

## Flood repairs Feds want riverwork completed properly

Recent rains that have disrupted the flow of the Rio Ruidoso and flooded area properties have led some citizens to look for ways to guard against a recurrence.

Village and federal officials warn against initiating any work in or around the river channel without first checking with local authorities.

Jim Wood, a biologist with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, was in the village Tuesday to discuss federal regulations with local officials. Wood said most cities have a flood plain regulation similar to a Ruidoso ordinance.

"We can work together because our program fits in real well with their (Ruidoso) program," noted Wood.

Wood said the regulation he is charged with enforcing is the Clean Water Act, designed to protect the physical, chemical and biological integrity of the nation's water.

He said his agency issues permits for filling activity in the riverway, new construction or anything that could disrupt the course of the river.

While federal laws govern the river channel, the village regulation calls for anyone building a retaining wall along the river to obtain a building permit, said Jimmy Neeley, village building inspector. Wood said federal permits require that local regulations be observed.

"People want to protect their property," noted village enforcement officer Sandy Hall, adding they can't be allowed to do so in a way that could adversely affect a neighbor's property. That's why the village has established a list of requirements to obtain a flood control permit.

Neeley said anyone making application for a flood control permit should have the following:

- a registered survey showing proposed construction in relationship to the existing river channel and property lines;

- construction detail, wall cross section and dimensions;

- description of work including cubic yardage of any fill material—river rock, sand, concrete.

"All this work can usually be prepared by a registered land surveyor and be on the survey," said Neeley.

The village, too, must comply with federal regulations, and is presently obtaining an emergency permit for some flood cleanup works, said Neeley.

"A Corps permit is required if you plan to locate a structure or discharge dredged or fill material in waters or navigable water in the United States," according to information provided by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers Albuquerque District office.

Regulated activities include site development fills, roadfills, dams and dikes and protective devices such as levees, riprap and other bank stabilization, according to Wood.

"We need to stress the importance of retaining walls," said village assistant manager Frank Potter Wednesday. He said municipal officials want to encourage individual property owners to take steps to protect against future floods.



Assistant village manager Frank Potter advised a section of the Rio Ruidoso in the Upper Canyon where property owners have cooperated in building retaining walls, he said protect from flooding and enhance the natural beauty of the area. Potter says he'd like to see similar things implemented along the river.

But make sure you don't drown your neighbors," said Potter. Neeley said compliance with local and federal regulations should be maintained.

## Airport Feds ponder funding

"We're down to the tough part now," said Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) official Bill Howard Wednesday.

Now that the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport (SBRA) project has cleared the environmental hurdles by receiving a finding of no significant impact (FONSI), Howard said the FAA is now faced with identifying funds to build the facility.

Gramm-Rudman legislation and agency budget cuts have caused "financing problems," said Howard. He said he's optimistic that enough funds can be allocated to start the site preparation and earthwork on the Fort Stanton mesa.

Howard said two project pre-applications currently are in the hands of the FAA—the first is for \$1 million to reimburse New Mexico State University for the airport land, and the second for about \$11 million for the total project.

The \$1 million pre-application is being processed. He said FAA of-

ficials are trying to identify funds from the current fiscal year (FY86) and from next year to issue a tentative allocation for the airport construction project.

Howard expects a tentative allocation this fiscal year. That year ends September 30, so Howard predicts a funding allocation by the end of August, leaving time for a grant to be issued before the fiscal year ends.

If funds can be identified in both the current and the next fiscal year, bids can be solicited for the entire project.

Although FAA has told Ruidoso that its \$2.6 million obligation toward the project can be paid out at \$500,000 a year, Howard said that plan could delay the opening. The FAA is pressing for a commitment of those funds from the village as soon as possible.

It will enhance their chance of getting the airport operational sooner," said Howard. "We feel that that's in the best interests of the community."

## County may face suit

County Commission Chairman Bill Elliott confirmed Wednesday that county attorney Gary Mitchell told the commission on July 9 of a lawsuit being filed against Lincoln County.

Elliott said Mitchell didn't give details of the suit, but revealed it stems from an arrest made by the Lincoln County Sheriff's Office.

When they sue the sheriff's department they're suing the county," noted Elliott.

County Clerk Fran Siddens also confirmed receiving a notice of intent letter from Ruidoso attorney Daniel A. Bryant of Parsons, Harris and Bryant, however she declined to comment on any pending litigation.

By late Wednesday afternoon, 12th District Court deputy clerk Liz Luceras said she had no records of the suit named in the letter being filed.

Sheriff Tom Sullivan said the suit has been threatened by Duane Shannon of Ruidoso who was arrested in a sheriff's office drug raid.

He was arrested under a warrant we had and the only name we

had on the warrant was an alias," explained Sullivan. "He appeared to be that person, and I'm still not sure he wasn't," he added.

"We certainly wouldn't want to arrest the wrong person," said Sullivan, adding if a mistake was made it was an honest mistake.

Sullivan said he's not concerned about the suit since the sheriff's office was acting in good faith, but he was surprised.

He recalled during a hearing on April 22 that charges were dismissed against Shannon. During a recess of that court hearing, Sullivan said Assistant District Attorney Harry Wilcox Jr. mentioned to Bryant he had grounds for a lawsuit.

At that time Bryant said his client had no plans to file suit, said Sullivan. "I took Dan Bryant at his word," he added.

Sullivan was very distressed at the prosecutor making the suggestion.

The DA's supposed to be our legal advisor," said Sullivan.

Bryant, Wilcox and Shannon were unavailable for comment Wednesday.

## Chamber supports airport quarter cent tax boost

The Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors Tuesday approved a recommendation, from the chamber's Economic Development Task Force (EDTF), that supports the proposed 0.50 percent gross receipts tax increase ordinance, but recommends it be limited to 0.25 percent.

The recommendation was initially presented to the EDTF by the task force's Finance Committee at its regular meeting last week, and was approved by the task force as a whole to be presented to the chamber board. The task force cannot make a public statement without the board's approval.

The recommendation, to be presented at the July 29 public hearing, states the Finance Committee has been pursuing alternate sources of financing for the existing airport, but was limited by time.

... due to the time limitations placed upon the committee through the proposed ordinance of increasing gross receipts tax, it is the committee's recommendation that the Task Force and the Chamber of Commerce support the ordinance as a means of financing the airport site for future development which would broaden the community's economic base," the recommendation states.

The recommendation also suggests the gross receipts tax increase be limited to 0.25 percent, and says the committee will continue to pursue other sources of funding for the \$2.6 million land.

"The committee strongly recommends that the council limit the increase in gross receipts tax to one-quarter percent and if necessary, utilize other village resources to supplement any shortfall.

... the Finance Committee will continue to consider other possible sources, since the proposed in-

crease in tax would not take effect until January 1, 1987."

Chamber Economic Development Division Vice President Don Shaw summarized for the board events leading to the submission of the recommendation.

"The Economic Development Task Force was formed under the last chamber board to convince the village to retain the airport land and to make a sincere effort to bring in revenue generating entities to broaden the economic base in Ruidoso," Shaw said.

Shaw explained that a resolution was adopted by the Ruidoso Village Council on May 29 which said, in part, the task force would seek out sources of funding for the airport land.

... and FURTHER, that the governing body appoint this dedicated existing 'Task Force' which is representative of the community, to solicit commitments from above described revenue generating entities and to seek

financing from the public and private sector that will be necessary to reach our goal," the resolution states.

Shaw explained the task force immediately began "investigating alternate ways to pay the FAA (Federal Aviation Administration) the \$2.6 million."

He said time limitations surrounding the proposed tax increase ordinance and public hearing caused the task force to create the recommendation for the chamber's approval.

"The task force was not for an increase in gross receipts at all. But, the ordinance is there and it is coming up for public hearing July 29. We still feel there are alternate ways," Shaw said.

Chamber Board of Directors President Bill Hirschfeld stressed the chamber is trying to support the village council.

"We are not working against the village council. We are trying to work together to find the best thing for our community," he said.

## 'Father of Bluegrass' Bill Monroe to perform Monday

Tue tappin' and hand clappin' will echo through the All-American Sale Pavilion at Ruidoso Downs Race Track when Bill Monroe and his Bluegrass quartet roll into town for a concert at 8 p.m. Monday, July 21. Ruidoso Summer Festival will present Monroe, The Father of Bluegrass, as its second concert offering of the season.

And Monroe said Tuesday he and his crew are ready to bring their unique musical style to Ruidoso.

"I've got a lot of friends in New Mexico," said Monroe Tuesday in a telephone conversation from his Nashville, Tennessee, office.

But the septuagenarian singer added he will be making his first appearance in Ruidoso.

Monroe, whose lilting speaking voice gives the listener a hint of his tenor singing style, said his brand of Bluegrass has its roots in the old southern blues and even Scotch bagpipe music.

"Well, it really comes from the heart," drawled Monroe. "It belongs to America," he added of the highpitched, fast-paced music.

Bill Monroe and his brothers, Charlie and Birch, learned to play stringed instruments from their mother and uncle Pen Vandiver. They performed together in the mid-1920s, and their unusual musical style took its name from

their home state of Kentucky.

After the brothers split up, Monroe and his band continued touring, performing and gaining national attention. When Monroe and the Bluegrass Boys joined the Grand Ole Opry, they became a training ground for young performers.

Among early members of his group were Sam and Kirk McGee, Lester Flatt and Earl Scruggs.

Bluegrass musicians employ acoustical instruments, with no electronic or electrical equipment, and Monroe's specialty is the mandolin.

Many bluegrass classics came from Monroe's pen, and he'll be performing many of those well-known tunes during Monday's concert.

"I'll be singing 'Uncle Pen,' 'Blue Moon of Kentucky,' and all the songs my friends like so much," promised Monroe Tuesday.

The Bluegrass Quartet backing Monroe up these days includes Tom Ewing on guitar and lead singer; Johnny Montgomery on bass; Blake Williams on banjo and singing baritone; and "Tater" Tate fiddling and singing bass.

The Kentucky native said Tuesday he's in his 50th year of touring the nation with his home-grown musical show, and he'll commemorate the year by visiting all 50 states. Monroe and the Bluegrass

Quartet spend from 200 to 250 days a year on the road.

When asked when he plans to slow down, Monroe countered with "when do you think I should?"

Although he loves life on his Tennessee farm where he raises quarterhorses, cattle and foxhounds, Monroe said he's always

happy to get back on the road.

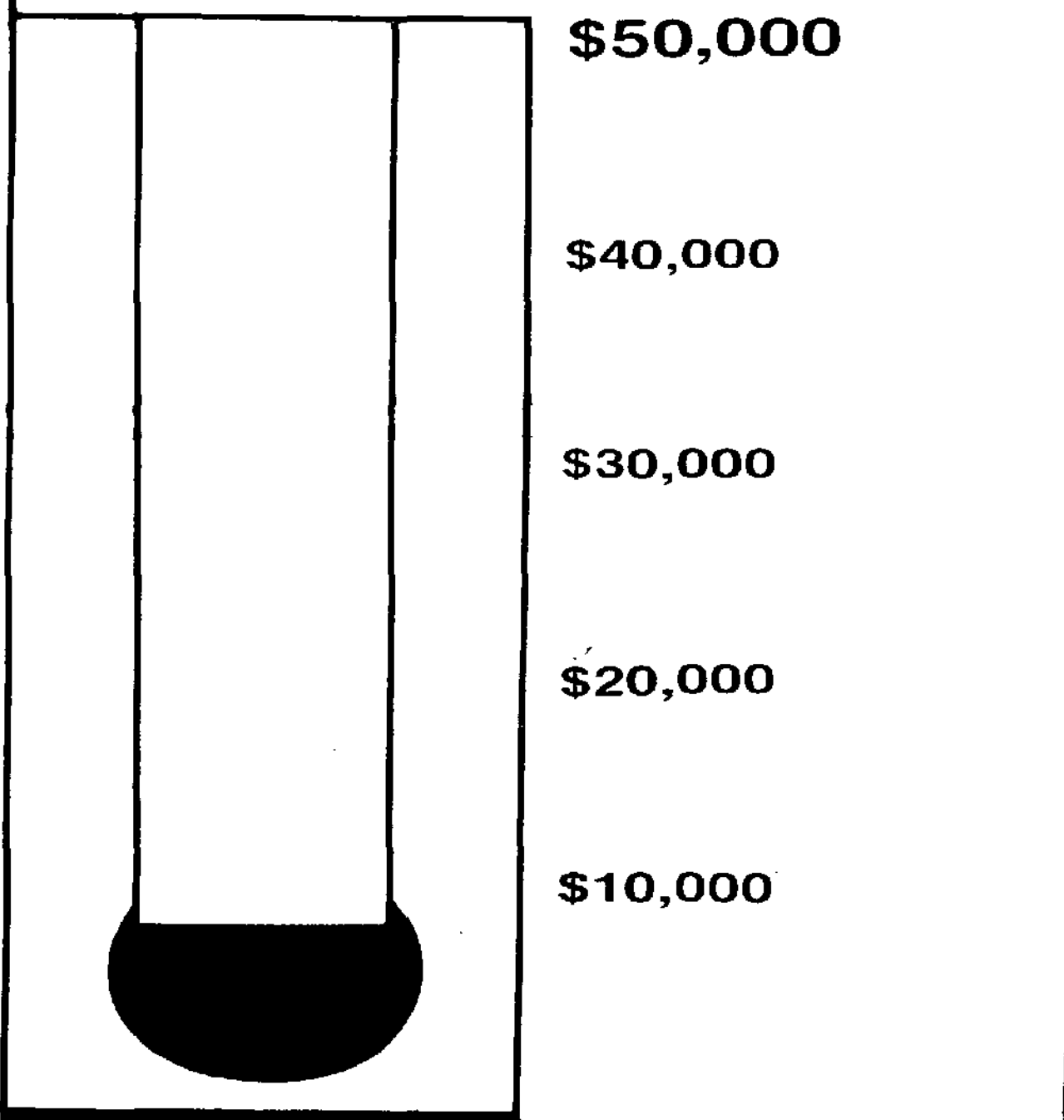

## Downs trustees consider development logistics

Vicki L. Byrnes, the general counsel for C.L. Crowder Investment Company Santa Teresa Country Club, Inc., of Santa Teresa, told the Village of Ruidoso Downs Trustees the Santa Teresa company wants to act quickly if it ever decides to develop the 180 acres it owns in Ruidoso Downs.

The investment company, which has been associated with some exclusive real estate projects in the El Paso, Texas, area, owns property north and west of the Ruidoso Downs Race Track, according to Byrnes.

At the regular trustee meeting Monday, Byrnes told the trustees the company she represented had no immediate plans to develop their Ruidoso Downs acreage, but had to inquire about sewage disposal and water rights as a matter of business policy.

Mayor J.C. "Jake" Harris told Byrnes he couldn't see any problems with providing sewage service on the company's property, but could not make any formal agreements with her on water rights because the village was still studying the water rights question in the Downs.

Trustee J.L. Wilson told Byrnes he felt it was the responsibility of the trustees to prepare the village for the future, but said the trustees were obligated to provide the best utility service possible to the residents already living within the village limits.

After she addressed the trustees, Byrnes said privately though the Santa Teresa company had not formalized any type of development plans, it could see the potential for growth in the Ruidoso Downs area sometime in the future.

She also said she knew the area was still suffering from an economic slump.

Byrnes had private discussions with village officials last Tuesday.

Village Counsel Richard Hawthorne told the trustees state law required villages to provide

proper sewage and water services to residents within their established limits when feasible.

In other business the trustees: —Applauded the actions of Ruidoso Downs Police Officer Jan Cary, who was presented a citation for bravery by Downs Police Chief Skip Hazel.

—Heard the village would have to pay about \$16,000 to complete their portion of the DiPaolo Hill Road paving project.

—Granted a resident the right to pave an additional 60 feet of DiPaolo Hill Road at his own expense.

—Appointed the election judges for the special election in August—which asks Downs residents to decide whether they want Downs restaurants to serve liquor on Sunday.

—Discussed the flooding problems of River Park resident Joe Wheatley, who has had flooding problems for more than 10 months on the land he rents from a private individual.

Village engineer Barrett Atkins told Wheatley a long-term solution to the River Park flooding problem was being considered. But the village also offered Wheatley a short-term solution.

At the request of Trustee Conrad Buchanan, the trustees decided to provide Wheatley with a truck full of topsoil to replace dirt he had lost during the recent flooding. The village also decided to straighten railroad ties that had drifted out of place on the lot Wheatley rents.

Offenders in the Downs community service program will do the work for Wheatley, along with one or more regular Downs employees.

—Agreed to investigate a solution to the speeding problem in the River Park area at Wheatley's request.

—Agreed to enforce animal control ordinances on property located in the River Park area at Wheatley's request.

"Manpower is down considerably this year. We will be relying on you to take charge of your own events," Swenor said.

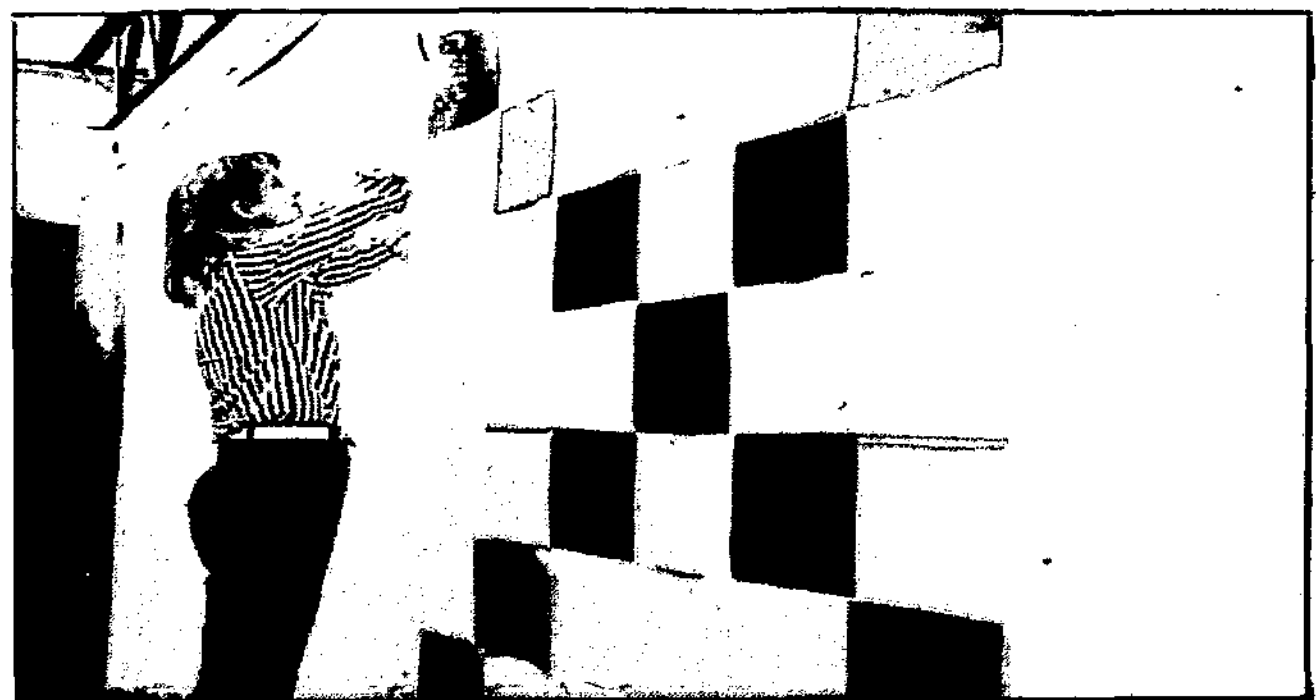
Survivors include her husband, Eugene W. Haden of the family

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When it comes to desserts, hot and crusty fresh fruit cobbler is hard to beat. The following recipe features two of summer's most luscious fruits topped with a cakelike topping, and lightly sprinkled with a mixture of sugar and nutmeg.

one-quarter cup sugar  
one-quarter cup brown sugar  
1 Tbsp. cornstarch  
½ cup water  
1 Tbsp. lemon juice  
2 cups fresh peaches, sliced  
1 cup blueberries

#### Topping

1 cup unbleached flour  
½ cup sugar  
1½ tsp. baking powder  
½ tsp. salt  
½ cup milk  
one-quarter cup melted butter  
one-quarter tsp. ground nutmeg  
2 Tbsp. sugar

In a saucepan, combine one-quarter cup sugar, brown sugar and cornstarch; gradually stir in water. Cook over medium heat until thickened, stirring constantly. When thickened, remove from heat, and stir in lemon juice and fruit. Pour into a lightly greased 8" square baking dish.

Mix together flour, ½ cup sugar, baking powder and salt. Stir in milk and melted butter, mix until smooth and spoon over fruit.

Combine 2 Tbsp. of sugar and nutmeg; sprinkle over batter. Bake at 375 degrees for approximately 40 minutes or until golden brown.

Roybal Electric also defeated the Crushers, 8-6, in a make-up game. The Pumas topped the Scorpions in another make-up game, but no exact score was available.

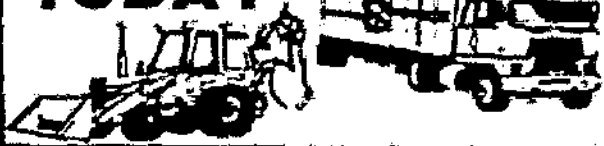

Now that the heart of the major-league baseball season is beginning, it's questionable whether some of the season's surprise teams can hold on.

The National League has had some major surprises, particularly in the Western Division.

The San Francisco Giants are leading the division by one game, an incredible feat when one considers the Giants lost 100 games last season.

San Francisco is the second-best hitting team in the league and its pitching also has improved.

However, the Houston Astros are right behind (trailing by one game) and probably have a better overall pitching staff.

San Diego also is a strong contender in this well-balanced division. The Padres have a good combination of experience, pitching and hitting.

Look for the Padres to edge the Giants and Astros by about three games. San Francisco just doesn't have enough experience and it has some injured players.

But don't count out the defending World Champion Kansas City Royals.

Kansas City has not been hitting well, but its pitching is ranked third in the league. If the Royals' bats start connecting, look for Kan-

The shoot rounds will start at 6 p.m. They will last until the second week of August.

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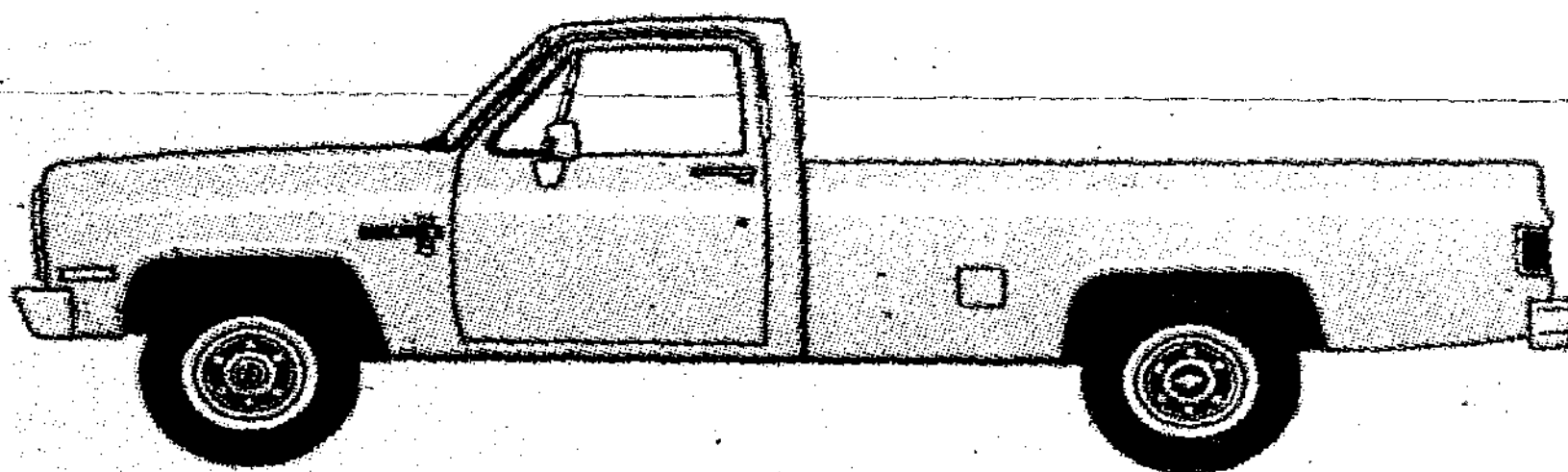
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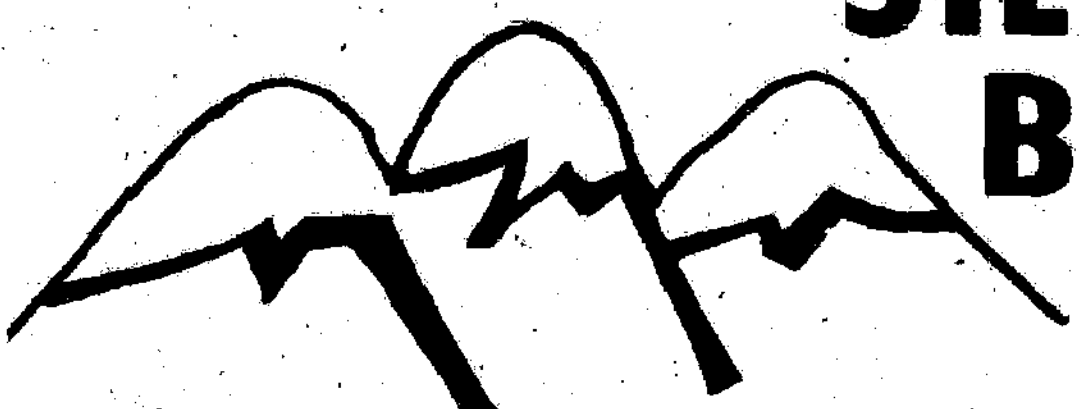

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# Murder victims are remembered fondly by families

Their names were Cotton and Judy McKnight.

Because of the awful circumstances surrounding their untimely deaths, they're remembered by many these days as "slain ranchers, McKnight murder victims" and other nameless terms.

But young Brett Bussey, Judy McKnight's nephew still remembers good times at the ranch with "Aunt Judy and Uncle Cotton."

Brett, the son of Judy's sister Terri Bussey, laughed when he talked of the annual "chicken in the rain" party the McKnights threw at their ranch every July.

"I guess it rained the first time, and that's how the party got its name," said Terri Bussey. The get-together was remembered by Terri and Brett as a full day of fun and

games with "lots and lots of food and lots of people."

"I always liked to be on Aunt Judy's team," remarked Brett.

That was to be expected, explained Brett's mom and his grandmother, Mrs. Rickley. They said Brett and his Aunt Judy were always special pals.

Mrs. Rickley, Judy McKnight's mother, and the two Busseys spent the morning recently remembering their lost daughter, sister and aunt.

They said time has made it a little easier to talk about Judy. But tears still mix with the smiles and laughter of shared memories.

Born February 17, 1947, Judy was the fifth of 12 children—six boys and six girls. Judy was born in Colorado, but the family made several moves during her childhood, and Mrs. Rickley said they were settled in California by the time the young woman graduated from high school.

In a family of individuals, Mrs. Rickley said Judy was her friendliest, most outgoing child.

"She always had lots of friends," remembered Terri, the big sister who was the third of the 12 children.

"She used to have to get up an hour early to get ready for school," recalled her mom, looking at picture after picture of her attractive, well-groomed daughter.

She loved school so much that she had mixed emotions upon graduating from Tamales High School in California, said Mrs. Rickley.

Judy enjoyed the small school, and was active in chorus and drama.

"Just this year they're having their reunion," Mrs. Rickley said sadly.

After graduation Judy wasn't sure what she wanted to do, so she started, but didn't finish, beauty school and a California junior college, before working in a convalescent home for a time.

By the time she decided to join Terri and her family in New Mexico, Judy had an eight-year-old, Randy.

"She raised Randy by herself—she was all he had," said Mrs. Rickley, adding that Cotton was really the only father the boy had ever known.

Pictures of Cotton and Judy's wedding show Randy as a slender, blond youngster standing proudly by his mother. That wedding at the ranch, commemorated with families and friends, came after Judy worked in Roswell for several years.

The smiling faces at that wedding celebration, included Judy, Randy, Cotton and his young son, Judson. The crowd of people gathered that day were not much different from the many who came and went in the years that followed.

The McKnight house became a gathering place, recalled Terri.

"Judy never knew how many would be there for dinner," remembered her mother.

She also remembered her daughter working sheep right along with Cotton.

Terri said Judy sometimes worked the ranch alone with the hired hands, and sent Cotton to town because he would get so nervous

and upset about things at the ranch. "He carried a heavy load, trying to make that ranch work," said Mrs. Rickley with a small shake of the head.

Besides all the people who came and went, the McKnight house became a haven for all kinds of animals, said Terri with a laugh.

"Cotton used to laugh at her (Judy) because she always had her lambs and baby animals in the house," said Terri. She said Judy even raised a Barbary sheep on the bottle. That sheep, Reuben, now lives at the Roswell zoo, noted Terri.

Mrs. Rickley said that love of animals was always one of Judy's characteristics.

"We always had whatever a kid could bring home around our house," she said.

She said her house was always full of "12 kids and everybody's friend."

Terri, Judy and a brother all settled in New Mexico, and the two girls remained especially close. Terri's daughter, Jamie, and Judy's son are the same age, and Terri said they were raised almost

like sister and brother.

Members of the two families always tried to spend birthdays together, and Terri remembered the last time she was with her sister was when Judy spent Jamie's birthday with the Bussey family in Capitan.

As always, they laughed and talked and had a good time together, recalled Terri.

And that's the way she remembers Judy—laughing, joking and having a good time with people she loved.

Her photo album bears witness to the happy occasions at the ranch and other places Judy, Cotton and their friends and family frequented.

But in the back of that book, tucked in first one way and then another, are newspaper clippings, letters and legal documents that tell another story—the story of a pair of young ranchers found slain in their Picacho ranch house.

## Cotton McKnight

It's not every New Mexico kid that has an elephant for a pet, but the young McKnights—Cotton and Pancho—once did.

Pancho McKnight laughed a lot remembering the "outstanding" childhood he shared with a younger brother, Cotton.

Pancho, 18 months and 11 days older than his brother Cotton, remembered growing up on the family's ranch in the Hondo Valley. He never expected to be a suspect in his only brother's murder.

"But, I was," said Pancho, who doesn't know if he is still a suspect in the November 1984 double murder of his brother, Cotton, and Cotton's wife, Judy.

Pancho recently took time to talk about his brother.

"I like to think of Cotton tearing up as fast as I built," said Pancho with a laugh. "We had a dream childhood," he added.

Besides the baby elephant the boys had for a time, Pancho said the two had just about every pet imaginable. He said they did Cub Scouts and all the other things young boys normally do.

"We could whip up on each other, but nobody else could whip up on us," recalled Pancho, remembering that the two could be "monstrous" little boys.

Their brotherly squabbles were more verbal than physical, said Pancho, adding that Cotton outgrew him when he was just 16.

Pancho said both he and Cotton were born in Roswell. They grew up on the family's "lower" Hondo Valley ranch, and attended Hondo Schools and the New Mexico Military Institute.

"Cotton really was a consummate politician," said Pancho. He said his brother was constantly on the go, wanting to be with people all the time.

He said Cotton, who became the rancher of the family white Pancho became an artist, married young, and he and his first wife, Vikki (Baier), had a son, Judson.

Pancho said Cotton and Vikki tried more than once to make a go of their marriage, but were finally divorced, and it wasn't long before his brother met and married Judy.

"Cotton was really a very lonely person—he hated being alone, and didn't stay alone very often," said Pancho.

He said the Judy and Cotton McKnights' relationship had many ups and downs from the time they met until they died together.

"It had been marvellously tempestuously from the day they met," noted Pancho.

The two settled into ranch life, but Pancho said Cotton's main interest in his final years was politics.

Pancho said Cotton served two terms on the Lincoln County Commission, and lost a bid to become the Republican candidate for State Representative just before he was murdered.

But he would have been back on the campaign trail, had he lived long enough.

The two brothers' last conversation was about politics, recalled Pancho. He said Cotton called him on the telephone on election day (1984).

"He called and asked me to vote for Tom Sullivan," said Pancho.

While Cotton, the politician, had a concern for the welfare of the county, he had a sense of humor in his campaign techniques, remembered

Pancho with a small smile.

When campaigning for better roads for Lincoln County, Cotton once remarked "I'm going to fix mine first."

But Pancho finds it hard these days to separate the good memories of his brother, from the horrible way he died and the terrible things that have occurred since.

"I think about it entirely too much," said Pancho thoughtfully. That's why, he said, he has come

forward to speak out in favor of taking the evidence in the murder case before a grand jury.

Pancho wants to see a resolution to the nearly two-year-old case.

"I no longer have the attitude of staying back and keeping my mouth shut and let the wheels of justice grind on," he said recently after submitting the petition asking District Judge Richard A. Parsons to appoint a grand jury in the case.

"My name has been banded

about more than once as a suspect," added McKnight. He said he took and passed a polygraph test as well as voluntarily submitting a whole list of other samples for testing.

"I did everything they asked," said McKnight, adding that now he wants some action from the District Attorney, the Attorney General and Judge Parsons.

Although Parsons failed to convene a grand jury as petitioned by

McKnight and Terri Bussey, sister of Judy McKnight, the State Supreme Court recently gave him 60 days to act on the petition.

Parsons has not been available to The News for a comment. A spokesman at his office last Tuesday said he was "too busy" to talk with this reporter.

"He plans to be busy all day," she added.



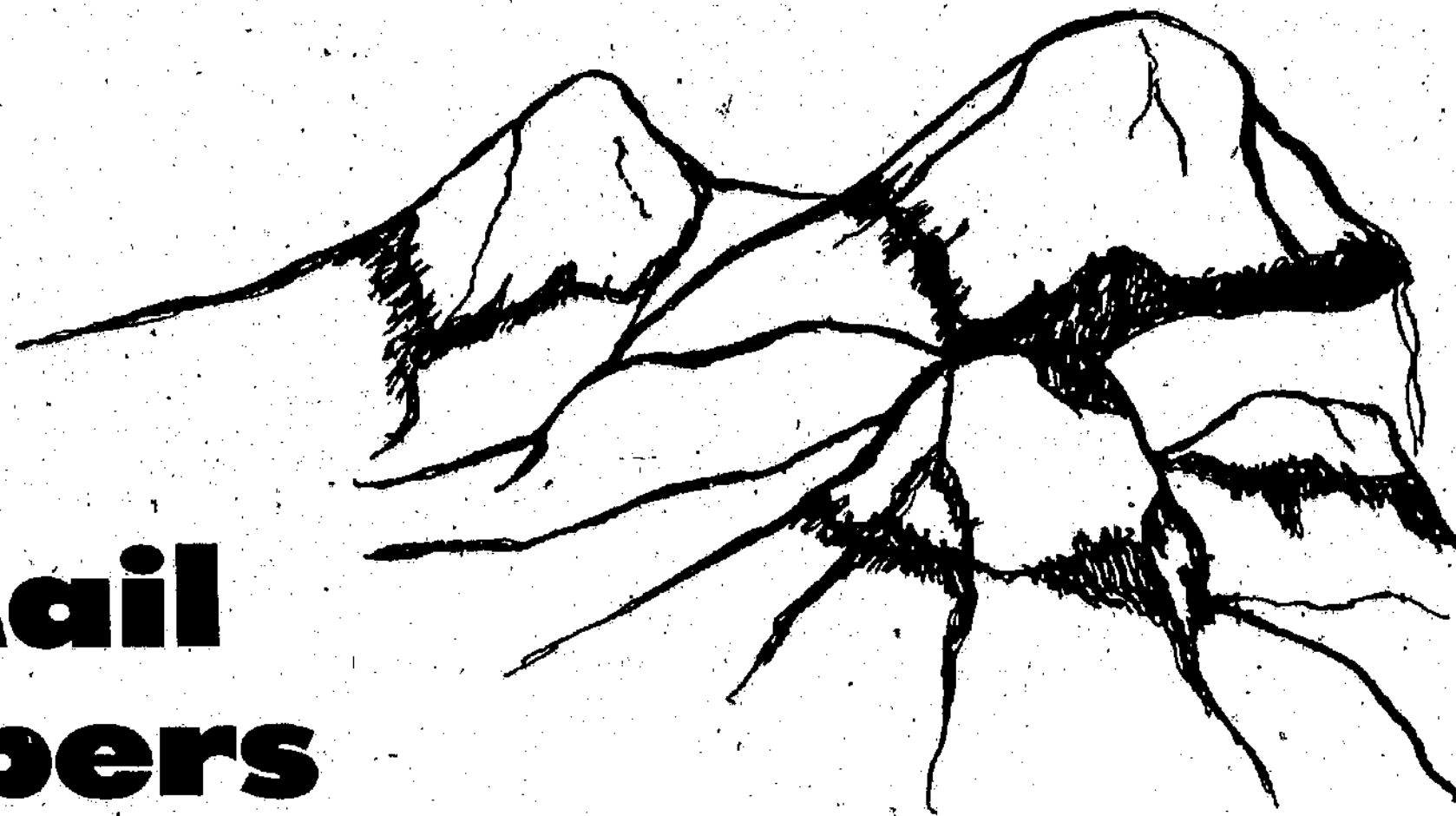
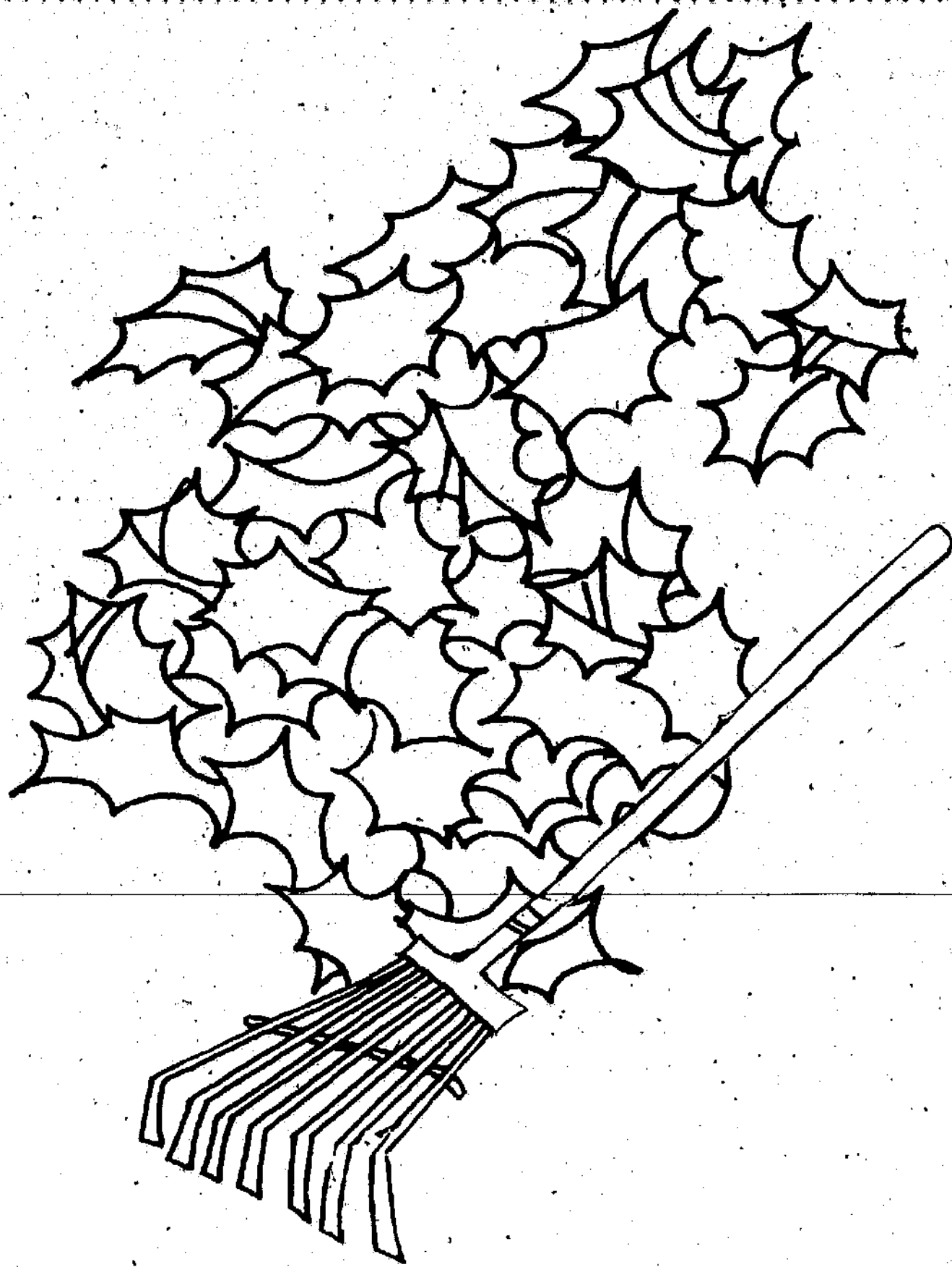
## Bonito volunteers

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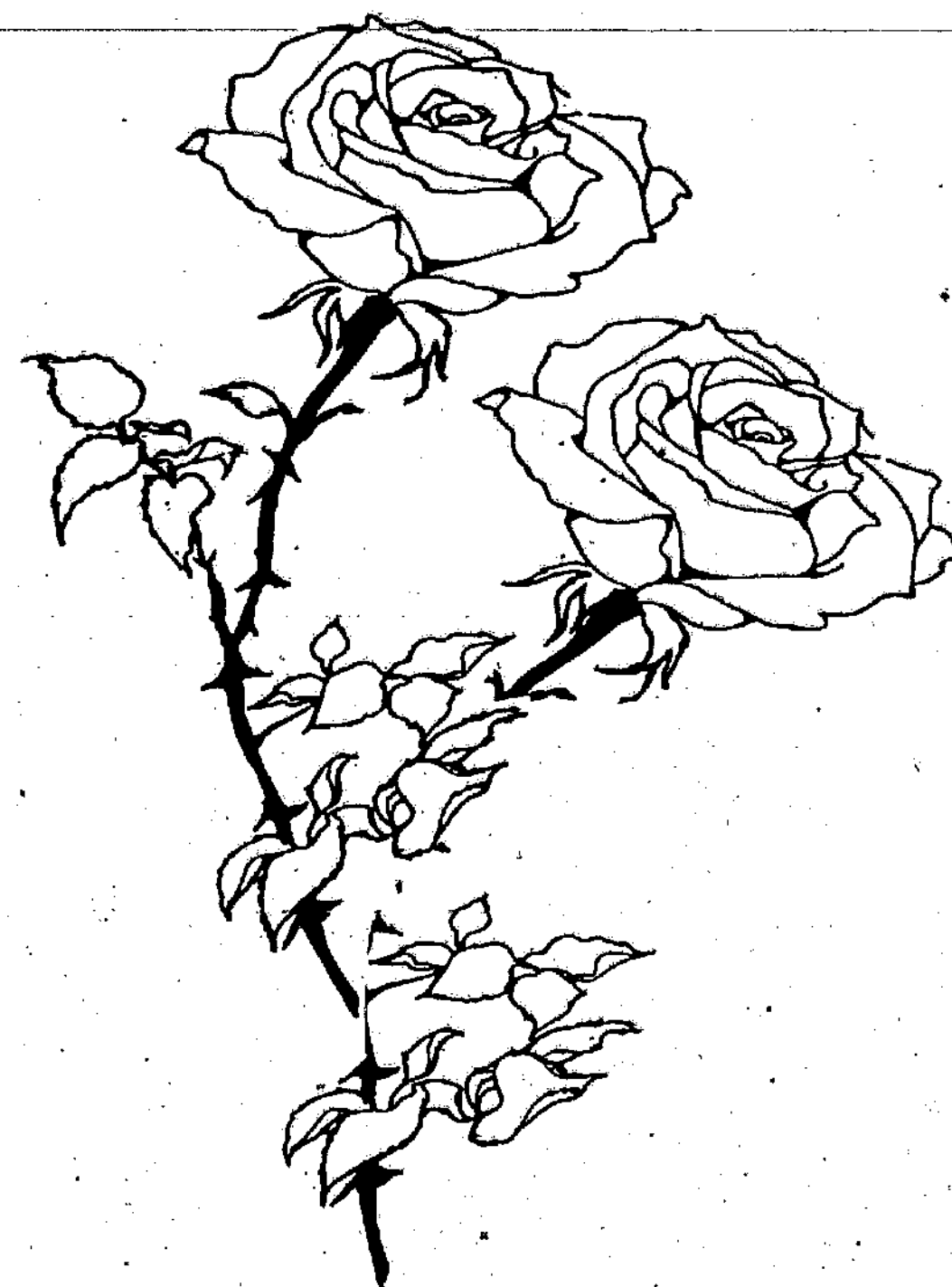
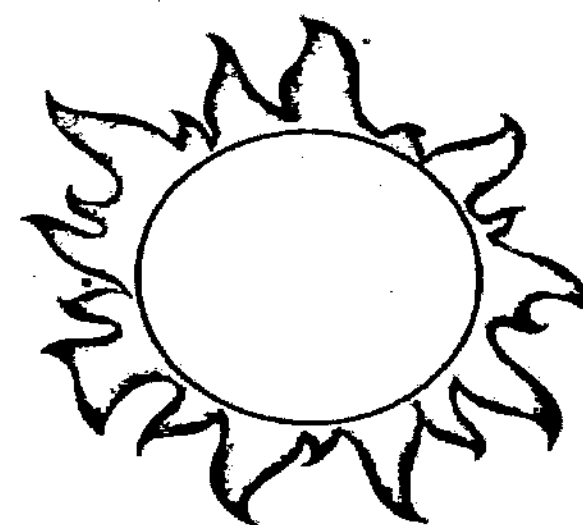

## Preparations Begin For Lincoln Pageant

Word has been received from Diane Shrecengost, this year's director of the show, that practices will begin Thursday, July 17, for the annual Lincoln Days Pageant, "The Last Escape of Billy The Kid," held every year on the first weekend in August.

This will make the three performances fall on August one, two and three, Friday and Saturday. The show begins at eight o'clock. Then the final performance will be Sunday, August three, at three o'clock.

On Sunday, there will be a parade at eleven thirty.

This year's Billy The Kid will be young Ronnie Barone. Ronnie is Kid number seven, the others being: Peter Hurd, John Davis, John Thomas, Tom Taylor, Earl Taylor and Bill Shrecengost, Jr.

The Pageant was established in 1940, as a feature celebrating New Mexico's four-hundredth birthday—going back to Spanish times—or The New Mexico Cuarto Centennial.

Back in 1940 special celebrations were held all over New Mexico. Somehow the Lincoln event caught on with the people and kept on; while the others lasted only that year.

It was originally called "A Day In Old Lincoln" by the originators of the celebration—Louise and Wilbur Franklin Coe.

Wilbur that year was chairman of the Lincoln County Historical Society. His "Day In Old Lincoln" was a day set aside in honor of the pioneers of Lincoln County and the Southwest—a time of meeting of the

old timers, many of whom were at that time still with us, for a day of re-union and fellowship, with the general public, of course, cordially welcomed.

As a feature of this day, Wilbur decided to have a historical pageant—touching upon the high points of the Lincoln County War and featuring its star actor, Billy The Kid.

To this end he employed a veteran Hollywood script writer, Blanding Sloan and his young assistant, Mark Hamilton, to write a script. The script, which has been changed and added to through the years, was taken mostly from a book that came in 1924 by Walter Noble Burns entitled "The Saga of Billy The Kid." Burns for his book interviewed at length one of the Kid's good friends and companions, Benjamin Franklin Coe, known to his friends as Frank Coe.

The "Day In Old Lincoln" was discontinued during World War II and was revived in 1949.

The pageant became so popular that it was held for two nights every year, and then finally two nights and one afternoon. People came from all over the United States and even the world to see the show.

It is in a class by itself being the only western pageant that takes place on the very spot where the true action happened.

The pageant grounds is in the very shadow of the old court house from which the Kid made his escape in 1881 "with the odds against him one million to one."

In addition to this, the town of Lincoln is little changed from what it was a hundred years ago.

The play is put on by local folks, many of them direct descendants of the pioneers who were in the real action which the play depicts.

Through carefully remembering the words of the pioneers who figured in the early dramatic episodes, a very accurate picture is presented of the early struggle, which is now world famous, outlining in particular the turning points in the life of Billy The Kid.

Come over the first weekend in August and help us turn the clock back one hundred years.

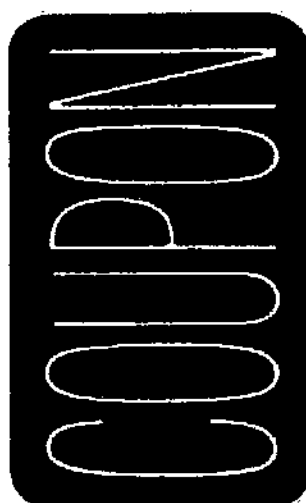

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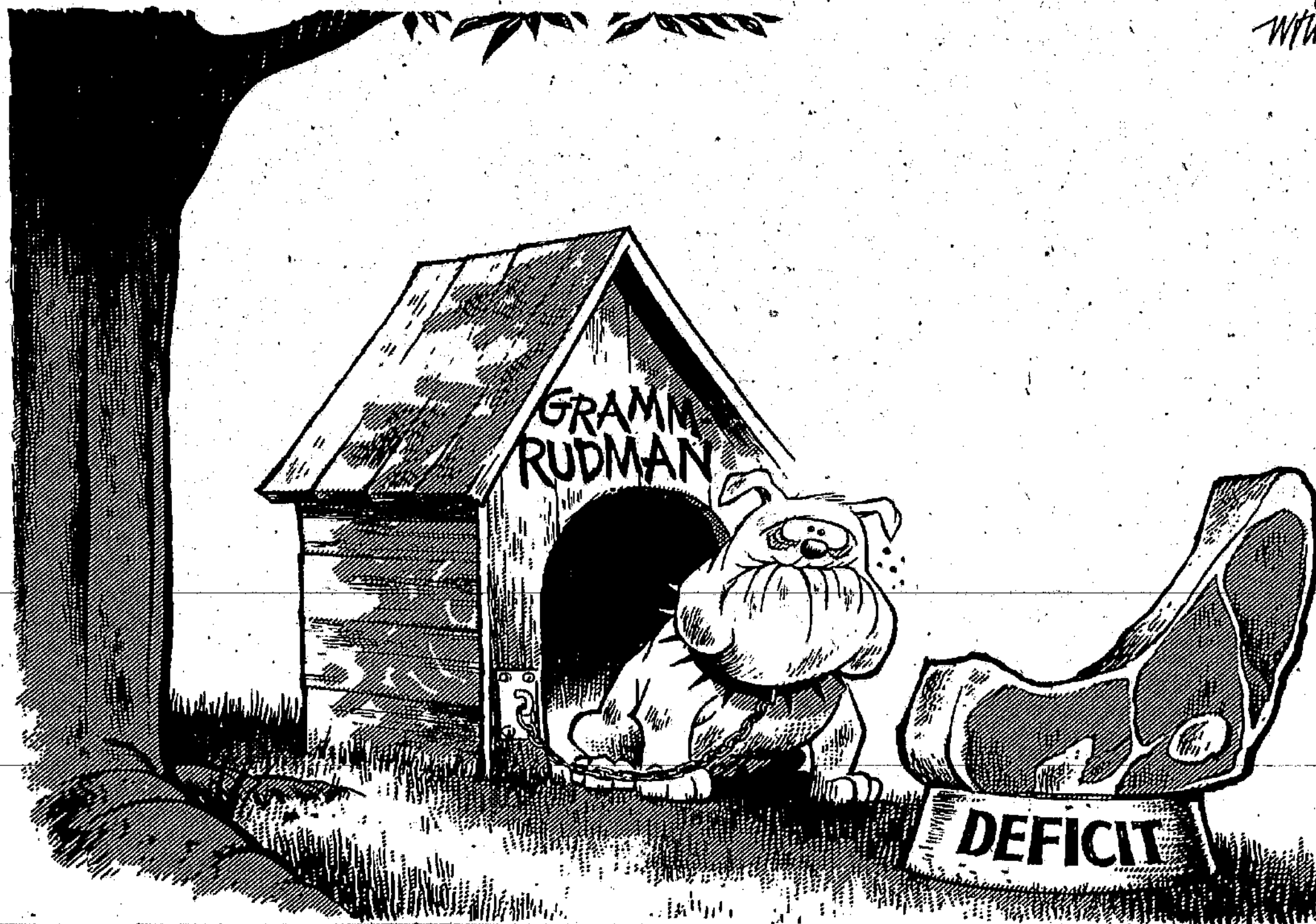

## Inside the Capitol

**SANTA FE**— Students of New Mexico voting patterns find themselves more than ordinarily perplexed as they study the numbers generated by this year's primary elections.

It's hard to remember when we last had a race in which a man with a name like Brant Corbally Calkin badly outdistanced a man with a name like Alex Armijo in the counties that make up the Democratic North. Even more difficult to figure is how a woman named Rebecca Vigil could run way out ahead of a woman named Melessia Helberg in Chaves, Curry, Eddy and Bernalillo counties.

Maybe our decades-old voting habits are in process of changing. Such a change may even be for the better. But for those who make a full- or part-time profession of politics, predicting the way that change is going to go is what's tough.

Jack Emmons, who is the Republican candidate for State Auditor this year, has made one statewide race, in which he did well, though he wasn't the final victor.

Still, most of us wouldn't say his name is exactly a household word in our northern counties.

How then does one account for the fact that Emmons, in the 15 counties that make up the third Congressional district, ran better than David Cargo, whose name is a household word, in every county, in both number of votes cast and in percentage of votes cast?

Some readers scoffed when this correspondent once said Cargo, who is more successful at cozening members of the news media into listening to his stories than he is at getting voters to support to his cause, would find support for himself weakest among Republicans in the district in which he is running. The results of that June 3 primary suggest we may have been right on target with that observation.

Cargo is admittedly well-known. What matters when the voters get into the booth, however, is how much they like and respect you.

Is there a more-than-ordinary amount of disarray inside the Ray Powell camp?

That question gets asked about the way the Democratic campaign for governor is being run because rumblings heard here suggest there is a move afoot to axe Chris Brown, the professional campaign advisor, whose credentials for producing winners are better than most who are drawn to his particular vocation. Unlike many of such folks, Brown even knows New Mexico, which happens also to be his home, as it is of almost no others of his profession on the Democratic side of the ledger.

There are other disturbing signals.

No well-run campaign, for instance, allows itself to get into a "me-too" position. Yet when the media get a release saying Powell and other Democrats plan to tour the state in a caravan sometime in late August, and that release arrives when it does, almost certainly because the Republicans have just started caravanning, it's tough to avoid the conclusion that somebody thought or said, "Whatever they do, we gotta do also."

Smart campaigners never even suggest they know or care what the other side is up to. If there's ever been a place for that old adage to "plan your work and work your plan" without letting the other guy affect you, it's in politics. Once you become the tagalong in political campaigning, you increase by a sizeable degree the likelihood you'll also be the tagalong on election day.

Mike Rannels knows he has to arrange for some daylight between himself and Governor Toney Anaya if he, Rannels, is going to make a healthy showing against Joe Skeen in that race for Congress in the second district.

You know Rannels has to be scratching his head to find a way to do that.

That's why some of us find it amusing that when the Lieutenant Governor had a chance to fill in for Anaya during an absence of several days in a row recently, he reportedly considered making a public announcement that, for as long as the Governor was outside the confines of New Mexico, Rannels was officially designating this a "non-sanctuary" state.

Anaya wouldn't have been amused.

## Reporter's Round

History is something that is tangible through the architecture of past times.

When someone looks at an old building, they can imagine things that happened 100 or 200 years ago. And there's plenty of historical architecture in Lincoln County.

This area was witness to one of the great "wild west" battles in United States history, the Lincoln County War, which occurred in the late 1870s.

The courthouse from which William Bonney ("Billy the Kid") escaped in 1881 is still standing in Lincoln.

There's plenty of other architecture in Lincoln that has its origin during the time of the Lincoln County War and even before.

But there's a lot of other 19th-century architecture existing in Lincoln County outside of Lincoln.

A number of ranches in the area date back to the mid-1850s and possibly even earlier. Some of them are made of adobe, which gives them an insulation advantage for cold and hot weather.

There also was an abundance of mud which made adobe building sensible.

Some county churches date back a 100 years and more.

And in Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs, a number of buildings are still standing which date back to the 1800s.

The Old Mill Curios, located on Sudderth Drive, is owned and operated by Carmon Phillips. It's probably the most famous landmark in Ruidoso.

It probably dates back 125 to 130 years and was well-known to travelers in pioneer days.

Another even older mill also existed in Ruidoso. It only lasted about a year before it was washed away near the Rio Ruidoso.

The White Mountain Inn in Ruidoso Downs is another famous landmark. It could be as old as the Old Mill Curios.

Ruidoso's only Victorian home is located on a road near Innsbrook Village. It was moved from Roswell in 1976 by Barry and Lindsay Rusler.

The home was originally built in the late 1880s or early 1890s by one of the pioneer families of Roswell.

Victorian homes add charm and a unique form of architecture to the Ruidoso area.

There's also plenty of historical value in the Upper Canyon, if not quite so old.

Three cabins up near the Mesalero Reservation line date back to 1913-1914. They are almost certainly the oldest remaining cabins in the Ruidoso area.

Lincoln County Historical Society President Linda Sanchez rates the county's historical value highly.

"I think we have a lot of variety of history," she said. "I would say we have one of the most historical counties in the state."

"We also have an ethnic history with Indian, Hispanic and Anglo backgrounds."

So besides living in a beautiful and exciting area, Lincoln County residents have plenty of physical examples of a colorful past.

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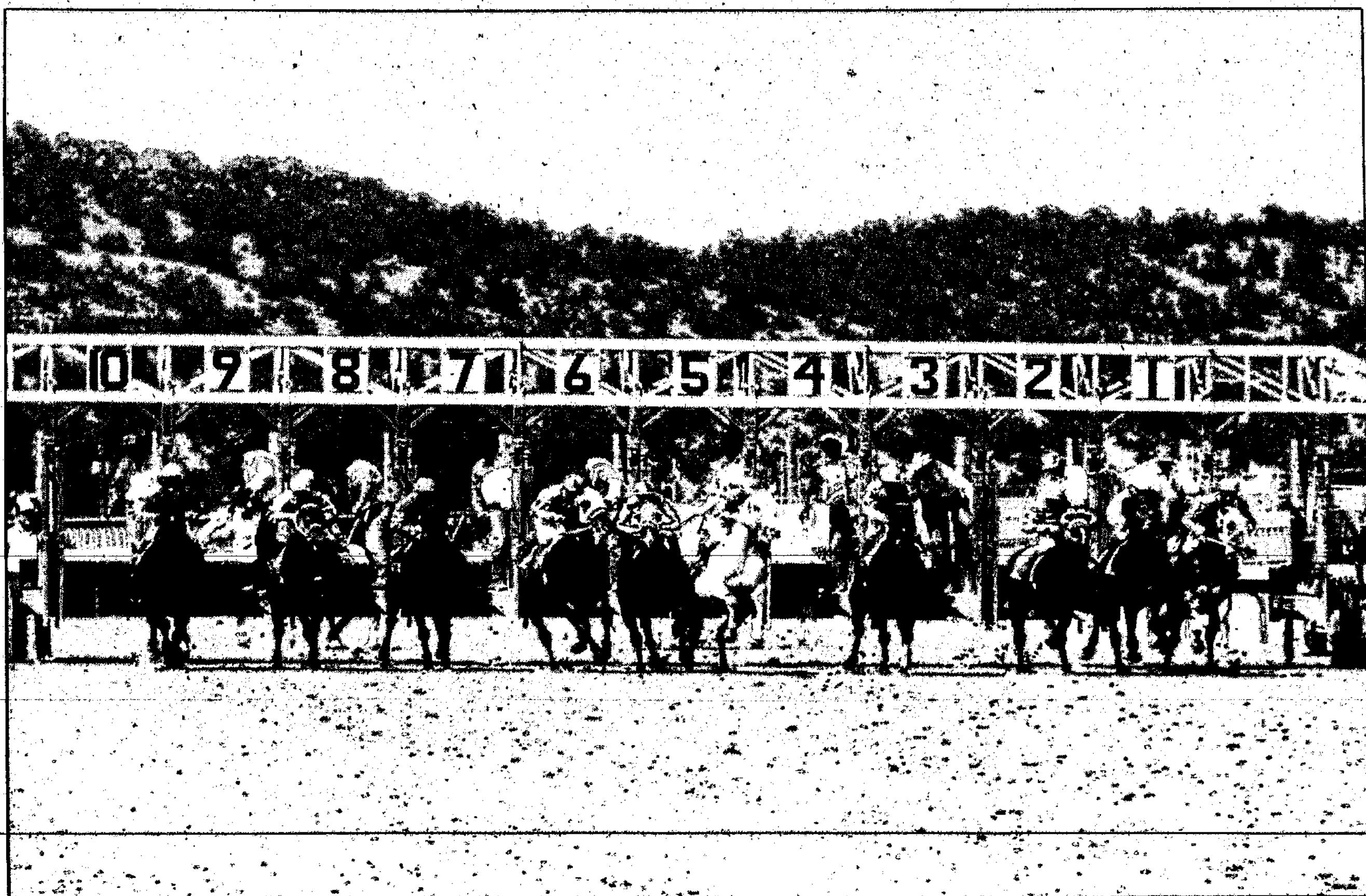

## Handle Hotline

The current handle at Ruidoso Downs, after 35 race days and 426 races, is \$14,279,217. The current daily wagering average is \$407,978 with current wagering per race at \$33,519. At the same time last year, after 37 race days and 449 races, the total handle was \$15,908,030. The wagering average at this time last year was \$429,947 with average per race wagering at this point last year \$35,430. The daily wagering average is down 5.11 percent and the wagering per race is down 5.39 percent when compared to last year at this time. Average attendance at the track is down 2.68 percent below that of last year.

## Track Talk

It took Keep The Change just one race to provide a big payoff for his new owners. The 6-year-old horse was purchased for \$8,000 in the Stars-N-Stripes Sale at Ruidoso Downs last week and on Sunday (July 13) repaid his new owners (Bob Haynesworth of El Paso and Edwin Mayer of San Angelo, Texas, and J. Phillip Mote of Ruidoso) by winning the \$12,475 Flying Charm Handicap. His winning purse was \$7,485.

"This was one great surprise. I had no idea this horse had that kind of speed," said trainer Fred Danley in the winner's circle after Keep The Change ran the 870 yards in 44.26 seconds to set a new track record for the distance.

"I knew he was a good runner in allowance races, so I felt he was worth \$8,000 when he was purchased. Now he's paid for himself in one race," Danley said.

Trainer Jimmy Claridge and jockey Danny Sorenson were a hot team on Saturday (July 12). Sorenson rode all four of Claridge's entries for the day and they all went to the winner's circle, two broke the record for 7 1/2 furlongs and the effort was capped by taking first in the Jockey Club Handicap.

Curtwain was the first to break the 7 1/2-furlong mark covering the distance in 1:32.1 Two races later, Forever A Ruler won the Jockey Club Handicap over the same distance in 1:31.1 seconds.

"Everything seemed to come together for me and Danny today," said Claridge in the winner's circle following the Handicap. "All of the races went well for us." Sorenson came back on Sunday to win another race on a Claridge-trained horse.

Trainer Jerry Lazenby's second to Storms Eye with Delightful Mary was good enough for the ninth slot in the Rainbow field. Terry Layton rode the Oh Jet Van filly. Oh My, Gee Whiz rounded out the qualifiers finishing third to Solid Policy with Larry Payne up for trainer Arnold Simmons Jr.

Here's the complete qualifying field for the Rainbow Futurity with their respective running times: Some Power Play, 20.080; Lil Bit Shinee, 20.130; Make An Effort, 20.170; Solid Policy, 20.280; Million Dollar Bug, 20.330; Vital Dash, 20.335; Storms Eye, 20.350; Oh My Gee Whiz, 20.380; Delightful Mary, 20.415; and Mr Macho Jet, 20.415.

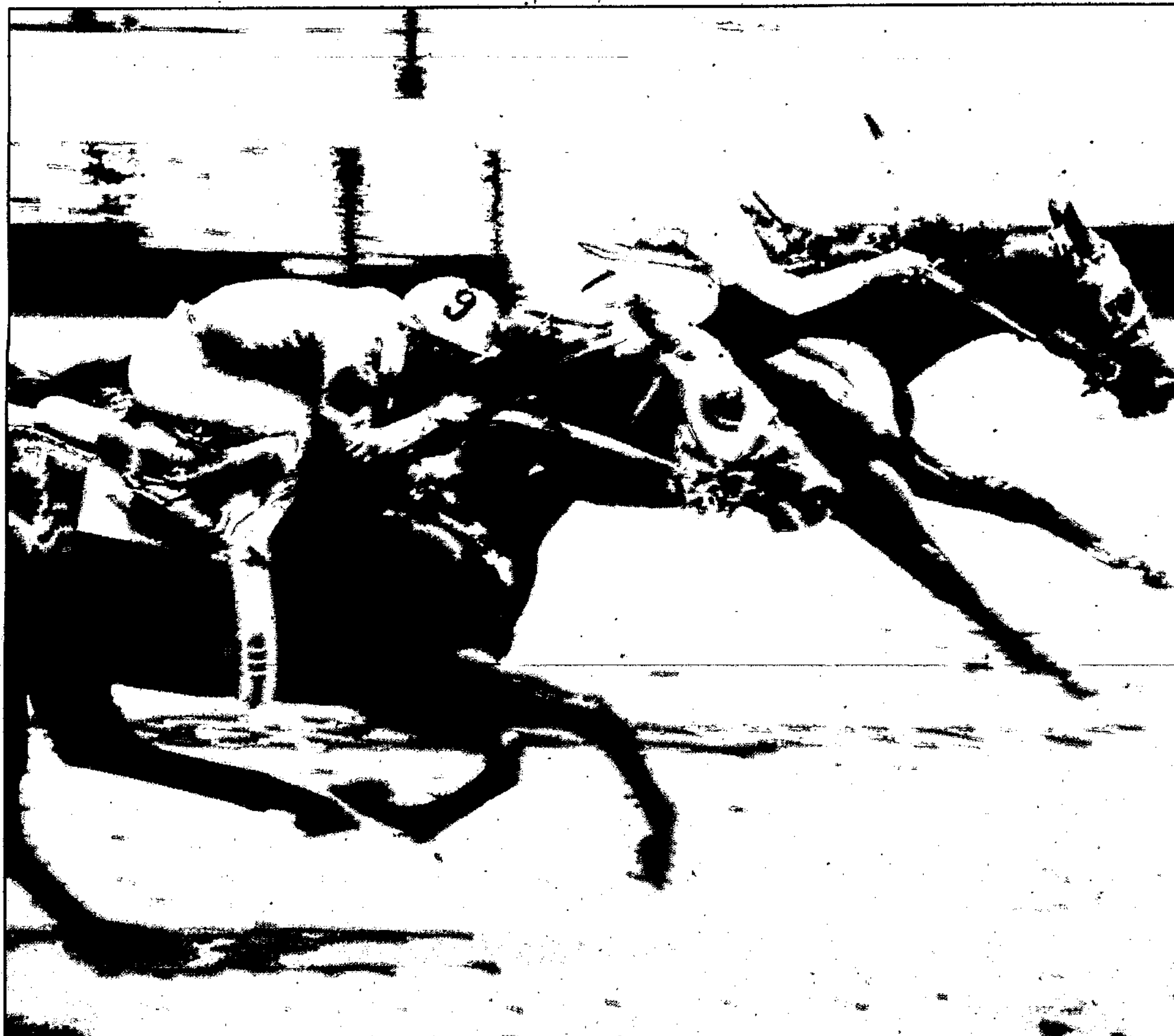

Fans will see this shining beauty on Sunday, July 20, when the Rainbow Futurity is finally run.

Some Power Play is one of five horses qualified to the Rainbow Futurity by Oklahoma trainer Jack Brooks. He's owned by Melvin Hatley of Norman, Oklahoma. Conditioner Hugh Tucker saddled Lil Bit Shinee for Shelly and Lodie Stapleton of Bellaire, Texas. The early morning line on Some Power

Play will probably be 3-1 and Lil Bit Shinee will probably be lined up at 7-2. Vital Dash will be another favorite with a 4-1 morning line. But track insiders are hailing Million Dollar Bug who will wake up to about 8-1 odds and Storms Eye, an ornery but unstoppable colt, who will tempt handicappers with

around 15-1 odds. The tragic death of 1985 Rainbow Futurity winner Brigand Silk, who is now beautifully immortalized by many Ruidoso artists, will never diminish the fact that the Ruidoso legend still holds the fastest time ever (19.37) in a Rainbow Futurity.

## Racing world is stunned as Keep The Change runs one of fastest 870's ever recorded

A little more than a week after the speedy thoroughbred Keep The Change sold for \$8,000 in the Walter Merrick Near Dispersal Sale at Ruidoso Downs, the horse's new owners nearly recovered their investment as he upset one of the Southwest's best sprint specialists in the \$12,475 Flying Charm Handicap on July 13 at the mountain track.

"This is one great surprise," trainer Fred Danley remarked in the winner's circle of the stake. "I knew he could run the distance, but I had no idea he had this kind of speed."

Keep The Change was dismissed at nearly 25-1 odds after drawing the disadvantageous No. 9 post position for the 870-yard Flying Charm Handicap. Multiple stakes winner Special Hank was the over-

whelming 4-5 choice to collect the winner's check after accounting for the Master Salls and Barlaris Handicaps earlier in the season.

Jockey Joe Martinez got Keep The Change out of the gates incredibly fast, maneuvering the six-year-old to the rail by the time the 10-horse field rounded the turn. Salustio Burgos settled Special Hank on the rail about two lengths behind the leader and was forced to take the favorite wide to make his bid in the final 200 yards.

Keep The Change held his lead as Special Hank closed strongly in the final going, with 27-1 outsider Financial Aid a few strides back.

Martinez drove to a one-length victory in the fastest 870-yard clocking ever recorded at Ruidoso Downs—44.26 seconds. Special Hank was two lengths the best of

Financial Aid for second-place money.

Keep The Change is now the property of a partnership comprised of El Pasoan Robert Haynesworth, San Angelo, Texas, native Edwin Mayer Jr. and Phillip Mote of Ruidoso. They collected \$7,485 for Keep The Change's win. It was his first trip to the winner's circle in two starts this year. The horse only earned \$6,128 in seven appearances last year, winning two of those races.

Lowell Hankins of Rocksprings, Texas, took home \$2,745 for Special Hank's second. Doyal Roberts Sr. is the trainer. Financial Aid, ridden by Darrell Blevins for conditioner G.R. Howell, earned \$1,248 for third. He carries the colors of James Pirtle of Longview, Texas.

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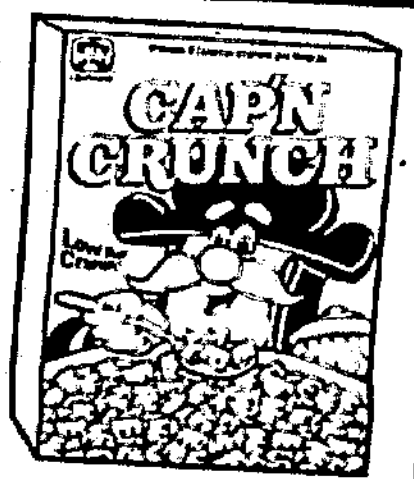
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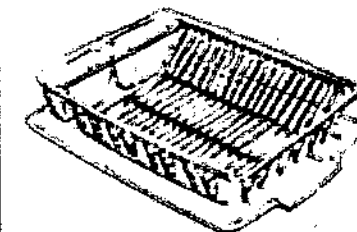
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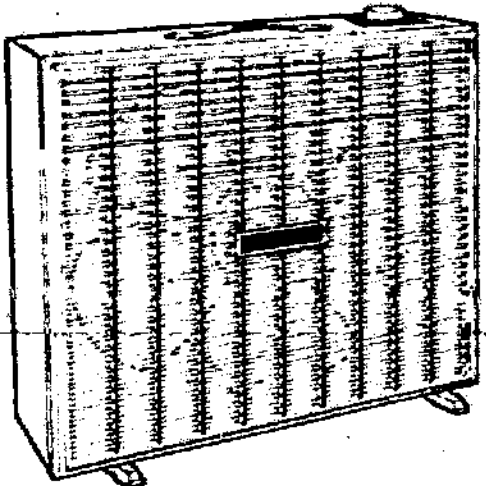
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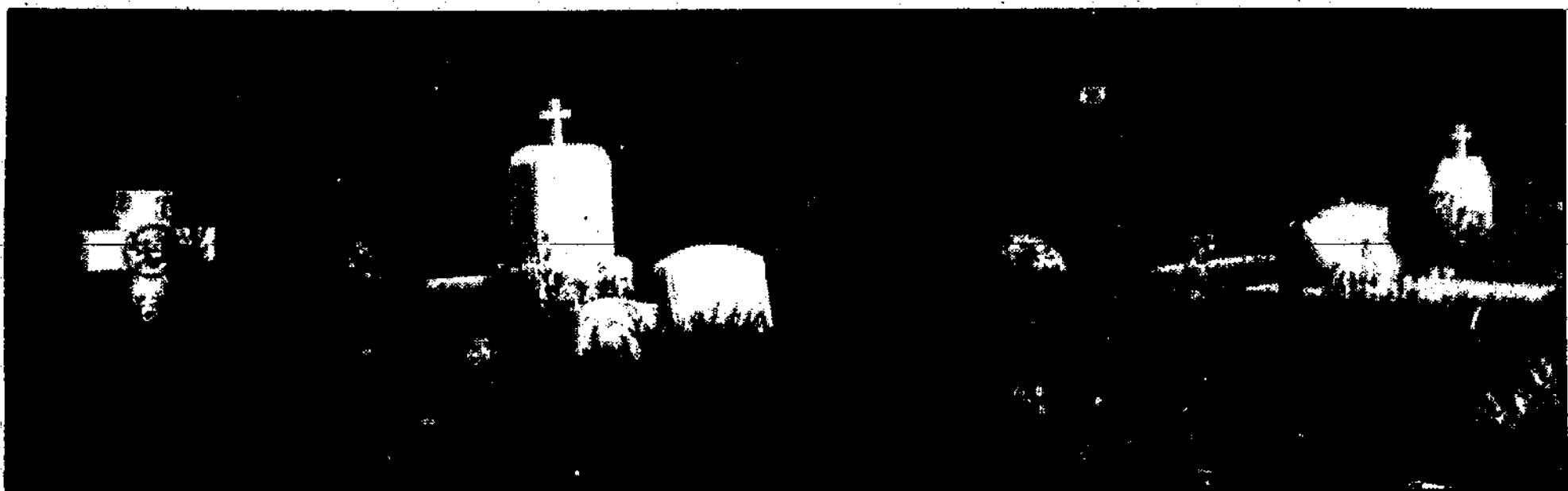
## JULY 16-22, 1986

The old San Patricio Catholic Church now stands almost defiantly in a field surrounded by various farms and ranches.

A wooden steeple sits atop the church. The building itself is adobe and is painted white.

Ground squirrels race for food among the rocks above the church near Highway 70. A slight wind whistles as a visitor walks near the church grounds.

A graveyard filled with tombstones dating back almost 100 years catches the visitor's eye.

The old church has seen more

than a century of activity in Lincoln County. Tranquilino Montoya started construction on it in 1884 and the building was finished in 1885.

Father Senbrano was the priest who organized the building of the church. The church was in constant use until 1967, when the present St. Jude's Church in San Patricio was completed.

Now it is used mainly on two occasions each year.

A Feast Mass is celebrated at the church every March 17. There also is a pilgrimage from St. Jude's to San Patricio the last Saturday in October as part of the St. Jude's Festival.

"The building is still in pretty good shape inside," said Father David Bergs, priest of St. Eleanor's of Ruidoso (Bergs also does ser-

vices at St. Jude's). "There is a group called the San Patricio Restoration Committee that is trying to restore the church to the way it originally looked."

San Patricio probably ranks among the oldest churches in Lincoln County, particularly along the Highway 70 route.

A number of San Patricio residents have attended services there in the past.

"The church looks a lot like it did about 30 to 40 years ago," said Juan Montoya, who used to attend the old church.

The church is a big part of Lincoln County history. And if the restoration job is done, it will give people a glimpse back at the way life was in the 19th century.

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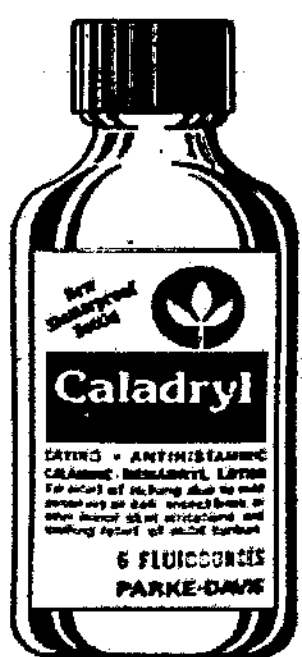
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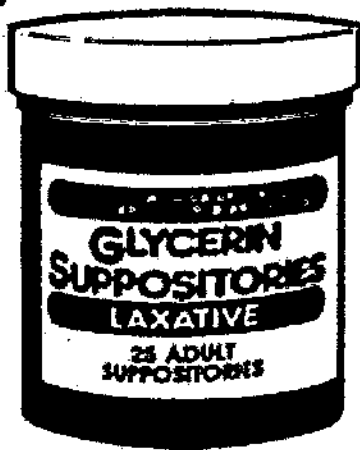

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# Intriguing set of events returns Billy The Kid's spurs to Lincoln

It's almost miraculous that a mere set of coincidences brought Billy The Kid's spurs back to Lincoln in about 1959.

The 110-year-old spurs, which have been authenticated by experts at the New Mexico State Monuments offices in Santa Fe, have been with Lee Hovey Booky's family since 1930.

The well preserved spurs, which are still functional, came into the limelight recently when Santa Fe psychic, Bryon Summers, came to Lincoln to try and help archaeologists pinpoint the area where the McSween family home once stood.

This Saturday, experts from Human Systems Research in Tularosa will begin to look for artifacts which are believed to be buried under the site of the McSween family home.

The McSween home was set on fire as one of the rival factions in the Lincoln County War tried to bring an end to a raging gun battle that had centered around the McSween home.

Some members of the group that had barricaded themselves inside the McSween home managed to escape both the fire and the bullets of their rivals.

One person who escaped through the rear entrance of the makeshift stockade was Billy The Kid.

While psychic Summers concentrated on the vibrations of those turbulent days in Lincoln, someone handed him Billy The Kid's spurs for his psychic evaluation.

Summers said he had some sense of Billy The Kid's personality after grasping the spurs.

But Summers probably never knew the sequence of events that brought those well-made, silver inlaid spurs to his hands.

Before Billy The Kid made his famous escape from the Lincoln County courthouse in 1881, he had been dragged from a prison in Santa Fe to the Mesilla Valley Jail for many reasons, not the least of which was territorial officials feared he would escape from the Santa Fe prison.

When Mesilla Deputy Sheriff Billy Hall saw the young outlaw wearing fancy spurs with sharp rowels, he decided he better confiscate the spurs, according to some historical accounts.

When Hall retired from the Mesilla Valley Jail, he went to work as a caretaker for the Victorio Chief Mine in Silver City, and the spurs went with him, according to Booky.

In about 1910, while riding by the mine, Ralph Hovey, Booky's father, met Hall.

Hovey was working on a ranch near Silver City for a man named Charlie Boone, who was a very good friend of Hall's, according to Booky.

Hall gave Boone the spurs just before he died, Booky said.

Boone let Hovey use the spurs from time to time.

After 1915, Hovey moved to Kansas City, Kansas, to start a family. He became the train director for the Terminal Railway System in Kansas City, Kansas, where Booky was raised.

Because Boone had no family members to will the spurs to, in about 1930, he mailed the spurs to Hovey in Kansas City.

Booky said she was about eight years old when she saw her father take the spurs from a well-wrapped package.

She took a liking to them and her father let her wear them while she learned to ride a horse.

When she got older, she noticed she was wearing the inscription on the inside of the spurs down, and also began to realize the worth of

the spurs. She said she rarely wore the spurs after the 1940s.

Because he liked the beauty of the area, Booky's father retired in Hondo in 1953, and moved to Lincoln, the place where Billy The Kid became famous, in 1959. The spurs were home!

When Hovey died in 1972, he left the spurs to his daughter, who had married Hondo school teacher Albert Booky in 1953.

The spurs were housed in the old

Lincoln County Courthouse Museum from 1965 until 1975, when a series of thefts prompted the state to remove many of the items from the old museum site.

Longtime New Mexico State Monuments receptionist in Lincoln, Mickey Thomas, who still works for the state at the Tunstall Store, asked the Bookys to take their spurs home in 1975. The spurs have remained in an undisclosed location since then.

According to historical documents and Hall's stories, the spurs were made by Milquiadas Segura of San Elizario, a friend of Billy The Kid, in about 1875. The rowels in the spurs are not the originals, but no other changes have ever been made on the spurs, Booky said.

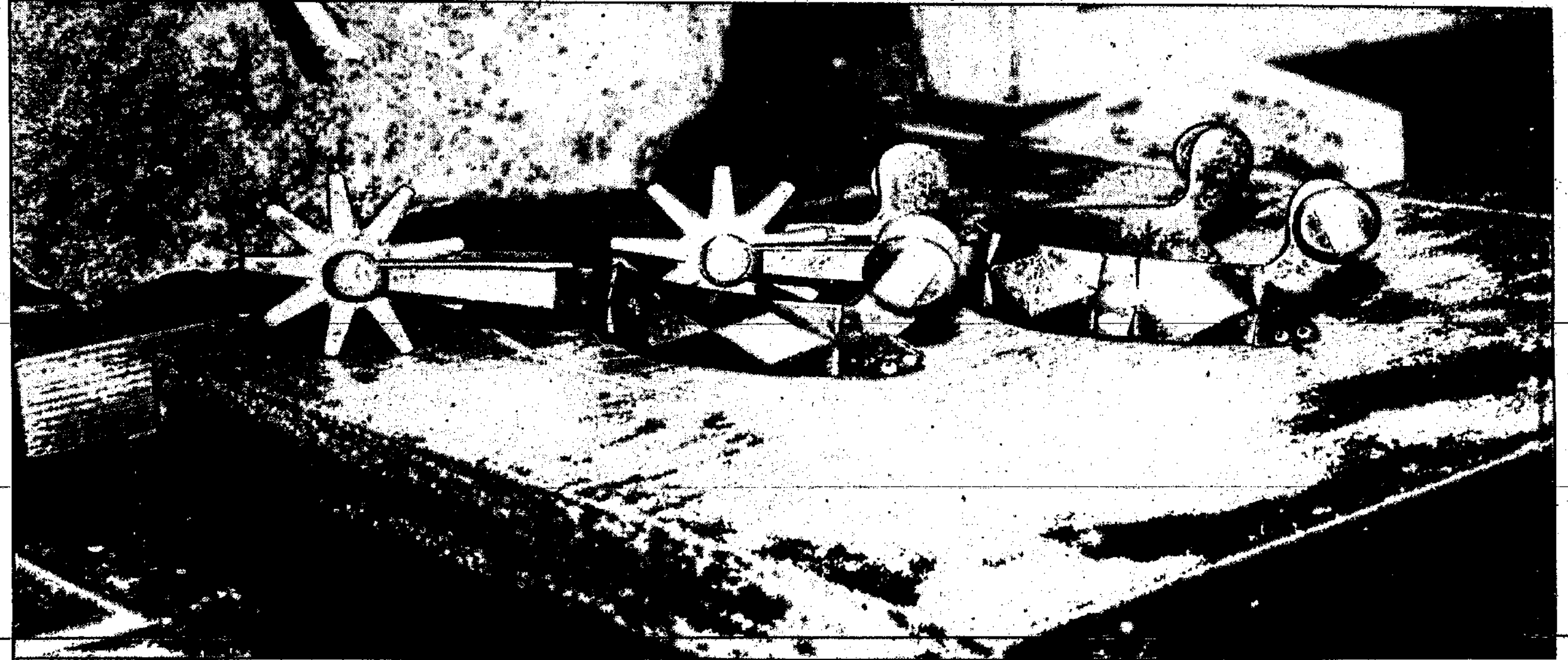
Segura made the spurs to repay "The Kid" for breaking him out of a jail in Mexico, according to Booky. The steel spurs, which are inlaid

with silver designs, are inscribed on the underside.

The inscription, which is still partially visible to the naked eye, says, "Milquiadas Segura," on one line and "To Billy The Kid" on two other lines.

The same inscription is etched on both spurs.

Booky said the spurs will remain in Lincoln until her death, after which they will be passed on to her son.
