

County officials seize marijuana plants

A house at 108 East Street in Ruidoso Downs served as a double-duty nursery until late Thursday, January 9.

While occupants apparently operated a home childcare nursery in most of the small house, one room was set aside as a nursery for growing marijuana, said one officer at the scene.

Lincoln County Sheriff's Department records indicate that three suspects were arrested Thursday in Ruidoso Downs as the culmination of a lengthy and extensive Department investigation.

Sheriff's investigators, backed up by the Ruidoso Downs police, spent much of Thursday night gathering evidence from the East Street house. In a room lined with mirrors and aluminum foil, and equipped with a watering system, fans, humidity gauges, thermometer and

heat lamps, investigators found 20 large marijuana plants—each one over six-feet tall.

"This is a highly sophisticated operation," said Cox, who said the plants were being grown hydroponically.

By the time the specially equipped nursery was empty, the back of a Sheriff's Department pickup truck was completely filled with the marijuana plants. Cox estimated that each plant has a value of about \$1,000.

Mitchell L. Hinsz, 25, and Dolly Curtis, 22, both of the East Street address, remain in the Lincoln County Jail on various drug-related charges, said undersheriff Charlie Cox. Hinsz is charged with possession of marijuana with intent to distribute and conspiracy to distribute, said Cox. He said Curtis is charged with sales and distribution of marijuana and possession of marijuana with intent to distribute. Cox said an undercover in-

vestigator purchased two pounds of marijuana from Curtis Thursday before the arrests were made.

Carl Lee Freeman, 24, of 109 Park Avenue in Ruidoso Downs, also was arrested Thursday and remains in jail charged with possession of marijuana with the intent to distribute, said Cox.

The investigation resulted in two more arrests on Friday. Cox said Elmata J. Welch, 44, of Ruidoso, and Wanda L. Krieger, 25, of the Park Avenue address in Ruidoso Downs, were arrested Friday. Both were released on their own recognizance, he said.

Welch was charged with conspiracy to distribute a controlled substance (marijuana) and Krieger was charged with possession of a controlled substance (marijuana) with the intent to distribute, said Cox.

He said other charges are pending, and more arrests are possible as the investigation continues.

Land use, zoning maps prepare for future development of village

"This is possibly what the Village of Ruidoso could look like in the year 2010," said Mike Callaghan, chairman of the Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z), as the group viewed a proposed land use map for the village.

In a special meeting Friday, P&Z approved both the land use map, prepared by commissioner David Smith, and a zoning map. The two will accompany a zoning ordinance being proposed as part of a master plan to carry the city into the 21st century.

Commissioners already have put final touches to the written zoning ordinance prepared by BRW, Inc., an Arizona firm hired to prepare the master plan. The maps are auxiliary documents to the ordinance, with current zoning being shown, using new terminology from the proposed ordinance.

Smith explained that by 2010 the zoning map should look very much like the land use map. Over the next 30 years, Smith said P&Z, developers and planners will use the land use map as a guide for applying the zoning ordinance to undeveloped land.

Davis recommended that the village sign ordinance be omitted

from the zoning document, and members agreed. Several sign ordinance changes are being proposed by P&Z and the commissioners said they didn't want progress on the master plan held up while the Ruidoso Village Council acts on the recommendations.

Next step for the zoning ordinance and maps is a review by BRW staff.

"Then we'll prepare ourselves for a very long day of public hearings," said Paul Davis, village enforcement officer.

During further discussions on signs, P&Z members talked of one recommendation that will be made during Tuesday's council meeting—to eliminate all for sale and for rent real estate signs in village limits.

It was learned Friday that some members of Multiple Listing Services during a recent meeting indicated they would not favor amending the current sign ordinance to eliminate real estate signs.

"It's got to be pointed out that this was started two years ago by Greg Masters," said commissioner Martin Rose, who opined that seeing too many real estate signs "confuses the buyer."

"Our interest is in the town, not in individual real estate offices," said P&Z member Ken Carr.

Also Friday, P&Z paved the way

for a new Safeway grocery store on Highway 70 by approving commercial development plans submitted by Charles L. Henry, architect for the project.

Even though commissioners strongly encouraged the inclusion of landscaping in the commercial development in the Pinecliff Subdivision, they unanimously approved the plans exactly as submitted—without a landscaping plan.

"Safeway doesn't want to be singled out," said Henry. "So far we haven't seen anything green on Wal-Mart (next door to the Safeway project)" he added.

Callaghan said landscaping was also suggested to Wal-Mart.

"Whatever (landscaping) you could do we'd appreciate," said commissioner Mary Underwood.

Davis listed concerns of various village department heads "for information only," and informed Henry that Safeway will be expected to provide eight handicapped parking spaces, rather than just four as shown on development plans.

"Our clock is running," said Henry, as he thanked the group for calling a special meeting to review the Safeway plans. He said the contractor will be on the site next week, and the project is expected to take 240 calendar days.

Village is sued by fire victims

The Village of Ruidoso, the Ruidoso Police Department and the Ruidoso Fire Department are named as defendants in a federal suit brought by a couple whose home burned to the ground in 1984.

Joseph and Thais Robinson claim that fire and police personnel failed to respond to a fire alarm preceding the January 16, 1984, blaze at their three-story frame and cinder block house in Middle Creek Subdivision, out Cedar Creek Road, according to the suit.

The Robinsons, who declined to comment on their case, are asking for \$100,000 in damages from the village.

Their claim states that the defen-

dants were notified by the Robinson's neighbors on the day of the fire that a fire alarm was sounding at the house and that live electrical wires were lying upon the roof. Further, the suit states that "the defendants had a duty to answer the call from plaintiffs' neighbors right away and investigate the dangerous situation."

"I remember the fire, we were all there even though it was in the county," said fire chief Virgil Reynolds.

According to Fire Department records, the fire was reported at 4:30 p.m. on January 16, and the Forest Service responded with two trucks and five men. Records in-

dicate that seven paid Ruidoso firefighters and 13 volunteers responded, but found the structure "fully involved" upon their arrival. Reports show that no hydrants were available and the fire fighters remained at the scene to cool the propane tank and protect the surrounding area.

Reynolds said the location was out of village jurisdiction, so the Lincoln County Sheriff's Department was notified.

"We're still in the discovery process," said Sam Westergren, attorney for the Robinsons. Both Westergren and village attorney John Underwood declined to discuss the pending case.

Trucker is killed in highway accident

Kenneth Dean Loehr was killed about 7:30 p.m. January 10, in a one-vehicle tractor trailer rig accident on Highway 70 near Riverside, according to State Police records.

The 40-year-old truckdriver was

from Fort Dodge, Iowa, said police.

The vehicle, headed east on Highway 70, entered a curve going too fast and rolled over throwing the victim out on the passenger side, said police.

Although seatbelts were installed in the tractor, police said they were apparently not used. A report filed by State Police officer Clayton Floyd stated that in his opinion, had the driver used a seatbelt, he might have survived the crash.







Winter Warning
Winter Blows In

On the sixth of January you began to wonder whether or not we would have any winter weather. The mountain meadows were shimmering with small heat waves at high noon, with the temperature at sixty. Under a pure blue sky the hills and valleys and glens lay dozing drowsily, dreaming through this summery interlude. When you remembered that snow often arrives in October, you wondered if this is going to be one of those rare dry winters.

Then I happened to find a copy of our father's narrative poem which he wrote about an old Alaska prospector who waited a little too long to come out of the through Valdez Pass interior ahead of the first blizzard. He had forgotten now suddenly winter can come charging, forgotten also that he did not have the speed of foot of his youth.

In the words of the poem the old man "struggled through the deepening snow as the cavalry of winter rode to overtake him."

Is this some kind of omen, I wondered to myself, this running across our father's poem? Imagination can take hold of you all right,

and yet the idea of snow anywhere close to hand or any time soon seemed all out of reason.

Yet there was one little giveaway: A small band of cows who had been back in the hills came down to the creek to rest and fill up on water, as is often times their habit before a snow storm. Oh, well the cows are apt to happen down for any reason.

The spring-like day closed with a peaceful golden sunset followed by the gold and rose colors in the sky which reflected down casting the mountain land all in the cheerful colors of the gloaming.

It must have been about eight o'clock, while half-asleep before the fireplace, I thought I heard a tiny voice up amongst the eaves of the house, and a kind of whispering sound against the windows.

Corina, the cat, rose up from her bed in front of the fire and got up on the piano and pushing aside a curtain, began staring outside.

Sure enough, when I switched on the light above the door which my great nephew Kent Maulsby had fixed, the ground was already covered with a half inch of snow.

"The cavalry of winter" had charged in, but without bugles

blowing or iron clad hoof beats pounding.

The Snow Stays

"The army riding hard," to get back to father's poem, was made up of snow flakes mounted on the flying horses of the north wind.

I think they were the largest flakes I ever saw, larger than a silver dollar, beautifully formed, and flying so close together that in no time at all the ground was covered with about four inches of snow. For thirty minutes or so, the snow came driven by the wind. Then the wind stopped all at once and the snow flakes really went to work, drifting straight down, so that the snow depth increased to about eight inches, with drifts up to a foot and a half.

This snow came just right to stay with us awhile. It is what you call a cold snow. We have had sunny days ever since the snow, with temperatures as high as sixty in the shade. And yet on the shady side of the world the snow is shining silvery white on the meadows close to the mountains and all among the evergreens on the mountain themselves.

This is a glad sight to behold—this snow still there after so many warm days. This puts a bright smile on the face of good mother earth, for she knows now that there will be a good winter for her children.

So winter is here, just a little late after all, with a good beginning of snow with more on the way, which all adds up to a pleasant winter season and a springtime glorious with songs of birds, green grass and fragrant blossoms.

Chamber Texas family campaign praised

Ed Jungbluth, New Mexico Director of Travel and Tourism, told the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce's advertising committee that its "Picture Yourself in Ruidoso" advertising campaign and recent reception for the winning family of the year was very impressive.

Jungbluth, a former executive director for the Ruidoso chamber, joined the group at its meeting Friday.

Chamber executive director John Jeffers told the committee that the recent reception in Austin, Texas, was a "huge success," which New Mexico Governor Toney Anaya called "innovative and creative."

Jeffers opined that the reception was a "fitting middle" to winter

advertising campaign. The first part of the campaign announced the contest and solicited entries. The next phase will be advertisements in various Texas newspapers and magazines displaying Ruidoso's Texas Family of the Year and their testimony to Ruidoso.

Jeffers said the contest winners, the Brown family of Arlington, Texas, will be available for promotion throughout the year.

Committee chairman Bill Hirschfeld said the committee spent \$500 on a public relations campaign about the contest and its winners. Hirschfeld said he felt the money was well spent.

Hirschfeld later told the group that Ski Apache would not participate in a cooperative winter advertising campaign. Hirschfeld said the resort had earlier agreed to contribute \$10,000, but rescinded

the offer. Hirschfeld said the Ruidoso Downs Race Track has agreed to contribute up to \$25,000 for a summer advertising program.

The committee spent much of the meeting reviewing bills and analyzing ways to make the billing system more effective so that committee members could be apprised of current debts and payments. Ann Glover, new account executive for Ruidoso with advertising agency D B G & H, said that she will see that the committee receives itemized bills for all work and media placement.

Committee member Phil Hamilton, also a member of the Ruidoso Lodgers' Tax Committee, said that lodgers' tax collections are about \$10,000 short so far this fiscal year, and that changes in the advertising budget may have been needed.

Adult Recreation Committee schedules Alamogordo trip

The Adult Recreation Advisory Board voted recently to recommend that the Adult Recreation Center (ARC) sponsor a March trip to the planetarium in Alamogordo.

Board members suggested that the trip, which might include a dinner in Alamogordo, be promoted in the ARC's February newsletter.

Bette Romans, ARC director, will check on a bus for the Alamogordo trip.

In further discussions on travel, board chairman Barney Waldrop reported that assistant village manager Frank Potter told him there is nothing in the village insurance policy that prohibits out-of-town travel in the Center's van. However, Waldrop added that village manager Jim Hine is opposed to such travel because of an accident a number of years ago.

"I'm not so much opposed as I am concerned about the cost of it," said Hine, when contacted by telephone Friday. "We did have an accident

some years ago," he said, adding that the director was slightly injured stepping out of the van.

"We can't do everything... this is why we have an advisory committee," Hine said.

Verna Adams of the board asked the chairman for reports on two items the group voted to submit to the Ruidoso Village Council, however the items are apparently still unsettled.

In a telephone conversation after the meeting, Adams said the board agreed in December to ask the councilors if money from the sale of the lapidary equipment could be returned to the center if it was sold through the center. She said the other issue, which is still unresolved, involves use of the Center's van.

Burdette Stampely, board secretary, volunteered to represent the group at the January council meeting, and ask for answers to board questions.

Waldrop, who opened the meeting with prayer and presented a monologue on peace, later reported that Bill Underhill had resigned from the board. He said names of prospective members should be submitted to Mayor George White.

Underhill, in a telephone interview, declined to comment on his resignation, and said he didn't want it reported in the newspaper.

"I don't think it's anybody's business," said Underhill.

Romans displayed copies of the January newsletter, the first using a new format designed in December. Members voted to give the three donated prizes being offered through the newsletter in three consecutive issues.

It was learned at the meeting that Fred Gisler of the State Agency on Aging will be the guest speaker at next month's meeting. Stampely agreed to serve as moderator since Waldrop will be in Hawaii.

Ruidoso Board of Education learns of enrollment drop

Though an enrollment increase was predicted for the 1985-86 school year, Ruidoso schools have experienced a slight decrease in both the special and regular education student population since the beginning of the year, according to Ruidoso Schools superintendent Sid Miller.

At the regular meeting of the Ruidoso Board of Education Wednesday at Nob Hill Elementary School, both Miller and school board president Stormy Edwards said the loss in school population might be related to the current economic slowdown in the area.

"Some people are having to go to other cities to find work and that could be hurting our enrollment,

though we have no way of knowing what the final figures will be right now," Edwards said.

In other board business, the members unanimously approved a request by New Mexico State University at Las Cruces (NMSU) to use the shop facilities at Ruidoso High School for art classes this summer.

NMSU plans to offer courses in painting, drawing, design, jewelry-making, sculpture and printmaking in a six-weeks session this summer.

Any member of the Ruidoso community who meets NMSU entrance standards is eligible to attend.

Students who will be seniors in the fall at Ruidoso High will also be eligible to attend the summer

NMSU art program in Ruidoso, and will be awarded credits at Ruidoso High for their participation.

Segura of Hilliard. "We just couldn't stop him inside."


Still, Segura praised parts of the Warriors' game.



Building permits \$841,991 in Dec.

With residential building permits down and commercial permits up, village construction in December hovered near November levels, but showed a healthy increase over the same period a year ago—December 1984.

Last month—December 1985—the Village Building Inspector issued 24 permits in all categories with a total valuation of \$841,991, bringing the year-to-date total to 596 permits with a dollar valuation of \$20,669,130. Year-end figures for 1984 indicated that the inspector issued just 580 permits, but with double 1985's dollar valuation at \$40,412,970 for 1984.

Six permits with a total valuation of \$456,298 were issued in the village during December on new single-family dwellings (SFD), a decrease of just two from November 1985's eight permits, but a big dollar decline from November's valuation of \$679,353.

In December 1984, the building inspector issued five SFD permits with a valuation of \$476,026.


Residential remodeling permits, after an upward spiral over the last year, fell during December, with seven permits issued in that category with a valuation of \$81,930. In November the village issued 20 residential addition/alteration permits with a valuation of \$137,416.

Last month's remodel permits also had a valuation higher than last year's when the village issued the same number of permits (seven), but with a dollar valuation of only \$43,462.

Commercial permits issued in December 1985 showed a huge increase over both November 1985 and December a year ago with five permits at \$272,653 issued last month. November saw just one new commercial building permit issued with a value of \$14,210, and in December 1984 the one permit issued had a value of just \$4,030.

Projects contributing to December's big commercial building increase include the Humane Society animal shelter, a service station in Pinecliff and a warehouse and office in Skyland. Three permits were issued last

month for commercial additions and alterations. The valuation listed on those three was \$12,899, down slightly from November's one commercial remodel permit with a valuation of \$14,210, but over December 1984's one permit in that category with valuation of just \$4,030.

Two permits with a valuation of \$16,000 were issued during December for apartment additions and alterations. The two permits issued a month ago (November) in that category had a valuation of \$20,010, and none were issued in December 1984.

One demolition permit was issued last month with a valuation listed at \$10. No demolition permits were issued in November 1985 or during the same period last year—December 1984.

The village issued no permits on grading or foundations in December 1985 or in December 1984, however in November two foundation permits were issued with a valuation of \$5,700.

Permits issued by the Village of Ruidoso during December, by subdivision, type of structure and estimated cost of construction, were:





Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE—Everyone is used to lots of waiting time here in the land of manana. To be useful, however, ordinary, blank, just-waiting time ought to be put to creative use.

That would be especially helpful in connection with impending events like the 1986 session of our state Legislature, scheduled to start here at noon just 11 days from now. To be truthful, though, there is little evidence that anyone in charge is doing much analytical thinking of the practical sort as that big day approaches.

Our Governor has been whirlwind-ing about the state, revealing one set of proposals for spending our money here and another one there. He appears this year to be bent on mixing conciliation with aggression during the legislative period, as though heedless of the fact that the two won't blend. What he doesn't appear to be doing is any thinking beyond the immediate present, though we desperately need lasting solutions to that is almost certain to be a lasting problem.

The rest of the "leaders" aren't a lot better.

The honcho is the Senate, Albuquerque's own Les Houston, seems to be spending most of his time on the phone, trying to keep hold of those members of that body's majority who show signs of wanting to escape his bear hug. He admits the major disadvantage of the job he now holds is too much time on the telephone, and too many long-distance charges. If he's thinking deeply about anything it could be about what promises to make to which restive Senator to keep him or her in the Houston camp. One of those items he has to give away, a choice spot on the Senate Finance Committee, may already have been promised to too many members to be deliverable.

As for the Speaker of the House, who has his own particular coalition to hold together, he always appears to be thoughtful but is so reluctant to share any of his plans with the rest of us that it's as though he had none.

And the liberals in the two houses—what are they up to? Well, if this time in 1986 is anything like the same period in 1985, they are most likely commiserating with one another, wringing their hands at their own powerlessness and planning how they can go crybabbling to their captive Governor again merely for reasons of throwing monkey wrenches into the works. Nothing much beneficial can be expected from these folks either, though they are loud in their condemnations of their opposite numbers' "negativism."

What plans we do hear from those who say they have been busy their brains offer nothing in the way of solutions to the problems that vex us.

UNM president Tom Farrer has some sort of half-baked notion about an issue of general obligation bonds the proceeds from which could be used to buy equipment for the institutions of higher education. His aim is to free up already appropriated equipment funding to be used instead to raise salaries for those pros who keep telling us how

put-upon they are. This complex plan, which is of suspect constitutionality, hasn't managed to get the support even of Farrer's fellow presidents. It certainly hasn't drawn kudos from legislators, some of whom think Farrer fell into bad company when he sat Joe Goldberg, former Secretary of the Department of Human Services and then of the Department of Health and Environment, on his right hand as his closest advisor. After a stint in Santa Fe, Goldberg may believe he is now an expert at manipulating state government, but he isn't.

Another proposal we didn't need was that new plan Anaya has come up with for funding that badly needed bridge in Albuquerque's North Valley. Lawmakers thought that proposition had been disposed of, and to bring it up again during the coming session, in a new form, is only inviting another war from those parts of the state where the Big City is viewed with little-high regard.

We could say honestly that, as of the day you read these words, most of those charged with finding the state's way out of its current mess have shown little courage in facing up to the problem and almost no inventiveness in devising solutions.

It's still manana-time in the old Southwest.

The hotel is incredible. In the center of the building is an atrium room with a fountain. White lights glisten on the atrium trees, visible from each floor balcony.




The Capitan Tigers came back from their loss to Alamogordo by winning the game against Hagerman on Friday afternoon, with a

School board re-hires Hays, elects Trost secretary

The Capitan Board of Education re-hired the superintendent, elected a board secretary and heard reports at its regular meeting Thursday night.

Attending board members James McDaniel, Tom Trost, Preston Stone and Tim Worrell unanimously renewed superintendent Leonard Hays' contract for 1986-87. His salary will be negotiable when the new budget is drawn.

Trost was elected as the board secretary after Stone declined to serve in the office. Stone was elected at last month's meeting, from which he was absent. On Thursday he said he did not want the position. The board rescinded the previous election and selected Trost.

Also Thursday night, Ray Hodge, contractor for the library complex, said that the library would be completed by the end of the next week

(January 13-17) if the furniture arrives and the weather is mild enough to complete the roof.

The board also discussed the commons-area project, still under construction. The board approved of a bracket-type of beam support at its December meeting.

At Thursday night's meeting, the board instructed Hodge to place metal columns from the beams to the floor for visual and possible safety reasons. The opposite side of the room has columns from the beams to the floor.

The board briefly discussed a refrigeration problem in the new kitchen. Hodge said that he had a refrigerator repairman check the unit after Christmas, when the first cooling problems were detected.

Hays said the food in the unit was transferred to the freezer in the agriculture building. He added that the food would be kept there until the kitchen unit is working satisfactorily.

Hays reported the unit was work-

ing on Thursday. He said that he would check with the head cook's daily temperature records to be assured the unit is working properly before moving the food from the other freezer. The records are required by the federal government for schools which receive commodities, Hays said.

Al Clemmons, a representative of Quinn and Company, financial advisors for the school, told the board that the school could sell about \$190,000 in bonds in 45 days. He opined that the school should wait until August, when the land transaction with the U.S. Forest Service would raise the school's assessed value. He said that the transaction could not be completed until summer, because of the lengthy bureaucratic process involved.

The board agreed to wait until August, but said it would inform Clemmons when the school was near a commitment from the Forest Service so he could begin the bond process.

The board briefly discussed the financial aspects of the annual Smokey Bear Classic Tournament. Board president McDaniel requested that a financial statement of tournament costs and revenues be made available to the board at its February meeting. McDaniel said the board might consider future changes in the dates and length of the tournament.

In other business, the board: —Discussed two dental plans available to the school staff and declined an additional option for vision care. The dental plan will be voted on by the staff.

—Approved the unbudgeted activity funds after Hays reported that the Future Farmers of America paid off a listed debt after December 31 because of the Christmas holidays.

—Approved the budgeted athletic funds.

—Heard a report that sixteen Apple computers were installed in the elementary classes.

Capitan citizens' group endorses candidates

The Capitan Concerned Citizens Group gathered Monday night at the fair building to establish a platform and endorse candidates for mayor and trustees.

The group, led by W.F. Eckland, unanimously approved Vernon Kelly Beavers as their candidate for

mayor. Beavers was reluctant to run because of two previous unsuccessful tries for the seat. Members in the group of more than 30 persons said that Beavers is the most informed person on village issues because of his term as a trustee.

Beavers said that he is concerned most with the issues of the grant money for the filter plant and the upcoming bond election. Beavers

said he wanted to use the grant money for the filter plant. He said that he wants to incorporate the well into the village system at some later time, after the filter is upgraded.

The group also endorsed Dave Rouleau and Eckland as candidates for trustees. Rouleau reviewed his research into the water situation and stated that he wanted the water

upgrade to be a priority. Eckland agreed with Beavers and Rouleau about the water filter and system.

Eckland closed the meeting by telling the group that more meetings will be scheduled before mid February. He said the group would begin its campaign after that time because of the high costs of advertising and ineffectiveness of early campaigning.

More than 125 conservationists, mostly district officials representing the 47 New Mexico soil and water conservation districts, recently attended the 39th Annual Meeting of the New Mexico Association of Conservation Districts (NMACD) in Albuquerque.

Milton E. Mekelburg, immediate past president of the National Association of Conservation Districts, urged the conservationists to be constantly vigilant of trends and priorities of soil and water conservation programs at the federal level. He advised the officials to develop a better

understanding of the political process and pressures facing conservation legislation.

Also at the meeting Gary Hightower, Carrizozo rancher and member of the Carrizozo district, was named as the Outstanding Rancher for 1985.

Myrtis Pfingsten, of Hondo, was elected treasurer of the association's ladies' auxiliary. Also at the meeting were Clem Weindorf,

president of the Upper Hondo Soil and Water Conservation District, and members Ken Cole, Shirley Goodloe and Sue Stearns.

The NMACD, a private, non-profit organization, represents the state's districts to advance their cause and that of the thousands of individuals and groups they serve. It is operated by its member districts and is financed by contributions.






