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Sunland sale still not set

"All I can say is we are close to making an announcement and we are close to completing our financing. I don't want to say much more than that," said Roy Salome, an El Paso, Texas, man who may soon be one of the owners of Sunland Park racetrack.

Salome and his prospective partner, Jeff Keckley, also of El Paso, have been negotiating to buy the racetrack in Sunland Park for anywhere from one to three months, according to a Ruidoso Downs racetrack official who asked not to be identified.

Media reports have quoted the sale price of Sunland Park as about \$3.5 million, and in an earlier interview with The News, Salome said that figure was close to the asking price.

Officials at Ruidoso-Sunland, Inc. would neither confirm nor deny the reports Salome and Keckley, a Ruidoso Downs horseman, may buy Sunland Park.

Salome said he "hoped" he could make an announcement on the sale of the track some time this week.

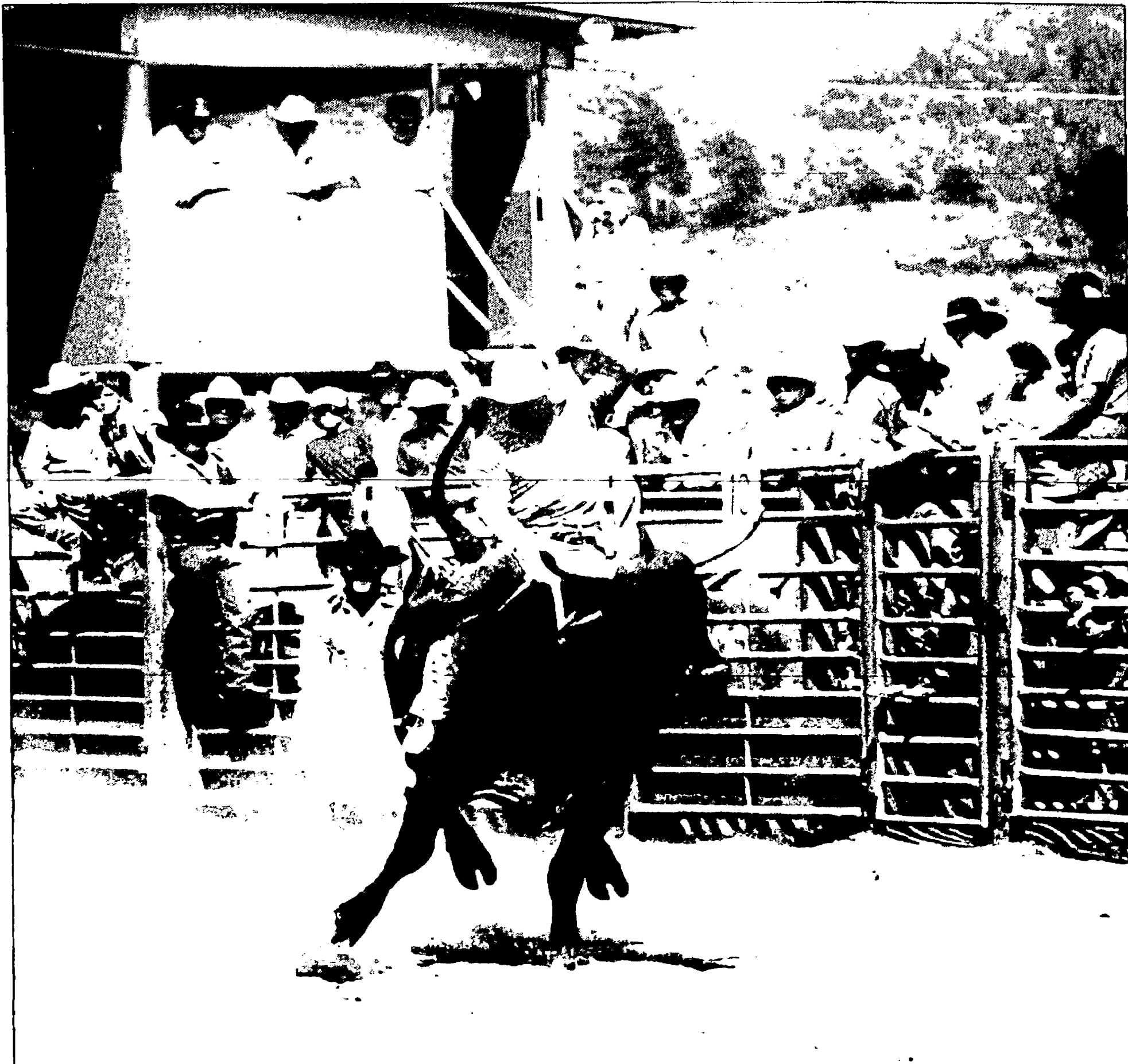
He said the formal papers had been completed for the sales transaction, but a few financial backers had not seen the papers as of last Thursday, when Salome was reached for comment by telephone at his law office in El Paso.

Salome said Keckley was still working on restructuring the purses for the 1986-1987 racing season at Sunland Park.

But Salome said the approval of the sale did not hinge on anything related to prize money.

Salome said there was a slight chance he and Keckley would not be allowed to buy Sunland Park.

Though Keckley, a former professional bowler, was in Ruidoso Downs over the Fourth of July holiday weekend, he was not available for comment.

Officials plan flood aid request

Area administrators got the word Thursday on how to obtain federal disaster funds for damages sustained in recent floods.

Ruidoso, Ruidoso Downs and Lincoln County officials and employees were among about 120 people gathered in Roswell for reports from the state Office of Military Affairs (OMA), Civil Emergency Preparedness Division, the State Highway Department and the Environmental Improvement Division.

Documentation was stressed heavily by speakers at the meeting. They warned government representatives from the three counties involved (Eddy, Chaves and Lincoln) to keep complete and accurate records of damage and repair expenses.

Thomas C. Closson, the OMA reminded the audience that the Federal Emergency Management Administration (FEMA) and state disaster programs will only restore damaged structures back to their original condition.

"If it costs a nickel more, you can't do it," said Closson.

The Village of Ruidoso has wrestled with that problem before as the Paradise Canyon bridge has been washed out and restored to its original condition many times.

Village administrators have complained that FEMA rule, averting that funds should be allocated to repair structures, such as the Paradise Canyon bridge, in such a way that they will withstand further disasters.

Thursday's audience complained of the official rate chart for reimbursement of eligible items, such as fuel, food, and other items, which could be revised to today's prices. Although General Ed Baca of the OMA said the chart now being used is based

on 1984-85 prices, local representatives said the chart price is far below actual costs.

Ruidoso Downs Trustee, George Buchanan, said the chart allowed expenditures of \$2.50 a yard for land fill, and his village has had to pay about \$4 a yard for that item.

County Manager Suzanne Cox said she has the same problem, noting that when the lowest bid received is higher than the chart allows, then the program auditor questions the expenditure and further paperwork is required to receive payment.

Both Cox and Ruidoso Downs manager Jim Hine said after the meeting that they have received disaster funds requests after the August 1984 flood.

Lieutenant Governor Mike Egan said both the pricing and restoration to original condition issues need to be addressed with FEMA. Egan and some county members then made a preliminary review of the damage to Eddy and Lincoln counties.

Although the county estimates were prepared within a matter of a week, flooding, erosion, and other reports will be presented at a meeting scheduled for 10 a.m. Friday, July 8, in Roswell. Hine and FEMA representatives will be at that meeting.

Ruidoso Village administrator Mike Davalos said he has a budget request for \$18,000 for the following:

- \$6,000 debris removal
- \$1,000 protective materials
- \$7,000 roads
- \$1,000 public utilities
- \$3,000 drainage improvement

under construction. The county Sports Complex.

Buchanan and Ruidoso Downs will apply for \$4,000 for damage to street and water line, and Cox said the county will ask for about \$400.

Reaction mixed to court ruling

A State Supreme Court ruling last Wednesday, welcomed by some relatives of a slain Pecos couple, was apparently not greeted with enthusiasm by some officials.

The court gave District Judge Richard A. Parsons 60 days to convene a grand jury on a petition, signed by the requisite number of registered voters and presented by Terri Bussey and Frank Pancho McKnight.

Bussey and Pancho McKnight, relatives of Thomas "Cotton" and Judy McKnight who were found shot to death in their isolated ranch home in November 1984, want a grand jury to review all the evidence in the unsolved murder case. They cited the New Mexico State Constitution as their basis for filing the petition.

But Parsons did not respond, and said the Constitution wouldn't require a judge to perform a "futile" act. He said the attorney general, who took over the case after a dispute between the Lincoln County Sheriff and the Twelfth Judicial District Attorney, would bring the case to trial when enough evidence is uncovered.

Parsons could not be reached by The News, but said in another published source that he'll comply with the order after conferring with the attorney general.

According to a story in the El Paso Times, Parsons said "it was conceivable the grand jury could complete its term without reviewing the McKnight evidence if prosecutors choose not to present the case."

However the petition presented by Bussey and McKnight specifically names the McKnight murder case.

It was also reported that Parsons noted three recent grand juries have met without being asked to consider the McKnight evidence.

But a grand jury, in a recent grand jury reported the panel asked to hear evidence in the McKnight case, and was denied the request.

Both Bussey and McKnight said they were not satisfied they have been granted their constitutional rights if a grand jury is convened and McKnight's case is not reviewed.

Their petition called for Parsons to appoint a special prosecutor other than the District Attorney, and for the Attorney General and their assistants to present the case of the murders of Thomas "Cotton" McKnight and Judy Lee McKnight to said grand jury.

Parsons has said he has no authority to appoint a special prosecutor, and Gary Mitchell, the attorney who presented the case, said Wednesday that issue was not before the State Supreme Court.

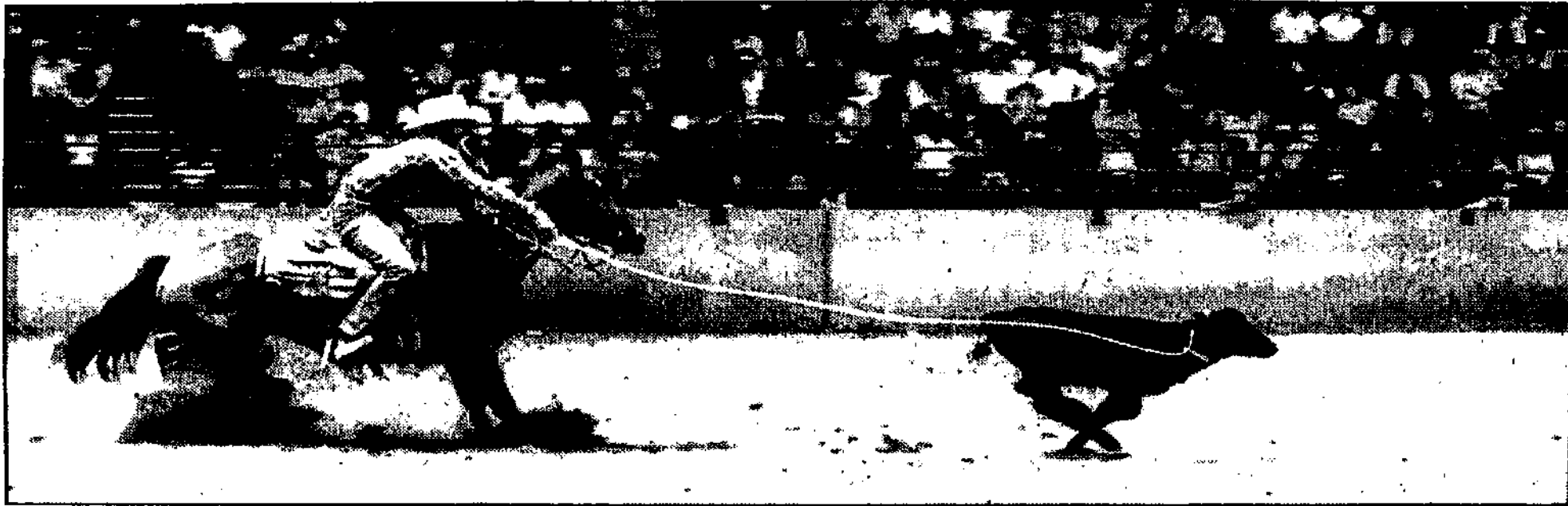
Mitchell and his clients said they hoped all the agencies involved would cooperate and see that the evidence is presented, whether by the AG, the DA or another licensed attorney.

The sheriff and the New Mexico State Police began the investigations the day the bodies were found, but the State Police voluntarily left the case, only to be called back by the attorney general nearly a year later.

Although the sheriff has said emphatically that he knows who committed the crimes, District Attorney James Weldon has refused to present a case with what he calls "tainted evidence."

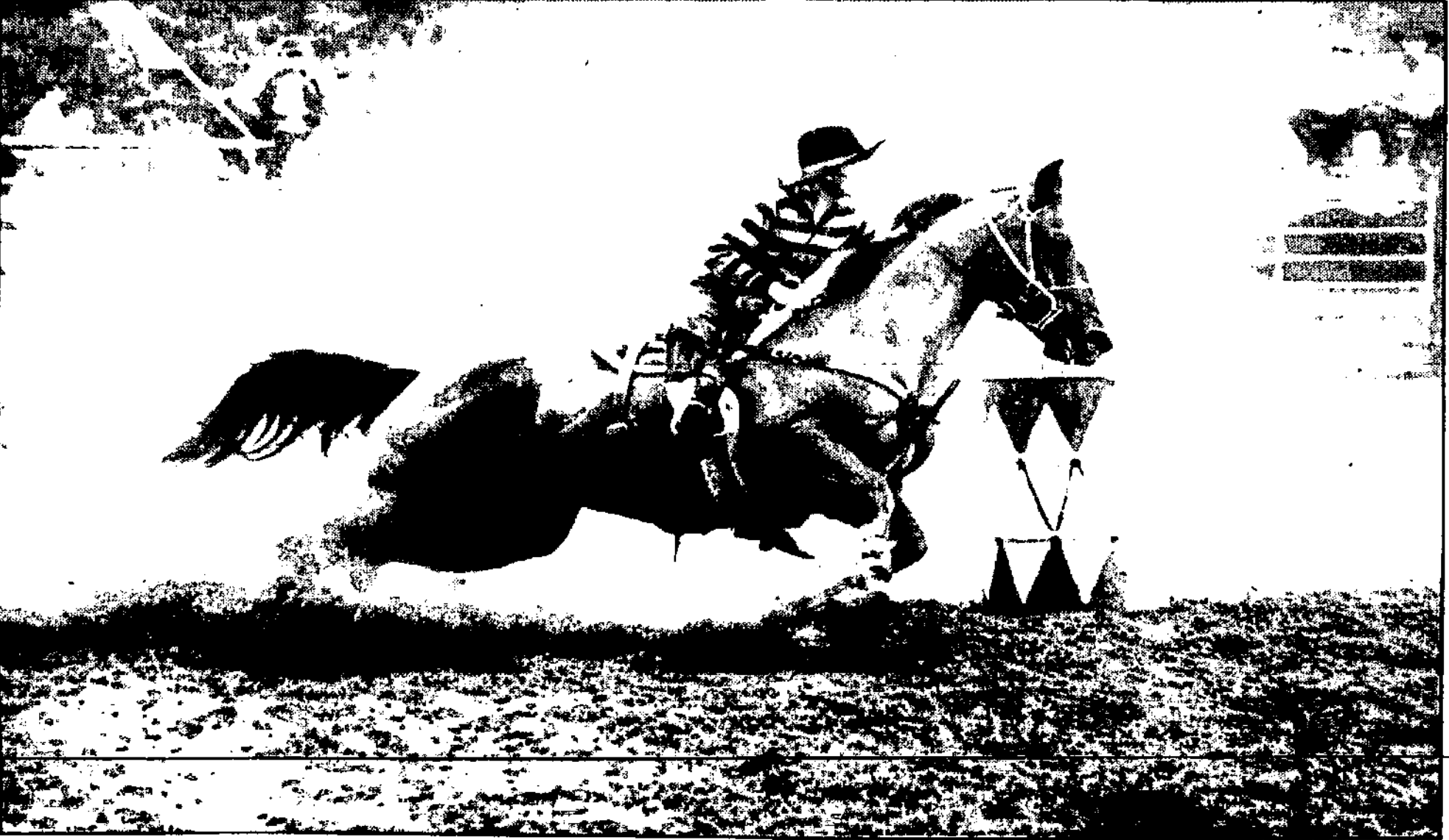
Meanwhile the 20-month-old investigation apparently continues. Deputy Attorney General Stephen Westheimer consistently has no comment on what he calls a continuing investigation.

By the time a grand jury is convened in 60 days the McKnight murder case will be nearly two years old.

Group forms to combat hunger

A handful of people gathered last Monday to discuss the growing problem of hunger and malnutrition in Lincoln County.

Lincoln County Food Bank, soon to be a non-profit, incorporated agency, was born at that meeting.

But the whole meeting grew out of problems identified by members of a church group who have established an outreach program to help with emergency needs. One of those emergency needs turned out to be transportation to Alamogordo to apply for Food Stamps.

Lincoln County residents are required to make an appointment and apply for the federal food program at the Alamogordo office of the Department of Human Services, and it was learned at the meeting that the whole process from initial application to receiving the stamps takes about seven weeks.

By assuming some of these duties we became more and more aware of the needs of the county," said Phyllis Boverie, outreach chairman for the Episcopal Church of the Holy Mount.

Boverie said she learned at a recent state conference that New Mexico has a "gleaner's law," called the Food Donors Liability Act.

That law is designed to encourage grocery stores to donate products they can no longer sell to food programs. It releases the donor from any liability from any problems that might arise from donating the unmarketable but still edible or useable goods.

Sister H. Rose Kidd, director of the Casa de Peregrinos, a food bank

in Las Cruces, said few food outlets are donating food to her program. She purchases most of the one-and-a-half tons of food a day distributed through the Las Cruces food bank.

"Most people probably don't understand that you can give away food without risking being sued," remarked State Representative Ben Hall.

Another significant tax incentive to food distributors was included in the 1976 Tax Reform Bill, said Sister Rose. She said donors may deduct the cost of the food plus half of their normal profit margin.

That could be significant," noted Bob Boverie.

Sister Rose gave a short background on food programs, and explained how her own program was organized and has operated for the past four years.

She said her financial support comes from businesses, churches and individuals including many people who have been helped by the program and want to help others in return.

While the number of people in Lincoln County with emergency food needs is unknown, Sister Rose warned that the program will grow fast once it is established.

"When you feed one hungry person the word gets out," she said.

In Las Cruces the program serves more than 1,000 families, and up to 5,000 people a month, explained Sister Rose. She said many clients come just once with an emergency short-term need, but about one-fourth come more than once. She keeps detailed records of the families the program serves.

While the director and an office manager are paid, the program

depends heavily on 60 or more volunteers a month sorting, packaging and distributing the foods and supplies, said Sister Rose.

It was learned Monday that an emergency food pantry is stocked at the Department of Human Resources in Ruidoso. Food and supplies are donated by various churches, but quantities are limited and the pantry often runs out of food.

Sister Rose said the successful Las Cruces program also had a small beginning—distributing food from the back of a church.

"The only thing that kept me going was the faces of the poor," remarked Sister Rose.

Lincoln County Food Bank organizers will meet again from 7-9 p.m. Thursday, July 10. Anyone interested is asked to attend.

Weekend sees rash of accidents in Ruidoso

An accident involving a New Mexico State Police vehicle was among an even dozen accidents without injuries recorded by the Ruidoso Police Department over the Fourth of July weekend.

State Police Officer Steven D. Standridge, 30, was westbound on Highway 70 in the department's 1985 Chevrolet Blazer on Sunday, July 6, when his vehicle was struck by a 1978 Ford pickup driven by Jarrett Newton Hicks, 61, of Blanket, Texas, according to Ruidoso Police.

Police said Hicks was eastbound

on Sudderth Drive when he stopped at the stop sign at the "Y," apparently didn't see the Standridge vehicle, and pulled into his path. Reports indicated that Standridge's vehicle struck the left rear fender of the pickup Hicks was driving.

Hicks was cited for a right of way violation, reported police.

Four people were hospitalized as the result of a two-car crash on Friday, July 4, according to police.

Two Roswell residents, Gladys Schram, 80, and Beulah Hansen, 80, and two El Paso, Texas, residents, Richard Wagner, 40, and

Deborah Wagner, 29, were taken to Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Hospital after the accident at Hull Road and Heath Drive, said police. Three of the victims were treated and released Friday, with Richard Wagner being hospitalized until Sunday, said hospital officials.

Schram was travelling north on Hull when she attempted to make a left turn on Heath Drive and collided with the Wagner vehicle, said police.

Police said Schram was cited for a right of way violation.

Airport impact document ready for review

It's official!

The long-awaited "finding of no significant impact" (FONSI) on the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport land, announced recently, is confirmed in an inch-thick published document. The heavy volume is filled with facts, figures and conclusions surrounding the impact of an airport on Fort Stanton mesa.

The Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) approval of the environmental statement is the last step needed before federal funding can be allocated for the airport

construction.

The FONSI, coming after months of discussions and several public meetings, offered no surprises.

Environmental issues cleared by the FONSI include air, water, noise, pollution and solid waste.

"No established scenic, wildlife, recreational, cultural, historical or archeological resources will be adversely affected by the proposed development," states the report, which goes on to explain the mitigation process used for an endangered species, the Kuenzler's hedgehog cactus, identified on the property.

The FAA approval came in spite of objections filed by a group of

county residents. Those objections are included in the document.

Nearly a fourth of the book is comprised of those comment letters and accompanying documents prepared by J.H. Jordan, Cleis Jordan, Gaylord Freeman, Walter Henn, Ann Buffington and Bob Scribner.

Copies of the completed statement are available for review at the Ruidoso Public Library.

Jerry Trujillo, FAA environmental specialist, said last week a tentative allocation of funds is the next step toward building an airport facility on Fort Stanton mesa.

Task force seeks delay of tax hearing

Members of the Economic Development Task Force agreed to ask the Ruidoso Village Council Tuesday to postpone the July 29 public hearing on the 0.5 percent gross receipts tax increase and will suggest a synopsis of possible alternative sources of funding for the existing airport land.

The task force, created by the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce, is designed to study and suggest possible sources of revenue for retaining the airport land and to find potential entities interested in economic development of the area. In short, the group's goals are to maintain possession of the land and find ways to create a year-round economy for the Ruidoso area.

The decision of asking the council for postponement came Thursday after lengthy discussions concerning the 0.5 percent gross receipts tax increase and possible alternative revenue sources for the \$2.6 million land. The task force stressed it was not taking a position on the tax increase or any other form of funding.

"We don't want to give the impression that we're against the half percent increase," said Don Shaw, chamber vice president for economic development.

"We do not have a preference

right now. We just feel it is premature to make any decisions now," task force co-chairman Buddy Bundick added.

The task force listed possible alternative sources of funding for the land. They are, but are not limited to: a 0.25 percent gross receipts tax increase; funding from Lodgers' Tax together with other funds; county and state participation with some type of federal funding; and the possibility that the task force can bring in some development investors who are interested in the land, Bundick said.

The task force discussed the possibility of losing the airport land if the already scheduled public hearing is held.

"We're afraid that if the hearing is held, the people won't want another half of a percent increase in gross receipts tax and the council will say 'OK, the people really don't want the land,'" Bundick said.

"If we allow that land to be sold to the highest bidder, we will have no control whatsoever over what is developed there," he said.

The task force questioned why the council was pushing a decision on the tax increase.

"I imagine it is to get some action. The way I see it, we have two issues. Do we want the land and do we want to raise gross receipts tax to pay for it," village councillor Victor Alonso said.

The task force also heard one proposal for economic development of a portion of the airport land. Local businessman Ed Hyman said he has been playing with the idea of building a coliseum for more than 12 years.

The coliseum would cover 30 acres and would hold 5,000 people to start with leaving room for expansion in the future. It would house a large arena, and two banquet or meeting rooms and would be available for horse activities as well as for other events, he said.

Hyman said he knows of horse people in the San Angelo, Texas, area who are interested in bringing a cutting horse competition to Ruidoso. San Angelo's contest attracts 25,000 people annually, he said.

"These people have wanted to come to Ruidoso for a long time, but we had no where to hold the event," Hyman said.

Hyman said 25,000 people spending \$100 a day in Ruidoso would bring in \$2,500,000. He said he would be happy with 5,000 people.

"If we could attract just 5,000 people per event and have 20 events per year, think of the possibilities," Hyman said.

Ruidoso already has events that are cut short due to lack of space or the weather. He cited the Gun Show and the motorcycle festival as examples.

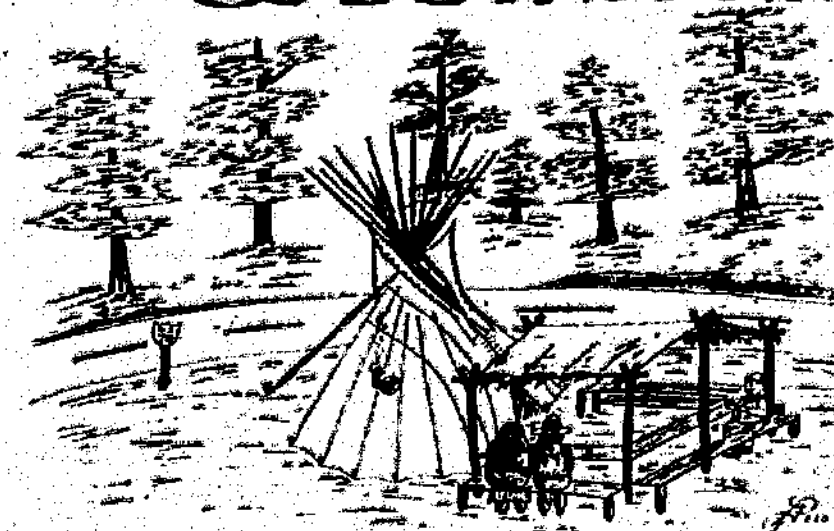

About 100 competitors participated in the race, which also included a 5-K Fun Run.

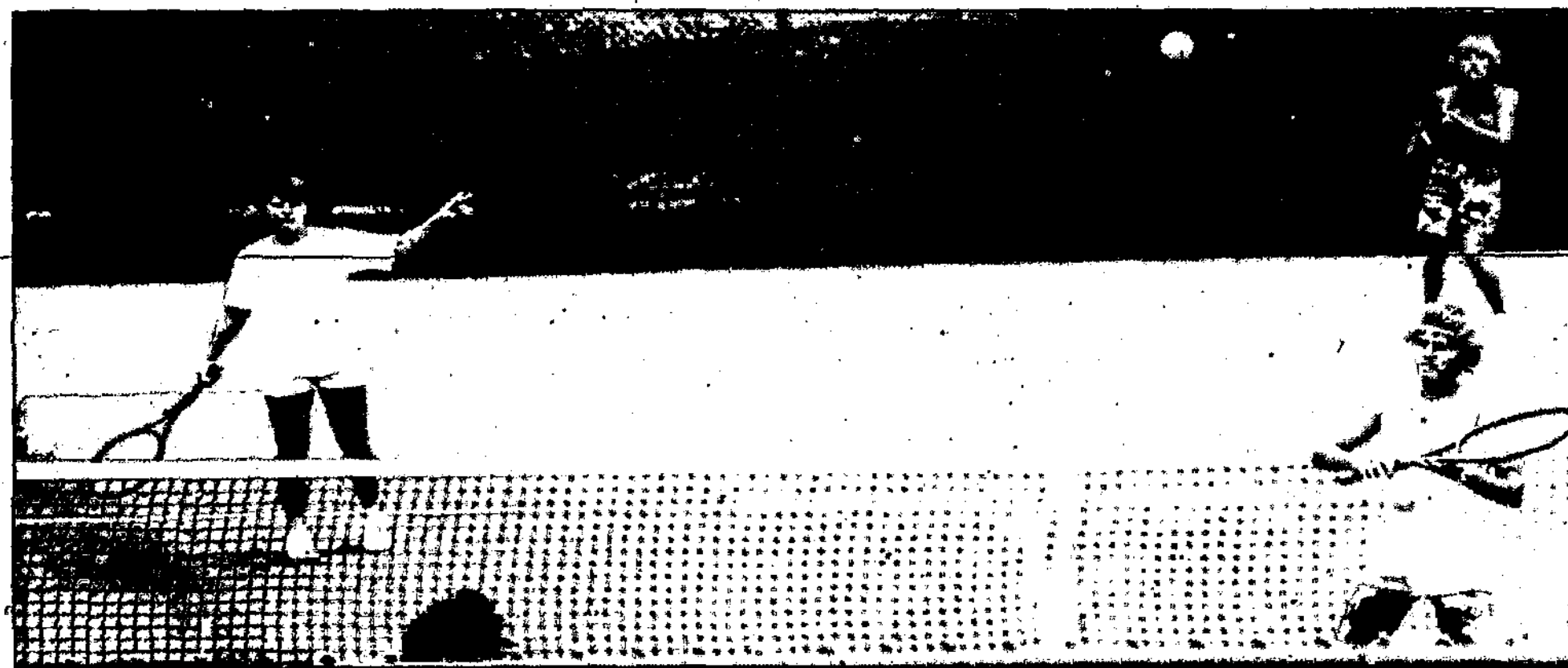
Lavine Barber was the first woman finisher in the 10-K, running a 50:11.

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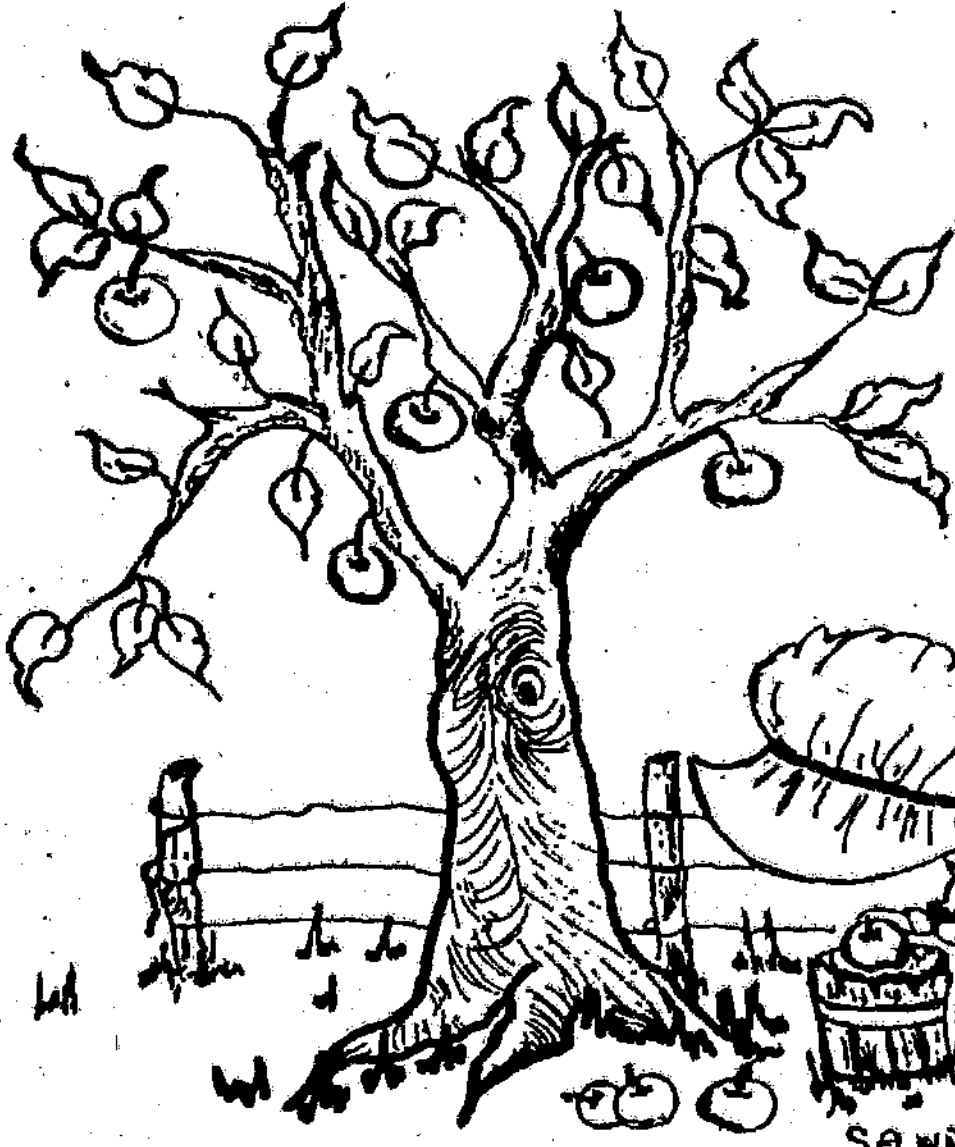

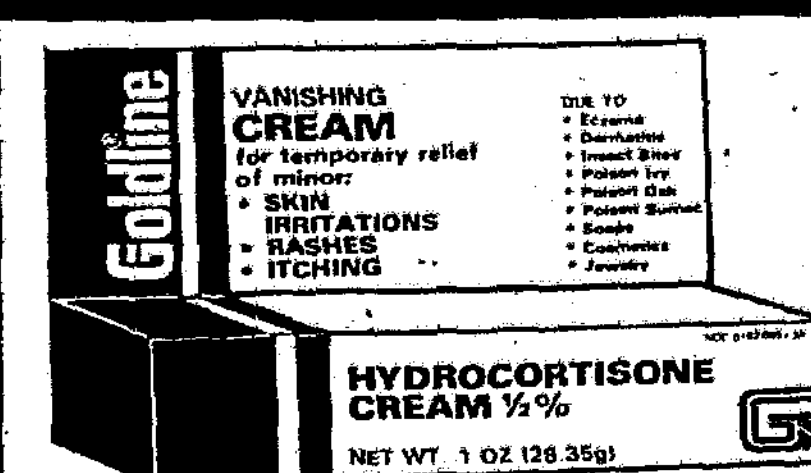

The business of flying is Hightower's calling

"Flying is just something I have always wanted to do," Mountain Aviation owner Steven Hightower said.

Hightower earned his private pilot's license at age 17 while still in high school. At 27, he is the sole owner and operator of one of two airplane charter services in Ruidoso.

Hightower received his commercial, instrument, and certified flight instructor's ratings from Arizona State University. He recently took and passed an airline transport pilot's (ATP) exam in Albuquerque. This is the highest rating a pilot can receive, and allows him to fly for an airline.

"I used to think that flying for the airlines was the only way to go. But now, I enjoy the freedom of owning my own business. Airlines are very

structural. You fly the same routes and go to the same places day after day," Hightower said.

Originally from Midland, Texas, Hightower moved to Ruidoso 10 years ago. He opened Mountain Aviation in 1980 and has been flying commercially for six years. His charter plane is a Cessna Turbo 206, a six passenger airplane.

Hightower says the summer season is the busiest. The racing season brings a number of people in and out of the Ruidoso area.

"I deal mainly with people involved in the horse industry, like trainers, owners and jockeys," Hightower said.

He charters flights mostly in New Mexico, Texas and Oklahoma, but makes trips to Colorado, Arizona and Nevada as well.

Hightower also handles contract flying. He currently has contracts with eight banks in the Ruidoso-Alamogordo area. He delivers their

banking documents daily to El Paso, Texas.

To maintain the various ratings, a pilot who is flying commercially on a daily basis is periodically tested. Once each year, Hightower completes a "check ride" with a Federal Aviation Administration inspector.

"I get in a plane with the inspector, and I pretty much do whatever

he wants me to," Hightower said.

Then, once every two years, Hightower is tested for his flight instructor's rating. He will also take 24 hours of classroom instruction during this period, he said.

In the future, with the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport project, Hightower would like to expand and possibly acquire a larger Cessna which would seat 14 passengers.

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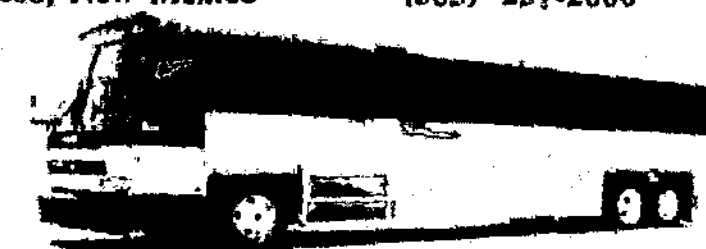

The C bar T Rodeo Livestock Company from Lubbock, Texas,

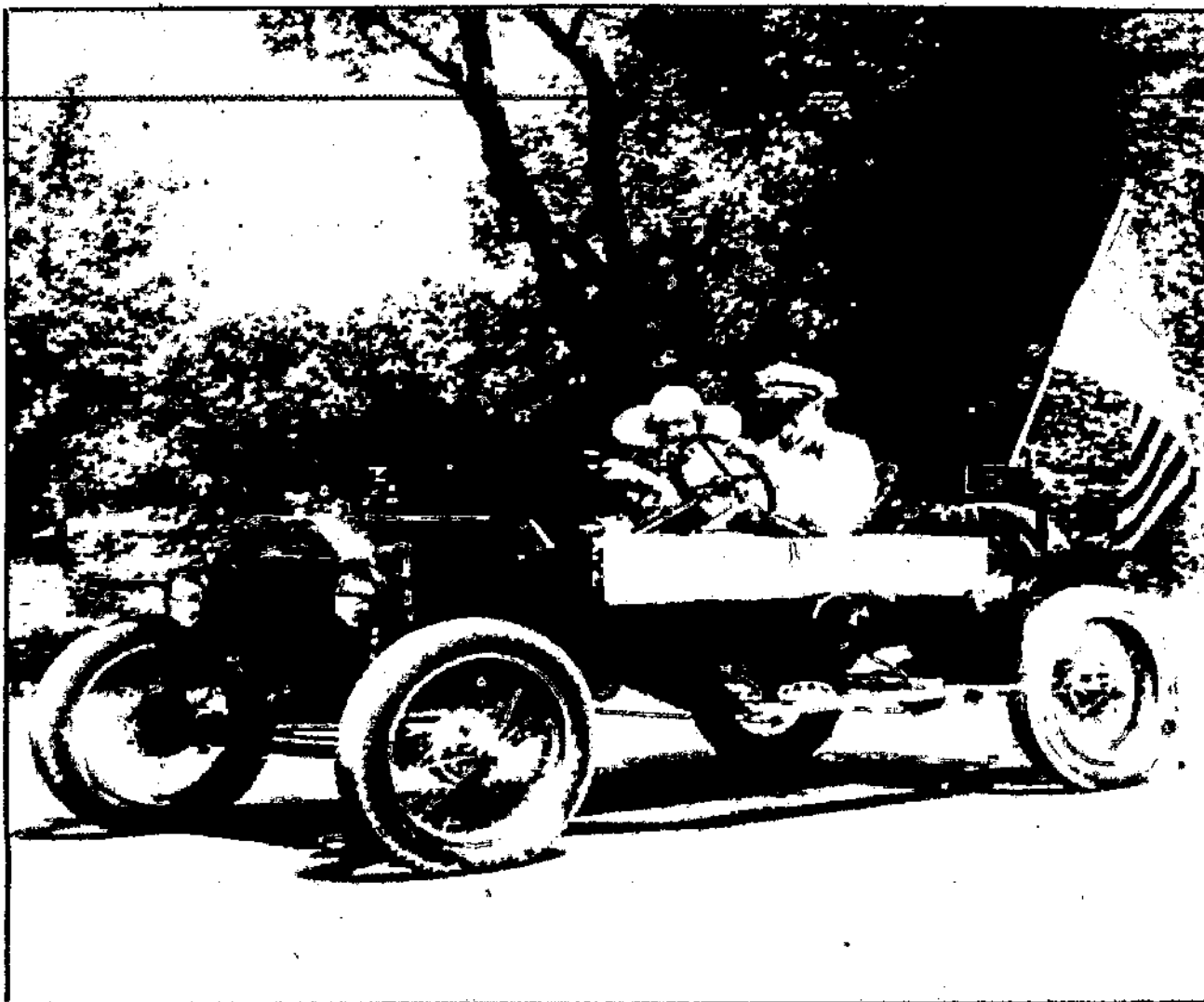
furnished the stock for the "Stampede" and according to contestants it was some of the best. The bucking stock was big, tough and "rough to hang on to."

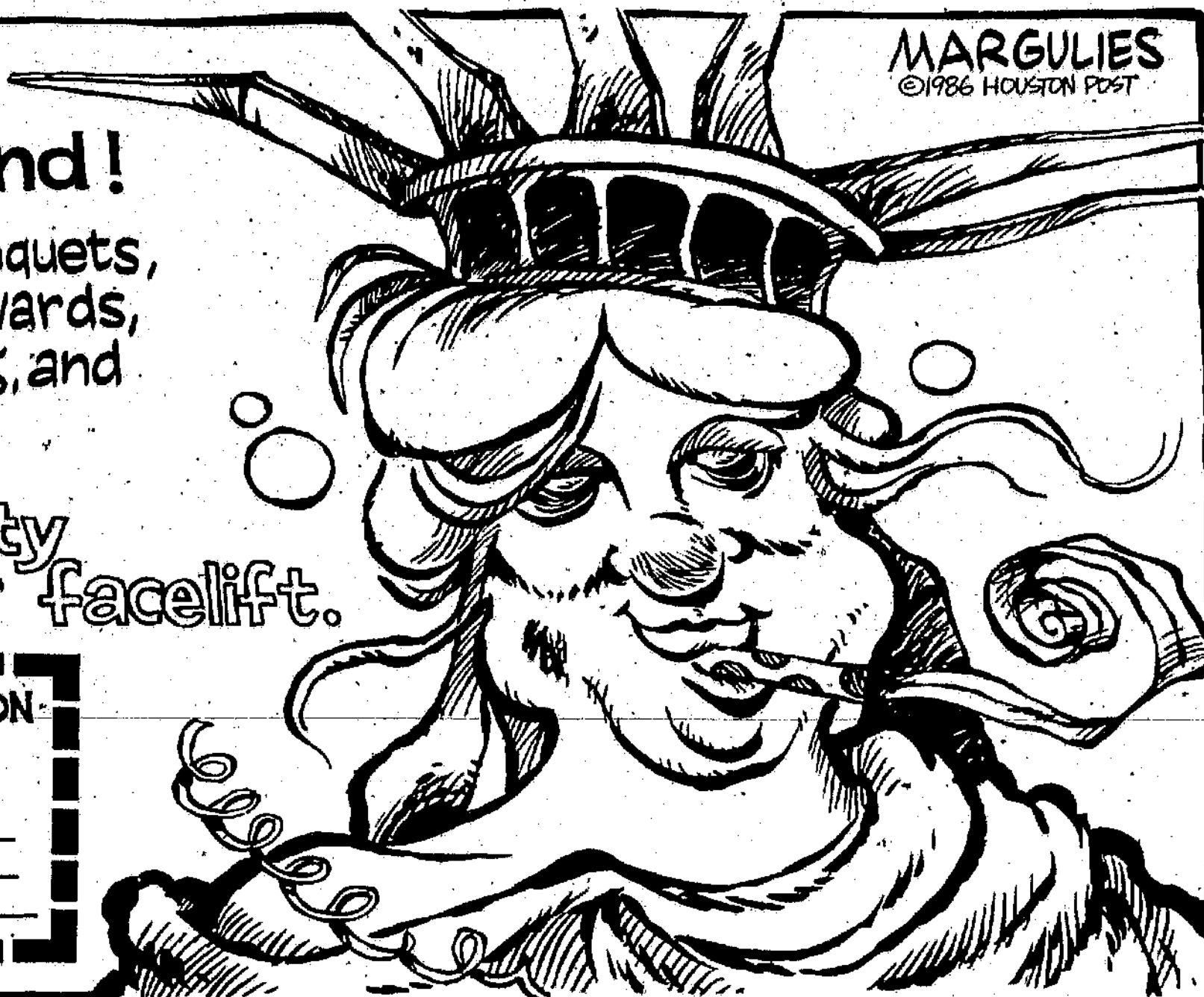

Editorial

All area villages have such bans, but a gap in the net of prevention exists in the county.

Lincoln County enforces the state statute on fireworks, which allows certain lesser pyrotechnics.

But in a summer sun-dried forest, even minor fireworks can spark major fires.

We encourage the Lincoln County Commission to examine the issue of an absolute ban on fireworks, and take appropriate action to close the net of fire prevention.—DJP

Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE—In Texas, almost everything is bigger—but not necessarily better.

Here in New Mexico, our state faces bad news about severe shortages of the cash that fuels state government. Compared to our neighbor to the east, however, our problems are minuscule. Texas has revised estimates of that state's deficits sharply upward—from \$1.3 billion, which is certainly bad enough, to \$2.3 billion. That latter figure is almost twice our state's entire budget.

When you get numbers with as many zeroes in them as \$2.3 billion has, and you are furthermore told that they are likely to have around them the parentheses accountants use to designate negative sums, you take some stiff doses of bad-tasting medicine.

Maybe those who run our state government, who are ordinarily most reluctant to take medicine of any kind, though they give rousing speeches which indicate just the opposite, could learn a little from the folks next door.

Our governor, in his call for that most recent special legislative session, specifically instructed lawmakers not to reduce budgets for state government by more than 2 percent.

In Texas, Governor Mark White called for cuts of 13 percent when he was told the deficit would be that mere \$1.3 billion that was first estimated. You can imagine what slashes he is going to demand now that a full billion has been added to that total.

You say that since New Mexico isn't going into the drink for quite so many dollars, we don't have to cut as sharply as others? Those are

percentages, friends, and on a percentage basis our peril of total wipeout is almost exactly as great as theirs.

What's more, Texas tax collectors seem to understand economics a little better than those who predict New Mexico's income do. Over there, they say, "The growing deficit stems primarily from declining sales tax generated by the oil and natural gas businesses and related industries. But state officials said the energy slump is beginning to hurt retail sales and building activity, further reducing sales-tax revenue." Here at home, forecasters don't appear to have taken into sufficient account that second wave of revenue reductions which almost inevitably follows on the first.

Note the sense of urgency about the matter this description of affairs in Texas generates: "Meanwhile, cities, which receive some sales tax revenue from the state, are feeling the pinch. Houston, Dallas and San Antonio, the state's largest cities, already have slashed budgets, frozen salaries, laid off workers and cut services."

Have you seen any of those things—slashing, freezing, laying-off or cutting—taking place here?

On the contrary. We have just increased salaries of state workers by 5 percent and given our schoolteachers a whopping \$2,200-a-year raise. And that big cutback in state jobs our governor brags his administration has concluded—how did that come out? Well, the supposed abolition of 400 posts turned out, when completed, to have reduced the total number of state employees by an almost insignificant 83. All the rest were "saved" by being

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given other posts in state government—where, of course, they will continue to draw salaries, thus expanding rather than contracting the likelihood of deficits for our beloved state.

Mayor Henry Cisneros of San Antonio, sometimes viewed with our governor as one of the country's Hispanic up-and-comers, is planning to eliminate 375 staff positions in his city alone. That may tarnish his local popularity, but at least he doesn't seem willing to kid himself about the severity of the matter.

Here in Santa Fe, it is sad to relate, the major wave of emotion that has swept through the higher

reaches of state government recently is not one of concern about our state's difficulties, which are as real as Texas'. It is mostly a feeling of elation that the Legislature has come and gone without causing Cabinet Secretaries any major inconvenience. Along with the smiles that realization causes, there is clearly a heavy admixture of relief that these folks, along with the governor who appointed them, will be gone in six months, leaving others to face the problems.

We who will have to pay the bills they leave behind have no reason to share their ebullience.

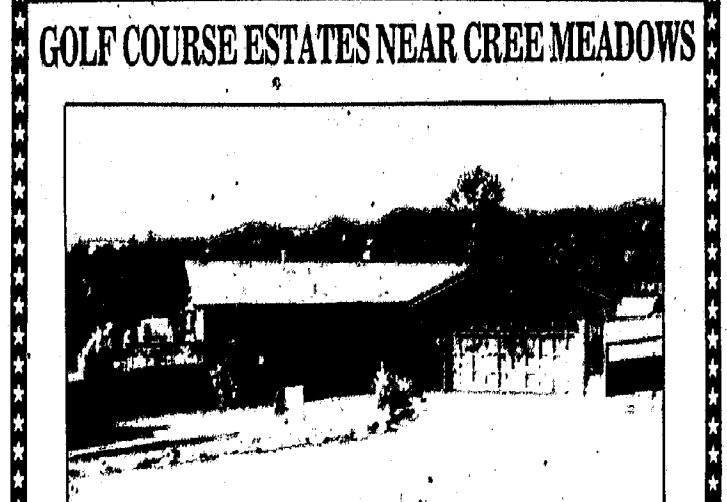

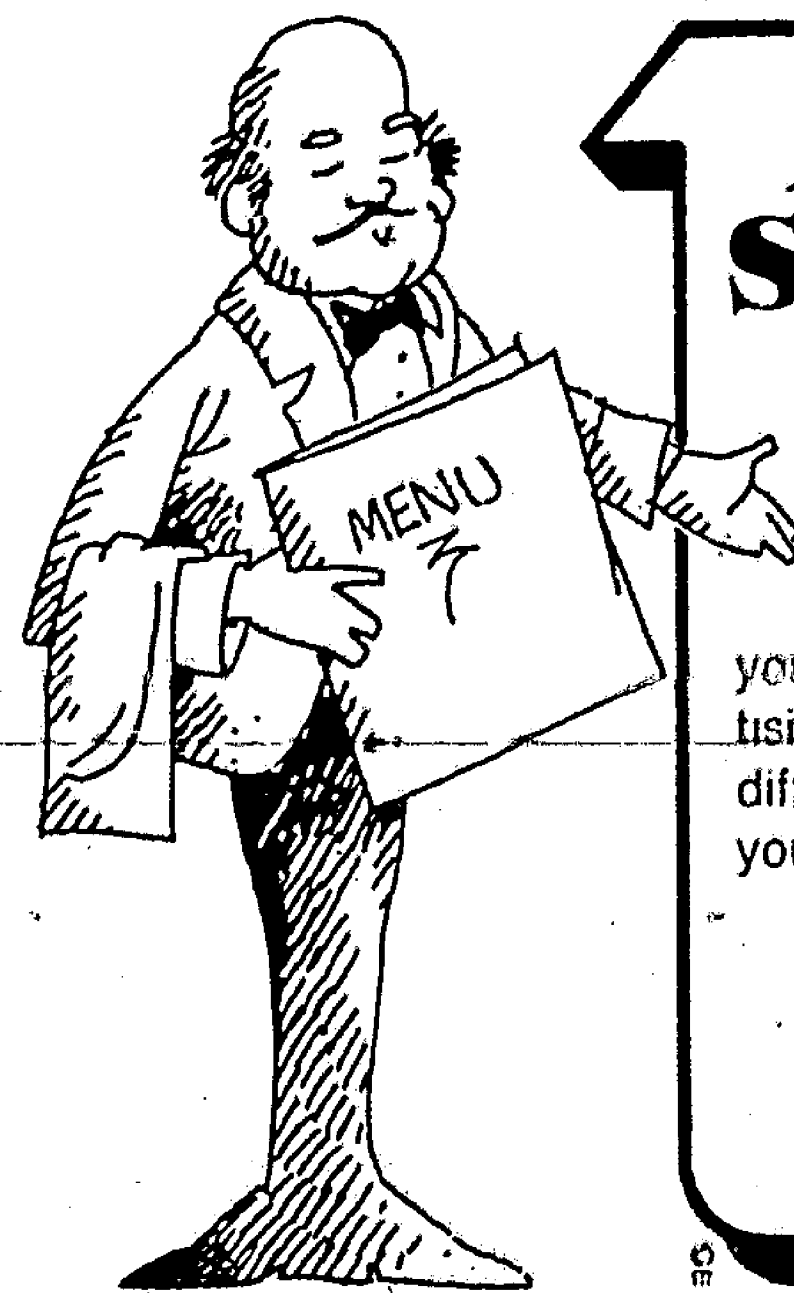
