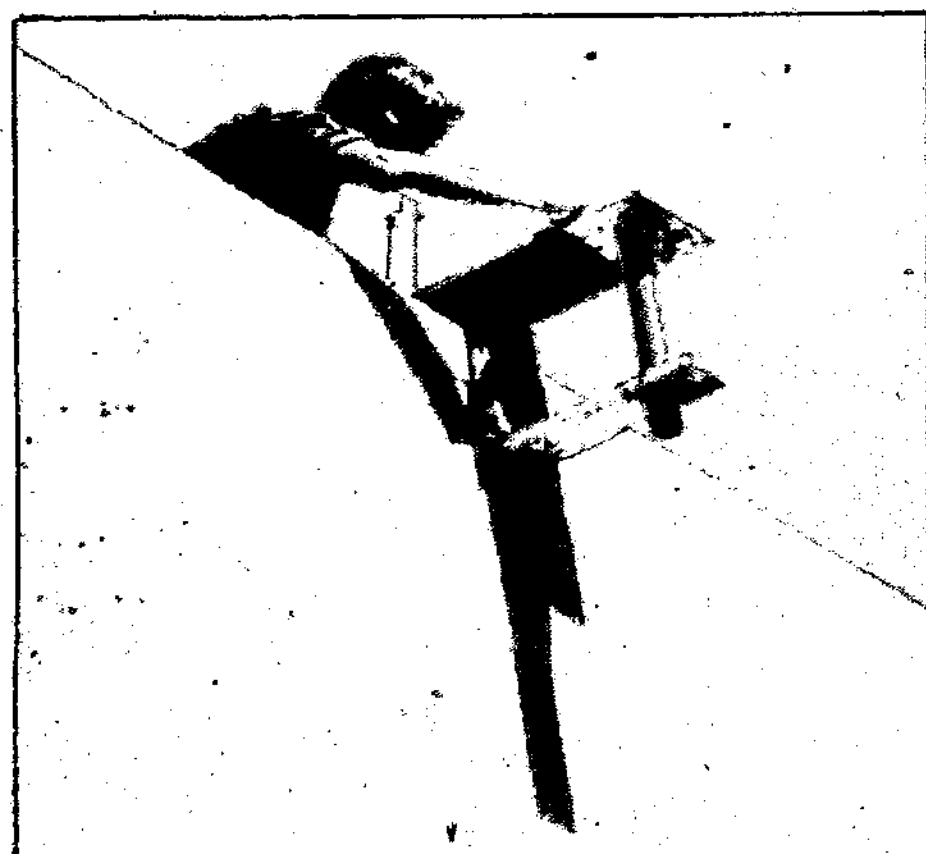
Elliott also noted that a petition is being circulated calling for adding guardrails on Gavilan Canyon Road.

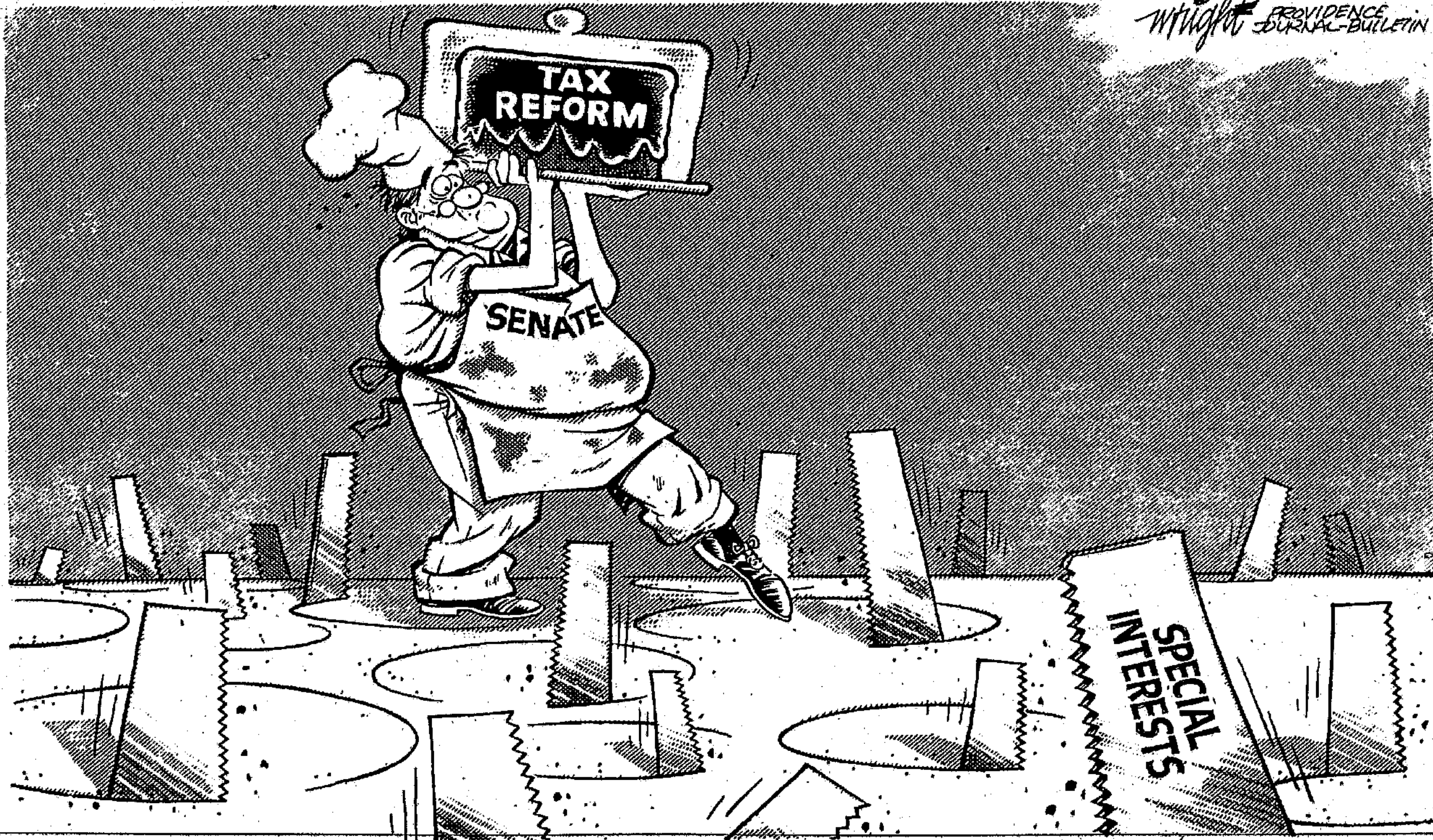

Two intersections in Ruidoso certainly could benefit by the installation of traffic-control signs.

The intersection of Parr Drive and Mechem Drive and the intersection of Fifth Street and Sudderth Drive both are heavily traveled areas. Both side streets split into "Y"s where they intersect the larger streets.

Those "Y"s create a difficult situation for motorists simultaneously approaching the point where the split road melds into one road.

Who is to yield and who is to continue? Not uncommon is the sight of both motorists stopping, each motioning the other to continue.

The New Mexico Driver's Guide offers no specific direction on how to handle driving in a "Y". It does say that when two vehicles arrive at an intersection at the same time, the vehicle on the left should yield the right-of-way to the driver on the right.

Strategic installation of yield signs could clear up any confusion.

At Parr, motorists northbound on Mechem entering the south branch of Parr Drive should yield at the "Y". At Fifth, motorists westbound on Sudderth entering the east branch of Fifth should yield at the "Y".

Traffic southbound from Mechem at Parr and eastbound from Sudderth at Fifth should continue uninterrupted. Traffic from Parr and Fifth out to Mechem and Sudderth also should not yield.

Two yield signs are all that stand between problem and solution.—DJP

Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE—Nobody in New Mexico ought to disagree with the aim of the Saudis; we'd like to see oil selling for \$28 a barrel, just like they would.

Trouble is, the way the Saudis are going about achieving that aim is likely to bankrupt New Mexico in the process.

At this time last year, that oil-rich Arab nation was still reducing production in an effort to keep the price of oil high. They allowed sales to drop to a mere two million barrels a day and they discovered that one consequence of that action was to reduce their prestige and their potency in international affairs.

That's when they determined to take the opposite direction, the one that has New Mexico's revenues reeling on the ropes as a direct result of their decision. They switched instead to maximum production, which is so high that it drives down the price of the product all over the globe and fosters the industrial world's bad habits of consuming more and more petroleum products every day. Meanwhile, nations whose production of oil is much more costly, like the U.S., Great Britain, Canada, Norway, Egypt, Mexico and others, watch demand for their high-priced product wither and die.

The result is just about the same as when a big chain store opens with low-priced merchandise and puts all neighboring mom-and-pop stores out of business. After that, the seller with the economic muscle, having killed off the competition, can charge pretty much what he wants—like \$28 a barrel for oil, which the Saudis will eventually ask for.

But don't hang around waiting for them to go broke in the process. With 170 billion barrels of reserves, the Saudis can keep producing until the 22nd century, long after the rest of the world has been pumped dry.

So how's their master scheme working? Well, in six months they have flooded world markets with their product, and thus cut its price by more than a half. That in turn has started reshaping economic prospects around the globe. Nigeria has already suffered a military coup as result of this manipulation, and the government of Prime Minister Kare Willoch in Norway has fallen. There is more still to

come. What's worse, the nations being hurt most are those least able to absorb such punishment. Among those, count Mexico, Egypt, Ecuador, Gabon, Nigeria, Venezuela and Algeria.

Maybe we should add at the end of that list New Mexico. True, we're not a nation, but our relationship to the rest of our country has always been more or less like that of a colonial dependant. Like the poor countries named above, our only riches were in the earth, and our economic destiny was determined by others outside our boundaries.

So New Mexico has been hit in much the same way as the poorer oil-producing nations we resemble. Our state revenues have plummeted, and our leaders wring their hands, unwilling or afraid to take the steps called for by this emergency.

As might be expected, production continues to fall in all parts of the United States, including New Mexico, till by the year-end we will have dropped several thousand barrels of production a day. Exploration also withers, because we can't compete. Thus the nation's dependence on the OPEC countries grows and grows.

Maybe that's when the federal government will take some steps, when it is clear that our national security can be threatened economically more successfully than it can be militarily.

There's no telling what shape New Mexico will be in by that time. The recalcitrance of those at the top here and their willingness to face the problem squarely has already squandered much time. Because they put their personal political careers first, state surpluses and reserves got eaten up, with little likelihood that we will be able to build them back up again. Too many elected officials kept on trying to con themselves into believing they would wake up one day and find this problem had gone away. It hasn't, and it isn't likely to soon.

When will we get that \$28-a-barrel oil that could turn everything rosy again for New Mexico? "Not too soon," says Saudi oil minister Amad Zaki Yamani. "Not in a matter of a year or two."

Sounds like we'd better stop hoping and start working instead.

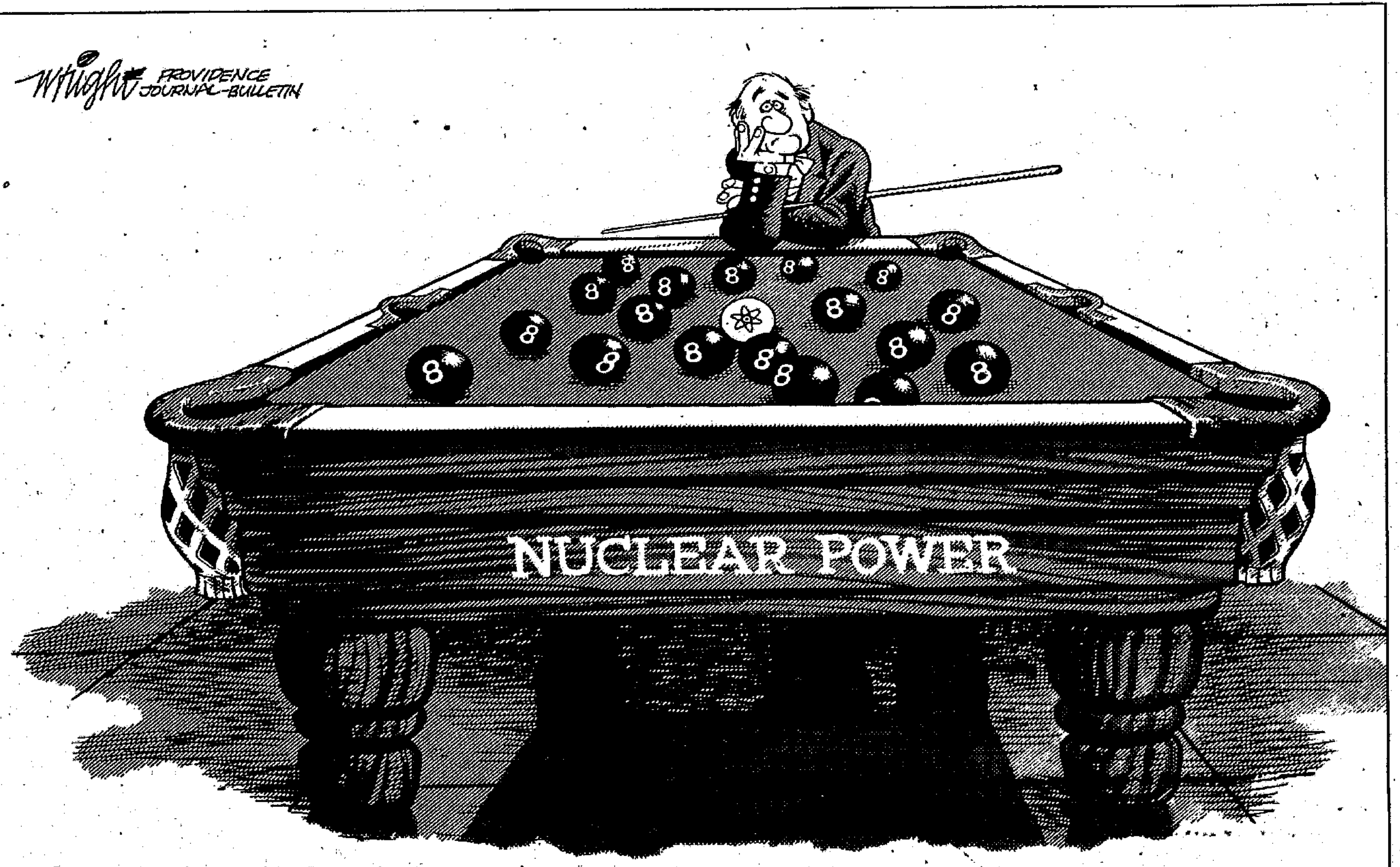

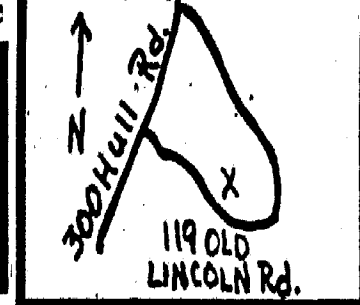
