Downs special election requested

One-hundred-eleven Ruidoso Downs residents signed a petition which asks the Village of Ruidoso Downs Trustees to conduct a special election, according to one of the petition organizers, Sandra Perry.

Attorney for the petition organizers, Gary Mitchell, delivered the petition to the board of trustees last Monday.

Downs Mayor J.C. "Jake" Harris told Mitchell at the regular trustees meeting last Monday he would see the petition was responded to in a proper fashion.

New Mexico Municipal Code 3-12-2.1 says, "... members elected to the governing body (the Village of Ruidoso Downs Board of Trustees in this case) may adopt an ordinance increasing or decreasing the number of councilmen or trustees of that body and calling a special election on the question of approving or disapproving the change."

The petition had to be and was signed by at least five percent of the number of registered voters of the municipality of Ruidoso Downs, Mitchell said.

The state municipal code also says the "... petition shall specify the number of councilmen in addition to the mayor which shall constitute the governing body of the

municipality. The petition shall be validated by the municipal clerk by verification that it contains the required number of signatures of registered voters. The election

resolution shall be adopted within ten days after the petition is verified by the municipal clerk."

The special election must be held within 90 days of the day the peti-

tion is either adopted as a resolution by the trustees or verified by the municipal clerk, according to the state municipal code.

Newly appointed village clerk JoAnne Jenkins said she hoped to

have the signatures on the petitions verified by Monday afternoon.

"The municipality shall pay for the cost of the election," according to the state municipal code.

Mitchell said if the trustees call

for an election to increase the size of the governing council, but don't include the mayoral issue in that election, he will challenge their decision in a legal forum.

If the trustees choose to ignore the petition altogether, Mitchell said he will go to the District Court, and if necessary the New Mexico State Supreme Court, for a "writ of mandamus."

A writ of mandamus is a legal order from a higher court to a lower court or to an official agency which orders an action, in this case an election.

"If they ignore the petition completely, it will be political suicide," Mitchell said.

When former Ruidoso Downs mayor Carlton L. "Bones" Wright was asked if he would run for mayor if the voters in the Downs approved a new trustees and mayoral election, Wright responded, "You're damn right!"

Residents protest actions of Downs Mayor Harris

Though an air of compromise seemed to exist between Village of Ruidoso Downs trustees and new Downs Mayor J.C. "Jake" Harris at last Monday's regular trustee meeting, a number of Ruidoso Downs residents walked out of the meeting in protest of some of Harris' actions at the meeting.

Harris appointed JoAnne Jenkins as the new village clerk for Ruidoso Downs.

But it was necessary for former village clerk Wilma Webb to attend the trustees meeting to sign certain documents before her official duties were ended.

After most of the business of the meeting had ended, Webb was recognized by the board and began to give a pre-prepared farewell address.

A few lines into her address to the

board and the residents of the Downs, Harris pounded on the table with the gavel and said, "Ms. Webb, please put that in the form of a letter and submit it to my office tomorrow."

But before Harris could finish his sentence to Webb, a majority of the people in the village meeting room walked out to protest the mayor's treatment of Webb.

As they left the hall and while they were outside the meeting room, some of the residents shouted at Harris when the trustees recessed before going into executive session.

"Is this America or Russia?" asked one disgruntled resident.

"There is no freedom of speech in Ruidoso Downs!" another resident shouted.

Before Harris interrupted Webb, he had also informed several

Petitioners still seek grand jury investigation of McKnight double murders

Frank "Pancho" McKnight has asked attorney Gary Mitchell to file a "writ of mandamus" forcing District Judge Richard A. Parsons to call a grand jury to review evidence in the murders of Thomas "Cotton" and Judy McKnight.

Pancho McKnight said Monday he'll continue his efforts to get the evidence in the double slayings before a grand jury, and expects the writ to be filed today (Thursday).

McKnight, Cotton McKnight's brother, and Terri Bussey, Judy McKnight's sister, last week presented Parsons with a petition, signed by the required number of registered voters, calling for a grand jury.

Although the State Constitution provides citizens with that option, Parsons didn't call a grand jury, but instead asked the opinion of the Attorney General (AG). The AG opined that not enough evidence has been uncovered for a grand jury presentation.

Judge Parsons Monday filed an order in Twelfth Judicial Court in which he officially denied the petition, listed his reasons and referred the matter to the AG to "determine whether there is sufficient evidence to submit a criminal matter to the requested Grand Jury and to determine whether there is a constitutional or statutory officer to prosecute the same."

Parsons cited portions of the State Constitution including provisions for the AG to assist the grand jury and for the DA to attend the grand jury. He noted a section stating the DA "shall prosecute and defend for the State," and a section empowering the DA to appoint a Special Assistant District Attorney.

Parsons said New Mexico law allows the AG to act in place of the DA "upon the failure of the District Attorney to carry out his duties."

Noting that convening a grand jury is a function of the courts and citing separation of branches of government, Parsons said the court has no authority to appoint a special prosecutor.

He said the Constitution "does not delineate the scope of inquiry by a Grand Jury nor the manner in which the investigation will be conducted or in which evidence will be produced or presented."

He added the court should "direct and guide the Grand Jury so that the proceedings will not develop into a fishing expedition."

Parsons listed expense and inconvenience to the public and interference with the normal functioning of public officials and bodies caused by such investigations.

The Grand Jury system should be utilized in its traditional and historical sense, an extraordinary proceeding designed to protect the public from illegal abuses and also to protect the innocent from unfounded accusations, all by means

of secret proceedings which protect witnesses as well as those wrongfully accused," continued Parsons.

Judge Parsons told The News last week he would ask the Lincoln County Clerk to review the signatures on the petition, but Mitchell said the petitions were not in the Clerk's office on Monday.

For purposes of his judicial order, Parsons assumed that at least 200 registered voters signed the petition.

But Mitchell said he needs the signatures to be verified so that he can attach the petition to his writ.

"People have asked why a grand jury," said Mitchell, who listed several reasons his clients want a grand jury to review the case.

Mitchell said a grand jury review may be the only way to gather the evidence of all three investigating bodies for a thorough review.

"The (Lincoln County) sheriff's office has certain evidence that points to at least two prime suspects," noted Mitchell. He said nobody knows what evidence the District Attorney (DA) and the AG

have gathered, but Charlie Cox, Lincoln County Undersheriff, has said those two groups have shared nothing with his office.

"More important the AG and the DA have a conflict," said Mitchell. "There are members of certain state agencies who may be suspects in this particular case," he added.

"I think that once the public finds out who the suspects in the case actually are, they will understand why members of law enforcement agencies outside this county and outside the State of New Mexico were brought into this case," noted Mitchell.

Joe McKnight, father of the slain Cotton McKnight, told The News last month that he and another person are suspects in the case.

Mitchell questions whether the AG's office should be involved in the prosecution of the case because it works so closely with "this particular state agency."

Lawyers are supposed to avoid even the sense of any impropriety,"

remarked Mitchell.

He said justice would be better served if a special prosecutor or prosecutors is appointed to handle the case, and any further investigations.

"I'm astounded and somewhat ashamed that the AG and the DA haven't said let's let a special prosecutor take the case," said Mitchell. He said at least six lawyers in Lincoln County have experience in

prosecuting cases. Mitchell said he would like to see a special prosecutor appointed to handle the case, and any further investigations. Council allows public use of compactor

The Ruidoso Village Council Tuesday made quick work of a short agenda before thoroughly discussing a proposed usage policy for the trash compactor.

Councillors finally approved Victor Alonso's recommendation to adopt an "open" policy and instructed the village engineer to address concerns presented earlier by sanitation supervisor Leonard Corona.

"I do believe we can compact all the trash in Lincoln County," noted Alonso after listing Corona's concerns and telling what he learned from the El Paso, Texas, compactor operation.

Alonso said the El Paso system is in its 15th year and lists maintenance costs of \$13,000 a year. He said El Paso, using two compactors, processes nearly 40 times Ruidoso's volume of trash.

"Higher productivity means higher efficiency," said Alonso as he pushed for maximum utilization of the system. He suggested opening the facility for paid users from private citizens to commercial enterprises to other governmental entities.

"We're not going to wear it out," remarked Alonso.

Concerns Corona listed in a letter he presented during budget workshops include:

—90 percent of people pulling trailers don't know how to back them properly,

users might slip and fall in the equipment,

most people hauling trash have children with them, and the youngsters could get hurt,

—with a village truck making neighborhood pickups, there's no reason for individuals to use the facility,

—sanitation trucks use the compactor from 8 a.m. until 1 p.m., and other traffic could affect the route schedules,

—insurance liability.

But Alonso said there are "over-

riding reasons" to address those concerns and open the compactor as a service.

Before councillors approved Alonso's motion, former council member Al Junge asked that they wait until July. He said he and village manager Jim Hine have designed a production report which will be available then.

"The first thing we ought to do is take care of our own trash," said Junge. He listed problems with the system, including dust, and predicted many workmen's compensation claims by employees if that is not addressed.

"It's still Al's baby—he's still babysitting it," remarked Village Councillor Elmer Pirelli, before the new policy was adopted unanimously.

The council Tuesday upheld the Ruidoso Planning and Zoning's (P&Z) decision on an appeal by William Wyland of Tiara Del Sol. P&Z allowed just two of the five information booths Wyland requested

in Midtown Ruidoso, and the council agreed.

Wyland was on hand to appeal the denial of the booth beside Caprio. He said P&Z based its denial on parking considerations, and contended the booth in that location doesn't impact parking.

However P&Z Chairman Mike Callaghan disagreed, noting that each booth requires a parking space. Callaghan said the structure also would affect ingress and egress to a parking area beside Caprio.

Mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr. questioned Callaghan on where such booths fit into the overall zoning regulations. He said the questions of having the booths, who may place them and how many are allowed should be addressed.

Although Callaghan said those questions aren't answered in the zoning ordinance, he added a precedent was established last year by allowing a booth.

"Maybe we ought to come to grips with it," said Mayor Davis.

Wyland averred his program is a professional operation, but depends on booths so that sales representatives are not "streetwalkers." He said if he has to use "streetwalkers" he'll be forced to hire less professional and younger workers.

Alonso opined a "\$300 temporary little shack" doesn't project a professional image.

"They already have two, I think that's adequate," said Pirelli before the council voted unanimously to uphold P&Z's

denial.

Airport manager Tim Morris said the increased cost from \$72,000 last year to \$78,900 this year was caused by insurance rate hikes.

Sent best wishes to Barbara Duff, who is in Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Hospital.

Expressed concern for Ray Dean Carpenter's stepfather, Art Blazer, after Morris announced that Blazer was flown to Albuquerque after he "suffered a massive heart attack." Carpenter was not present for Tuesday's meeting.

village employees and residents their questions to the trustees were out of order and would be more appropriately discussed in his office at another time.

"He asked for questions from the audience and then he cut people off in the meeting," said Sandra Perry, one of the leaders in a movement to force another mayoral election in the Downs.

Many of the people who walked out of the meeting were angry when the trustees went into seclusion for an executive session to discuss personnel.

The right to adjourn to go into executive session to discuss certain matters is granted in the municipal statutes of the state of New Mexico, and is standard practice for most official municipal agencies throughout the United States.

Most of the meeting was characterized by the normal routines of village government.

"We want some positive coverage somewhere down the line,

some balanced information. We have been a stepchild to Ruidoso for too many years and we are tired of it. We want to build some things up and show people we are moving in the right direction in this village," Harris said.

In other business the board of trustees:

—Appointed attorney Richard Hawthorne as the interim village counsel until the position can be legally advertised in compliance with state hiring statutes.

—Discussed a petition from some of the residents of Ruidoso Downs that calls for a special mayoral election and a vote to decide if the size of the governing body of the Village of Ruidoso Downs should be increased. (See related election petition story).

—Discussed a railroad feasibility study which deals with a proposal for a new railroad, which if built, would link the new airport to Ruidoso Downs, Ruidoso and Ski Apache.

—Heard an extensive report from village engineer Barrett Atkins on road construction and paving projects in Ruidoso Downs.

—Adjourned into executive session to discuss personnel matters.

Speaker pushes ad program

Maureen Pippen, regional advertising manager from Dallas of the Hotel and Travel Index told members of the Ruidoso Lodgers Association (RLA) Wednesday she wants to help promote the Ruidoso area.

Pippen was guest speaker at the association's meeting at the Swiss Chalet Inn on Highway 37.

"I'm here on a personal thing because I want travel agents to know you're here. I want to promote Ruidoso with you," Pippen said.

The Hotel and Travel Index, published by K. Rupert Murdoch, is a large directory used by travel agents that lists the names and general information of hotels and other lodging facilities around the world. It contains 35,000 listings and 7,000 advertisers, Pippen said.

The directory is 47 years old and began as a collection of brochures for convenience. It is now published four times a year and has 55,000 subscribers, Pippen said.

All lodgers present were given questionnaires from which free listings will be provided in the next edition of the index.

Pippen proposed what she called a co-op advertisement whose cost

would be split between the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce Advertising Committee and interested area businesses.

"Depending on how much participation there is, the promotion could cost as little as \$150 per issue per year," Pippen said.

"I think it is a good idea. It will help to get us more exposure in the community," RLA president Clabe Webb said.

The heart and flag are designed to be placed in area merchant's windows and visitors from Texas may stop by participating businesses for discounts on Texas Appreciation Day, June 28. Stadium to be renovated before new school year

Renovation of W.D. Horton Stadium at the Ruidoso Middle School is scheduled to end in mid to late August, according to Steve Strain of the architectural firm of Alley-Connell-Strain and Associates.

An "action plan" has been devised for the summer stadium renovation program, Strain told the Ruidoso Board of Education at a regular meeting last night (Wednesday).

A remodeled pressbox, new entries to the bleachers, new goalposts, a new lighting system, a new scoreboard and several other changes are planned as part of the stadium renovation this summer, Strain said.

The stadium renovation will be paid for with revenues generated from the sale of \$1.5 million in school bonds, the first phase of the bond issuance, which took place yesterday (Wednesday).

Pfeffer refutes charges of wrongdoing

Ruidoso Police Captain Dave Pfeffer Monday issued a challenge to people he says have accused him of wrongdoing.

"Bring forth the evidence," said Pfeffer emphatically.

"There have been allegations and rumors of my being involved in narcotics in this community and county," said Pfeffer. In an interview Monday Pfeffer invited his accusers to face him the same way he faces people he accuses.

"In my job I have to establish proof, and then I put them (the accused) in jail," said Pfeffer.

He said he'd like the opportunity to answer charges he usually only hears second- and third-hand. Pfeffer said he has never in his 11 years as a police officer or in his lifetime sold or given narcotics to anyone.

"I have arrested more narcotics dealers and people for possession of narcotics than anyone else in the history of this department," remarked Pfeffer. With that kind of record he said the idea of his dealing in drugs is "ludicrous" and "silly."

"That would be cutting off your nose to spite your face," he noted

with a laugh.

Pfeffer recalled two intensive investigations of him and the Ruidoso Police Department, the first by the New Mexico State Police seven years ago and the second by the Attorney General four years ago. No charges were filed after either of those investigations, said Pfeffer.

Pfeffer said those investigations cleared him, but the rumors continue to surface.

Pfeffer speculated the only way a criminal can "get to" a law enforcement officer is by rumor and innuendo.

"I am very straight forward in my approach to police work," said Pfeffer, adding that his determination to treat all "equitably" may have made some people angry.

"There are some people in this community who believe the laws are not written for them," said Pfeffer.

"I believe in equity and the law," he added seriously.

He recalled the "tragic gambling raid" last summer in which the Ruidoso Police assisted the FBI and the New Mexico State Police. He said the Ruidoso officers were called upon to assist an agency that already had obtained a valid search warrant.

"We couldn't tell them no," said Pfeffer. He admitted he would have handled it differently, but stressed that one agency can't dictate to another.

Besides the allegations of his involvement in drugs and organized crime, Pfeffer said he has heard of people wondering how a Ruidoso Police officer can afford a van and a Corvette.

He explained that he was awarded a cash settlement after an automobile accident five years ago, and used those funds to purchase a van and a boat. Pfeffer said he recently traded the boat for a Corvette.

"It's ironic, but the day I was released from the hospital I went back to work with my arm in a cast," noted Pfeffer.

He said he loves his job and is determined to continue as a police officer.

"I consciously give 150 percent to the people of this community," added Pfeffer.

It's because of his determination to do a good job that he said he must dispel the rumors and allegations that could have an adverse affect on his performance.

Pfeffer said the false stories about him also affect his wife, Ruidoso Police Corporal Roxann

Pfeffer, and their four children.

He said his children, all good students, are further evidence that his family is not involved in narcotics.

"We have a really neat family," said Pfeffer with a big smile. He said his children have heard the stories about him, and he has encouraged them to discuss their feelings with him.

"They're learning to deal with it," he noted.

Pfeffer confirmed that his wife, Roxann, was once married to a man who has since served time in the state penitentiary for narcotics trafficking. Pfeffer said the crimes were committed after the two were divorced.

He said he doesn't have access to drugs and contraband confiscated by police officers, and explained that two other investigators maintain security in that area.

Pfeffer said he is a strong believer in honesty, and maintains that he is "honest, sincere and professional" in all he does.

Although he stressed that his remarks were not motivated by any political ambition, Pfeffer said positively that he'll run for sheriff again someday.

"I will be the sheriff of this county someday," said Pfeffer.

Lodger's Tax group OKs \$2,500 for Spirit function

The Ruidoso Lodgers' Tax Committee (LTC) Wednesday approved a \$2,500 request from the Spirit of Ruidoso to help fund an advertising campaign for the upcoming Texas Appreciation Day picnic and dance.

The committee released frozen Contingency Funds to grant the request.

The request was presented by Spirit of Ruidoso representative Dan Kelley who said the \$2,500 would be used as part of a joint advertising package with Ruidoso Downs Race Track and KHEY radio station in El Paso, Texas.

The package includes more than 100 30-second spots on KHEY radio. The Downs will match the \$2,500 to advertise KHEY Race Day, June 27. KHEY will also match \$2,500

with radio station air time.

"I believe the result of the advertising in El Paso will be strong if we work with the race track and

KHEY," Kelley said.

The LTC also heard from Clark Carpenter of Dan Dee Cabins. Carpenter presented figures he received from the New Mexico Hotel and Motel Association.

"These figures show that the Lincoln County lodgers industry had a gross receipts tax increase of 40 percent for the first quarter. Your figures show there was an exact 40 percent tax decrease," Carpenter said.

The Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce checked the figures with the Taxation and Revenue Department in Santa Fe. They contend the figures are correct, John Jeffers, chamber executive director said.

Committee members discussed the possibility that some lodger

operators were not paying their fair share of lodgers' tax and this possibility may account for the difference in percentages.

"Why would someone pay all of their gross receipts tax and not pay

the lodgers' tax?" Lodgers' Tax Committee member Phil Hamilton asked.

"I'll tell you why," said Leon Eggleston, secretary of the committee. "There is a 10 percent or \$10 penalty, whichever is greater, for not paying lodgers' tax. The penalty for gross receipts is much greater. It can be as much as 50 percent" of the unpaid tax, he said.

LTC has tried to verify with the Taxation and Revenue Department the amounts of gross receipts tax and lodgers' tax.

"They will not disclose the information when asking for specific accounts," Eggleston said.

Another explanation was offered for the difference in percentages.

"These people may be plugging in time-share sales and that's where they are getting the high percentage," committee member Rod Adamson said.

The committee agreed that Eggleston should look into the figures more closely.

In other areas, the Chamber of Commerce Advertising Committee mail-out brochures were presented to the committee by Jeffers.

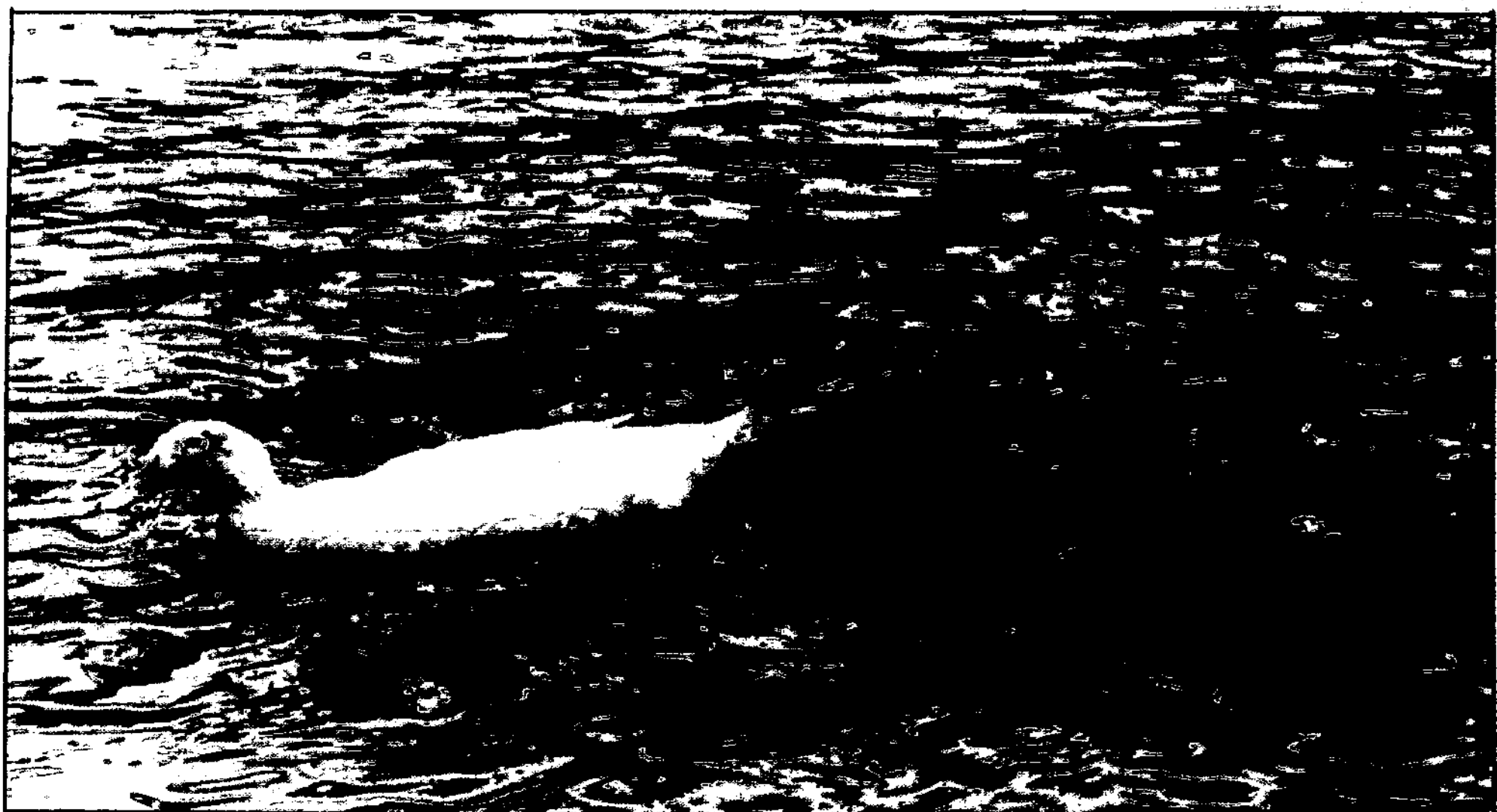
"These brochures are an outgrowth of a co-op program between the Ruidoso Downs and the advertising committee," Jeffers said.

Ruidoso Downs Race Track and the advertising committee each paid for half of the cost of the brochures, including mailing lists and postage.

The direct mail-out brochures were sent to 135,000 homes in areas including, in part, Lubbock, Dallas, Austin and Albuquerque.

Artists to gather for chamber's festival July 25-27

The 1986 Summer Art Festival featuring 110 artists representing seven states is scheduled for July 25-27.

"The 110 artists were selected from 280 applicants," said Charlie Smith, chairman of the Art Festival.

A jurying committee, made up of five people, viewed three slides submitted by each artist as a representation of their work. The committee then made their decisions based on

the slides, Smith said.

Categories of artistic works included in the festival will be hand-made fabrics, original leather designs, metal work, photography, woodwork, sculpture, oils, watercolors, pencils and pastels.

The festival will be in the Ruidoso Middle School parking lot.

Many artists will be demonstrating their works, Smith said. Prices of the art will range from \$3 to \$2,000, he said.

Some of the local artists who will be participating include Denise Dorn, Paul Crown, Randy English

and Karen Barrow.

The festival, sponsored by the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce, is expected to bring a net profit of \$20,000.

"I'm excited about it. The Chamber of Commerce has been working hard this year to get out of debt. We hope the festival will be very successful," Smith said.

In addition to the art displays, local non-profit organizations will provide food and refreshments.

"We limited the food booths to non-profit, local organizations to help the groups raise money. We have also asked the groups to decorate their booths with a pioneer theme to celebrate Ruidoso's 100th birthday," Smith said.

Musical entertainment also is scheduled including local and regional groups as well as solo artists.

A poster will also be on sale promoting the festival.

"Last year's best of show winner produces this year's poster," Smith said.

Terry and Cindy Burleson won best of show last year with their acrylic painting and sculpture work. The two will be incorporated into the poster.

Organizers hope to have a more accurate count of visitors to the festival this year.

"We should have a more accurate gate count this year by using numbered tickets. This way we can let people in town know how many people attended each day," Smith said.

The festival should generate about 75 to 80 room rentals and approximately 100 meal purchases per day. Also, purchases at the festival are taxable, drawing sales tax money for the state, Smith said.

The chamber will host a dinner on Sunday, July 27, for all participating artists.

Hosmer withdraws to nature to fuel the fires of both his personal and artistic inspiration

It's not hard to imagine what Ruidoso artist Ken Hosmer's life would be like if he had lived 100 years ago.

Somewhat, he would have found the boat fare to France to study and intellectualize with the likes of the then struggling impressionists Monet, Renoir, Pissarro, Cezanne, Cassatt and Morisot.

Hosmer, long time director of the Carrizo Lodge Art School, retired from that position recently to devote more time to his artistry as well as his art workshops, which are now featured in most regions of the United States.

"Workshops offer the opportunity to share knowledge, make new friends and visit exciting locations. These things are as important to my personal growth as an artist, as

on Hosmer's early development as a painter and as a person interested in art, Hosmer said.

He took a variety of art courses at the University of Texas at El Paso which eventually led to an art degree.

After a stint teaching art in the public schools of El Paso, Hosmer found his way to a position with the Carrizo Lodge Art School.

But now, between raising a daughter and teaching art workshops, Hosmer is a fulltime painter.

Hosmer said he cannot see himself burning out as an artist because he draws energy from both his work and the subjects in nature he portrays.

When Hosmer does question his role in life and his goals as a painter he said he refers to a book by Robert Henri which is called "The Art Spirit."

is painting," Hosmer said in a recent publication about New Mexico artists.

The former El Pasoan says he has drawn "as long as I can remember."

But when he was in fifth-grade at historic Ascarate Elementary in Ysleta, Texas, he won a combined art school sweepstakes contest that was sponsored by both the El Paso and Ysleta Independent School Districts.

Hosmer said though he did not pursue art during high school, that contest prize in the fifth-grade seemed to focus his interest on pursuing a career as an artist.

In 1969 Hosmer first came to the Carrizo Lodge Art School to study oil painting with Carl Cogar.

"This also had a lot to do with me being an artist," Hosmer said. Cogar had a profound influence

"But nature is my thing," Hosmer said.

Hosmer said he is currently in a watercolor phase in his work because he is fascinated by the color options inherent in that medium.

But Hosmer is never sure which direction his artistic instincts will take him.

"Art is a growth process, a continuum. An artist should constantly be growing and taking new directions which are sometimes not even obvious," Hosmer said.

Hosmer's work can currently be seen at the studio in his home, Jernigan Galleries in Ruidoso and in galleries all over the Southwest.

Hosmer is represented by Wilmar Associates.

He is scheduled to conduct workshops in Texas, Washington D.C., Mississippi and California in the months to come.

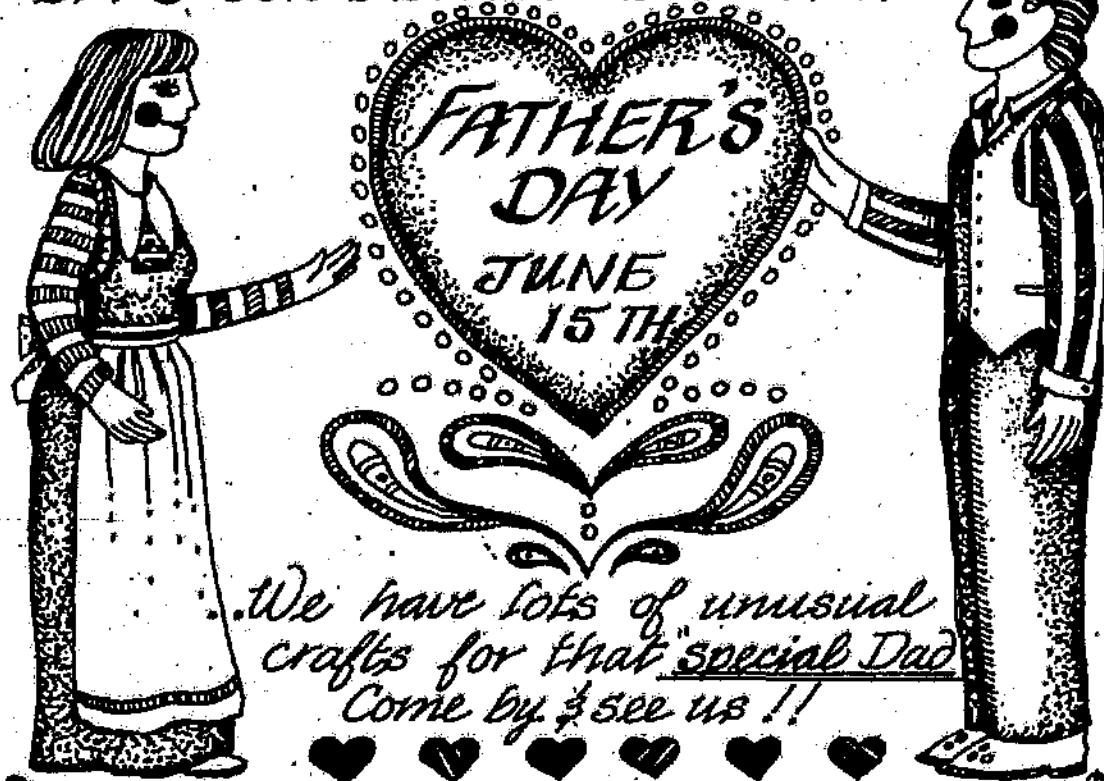

MOIST COCONUT POUND CAKE

This cake is delectable with freshly brewed coffee, and improves in texture and flavor for several days after baking. If you are looking for a cake to take to the lake or a family reunion, this is it! This is my youngest daughter's favorite cake. The subtle hint of almond flavoring makes it special, and the sour cream makes it very moist!

Moist Coconut Pound Cake

1 cup butter
1/2 cup margarine
3 cups sugar
6 eggs
3 cups flour
one-quarter tsp. soda

1-8 oz. carton sour cream
1 cup coconut
1/2 tsp. coconut flavoring
three-quarter cup sugar
three-quarter cup water
1 tsp. almond flavoring

Cream butter, margarine and sugar for 5 minutes. Continue to beat, adding eggs one at a time, beating well after each addition. Sift flour and soda together and add this alternately with sour cream. Fold in the coconut and coconut flavoring. Pour into large tube pan and bake at 325 degrees for 1 1/2 hours. Cool for 10 minutes and turn out onto cake plate.

Almond Sauce

Combine three-quarter cup sugar, three-quarter cup water and 1 tsp. almond flavoring in a small saucepan. Boil five minutes. Pour over warm cake.

There are new small sized bundt cake pans available in many kitchen shops. Divide this recipe between two of these smaller pans, cut the cooking time, and this recipe makes beautiful gift cakes. Or you may eat one and hoard the other in the freezer until company comes!

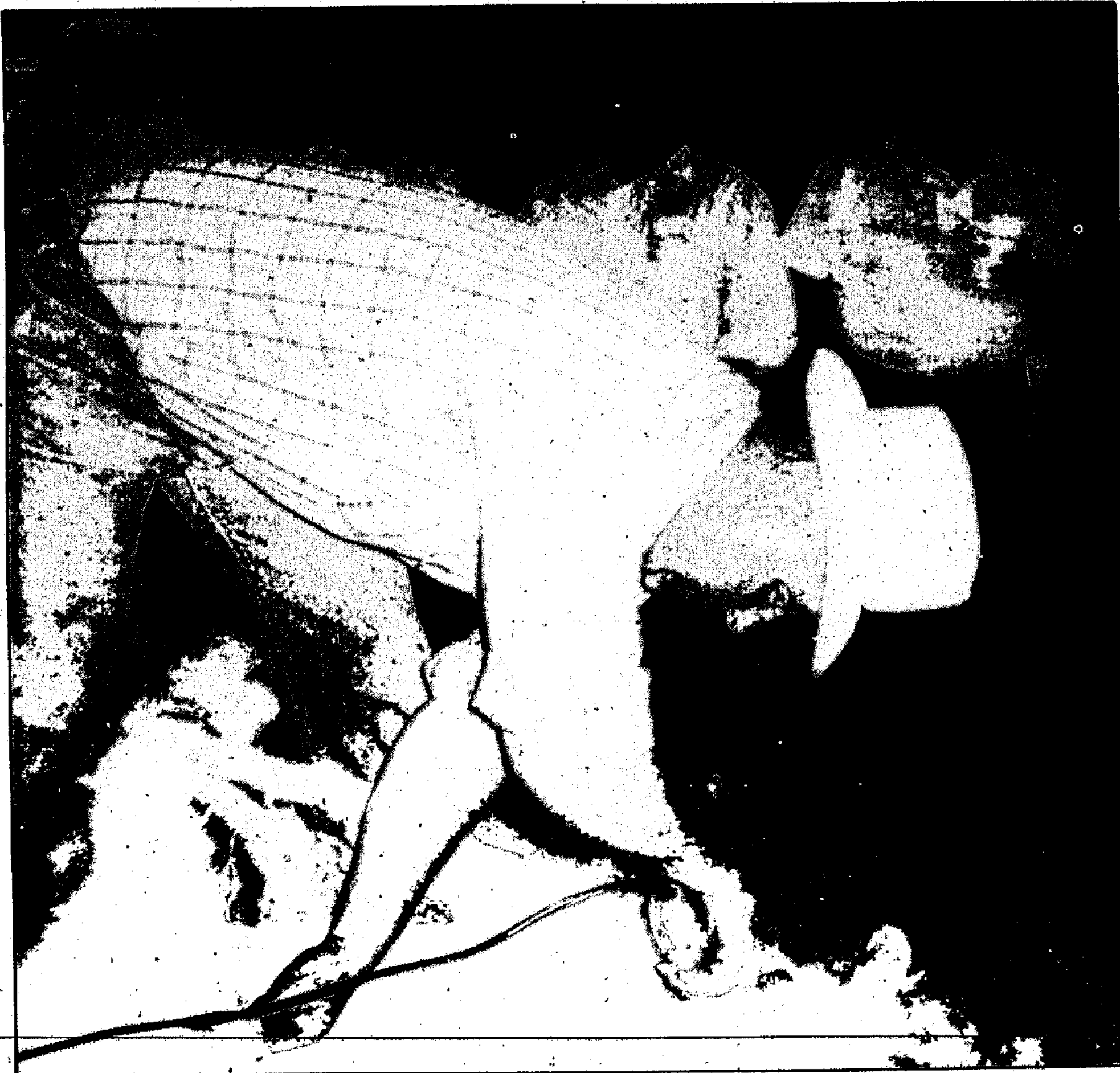

Cree pro has distinguished career

Johnny Palmer brings a distinguished professional golf career to his new job as Cree Meadows Country Club golf professional.

Palmer, who has been the Cree Meadows pro since the second week of April, was a member of the Pro Golfers Association tour from 1946 to 1960.

"I won \$128,000 and took eight tournaments," he said. "I guess the closest thing to a major tournament I won was the Western Open in 1947. I also won the Houston Open in 1948."

Another big tournament Palmer won was the Colonial National Invitational in 1954.

Palmer played with some of the best golfers in the history of the game, including Ben Hogan, Sam Snead, Arnold Palmer (no relation) and others.

"I think Snead had the best swing," Palmer commented. "Hogan didn't have as good a swing as Snead, but he had better concentration, the best of anyone I knew."

"Palmer came on in the latter stages of my career."

The Cree Meadows pro thinks a golfer must do well in several areas to be successful.

"You have to be disciplined," he said. "You have to concentrate a lot and block out bad shots from your mind. You can't let it bother you."

"The game is as much mental as it is physical."

Palmer grew up in Badin, North Carolina.

He became interested in golf in the 1930s when he was a caddie at Stanley County Country Club in North Carolina.

He became a pro in 1938 but did not join the tour until 1946 because of World War II. He was a tail gunner on a B-29 bomber during the

war.

After leaving the pro tour in 1960, he was the pro at Tulsa Country Club in Tulsa, Oklahoma.

In 1969, he returned to Badin for four years. In 1973, he became head pro at Statesville Country Club in North Carolina and stayed there for 10 years.

He semi-retired in 1983 and returned to Badin before coming to Cree Meadows two months ago.

Palmer does not play much golf now, but enjoys teaching the game.

"Sometimes I may play twice or three times a week, sometimes not even once a week," he said. "It varies."

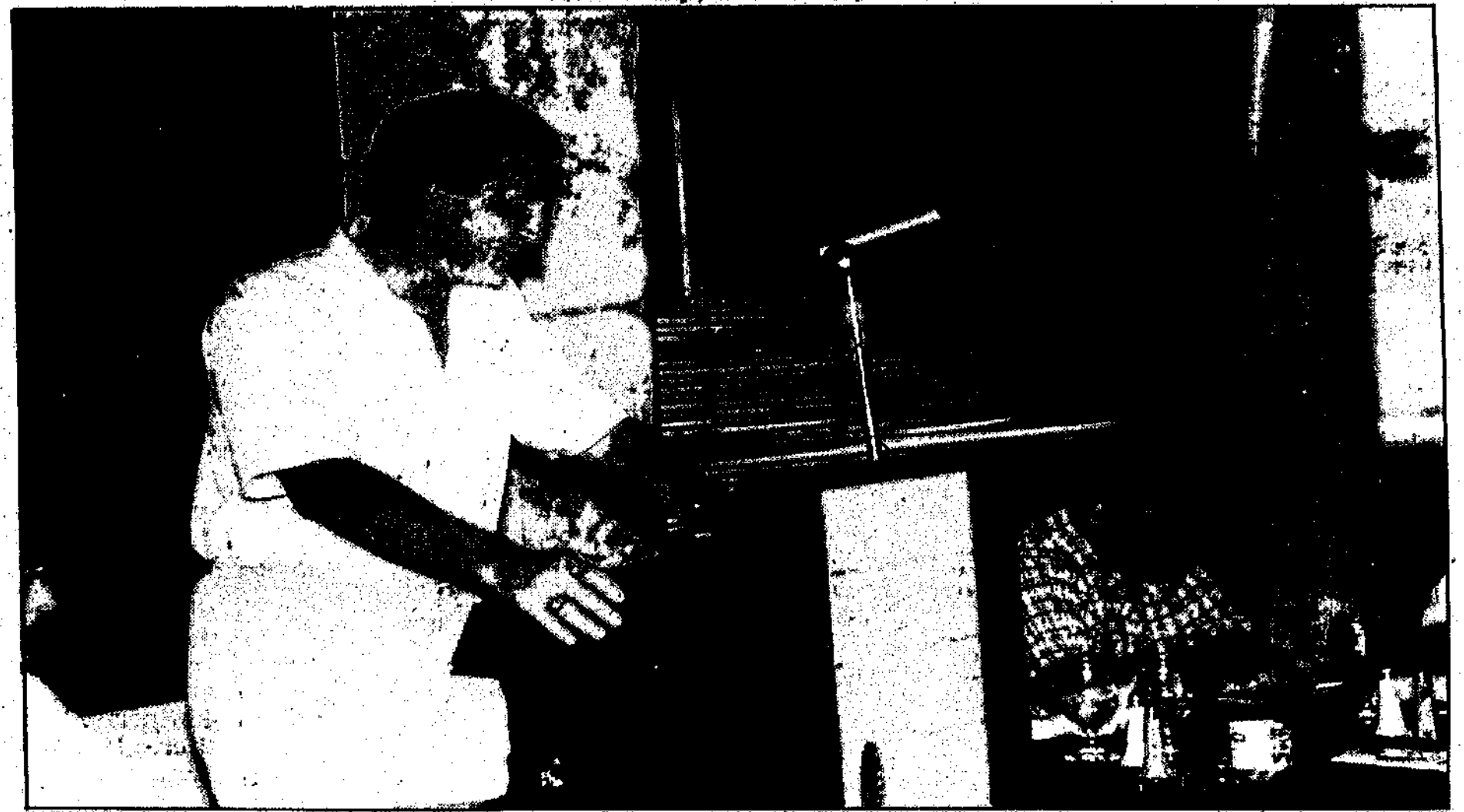
The Cree Meadows pro has some objectives as far as the club goes.

"I'm trying to get more people involved with the club," he remarked. "I'm trying to get more people to join the club, more people playing golf and more guests to come."

Chamber sets goals for new year

The second annual Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors retreat was "extremely productive," said chamber executive director John Jeffers.

About 20 members, new members and representatives from the Ruidoso Valley Greeters attended the retreat, at their own expense, in Albuquerque last Friday and Saturday.

The retreat, a two-day seminar, was designed to create a "program of work," including ideas and goals, for the chamber's 1986-87 fiscal year. The 1985-86 fiscal year ends June 30.

Terri Maisel, executive vice president of the Albuquerque Chamber of Commerce, offered the orientation Friday.

Dr. Eddie Dry, of Anderson Schools of Management at the University of New Mexico in Albuquerque, served as moderator of the seminar.

The group agreed that the chamber should take a more active part in decisions made in the community, county and state by providing input to decision makers, and should have a more visual image in the community.

"We want to be more visible by adding input to entities which make decisions, that affect area businesses and the community," Jeffers said.

"Along with maintaining our committees and goals from last year, the group took action to be more involved in community development. We also want to take

a more active part in community decisions by community, county and state entities," Bill Hirschfeld, president-elect of the board said.

The group also discussed concerns regarding the village's dependence on tourism.

"We decided to broaden our view from just tourism to tourism and the possibilities of diversifying the economy in Ruidoso," Hirschfeld said.

On Friday, participants broke into groups to discuss ideas under each of four main divisions that encompass chamber activity. They are: the economic development, community development, organizational development and advertising promotional divisions.

On Saturday, committees were formed under each division and goals for each committee were set.

Under the Economic Development Division, an Economic Development Task Force was established, with a goal, in part, to solicit revenue-generating entities for economic diversification; a Legislative Awareness Action Group to maintain awareness of legislation affecting business; an Airport Promotion Task Force to monitor and report progress of the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport; and a Small Business Committee to sponsor a series of seminars of interest to local, small businesses.

Committees established under the Community Development Division included a "Ruidoso Image" Action Committee with one goal to encourage enforcement of Planning

and Zoning regulations; a Beautification/Clean-up Committee to establish a beautification awareness program; a Committee for Identification and Signing of Historic Sites to identify historic sites and buildings in the Ruidoso area; and a Public School Committee to support local groups having drug and alcohol awareness programs.

Under the Organizational Development Division a Membership Committee was established to, in part, reach and maintain 500 members of the chamber; a Finance Committee to conduct a semi-annual budget review; a United States Chamber of Commerce Accreditation Committee to accomplish accreditation of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce; a Plant and Equipment Committee to identify problems and establish a budget for future needs; and a Convention Bureau Development Task Force to create and seek funding for a convention bureau within the chamber structure.

Finally, under the Advertising Promotional Division an Advertising Committee was established to, in part, research and identify potential new markets; a Special Events Committee, to develop spring tourism events; and a Film/Video Promotion Committee to encourage development of a sound stage.

The Chamber of Commerce's next Board of Directors meeting will be June 25.

Vicki and Emmett Autrey were the successful bidders for concessions at the fields, said Bailey. They'll pay the village \$1,700 for the season, he said.

Permanent concession facilities and bleachers will be constructed with capital outlay funds requested during the next fiscal year, explained Bailey.

Committee members discussed organizing softball tournaments at the complex, and Bailey said a small tournament is being planned by the softball association for late July. With better facilities next year he predicted softball organizers will have two events a month at the complex.

Bailey reported the municipal pool opened on May 26, but because of rainy weather has experienced lower attendance than this time last year.

Dick Shaw, a member of the committee, suggested keeping a weather log along with other pool records.

Next month members will make plans for a "10K Fun Run" scheduled in Ruidoso on August 2.

All four members of the committee were present Monday.

file that," said Mitchell. He said he asked her to give the three agencies time to coordinate their investigations and evaluate the accumulated evidence.

"She finally became fed up with it," said Mitchell.

Bussey said recently she waited eight months from the time the AG put the investigation in the hands of the State Police. Since she knew of no progress toward an arrest and indictment, she asked for a grand jury and special prosecutor.

"To say that this was politically motivated is just improper," said Mitchell.

Bussey, who has received telephone threats each time she initiates any action on the case, has stated privately that she knows who the sheriff suspects.

Cox announced Friday that he has assigned two investigators to the McKnight case. He also felt that eight months was long enough to

wait for some word from the AG.

Although Deputy Attorney General Steven Westheimer is unwilling to comment on the investigations, he said last week "many investigators in both our (AG) office and the State Police are out there working on it."

But Bussey and McKnight are tired of waiting—they both aver they'll pursue every legal avenue until the case is resolved.

Cotton and Judy McKnight were slain in November 1984. Their bodies were found on November 15—both had been shot.

Police reported no signs of forced entry and no evidence of burglary of the isolated ranch house.

Since their deaths bitter disputes have occurred among the investigating agencies and some members of their families.

Joe McKnight, who has stated publicly that he has no confidence in the sheriff's office investigation, recently offered a \$5,000 reward in the case.

Section 1 ratifies, approves and confirms the action of the Board of Trustees and officers of the Village including but not limited to action taken for the purpose of constructing and purchasing a system for supplying water for the Village (herein the "Project"), the issuance of the Bonds and the acceptance of the proposal for the purchase of the Bonds being issued for such Project.

Section 2, in order to provide funds for the Project, authorizes issuance of the Village's fully registered Village of Capitan General Obligation Water Bonds, Series July 1, 1986 and debt in connection therewith, including the following: such issue shall be in the amount of \$600,000, shall be dated July 1, 1986 except as otherwise provided

upon reissuance, issuable in denominations of \$5,000, or any multiple thereof, and subject to other specified limitations; interest is payable on July 1, 1987 and semiannually thereafter on January 1 and July 1, in each year; the place and manner of payment of principal and interest of the Bonds, including provisions for payment of interest, Record Date and Special Record Date; the bonds to bear interest at varying per annum rates of 7%, 8%, 9%, 10%, 11%, 12%, 13%, 14%, 15%, 16%, 17%, 18%, 19%, 20%, and 21% and mature serially, without option of prior redemption on July 1, 1987 through July 1, 1988.

Sections 3 through 7 provide for the manner of execution and authentication of the bonds; for registration, transfer, exchange, replacement, payment, delivery and holding of custody of Bond certificates, cancellation of, and registration records for the Bonds; for successor registrars or paying agents, provide that the Bonds shall be fully negotiable and shall constitute the general obligations of the Village, to the payment of which the full faith and credit of the Village is pledged; and prescribe the form of the Bonds, certificate of authentication, assignment and legal opinion certificate.
Sections 8 through 13 provide for delivery of the Bonds and application of the proceeds, provide for sources of payment of principal and interest on the bonds, including the annual levy and collection of taxes, the general fund and other available funds, impose upon the Board the duty to effectuate the provisions of the ordinance with reference to the levy, collection and application of such taxes, authorize and direct the officers of the Village to take all action necessary or appropriate to effectuate the provisions of the ordinance provide that Bonds proceeds may be invested (but covenanting that such proceeds shall not be invested so as to result in such bonds becoming arbitrage bonds or in bond interest being taxable for federal income tax purposes), and include covenants by the Village to take all steps necessary to comply with H.R. 3838 to the extent necessary to maintain the exemption of interest on the Bonds from federal income taxation.

Section 14 makes the ordinance irrevocable until the principal of and interest on the bonds shall have been fully paid, satisfied and discharged.
Sections 15 and 16 are a repealer clause and a severability clause, respectively.

Section 17 declares an emergency, and provides for execution and publication of this ordinance.

Section 18 provides for the form of this publication.
There also is contained a statement by the Mayor that this ordinance is an emergency (stating some of the reasons therefor).

As a graduate of the University of New Mexico in Albuquerque, I have been a part of the university community for some time. Lately the institution has been plagued with problems involving the administration. These problems have unfolded on the students and community outside the university.

It has been said many times that the state's largest university needs a fresh start. I agree, it needs a new panel of regents appointed by the new governor to search for a new president.

UNM President Tom Farer was trying to initiate his plan for the university. Unfortunately, circumstances involving the board of regents, and other factors, have led to his decision not to renew his contract.

A state university achieves high academic standards in part by having prominent faculty, students who wish to learn, support from the legislature and a president and board of regents who will work together to serve the university. In order to maintain these standards, the university needs a president who will see that the needs and best interests of the university are met and who will make changes where necessary to meet these needs. I feel the university had such a president in Tom Farer.

The board of regents, headed by Jerry Apodaca, is a five-member panel installed by the governor to oversee the university's operations. It has been reported many times that the working relationship between the regents' president Apodaca and Farer has been unsettled. Much of the controversy stems from Farer's attempts to change certain management positions and policies to better the educational function of the university. Some regents thought it was their place to step in when they disagreed with what Farer was doing, regardless of the outcome on the university as a whole.

How can the university operate as a credible institution when Farer, or anyone in his position, is not allowed to perform the duties of university president?

The faculty and students have made their views clear. At the biggest turnout of UNM faculty ever, 700 faculty members placed a vote of "no confidence" in the board of regents. Students gathered more than 1,500 signatures on a petition asking for the regents' resignations. It is clear the university community wants and needs a new governing body.

Morale at the university is very low. Some faculty members are looking elsewhere for employment due to the below national average salaries they make, and many students are looking to other universities to complete their educations.

Albuquerque relies heavily on high-tech and other industries to create jobs and generate revenue in the city. Many industries that locate in the city rely on university graduates to fill positions in their companies.

I fear some companies may hear of or see for themselves the bad feelings spewing from the university and decide to locate elsewhere. I fear the present situation at the university will create a bad reputation for the school and the city.

UNM is a credible university. It is an important state institution that brings faculty and students alike to the state. Higher education is also important to the state. We must insist on high academic standards to attract industry, faculty and students here.

The UNM Board of Regents are not serving the university's needs. I feel they are damaging the credibility of the school and should step down to let officials who are concerned about the needs and interests of the university take over.

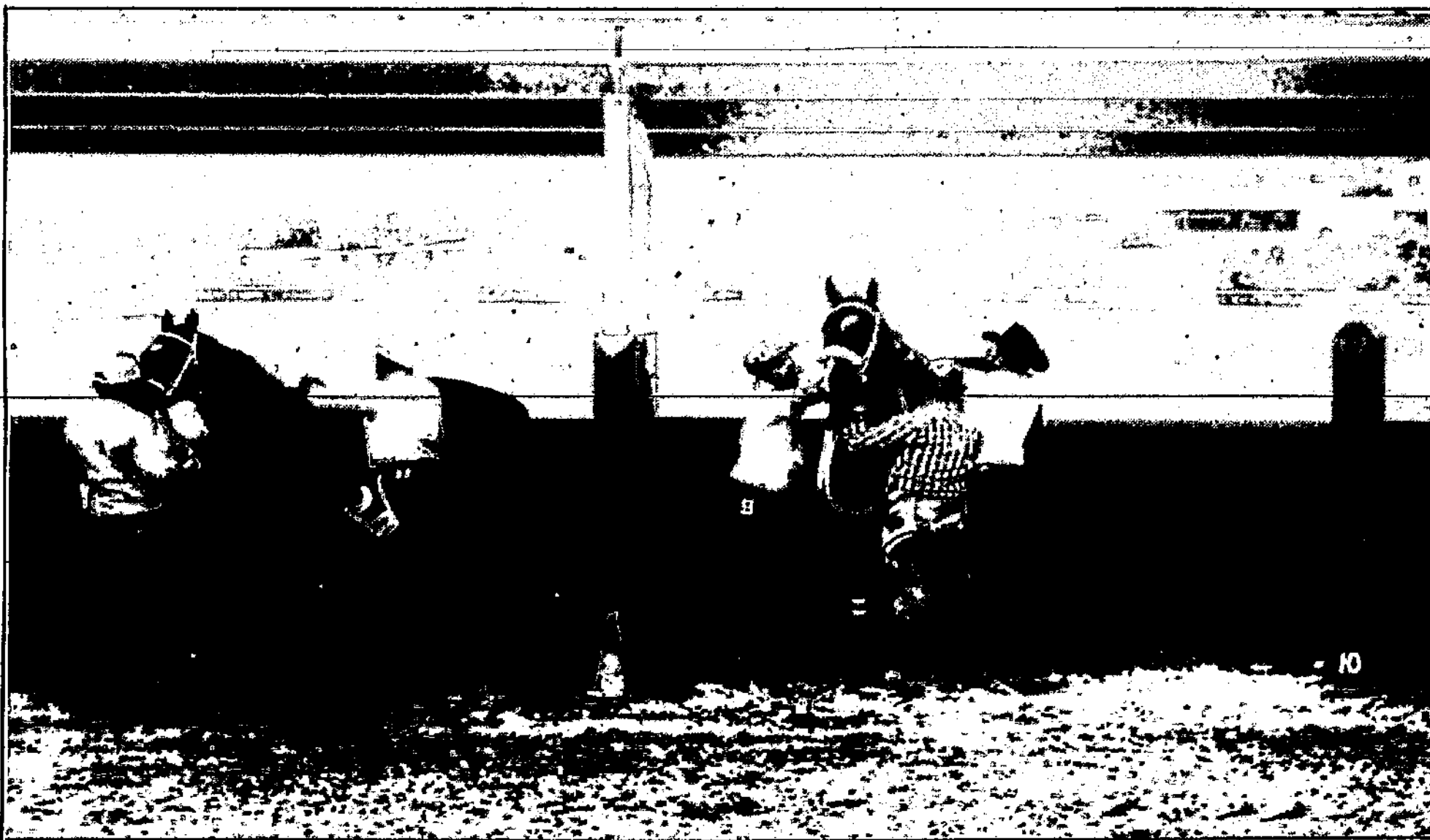

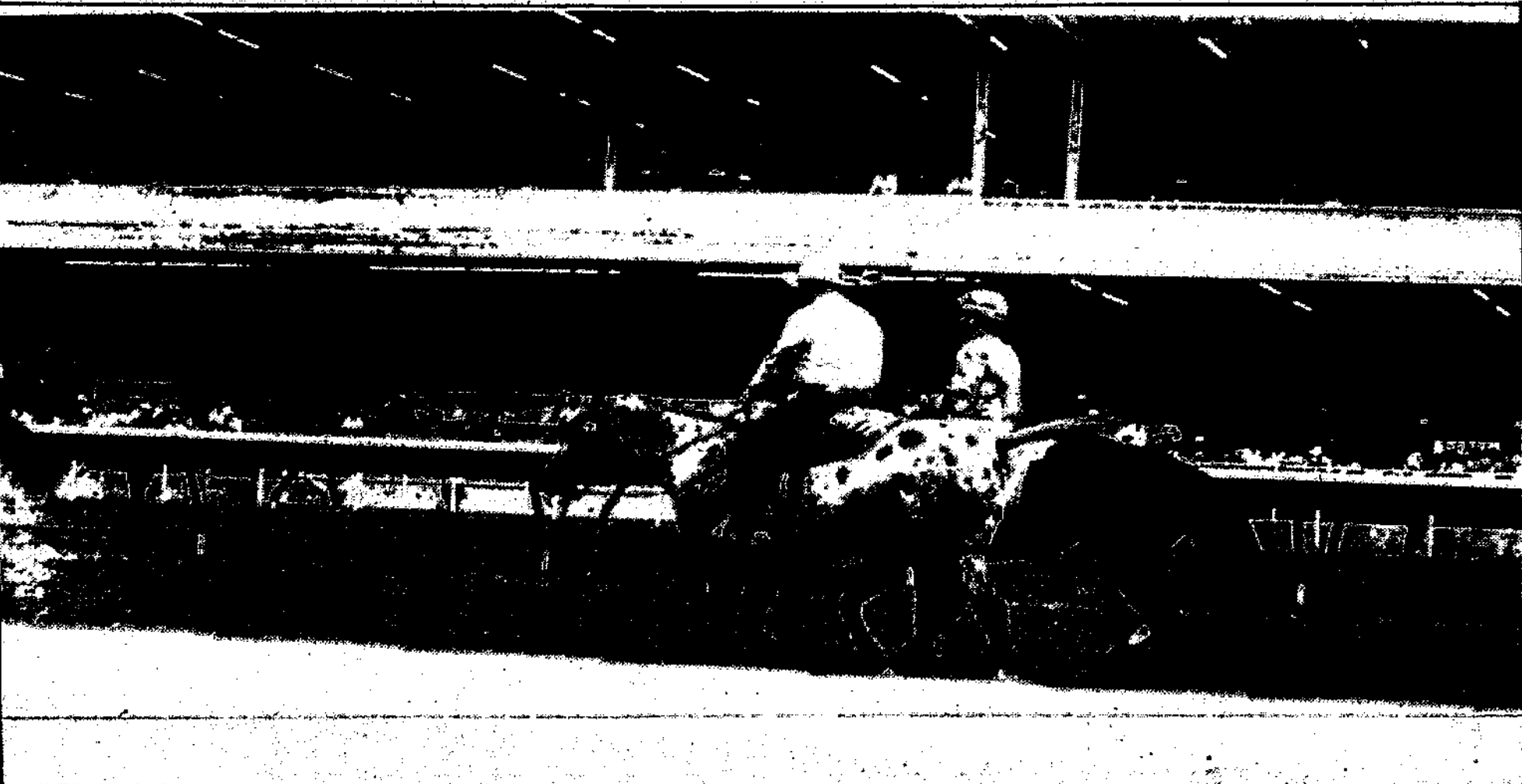

Silver medals were won by Payne

in horseshoes, Lanelli in men's singles table tennis and Barton in women's singles table tennis.

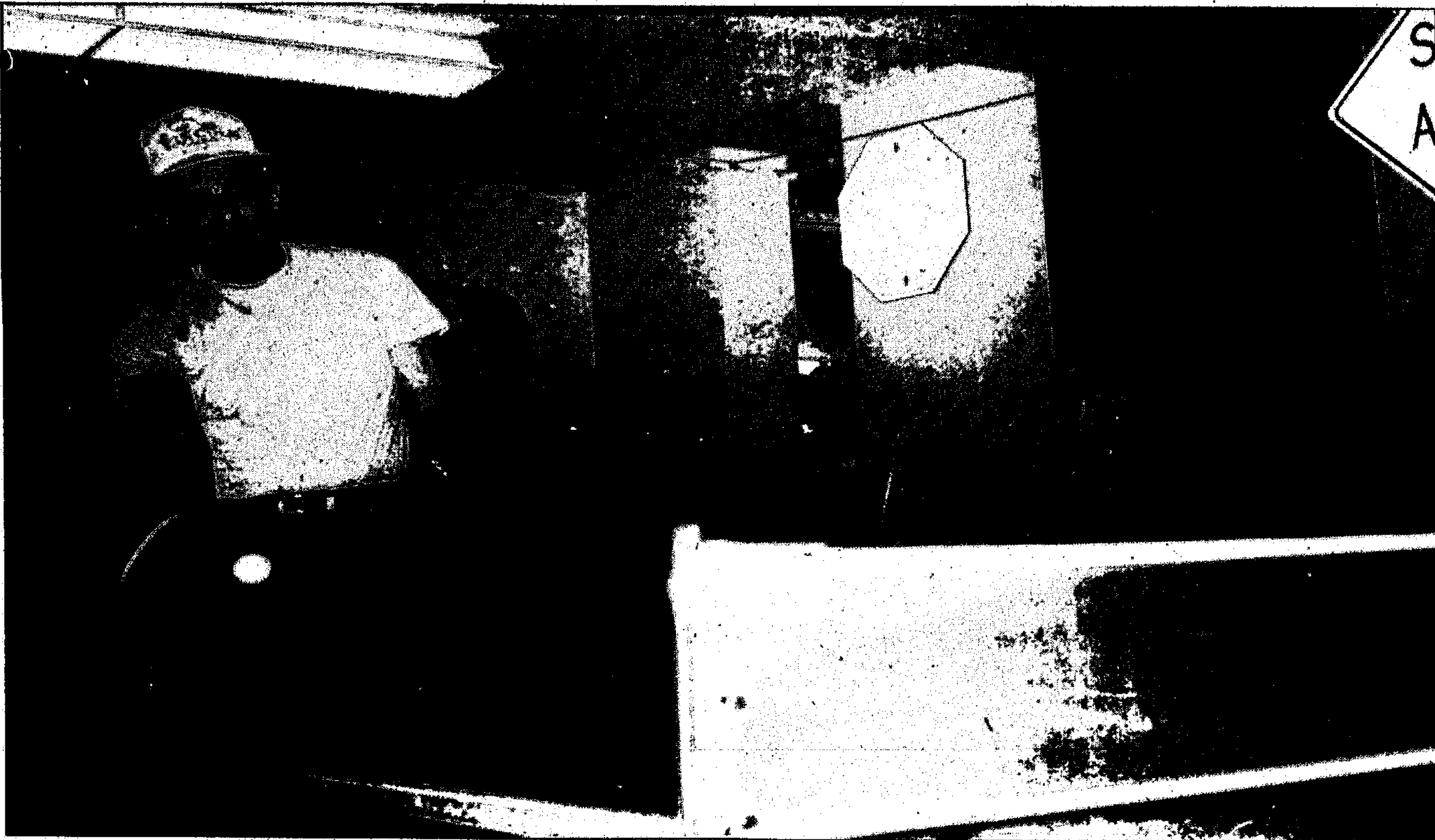
Chevo Baca and Paul Ortiz won bronzes in golf. Bucky Baer won his bronze in pool.

Elfigo Montana earned a fourth-place ribbon in softball throw. In the talent and dance divisions, Stanley Few won a fourth-place ribbon and the dance team of Floyd and Virginia Danielson won a fifth-place in polka.

Events began Tuesday, May 28, with the lighting of the Olympic

torch in Albuquerque. It was relayed to Roswell throughout the night accompanied by Zuni runners, arriving in Roswell at 5 p.m. Wednesday. The senior citizen torchbearer led the parade of participants to the courthouse where dignitaries welcomed the Olympians and declared the games open.

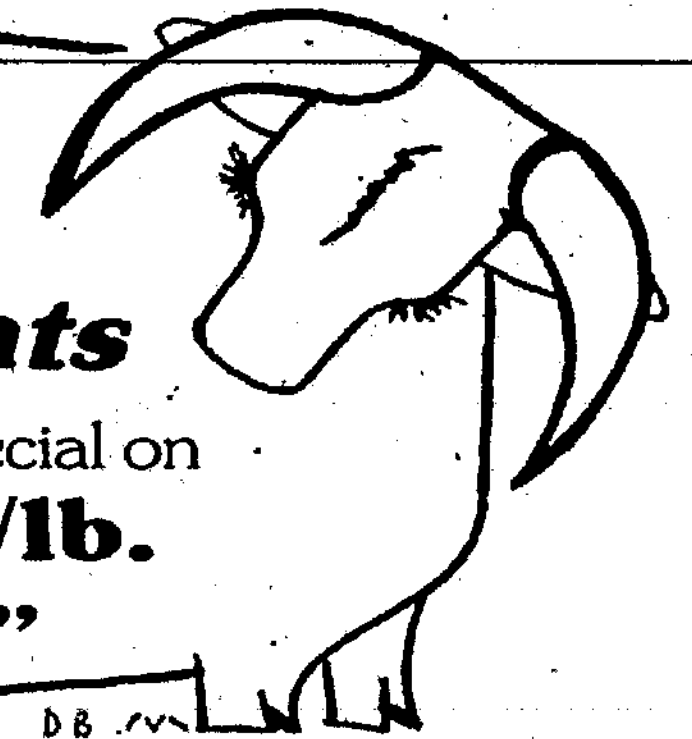

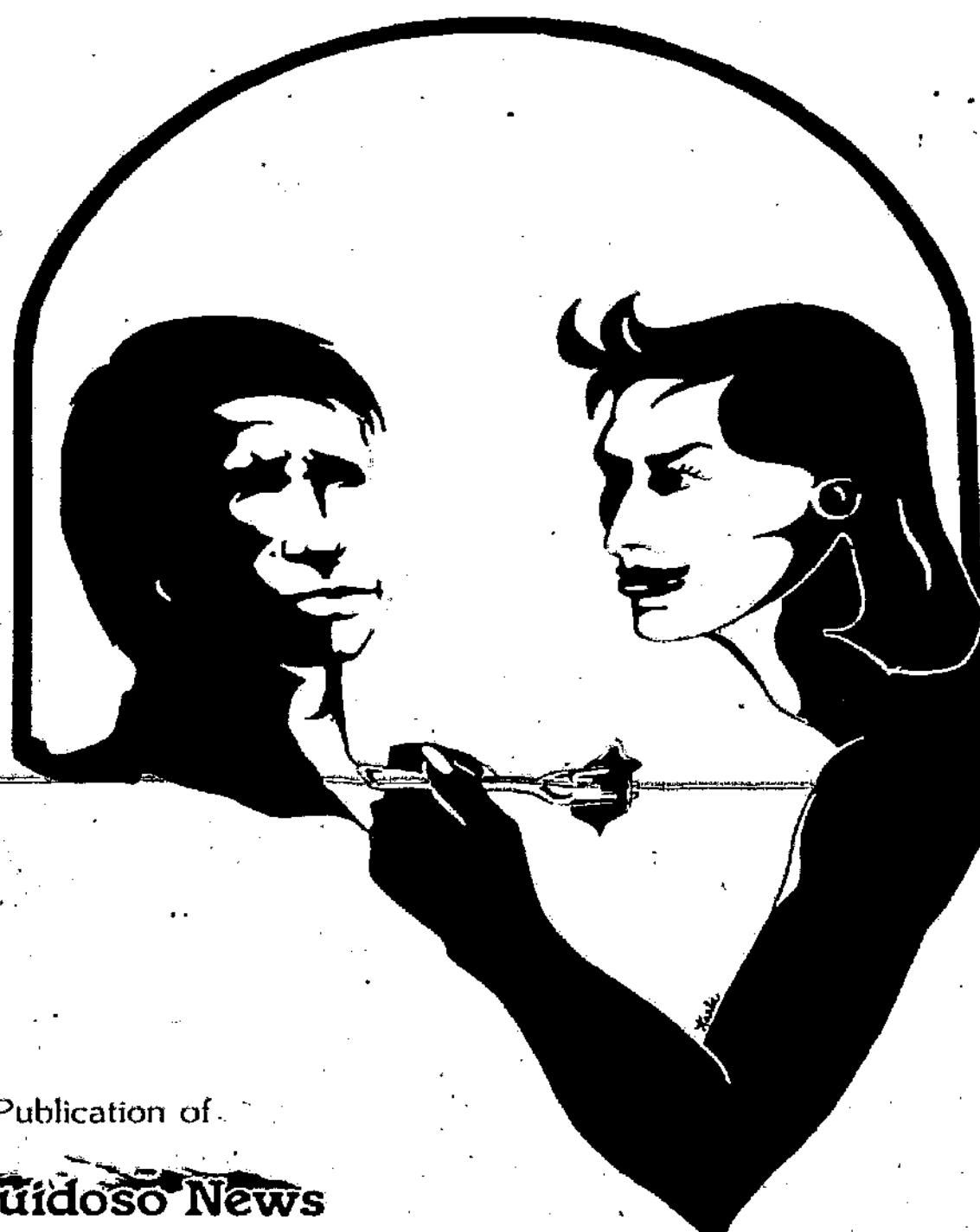

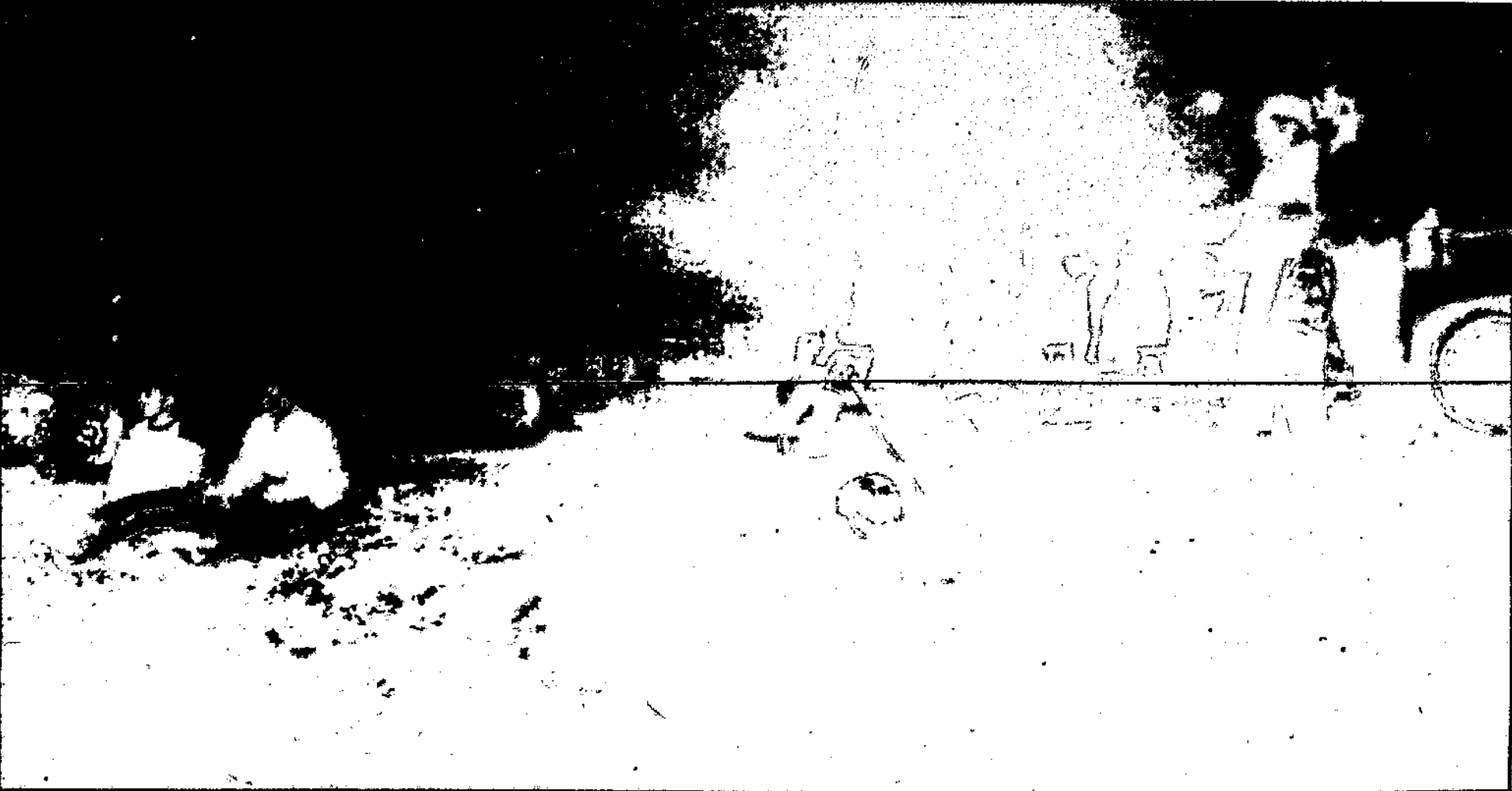
Softball season opens as new complex is unveiled

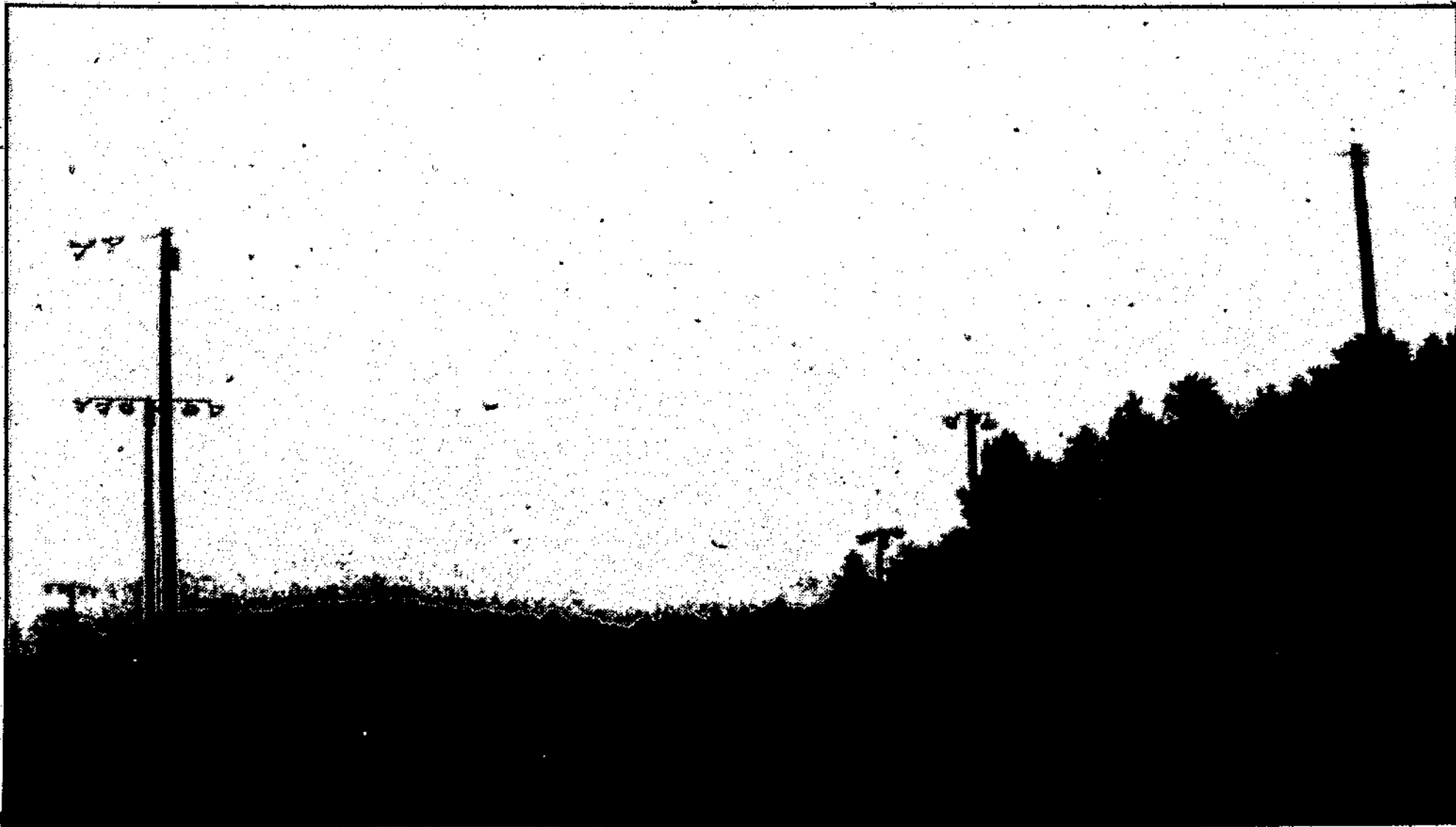
