## Airport builders plan construction cuts

Engineers for the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport revealed during a Thursday Sierra Blanca Airport Commission workshop that cuts are being made in construction plans because "funding was going to be a problem."

Earl Cooke of Leedshill-Herkenhoff, project engineers, said that a crosswind runway was not included in construction plans.

"It's not 100 percent positive that you need one," he added. Cooke

said a stageback in paving thickness also was designed to cut initial costs. He said as traffic develops the thickness can be increased to bear the heavier loads.

Commission chairman Fred Heckman and commissioners Conrad Buchanan and Ken Nosker spent most of Thursday in a detailed review of engineering plans.

The workshop session was suddenly interrupted when State Representative Ben Hall arrived and commissioner Buchanan called for an executive session to discuss "possible threatened litigation and

acquisition of real property."

Commissioners conducted a closed session with Hall and Cooke.

Engineers were questioned during the regular meeting Thursday afternoon about construction specifications included in the plans. Commissioners, who asked many questions about the plans, wondered if the plans would be clear to the contractor.

"If a contractor gets confused ... he probably doesn't have much experience," said Cooke.

Cooke suggested a prequalifying process for contractors bidding on the project, however county attorney Steve Sanders, the commission's legal adviser, wondered how a determination could be made.

Buchanan then expressed concern that the contractor who is awarded the bid pay subcontractors promptly so that they can pay local suppliers on time.

"What I'm trying to do is protect local people," said Buchanan, reminding commissioners that the airport will be one of the largest projects ever for this area.

Sanders said such a requirement could be included in the construction contract.

The review continued with commissioners discussing water sources, access roads and related subjects. Heckman said an executive session would be the last item on the agenda for discussion of the acquisition of water rights.

Commissioners Wendell Chino and Benny Coker were not present for the regular monthly meeting. The commission will meet next at 1:30 p.m. Thursday, February 20.

## Lincolmites, land sale fog new airport progress

The Sierra Blanca Airport Commission, planning a regional airport on Fort Stanton mesa, is not the only area group interested in the airport project.

As the commission works with engineers on construction plans and solicits proposals for an engineering contract administrator, the Ruidoso Village Council wrestles with questions surrounding the disposal of the Ruidoso Municipal Airport and the village's financial obligation toward the regional facility.

A loosely organized group of county residents are working to see that the airport is never built.

Lincoln residents, with Jeremy and Cleis Jordan as their most visible spokesmen, turned out in force at a recent environmental meeting on the airport. They originally opposed building the regional facility so near their town, but Jeremy Jordan said he has become concerned about other factors as well as the preservation of historic Lincoln.

His wife says the "sheer financial burden" of a facility that so few people will use is one reason they oppose the airport.

The Jordans want to know where the money for the airport will come from, and they also ask what airlines have indicated a willingness to serve the SBRA. Jordan lists size and weight constraints from airport plans, as well as the size of the Ruidoso market, as detractors to major airlines.

Jordan has studied the environmental assessment prepared by EnviroSphere Inc. upon the instructions from the Federal Aviation Administration and opines that the conclusion—to build a new airport—does not agree with evidence in the report.

"I've just tried to study it (EA) and not be emotional," said Jeremy Jordan, who says he won't give up until a final finding on the environmental impact is released.

The Jordans point to the assessment's findings that closing the cur-

rent airport with no replacement would have little impact on the economy. They also find the benefits in increased tourism listed with the new airport as minimal compared to the cost of the huge project.

Jordan has studied the accidents reported at the Ruidoso Municipal Airport, and said that National Traffic Safety Board statistics indicate that pilot error was the cause of most aircraft mishaps. He said the safety issue has become an emotional one, but wondered why a school was built so close to an already existing airport.

The Jordans suggest that moving a school would be less expensive than moving the airport.

"People will continue to flock to Ruidoso—but they'll come by car," said Jordan, adding that tourists need a car to enjoy the area—listing Lincoln, White Oaks and other sites as possible tourist attractions.

"It's a perception you get that once a steamroller gets started you can't stop it," said Cleis Jordan, adding that people do win.

Until the environmental issue of the Kuenzler hedgehog cactus, an endangered species, is resolved, the Jordans and other area residents will continue in efforts to block the airport.

In the meantime the Ruidoso Village Council has awarded a contract to obtain an appraisal on the current airport land, the next step to clearing the way to abandon the current airport and cooperate in the operation of the regional facility. Councillors have indicated they wish to keep the land for municipal use.

Members have debated during recent meetings as to what the FAA will require from the village, and how to keep the amount of money required as payment for the airport, which is jointly owned by the FAA and Ruidoso, to a minimum.

Discussions have centered on whether or not the zoning of the land will affect the appraisal price,

and when the FAA will expect payment for the land.

Discussions have not included how the money will be obtained.

Bill Howard, manager of the FAA Airports District Office in Albuquerque, has said in several interviews that Ruidoso will be expected to contribute the fair market price of the current airport land into the SBRA.

In a letter to Mayor George White, dated January 16, Howard reiterated that requirement, saying:

"During the past many years that we have worked with you and other Village officials to replace the existing Ruidoso Municipal Airport, we have consistently advised that we would require the Village to reinvest the current fair market value of the present airport property in FAA-approved items of development at the replacement site without further Federal matching funds."

Howard referred to "recent public debate" as "disturbing" to FAA officials, and listed FAA requirements that include using the "highest and best uses" in appraising the airport land.

"Any part or all of the existing airport property may be retained by the Village, but the requirement for reinvestment of the fair market value in the replacement site remains the same," continues the letter, which also states that reserving the property for municipal purposes will not influence the land's value.

Howard asked the mayor to sign a supplemental agreement including the amount of money to be invested in the SBRA airport by the Village of Ruidoso, with "said amount representing the fair market value of the Ruidoso Municipal Airport."

Councillors will be expected to furnish the FAA with a plan for disposing of the airport, according to Howard's letter.

## Public input sought on phone company

The New Mexico State Corporation Commission (SCC) will have a public meeting in Ruidoso at 7:30 p.m. Tuesday, January 21, at Ruidoso Village Hall.

The purpose of the meeting is to receive testimony relating to the quality of New Mexico telephone service provided by Continental Telephone of the West (Contel).

According to Tomas Martinez, executive assistant to the chairman of the SCC, Contel petitioned for a rate increase in November 1985. The commission has six months to make a decision on the request.

Public meetings in Ruidoso, Truth or Consequences and Espanola—the New Mexico areas serviced by Contel—will garner information to aid the commission in its decision, which must be made by May 1986.

Contel requested a \$2.3 million increase, said Martinez. Contel already is collecting part of that amount in the form of a \$4 monthly increase which took effect on November 1, 1985.

The November increase was the result of a settlement issue with Mountain Bell. Martinez said that

in 1984, Mountain Bell collected \$13 million from the independent companies (including Contel) that used its lines, and paid back \$26 million from a settlement pool at the end of the year.

"Mountain Bell's customers were subsidizing the independent companies," said Martinez.

The SCC phased out the settlements and allowed the independent companies to raise their rates by \$4 per month. The \$4 increase still is subject to question, said Martinez.

## Council appoints P&Z member, mulls finances

Mayor Pro-tem Jerry Shaw appointed Melody Vuicich to the Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission during a special meeting of the Ruidoso Village Council Friday.

Vuicich will fill the vacancy left by the resignation of commissioner Karon Petty.

The new commissioner is an owner of Evelyn's, and is president of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce Greeters.

Councillors adjourned the special meeting within 10 minutes, and went into session as the Finance Board for the village.

Village manager Jim Hine distributed copies of the village fund revenue and expenditure summary showing mid-year figures, and then led the council through a

line-by-line review.

"Well, are we going to run into trouble on our total budget?" asked Village Councillor Victor Alonso, and Hine indicated that most departmental budgets are on target.

"The cuts that you put in a couple of months ago are all reflected in this report," said Hine.

The manager revealed that insurance costs are "playing havoc" with budgets in several departments, including the Police Department. He complimented Police Chief Richard Swenor for keeping a tight rein on police overtime costs.

Councillors questioned administrators about budgets that receive funds from various sources, and indicated they'd like to see income and expenses clearly defined as to sources and intended use.

"Thanks to one of our citizens,

Ralph Rush came to us and wanted full accounting for what we've made on the slide," said Hine in explaining the swimming pool budget. Hine said an agreement made when the slide was purchased from Rush calls for paying him 10 percent of the gross income for five years after the slide produces \$30,000 in gross income.

This year the village paid Rush \$982.50, and Hine explained that the obligation will continue for four more years.

"Why don't you just change the way you collect money at the front gate," suggested Village Councillor Rick Evans.

The Sewer Department also has incurred an unbudgeted expense with the purchase of a new truck, said Hine.

"When a truck breaks down you have no choice," he added.

In reviewing the airport budget, Hine said business was not up, but collections were increased after that department ended last fiscal year with accounts receivable of around \$92,000.

"It (the accounts receivable) became very alarming to us," said Hine, who said airport personnel "started collecting." Those collections show up as revenue on the current budget.

When Alonso asked Hine if the airport is going to be self-sustaining, Hine answered that it would not.

"That's disappointing considering we raised the parking fee by 50 percent," said Alonso.

Hine said the cost of utilities is hurting the wastewater plant operated jointly with Ruidoso





Downs, and the expenditure summary indicated the budget for that fund is 61 percent spent at the mid-year mark.

He explained measures that were taken to reduce costs for the Building Maintenance Department. Cuts included moving into a smaller, rent-free building.

Assistant village manager Frank Potter said two new sanitation trucks were ordered, but haven't been received because the manufacturer has filed for "chapter 11 or 13 or something."

Village Councillor Bill Karn questioned Potter on current truck usage, and was told that trucks operate as early as 1:30 a.m. as an economy measure—with longer hours for trucks using two crews to avoid overtime costs.

Potter said the two new trucks, when received, along with the trash compactor, should save the village money.

Alonso suggested that money for demolishing buildings identified as

dangerous by the Board of Appeals, Abatement of Dangerous Buildings will soon be needed.

"We're legally obligated," said Mayor Pro-tem Shaw, in agreeing that funds should be found.

"We've created our own monster," said Village Councillor William A. "Dub" Holt of the abatement board.

Hine, who referred to discussions during last Tuesday's council meeting on distribution of village funds, told councillors that village monies are within \$112,000 of being "equitably deposited" among local banks.

After hearing a suggestion by Potter that the council hear updates from the village engineer on village projects, a workshop session was scheduled at 5:30 p.m. Tuesday, January 23, for that purpose.

"Compared to last year I can say that expenses are under and receipts are within two percent of the same," said Hine of the overall budget.

"We deserve some credit," added Potter.

# Special Olympians compete

"I've watched hundreds of kids in the Special Olympics program, and everytime I get a thrill watching them succeed," said Captain special education teacher Mary Lee Gates as the New Mexico Special Olympics (NMSO) got underway last Wednesday at Ski Cloudcroft.

Some 175 athletes, ages 8 to 45, met on the slopes, hills and skating rinks of Cloudcroft to not necessarily win an athletic event, but to be considered an athlete, a "winner," for a few brief hours in the hills of Otero County.

The NMSO costs the state office about \$9,000 in revenue to execute every year, according to Jeanne Culbertson, director of the New Mexico Special Olympics.

"It's a big part of our budget, but it is what we are all about. Our entire budget comes from donations, and we are here for the athletes, and nothing else," Culbertson said.

"But private individuals or groups can make an enormous difference in our overall success. For instance, Ski Cloudcroft does not charge us for the use of the ski lift or any of the ski equipment that the athletes use. This saves the NMSO about \$6,000 to \$9,000 in itself," Culbertson said.

"Several Ruidoso groups are

helping us too. The Altrusa and the Rotary clubs donated all the lunches for everyone, and Beta Sigma Phi donated all the hot chocolate," Culbertson said.

The Fort Stanton Hospital and Training School for the Mentally Handicapped and the Developmentally Disabled sent a few students to the NMSO along with ceramics teacher Pam Payne and production supervisor/instructor Laura Jones.

"I came last year as a ski coach, and it made me so happy to see the students doing well in an environment outside the Fort Stanton facility, I just had to come back again this year," Payne said.

Jones echoed Payne's sentiments. "Pam got me to go this year, and I know the students can somehow in some way better themselves after what I have seen today," Jones said.

For two days the coaches, chaperones, directors and everyone involved with the NMSO knew their hard work and planning had been matched by people who pushed the odds beside to be something special.

For two days in Cloudcroft they stole the village spotlight. They were athletes and winners, not for the skills they showed perhaps, but for the efforts they made just to reach the finish line or even compete.

# Retiring Downs Mayor Day supports Branum for mayor

Ruidoso Downs Mayor J.C. Day cites spinal arthritis as the reason he is not seeking re-election this year. In a recent interview, Day reviewed his term in office and told The News that he supports Trustee Jackie Branum in her mayoral campaign.

Day said Ruidoso Downs has come a long way since he became mayor in 1982. He noted "vast improvements" in village equipment and amount of personnel. He cited the shop and street equipment and Sanitation Department improvements as more examples.

The mayor commended Branum, the sanitation commissioner, on her department's improvements and her recent proposal to amend the sanitation ordinance.

"I think the move that Jackie Branum made in getting the dumpsters was very good for cleaning up the village," said Day. "Under the former system, we were a trashy little town," he added.

Day also noted improvements in the Police Department, which he said lacked adequate funds and vehicles when he began his term

four years ago.

The mayor said he would like to see the village continue to grow in a reasonable fashion and hopes that started programs are completed. Day said that if the requested grant project is executed, one-fourth of the Downs' roads will be paved.

"I've lived here 18 years and I'm just as tired as other people of the roads that are dusty when it's dry and muddy when it's wet," he said of the unpaved streets in the Downs.

Day said the village should progress within its means and that it is doing better, financially, than it has ever done. Part of the financial health is due to sales tax collected from concessions sold at Ruidoso Downs Race Track, a program which began last summer, he said.

Day opined that Ruidoso Downs and the whole valley are ideal areas for growth. He said the track enlargement will help the Downs and the new luxury hotel will be "the icing on the cake."

The mayor said he would like the next administration to be aware of zoning and to keep visible highway frontage "nice to look at."

Day said he supports Branum in her mayoral campaign. He said she

has been a volunteer on the planning and zoning commission and has attended many meetings that have been important to the village. Branum has been a village trustee for two years, he added.

"She feels as I do—obligated to the majority of the people, not a select few," said Day.

One area in Downs government which Day said he felt needs improvement is participation. The outgoing mayor said he would like to see more people involved with local government, checking the agendas and attending village meetings.

"The council has to do what they think best," said Day. "People don't come to the meetings, yet they complain about the outcomes."

Day said he felt dissension has slowed progress in the Downs.

"I don't think that people are glib enough to see that more progress has not been made in Ruidoso Downs because of people's animosity towards each other," said Day, adding that he felt the situation has improved during his term.

The mayor said that people used to call the village trustees'

meetings "the Monday night fights."

"If people spend more energy improving, rather than tear each other down, the Downs would be a better place to live," said Day.

Day said his future hopes for the village include the annexation of the land in the valley between Ruidoso Downs and Biscuit Hill. The mayor also said he would like to see Ruidoso Downs receive more recognition as a village.

"A lot of people don't realize we're here. They refer to Ruidoso as the village and Ruidoso Downs as the racetrack," he said.

Day and his wife, Betty, have lived in Ruidoso Downs for 18 years, 12 of which he spent as the maintenance supervisor at Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Hospital.

Now retired, Day said he would like to continue to participate in village government if his health allows. He said that spinal arthritis prevents him from doing all that he would like to do.

"Some people even think I'm anti-social because I can't attend all the events I'm invited to," said Day.

Because of his health, Day said he "wouldn't feel fair" asking the public to re-elect him.



Ruidoso High School's boys varsity basketball team split a pair of close games over the weekend.

Ruidoso's junior varsity lost a







## Trustees grapple with water issue

Ted Asbury, the water engineer hired in 1983 by the Village of Capitan to study and design the water system and filter, told the village trustees that putting grant money into the new well is a "gamble" that could leave the village with "a whole bunch of nothing."

Speaking before a capacity crowd at the village meeting Monday, Asbury asked the trustees to consider using his firm to conduct the water system priorities study for the upcoming bond issue. He said that his firm conducted a study of the water system prior to the discovery of the new water well.

Asbury said that the study, at present, is 80 percent complete for the village water system and that a study of the well easily could be incorporated into his present research with less expense than hiring a different engineering firm to make a new study.

Mayor David Cummins called a special meeting Thursday evening to review the engineering proposals for the water study. The trustees recently applied for a grant to pay for an independent water study to define priorities for the voters before the March election.

Asbury said he felt the well needed extensive evaluation.

"It's foolish to put \$600,000 into the well without it," he said.

Asbury emphasized the need for a filter system to upgrade the Eagle Creek and Bonito Lake water presently used by the village. He asked the trustees what they would do if the cost of connecting the well to the village system is more than \$1 million, the amount the village would have if the \$600,000 bond issue passes in March.

The village presently has \$590,000 in grant funds for the water projects. Trustee Norm Renfro stated the village would not pay more than \$1 million.

Trustee Benny Coker said that he wanted to emphasize the new well because the village has no rights to Bonito Lake water. He agreed that in 1983, when Asbury began the water study, the village had no other source of water; but Eagle Creek and Bonito Lake needed an extensive filter system to upgrade the quality of the water. He also said that it is possible that Eagle Creek will produce little water this year.

"It's naive to think that the filter will solve all the problems," Coker said.

Coker said he wanted the well tested in order to revise the filter plans to fit the water situation if the well is incorporated.

Cummins agreed that the well needs testing first. If the tests prove satisfactory, the costs to bring the well water to town should be outlined, said the mayor.

Asbury said his firm could outline the costs to transmit the water from the well to the storage tanks in the village, including booster pumps to the subdivisions.

Trustee Kelly Beavers agreed that Asbury is on the "right track" by including the costs to transmit the well water to the subdivisions. Beavers previously expressed concern that the well water would not be available to the residents in the subdivisions which are in upper elevations of the village.

Cummins told Asbury that his proposal would be considered with the others at the special meeting Thursday evening.

In other business, the trustees: —Heard a report from village attorney John Underwood that the Capitan Planning and Platting Subdivision Regulations Committee met for additions and corrections to the regulations and that the final public hearing, before passage of the regulating ordinance, will be at 5:30 p.m. Monday, February 10, at the village hall.

—Named Barbara Sanchez and Linda Wright as election board clerks and Margaret Rench as election judge for the municipal election to take place on Tuesday, March 4, at the fair building.

—Increased the emergency medical services budget by \$1,037 with the receipt of a grant.

## Capitan has special water meeting

Capitan Mayor David Cummins told a capacity crowd at the special meeting Thursday night in Capitan that engineering proposals will be considered for the development and construction of the new water well and its facilities and transmission lines, rather than a full study of the water situation in the village.

The village received five proposals for the well facility, but they did not include the testing of the well for quality and quantity of the water. Cummins said the proposals were submitted after the trustees changed the scope of use of the \$593,000 filter plant grant last year, to allow the village to use the money for the well. Since that time the transfer of the village water rights from the existing wells (near the village) to the new well, was challenged, halting the project.

After considerable discussion between the trustees and village residents present, Cummins called another special meeting for 7 p.m. Friday, January 24, at the fire hall. He told the trustees to review the proposals, evaluate each one based on a list of guidelines developed by Bill Weber of the New Mexico Environmental Improvement Division (EID) and submit their final decisions in a sealed envelope to be opened at the Friday meeting.

Cummins told the group about the

preliminary hearing for the water protest, which took place earlier that day at the state water engineer's office in Roswell. The engineer told Cummins and trustee Benny Coker that the village cannot test-pump the well until the water protest is settled, because the village has no water rights to the new well. The final hearing is scheduled for June.

At the Thursday night meeting, a resident questioned why engineer Ted Asbury said Monday night that he could get the rights to test the well.

Cummins reminded the group that the well was tested for 24 hours by engineer Jack Atkins just after the well was drilled. The test was allowed by the state on a special waiver. Cummins said the results of that test, which were certified by an independent laboratory in Roswell, are available for public review at village hall.

Coker said he is satisfied with the existing tests, but has no argument against getting a second opinion. He said the only problem is when the additional tests can be made. Cummins said the village would try to find a way to test the well before the bond election on March 4.

Another argument Thursday night was whether to review and accept any of the proposals presented to the trustees. Weber suggested the trustees review the proposals and evaluate each firm on the basis of costs, design, experience and technical ability.

Trustee Kelly Beavers questioned where the money will come from to pay for the proposals. Coker reminded Beavers that the village recently applied for a Community Development Block Grant (CDBG), for up to \$25,000, to pay for the cost of the proposal for the design of the well pump, well treatment plant and transmission lines to the village. Coker said the village would know if the grant is approved by February 28, and that the chances seem favorable.

Beavers' main objection to the proposals was that the testing of the well for water quality and quantity was not included. He wanted the village to request the firms who submitted proposals to include the well tests.

The trustees questioned the legality of requesting the additional tests under the state procurement code, which requires any proposals to be called for by letter or

newspaper advertisements. Village Clerk Virginia Spall said she would call the state Department of Finance and Administration to see if the tests could be added to the existing proposals.

Jack Pogue, a Capitan resident, suggested the trustees evaluate the proposals, select a firm and negotiate for the additional well tests. Pogue also suggested that if the well does not prove satisfactory, the proposal for the well development should become null and void.

Pogue said he wanted the well developed because he heard of the possibility that Alamogordo may dredge Bonito Lake this summer, cutting off the main supply of water to the village. Dave Locke, a candidate for village trustee, said he spoke with the Alamogordo city manager and confirmed that the city is planning to dredge the lake, but is waiting on approval by state officials.

Cummins reminded the group that the village has no rights to Bonito Lake water, and that if purchases surplus water from Alamogordo. He also said that neither the proposed new filter plant nor the new well would do the village "any good this summer."


Weber confirmed Cummins' comments, stating that it would take at least one year to complete studies and construction of any of the projects, if started now.

The general consensus of the group present Thursday night was to seek a second opinion on the well to assure the voters that passage of the \$600,000 general bond issue is needed. The trustees and residents agreed that if property taxes are doubled with the passage of the bond, the voters need to know why.

In other business, the trustees: —Instructed Spall to check with various insurance companies to see if items in the Smokey Bear Museum, listed by the inspector as unsafe, need improvement; and, if so, to comply by calling for bids to construct a rear exit door, reset a stone and upgrade the fire extinguishers.

—Selected Dorothy Smith as an alternate election judge and Duffy Morton as an alternate election clerk.

—Set the dates for the temporary closure of the village Motor Vehicle Division as January 29, February 3 and 5.

## New bank reduces staff

Robert Hays, president of newly opened First National Bank of Ruidoso, reported that approximately 20 of the 45 former First National Bank of Lincoln County (previously Moncor) personnel were retained by his new bank after it moved locations from the Mechem Drive office to the Sudderth Drive office.

The new bank was formed on December 16, 1985, when the holding company that owns First National Bank of Alamogordo purchased the former First National

Bank of Lincoln County from the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation (FDIC). The old bank had been declared insolvent by the U.S. Office of the Comptroller of the Currency and taken over by FDIC.

Hays said that the old bank's top management were never part of the new bank's payroll. Other bank employees remained with the new bank temporarily during the transition period. Some went to work for FDIC, said Hays.

"They (the old bank) had 45 employees," said Hays. "We always thought we'd need about 20—that's where we are now," he said.

The bank president said he felt

his staff is down to the level where there will be no more layoffs.

Hays said he is pleased with the reception the new bank has received in the community.

Future plans include the restructuring of interest accounts due to federal deregulation. On January 1, 1986, Federal Regulation Q, which governed interest rates banks paid on deposit, was eliminated, said Hays.

Hays said the bank will not reopen the automated teller machine used by the old bank. He said the machine is not cost effective and that it averaged only 200 transactions per month.




A few days ago in his radio broadcast, Paul Harvey said there is no struggle between good and evil.

## Editorial

When decisionmaking becomes too painful for a governing body, perhaps it's time for that group to disband.

The Ruidoso Village Council last Tuesday took no action on item after item. Members seemed determined not to go on record for or against anything.

Five recommendations from the Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission were returned to that volunteer group for further review—four of the five were not even thoroughly discussed by the elected village officials.

After yet another confused discussion on the demolition of dangerous buildings, councillors opted to return a request to another volunteer board without studying the ordinance and acting on the request.

One decision that was made—to declare a state of emergency because of the loss of a five-million-gallon water tank at Alto Lake—came only after pressure from village administrators. Councillors gave the administration a free hand to solve the problems, avoiding any further decisions.

Could upcoming elections, with four of the six councillors running for office, have anything to do with the body's reluctance to take a firm stand on anything?

Perhaps the council should disband until after elections, and reorganize when they're feeling a little more secure.—fj

## Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE—Historian Barbara Tuchman says wise things on many topics. In her latest book, *The March of Folly*, she makes an observation that might explain the state of mind of many of our state's legislators, especially those serving in the House, as they gather for next week's session.

Her words go like this: "Intelligent government would require that the persons entrusted with high office should formulate and execute policy according to their best judgement, the best knowledge available, and a judicious estimate of the lesser evil. But re-election is on their minds, and that becomes the criterion."

Savor that last sentence and you will understand, among other things, why almost no legislators, even in the closing days before they begin their deliberations, are willing to share with us, the citizens of the state, their honest answer to this honest question: What exactly do you propose doing to solve the problem of the state's declining revenues?

It is not that they do not have plans. The man who leads the Senate, Les Housley, to name only one, has had a massive tax increase measure drawn up for introduction. But they do not trust the citizenry enough to let us know the details of their proposals in advance. They avoid candor, and choose to hold their cards close to their vests. That way, they hope, they can manipulate the process, not to provide that form of intelligent government Mrs. Tuchman speaks of, but to take care of selfish needs, such as their own continuance in power.

All who believe, with Governor Anaya, that the Democratic party "will be resurrected in 1986" in New Mexico may now hold up their right hands.

Hmmmm. There don't appear to be many of you who hold to Anaya's true faith.

Of course, as the Governor freely admits, not even he has always been able to lift high the torch. He told that gathering of Democrats in Albuquerque last week at which he prophesied the party's resurrection that until six months ago he himself had been "at the head of the list of doomsayers" when the fortunes of the party were discussed. What exactly had caused his religious conversion since that time he did not specify.

The tone of religious metaphor for this discussion was not set by choice of this commentator. Anaya himself, just back that day from experiencing the religious-political fervors of Jesse Jackson, chose to talk in these terms. Perhaps his highest flare of fancy occurred when he compared himself to Christ, the Reverend Martin Luther King and others whose lives ended in literal martyrdom.

(Good taste has never been one of Anaya's oratorical strong points.)

A point the Governor seems to miss is that the obloquy suffered by those genuine heroes he cites was unmerited. A man does not incur martyrdom simply by suffering the slings and arrows his own missteps and misstatements have brought

down on his head.

The problem of workman's compensation insurance grows worse, not better.

A Santa Fe district judge has ruled insurance companies may put into effect immediately the 37.1 percent rate increase they have asked for, pending resolution of court action on the issue. That's a jump of more than a third in costs for this obligatory coverage many companies complain are already backbreakingly high.

The judge's ruling seemed to say that action by the state Corporation Commission on December 10 suspending initiation of the higher rate was illicit. Such a conclusion would surprise no one familiar with the actions of that Commission, which for the last three years has turned itself into the Larry, Moe and Curly Show of state government.

One of that group's members has lately taken to telling those in bars he frequents what gory punishments await some local citizens presumably (including this writer, one of his favorite targets) when "we take over."

It's that kind of less-than-rational behavior on the job and off, that has destroyed what little respect for this body had been left after its years of blowing hither and yon with every political wind.

"Pardon me sir, I'm having quite a few weather problems, and you seem to be laughing at me," I declared.


"Are you from Ruidoso?" the restaurant owner asked.


