Judge names Harris as winner

Around 3 p.m. last Thursday J.C. "Jake" Harris became mayor of the Village of Ruidoso Downs.

He was not in Ruidoso Downs when sworn in as mayor, but Carrizozo.

Harris was sworn in as the Ruidoso Downs mayor in the District courthouse by District Court Judge Richard A. Parsons, who had just ruled Harris the official victor in the March 4 general election in Ruidoso Downs.

Carlton L. "Bones" Wright, who was previously declared the winner in the mayoral election after a short but seemingly successful write-in campaign, was once again a private citizen.

After the March 4 general election, and an official recount of the votes in mid-March, the Ruidoso Downs Precinct Board declared Wright received 93 votes in the general election and Harris 92.

But according to legal counsel for both Wright and Harris, Parsons declared seven of Wright's votes in the election invalid under state law.

The final vote total was Harris 92 and Wright 86.

After the Downs' Precinct Board recertified Wright as the winner in the mayoral election in March, Harris obtained the services of local attorney Charles E. Hawthorne, who filed a complaint of contest on Harris' behalf with the District Court.

When Ruidoso Downs village attorney Don Dutton decided state statutes might be violated if he represented Wright in the court contest, Wright chose local attorney Gary Mitchell to argue the case on his behalf.

Last Thursday's trial began about 9 a.m. and ended about 3 p.m. when the judge disallowed seven write-in votes for Wright and declared Harris the valid winner in the election.

In court, Harris' case was actually argued by both Charles Hawthorne and his brother, Richard Hawthorne.

Testimony by Ruidoso Downs village clerk Wilma Webb seemed to be vital to both Harris' and Wright's case.

When Webb testified, Mitchell

tried to show Webb and election officials acted to the best of their ability and without the intention of influencing voters in any manner.

Mitchell argued Wright was the clear choice of the voters in Ruidoso Downs and difficulties with election procedures should not disenfranchise any voter or unseat any elected official, according to state law.

The Hawthorne brothers tried to argue that several voters in the election were not residents of the Downs, but lived in trailer courts or residential developments outside the legal boundaries of the village.

Webb testified she had based her decisions almost entirely on information supplied by Lincoln County Clerk Fran Siddens, who makes many of the final judgments on which residents are actually eligi-

ble to vote in elections conducted in Lincoln County.

After Webb testified, Parsons informed the Hawthornes he would not rule in the case based on state statutes or past cases that dealt with voter residency requirements.

Webb testified determining the residency of voters, mechanical problems with the voting booth and determining the intent of voters who cast write-in votes made the March 4 election difficult for her.

Election official the Reverend Dale McCleskey testified voters were having difficulties casting their write-in votes, and did not seem to vote in the proper write-in slot, which was the number one slot.

McCleskey testified since he believed votes would be counted based on the intent of voters, he did

not think it mattered which slots voters used to write-in their votes.

In later testimony, election judge Alice Allison testified the clip on slot number two seemed to stick, causing more difficulties for write-in voters.

When the trial resumed after a recess for lunch, the Hawthornes seemed to pursue a different legal avenue to try to prove Harris should be declared the winner in the mayoral race.

Siddens was called to testify in the case by the Hawthornes.

State election laws only allow write-in votes in the number one slot, which is much larger than any other slots, above candidates' names, Siddens testified.

Siddens testified other write-in slots should have been locked in accordance with state law, but were not for some reason.

Counsel for both parties determined six votes appeared in the number two write-in slot instead of the number one write-in slot.

In his summation, Mitchell

Harris ready to serve

New Village of Ruidoso Downs Mayor J.C. "Jake" Harris said when District Court Judge Richard A. Parsons ruled in his favor, and swore him in as mayor of Ruidoso Downs last Thursday in Carrizozo, it was a victory for not only himself but the people of New Mexico.

"Because of my case, it has been clarified how write-in votes should be cast and how they should be counted," Harris said.

Harris said he expected his case would set legal precedents in the state.

Carlton L. "Bones" Wright conducted a last minute write-in campaign in his attempt to become mayor in the Downs, and was originally declared the winner in the March 4 general election.

But because people wrote his name in the wrong write-in slot and did not write his name in a form that was in accordance with state election laws, Parsons declared Harris the legal victor.

Wright served as mayor in Ruidoso Downs from March 4 until about 3 p.m. last Thursday, when Harris was sworn in by Parsons.

Ruidoso Downs officials said since Harris came into office under such unusual circumstances many matters such as when his salary was to begin or when he was allowed to take office had to be clarified by both village attorney Don Dutton and the New Mexico Municipal League.

But Parsons made it clear last Thursday that he had officially sworn in Harris as the mayor of Ruidoso Downs in the District courtroom.

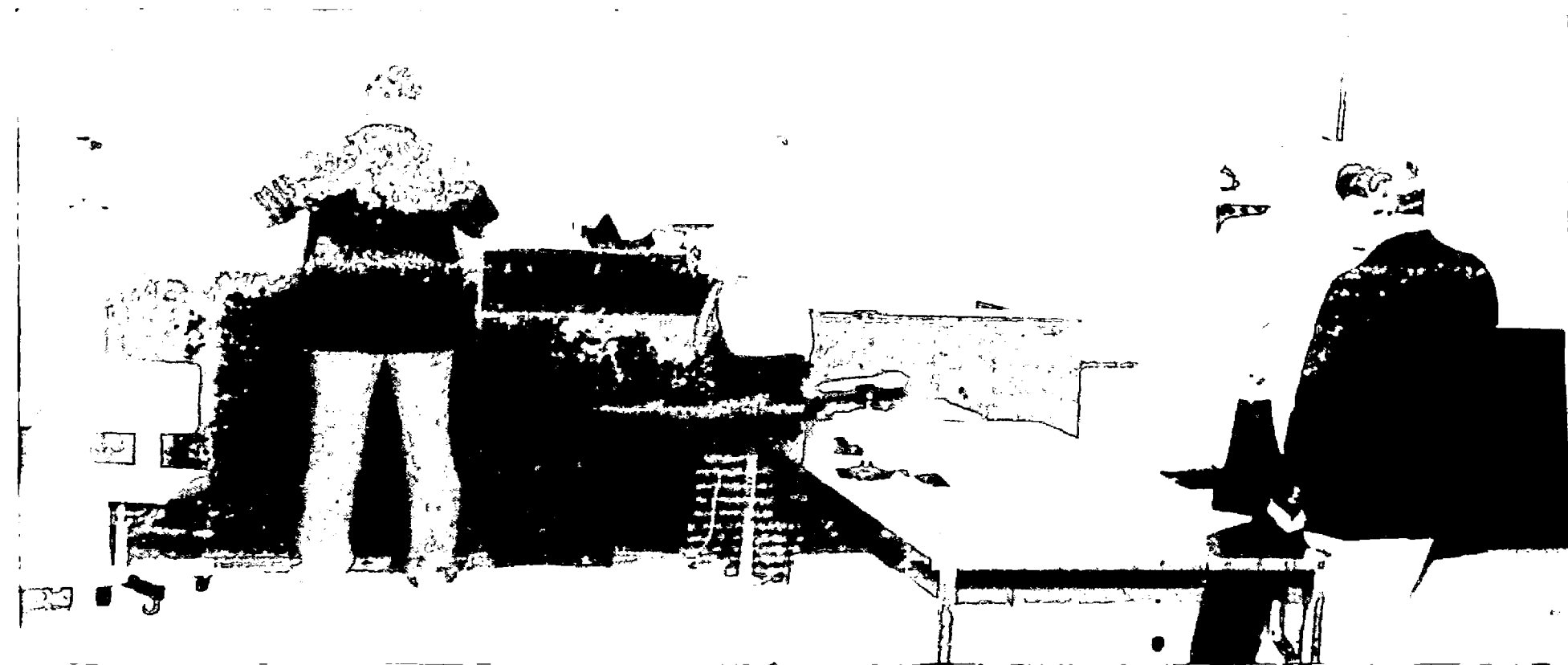
"I will meet with the trustees tomorrow (Monday) some time, and will make the necessary decisions on several matters after my discussions with them," Harris said.

"I have taken the oath of office and am the mayor," Harris said.

"If Judge Parsons says I am officially sworn into office then that is good enough for me," Harris said.

Harris said he is interested in beginning to honor his campaign pledges.

"I am going to work on improving the water system, improving the streets and improving the general welfare of the people in Ruidoso Downs," Harris said when reached by telephone Sunday night.

Council and P&Z consider annexations, policies

Discussions centered on when, how and whether to annex pockets of unincorporated land within Ruidoso's geographical area when the Ruidoso Village Council and the Planning and Zoning Commission conducted a joint workshop

Thursday.

Village Councillor Ray Dean Carpenter said the easiest way to incorporate those areas, which include the municipal cemetery and School House Park, is by arbitration. He said public lands should be annexed before the village puts pressure on private owners to incorporate.

It was learned at the workshop that some private property owners are utilizing city services and not paying for them.

"In instances like this all we've got to do is take out the illegal water meters," said Mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr.

A method of annexation recently considered by members of P&Z

would utilize a boundary commission appointed by the governor.

"If the boundary commission recommends annexation and the governing body turns it down we have problems," noted Carpenter.

Village Councillor Elmer Pirelli agreed, adding that members of a boundary commission would be

Airport assessment may be ready by late June

Progress on the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport (SBRA) is apparently on hold as the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) continues to review the Environmental Assessment (EA).

Gene Faulkner, manager of the Airport Plans and Programs Branch for FAA Southwest Region, predicted Friday that the EA review will be complete by the end of June.

"That's if we don't have any problems with it," he noted.

Faulkner said he isn't expecting any problems since the district office already reviewed the document.

Jerry Trujillo, FAA environmental specialist in the Airports District Office in Albuquerque, confirmed Friday that he thoroughly reviewed the document and the related comments before forwarding it to the FAA Southwest Regional Office in Fort Worth, Texas.

"It's still within the FAA," noted Trujillo. "They actually approve it at the regional level," he added.

Faulkner said the EA will continue through both the airport and legal divisions.

He said a tentative allocation request can be processed if a "finding of no significant impact" (FONSI) is issued after the EA process is complete.

The funding process leading to a tentative allocation will take 30-45 days after the FONSI is issued, according to Faulkner.

An application is already in the regional office for the \$1 million to pay New Mexico State University for the airport land, and those funds should be easily attained, said Faulkner.

"Money for construction's not readily available," he added. But at this point he said the FAA will be looking for money from both the current and the upcoming fiscal years.

"As far as funding goes we've got a problem with the Gramm-Rudman-Hollings legislation," said Faulkner.

But he expects certain high priority projects, such as the SBRA, to be funded at some level.

A major item of concern throughout the environmental process was the discovery of an endangered species, the Kuenzler's hedgehog cactus, at the airport site on Fort Stanton Mesa.

Trujillo said the FAA completed a formal consultation with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Department before that agency wrote a biological opinion on the airport's possible impact on the cactus.

They found that the construction of the SBRA is "not likely to jeopardize the continued existence of the Kuenzler's hedgehog cactus," according to the opinion they wrote for the EA.

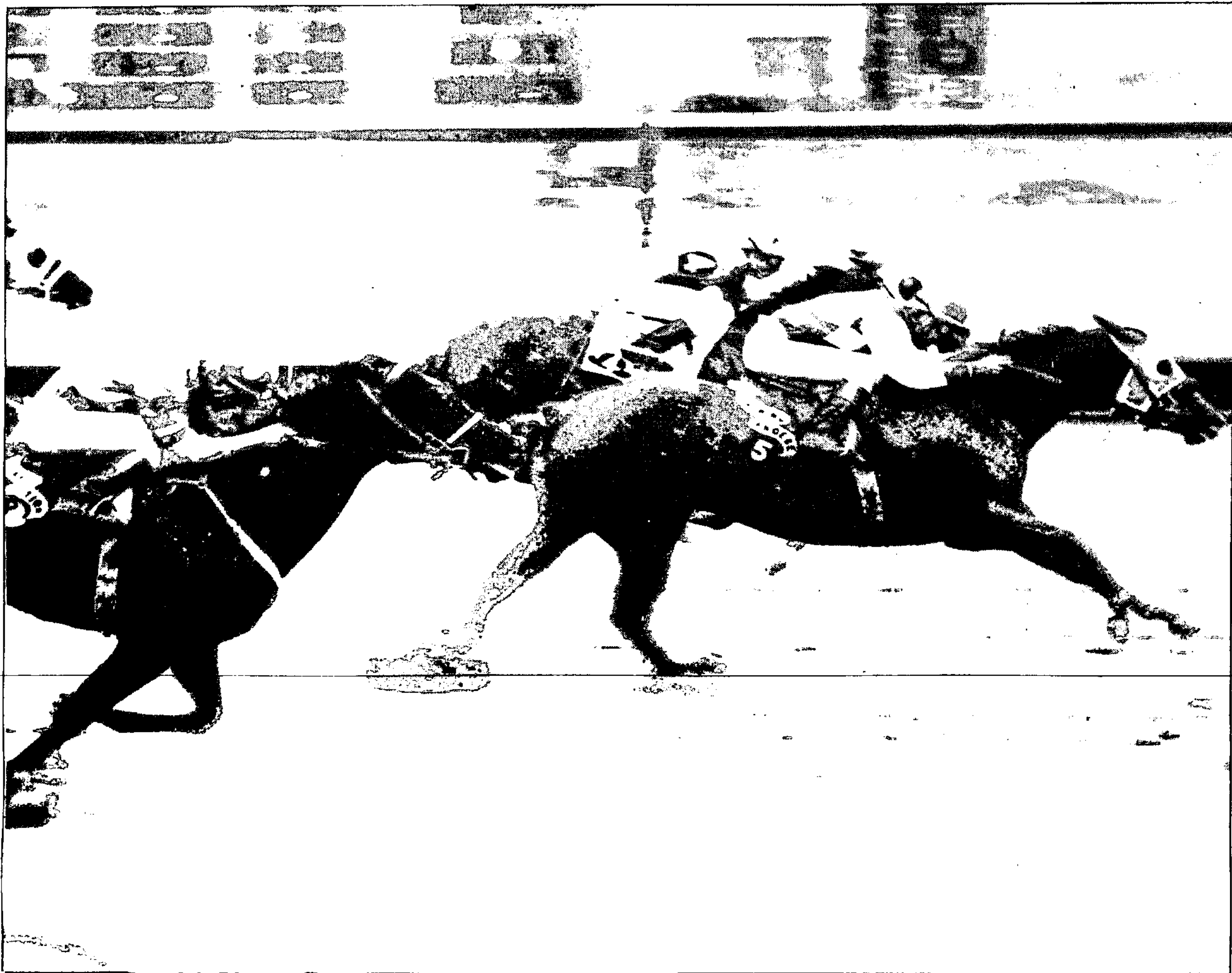
Anyone unsure about the precinct where they should vote may call the County Clerk's Office at 648-2337. Village clerks can also provide information on where to vote.

Last minute dash fails as Dashing Phoebe wins

The speedy quarter-horse filly Dashing Phoebe held off a strong challenge from Reach Together to post a narrow victory in Saturday's Kansas Derby at Ruidoso Downs Race Track.

Saturday's renewal of the Kansas Derby saw Dashing Phoebe backed down to the 4-5 choice to win the 400-yard stake, which offered a gross purse of \$241,980. Savy Edition, the filly who had turned in the fastest qualifying time in trials two weeks ago, was the second favorite at 4-1. The Dwayne Gilbreath-trained entry of Six Popper and Dash S Shadow went postward as the third pick of 3,552 fans on hand for the afternoon racing program.

Jockey Jerry Nicodemus got Dashing Phoebe away from the gates in good order taking a clear half-length lead out of the No. 6 post position. Two doors down, Reach Together closed strongly on the leader with Danny Campbell at the helm. Jockey Rudy Bustamante ran a good race aboard top qualifier Savy Edition from the far outside post after coming out a step slow.

Dashing Phoebe held on to win by a head in 19.86 seconds, equalling the second-fastest time in 12 runnings of the Kansas Derby. Reach Together crossed the wire another three-quarter lengths in front of Savy Edition. Sticks And Stones, a 17-1 longshot, finished fourth.

The Kansas Derby win boosted Dashing Phoebe's lifetime earnings to more than \$480,000. First-place money for the Derby was \$99,172. Charles "Bubba" Cascio trains the daughter of two-time World Champion Dash For Cash. She races for the San Jose Cattle Co. of Pleasanton, Texas. San Jose representative Art Shahan said Dashing Phoebe will be pointed toward the Rainbow and All American derbies later this season.

Reach Together's second earned \$45,336 for AOS Enterprises of Manor, Texas. Arnold Simmons Jr. conditions the Raise Your Glass filly. Savy Edition's third-place effort earned \$23,235 for John Baughman Sr. of Seguin, Texas. Johnny Bustamante trains the daughter of The First Edition.

Saturday's co-feature - the Rio

Grande Kindergarten Futurity - could have been renamed the Bold Ego Futurity with three of the young sire's offspring taking the lion's share of the \$41,691 purse.

The 5-furlong stake saw Riley Allison Futurity winner Big Bold Boz suffer his first defeat as Sid's Ego collected the \$20,846 winner's purse for the Double B Ranch of Santa Teresa, New Mexico.

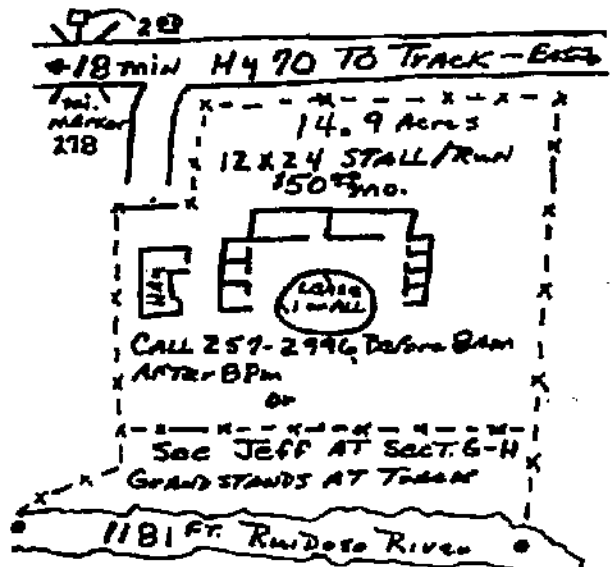
The two thoroughbreds drew alongside each other a short distance out of the gates in the Kindergarten, dueling around the final turn and into deep stretch. But jockey Danny Sorenson got the best of veteran Larry Byers in the final strides to draw away aboard Sid's Ego for a one-length victory in 1:01 over a sloppy racing surface.


Sid's Ego raced as part of a Clifford Lambert Sr.-trained entry with another Bold Ego colt - Egor. Egor finished 8 1/2 lengths behind Big Bold Boz for third.

Big Bold Boz's second-place effort was worth \$9,172 for owner Jackie Spencer of Alto. Egor, ridden by Casey Lambert, earned \$5,003 for Glenna Lambert of Ruidoso.

Special High splashed to a nose verdict in the \$74,676 Kansas Futurity First Consolation slated as Saturday's 4th race.

Dismissed at nearly 14-1 on the boards with Jacky Martin aboard, Special Hi broke from the No. 2 post position in the 350-yard dash, overcoming a healthy lead by 16-1 longshot Lucksgay Ladyolene under rider Jeff Williams.



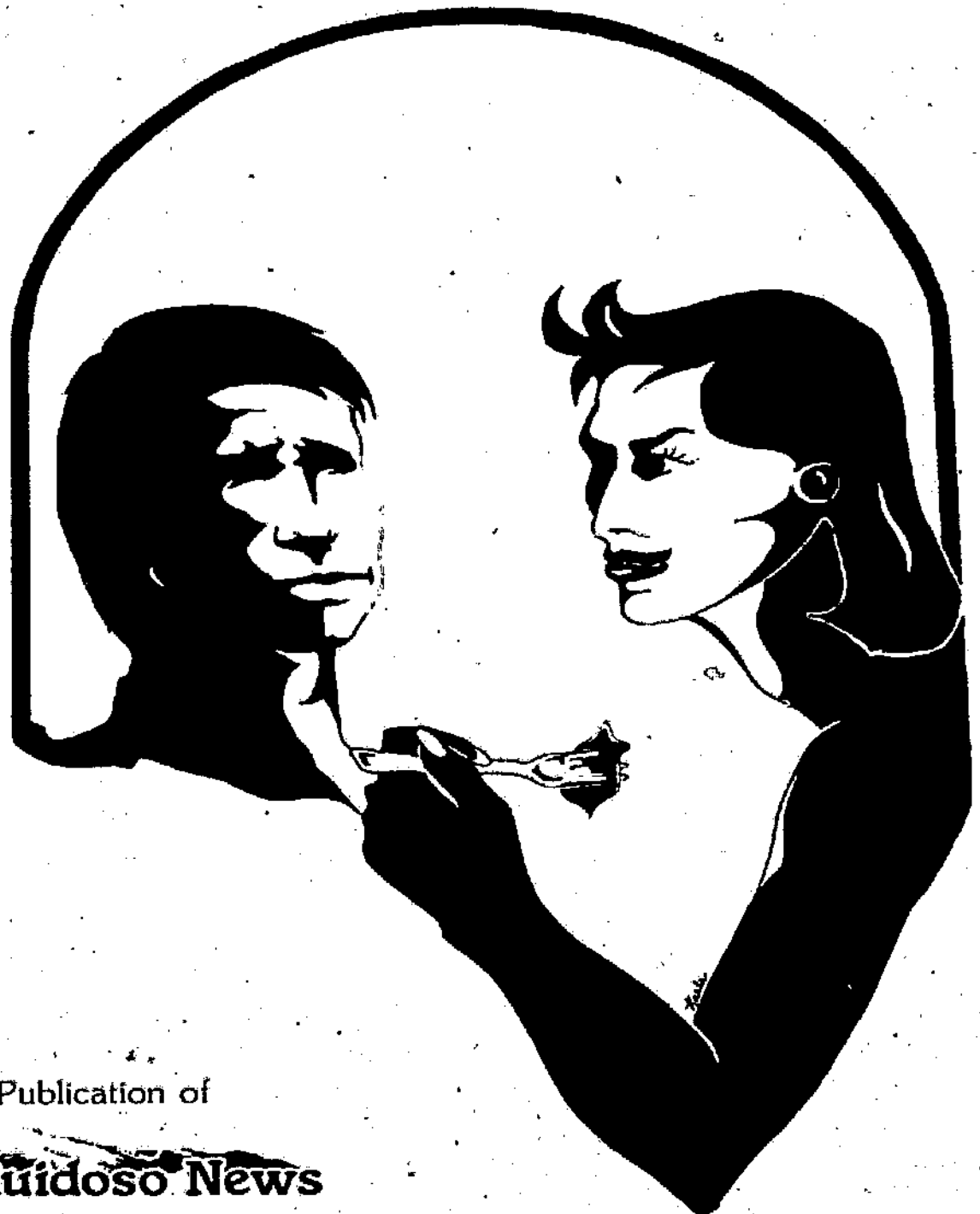

The Rain Crow had been true to his word. It is one fifteen here on the first of June, and here comes another rain. This time from the hills to the Southwest.

Ruidoso also will compete in AAU tournaments July 26-27, in Portales; and August 2-3, at West Mesa High School in Albuquerque.

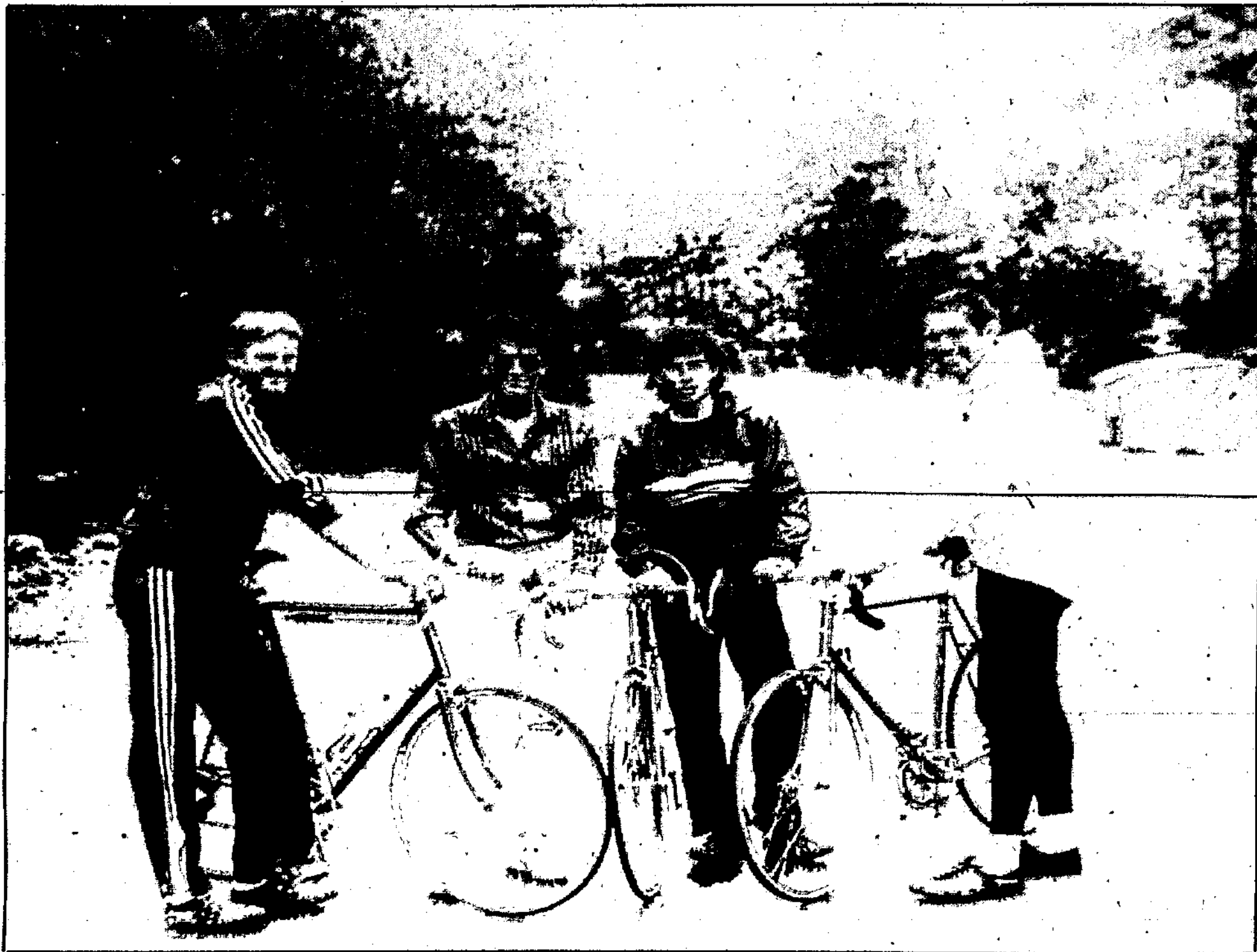
"It should be a fantastic experience for the kids," Arthur said.

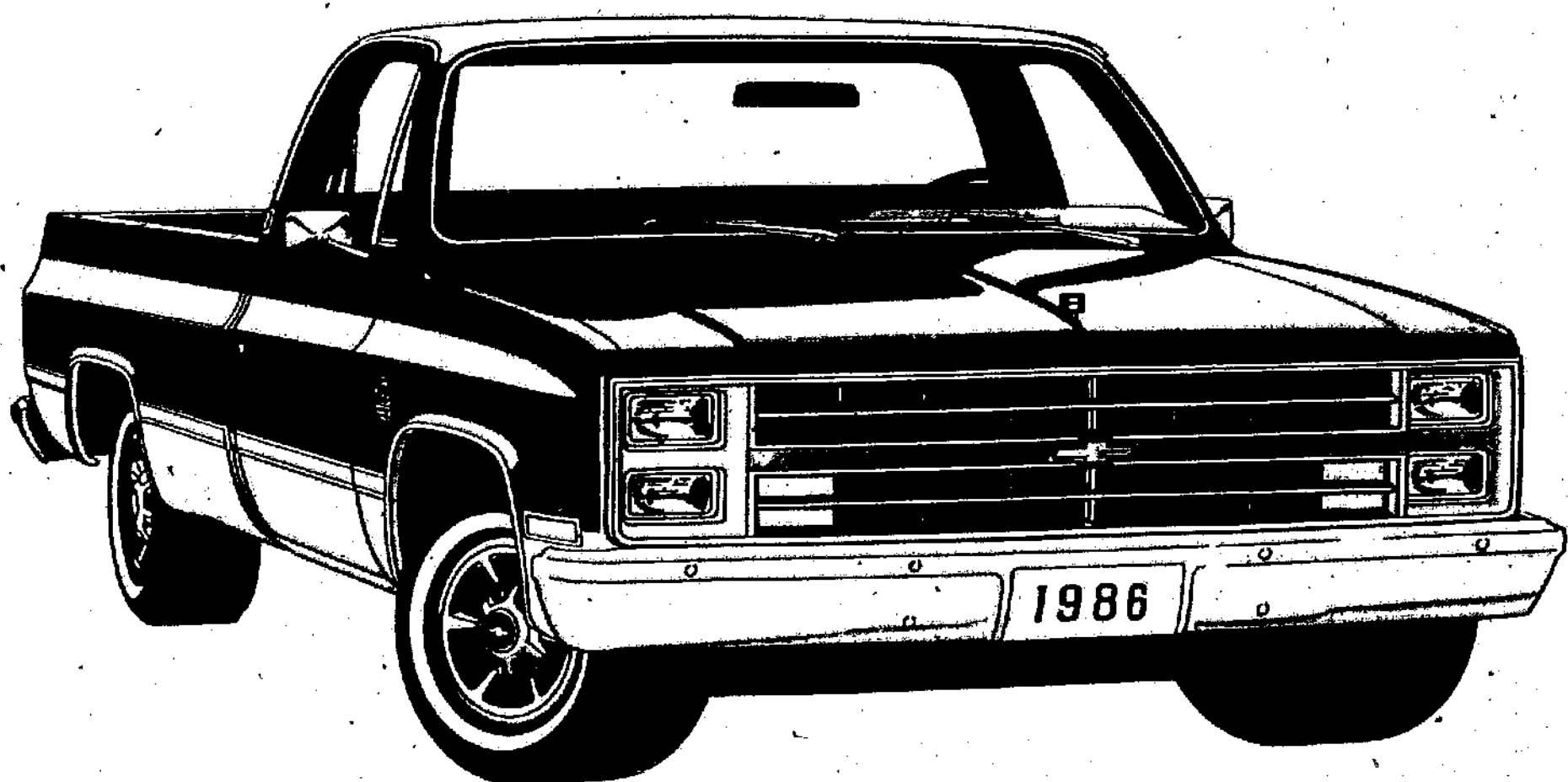

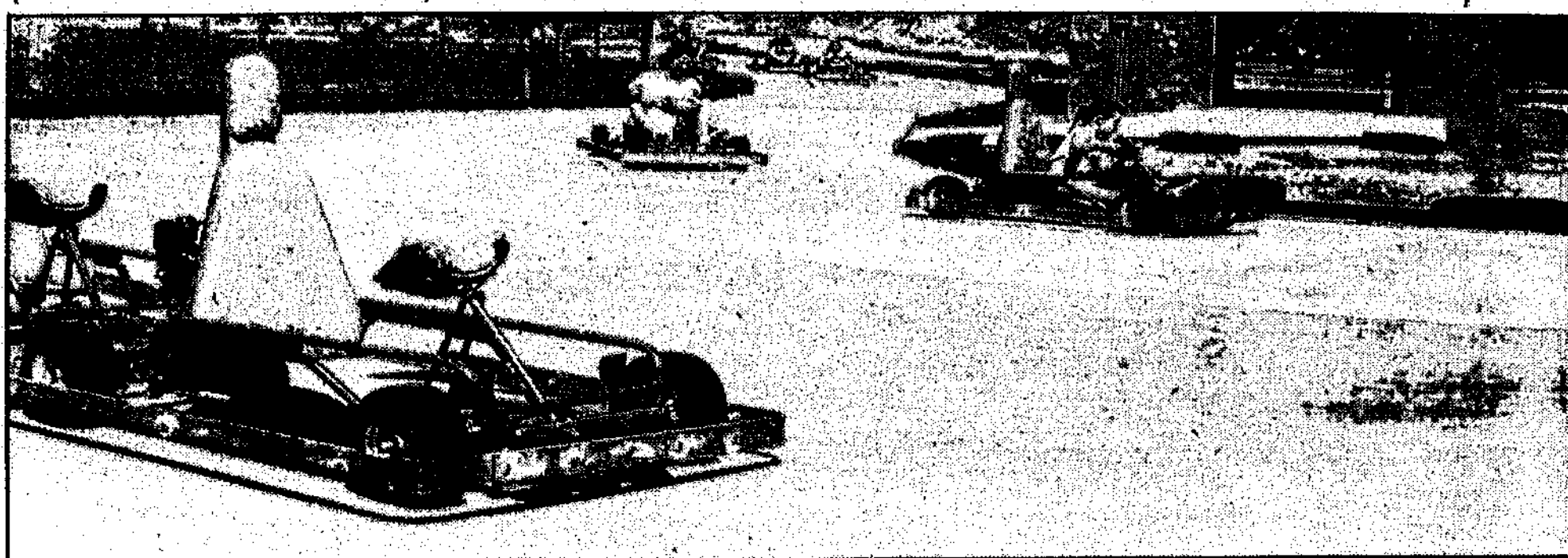

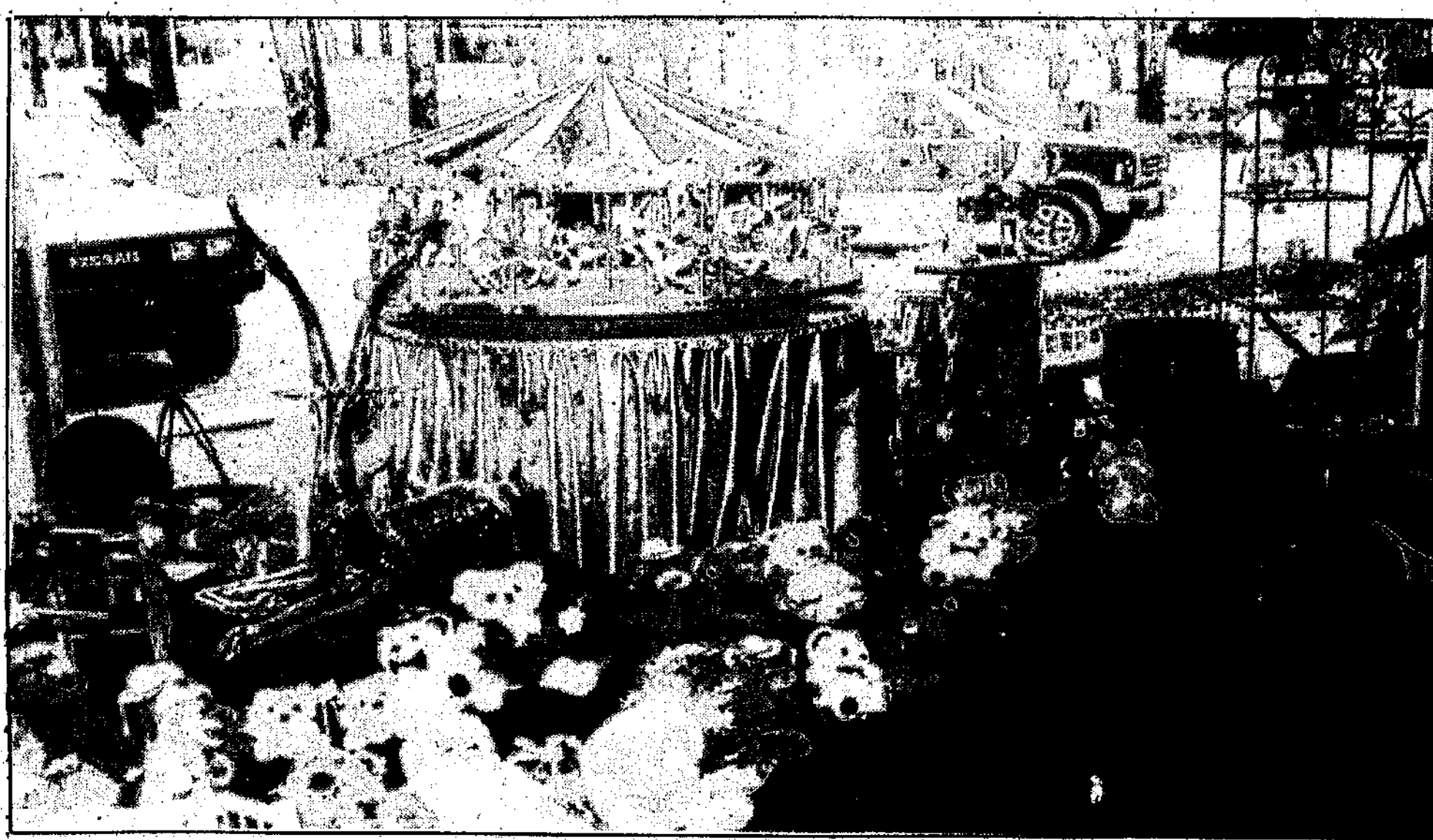

School board cuts budget

The Capitan Board of Education met in special session Tuesday to reduce the 1986-87 school budget by two percent.

The budget reduction was due to a request from Governor Toney Anaya and is a voluntary budget cut.

School superintendent Leonard Hays told board members Tom Trost, Tim Worrel and Preston

Stone he had received a phone call from the Governor's Office requesting budget cuts so "the governor will not have to call a special session of the Legislature."

There will be school budget hearings and budget approvals in Roswell June 6.

A mandated five percent pay increase added additional problems.

"It's difficult to add a five percent pay raise and at the same time make a two percent overall budget cut," Hays said.

The budget cut eliminated the elementary school teacher's aid, however a temporary opening, due to the leave of absence of librarian Becky Angell, will be filled by the teacher's aid, Kathy Dean.

The primary cuts were made in supplies and materials and in athletic activities.

from out-of-town.

Thursday's workshop was called to discuss the proposed Comprehensive Plan and Zoning Ordinance, and members of both groups exchanged ideas on those draft documents.

The proposed plan has no special category for churches, municipal lands or golf courses, and members decided to add a public lands designation. Within that category it was decided that uses should be consistent with uses of surrounding properties.

Mayor Davis suggested that churches should be in a special zoning category, and Village Councilor Victor Alonso suggested that a golf course or green space designation be added.

After hearing P&Z enforcement officer Sandy Hall read a list of changes made to the Comprehensive Plan since the last review, members moved on to discussions of proposed changes to a current village ordinance.

The Village of Ruidoso has an ordinance requiring a 20-foot setback in both the front and back yards and 10-foot setbacks on the sides in all residential categories.

Those requirements have come under fire during several council meetings recently, and village attorney John Underwood last Tuesday proposed an amendment that would have omitted the setback requirements from all subdivisions established before 1976.

Even though Underwood was asked in a previous meeting to come up

with a solution to the parade of citizens who have appeared before the council appealing variance denials by P&Z, his draft was apparently too broad.

"Let's don't just abandon them," said Davis during the Tuesday meeting. He then suggested discussing setback requirements during Thursday's workshop.

In those discussions he said it would be possible for the village to adopt restrictive covenants.

The groups talked of simplifying the variance process by adopting a set of criteria under which the enforcement officer can administratively grant a variance.

Among possible reasons for a variance listed were contours, precedents on the lot and precedents on adjacent lots.

"At what point do you deny a variance?" asked P&Z Commissioner Mary Underwood.

Alonso said requestors would still have the same method of appealing denials.

"That still puts us in the same hot seat," said Alonso, who noted that they would still use the same criteria they do now.

"Like how many people are in the audience," he added.

"It comes down to whether you govern by whim or you govern by law," remarked P&Z Commissioner Martin Rose, recalling times when P&Z has granted variances "willy nilly."

Rose said three years ago the commission granted lots of variances, but the administration then "came down hard" with the

philosophy that new construction should fit within the guidelines of the village ordinance.

He said that's when P&Z got tough with people wanting to build in the setbacks.

The two groups also discussed requirements for a certified plot plan when adding square footage to a structure.

Pirelli voiced concern of requiring an "expensive survey" for any construction project, and Alonso said the village should accept the most current plot plan available.

"It's trying to keep people from building on the wrong lot," said Davis.

Jimmy Neeley, village building inspector, explained that the amendment he's proposing reduces the requirements rather than creating a new regulation. He said the old ordinance calls for a certified plot plan for any remodeling or building project.

P&Z Chairman Mike Callaghan recalled an instance where a permit was issued without a plot plan, a structure was built on the wrong lot and the whole situation ended up in court.

Hall said she accepts a current plot plan, and doesn't require a new survey for every job.

Village clerk Leon Eggleston asked the council for an amendment to the lodgers' tax ordinance that would strengthen its enforcement.

"Out of 61 lodgers 20 haven't paid for the month of April," noted Eggleston. He said some lodgers even file reports without including payment.

Downs meeting is last one for Wright

Former mayor of the village of Ruidoso Downs Carlton L. "Bones" Wright did not think last Monday's trustee's meeting would be the last meeting in his short term as mayor. Wright was elected mayor in the March 4 general election in Ruidoso Downs.

Wright was elected mayor after a write-in campaign. He survived an official election recount about a week after the election, but was removed as mayor, based on a judicial decision about 3 p.m. last Thursday, by District Judge Richard Parsons at District Court

in Carrizozo (See related story).

At Wright's last meeting as mayor, Rip Russell donated \$10,000 to the village to help pave DiPaolo Hill located off DiPaolo Road and the entrance to the Redman Club, which is owned by Russell.

Several residents of Ruidoso Downs had expressed their desire that DiPaolo Hill be paved, according to village officials.

In other business the trustees: —Approved a new sewer line on Bert Oliver's property pending a routine check of property ownership for easement purposes on land adjacent to Oliver's.

—Approved the purchase of a new four-wheel-drive pickup to be used as a scraper and salter during the winter months.

—Officially stated the cost of moving houses in the boundaries of the village of Ruidoso Downs would be \$25 plus \$1 a foot times the width and length of the house.

—Heard funds from a garage sale at the Flea Market in Ruidoso Downs would be donated to the Ruidoso Downs Fire Department.

—Approved a 1986-1987 working budget to be submitted to Santa Fe for state approval.

argued past legal decisions in state and federal courts clearly stated no candidate could be removed from office based on mechanical or official error during the voting process.

But when ruling on the case, Parsons said state law was clear on which write-in votes should be allowed.

Parsons also indicated in his decision a write-in vote which was written "C L Wilson" could not be considered as a valid vote. (Parsons also ruled "Bones" could not be counted as a legal vote but election

officials had already declared the "Bones" vote invalid).

With one vote taken away from Wright because voter intent could not be determined, and six votes declared invalid because they were not written in the proper write-in slot, Harris had a seven vote majority in the election, and Parsons ruled he was the legal winner in the March 4 election.

In a similar case earlier in the week, which involved the mayoral race in Carrizozo, Parsons declared the incumbent the winner.

"An ounce of prevention would provide a pound of cure in these elections," Parsons said in an informal discussion after the trial.

Parsons said an "informed electorate" (in voting procedures) could keep election cases out of the courts.

Though seemingly dejected after Parsons' ruling, Wright said he would abide by "the will of the court."

After being sworn in by Parsons, Harris said he was ready to serve the people of Ruidoso Downs.

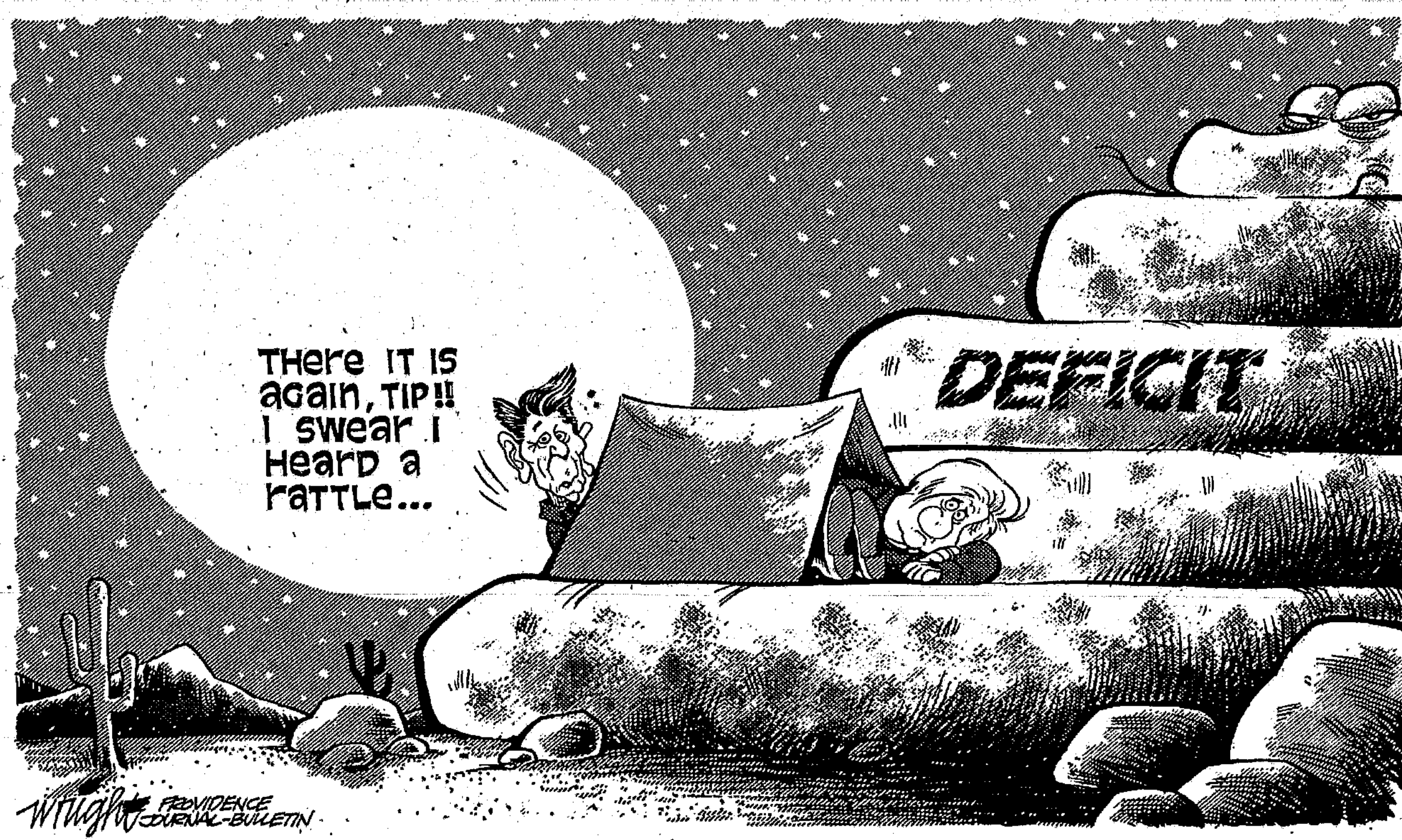


Grindstone Canyon dam

Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE—The Earl of Oxford, aka William Shakespeare, may have had in mind New Mexico this summer when he wrote about "sound and fury signifying nothing."

We get lots of that here every fourth year, when the populace is preparing to choose a new chief executive, along with the majority of the members of the upcoming Legislature.

"Upcoming" then becomes the operative word, as clearly distinguished from "outgoing," which, when written before a name, plainly suggests that this person's views can safely be disregarded.

Hence, while noises made by those who will be leaving still clearly fall within the range of "sound and fury," they end up signifying almost nothing.

Sad to say, that likely applies to all 112 pages of that report given us last week by the Governor's Task Force on Higher Education, principally because the governor whose name is on it is himself about done for. Whoever takes his place will undoubtedly want his own task force and his own report, which will obliterate and replace this one.

It would appear that this Anaya Task Force met all of twice, and there would seem to be reason to doubt all of its members even read the final report. What we have in this document is said to be mostly the views of Ted Guambana of the Anaya staff on what should be done about our state's colleges and universities. There are indications that whenever the task force felt his views on any subject were not wildly out of line with their own thinking, they simply assented to what he suggested to them.

Half the members of the group didn't even bother to show up when it was formally presenting the final words to the parallel committee of the Legislature, which is also making largely idle gestures toward studying the very same topic. That committee too is an "outgoing" one, so its views will not merit being taken too seriously either.

What the Guambana study mostly calls for is considerable downgrading in our academic institutions, and that kind of suggestion is just the sort to cause the legislators who represent the area

in which the college or university is found to come out swinging. Even if these were the best ideas in the world, they would meet considerable political opposition. That's one of the problems with discussing any change in the present status of things as regards these sacred cows, all of which make highly significant financial contributions to the communities in which they are located.

Among suggestions of that kind the Governor has chosen to give his imprimatur to are some that will curl the hair of certain academics. Examples:

—We should end graduate programs in everything but education at all schools but UNM, NMSU and Tech.
—We should do away with all "dumbbell" or remedial classes at the Big Three schools and let all such teaching be done at lesser institutions like the regional universities and the community colleges.

—And, though it never quite goes to the logical conclusion and says this explicitly, we should eventually reduce Western in Silver City to the status of a two-year community college.

That's enough material to get a few fights started, as they already have, without paying too much attention to the remarks of Santa Fe school superintendent Eddie Ortiz, a member of both the task force and the committee to which the task force was reporting, who observes that "certain constitutional issues may cloud this report." That's polite language that means, "Some of the ideas suggested here are almost certainly unconstitutional."

Unlike the turnout of task force members, the audience drawn to this hearing was a large one. That's because those who run the existing institutions of higher education want to know which wild-haired ideas they are going to have to be prepared to fight off during the current assault on their bailiwicks. Watching their faces as Toney Anaya summarized his group's findings, you could discern an expression that appeared to mean, "We were here when these clowns came along, and we'll still be here long after they get through with this foolishness."

Sound and fury, in short, that signified little if anything.

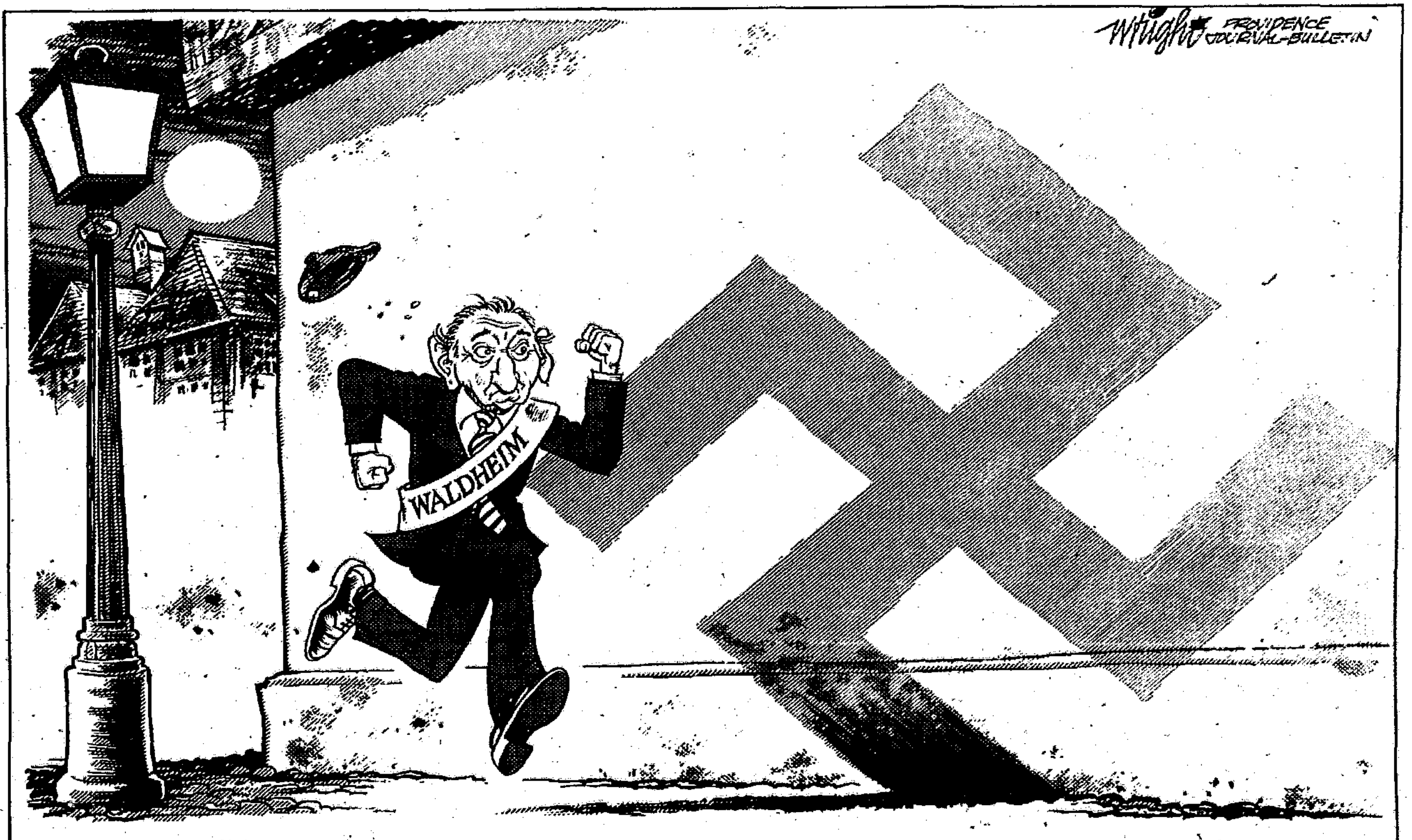

Box 637, Ruidoso, New Mexico 88345, filed application number H-2026 with the STATE ENGINEER for revision of permit to appropriate 3,700 acre-feet of annual of alluvial ground water of the Hondo Underground Water Basin.

An existing discharge well drilled under permit number H-2026, located in the NE¼NE¼SE¼ of Section 25, Township 11 South, Range 13 East, and H-1, was drilled by Ward Drilling Co. of Ruidoso, NM. It is 80 feet deep with an outside casing diameter of 8 5/8 inches. One or two more discharging wells are proposed, depending on the performance of the double pump system in each well to recover floating petroleum products from the water table. The discharging wells are located in the NE¼NE¼SE¼ of Section 25, Township 11 South, Range 13 East, on land owned by Bill McCarty Construction Co., Inc. These additional pumping wells are proposed to contain a double-pump system that is essentially the same as the one employed currently at H-1. The new pump much the same as in H-1, but the upper pump could either be a large diameter floating skimmer pump or a submersible, as in H-1. Therefore the well construction details are proposed as follows: The upper 30 feet of steel well casing and screen could be as much as a 24 inch diameter. From 30 to 60 feet below land surface the casing and screen might be 8 5/8 inch diameter steel. The anticipated withdrawal rates for each well may be on the order of 190 acre feet per year. With a possible three wells in operation there would be a total diversion of as much as 370 acre feet per year.

The discharge from the depression pump in each of these wells is proposed to be reinjected into an existing well up-gradient of the product plume. This well, H-7, located in the NW¼NE¼SE¼ of Section 25, Township 11 South, Range 13 East, is owned by the Village of Ruidoso as a supplementary water supply well. Since the contamination of well H-272-S nearby, located in the NW¼NE¼SE¼ of Section 25, Township 11 South, Range 13 East, this well has not been used. The Village has granted permission to us H-7 and/or H-272-S as injection wells. If either or both of these wells cannot support the flows needed to create a circulation cell with the discharge pump, then two other alternatives are proposed. Either another injection well will be drilled in the NW¼NE¼SE¼ of Section 25, Township 11 South, Range 13 East, and will be drilled by Ward Drilling to a depth not greater than 60 feet and/or an infiltration gallery will be constructed in the NW¼NE¼SE¼ of Section 25, Township 11 South, Range 13 East and will not exceed 10 feet in depth, to handle the additional flow. If the hydraulics of this system work out such that we cannot inject the same amount of water as is discharged and still maintain hydraulic containment of the floating product, then a portion of the discharge water may be directed into the Village sewerage system, as is already being done at the site with the well R-1 discharge.

The quantity of water to be diverted is approximately 570 acre feet per annum. The amount will be discharged via 2 or 3 pumping wells and reinjected on site through injection wells and/or an infiltration gallery. This discharge/injection circulation cell scheme is proposed to enhance recovery of floating petroleum products that have contaminated the alluvial aquifer at the site.

The place of use of the discharge waters from the depression pumps will be diverted into an injection well(s), and/or an infiltration gallery, or possibly a small slip-stream into the Village sewerage system with an outfall into the Rio Ruidoso down-gradient from the site. Most of the discharge water is proposed to be reinjected on site. Nonetheless, all of the discharge water will remain in the Rio Hondo Drainage Basin.

No consumptive use of water will result from this diversion. Pumped water will either be returned to the aquifer near the site by injection well(s) and/or an infiltration gallery or returned to the Ruidoso River downstream from the site. Any person, firm or corporation or other entity objecting that the granting of the application will be contrary to the conservation of water with the state or detrimental to the public welfare of the state and showing that the objector will be substantially and specifically affected by the granting of the application shall have standing to file objections or protests. Provided, however, that the state of New Mexico or any of its branches, agencies, departments, boards, instrumentalities or institutions, and all political subdivisions of the state and their agencies, instrumentalities and institutions shall have standing to file objections or protests. The protest or objections shall be in writing and shall set forth all protestant's or objector's reasons why the application should not be approved and must be filed, in triplicate, with the State Engineer, P. O. Box 1217, Roswell, New Mexico 88201, within ten (10) days after the date of the last publication of this Notice.
