Election signup is Tuesday

Aspirants to five Ruidoso municipal offices to be filled in a March 4 election must file for candidacy between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. Tuesday, January 7.

Village manager Jim Hine explained that candidates for any of the five positions must sign a "declaration of candidacy," and present that document on Tuesday at Village Hall.

The village clerk or his deputy will be on hand to notarize each signature, and Hine said candidates should wait until Tuesday to sign their affidavits at Village Hall.

"We would prefer that they do it that way," he added.

Positions that will appear on the March 4 ballot are: village mayor, a four-year term; one village councillor, a two-year term; and three village councillors, four-year terms.

Prospective candidates must stipulate for which office they're declaring, said Hine, adding that each one may run for only one office.

When declaring for office, hopefuls will be required to swear that they are legally eligible to serve and that they will be able to serve. Each candidate must be a registered voter in Lincoln County and must reside within the corporate limits of the Village of Ruidoso.

A candidate must not have been convicted of a felony. Making a

false statement on the declaration is a fourth degree felony, noted Hine.

Before certifying the declarations on January 9, the deputy village clerk will confirm the voter registration and legal residence information by checking county records.

The present Ruidoso Village Council, elected two years ago, is the first six-member governing body to serve in the village. Voters in 1983 petitioned for a special election, set for March 6, 1984, in which the four-member council was enlarged.

Four of the six members of the present council—Ray Dean Carpenter, Jerry Shaw, Bill Karn and Rick Evans—were selected

from among 21 candidates in that March 1984 election. Sherman Atwood and John Underwood also were elected.

Atwood died while in office and Mayor George White appointed Village Councillor Victor Alonso to fill his term. Underwood later resigned to become the village attorney, and White appointed Councillor William A. "Dub" Holt to fill the vacant council spot.

Carpenter and Shaw will remain in office, having drawn four-year terms, while the other four councillors' terms will expire.

Hine said anyone filing a declaration of candidacy who later decides not to run must file an affidavit of withdrawal within two weeks of the January 7 filing.

Downs, Capitan slots are open

Tuesday, January 7, is the day for prospective candidates for municipal offices to file their declarations of candidacy. The position of mayor, municipal judge and two seats on the village board of trustees will be open in both Ruidoso Downs and Capitan.

In Ruidoso Downs, Mayor J.C. Day's term expires this year. Downs trustees whose terms expire are LeVerne Cole and Jake Harris. The office of municipal judge, currently held by Martin Valenzuela,

also is up for election.

In Capitan, Mayor David Cummins will end his term this year. Trustees whose terms expire are Benny Coker and Ann Goodwin. Municipal Judge Jimmy Stewart's term also expires.

All terms of office in the Downs and Capitan are for four years. Declarations of candidacy will be accepted at both village halls from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Tuesday, January 7. Elections will be in March.

Improper chimney maintenance can be cause of a fire

Chimneys are a major cause of fires in the Ruidoso area, according to Ruidoso fire chief Virgil Reynolds.

Reynolds and Jimmy Neeley, village building inspector, in a Friday interview talked of fires and fire safety. They joined with the Consumer Product Safety Commission in urging fireplace users to ex-

ercise care and common sense.

Since many Ruidoso fires are caused by faulty fireplaces and chimneys that have been improperly installed, the two men recommend regular maintenance of fireplaces, chimneys, woodburning stoves and appliances.

Neeley said he and Reynolds regularly inspect new construction, but added that many problems occur in older structures.

Some installation problems listed

by the commission as common causes for chimney fires include installing a chimney too close to wood framing, installing thermal insulation too close to the chimney or improperly passing the stovepipe or chimney through a ceiling or wall.

Neeley recommends following the manufacturer's instructions exactly when installing fire appliances. He said the amount of non-combustible surface required by most woodburning stoves may sound like a lot of floor space, but is very important to home safety.

Proper maintenance is vital to safeguard against structural damage caused by the ignition of creosote, a black tar-like substance

that builds up inside the chimney during normal use. Reynolds said he has seen chimneys that were nearly closed due to the buildup.

He and Neeley suggest either purchasing the proper equipment to clean the chimney regularly or utilizing the services of a chimney-sweep.

Neeley said the buildup is easily visible by looking down the chimney, and can be cleaned with a special brush on a very long handle. Reynolds reminds "do-it-yourself" chimney-sweeps to be sure and close the front of the fireplace to avoid spreading ashes and soot into the house.

One recent fire was apparently

caused by dumping ashes on a deck, said Neeley. He and Reynolds suggest keeping a metal container for the ashes removed from the fireplace.

Reynolds said ashes remain very hot for a very long time, and suggests keeping them in the metal container until they are "dead out."

Rental units are one area of concern for the fire chief. He suggests that lodgers provide metal containers for ash disposal.

Another strong recommendation from Neeley and Reynolds is to install smoke detectors in each sleeping area.

"It will save your life," said Reynolds. Neeley agreed, adding

that many fire victims succumb to smoke inhalation.

The village will provide an inspection service for anyone who suspects a structural problem in a home fireplace, said Neeley. He said such an inspection is required for new installations in mobile homes and recommended for additions or modifications of already installed fireplaces or woodstoves.

The fee for a fireplace inspection is \$15, and Neeley stressed that the service is for fireplaces and stoves—not chimneys.

The commission provides a toll-free number, 1-800-638-CPSC, for information on safety problems with chimneys.



SKI REPORT

Ski Apache Resort: The average packed snow depth is 31 inches on the trails that are open. Snow is being made nightly on the lower mountain trails. Skiing conditions are good to excellent. Surface conditions are machine groomed and it skies just like packed powder, according to manager Roy Parker.

Lifts that are open include chairs 2, 3, 4, 5 and 7. Trails that are open are Capitan, Deep Freeze, Smokey Bear, Snow Park, Lower Moonshine and the novice slopes on chairs 3 and 5.

The weather at report time is overcast. Chains are not required on the road to the ski resort.

Despite a lack of snow during the Christmas season, many Ruidoso merchants reported fairly good holiday business.

Most businesses questioned said December started slowly, but business increased during the two weeks before Christmas and the week between Christmas and New Year's. Ruidoso streets were lined with cars and tourists during the latter part of December.

Budgie Green, owner of The Wild Snail (a Hallmark card and gift shop), said that his holiday business was excellent and at its best during the week before Christmas.

"It seems as though local people didn't get out until then," said Green.

Although his holiday business was good, Green said it was down from last year by about 15 percent. He said he expects 1986 to be better than 1985, since business has "bottomed out."

Jane Deyo of The Aspen Tree, a book and gift shop, said her business was good during the pre- and post-Christmas period. Deyo added that November also had been a good month for her store, with sales topping those of last year for the first time since March.

Clothing shops seemed to fare well during the holidays. Mary Parsons, owner of Mary's Fashions, said her sales are "quite a bit" ahead of last year. She said her business began to increase in June and has not slowed down since then. Both she and Green said they had many customers from Mexico this season.

Two clothing stores that have locations on Sudderth Drive and in the Sierra Mall on Mechem Drive had good holiday business, as reported by their owners. Anita Smith, of Steppin Out shoe store, and Melody Vuicich, of Evelyn's, both reported increased sales this season.

Smith hypothesized that the lack of snow may have kept some people off the ski mountain and in the stores. Green voiced a similar theory, stating that some skiers skied until noon and shopped for the rest of the day.

The lack of snow did keep some people away from Ruidoso and the lodging establishments here. Of those lodgers polled, most reported decreased occupancy.

Nancy Radziewicz, proprietor of West Winds Lodge, said she filled her rooms some days, "but not nearly as much as last year."

"My people cancelled because the whole ski area wasn't open. They didn't want to ski on half a mountain," she said, adding that the guests she had were not unhappy with what was open at Ski Apache.

"We probably had a record in cancellations and re-bookings," said Karen Moore, marketing manager of Swiss Chalet, explaining that the lack of snow caused "massive cancellations." Moore said Swiss Chalet's business increased, but from business groups, not tourists.

Bill Rawlins, owner of Ruidoso Lodge Cabins, said that business was down from previous years, but better than he had expected.

"There were an awful lot of people in town, I don't know where they stayed," he said, speculating that

some stayed with friends and families.

Roy Parker, Ski Apache Resort manager, also opined that business was "better than we expected." He said that the number of skiers is down from last year, when more than 130 inches of snow had fallen by Christmastime. Only 19 inches has fallen so far this season, said Parker.

Parker said his crews are making snow nightly and that skiing is good to excellent in the areas that are open, with snow levels from three to five feet deep. In anticipation of the rest of the season, Parker said he has never seen a winter (in his 22 years here) when the entire mountain did not open.

Ginger Tracy, owner of the Ruidoso Bus Station, said that December's business was down from last year's in both passengers and freight. She said October was up and November was about the same as last year.

With mixed business results, merchants disagreed on where locals shopped this season. Dorothy

Byrd, owner of The Byrd's Nest, a gift shop in Sierra Mall, said she thought this year's business topped last year's. She attributed the successful season to the new mall location and the participation of local shoppers.

"We've had a lot of local people," she said, expressing appreciation to the local shoppers. She said her store (and most of Sierra Mall) was very busy from the Saturday before Christmas through Christmas Eve.

However, another merchant said that most Ruidosians went to other areas to shop.

"Had it not been for the Mexican trade, the season would have been a disaster," he said.

The shortage of skiers decreased business in many Ruidoso restaurants. Jimmy Goodwin, owner of Schlotzsky's, said his business was down by 15 to 20 percent during the first three weeks of December. However, the week between Christmas and New Year's was equal or a little above last year, he said.

1985 is remembered



year, Ski Apache Resort (then Sierra Blanca Ski Resort) was blanketed by an average midway depth of 109 inches of snow.




Randy Elkins of Pinon leaps from his horse during calf-roping competition at the Mescalero rodeo during the Fourth of July



Harold K. Jones
Services were under the direction of the Reverend Mr. Ken Cole with Harold's son, the Reverend Max K. Jones, delivering the eulogy for his father.

The Reverend Mr. Cole, saying that Harold was now rejoicing in his new life in Heaven, quoted from the scriptures:

"Who shall ascend the hills of the Lord? He who has a pure heart."
And from the book of Romans, "... nothing shall separate us from the love of God"

The congregation sang a favorite hymn, accompanied at the piano by Karita Ratliff:

"Oh God, our help in ages past,
Our hope in years to come..."

The Reverend Max said that it was his father's request that there be no sorrowing and that we should talk of life, the great opportunity of life here on earth and of the glory of the life in Heaven.

Max said that his father was

everything a good father could be, was first of all a gentle man, and that he had a profound faith in God, that he kept searching, striving for deeper understanding of the meaning of God in our life. He said also that his father had a great yearning for freedom, that he was a handsome man, whose perfect health came from clean living, that he was thoroughly decent in his thoughts and actions.

The Mustangs
To illustrate that gentle love was the central element of his father's nature, Max told a little story.

He said that he knew some boys who caught some mustangs from the Indian reservation and had them penned, but could not get them to eat — that the horses preferred starvation to captivity. Knowing that the horses would more than likely perish, Max brought the matter to his father's attention.

In speaking to the boys about the Mustangs, Harold in gentle words brought home to the boys the dire condition of these horses and their love of freedom, that the boys of their own accord set the mustangs free, once more on the mountains of their birth.

The Orchard
Some years ago, Harold Jones and I helped the late and beloved Elzy Perry set out an orchard, much of which still stands down east of the Perry Ranch home in Glencoe.

Elzy and Harold learned from our Mother that I had always wanted an

orchard, so between them they set aside a hundred and twenty or so trees. Then Elzy brought up his tractor by the old road, and Harold and Max as a young boy came along. With stakes, Harold and Elzy mapped out the locations for the trees, and Elzy dug the holes with the auger attached to the tractor. Then all of us worked enlarging the holes with shovels and planted the orchard.

This orchard, on the meadow sloping toward the river from the house was one of the bright spots in my life. For about twelve years I raised the finest apples: Golden, Red delicious, Gravenstein, several kinds of Winesaps, Jonathan, Rome Beauty, also three kinds of pears and three trees of peaches. Every spring, my heart would beat high with joy at the fragrant blooms which made a wonderland of all the meadow. The apples gold and red in ripeness in the fall were a dream come true for me. And our Mother was happy and grateful that my dream had come true.

When I look down where the orchard used to be, I send up a prayer of thanks to Elzy, Harold, and Max for the years of lasting happiness they brought to our Mother and myself.

Harold was that kind of man, who helped others make their dreams come true.

Harold Jones has left great blessings among us in the form of his son Max, his daughter, Darlene and his devoted wife, Maudetha. He will always have a special spot in our hearts and we rejoice that he has been welcomed into Heaven by the Lord he served so well while here among us.

Garret Henson, Justin Smith, Toby Rue and Chris McAdams have done well off the bench.



DEAR EDITOR..

In order to cover some points which, for reasons of space, were omitted from your articles of 26 December, the following:

I proposed a municipal zoning designation because of the loophole that exists in both our 1976 zoning ordinance and the master plan that is under consideration. Neither had a designation for municipal use; an oversight that should be corrected.

Now, some are saying that "We might lose the FAA support if we zone the old airport land for municipal use."

This is a smoke screen and it is

not true.

It is, however, an excellent scare tactic to retain the present commercial-industrial zoning on the land use map which permits condo's, shopping centers and hotel complexes.

The village and the FAA have, and will continue to have, a good productive relationship, working together on the new regional airport. Eighteen months ago I contacted the FAA to find out what would be required from the village. I was told that, under the current field rules, after an appraisal, the old airport would be sold and ALL

proceeds, or a comparable amount, would be put into the new airport. The village could not keep any of this money, no matter how much the land sale brings. I was also told that the FAA could be flexible.

To determine the degree of flexibility, and mindful that you, the taxpayer, have supported the airport, I called Washington and was told that the village does have options; options that have been extended to other communities.

Some people had been telling me that the village had no option, that we HAD to sell the airport, retaining only a small portion.

When these people heard that I had called Washington and learned of these options, they became very upset and active! The smoke screen about "losing FAA support" surfaced...the council had an executive session...the first FAA negotiating committee was formed.

My concern was that it included only two members of the council and others, some of whom had indicated a disposition toward the sale or lease of a majority of the land. Also, some of the committee members, when in Washington, had made the statement, to me and the news media, that Senator Domenici would not help Ruidoso and that his actions were "a political maneuver." This just outside the senator's office, immediately after he had given the village the first E.I.S. study in the history of the airport and had provided the funding.

Furthermore, to assure flexibility in the coming negotiations, I felt that the council, which is directly responsible to the people and has the final authority, should have had more representation.

We have it on the new committee. I was afraid that proponents of sale might use the following scenario:

(a) Retain the current commercial-industrial zoning, as shown on the land use map, and skyrocket the assessed valuation to a figure far beyond the village's ability to pay.

(b) Unaware that it has other options, the village is stampeded into a quick sale of the land.

(c) Land, supported by the taxpayers, is dumped on the market, in competition with all other commercial land and existing businesses.

(d) A large shopping center and hotel complex are built.

(e) A road is then needed from Highway 37 to Hull Road, crossing some private property and using up airport land at the rate of approximately one half to one acre every 435 running feet, and

(f) The village and future generations of children and Ruidosians lose forever the last centrally located land suitable for parks, schools, convention center, college and a vast number of other municipal uses.

The adoption of a municipal use zone will preclude the above scenario from happening now or in the future, without public hearings and input.

A municipal use zone will not "scare off" the FAA.

Eighteen months ago, and again in our recent meeting in Albuquerque, they indicated to me their willingness to be flexible. The village council and the FAA will reach a fair and equitable agreement.

The FAA, Senators Domenici and Bingaman, Governor Anaya and Representatives Skeen, Lujan and Richardson have given us support and are well aware of the need for a regional airport; not only for the tourist related revenue it will generate to help offset that lost to the state from the declining oil and gas industry, but for the safety of the teachers and school children as well.

BCA wouldn't send for my son's records when I went there the first time, they might offend my general practitioner. Why would they be offended? My doctor doesn't have enough hours in a day. I leave the office feeling I should apologize for wasting valuable time. Having a pediatrician would free them up. They wouldn't have to spend time with worried mothers who have kids with chronic runny noses or diaper rash that won't clear up.

My month old son was very sick when he was born. Without the BCA pediatricians, he would have ended up in Roswell or Albuquerque, and spent a fair amount of time there.

My two-year-old was misdiagnosed. For twenty-two months I kept dragging him to the doctor. Finally, I took him to the BCA pediatricians. A few tests and a week later he was as healthy as could be and instead of whining all the time—he's now a little terror. It wasn't the fault of the G.P.'s. They can't know all there is. They take care of people from conception through death.

In this town we have two OB/GYN's to take care of women's

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special problems. We have an internal medicine doctor, a urologist, surgeons, a radiologist, optometrists and even a foot doctor.

I think its about time we had a doctor that specializes in children's problems. We have specialists for everything else, aren't our children as important as our feet?

I think BCA's problem was money. It's very expensive to set up a practice. I asked if the hospital would help. The answer, No. Why Not? They are already established. Really? It seems they're established in Roswell. I don't live in

Roswell, I live here. Don't I count? The hospital brought in an internal medicine doctor and helped set him up. They brought in the OB/GYN and helped him set up. Why not a pediatrician? We need one of those, too. Check out the schools there's lots of kids. Check out the hospital and with midwives. There's a bunch of kids being born. Before we spend millions building a new hospital shouldn't we staff the one we've got? We really need a pediatrician.

How about it Ken?

Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE—Here's a thought for a new year's resolution appropriate to those of you who care about the kind of elected officials we get.

Would-be candidates of all kinds, good and bad, are having considerable trouble getting enough names signed to those petitions the law now requires them to present before they can officially be declared to be candidates. They need help. Why not take the responsibility of getting the signatures of those of your friends of the appropriate party on the official forms candidates can make available to you?

It's a way to affect the future of the state without sacrificing even a lot of your time in the process.

This observer of conditions in our state finds logic more often leading to the conclusion that government spending should be cut. Once in awhile, though, the indications lead to another style of thinking.

Though times are tough, we believe the state should put up the \$100,000 it is going to be asked for to allow evaluation of three potential sites for the Superconducting Super Collider the feds may decide to build.

This is a project of the sort our state has had much connection with, as in the Very Large Array and our two national laboratories.

The SSC requires a total of 11,000 acres, 400 of which have to be deeded land for location of a "campus." There are stiff requirements for support facilities in the area, and the site finally chosen must be within 45 minutes driving time of a major airport.

So far, 18 of the states have proposed 30 potential locations. The committee to look for possible sites in New Mexico, headed by Dr. Lawrence Lattmann, boss at New Mexico Tech, located three. One is near Deming, one is south of Las Cruces and the third is in the Estancia valley.

If you want to know what the SSC will be like, picture an enormous basic research machine in the form of a circular or oval "racetrack" buried 40 feet underground. The tunnel would be 10 feet in diameter and would form a ring that would be

something like 20 miles across. The Department of Energy will make a decision early this year on whether to ask for something on the order of \$4 billion to \$6 billion for its construction.

The \$100,000 our Legislature may be asked to put up would allow for a more complete evaluation of the three possible locations here, and put the state in position to make a formal proposition if DOE decides to proceed with the project.

This appears to be the kind of thing we ought to be fighting to get.

You can make a pretty good case that our state's outstanding industry at this time is actually scientific research. In fact, there is so little industry of any kind here and the likelihood of its developing is so finite that we ought to make every effort to capitalize on chances to expand our scientific endeavors.

Projects that are much less deserving will get \$100,000 out of our present Legislature when it meets, so this one should be aided as well.

A small comparison, in the realm of politics.

Mario Cuomo began his present term as governor of New York at the same time Toney Anaya began his in New Mexico. That suggests that they had something like the same sort of general conditions to deal with during their times in office.

Yet a recent survey shows that 79 percent of the residents of Cuomo's state approve of the way he has done his job during the past three years, while Anaya's approval rating from New Mexicans is down around 20 percent.

We mention the fact for two reasons. Anaya is starting his last year as our governor. If he is to raise himself in the estimation of his fellow citizens, he has to give more than an ordinary amount of attention to trying for some positive achievements during 1986. We hope he will heed that thought and act accordingly. We also want our people here at home to know it isn't only writers like this one who rank the Anaya performance to date as a minor disaster.

County commission ends year with appointments

The Lincoln County Commissioners ended 1985 with appointments to the Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) and the Lincoln Historic Board, approval of the mid-year budget and 1984-85 audit and review of roads at their meeting in Carrizozo Tuesday.

P&Z commissioners Modesto Chavez, Ben Hall, Walt Wilson and LaMoyné Peters were reappointed to the board. E.J. Fouratt was selected to fill the vacancy created by the expiration of Bill Seelbach's term. Lincoln County manager Suzanne Cox said that Seelbach told her he did not want to serve because his business interests keep him out of the county. The P&Z members will serve two-year terms.

County manager Suzanne Cox reviewed the mid-year budget and reported that, overall, the general fund is 46 percent expended. Most departments showed expenditures at 50 percent or below. Increased insurance costs and unexpected litigation costs put the manager's, law enforcement and county attorney's departments above the 50 percent expenditure level.

The road department showed 93 percent expenditure. Cox explained that the department's budget is increased as the county is refunded from the state for road projects.

The Bonito Fire Department budget reflected the payment for a new fire truck.

The commissioners approved the budget and a resolution to pay prior bills for doors to the county yard garage. Cox requested budget adjustments for road department equipment repairs and road construction.

Cox said a refund for the two bills is expected from the state, but had not been received by the meeting

time. The commissioners approved a \$200,000 budget transfer from the general fund to the road fund.

Two other transfers were approved to correct errors in the Carrizozo Health Clinic and senior citizens' departments. Other transfers made were from the general budget for increased expenses for litigation in the attorney's department and for a transfer of money from the Sierra Blanca operating expense to capital outlay.

Cox reviewed the audit report for the 1984-85 fiscal year, conducted by Wingfield and Company, certified public accountants. She commented that the report was "very good, with constructive comments."

According to Cox, the auditors suggested that the Carrizozo Health Center's dental department be billed through the Southwest Health Services computer system, as are the center and the Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Hospital.

The auditors also suggested the county treasurer's office be brought on-line with the county computer system, to create a link with the manager's office and to keep up to date with cash accountability. The auditors further suggested the Zia Senior Citizens' Centers finances be placed on the county computer system.

Cox reported that she currently is working with Southwest Health Services to convert the dentist's office to their computer system and that the treasurer's office will be on the general ledger system by June 30. The Zia center will be on the county computer system by the end of January, she added.

Road closures occupied much of the meeting Tuesday. Some county citizens challenged the commissioners' October decision to terminate an agreement with the Stephenson Ranch which allowed limited access to Water Canyon Road. The citizens said that the road is the only access into private land and mining claims that are beyond the Stephenson property. The road also provides access to the western side of the White Mountain Wilderness Area.

The original agreement between the county and Stephenson was

signed in 1977. Since then access was obtained with a key, available at the Lincoln County Sheriff's Department, and during the regular rifle hunting seasons.

In October, Sheriff Tom Sullivan approached the commission, asking to terminate the agreement because of the inconvenience to his department in handling the key. The commissioners approved the termination.

Tuesday, county Attorney Steve Sanders gave a report on the history of the Water Canyon agreement. He said that the question about the road first came to the county in January 1974, but no action was taken by the commissioners at that time.

A road review committee appointed in 1974 recommended that the road be closed until a public campground could be created on the U.S. Forest Service land. The Stephensons originally requested the closure because of vandalism and camping on their property.

The matter was shelved until 1977 when the county entered into a lawsuit contesting whether the road was private or public by prescriptive use. In January 1977, the assistant district attorney at the time stated he was doubtful that it was a private road.

In August 1977, the assistant district attorney proposed an agreement which gives limited access in exchange for county recognition that the road is private and will not be maintained. Sanders said the agreement could be terminated 90 days after a signed request by either party.

Concerned county residents present, including former county commissioner Bud Payne (who served during the 1974 controversy), requested that the commission rescind its October decision to terminate the agreement until August 15, when the agreement annually is renewed.

Commissioners Bill Elliott and A.W. Gnatkowski voted to rescind the termination they approved in October. Commissioner Ken Nosker abstained because he said he did not approve of the termination in October.

Elliott recommended that the Stephenson Ranch and the Forest

Service work on an agreement to construct a new access road into the wilderness area.

In other road action, the commissioners did not close roads A-034 and A-035. They based their action on the recommendation of the road review committee.

In other business, the commissioners:

—Postponed action on Sierra Blanca Boulevard in Alto Crest Subdivision until a survey of adjoining property is made to determine the boulevard's location.

—Approved the final plat for the Mountain Lakes Subdivision, located off Fort Stanton Road, with the stipulation that the proposed dams be built to withstand a 100-year storm.

—Approved an agreement with The Lincoln Pageant Corporation for the lease of property located in Burro Alley. The site will be the location of a county trash dumpster in Lincoln. The commission approved a grant for not more than \$1,000 to be used to screen the dumpster (as required by historical zone codes).

—Approved a grant, not to exceed \$1,500, to the Lincoln County Fair Association to fence the fair grounds in Capitan after approval of a resolution by the Capitan Board of Trustees.

—Approved the Tuesday meeting dates for 1986 as January 21, February 11, March 4 and 25, April 15, May 6, June 6 and 17, July 8 and 23, August 19, September 9 and 30, October 21, November 7 and December 2 and 23.

—Approved of a grant award for the Zia Senior Citizens' Center from the Eastern New Mexico Area Agency on Aging.

—Awarded the bid for the annual fuel supply to LaMay Distributing in Carrizozo.

—Approved the \$5,000 agreement to finance a portion of the cog-wheel railway feasibility study.

—Approved the warrant and payroll registers, a budget increase for a prior year's bill and increases in the Bonito Fire Department and the county sheriff's office budgets.

—After meeting in executive session, approved the release of a \$661,606 securities pledge from the First National Bank of Ruidoso.
