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GET EM'-Lawmen nab two dozen in early morning narcotic raids

"GET EM," an undercover operation launched in July by the Lincoln County Sheriff's Department, culminated early January 25 with a drug raid that netted more than 20 arrests.

Area law enforcement agencies cooperated in the carefully planned operation, with 38 officers hitting the streets at 5 a.m. Saturday to arrest suspects named in sealed indictments by a special grand jury that met all day Friday, January 24.

Some of the 30 suspects named in the indictments still are at large, according to Lincoln County Under-Sheriff Charlie Cox, but he said several were already in jail on other charges, and one suspect was arrested Sunday.

Sheriff Tom Sullivan said he was especially pleased that the raid included the arrest of one person suspected of being the major drug supplier to Ruidoso High School students.

By late Sunday "GET EM" had resulted in 92 narcotics charges being filed against 47 defendants, according to the Sheriff's Office.

Sullivan, in a Saturday morning news conference, said an undercover agent purchased drugs from each of the suspects named in the indictments. He said the charges were a result of those "clean buys," meaning that a third party or a "snitch" was not involved.

The agent spent \$1,300 to purchase the drugs, and Sullivan said more arrests could have been made had the department had the funds to make further buys. He said the operation will continue.

Drugs seized during the operation and prior to Saturday's raid were valued at \$40,000, according to the Sheriff.

Besides the drugs, he said the operation provided information that cleared up 22 burglaries, several larceny cases and resulted in the arrest of a murder suspect wanted in Dallas County, Texas. Sullivan said the department recovered \$25,000 in stolen property during the narcotics investigation.

Law enforcement officers from the Sheriff's Department, Ruidoso Police Department, Ruidoso Downs Police Department, Capitan Police Department, New Mexico State Police, Roswell Police Department and Las Cruces Metro Narcotics Unit worked with representatives from the 12th Judicial District Attorney's Office on the investigation.

For Saturday's operation, designed to make as many arrests as possible simultaneously, officers gathered at the Lincoln County Sub-office in Ruidoso and were divided into 13 teams. They were instructed on legal methods by Assistant District Attorney Harry Wilcox Jr.

"There may be some opportunities to get search warrants," said Wilcox, who explained that if drugs or paraphernalia were observed "in plain view," the arresting officers could "freeze the scene" and ask the judge standing by for a warrant.

"We need to hit the streets," said Cox just after 5 a.m. "We'll hit at the same time ... hit it and secure it," said Cox, cautioning officers, "we don't want anybody shot."

By 8:30 a.m. the teams had made most of the arrests and returned the suspects to the sub-office where they were booked, fingerprinted and photographed before being transported to the Lincoln County Jail in a Carrizozo school bus.

Named in the grand jury indictments, and arrested Saturday, according to police, were:

conspiracy, with bond set at \$50,000.

—Kurt Hesse, 19, of Ruidoso, charged with one count of distribution of a controlled substance (marijuana) and two counts of conspiracy, with bond set at \$50,000.

—Joel Walker, 20, of Tularosa, charged with one count of conspiracy, with bond set at \$50,000.

—Rita Carrell, 25, of Ruidoso Downs, charged with two counts of distribution of a controlled substance (marijuana), with bond set at \$50,000.

—William "Bill" Stengel, 26, of Ruidoso, charged with two counts of distribution of a controlled substance (marijuana), with bond set at \$50,000.

—Shawn Childress, 18, of Ruidoso, charged with one count of conspiracy, with bond set at \$50,000.

—Duane Shannon, 30, of Ruidoso, charged with one count of conspiracy, with bond set at \$50,000.

—Mark Robinson, 19, of Tularosa, charged with one count of conspiracy, with bond set at \$50,000.

—Gary M. Taylor, 24, of Alamogordo, charged with one count of conspiracy, with bond set at \$50,000.

—Adrian Maldonado, 20, of Ruidoso, charged with two counts of distribution of a controlled substance (psilocybin mushrooms), with bond set at \$100,000.

—Andrea Chavez, 18, of Ruidoso, charged with two counts of conspiracy, with bond set at \$50,000.

—Josephine Rue, 18, of Ruidoso Downs, charged with two counts of conspiracy, with bond set at \$50,000.

—Paul Saenz, 25, of Bent, charged with one count of distribution of a controlled substance (marijuana), with bond set at \$100,000.

—Kelly Junge, 26, of Ruidoso, charged with one count of distribution of a controlled substance (marijuana), with bond set at

\$50,000.

—Jonathan Junge, 24, of Ruidoso, charged with four counts of distribution of a controlled substance (marijuana and methamphetamine), with bond set at \$100,000.

A 16-year-old Ruidoso Downs resident was among those arrested Saturday, but the sheriff declined to release his name.

Named in the indictments, but already jailed on previous drug charges, was Mitchell L. Hinz of Ruidoso Downs, according to police. Hinz, also wanted in Dallas County on murder charges, was charged Saturday with conspiracy, and remains in Lincoln County Jail with bond set at over \$100,000, according to Cox.

A 22-year-old Ruidoso resident, Maurice Pedro, was indicted Friday on two counts of conspiracy and three counts of distribution, police said. He was arrested January 22, and remained in jail Saturday with bond set at \$100,000, according to police.

Another defendant named in the sealed indictments was Quentin Evans, who Cox said was jailed two weeks ago on burglary charges. He remained in jail Saturday as he was charged with one count of distribution of a controlled substance (marijuana), said police.

Two new cases were identified during Saturday's raid and Ruben Polaco, 22, and Lucas Polaco, 23, both of Hondo, were arrested and charged with possession of marijuana, less than an ounce, according to police. They were jailed and bond was set at \$1,000 each, police said.

Mike Shipman, 18, of Capitan, was picked up during the operation on a bench warrant, said Cox.

One suspect, Gilbert Barela, was charged in an Otero County magistrate court with distribution

of a controlled substance (amphetamine), police said. The 20-year-old Alamogordo resident was incarcerated in the Otero County Jail, said Cox.

Mike McClellan was charged with two counts of distribution of a controlled substance (marijuana), but wasn't arrested until Sunday, according to police. The 21-year-old Ruidoso resident's bond was set at \$100,000, police said.

A 22-year-old Alamogordo woman, Dolly Curtis, was arrested and charged with four counts of distribution of a controlled substance, although she wasn't named in the indictments, said Cox. Her bond was set at \$100,000.

Cox said defendants will appear in District Judge Richard Parsons' court beginning today (Monday), January 25.

A driver and two passengers sustained minor injuries when their vehicle overturned down the hill in front of Prime Time restaurant at 11:35 p.m. Friday, January 24.



Lifeline provides a way for elderly to keep in touch

On Wednesday morning, January 22, eighty-nine-year-old Ruidoso resident Gladys Knox became the first person in Lincoln County to receive a personal emergency response system which alerts the staff at Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Hospital (RHVH) when special assistance may be required.

Knox is the first person enrolled in a new service called Hospital Emergency Lifeline Program (HELP), which is designed not only to help someone who needs emergency assistance, but also to enable a person to shorten their stay in the hospital, according to Elynn Anderson, director of the HELP program at RHVH.

In 1983 RHVH conducted a community survey to establish the need for a personal emergency system such as the Lifeline system. Over 85 percent of those who responded to the survey said a personal emergency system was definitely needed in Lincoln County, Anderson said.

After receiving a special grant for rural area hospitals from the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation in Princeton, New Jersey, and a donation of \$10,000 from the Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Hospital Auxiliary, 50 units and the center response (RHVH) unit were purchased, Anderson said.

According to Anderson, personal emergency systems will be issued based on the extent of need by an individual, and in accordance with the population ratio in Lincoln County.

Lifeline western regional manager Connie Knighton said the unit is primarily designed for elderly patients who may need immediate emergency assistance from a hospital, though people with various disabilities of all ages use the unit in other parts of the country.

the unit become operational. The system is designed to give former hospital patients more independence in day-to-day life. If Knox is faced with a personal emergency, she merely has to push the button (shown hanging from her neck), and the hospital will respond to her call for assistance.

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Asbestos pipes no danger, says village

A move last week by the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) to implement an "immediate" ban on five product categories of asbestos won't have any immediate effect on Ruidoso, according to village engineer Mike Davalos.

Davalos confirmed that asbestos pipe was used throughout the pipeline from an Upper Canyon diversion point to the Grindstone Canyon dam, however he said that pipe is already installed and not covered by Thursday's EPA proposal.

The asbestos-cement water pipe will transport raw water, said Davalos. He said water moved through the pipe will be stored in the dam and then processed through a treatment plant before entering the municipal water supply. The village engineer said the treated water will contain no asbestos traces, and should be completely safe.

However Davalos said he is unsure whether the ruling might eventually constrain the village from using the 1,000-or-so feet of asbestos cement pipe left over when the pipeline route was changed.

According to published reports, the EPA estimates asbestos causes 3,300 to 12,000 new cancer cases each year, with nearly all of them fatal within five years.

Besides asbestos cement pipe, the initial ruling will affect clothing used by firefighters, roofing felts, flooring felts and floor tiles.

An EPA spokesman reported the implementation may take over a year. Although new uses will be banned, old asbestos will remain in place, according to the proposal.

Overdue books could lead to court

Over the past three years Ruidoso Public Library (RPL) cardholders have either stolen, lost or failed to return about \$5,000 worth of books, according to Mary Lou Gooch, head librarian.

Gooch estimates that about five percent of library books are not returned each year. Over the past three years RPL cardholders have failed to return \$36 books.

In a January 9 meeting of the RPL Board of Directors, the board passed a motion to begin a new overdue books policy that could lead to a bench warrant from Municipal Judge John Copp. (See related adjacent story)

"I hate to take such drastic measures, but we have tried other things and the results have never been good. I felt I couldn't let things go on the way they were, so I took the matter up with the board," Gooch said.

In December the RPL board declared a two-week amnesty for cardholders with overdue books. No questions were asked, no library cards were revoked and no fines were assigned, but only five books were returned.

"I had to turn the problem over to the board because it was so serious, and under the legal counsel of city attorney John Underwood and Judge Copp we have decided to make people aware that they may be facing a petty larceny charge or even an appearance in Judge Copp's court, if they do not return their overdue books," Gooch said.



Are you in these files? If you have not returned or paid for a book you checked out from the Ruidoso Public library in the last three years, you may be in for a greater penalty than you think.

BOOK RETURN POLICY
Ruidoso Public Library (RPL) cardholder is issued a book for two weeks. Before the two-week period is up, the RPL cardholder will receive a phone call reminding them their book is due at the end of the two-week period.
After two weeks, if the book is not returned, cardholder receives first overdue book notice (white) in the mail.
After another two weeks, if the book is not returned, cardholder receives second overdue book notice (yellow) in the mail.
After another two weeks, if the book is not returned, cardholder receives third overdue book notice (pink) in the mail.
After another two weeks, if the book is not returned, cardholder receives a summons signed by Village Municipal Court Judge John Copp from the RPL. The cardholder has two weeks to either bring the book to the library and pay the overdue fines, or pay for the book if it is lost.
After another two weeks, if the cardholder has not responded to the summons from the RPL, a bench warrant to appear in the municipal court of Judge Copp may be issued. At this time Judge Copp will determine the extent of all fines and penalties the cardholder may incur.

Chamber plans membership drive

Ruidoso Chamber of Commerce president Paul Crown told chamber members that the chamber will have a membership drive on February 5. Crown made the announcement at the chamber's quarterly membership meeting at Cree Meadows Friday.

The membership drive will be a day-long event in which two teams will solicit new members. As with past drives, the teams will be labeled the "good guys" and the "bad guys." Chuck Kemp will head the "good guys" and Buster Hill will lead the "bad guys" team.

Crown said that new members will be able to have a listing in the new Ruidoso brochure, to be printed shortly after the membership drive. Crown said delinquent accounts must be paid by that time to be included in the booklet.

Chamber executive director John Jeffers told the members present that the chamber plans to have a fundraising tele-auction at the end of March. Televised on local Channel 11, the event will be similar to auctions done by the public television stations, in which viewers may call in bids on gifts, vacations and other prizes.

Local entertainment also will be featured on the telecast. Jeffers said he hopes to establish "watching parties" around town. He said his collection goal for the fundraiser is \$2,500.

Each chamber divisional vice president gave a short report of activities that have taken place since the board's planning retreat last May. Barbara DiPaola, vice president in charge of economic develop-

ment, told the group about the committee under her jurisdiction.

DiPaola said that Kay Carpenter is the head of a legislative review committee that will keep chamber members informed of legislation which affects Ruidoso. John Shaw is the head of the transportation committee, and the airport committee is "on hold" for the time being, she said.

Bob Browning is the chairman of the Business Research and Development Committee, which DiPaola reported is actively gathering data about the community. The statistics will be used to promote Ruidoso to interested investors and businesses.

Stanley Dacy, vice president in charge of the Community Development Division, told chamber members that Sue Taylor is the chairman of the Cleanup and Beautification Committee.

Dacy said Taylor's committee is "trying to get the village cleaner and make people aware of what's going on." One way they will try to clean up Ruidoso is by working with Municipal Judge John Copp to have minor offenders do community service. Other clean-up committee activities include the distribution of litter bags and a poster contest to take place in the spring.

Other committees under Dacy's jurisdiction are the Higher Education and Adult Education Task Force, headed by John Underwood, and the Committee to Identify Historical and Artistic Structures, headed by Frank Putler. Putler reported that his committee intends to compile a brochure which tourists can use as a guide to historical landmarks. His committee also will research and plan the 1986 centennial celebration.

Bill Hirschfeld, vice president in charge of the Advertising and Promotion Division, reported on the success of the "Picture Yourself in Ruidoso" winter advertising campaign, which included the reception for "Ruidoso's Family of the Year" in Austin, Texas.

Buddy Burdick, head of the Business Seminar Committee, reported that his committee is working to identify locations for seminars and to compile a list of business and educational groups that have seminars.

"We want to make them aware that Ruidoso would like to have them here," said Burdick.

Jeffers gave a report on the Operations and Management Division, headed by Bill Carrigan, who could not attend the quarterly meeting. Currently, the chamber has 43 members. Jeffers said the membership committee hopes to establish a year-round membership program after February's membership drive.

Jeffers said he would like to see the chamber become accredited by the United States Chamber of Commerce. He reported that a committee, under Carrigan's jurisdiction, will study the requirements.

Jeffers also reported on the activities of the Ruidoso Valley Greeters. The Greeters have had receptions for New Mexico's Washington congressional delegation and for Governor Toney Anaya. They hosted a reception in Austin, Texas, for Anaya and Texas Governor Mark White. Jeffers said the group hopes to represent Ruidoso at the annual meeting of the United States Chamber of Commerce in Washington, D.C., this spring.

Village awaits Eagle Creek water word

Jack Atkins of Atkins and Landfair, the firm representing the Village of Ruidoso on water issues, is awaiting a verdict on his request to the State Engineer's Office to amend an offer of judgment on the Eagle Creek well field.

"Evidently they're having quite a discussion on it," said Atkins, who expected an answer by January 17.

He met recently with representatives of the hydrographics division of the State Engineer's Office

and presented the village's case, asking for an earlier priority date and rights to 100 percent of the water in the Eagle Creek well field.

The state's offer listed a 1984 priority date and granted the village 60 percent of the water determined to be available in the wells.

"I will be more willing to talk to you after Monday," said Edward Yuarde, chief of the hydrographics division, when asked Friday about the status of the request for an

amendment to the offer. "I'm not going to be talking to anybody until it gets to the village," he added.

As of Friday the village water attorney, Neil Stillinger, said he knew of no changes to the offer.

Atkins said he would recommend taking the case to court if the State Engineer doesn't increase the terms of the offer.

"I think we have a very strong case," said Atkins.

Shoplifters will be fined, judge says

"We're seeing a whole flurry of shoplifting here," said Municipal Judge John Copp Thursday.

Judge Copp said shoplifting may look easy, but he would have Ruidoso residents know that it is a crime—specifically petty larceny.

Copp said he has been handling at least one shoplifting case a week, and often two or three.

"In a town this size, that's a lot," he added.

The law allows for a sentence of up to a \$300 fine and as long as 90

days in jail for a shoplifting conviction, explained the judge. He said a typical fine in his court for a first-offender is \$200.

Sometimes Copp adds community service hours to the fine, he said. Although some offenders may shoplift out of desperation, many are accused of stealing cigarettes, liquor and even makeup, said Copp. He advises anyone in need to seek help through established agencies.

"It's a lot less embarrassing to go ask for help," said Copp, since shoplifters are arrested, booked

and fingerprinted before appearing in Municipal Court.

Copp, who said the problem has escalated recently, said he isn't sure whether it's due to the local economy or what, but he hears some strange excuses.

Whatever the reason, the municipal judge says anyone found guilty of shoplifting in his court can expect to pay a fine of no less than \$100.

"It's just something that I want people to understand," said Copp seriously.

In Mescalero, LaFountain is the law

When Richard LaFountain, Bureau of Indian Affairs (BIA) agency special officer at the Mescalero Indian reservation began his new position last September, he wasn't sure what to expect.

He had held a similar position in Browning, Montana, for five years, while working with the Blackfeet Indian tribe.

"The Blackfeet reservation is about 100 miles by 100 miles. Their socioeconomic conditions are bad, and they have a very high crime rate. Every day was a battle, that was for sure," LaFountain said.

LaFountain knew it was time for a change.

"The BIA watches out for burnout and they teach us how to recognize it in ourselves. I needed a change. Things are much better in Mescalero," LaFountain said.

He and his wife, Dorothy, and their two children, Eddie, 15, and Michelle, 3, found a house in Alamogordo and have enjoyed the New Mexico lifestyle so far. LaFountain is beginning to participate in Ruidoso service club activities also.

But life as a supervisory criminal investigator (the New Mexico State Police title that LaFountain prefers), is not without its challenges and pressures on the Mescalero reservation.

LaFountain supervises 22 uniformed BIA officers, which includes the Mescalero jail staff and agency dispatch officers. LaFountain and his police officers must patrol about 400,000

acres of Mescalero lands.

Most of the infractions on the reservation are misdemeanors or petty crimes, but LaFountain often has to work with Reswell FBI agent Hal Roth, because Indian lands are under the federal government's jurisdiction.

At the present time LaFountain and Roth are investigating two unusual cases.

On January 1 a juvenile murdered "an adult Indian male," according to LaFountain.

The case is still under investigation, but the BIA and FBI are almost ready to send their report on the incident to the U.S. attorney general's office in Albuquerque.

LaFountain and Roth also are investigating a somewhat bizarre helicopter poaching incident which took place recently on the Mescalero reservation.

A Mescalero tribal conservation officer recently discovered four deer carcasses which were the result of gunfire from a helicopter,

LaFountain said. "This type of incident infuriates the Mescaleros, and has to be cleared up," LaFountain said.

By and large, LaFountain has maintained excellent relations with the Mescalero Apache Tribal Council (MATC).

"I took over from Mark Chino (MATC president Wendell Chino's son), who was acting supervisor for a few months before I could get here, and things were in pretty good order," LaFountain said.

"Mark (Chino) is in Marana, Arizona, at the U.S. BIA Indian Police Academy right now, serving as an instructor, and waiting for some kind of promotion. He is some kind of police officer, believe me," LaFountain said.

LaFountain said he has enjoyed working with Wendell Chino as well.

"He is an unbelievable leader. I've been in law enforcement a few years now, and I've never seen a man so prepared for any situation. Wendell is a skillful leader, and a good man to work with," LaFountain said.

LaFountain said working with native Americans is both challenging and difficult. There are many legal clashes from the tribal, state, and federal governments that LaFountain must not only be aware of, but also enforce.

But LaFountain has enjoyed the New Mexico climate, and is glad he is finished with the harsh Montana winters. But he is also glad to be working with the Mescalero people who have treated LaFountain and his family with kindness and fairness since his arrival, LaFountain said.

EMT delivers baby girl in ambulance

John Webb, a paramedic with Ruidoso Emergency Medical Services, delivered a baby girl in the early morning hours of January 20, in the back of an ambulance enroute from the Public Health Services (PHS) hospital in Mescalero to the Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Hospital.

The healthy baby girl weighed in at seven pounds, 10 ounces, said Webb, adding that the mother and baby were doing fine when he left them at RHVH.

"That's the neat thing about this job; you get surprised" said Webb.


Since the PHS no longer includes an obstetrics section, Webb said transfer calls are fairly common. PHS obstetrics patients are routinely transferred by ambulance to RHVH, he said.

Monday's call looked routine, said Webb. He and fellow paramedic, Don Mason, began the 20-minute drive with a patient expected to deliver a baby in two or more hours.

"About 10 minutes into the ride everything changed," said Webb.

"The kid decided it was time," he added with a big grin.

Webb said that even though he didn't expect to make the delivery, he followed standard procedure and was prepared for that eventuality. When he was sure the baby wasn't going to wait for the obstetrician standing by at RHVH, Webb asked Mason to stop the ambulance.

"The actual delivery took about 15 seconds," said Webb. During his two-year paramedic training program, Webb said he did one rotation on obstetrics and was trained in emergency deliveries, but this was the first real thing.

Webb has been with Ruidoso EMS for seven months.

"You get your bad calls, trying to prevent death. This was just the opposite, helping someone into this world," said Webb.

"It felt good," he added.

High school basketball coaches all over the country are getting plenty of practice watching games from a sitting position this season. A new rule prohibits a high school basketball coach from standing on the sidelines except for certain situations.

Those situations include taking one step to request verbally and non-verbally a time out, going to the scorers table to discuss a correctable error, standing up to get a player on the bench to replace a disqualified or injured player, and a spontaneous reaction to a positive play by the coach's team.

And most high school coaches do not like the new rule. "I don't like it," said Ruidoso High School head boys coach Gene Segura. "It takes the coaches out of the game. We almost might as well be spectators."

Last season the coaches could walk back and fourth in the bench area, talking to their players.

However, it's all different now, and it seems something has been taken out of high school basketball.

"What I'd like to see in college basketball is something like the coaches' box they have in college basketball," Segura remarked.

"In college, the coach can stand up within two lines in the bench area. But he can't go outside those two lines."

New Mexico Activities Association assistant director Dan Salzwedel says that high school sports is a little different than college sports.

"The purpose of high school activities are to teach morals,

character and the American system of achievement," Salzwedel said.

But it still seems like the new rule has taken some excitement out of the game.

Many spectators like to watch the coach in action during a game, as long as he or she doesn't get too carried away.

But now the coaches are almost restricted to being "advisory spectators".

The rule should be at least modified for the good of the game and the enjoyment of the fans.

For over eight years I, like many of you, attended meetings, signed petitions and made phone calls with the hope of moving the airport. After being elected to the Council and prior to the last fatal crash, I twice asked for an airport progress report and, receiving none, contacted N.M.S.U. to find a means of compromise. From that contact came an invitation to meet on the Mesa with the Board of Regents and State and Federal Officials to discuss their concerns. At that time, I was not aware that I had been the only representative of the Village to receive this invitation. It said "ten local officials" had been invited and I assumed that included the entire Council. After that meeting and many subsequent phone conversations with certain Regents and officials, I went to Las Cruces and obtained an official letter from N.M.S.U. covering their preliminary concerns and delineating possible conditions under which they could move their grass study and gave a copy to each Councilor. In Washington, when the Council had received two "NO's" on the Airport relocation, I introduced the letter, which cleared up the misunderstandings, and asked Senator Domenici to help N.M.S.U. find comparable land and funding to move their research. Senator Domenici read the letter and asked our State Aviation Director if Ruidoso had ever had an Environmental Impact Statement? The answer was "no", only Environmental "assessments." The Senator then pointed out that no land could be transferred, at that time, without an Environmental Impact STATEMENT. When informed that the Village had no matching funds, Senator Domenici found them for us. I was the only Councilor to attend all four local E.I.S. hearings, and at the first session, repeated my request for "comparable land" and "funding" to move N.M.S.U.'s research. At the fourth hearing, N.M.S.U. made these same requests. Since the Washington meeting and the E.I.S. hearings, legislation has been passed that funded the N.M.S.U. relocation and deeded the land to the Sierra Blanca Airport Commission. The new Airport is the result of the long and untiring efforts of the entire community. Without your, and Governor Anaya's constant and unwavering support, nothing could have been accomplished in Washington. As your elected representative, I acted on your behalf. I would like to continue to represent you as your Mayor.

Farmers Home Administration will service delinquent loans

The objective of the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) "is to keep the notion of family farming and ranching alive in this country," said FmHA state director Lou Gallegos. However, some New Mexico agricultural families could lose their livelihood as the FmHA takes steps to service delinquent loans.

Gallegos was in Ruidoso last week to visit the county office and inform area borrowers of the upcoming action. County supervisor Art Baca handles Lincoln and Otero counties from the Ruidoso office.

For the past three years, the government has stopped the FmHA from foreclosing on delinquent accounts, said Gallegos. As of November 1, 1985, the rules were changed, with the concurrence of the courts, so that FmHA may proceed to service those accounts, he said.

During the next week, the FmHA Finance Office will send each county office a list of accounts that were delinquent by \$100 or more as of December 31, 1985. Borrowers will be sent letters informing them of the action and listing seven options that they may choose to ask FmHA to consider.

Delinquent borrowers will have 30 days to respond, choosing one or none of the options. Borrowers who do not respond within the 30-day period will lose their right to appeal, said Gallegos. FmHA issues two type of

agricultural loans, for operational funds and real estate. Gallegos emphasized that loans may be serviced in a variety of ways, without foreclosure.

Choices available to delinquent borrowers include: deferring the loans for up to five years; entering a limited resource program, which provides credit at an interest rate lower than FmHA's regular interest rate; or consolidating and rewriting similar type loans made for operating purposes at new rates and terms.

Other options include: reamortizing the loans by rewriting loans made for real estate purposes at the interest rate of the original note or current loan rate, whichever is the lesser. Operating loans may be reamortized in a similar manner. Other options are subordination of the FmHA lien to another creditor or restructuring the business and debt by selling a portion of the assets.

Borrowers receiving the letters also may pay the accounts current or make restitution for any unauthorized disposal of security. They also may voluntarily liquidate the property by selling it for cash or transferring it to the government or an approved applicant.

Historically, the lowest delinquency occurs on December 31, since most annual loan payments are due on January 1. Baca said that late payments would not be listed on the computer list. Borrowers who are current on their loans should indicate so on the return letter.

Baca estimated that from seven to 12 letters would be issued to farmers and ranchers in the combined Lincoln-Otero County area. His portfolio of farmer loans is \$4,920,131. In this area, the program will not have as big an impact as it will on the east side of the state, where FmHA has a greater number of agribusiness borrowers.

Baca said he will work with his borrowers in considering their chosen options. He said he will review each case to determine the feasibility of the option chosen. If no feasible solution exists, he may have to proceed to the next action, which may lead to foreclosure, he said.

Both Gallegos and Baca said they hope to foreclose as few loans as possible. Gallegos said the FmHA is concerned with land values, were it to foreclose on many loans in one area.

Baca said four to six loans inevitably could be foreclosed in his two-county territory. Some could be paid with livestock and equipment liquidation, he said.

"It's hard to make these opera-

tions cash-flow on paper," said Baca.

"These guys get caught in a price squeeze," said Gallegos, expanding on the reasons for financial problems in agribusiness.

Gallegos said agriculture in New Mexico had one of its best years last year. However, prices were so low that even bumper-crop farmers were short on loan payments.

"Agriculture is still the number-one industry in this country," said Gallegos. "However, it is the only industry that does not put a price tag on its products. They take what's offered, essentially," he said.

"The agricultural industry in this country is very complex. Most of what happens to the farmer or rancher in Lincoln County is way beyond his control," Gallegos added.

The state director said that land has an almost mystical quality to the New Mexico agricultural community. Many operations have been in a family for many years, and losing them could create family tragedies, he said, adding that he hopes to avoid that type of situation whenever possible.

In addition to agricultural loans, FmHA also offers rural farming loans to qualified low-income applicants. FmHA has a total of \$4,428,633 in rural housing loans in Lincoln and Otero counties.

The committee had its second meeting at the chamber Thursday, with chairman Richard "Bud" Browning presiding. Different committee members presented statistics they had gathered and the group discussed what additional information they thought is needed to promote Ruidoso.

Buddy Bundick, manager of Texas-New Mexico Power Company, gave electric cost and revenue figures from 1976 through November 1985. He also reported the total number of active meters from 1980 to 1985. The total number of commercial and residential meters (active and inactive) in the Ruidoso area (excluding Alto) rose from 7,459 in 1980 to 9,736 in 1985.

Mike Gladden, associate superintendent of Ruidoso Municipal Schools, gave a report on the school district from 1975 to 1985. Enrollment rose from 1,229 in 1975 to 1,880 in 1985. District valuation has nearly quadrupled, from \$26,318,253 in 1975 to \$98,101,229 in 1985.

Healthier Barium Dishes gave the Ruidoso Multiple Listing Service sales figures from 1983 through 1985. According to the report, sales for the 1984-1985 period were a record high, \$12,312,351.

Ruidoso village clerk Leon Eggleston and assistant village manager Richard Houk gave statistics on village taxes, licenses and other village information. The statistics will be compiled as they are available. Eggleston presented a long report on the village that his office computer could create different types of reports which they may want to utilize in their jurisdiction.

Richard Dave Bergs, who was absent from the meeting, sent a search registration report listing 11 area churches. Browning presented quarterly real estate sales printed in The News (See Ruidoso News). Tom Hanger presented area snowfall and attendance records.

Most of the committee members agreed on the need to attract light industry to Ruidoso. Browning proposed the future development of an industrial process district that could house local and out-of-town industry.

Chamber executive director John Jeffers suggested the year from a contract form for industrial development. Team members would meet with representatives of companies considering Ruidoso as an location for their operations.

The group also discussed the need for a business center and a call on some of the Ruidoso Chamber Board members. The chamber is currently in the process of building a new office building.

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

Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE—The Governor said it clearly in his speech to open this year's legislative session. In a simple declarative sentence, he enunciated the plain truth. "Let's face it," he said, "we're broke."

This columnist, who has by now written thousands of words in his attempt to be sure our citizens comprehend that message, could not have said it more clearly and crisply.

All together, now. Let's chant it: "We're broke!"

But after the gratitude wears off and the thanks have been given that our chief executive has proved his clear grasp of the situation, a few questions well up to the surface of one's mind.

If that's so, how in the name of all the saints can that same man consider proposing a new executive office building, to be built, if he has his way, at a time when the state is broke?

Isn't there some sort of small contradiction there? And wouldn't you think "conservatives" in the Legislature would remind the Governor of that fact?

Let's go another step and speculate about why "conservatives" might not have done that—or at least why Senators Les Houston and Bill Valentine, who between them have the power to block any action legislators propose to take, appear to be in sympathy with this ill-conceived project.

Have you seen those smiling shots of Houston and Valentine and others who normally oppose anything the Anaya office comes up with that have been all over the place the early part of this week? Houston, Anaya, Valentine and Samberson—all dancing hand in hand with another? What's that about?

Well, the proposed new executive office building could be just one part in what we might call a new and almost entirely surprising coalition. Watching Valentine and Houston give their blessing to the confirmation of Anaya's pal Joe Johnson to run Health and Environment despite some past activities on his part that might otherwise make it tough to get him confirmed could also alert us to the fact that deals are apparently on.

If everybody up here stays sweetness and light in days to come, it might be realistic to observe that those who normally obstruct one another's ways do not suddenly lie down together. Not that is, unless we are in the presence of The Big Deal.

Things to watch for: If we get a bill to fund construction of such a new office building to house the governor and friends, what block will it be built on? That decision could tell us much.

You remember Shirley Scarafioti, Anaya's assistant and confidante? Well, she and some others own a piece of property west of the present capitol building. It could well be that the proposal for this new (and totally unneeded) structure would place the building just there.

Not entirely incidentally, it was Mrs. Scarafioti's daughter, who may be entirely worthy of having the job, who was carefully placed in a position at Health and Environment with a degree of celerity that was surprising to all of us who know the state's normal personnel handling by none other than the aforesaid Joe Johnson.

See how all the pieces fit together?

Broke we may be, but that does not keep the boys and girls from scheming away—always to take care of their interests, and seldom to take care of ours.

Do we need a new building to house everything now in the statehouse except the legislators' quarters?

No way. You might be interested to know that the staff of the present governor is not only the largest ever, but is also almost twice the size those in charge of housing state government projected would be needed in the year 2000. Cut that back to the size it should be, and there will be no call for expanded quarters.

But it's not that situation some lawmakers have their eye on. They actually think they deserve suites of offices all for themselves—and they would spend the money for another state building just to allow themselves that luxury.



A Treasured Gift From Bonnie Scotland
 On January twenty four, the eve of the birthday of Robert Burns, Scotland's beloved poet, Mrs. Catherine Grantham affectionately known as "Scotty", called me up and told me to drop by the Ruidoso Downs Post Office, where she works.

Scotty is a native of Glasgow, Scotland, and last summer she

made a visit to her native land, and brought me a key ring with a sprig of white heather preserved in the clear plastic of the ring handle, also a small color photo of Glencoe, Scotland.

Up at the Post Office this time she held up a color photo of a scottish highland winter scene—something very much like something you might see here in our own valleys, and yet with a charm all its own.

It was of the Dalness mountains, with the Vale of Glencoe running through. The picture was a foot or more square set in a frame the like of which I have never seen before, and which made you think you were looking at the real scene through a small window.

The mountains were shining in snow overlaid by curtains mist in green, gold, rose, blue and all colors in between blending one into another in airy grandure, with the sun shining through on spots, the heather in the vale of Glencoe was patched with snow, and the river caught the green and gold and pink

of the misty mountains and sky.

Here the photographer had captured a rare glowing moment in the winter Scottish Highlands, striking a chord in your heart and bringing home to you the love of the Scotch people for their land, famous in poem, song and story.

The frame, made by Scottie's husband, N.C. Grantham, is an artistic masterpiece itself, a worthy home for this treasure of a picture. It is in finely finished wood, something like a miniature display case. The picture is in the back of the frame, four inches from the glass in front, giving you the feeling

you are looking at a bit of Scotland in all its glory, through a small window.

While I was cast in a spell of admiration, lost for the moment in the Scottish Highlands in glowing winter, Scotty brought me out of the trance, saying:

"You are the Glencoe Guy, so I thought you should have this picture of the original vale of Glencoe. I thank Scotty and N.C. Grantham for this gift, especially welcome during the birthday season of the poet who brought Scotland into the hearts of the whole world, Robert Burns.




