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## Airport road, tax, schools legislation busies Ben Hall

The 1986 session of the New Mexico State Legislature may have come in like a lamb, but some Roundhouse watchers predict that a lion is just waiting in the wings. "Things should begin to heat up tomorrow," said Representative

Ben Hall in a telephone interview Friday.

"We haven't got down to the really rough, tough issues yet," he added.

Although the coalition that prevailed in the 1985 session will still be a factor, with 36 versus 34 votes, Hall predicts the 1986 session will continue to be smoother than

last year's which was characterized by a lack of compromise.

Hall attributes this session's spirit of cooperation to some agreements worked out during the interim between sessions.

Major issues before the Legislature will be a tax package and education reforms, said Hall. "We think these issues affect

everybody," he said, adding that legislators are looking for ways to take care of the state's needs with the money available.

Hall noted a drastic decrease in state revenues, and predicts lawmakers will come up with a package of cutbacks in state government coupled with some kind of tax increase.

Hall has introduced several bills to benefit Lincoln County.

Of particular interest to Ruidoso is House Bill 46 to amend regulations on a one percent supplemental gross receipts tax collected in Ruidoso. The bill proposes to allow the village to pledge a greater portion of the supplemental tax to retire bonds.

Proceeds from the one percent are currently committed to water and sewer capital improvements.

"It's not increasing anybody's taxes," said Hall, who is optimistic that the House will pass the bill. Senator James Lee Martin will propose a similar measure in the Senate, said Hall.

Hall also is sponsoring House Bill 176, requesting a \$1.5 million severance tax allocation to acquire right of way for an access road to the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport on Fort Stanton Mesa.

If approved, the funds will be administered through the State Highway Department, said Hall, who noted that the request has the support of Governor Toney Anaya. Hall said the governor has sent a proposal to the Senate.

"This is the first important step to getting the new road in," said Hall.

Another Hall proposal is for \$300,000 in severance tax revenues to be used for constructing bleachers, restrooms, fences and a ticket booth for the football field at Ruidoso High School.

Severance tax funds also are requested by Hall in House Bill 81, asking for \$222,000 to drill a water well and set up a water tank for fire protection at Hondo High School.

Hall said the bill should have a high priority because lack of water was a factor in the destruction by fire of the old Hondo High School facility.

"We just have to take our chances with everybody in the state," said Hall of severance tax requests since lawmakers will ask for \$600-\$700 million from the fund which will probably total only \$50 million.

Hall said he also has introduced House Bill 78 which should benefit the entire state. That bill asks for \$961,000 from the general fund to support a New Mexico State University agricultural project.

The project proposes experiments with high yield, high return and easily grown products, said Hall. Funds will be administered through the University's extension service and experimental farms.

At the request of the Sheriff's Association of New Mexico, Hall presented Joint Resolution 9. If the lawmakers concur, voters will be asked to approve a change in state law allowing county sheriffs to seek an unlimited number of two-year terms.

Current state law allows sheriffs to serve just two consecutive two-year terms.

"You stand a chance of getting an amateur in every four years," said Hall. He said the resolution has the support of the state's police chiefs and the State Police.

Hall said his bills, along with those proposed by his fellow lawmakers, will begin winding their way through committees this week.

### Aviators agree air traffic control increases safety

Air traffic controllers, airport management and area pilots agree that a full-time control tower has made the Ruidoso Municipal Airport a safer place.

Roger Onstad, chief controller for the Ruidoso tower, says the airport has logged no accidents since a control tower was added over a year ago.

Not only have there been no accidents recorded, Onstad said he knows of several potential accidents that he has helped prevent.

Gear-up landings plagued the local facility when it was operated as an "uncontrolled" airport, and manager Tim Morris said the Ruidoso airport held the unwanted record for the most gear-up landings in the Southwest District.

None have occurred since the air traffic controllers took control of the air space, said Morris, and Onstad added that he has stopped at least five gear-up landings that were about to happen.

Morris said the cost for the air traffic controllers is shared with the state on a 50-50 basis. The state's willingness to help pay for the controllers shows that state officials recognize the unsafe conditions at the mountainous airport.

Onstad said he and the other controllers keep a visual lookout of the

skies around the airport, as well as maintaining radio contact with pilots approaching or leaving the airport. They organize air traffic so it flows to one runway, he said.

"Pilots don't have to worry about somebody sneaking in," said Onstad.

"The tower affords them (pilots) the opportunity to keep their head in the cockpit," said Morris.

Many pilots who utilize Ruidoso's airport are inexperienced or unfamiliar with mountain flying, and Onstad said the control is especially

important for those fliers.

Local pilots, too, are happy to have the control tower.

"I'm using all the resources at my command," said Victor Alonso, who has flown in and out of the local airport more than 200 times.

"I know how tricky this airport can be," added Alonso. "Out-of-towers may not know all the options," he said.

James Paxton, a local who flies in and out of the facility five to 10 times a month, said the controller adds an important safety margin.

Paxton, who was among the first to encourage the Ruidoso Village Council to add a control tower, said the controller is especially important because of conditions that are unique to this airport.

Morris, a pilot himself, cautions residents not to become too complacent with the airport's recent safety record.

"Every airplane that leaves this airport goes right over the main street of town," said Morris, adding that in case of an emergency there's just no place to go.



## She strives for Episcopalian priesthood

Sixty-year-old Ruidoso Downs resident Anna Lee Gaddy will take another step in her journey to the priesthood of the Episcopalian faith today (Monday), February 3, when she is ordained as a church deacon by the Right Reverend Richard M. Trelease, Bishop of the Rio Grande Diocese, at the St. Clements Pro-Cathedral in El Paso, Texas.

About two years ago, after a bitter fight and several discussions at the various Episcopalian general conventions, a compromise was worked out that allowed women, who were not trained in the seminary, to become deacons and priests in rural and inner city areas, according to Gaddy.

The debate concerning women in the priesthood became so bitter among Episcopalian that a dissenting group called Catholic Episcopalian was formed, Gaddy said.

The wounds are beginning to heal between the two groups of Episcopalian, but Gaddy said there will always be some members of the Episcopalian faith who resent women becoming deacons and priests.

But Gaddy has not and will not let criticism daunt her in her quest for the priesthood.

"I know I am answering a need," Gaddy said.

Gaddy will not experience any material gain in her duties as a deacon, or when she enters the priesthood in about six to nine months, if all goes well.

"I will be lucky to receive expenses as I perform my new duties, but my main function will be to take some of the burdens away from Burdette Stampley (priest at the

Episcopal Church of The Holy Mount), especially in the congregations outside of Ruidoso," Gaddy said.

Gaddy will perform her duties as a deacon mainly at St. Mathias in Carriso, St. Annes in Hondo Valley and in the homes of church members who host services in Old Lincoln Town.

"I will continue to take in alterations to pay my bills, but I am ready to join the order of deacons," Gaddy said.

Her ordainment as a deacon is part of the training non-seminarian Episcopalian must undergo if they wished to become priests.

About two years ago Gaddy began attending the Episcopalian ministry school in Las Cruces as she began her training to become a deacon. The school was one of the first in the nation to allow women to study for the Episcopalian priesthood, and came under scrutiny from all segments of society, Gaddy said.

Gaddy admits she "pondered" the choice she had made while she was attending the ministry school in Las Cruces. But the other 15 women who have become deacons and priests in the rural and inner-city Episcopalian congregations of New Mexico serve as her inspiration as she continues her studies and duties related to her acceptance into the priesthood, Gaddy said.

And of course, Gaddy is a woman of faith.

She still must train for six to nine more months with Stampley before she is ordained as a priest, Gaddy said.

An Episcopalian deacon can officiate at all ceremonies, but cannot perform any blessings, Gaddy said.

When Gaddy becomes a priest she will be able to perform most ceremonies as well as offer blessings, and consecrate the Eucharist.

In spite of all the criticism, all the sacrifices and all the pressure Gaddy has undergone, she says she remains firm in her belief she will be able to "... become a symbol and leader of the servanthood of the Christian, ministering to the poor, the sick, the lonely and the needy."

## Hollywood Station blackout darkens village for an hour

Lights went out in a major portion of Ruidoso for nearly an hour Sunday.

Buddy Bundick, district manager for Texas-New Mexico Power Company, reported that a circuit at the Hollywood Power Station that serves the downtown area of the city went out about 8:10 p.m. causing the temporary black-out.

"We did some switching and some rerouting and got the power back on in about an hour," said Bundick.

Bundick said an insulator apparently broke down, causing an arc, adding that his personnel will identify the cause of the problem today.

Ruidoso Police Chief Richard

Swenor said his officers observed sparks flying at the power station about the time the problem occurred.

After the power was restored Swenor said his officers spent from two to three hours resetting electrical alarm systems. He knew of no other problems caused by the power outage.

## Track Stall applications due March 18

As work nears completion on Ruidoso Downs' new seven-furlong course, Racing Secretary Harold Payne announced that the track is accepting stall applications for the 1986 summer meet.

Ruidoso Downs' 29th season opens on May 16, with 67 racing dates through September 1 (Labor Day), when the \$2.53 million All American Futurity traditionally closes out the meet.

The deadline for stall applications is March 18, Payne said. Applications can be obtained by writing: Harold Payne, Ruidoso Downs Racing Secretary, P.O. Box 1, Sunland Park Race Track, Sunland Park, N.M. 88063.

Since the gates closed on the 1985

season at Ruidoso Downs, crews have been working around the clock to expand the track's five-mile thoroughbred course to seven furlongs. The project marks the completion of a major phase of a \$6.5 million capital improvements program initiated in 1983.

The undertaking has included relocating the track's main entrance, construction of a new million-dollar sales arena last year, and the addition of 1,500 parking spaces and more than 700 new racehorse stalls.

"With the new seven-mile thoroughbred course, Ruidoso Downs will be the only facility in the nation with two separate racing surfaces for thoroughbreds and

quarter horses," Payne noted.

To compliment the extended racing surface, Payne said Ruidoso Downs will introduce a new stake to its two-year-old thoroughbred program in 1986—the Kachina Stake for juvenile fillies—which offers \$15,000 in added prize money.

"We've also revised our existing thoroughbred stakes program," Payne said. "The added money for all late-closing stakes has been raised to a minimum of \$15,000.

"Ruidoso Downs' quarter horse colony has long been recognized as the finest in the sport. With our new seven-furlong track, we fully expect a better quality of thoroughbreds to make Ruidoso Downs their summer home."

## Another suspect is arrested in wake of sheriff's drug raid

Lincoln County Undersheriff Charlie Cox reported today that Vicki Coomer, named by the grand jury in a sealed indictment last week, was arrested in Lubbock, Texas.

Coomer, whose age and place of residence were not available, signed a waiver of extradition and will be transported to the Lincoln County Jail, according to Cox.

Charges of conspiracy and distribution of a controlled substance were filed against Coomer, who was slated to be picked up during last week's narcotics raid, said Cox.

Assistant District Attorney Harry Wilcox Jr. said today that the suspects arrested in that raid (Saturday, January 25) appeared before District Judge Richard A.

Parsons for first appearance hearings.

Wilcox said the public defender, Gary Mitchell, was appointed to represent most of the defendants.

Judge Parsons heard motions to reduce bonds, and most of the suspects were released on their own recognizance, said Wilcox.

Parsons was unavailable for comment.

Then after church I met Mrs. Louise Joiner who told me that at Dimmitt's services there was "The biggest crowd I have ever seen at a funeral."

Louise said the services were under the direction of Sloan and Patrice Humphrey, a man and wife team, both ordained ministers. Besides the Corona church, they hold the services in the churches at Nogal and Ancho.

The Reverend Sloan read the scriptural passage in which Christ Our Lord comforted Mary, the sister of Lazarus, telling her that her brother would rise up into heaven to be with the Lord.

Also he read of how Joshua trusted our Lord. Both of these selections from the Scriptures applied very much to Dimmitt Bond, the Reverend Mr. Humphrey said.

The Reverend Mrs. Patrice Humphrey delivered a eulogy for Dimmitt, saying that through his fifteen years of suffering with his illness, he kept going, always trying to make life better for everyone, cheerful and helpful even under his burden. If anything, his love for people, and his faithfulness to Christ Our Lord increased and shone more brightly with each day of Dimmitt's life.

Alfred Rue and Rusty Silva each scored six points to lead a well-balanced Brave boys attack.


"We did real well," said Brave boys head coach Dean Hood. "We had to be patient against their zone. We haven't done real well against it in the past, but we did better this time."



## Inside the Capitol

**SANTA FE**—It's all a kind of numbers game.

Projecting the future is tough for anybody, economists included. When you have to do that very specifically, it gets immeasurably more difficult.

What would you say if somebody asked you, "What is the price of oil per barrel going to be 17 months from now?"

Essentially, that is the question those who decide how much income the state of New Mexico will generate at the end of the 1986-1987 fiscal year are being asked right now. Unless we can answer that question, or, more accurately, make an educated guess that turns out to be somewhere near reality, we can realistically budget state appropriations for the time period such and end-date includes.

As of the last report given legislators by those in state government who must perform concern themselves with such matters, we are officially expecting the price of oil to average \$24.40 per barrel during the period between now and July of 1987, and we expect gas to average a sales price of \$2.40 per thousand cubic feet during that same period.

Those who make these educated guesses for the state are, of course, not professionals in the oil and gas business, though they consult many who are. The people in the business this column talks to are not quite so euphoric as that. They—not all, but most—think those figures may be a little high.

What happens if they are?

Well, the scenario then works out something like this: Along about

October of this year, it becomes obvious that an appropriations act rooted in those figures provides for expenditures that are too high. A panic, emergency special legislative session must then be called to undo the harm that has been caused by misjudgment.

And after that? Well, as one person in the oil and gas business says, "In early November, we all go to the polls. At that time, we will certainly know whom it is we certainly don't want to vote for—anybody who is an incumbent." That in turn will give us a whole lot of brand new legislators along with a new governor, next January, and we can start the process all over again.

Lawmakers are not generally an edifying lot. Some, when they get to Santa Fe, seem to lose all sense of proportion, no matter how well they may conduct themselves in their ordinary private lives.

A case in point up here this session is those Bernalillo county legislators who are squabbling publicly over who should get the credit for that North Valley bridge the folks there have pushed so hard for.

Frankly, as between Senator Joe Carraro and Representatives Pauline Eisenstadt and Bobby Aragon as hogs of headlines, it would be tough to make a choice. For any of these to criticize the others is a clear case of a pot calling two kettles black.

Carraro may have gone the farthest of any lawmaker in recent memory, and may have earned the title as Hot Dog of the Session, 1986, when he appointed a committee to oversee the construction of the

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bridge as his personal representatives.

To spare legislators embarrassment, this writer has refrained from making a survey he is tempted to pull off.

It would consist of simply lurking around the doors through which Senators and Representatives sweep down into the basement of the Roundhouse, where they park their cars, to see how many of them have their seatbelts fastened. A casual, non-scientific study during a single hour on a recent morning suggests that the percentage of

those observing the law they themselves passed is miniscule.

Yet they expect all the rest of us to comply.

Hint to legislators who find they must cut the size of state government, no matter how reluctant they are to do so: In bureaucracies, as in middle-aged humans, the fact tends to gather around the middle.

Those who make it to so-called "middle management" and stop there are often examples of the Peter principle who can most easily be dispensed with.

## Editorial

If you have a problem with the new Safety Belt Law, now is the time to contact your state legislator and make your feelings known.

Last year's Legislature passed the Safety Belt Law, which took effect with the coming of the new year. The measure took many people by surprise, and the law's many shortfalls indicate the legislation may not have been completely thought through before it was enacted.

Two issues surface regarding the law, and citizens should make their feelings known on both.

Whether or not to have such a law is the first question citizens should ask themselves. Do we believe that government's role includes determining what measures we should take to safeguard ourselves?

Secondly, if we believe that the Safety Belt Law has merit, we should demand that the measure be reworked to become a fair and clear-cut regulation. The law is unclear on many counts.

Trucks are said to be exempt. Are the occupants of trucks less vulnerable to injury than are occupants of other vehicles?

And what is a "truck"? Are Jeep Cherokees, Subaru Brats and Ford Broncos also trucks?

And why are the passengers of school and commercial buses exempt? If it is because of the high cost of installation or difficulty of design in equipping buses, why are there no provisions to overcome these difficulties over time?

We believe that the use of safety belts is a smart choice. If government is going to step in and make this decision for us, let's at least make sure that resulting legislation is equitable and understandable.—DJP

## Letters to the editor

(Editor's note: The following is a letter The News received from Ruidoso High School graduate Will Dean, now a New Mexico State University student participating this spring in a joint program with the University of London called the "London semester." The News expects to publish several letters from Dean during his stay in Britain.)

DEAR EDITOR:

What are the differences between England and America? This is a question that is in the front of many a tourist's mind as he whisks over the Atlantic to explore the varied treasures of Britain. During my four-month stay with the American Institute for Foreign Study in London, I am trying to discover just what makes the British tick. This is the first in a series of letters detailing what I find out.

The most obvious trait that we Yanks probably note about the English is their accent. Actually, as you might expect, there are many different dialects, a few of which I have found to be totally incomprehensible. In cases where I ask for directions and receive one of these foreign language replies, I have found it best to pretend that I understand, graciously thank the person, and quickly search for someone else to help me.

Though I have walked a lot, as Londoners do, I still have not figured out how to get across the street properly. Having read a lot about the city before I came, I was prepared for the cars driving on the wrong side of the road. But which way do I look first? I thought that it should be to the right, but when I tried that I was nearly hit by a stream of taxis turning the corner. Now I shake my head vigorously from side-to-side and make a run for it. My friends think I am suicidal.

Speaking of streets, there are numerous places to see the more outlandish-looking young people for which London is famous. Saturday afternoons on King's Road is the best time and place to be present for the largest and most varied display of punks with multi-colored mohawk haircuts and vindictive attitudes toward photographers. Here, too, are the trendies, male and female, who have long hair, usually dyed black, and black clothes and makeup to match. These people spend the day simply strutting about and pretending to shop.

What do the young people do the rest of the week? The same as the youth in America—they work, go to school, spend money, eat at McDonald's. Fast food is big business here. McDonald's follows its formula for success down to the tiniest detail. Except that the fries are saltier. And the catsup costs about four pence (six cents) extra.

Another staple of daily life in the U.S.—the television, is quite different in Britain. People use to

such edifying imports as "Masterpiece Theater" would probably be shocked by "normal" programming here, as there are looser restrictions on adult language, humor, even nudity. There are only four stations to choose from—BBC 1, BBC 2, IBA (Independent) and Channel Four (alternative)—but figuring out what to watch is even more difficult than in America because of the confusing times of broadcasts.

Very few programs last thirty or sixty minutes. Some shows last twenty minutes. Some forty-five. Some thirty-seven. There's no way to know without a program guide, but even this is not dependable, as the times change at the last minute, without notice.

Game shows are interesting. There are many British copies of American series, such as "Catch Phrase" and "The Price Is Right." There are also English originals. "Treasure Hunt" is very similar to scavenger hunts you have at parties, with clues that lead to more clues, leading (eventually) to the treasure. The difference in the TV show is that the two contestants work together with the host in the studio to decipher the clues and to figure out where the next clue is.

The job of actually finding the clues falls upon a young, blonde female who files with a cameraman and a pilot by helicopter, landing where the contestants think the next clue is and communicating with the studio by radio. The time limit is forty-five minutes. It's entertaining stuff, especially when the chopper can't land near the clue and the woman has to hitch a ride on the highway. The prize? Only about \$1500.

If, like me, you have grown up watching news on American television, with its brief stories and attractive visual displays, you will probably find British news to be quite boring. Perhaps it's just the lack of news about the U.S. (there's a lot less than you might think). Maybe it's that less seems to happen in Britain. Most likely, it's both of these reasons, plus the fact that the stories are much longer and consist of different people saying the same thing over and over.

In any event, unlike American news, it is usually quite easy to recall all of the events covered on a forty or sixty minute newscast, as there are only four or five stories in all (excluding sports and weather). Also unlike America, I cannot remember the names of any of the news reporters or the anchorpeople. Maybe this isn't so bad.

As you can probably tell, I have so far, spent much more time doing ordinary American things rather than visiting the more cultural aspects of London. There is much more to write about. I hope to relate some of my visits to plays, operas, museums, etc., in future letters, as well as stories of my contact with the British people.

Money spenders and money lenders laugh all the way to the polls. It is so easy to pass bond issues in Ruidoso. Owners who do not live within the city limits can't vote. Less than 40% of the voters, voted bonds for Grindstone and Alto Dams; the latter evaporated along with the funds.

Ruidoso is about to launch the biggest project in the history of Lincoln County. The Village Council wrestles with the financial obligations like a sapling bending in the wind. They can't even afford to shovel snow from the streets.

Every resident voter ought to line up in front of the First National Bank of Ruidoso and pledge themselves to a personal \$10,000 loan because that is what it is going to cost each of them.

Bill Howard talks about FAA requirements that include using the "highest and the best uses"; this quote is also applicable to the new airport. Ruidosoans should ask themselves who benefits the most from this magnanimous expenditure. Of course, it is the rich and affluent who own airplanes. Who is

going to pay? The not-so-rich and affluent Ruidosoans. Roswell and Alamogordo, who are many times the size of Ruidoso, can't keep feeder airlines or major airlines. Eastern Airlines, who controls the East Coast is bankrupt. There is not going to be substantial input to the local economy. Dollar for dollar, it simply does not add up.

The Jordan's point out a valid analysis to the assessment's findings that closing the current airport will have little impact on the economy and find the benefits in increased tourism listed within the new airport as minimal compared to the cost of the huge project.

Once the council bends it is hard to stop the steamroller, although they are already considering a "Pie Crust" runway and facilities which will require additional funds later on.

Closing the present airport because it is surrounded in a fallacy. The council can be compared to a bird dog pointing at fool-quail. The school is located where it is because someone donated the land. New airports precipitate construction surrounding the airport.

It is surprising that Ruidoso News hasn't initiated a contest to name the new town.

The county seat has an all-weather airport which is only a little more than 30 minutes away. Clock the time it takes to go from any other airport to any other city. To up-date the county seat airport is a teardrop in the financial bucket as compared to the cost of the proposed airport.

## Lake drain is not planned

The water from Bonito Lake is a lifeline to the villages of Nogal, Fort Stanton and Carrizozo, as these communities have water rights to the water in the lake built in the early part of this century. The village of Capitan also depends on the lake, as it purchases water from the city of Alamogordo, which owns the lake and rights to most of its water.

Dry years create problems with the water supply. But as the years pass and floods accumulate silt at the bottom of the lake, less water is stored behind the dam. The city of Alamogordo is aware of this problem and hopes someday to solve the silting by dredging the lake bottom. But that project may take years to happen.

Alamogordo city manager Dan Malone told The News that the project is not even a project yet. He

said he heard rumors that his city is to drain Bonito Lake this summer, but to his knowledge, the rumors are untrue.

Malone said that he has not applied to any office, including the Army Corps of Engineers, for project assistance. Neither has he approached the Alamogordo City Council with a formal project proposal to dredge the lake.

Malone said funding for such a project would come from the council. The city does not have any money to undertake such a project at this time, he added. When he investigated what funding is available, Malone said he could not find any programs that would fund a lake reclamation project such as the dredging needed in Bonito Lake.

The dredge suggestion was made by city engineers while observing the lake, Malone said. However, no special engineer has been

employed by the city for such a project. When Malone tried to locate a dredge for the project, he was told the nearest one is in the Mississippi River.

Malone said he thought the rumors about the lake being drained and dredged this summer came from a discussion about a Soil Conservation Service project planned for this summer. The project will entail stabilizing the Bonito River banks in the section of the river above the lake, where recent floods have threatened the existing access roads. The project also will involve the recreation area in the "orchard," Malone said.

For now, the city does not plan to dredge or drain the lake, even though such a project would benefit all the communities on the Bonito line, said Malone. The only worry is whether there will be enough snow this winter to produce enough water for everyone this summer.

## Tiger teams have mixed results


