## Planning and Zoning to meet

The Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission will meet at 3 p.m. Monday, February 3, in council chambers of Village Hall.

Items on the agenda include:

- Review commercial building plans on lots 28-31, Block 1, Ruidoso Springs Subdivision for Ralph and Marion Treat.
- Consider vacation of right of way request adjacent to lots 1 and 28, Block C, Ruidoso Springs and Tract 1, Panorama Lodge Addition for Carrol Collier.
- Review commercial building plans on Tract 2, a replat of the Morgan Tract for Howard Tate.
- Discuss sign ordinance amendments.

Commission meetings are preceded by a 2 p.m. workshop, and both the regular meeting and the study session are open to the public.

## Airport Future of old, plan for new concern council

Before opening a meeting of the Ruidoso Village Council that was largely occupied with discussions on airports—the old and the new—Ruidoso Mayor Pro-tem Jerry Shaw dedicated the opening moments of silence to the space shuttle tragedy in which seven lost their lives.

During the regular meeting Tuesday, Shaw also read a proclamation naming 1986 as the centennial anniversary of the Village of Ruidoso, and, before turning to the regular agenda, called upon citizens to participate in the year-long celebration.

A detailed report by Fred Heckman, Ruidoso's representative to the Sierra Blanca Airport Commission (SBAC), occupied most of the council meeting, with Heckman detailing progress on the airport and outlining future plans.

Heckman, chairman of SBAC, displayed a map of the proposed airport site and reported that an operational replacement for the Ruidoso Municipal Airport is still a possibility by November 31, 1986.

After hearing Heckman report that the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) is waiting for "an expression by the city of Ruidoso of their intentions" for disposing of the current airport site, the council passed a resolution agreeing to terms and conditions of the FAA.

Councillors unanimously approved the agreement to close the existing airport and reinvest the fair market value of the airport property in FAA-approved items of development at the replacement site. The agreement calls for a future supplement setting forth details of the reinvestment.

Further conditions of the agreement deal with acceptable appraisal methods, possible retention of the property or any future sale of the airport land.

Village attorney John Underwood pointed out that the public will have the opportunity to respond to any plan the council formulates for the future of the airport land.

In other business Tuesday, the council:

- Heard J.L. Wilson report that a non-profit corporation has been formed to deal with the increasing

incidence of domestic violence in Lincoln County. Wilson reported that the Family Crisis Center is presently offering a hotline through Professional Counseling Associates and has plans to provide short-term emergency shelter for victims of family violence.

- Postponed action on a bond resolution after hearing from village manager Jim Hine that the bond refinance project passed in 1985 will be delayed as a result of legislation being considered in the U.S. Congress.
- There's just no market for public bonds at this time," said Hine.
- Passed a resolution allowing for staggered terms for members of the Lodger Tax Advisory Board.
- Heard a report by assistant village manager Frank Potter on two trucks ordered to go with the trash compactor system. Potter said the successful bidder on the trucks has filed for bankruptcy but could be under new management by Monday, February 3.
- Instructed Hine to establish a fund for the Appeals Board, Abatement of Dangerous Buildings, after hearing a report from the village

attorney on his meeting with village enforcement officer Paul Davis.

Underwood reported that landowners are notified by certified mail or by personal service, and if they do not respond a hearing is not required. He suggested that a lien search be obtained on buildings so that all "interested parties" can be notified of plans to demolish the unsafe structures.

Hine, who has already ordered the lien research, recommended that the fund be established with a transfer of \$5,000 from snow removal and \$2,500 from the Extra-Territorial Zoning fund.

- Heard Hine report that the Ruidoso Municipal Schools have paid the \$100,000 balance on the sewer installation project.
- Agreed to terms proposed by the New Mexico State Highway Department on a joint project to install a traffic light at the "Y."

The meeting was preceded by a workshop on capital projects (see related story). The workshop was continued after the regular council meeting to allow time to review all 13 projects being coordinated by village engineer Mike Davalos.

## Improvements update details \$13 million in projects

By summer's end the Village of Ruidoso will have \$13,176,857 in capital projects under way, according to village engineer Mike Davalos.

He said 22 percent of the funds for the 13 projects have been obtained from county, state and federal sources, with the village bearing the balance of the costs.

In a Tuesday workshop session before the Ruidoso Village Council, Davalos detailed five projects currently under construction and plans for eight upcoming projects.

- Davalos reported that the Grindstone Canyon dam project is running behind schedule about five percent, adding that is within reason.
- However some cost overruns on the project are a concern, said Davalos. He said two contract items on rock excavation have experienced overruns—one item a 21 percent overage and the other a 73 percent overage.
- The costs of the overruns, using the contract's unit pricing, amount to over \$115,000, but Davalos said he'll be negotiating with the contractor.

—The Ponderosa Heights sewer project is ahead of schedule, said Davalos, adding that the contract was modified to allow the contractor an additional three months.

Although the original project

schedule called for a December 31, 1985, completion, the amended contract extends the sewer project until the end of August. LeRoy Givens of Boyle Engineers said the contractor still hopes to complete the sewer project by the end of May.

When questioned about the size of the sewer pipe installed, Davalos said he felt the four- to eight-inch pipe is adequate with the slope and grade of the area. He did express concern for maintenance on the portion of the pipe that was installed 20-feet deep.

Givens explained that the pipe was buried at that depth to avoid adding an expensive lift station, adding that it is "a very isolated area" on Hemlock Circle.

- Bid opening on the second phase of the Eagle Creek well field is scheduled for 10 a.m. February 20, said Davalos. He said that phase includes equipping wells 1 and 3, building a control room and constructing two underground vaults.
- The engineer reported that design work will continue on Phase 3 as construction begins on Phase 2. Equipping wells 2 and 4, building a road and a pipeline are listed as Phase 3.
- Councillors questioned Davalos about including a pipeline, saying the council needs to make a policy decision as to whether water will flow down the creekbed or require a pipeline. They also expressed concern as to the cost of a pipeline.
- "All we had in mind now is to put two wells in the ground and set

them up for portable generators," said Davalos.

- Construction is complete on the trash compactor transfer system, said Davalos. That system will be operational by the second week in February, he said.
- The engineer said he expects the project to come in under budget, and recommends using the savings to pave part of the driveway from Gavilan Canyon Road to the compactor.
- Davalos reported that a great deal of work remains to be done on the Grindstone Canyon raw water pipeline, and provided councillors with a list of 40 items.
- "This is basically the work he (the contractor) has to finish," said Davalos, who has plans to negotiate on a firm completion date for the project that is as much as 120 days behind schedule.
- Councillors instructed Davalos to continue monitoring the project and report back at the next regular council meeting.
- The Ponderosa Heights paving project is scheduled for next fall, or whenever the Ponderosa Heights sewer project is complete, said Davalos. He said the estimated cost is \$500,000, and half the funds are to come from a Community Development Block Grant.
- The Carrizo Canyon Road paving is scheduled to begin in February or March, and will be

complete in about eight weeks, said Davalos. Funds for the \$266,000 project have been committed by the New Mexico State Highway Department through a cooperative agreement with Lincoln County and the Bureau of Indian Affairs. Ruidoso's share for labor and equipment is estimated at \$36,000.

- Davalos reported that the design process is nearly complete on the bridge replacement project financed through a direct appropriation from the state Legislature. Construction is scheduled to begin in September 1986, and the project has a total budget of \$634,020. Five bridges are included in the plans, said Davalos.
- The State Highway Department will complete the two traffic lights planned for Ruidoso through two separate contracts, said Davalos. One is scheduled for the corner of Highway 70 and Highway 37 (Sudderth Drive) and the other is to be installed at the corner of Sudderth and Country Club drives. Davalos said the village will be responsible for \$20,000 toward the traffic lights, which are expected to be operational by the summer.
- A paving project in Upper Canyon will be started after the raw water pipeline project is finished, said Davalos. Plans call for paving Main Road from South Street to Martin Road, with a project budget of \$160,000. The village engineer hopes to begin paving this spring.

## P&Z debates size, placement of signs

John Hall told the Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission Monday to "start enforcing the current sign ordinance" instead of writing a new one.

Hall, owner of a local real estate business, brought an assortment of signs and pictures of signs to the workshop which was scheduled to discuss proposed amendments to the village sign ordinance. He contended that the signs in the photographs were out of compliance with village regulations.

"It's got to be enforced on everybody—not just some," said Hall. "A lot of this came about because we came up with a billboard," he added.

"We have started enforcing the ordinance," said Commissioner Martin Rose. "You're first because you're very visible," he added.

Commissioner David Smith told Hall that P&Z wasn't aware that the sign ordinance allowed a sign as large as the one that prompted discussions on off-premise signs. He said members of the commission heard numerous complaints

after the 150-square-foot sign was erected.

Village enforcement officer Paul Davis explained that his office enforces the ordinance by notifying sign ordinance violators by certified letter, specifying a required time to comply. He explained that the court system is the next step for anyone who fails to comply after reasonable notice of the violation.

During recent meetings P&Z members recommended that the current sign ordinance be amended to disallow off-premise signs, instead allowing for off-premise directional signs of limited size and number. P&Z also sent a recommendation to the council that all for sale and for rent real estate signs be eliminated.

The commission made the proposals to reduce "clutter" and improve "aesthetics" in the village, however the council returned the P&Z suggestions for further study.

That prompted the work session.

"Private enterprise should be able to come to the rescue of government in this case," said Hall's attorney, Mel O'Reilly, after Hall suggested that the Board of Realtors incorporate language

dealing with signs in its by-laws.

"I like the idea of them policing themselves," said Davis, who agreed to discuss the suggestion with the village attorney.

On the size allowed for off-premise signs, Hall said the current ordinance is strict enough. He said a 200-foot distance requirement between signs makes it difficult to find suitable locations.

"We put up a sign in compliance with your ordinance and all hell broke loose," said Hall.

Rose suggested that off-premise

sign requirements remain unchanged while the commission gathers information, and recommended a meeting between the commission and local real estate businesspeople in six months.

Discussions of which side of a building may be designated as the front for figuring the amount of signage allowed occupied the remainder of the workshop.

Signs again will be a topic for debate during the regular meeting of the commission at 3 p.m. Monday, February 3.

"We were not able to reach a satisfactory agreement with the Fort Worth Symphony, so there will not be a summer festival this year," said Petty.

Petty said the board will try to work with local entertainers to stage future festivals.

"The festival will not disband. We will work towards the future," she said.

## Warriors top Tularosa, open district

A little winning streak is not a bad way to open the District 3-AAA basketball race.  
Ruidoso High School's boys varsity basketball team will open

district play Saturday, February 1, against visiting Deming on the heels of a four-game winning streak.

The Warriors evened their non-district record at 7-7 Tuesday night with an exciting 56-53 win over host Tularosa.

It was Ruidoso's fourth straight win since a frustrating 48-42 loss to Artesia two weeks ago. The Warrior junior varsity also was victorious, beating Tularosa, 60-58. Improved shooting was the key for the Warriors as they made 44 percent of their field goals and 80

percent of their free throws. Again Ruidoso had good free throw shooting in the final stages of the game.

After Russell Easter hit a 15-foot shot for a 52-51 Warrior lead with around two minutes left, Alan Kirgan and Kirk Ryan both hit two free throws to put the game away. The Warriors then let a Tularosa player make an untested shot as time ran out.

The game was close all the way. Tularosa's small, quick players bothered Ruidoso in the early going with some excellent outside shooting.

Tularosa had a 13-12 lead at the end of the first quarter, but increased that to 31-23 at halftime.

But the Warriors refused to quit, something that has been their trademark most of the season.

After trailing, 35-27, early in the third period, Ruidoso scored six straight points to cut Tularosa's edge to two.

Ryan, Trent Tolbert and Davis each hit a bucket to close the gap. After a Tularosa field goal, Ruidoso fought back to again close the margin to take the lead, 40-33, on a bucket by Tolbert.

Tularosa made a last-second basket to take a 41-40 lead into the final quarter.

Easter made a bucket to give Ruidoso a 45-43 lead. The Warriors had the lead until the Wildcats hit two field goals to take a 51-50 lead with around three minutes left.

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

—Village street crews have been working on the Municipal Softball Complex on Ski Run Road, said Davalos. He said lights and fencing have been purchased for the fields, expected to be ready for the 1986 season softball games. Davalos said costs were estimated at \$90,000, and \$79,525 has been spent. Sodding the field is scheduled for next spring, and that cost of about \$25,000 is expected to drive the project over budget, he said.

—Although construction is com-

plete on the Gavilan Canyon Road paving project, Davalos reported a cost overrun of over \$1,000. The total budget was \$400,625, but the paving finally cost \$401,951. The county paid \$265,000, the state paid \$114,000 and the village paid the balance.

Davalos said county figures used in original plans led to the difference between the budget and the final cost, but added that the county declined to pay more than \$265,000. Davalos, hired as village engineer in the midst of many of the projects, said he will continue to monitor them and make regular

reports to the council.

## Chamber member drive starts Wed.

The Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors discussed the upcoming membership drive at its regular meeting Wednesday.

The drive will take place Wednesday, February 5. The day-long event will begin with a kickoff breakfast at 8 a.m. at Whispering Pines Restaurant. The day will conclude with a tabulation party at 5:30 p.m. at the chamber office.

Two teams—the "good guys" and "bad guys"—will compete to bring the most new members into the chamber. Charlie Kemp heads the "good guy" team and Buster Hill will lead the "bad guys."

Red Rooster Barbecue will donate dinner for everyone who works on the drive at the chamber party that evening. However, the losing team will receive only beans, and will have to serve and clean up after the winning team.

Chamber president Paul Crown said team members will call on a total of 446 prospects. He said he hopes for a 25 percent sign-up rate, which would add approximately 100 new members to the chamber roster.

Crown told the board that new members would be listed in the new Ruidoso brochure and receive a radio promotion as well as one month of advertising on local cable television. A balloon and Art Festival poster will be given to each new member when they join.

Businesses wanting to join may call the chamber (257-7395) Wednesday and ask for members of the team of their choice to call on them during the drive.

Chamber executive director John

Jeffers presented the board with a plan for membership development. The first phase of the plan includes the formation of an active membership committee to solicit new members on a year-round basis. The committee also would contact delinquent members as they are identified each month.

The second phase of the development program involves the formation of a non-resident property owner's category. The chamber would have a campaign to solicit membership of non-residents who support Ruidoso. Non-resident members could receive discounts from participating merchants and annual chamber newsletters.

The third phase of the program would create a non-area supporting business category. Chamber member Ron Wells is developing this group.

Jeffers reported that the chamber currently has 236 members. He said that the figure has decreased from December's report because delinquent members have been deleted from the computer lists.

When divisional vice presidents presented the board with the reports they had given at the quarterly membership meeting last week, Crown read a letter of resignation from Sandy Dacy, who was not at the board meeting. In her letter, Dacy said that her business takes her out-of-town often, keeping her from chamber obligations.

The board appointed Frank Potter to replace Dacy as the vice president in charge of community development. The chamber will fill the vacant board seat by calling on the nominees from last June's election in the order of who received

highest votes.

Bill Hirschfeld, vice president in charge of advertising and promotion, told the board his committee took \$15,000 out of its budget to accommodate a shortfall in lodgers' tax collection. Board member Budgie Green, who is also the chairman of the Ruidoso Lodgers' Tax Committee, suggested that Hirschfeld apply for contingency funds for a media blitz if the Ruidoso area receives some snow.

"There is still the potential for a tremendous amount of business in February and March," said board member Mac McDougal.

Hirschfeld told the board that the New Mexico Film Commission is trying to have a movie made in Ruidoso. The proposed movie would be filmed in March and April. Hirschfeld said he would keep the board informed about the possible film.

Rick Henson, general manager of Ruidoso Downs Race Track, told the board that the track has pooled money with other racing areas and organizations for the Race New Mexico program. With matching funds from the state, a total of \$80,000 is in the campaign, he said.

The advertisements, to appear in many major magazines, will feature the theme "coming on strong" and show horses racing across a map of the state. Each racing area will be marked on the map, reported Henson.

In other promotional activities, Jeffers told the board that a group of bus tour operators will tour Ruidoso in March. A cocktail party for the group will take place at 4:30 p.m. Tuesday, March 11, at the Swiss Chalet.

After a brief discussion about the new airport, the chamber board made a policy statement in which it endorsed the new facilities being built on the Fort Stanton Mesa.

In other business, the board: —Banned smoking from chamber board meetings.

—Scheduled a workday to remove Christmas decorations at 10 a.m. Saturday, February 1.

—Heard Jeffers report that the tele-auction is planned for March 28 and 29.

## Texas travel shows attract chamber

The Chamber of Commerce Advertising and Promotion Committee decided to participate in travel shows and discussed the budget for spring and summer at its meeting Friday afternoon.

Nancy Radziewicz—who organized two wine-and-cheese parties to promote Ruidoso's winter season to Texas ski clubs, travel agents and other ski-oriented groups—said she felt that money earmarked for similar parties in Dallas and Houston, Texas, could be put to better use in participation in ski shows in those areas. Radziewicz gave the committee information about Ski Group '85, "a marketplace for group travel," which has shows throughout the country.

"Everyone I spoke to said they get information from these types of things," said Radziewicz.

The committee gave her the go-ahead to do one-day shows in Dallas and San Antonio, Texas, in late May. If she can generate an additional \$200, she said she will find someone to do the Houston show after Memorial Day.

Radziewicz had collected money from Ruidoso businesses in exchange for taking their promotional material to the parties. She will use the same brochures for the travel shows, unless merchants request

otherwise. Merchants still may participate by notifying the chamber office.

The bulk of Friday's meeting was a discussion of finances and an unfinished contract for promotional billboards. Committee chairman Bill Hirschfeld told the group that the last advertising committee, of which he was a member, made a commitment for Texas billboards, with a 60-day cancellation period.

The billboards were never canceled, leaving the chamber with a \$4,600 debt and a commitment for at least 60 days of billboard use. Hirschfeld said he is not sure who is responsible for the uncanceled boards, but cited a lack of communication with former advertising representatives.

The committee opted to use the boards from mid-April through mid-July as part of its summer advertising campaign, possibly in cooperation with Ruidoso Downs Race Track. The track has agreed to contribute \$20,000 to a cooperative advertising program, said Hirschfeld.

Hirschfeld estimated a shortage of at least \$15,000 for the remainder of the fiscal year, due to a shortfall in lodgers' tax funds. He said that spring advertising can be "done on a shoestring" and suggested that the remainder of the budget be used for summer advertising.

The committee discussed concepts for summer advertising and decided on a family theme, highlighting all the possible activities that families may do in Ruidoso.

"We need to try to make Ruidoso appeal to the largest number of people possible," said committee member James Hobbs.

Chamber executive director John Jeffers suggested a two-pronged campaign, possibly highlighting Ruidoso's Texas Family of the Year at the races and also showing other family activities such as fishing and hiking.

Racetrack representative Richard Lidberg reminded the group of future plans to have a family-oriented picnic area in the infield of the track. The infield lake area will not be ready this season, he said.

Hirschfeld suggested including the idea that vacationing in Ruidoso is less expensive than some other types of vacations.

"The high rollers aren't so high any more," he said.

Hirschfeld said he would contact the advertising agency the committee has been working with and notify them of the committee's ideas. He said he hopes to have some presentations in about two weeks, at which time he will call another meeting of the committee.

## Airport deed is accepted

The Sierra Blanca Airport Commission Wednesday accepted a deed to land on the Fort Stanton Mesa for the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport.

Although the conveyance document on the land that was transferred to the commission by an act of the U.S. Congress was expected to be a patent, with its implied warranties against any old or pending claims on the land, the Bureau of Land Management (BLM) actually delivered a quit claim deed.

"We're very happy with the quit claim deed because we have the law," said commission chairman Fred Heckman. He said the BLM was unable to provide a patent because the land hasn't always

been under that agency's control.

Commissioners thoroughly reviewed the 10-page deed during a special meeting Wednesday, before authorizing Heckman and assistant chairman Ken Nosker to sign it.

Heckman said Federal Aviation Administration officials also are reviewing the deed to the 1,667 acres known as "Site B" on the Fort Stanton Mesa.

With the airport land legally in the hands of the airport commission, the group will continue to seek \$14 million in federal funds for first-phase construction of the regional facility.

Another important step will be a final environmental assessment expected in March.

## Council discusses personnel

The Ruidoso Village Council met in executive session Monday, January 27, in a special meeting called to discuss personnel.

Present during the executive session, besides the council, were village attorney John Underwood, Ruidoso Municipal Airport manager Tim Morris and Sierra Blanca Airport Commission (SBAC) chairman Fred Heckman.

Heckman is Ruidoso's appointed representative to the SBAC.

"We just discussed with Mr. Heckman what we expected of him as chairman of the SBAC," said Village Councillor Ray Dean Carpenter.

None of the meeting participants were willing to discuss the details of the closed meeting, except to say that no action was taken.



## Personnel change, clean air occupy Downs Trustees

The Ruidoso Downs Board of Trustees replaced the sewer inspector and discussed the Clean Indoor Air Act at its meeting Monday night.

Mayor J.C. Day told the board that sewer inspector Don Edwards had resigned from his part-time position with the village. Day suggested that municipal code enforcement officer Mark Milford take on the inspection duties as part of his job.

After a discussion on the matter, the board voted to delegate the responsibilities to Milford, who will receive no additional remuneration at the present time.

The Clean Indoor Air Act was to have taken effect on the first of this new year, said Day.

"We don't seem to have an employee problem with smoking and not smoking," commented the mayor.

Smoking is not permitted in the council room during meetings. The board voted to retain that policy

and to divide the work office into smoking and non-smoking areas.

"Smokers don't realize how offensive cigarette smoke can be," said Trustee Jake Harris, a former 20-year smoker.

J.L. Wilson, director of Professional Counseling Associates, told the board about a family crisis center being planned for the area. In the initial stage, the center will have a hotline phone number and temporary shelter (provided by a local motel) for victims of domestic violence.

Wilson said he came to the meeting to tell the trustees and Downs residents what the shelter board of directors is trying to establish for the community. Eventually, a permanent shelter house may be established, he said.

The board approved the appointment of precinct judge Alice Allison and clerks Anna Carpenter, Nellie Randolph and Dale McClesky. Yolanda Flanagan and Wayne Joyce are alternates.

Trustee Conrad Buchanan told the trustees that letters were available at the village office for citizens to sign and send to state representatives. The letters request funding for paving Downs roads.

In other business, the board discussed the amended sanitation

ordinance proposed at the last meeting. The ordinance will be published then voted on at the next meeting.

After the regular meeting, the trustees had a closed session as the personnel board. No action was taken.

## No water, school closes

General maintenance to two distribution valves near Meander and Walnut drives by the Ruidoso Water Department caused a water shutdown to some homes and Ruidoso Middle School from about 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. Tuesday, according to Becky Durham, a spokesperson for the Ruidoso Water Department.

"The water department people said they would turn off the water for three hours or more to the school, so we decided to call off classes all day at the middle school

only," Mike Gladden, associate superintendent of Ruidoso Municipal Schools said.

Gladden said it is hard to run a school with over 400 students when there is no drinking water, cooking water, or water for sanitation.

The middle school students will not have to make up for the loss of an instructional day because the state of New Mexico allows districts to release students on an "emergency" basis without a loss in state revenues, according to Gladden.

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

Sanchez said. "I'd say Katherine and Tammy Osborne did the best on the boards. But they're (Artesia) big and strong."



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# Concern grows for elderly

In July 1983, for the first time in its history, the United States had more people over 65 than under 25. From 1970 to 1980 the state of New Mexico had a 62 percent increase in members of the population 65 and older, according to research done at The Institute for Gerontological Research and Education (TIGRE) at New Mexico State University at Las Cruces (NMSU).

A 1980 New Mexico census showed nearly 2,000 people in Lincoln County were over the age of 65, according to Stephanie Fallcreek, director of TIGRE, and a professor in the college of human and community resources at NMSU.

Fallcreek said New Mexico is one of the six fastest growing states in population 65 and over.

New Mexico has become popular with the elderly because of the weather, the lack of pollution, public relations from the state and TIGRE, the intra-social structure in New Mexico and spillover from Arizona, Fallcreek said.

Arizona was once one of the most attractive state's to the elderly, but has now become too crowded or too promoted for many retirees, Fallcreek said.

But, according to Fallcreek, the increase in the 65-and-over population also has brought problems to the state, and especially Lincoln County.

Many of the elderly in America are in an upper-level income bracket, Fallcreek said. However, from 10 to 15 percent of Americans 65 and older live below the poverty level according to Fallcreek.

"The percentage of the elderly who have economic difficulties is much lower than we are led to believe by the media and other sources, but nonetheless, there is a small percentage of elderly who have difficulty with day to day existence. And you can imagine what happens to this group when they have a major crisis, such as the need for extensive medical care," Fallcreek said.

TIGRE research indicates about 30 percent or 600 of the elderly in Lincoln County fall below the national poverty level.

Fallcreek said the state and people of New Mexico will face a difficult challenge as more and more people over 65 move into New Mexico, and as more and more native New Mexicans turn 65.

"In New Mexico we have the native New-Mexican population, the native American or Indian population, the hispanic popula-



**STEPHANIE FALLCREEK** tion—with its different cultural heritage in the northern and southern parts of the state, the migratory population and of course the anglo-American population to deal with," Fallcreek said.

Fallcreek, who earned her doctoral degree at the University of California at Berkeley, said making the public aware of the problems elderly face, and will face, is the best way to prepare society to meet the needs of the ever aging population in America.

At the present time 80 percent of all care to women 65 and older (women are still the largest percentage of the elderly) is carried out by daughters and daughters-in-law, according to Fallcreek.

Fallcreek calls today's woman part of the "sandwich" generation. Today's woman not only gives the primary care to the elderly in her family, but also takes care of the younger generation in her family, Fallcreek said.

As the 92 million "baby-boomers" (those born between 1945 and 1964) become older, society must be able to cope with problems related to aging in a manner that takes the burden away from one family member or one social agency, Fallcreek said.

"Madison Avenue is already aware that the baby-boomers are aging, and are beginning to cater to their particular buying habits. But, as science finds more ways for people to live longer, and as the baby-boomers age, every segment of our society must be prepared to meet the needs of the elderly and deal with the critical issues these demographic changes create," Fallcreek said.

Fallcreek said she "hopes" that TIGRE will begin to make both the public and those in political power in New Mexico aware of the problems associated with providing the proper environment for an elderly population that continues to increase in number.

Alternative to hysterectomy: new tool called the hysteroscope. Developed by a gynecologist, the scope has a light, lens, and path for surgical instruments. Could be used to repair some disorders, avoiding as many as 20 percent of hysterectomies.

Researchers may have found the virus that causes rheumatoid arthritis. At Montefiore Medical Center in New York, they've spotted viral particles in the joint linings of sufferers.

Another black mark for smoking: smokers are more prone to bladder cancer, according to research in three different countries. Those who smoke two or more packs a day have seven times normal incidence of the disease.

When the four million dollar tax increase was proposed, I voted against it, and also the hiring of an attorney for approximately \$4,800. It was unnecessary and I told my fellow Councilors where we could find the approximately \$750,000 without raising taxes.

My figures were not reported by the newspaper until they were credited to another Councilor who used them in one of the two special meetings called while I was on vacation.

At the next regular meeting the council did not pass the tax increase. As a member of the old-Grindstone Oversight Committee, I had protested the lack of freeflowing information. We are spending millions of your tax dollars and I believed then, as now, that the council was elected to take an active part in the supervision of contracts, questioning cost overruns etc., so, I made the motion that no bills be paid until the council had reviewed them.

No other councillor agreed, my motion died for lack of a second, and the "question" was called cutting off further debate.

At that time, we were one and one half million dollars short of the funds needed to complete the dam, PLUS the cost of the water treatment plant. I checked the law covering our existing 1% sales tax for water improvements and learned we are limited as to the amount of bonds we can issue and, we cannot pledge the \$400,000 surplus for additional bonds.

To avoid raising water rates, water tap fees or property taxes, I proposed, and the council agreed, that we should change the state law.

When an attorney advised the Village that no change was necessary, realizing that we are close to the 15 year limit on saleable bonds, I checked with two attorneys who draft laws for the State Legislature...both agreed the law should be changed.

At my request, representative Ben Hall explained the legal ramifications to the council; this was not reported in the paper.

As a result of previous testimony before the Senate Finance and the House Taxation and Revenue Committees, the New Mexico Municipal League appointed me to its Tax and Revenue and its Resolution Committees. Also, five Senators and one Representative are fellow alumni of N.M.M.L.

Since the council had endorsed my proposal, I went to Santa Fe at my own expense to explain to these, and other Senators, why we need this change to avoid raising Village water rates, water tap fees or property taxes.

This legislation has been introduced in the present session by Senator Martin and Representative Hall.

As your elected representative, I acted on your behalf. I would like to continue to represent you as your Mayor. I invite you to call and discuss the issues, to criticize, or to question my voting record.

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

How does the timeshare industry prosper in the current rough economy? Using Ruidoso as an example, Mobley said that many people cannot afford to buy a cabin or build a home here. A timeshare week may be purchased for a fraction of the cost of a home, and buyers have the flexibility of vacationing in Ruidoso or trading for other locations.

Boss said he tells buyers that a timeshare unit "may not ever be worth a dime more than it is today," but that it is an "investment in use and recreation" spread over many vacation years.

Each year, the timeshare owner pays a maintenance fee (for example, \$110 on a two-bedroom unit at Crownpoint) that includes taxes and insurance on the condominium. Three large companies handle exchanges to other resorts. The exchange companies charge a \$49 processing fee.

Local real estate businessperson Barbara DiPaolo owns two weeks at Pinecliff, which she said she bought seven years ago, when the prices were lower. She said she does not feel that any timeshare is a good real estate investment, but that her units give her inexpensive vacations two weeks each year.

"Timesharing is not for everyone," said DiPaolo, adding that prospective timeshare buyers should do extensive figuring to see if the investment would be worthwhile for them.

"You're buying a vacation, not a real estate investment," she said. "You must use it for it to be a good value."

DiPaolo said she is pleased with her timeshare weeks. She said she and her husband have used the exchange program and vacationed "all over," including Lake Tahoe, San Diego, Hawaii and Mexico.

Sometimes procuring an exchange week can be a "hassle," said DiPaolo, explaining that she often did not get her first choice in locations. However, she said she usually receives one of her three choices, and the condominiums in which she has vacationed are "really nice."

Ruidoso insurance agent Greg Carey said he also bought a week at Pinecliff when the rates were low. He said his main benefit is that owning the timeshare week causes him to plan and take a vacation once a year.

"Honestly, I don't know how much money it saves me, with annual fees, et cetera," said Carey.

Las Cruces resident Anna Mae Evans and her husband, Kent (who is the personnel manager of the Physical Science Laboratory at NMSU), own three weeks at Crownpoint and two weeks at High Sierra. Anna Mae Evans said she received a promotional letter in February 1984, and came to Ruidoso to claim her free gift (a home computer) and tour the facilities.

"I'm really negative about these things," said Evans, explaining that she did not plan to purchase anything.

Evans said she fell in love with the area and purchased her first timeshare week. She said she was not pressured into the purchase. The view from the condominium and the trading ability in timeshare ownership is what sold her on that first week, she said.

Under the VIP Program, the Evans' bring friends to see the resort and receive free lodging during visit weekends and cash stipends on sales. She said she has brought at least 40 new couples to Ruidoso, half of whom have purchased timeshare units.

Timeshare owners polled seem to be satisfied with their units and enjoy their vacations in timeshare condominiums. However, problems have been reported with some promotions involving certain companies.

In May, representatives from the New Mexico Attorney General's (AG) office had public meetings in Ruidoso, Santa Fe and Albuquerque to gather information to regulate promotional activity. The AG had received complaints about misrepresentations in prize sweepstakes and vacation giveaways.

Attorney General Paul Bardacke announced the new regulations on September 3. The regulations require clear and conspicuous disclosures of key parts of promotions, including requirements to state clearly the real odds of winning and conditions attached to awards.

As an example, Bardacke cited promoters' use of all-expense paid trips to Hawaii, Florida, Mexico and other vacation areas. Often, the trips actually only pay for one person, yet they require that two people take the trip, at costs arranged by the promoter.

The state currently has a lawsuit pending against North American Developments (Chateau de la Shay) alleging past violations of the Unfair Practices Act. A temporary stipulation was negotiated and a court date is set for May.

The alleged violations apparently took place when the marketing company, The New Professionals, promoted Chateau de la Shay last year.

"We parted ways in December because of the problems with the AG," said Mobley, explaining that The New Professionals no longer markets the timeshares. "If we're going to be blamed for something, we want to be represented and not dragged into it by a marketing company (which had an exclusive on sales)."

Dale Koeshall, director of sales and training for North American Developments, said the accusations are blown out of proportion, with an "80 to 20 percent ratio of truth." He said the company sent out a mailing which the AG claimed was not legal. However, at that time, there were no timeshare regulations to guide them, he said.

John Caffrey, attorney for North American Developments, said his client did not violate the law.

Ruidoso resident Cynthia Watson said she had problems with a vacation giveaway. Watson said she was offered the trip after her name had been drawn from one of the boxes located around town.

Watson said her problems were not with Chateau de la Shay, but with the Florida travel company arranging the Mexican vacation. She said she was misinformed about identification requirements and was unable to complete the original trip. The company did not give her another vacation date, and returned only \$111 of the \$250 deposit, she said.

Mobley said Chateau de la Shay has discontinued the vacation program. He said he now is working with local merchants, keeping money in Ruidoso by offering gift certificates, rather than vacations, as incentives for resort tour-takers.

Timeshare laws are scheduled to come before the state Legislature this year. The timeshare industry people questioned said they would welcome laws that define what they can and cannot do.

Mobley said he is trying to charter a timeshare council in New Mexico to police its own industry.

Boss said his marketing companies' representatives meet with the AG's office monthly and submit all promotional pieces for approval before they are used. He said he "would be glad to have a uniform timeshare license" similar to those required of real estate salespeople. Boss said he gives monthly sales trainings and makes sure his staff does not, in any way, misrepresent the timeshare units to customers.

Cruz said he handles all closings himself, overseeing the small sales staff at Ruidoso Inn.

The general consensus about the timeshare industry seems to be that it helps Ruidoso as long as the companies operate in an honest, legal manner.

As a Ruidoso businessman, Carey opined that the timeshare industry has had a good effect on the local economy, putting money into the economy through employment and tourism. He said he felt the sometimes negative publicity did not have a bad effect on Ruidoso's image.

"There will be some bad apples in any barrel. Any resort area has good and bad," he said.

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# Timeshares

## Growing pains pester an economic giant

Timeshare condominiums—do they provide the ideal vacation situations or are they promotional ripoffs to consumers?

The timeshare industry is a multi-billion-dollar business that has skyrocketed in areas of the United States, including Ruidoso, over the past 10 years. Resorts offer gifts to lure consumers to tour their condominiums, and sell prospective buyers on ownership of "ideal" vacation situations.

Although most timeshare companies appear to operate in an honest and legal manner, promotional problems with some resorts attracted the attention of the New Mexico Attorney General's office last year. Attorney General Paul Bardacke issued timeshare promotion regulations in September, and timeshare legislation is expected to come before the state Legislature this session.

Mention the word "timeshare" to most people, and they usually have a definite opinion, positive or negative. Although people seem to either love or hate the industry, many people do not fully understand the concept of timesharing, or the impact of the business on the Ruidoso economy.

Timeshare companies do extensive promotion, bringing people to Ruidoso from many states to see the condominiums. Johnny Mobley, president of North American Developments, owners of Chateau de la Shay, said his company brings 2,000 families to Ruidoso each month. Don Boss, sales manager for Crownpoint, High Sierra and Pinecliff, also quoted 2,000 as the average number of families brought in monthly.

Statistics show that tourists spend an average of \$75 per day while in Ruidoso. People visiting Ruidoso on a timeshare promotion probably will eat, shop, purchase gasoline and possibly stay a night or two in Ruidoso. The money spent flows through the economy in the form of revenue and taxes.

Boss said one of his programs pays for travel and lodging for three days for people visiting the resort condominiums. He books rooms at the Swiss Chalet and Super 8 motels. From June through December 1985, his company spent \$146,306 on lodging, said Boss.

Rick Arlaud, manager of Super 8, said that Crownpoint, High Sierra and Pinecliff book about 300 room-nights (approximately \$10,000 worth of business) each month.

"We'd probably be out of business without them," said Arlaud. "With no snow and no skiers, it's the pits," he added.

Karen Moore, marketing director for The Swiss Chalet Inn, expressed similar sentiments, stating that Boss' company is a "good, large piece of constant commercial business" which adds to the occupancy especially when tourism is down. She said Swiss Chalet reserves 30 rooms for them each weekend, and that they have asked for more.

"The community, as a whole, doesn't realize how many hundreds of people are brought in (by the promotions)," said Moore, using the adjectives "flocks" and "droves" to describe the multitudes. Moore said that many of the first-time visitors return to Ruidoso at later dates.

Boss said his company spends more than \$400,000 each month to promote Ruidoso and advertise his resorts. He said he and his sales crew sell customers on Ruidoso, using the timeshare condominiums as a vehicle.

Boss said that six different marketing companies prepare and distribute the mail-out flyers that invite prospective customers to tour his resorts. Only one-half of one percent of the recipients respond to the offer, he said.

Travel agent Patricia Espinosa said that Boss' company has spent more than \$100,000 with Ruidoso Travel, paying for air travel and car rentals for promotion visitors.

Under one program, timeshare condominium owners may bring a guest couple for a weekend and

receive lodging for themselves and their guests, said Boss.

Ruidoso Inn, a timeshare resort that does not do out-of-town promotions, also uses a guest referral system to introduce newcomers to their establishment, said sales manager Nelson Cruz.

Rick Evans, a Ruidoso village councillor, acknowledged that Ruidoso timeshare resorts bring thousands of people into town each month, generating a lot of spinoff spending. He also estimated that timeshare companies put at least 20 percent of every dollar spent on timeshare units back into the direct promotion of Ruidoso.

"Their efforts overshadow ours (the village's) in money spent," said Evans, adding that he felt the promotion is positive for the community.

As a real estate businessman with Century 21 (a company that does not deal with timeshares), Evans said that the timeshare industry has provided a use for the excess condominiums in Ruidoso, relieving a supply pressure in the market.

"I'd venture to say that a lot of

these units would still be for sale if not for timeshares," said Evans.

Evans said that a sold timeshare unit (50 to 52 weeks a year) is the basic equivalent of one family spending a year's worth of time in Ruidoso. However, since timeshare owners are vacationing, they are apt to spend more money during their week in Ruidoso, he said.

Evans said he has no problems with timeshares; as long as they are marketed and operated properly and honestly.

"At this point in time, the positive outweighs the negative," said Evans.

Councillor Jerry Shaw gave similar opinions.

Boss said he felt the public has a

misconception of the timeshare industry. He said that most people do not understand the concept of timesharing.

A timeshare condominium purchaser actually owns part of the resort, said Boss. The buyer receives a deed to the property, which becomes part of his or her estate, according to Boss.

The purchase of a timeshare week allows the buyer to use the condominium, or trade for a week at another location, each year. The cost to purchase one week runs from \$5,000 to \$13,000, depending on the popularity of the time period purchased.

Although many business ventures are floundering in today's

economy, the timeshare industry is flourishing. An article in the August 13, 1985, issue of "The Wall Street Journal" stated that the sales of timeshare units soared to \$1.6 billion in 1984, from less than \$10 million in 1972.

Currently, more than 1,000 timeshare resorts exist in the U.S. In 1973, there were eight.

According to the article, large companies, such as Marriott Corporation, ITT Corporation and Sheraton Corporation have entered the business. Walt Disney Productions, General Development Corporation and Hyatt Corporation have expressed interest.

Rawcut to the season's fastest time over 5 furlongs in the 4th race January 25 when he covered the distance in 59 seconds flat.



As the business manager for a local physician, I feel qualified to

comment on the community's need for and ability to support a pediatrician. Contrary to the statement in the paper the 20 patients a day will support a pediatrician, *The Journal of Medicine Economics*, in a recent survey, indicated that successful pediatricians see between 35 and 40 patients a day. In an informal survey of local physicians' offices regarding the number of children seen, there is not a total of 20 per day much less 35-40. Even if all of the family physicians agreed to refer all of their pediatric care, which is unlikely, it would seem there are not enough patients to support a full-time pediatric practice.

The community must ask what a pediatrician can bring to the community that is not already provided by local physicians. Family practice training prepares a family physician to handle 90% of pediatrics problems and to know

when a referral is indicated.

I hope the community will keep its perspective about the need for a pediatrician. We are a rural community with a population too small to provide an adequate patient base for a pediatrician. With the ski hill, Capitan and Carrizozo clinics all losing money, can the Ruidoso Hospital afford another drain in its resources, or is the community ready to pay the bill?

If you feel the community can afford a pediatrician and if you intend to use the services of a pediatrician, I urge you to sign the petition. If you believe the community is already served adequately or do not intend to use the services of a pediatrician, please do not sign a petition that will potentially commit our community to the long-term financial cost of supporting a community-salaried pediatrician.

## Editorial

Is this the "slow time" in Ruidoso? Although most will agree that the pace of the village is indeed "slow" this time of the year, a look at the activities planned by Ruidoso village officials shows anything but a period of inactivity—rather a building period that points out a spirit of optimism for the village's future.

The Ruidoso Village Council was given an update on village projects Tuesday by village engineer Mike Davalos.

His update showed that the village is planning, currently conducting or ready to complete 13 projects in Ruidoso. Those projects are valued at more than \$13 million, of which almost \$3 million is coming from county, state or federal sources.

Projects under way include the Grindstone Canyon dam project, the dam raw water pipeline, the trash compactor and transfer system, the Ponderosa Heights sewer and the Eagle Creek well field.

Planned by village officials are several street paving projects including the reworking of Carrizo Canyon Road. Also planned are traffic signals, bridge replacements and the Eagle Creek softball fields.

Assistant village manager Frank Potter said the projects are partly in keeping with the current growth of the village, and to keep pace with the rapid growth the village experienced in the early 1980s.

He said village planners gauge the need for services by looking at numbers over time. Even though the village economy has experienced a slowdown, officials continue to plan for the village's growth, which Potter estimates is still 7.3 percent per year or greater.

So our slow time is really a busy time, as village officials continue to plan for Ruidoso's future. As Potter put it, "We're not down the tubes by any means. We're pretty optimistic and enthused about the place, always have been." We couldn't have said it better.—DJP

## Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE—It's too easy to get worked up watching a Legislature at work. It's even worse to waste the wrath such a sight inspires by blasting lawmakers too early.

When you read in this paper, for instance, that legislators decided in the very first days of a session to gut a program you have always considered essential to good government, don't go all red in the face, get choleric and crush the newspaper between your two hands. All you have been told, at that stage in the game, is that one of many legislative committees is making such a recommendation. That's a long way from any final action on the matter.

Maybe we in the news game don't always make that clear in our reports, possibly because we give the populace too much credit for appreciating these fine distinctions.

Let's linger for just a moment on how action up here takes place, if only because it's true, as UNM prof Fred Harris says in the preface to one of his books, that our government is likely to "take the side of those who understand how it works and participate in its processes."

Consider, therefore, the beauties of House Bill 2. Before serious work on this measure, the one that says how appropriations from the general fund are to be distributed to the agencies of government for their routine, day-to-day of recommendations have been made. One is the "Executive Budget," which this year is a document of 592 pages. The other is "Budget Analyses of State Agencies," prepared by the Legislative Finance Committee staff, which is a mere 547 pages. Yet every one of the conclusions in these vast compilations is merely preparatory; there is nothing final, or even official, about them.

At the next stage, subcommittees of the House Appropriations and Finance Committee consider the monetary requests of each of these agencies separately. Again, only a preliminary action; so when you read that, for instance, the Governor's Organized Crime Prevention Commission has gone unfunded at this stage, the battle is not yet over.

All these subcommittee recommendations must then go to the full

committee for action, where defenders of the particular project can still successfully intervene. After that, there is another chance to affect the matter when the whole House takes up the bill. And even if the previous actions to which you object are sustained on the floor, the battle is not yet over.

By this time, you may have read three distinct newspaper stories that say, "Legislators Turn Down Funding for Such-and-Such," but that isn't wholly true yet. The Senate has still to be heard from.

On that side of the capitol (if a round building may be said to have "sides"), this big funding bill, like all such measures that create expenditures, will have to go before the Senate Finance Committee, which will hold hearings on its provisions one by one. This gives all those who object at least a minimal and hurried chance to be heard from again. And even after a bill is reported out of Finance, there is another floor debate on the Senate floor as well.

Admittedly, those who hold profound opinions on matters in this major funding measure have now had their last say—unless, that is, they want an expenditure it authorizes cut out entirely. That the governor can still do, by use of his line-item veto power. He can be lobbied with just as much effect as that action has when applied to legislators, so this is the one final chance a citizen has to make things come out the way he or she wants.

Given all those steps, none of which may be skipped, you can see why the early portions of this column counseled citizens not to throw up their hands in disgust at the first sign of stormy weather on the legislative seas. Lawmaking is complicated process, and that very complication works as much in favor of those on one side of any argument as it does those on the other.

The immortal Yogi Berra said, "It's not over till it's over." That suggests that he's a man who has a fine grasp of the legislative process as practiced out here in the wilds of little old New Mexico, where early despair is as big a mistake as not knowing when to quit.

It's no secret that I like to shop. I've written columns on shopping addiction and Christmas shopping. And now, for the sequel ... "Shopping III: Mail Order Mania."

It could be a box office success, not at movie theater box offices, but at mailboxes and post office boxes throughout the country. Well, at least in Ruidoso, where shopping by mail is a popular hobby.

One Alto resident told me that her 80-year-old neighbor buys everything but groceries through the mail.

"She buys her clothes, garden seeds, even vitamins through the mail," said my Alto friend, who asked me not to use her name, as she, too, is a mail-order addict, but is not ready to go public with it.

My friend speculated that her elderly neighbor (one of two

80-year-old neighbors who mail-order shop) started way back when Ruidoso did not have many stores, and continued the practice out of habit.

Terry Hayes, acting Ruidoso Postmaster, said that Ruidosans do receive a lot of catalogs, but not in a higher ratio than most communities, including his last post, which was Roswell.

My passion for mail order began when I was just a child. I'd read my morning cereal box, longing to order the Tony Tiger Fan Club kit, complete with stickers and secret decoders. Mom and Dad were hard to convince, but every now and then, I'd be victorious in my pleas.

Excitement mounted from the day I mailed the order until the day it arrived. I'd check the mailbox daily after school, hoping the order would come when I had a friend visiting, so I'd look important, having a package addressed to me.

When the big day came, it usually was disappointing. Things were never as great as they were on cereal boxes. The same went for the toys advertised in the back of magazines.

As I became older, and learned the joys of going to the mall or walking to a local discount store with my friends, my desire for mail order decreased. I did not bother with it much until a few years ago, when an automobile accident kept me off my feet for a while.

Stuck in my apartment, I began to look at the catalogs I'd collected, and ordered things from a few. I soon discovered that catalogs are like rabbits, multiplying rapidly in the house and mailbox.

Once you order something, the company sends you catalogs from all of their divisions and subsidiaries. They also trade and sell your name to other companies. Soon, you become a mailing-list regular, receiving enough catalogs to paper the walls of the Taj Mahal.

People who are not catalog collectors may not realize the wide range of merchandise available through the mail. Clothing, make-up, books and records are just a few of the things offered.

In addition to regular mail shopping is club membership, most popular in the categories of books and records. You've seen the advertisements: "Choose 11 records for one penny." "Take four bestsellers and receive a free totebag" ... The offers certainly are temp-

ting. Joining the clubs can be a good investment, but you have to be careful to take note of how many items you have to buy in the next year or three. Club members receive monthly booklets and featured-selection return-reply cards. Those of us who file them in the "to do" pile often don't, and end up with books and records we didn't know we ordered.

Why do we mailbox junkies bother, you ask?

"You can sit in your own dining room and browse through the catalogs that have beautiful pages with clothing, gifts, etc.," said my friend (who suggested I change her name in my column, to protect her not-so-innocence in the matter).

However, she admitted (and I agree) that shopping by mail is a bit of a gamble. You never know what the merchandise will be like until it arrives at the post office (or at your desk at work, in the case of United Parcel shipments).

Sometimes it's hard to believe that the item in the box is the same thing that looked so good in the catalog photograph. I've begun waiting until I get home to open packages, so I don't have to admit to co-workers that I actually ordered the problem merchandise, and can send it back before anyone sees it.

My editor, Darrell, said he never ordered anything through the mail because he likes to look at things before he buys them. Another News employee (name withheld on request) joked that he doesn't mail order because he likes the thrill of shopping in person.

For the most part, mail order shopping is fun. Some companies take a long time to process an order, so by the time it arrives, you've forgotten you'd placed the order. Then, it's a little like Christmas, and receiving packages can brighten an otherwise dreary day.

However, the reverse can occur if you get carried away. Those toll-free, 24-hour order numbers can be very tempting when I'm depressed or restless at night. The order seemed like a great idea, until the merchandise—and the bill—arrives.

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## More signups needed for college classes

This may be the last semester New Mexico State University at Alamogordo (NMSU-A) offers college level courses at Ruidoso High School due to a lack of attendance in some courses, according to Victor B. Watson, associate campus director at NMSU-A.

"There is no need not to be anything but honest. We came to Ruidoso to test the waters much as a marketing firm tests an area to market a product. This semester will most likely make or break the program here in Ruidoso," Watson said.

NMSU-A has suffered some financial losses while offering courses in the Ruidoso area, Watson said.

Colleges in New Mexico are funded in part based on attendance by districts which are drawn up by the state Board of Education Finance in Santa Fe. Ruidoso is not in any college district, and NMSU-A must operate solely on capital raised from tuition, Watson said.

"All we have been trying to do is make enough to pay the teacher's salaries, and so far we have taken a loss on that too," Watson said.

Tuition at NMSU-A is \$16 per credit hour and \$26 per credit hour at the Ruidoso campus. Books are sold by the NMSU-A staff as students register for classes. "Tuition is higher, but the student does not have to travel 75 to 100 miles per day (round trip) to Alamogordo, and should see some reduction in the long run due to a savings on gas," Brad Shelton, financial services coordinator at NMSU-A said.

NMSU-A has considered its program in Ruidoso as a form of community relations and as a way to get area students interested in the New Mexico State University system, Watson said.

"But we are just like any business or organization, if you keep showing a loss, you can no longer operate," Watson said.

Watson said each class would need an enrollment of 16 students to

make the Ruidoso program profitable.

The following courses will definitely be in session for this semester, according to school officials:

- \*OEUB 120-Principles of Banking
- \*CS 110-Computer Literacy
- \*SA 120-Secretarial Bookkeeping Procedures 1

Course that might be cancelled:

No courses will be cancelled until after late registration on Monday, February 3, from 5 to 7 p.m. at Ruidoso High, school officials said.



## The Silver Lining

### The Warmest January Draws To A Close

During this topsy-turvy winter in which Anchorage, Alaska was without snow for much of the winter; and hard frosts hit the orange groves of Florida—we here on the slopes of the Sierra Blanca have had one of the mildest winters I can remember in my sixty years here.

Year in and year out, January is the coldest month around here, with temperatures having plunged to sixteen below on January seventeen, 1963. Hardly a January goes by without the temperature going down to at least zero and a little below. Last January about this time there were several mornings at daybreak that the mercury hit two, four and five below. I guess you know that daybreak is the coldest hour of the twenty four.

This January, on the other hand, the coldest morning was eight above, back in the early days of the month; and since then the temperature has come down to maybe fourteen a time or two, and during the last week—right square in the deep of winter—an even twenty has been the coldest. Take last night (this is being sent to you on January 29) it was around forty most of the night, and then it hit thirty two at "dawn's early light." The ice on the drinking *metates* of the birds and Solo Vito, the dog, was only the thickness of thin cardboard. At sun up Solo hit the ice a bat with his paw and began having his morning drink. The snow birds drink ice or no ice, chipping away on the hardest-frozen ice in the coldest weather.

Spring In Winter  
Often times the Lilac Buds and Apricot Buds will swell a little on warm interludes during the winter—though seldom in January. The lilacs are showing green and the apricot blossom buds are looking anxious to bloom out. The mustard plants are growing two months early, with the tiny yellow blooms beginning to appear. And for the first time that I have noticed

at this time of year, the leaf buds of the walnut—last of the river trees to leaf out are beginning to swell.

Don't Be Caught Off Guard

To all of this about the warm winter, you might say "so what?" You hear a lot of folks say, "I can take a lot of this nice sunny weather in the winter. You won't hear me complain."

I think the folks up in Minnesota, North Dakota, Michigan, New York and lots of those places would agree heartily. Battling twenty and thirty below, with the wind chill bringing the cold to seventy below—that can get pretty monotonous after three and four months. Many folks are looking longingly down this direction dreaming of the day they can pack up and "light a shuck this way," as Little Joe the Wrangler did in the famous cowboy song.

It all boils down to one thing and that is that Jack Frost is still the boss. I will take whatever weather he brings and be happy.

As we say, we like the warm sunny days; but Mother Earth does not like them at all. And yet she is not worried about her children because she knows that there is still plenty of time for snow. We all feel sorry for Ski Apache, of course; and we trust that there will soon be a weather change so that there will be deep snow to make up for the snowless days. The mountain does not look right without its cap of white.

And this brings us to two things: do not lose hope and also do not get caught out in a sudden snow storm. Because some of the biggest blizzards came charging in just at this time of year during just such warm spells as we have been having.

### The Birthday Month

January is a slow-moving month but February moves fast, being as it is the little bridge between winter and the early spring. First comes ground hog's day on the second, then President Reagan's birthday on the sixth, Abraham Lincoln's birthday on the twelfth, Saint Valentine's Day on the fourteenth and Washington's birthday on the twenty second. There are some more birthdays in there that have slipped my mind for the moment.

After all it has been a great January in spite of being so dry. Let us hope that the "Birthday Month" will bring us a lot of snow. The next time Jack Frost comes by I will see what he has to say. Meanwhile, be on the look-out for a sudden snow storm.
