## Hall legislation passes both Houses

With just 10 more days in the regular session of the State Legislature, a special session is already a possibility, said State Representative Ben Hall Sunday. He said most bills currently before the State Legislature won't actually be passed until the last two days of the session.

Governor Toney Anaya has already threatened a veto of some bills even as most of the nearly 600 pieces of legislation are winding their way through the various committees, said Hall.

However Hall said he was already successful in pushing through one bill—House Bill 46—to allow the Village of Ruidoso to pledge revenues from the supplemental gross receipts tax toward bond issues.

That bill, which only affects Ruidoso and Raton, passed the House last week by 57-to-one, and the Senate by 39-to-0, said Hall. The last step to enact House Bill 46 into law is the governor's signature.

Although information was presented during a meeting of the Ruidoso Village Council that indicated such a bill was unnecessary, Hall said pledging supplemental gross receipts monies to repay bonds was in violation of state law without the bill.

Once Anaya signs the bill, "they can go back and spend the money they have without violating the law," said Hall. If the governor doesn't sign the bill, the village will

continue to be limited to spending the funds directly on water and sewer capital improvements.

Another Hall-sponsored bill, House Bill 176, asking for \$1.5 million in severance tax funds to acquire right of way for an access road to Sierra Blanca Regional Airport, was heard in the Taxation and Revenue Committee this week.

The request, which also is part of the governor's package for this session, was tabled without prejudice, said Hall. He explained that such tabling is standard procedure until legislators establish how much money is available.

Toward the end of the session after revenues are firmly established, the body will prioritize all the money bills they've tabled and allocate funds accordingly, he said.

Last week Hall revealed that the Legislature will hear requests for \$600-\$700 million in severance tax funds, and will have only about \$60 million to spend.

Among Hall's requests for severance tax funds are bills asking for \$300,000 to build bleachers, restrooms, fences and a ticket booth at the football field at Ruidoso High School and \$222,000 to drill a water well and set up a water tank for fire protection at Hondo High School.

Hall said another of his bills, House Bill 78 to appropriate \$961,000 from the general fund to support a New Mexico State University agricultural project, was heard and tabled without prejudice in the Agriculture Committee.

Educational reform will be on the House agenda for today (Monday), February 10, according to Hall, who isn't too pleased with the Senate's educational package passed last week.

The reform bill took away teacher tenure and due process for fired educators, said Hall. He said the \$2,500 across-the-board pay raise for certified school instructors who spend at least 50 percent of their time in the classroom was passed by the Senate in a separate bill.

Hall, who has heard from several teachers in his district, questions the wisdom of doing away with tenure. He also questions the equity of the proposed raise, since it doesn't include other state employees, school administrators, librarians or janitors.

Lawmakers will be looking for \$40 million to pay for the pay raises, if the Senate proposal becomes law. "The governor says he'll veto the bill as it is now," noted Hall. "Some of us are working on a compromise bill now," he added.

House Bill 2, the state's budget, was passed last week by both houses. Hall said the House passed a budget of \$1,300,000,000, but the Senate shaved about \$9 million from that total. Lawmakers will have until Thursday to reach an agreement on the budget and get it to the governor's desk, said Hall, adding that Anaya has said he'll veto that bill, too.

A \$124 million tax package will get the final touches this week before consideration on the floor,

according to Hall.

The bill, which includes some elements of "House Bill 511" that was debated during last year's regular session, has been designed to raise state revenues through a variety of ways, including:

- a 14 percent hike in individual income tax,
- increased excise tax on automobiles,
- higher prices for vehicle license tags,
- elimination of medical rebates,
- an increase in county gross receipts tax rates from 3.75 to 4.50 percent,
- an increase in state compensating tax from 2.5 to 4.5 percent.

Hall said the bill will return property taxing authority to local officials—an element from HB511 that was highly feared by local lawmakers last session, since that bill included giving all gross receipts tax revenues to the state in exchange for the taxing authority.

"This session's bill doesn't include that trade-off," said Hall. He said state lawmakers are looking to the future when municipalities will no longer have federal revenue sharing, and will be looking for ways to raise funds, including tapping into property tax.

Under the present proposal, before local governments can raise property taxes, they'll have to take the question to the voters, added Hall.

The governor has signed two bills this session—the "feed bill" to pay for the legislative session and a solvency bill.

## Adult Rec Board plans extended meals service

The Adult Recreation Advisory Board (ARAB) Thursday discussed ways to increase the level of participation in Adult Recreation Center (ARC) activities, and then approved plans for a daily lunch program to bring people into the center.

During the regular meeting of the village board, members and guests talked of ways to identify prospective new members for the center, involve them and still retain the current small, but active, core of members.

"We now have a group of people here with an assumption that all the people coming here will be just like them," said board member Burdette Stampley, who presided at the meeting in the absence of chairman Barney Waldrop.

Stampley said the board may choose to do nothing and "maintain the status quo or broaden our vision and scope and reach out to other people."

"If you don't bring new people in, then it will die," said Village Councillor Jerry Shaw, an advisory member of the board. Shaw warned that in the current economy, the

council may look closely at a budget of over \$50,000 for a facility that serves only 20 people a day.

During the discussion, Stampley reported on another local group now working to expand the Meals-On-Wheels program to include more homebound clients and also to serve the more active seniors at a group meal each day. It was learned that the current program serves just one meal a day.

Although the group is "skeptical about the willingness of the center and the city to do anything," Stampley said he had been asked to see if the center would host the congregate meals.

"I'll support it 100 percent," said assistant village manager Frank Potter, who also commented on the combination of nutritional and social needs that could be met through such a program.

"I truly believe this center is not going to have substantial growth until we have meals," said Verna Adams, a member of the committee.

Stampley, who warned that the new program may cause some stress on the center's current active members, explained that the meals will be prepared at the Ruidoso-

Hondo Valley Hospital.

Bette Romans, ARC director, expressed her willingness to support the program, and opined that regulars at the center will also be supportive.

When asked if changes to the newsletter format have affected participation, Romans reported that participation is up "a little bit." She said 26 people attended the luncheon where a gift certificate donated by a pharmacy was given away.

Comments submitted by those 26 people were highly complimentary of Romans and her staff, and were unanimous in asking that no changes be made at the municipal center.

Romans reported almost twice as many people used the van since hours were extended from once a week to two days a week. She also said the steps and handles have been installed on the van.

After hearing that the ceramics room is being heavily utilized, members of the board suggested a ceramics display at some future time.

In discussing how to identify prospects for the Center, Alma Russell suggested checking on new retirees, and Charlotte Jarrau said

that information can be obtained through Social Security. She also suggested checking voter registration records in Carrizozo.


Also Thursday Potter explained that he is working with the Golden Age Club to provide a new van for the center, and the board unanimously approved his efforts.

Stampley announced that the Ruidoso Village Council approved selling the Center's lapidary equipment and reserving the proceeds to purchase a sign, and Romans revealed that the equipment has since been sold for \$235.

Members also learned that the village council agreed that the van may be driven outside the village limits, and heard a report from Romans on an upcoming trip to Alamogordo. She said five people have already signed up for the March 20 trip.

Although Mayor George White already asked Romans for a suggestion to replace the vacancy on the ARAB, members voted to ask that the appointment be delayed until all members can make recommendations.

Chairman Waldrop and member Cleve Kirby were absent from the monthly meeting.

# Building permits jump

Construction in the village got a shot in the arm in January with the issuance of a permit to build a \$2 million apartment project in Camelot Estates.

The new apartment permit, the only one issued in that category, at \$2,243,516, accounted for most of January's total valuation of \$2,493,569 which was made up of 23 permits in all areas.

The over \$2 million start for building permits for the first month of 1966 was a healthy indicator after

December's total of just \$341,951 for the 24 permits issued in all categories. In January 1965 Ruidoso saw 42 permits issued with a valuation of \$1,751,151.

Six permits with a valuation of \$429,023 were issued last month for new single family dwellings, a slight increase over December 1965's six single family residence permits with a valuation of \$382,298.

During January 1965, the Building Inspector issued nine single family home permits and they had a valuation of \$338,532.

Remodeling permits declined in value in January, after a year of hefty increases. A dozen permits for residential additions and alterations were issued in January 1966, compared to December's seven permits with a valuation of \$81,900, and down drastically from last January when 21 remodeling permits with a valuation of \$192,023 were issued.

No new commercial building permits were issued in Ruidoso in January. Five commercial permits for a total of \$572,450 were issued to December 1965, and a year ago, in January 1965, four were issued with a valuation of \$315,737.

One commercial remodel permit at \$36,000 was issued in January, compared to a month ago when three permits were issued with a valuation of just \$92,829. A year ago, January 1965, four permits were issued with a valuation of only \$17,660 for commercial alterations.

One demolition permit was issued last month, and one was issued in December 1965, but none were issued last year in January.

This January's one new apartment permit for \$2,243,516 is a big increase over last January's one new apartment permit with a valuation of just \$155,032. No permits were issued last month, December 1965, for new apartments or condominiums.

One apartment addition and alteration permit for \$80,000 was issued in January 1966, a jump over last month's two permits with a total of \$16,000, but down from last year's one permit with a valuation of \$51,400.

One grading permit was issued in January for \$200.



# Streets are being cleared after big snowfall

Snowy and icy streets over the past few days have caused no major traffic problems, according to Ruidoso Police Chief Richard Swenor.

In spite of a rash of "fender benders," the department recorded only one accident with injuries during the weekend storm, according to a police spokesman.

"They (drivers) can't go fast

enough to hurt each other," said Swenor, adding that vehicle accidents on snowy roads tend to cause more property damage and fewer personal injuries.

Swenor said police officers are answering many "assistance" calls, and are answering them as quickly as they can, but some callers will have to wait. Swenor said he is maintaining normal

levels of personnel, rather than call in extra officers since the department is continuing to keep overtime costs to a minimum.


"If you don't have to go anyplace, stay home," advised Swenor.

However, for those who must travel, assistant village manager Frank Potter reported early today (Monday) that village street crews are following the prescribed plan of

clearing major streets by 8 a.m. and then working on side streets.

Potter said the plan is working well, and all major intersections were passable by 8 a.m. today.

"We're trying to get everything open," said Potter, adding that with next week's three-day weekend he wants to be sure that "everybody can go skiing."

After the severe floods of last year, the Council voted unanimously to apply for a direct appropriation to replace our flooded bridges with new and better ones.

Realizing the importance of this project and the Village's budget shortfall, I went to Santa Fe five times at my own expense to lobby for your new bridges.

When the Legislature adjourned, our legislation died. Later when the Governor called the special session, our City Manager told me that he had been advised that we did not qualify.

I made a phone call and found, not only could we qualify, but if we made it to the Governor's desk, we would not be vetoed.

Since the Council had voted unanimously to request the direct appropriation (and I had testified in front of both Senate Finance and the House Tax and Revenue Committees), I went back to Santa Fe for the entire special session, without cost to the village, to lobby for our bridges.

When the bill was ruled 'not germane' to the session, I worked with Representative Hall and Senator Martin to have the legislation included in a Senate Substitute Bill.

A member of the Senate negotiating committee told me that I could only have one bill passed; I chose the Ruidoso Bridge Bill for \$583,600.

Construction of new bridges for Paradise Canyon, Reese Drive and the first two bridges in Upper Canyon will begin this summer.

As your elected representative, I acted on your behalf. I would like to continue to represent you as your Mayor.


In Ruidoso Little League basketball action Friday night at Ruidoso Middle School, Castel topped Capitlan, 39-18, in major-division action.



## Chimney sweep works on rooftops

Albert Rivera wears a top hat to work. No, he's not a magician, he is a professional chimney sweep who recently opened a business in

Ruidoso.

Rivera has had a chimney sweep service in Midland, Texas, for four years. He decided to open Ruidoso's Chimney Sweep because he felt a need for it in this area, where many people rely on fireplaces to heat their houses.

"A chimney sweep is a person who services chimneys by cleaning them," said Rivera. Rivera is certified to inspect and clean chimneys. He said that heavily-used chimneys should be inspected twice a year, to prevent chimney fires. Some insurance companies give deductions for maintenance and will not pay for fire damage caused by an unmaintained chimney, said Rivera.

A chimney fire starts in the flue line, not in the hearth, said Rivera, explaining that a fireplace can appear to have burned out, but a fire may actually be smoldering in the flue line. A down-draft blows smoke, like a bellows, creating a loud noise and possible fire.

Rivera said chimney fires burn like Roman candles. Fireballs may shoot out of the chimney into the house and onto the roof or yard.

Rivera and his assistant, Eileen McGuire, work to prevent fires by cleaning three parts of the chimney: the hearth, smoke chamber and chimney stack. They

begin on the roof, where they clean down with special brushes.


Inside, McGuire holds an industrial vacuum hose to filter loose particles as Rivera cleans the chimneys. Both wear the traditional top hat and black clothing.

The tradition of wearing the hat began in England many years ago, during the time when chimney sweeps used small boys (usually orphans) to climb in and clean the chimneys, reported Rivera. The top hat has become a symbol of the profession, he said, adding that the hat is supposed to bring the chimney sweep good luck, so he won't fall off the house.

"A chimney sweep is a happy-go-lucky type person," said Rivera, expounding on the mythical qualities attributed to the profession. "If you touch a chimney sweep and get soot on you, it brings seven years good luck," he said of the legend.

In addition to routine cleaning, the best way to fight buildup is to burn dry wood, such as juniper, cedar, oak or aspen. The greener the wood, the more it releases sap and creates buildup, said Rivera.

Rivera said he will inspect chimneys and give a free estimate for cleaning. The telephone number for Ruidoso's Chimney Sweep is 257-7719.

# Prenatal clinic for needy is set up

The Ruidoso Field Health Office, in cooperation with several Ruidoso physicians, will begin a prenatal care clinic for low-income and indigent women from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Tuesday, March 4, at the Lincoln County Sub-office.

District health officer Dr. Joseph Swanton and public health nurse Cathy Johnson said the prenatal clinic is designed to provide quality medical care for pregnant women in Lincoln County with limited financial resources.

"Quite simply, we want women who have no ability to pay (for quality prenatal care) to have healthy babies," Swanton said.

The prenatal care clinic will be offered the first Tuesday of every month at the Lincoln County Sub-office, Johnson said.

However, if the need is present, the prenatal care clinic would be allotted more time, Swanton said.

A woman in need of prenatal care must go to the Lincoln County Sub-office, fill out a financial screening, and undergo a routine pregnancy exam to qualify for the state funded program, Swanton said.

A woman with limited or no income, no social agency (Medicaid, etc.) funding and no insurance would probably qualify for the program, according to Swanton.

Any woman of child-bearing age (in any age group) in Lincoln County who can demonstrate financial need and is not past the 27th week of her pregnancy, is eligible for the program, Swanton said.

If a woman satisfies the state financial guidelines, she will be eligible for pregnancy counseling, nutritional counseling, exercise guidance, laboratory tests, prescriptions and any healthcare item related to the well being of the fetus and mother at no cost, through the 27th week of her pregnancy, Johnson said.

After the 27th week of the pregnancy, women will be referred to local physicians on a rotating basis for the remaining weeks of the pregnancy and the delivery of the baby, Swanton said.

Several local physicians have agreed to offer last semester prenatal care and delivery services at a "fraction of the normal cost," according to Swanton.

Thus far, Dr. R.A. Beechie, Dr. Arlene Brown, Dr. William Harrison and Dr. Tim Fields have agreed to participate in the final stages of the prenatal care clinic.

If Swanton and Johnson identify a woman as being in a high-risk category (high-blood pressure, diabetes, toxemia and other conditions that may put the woman and

or her baby in a potentially dangerous health situation), the patient is automatically referred to a private physician for medical care. "We have funds from Santa Fe to take care of a woman in a high risk health category at no cost to the patient," Swanton said.

Swanton said a prenatal nurse practitioner will also be hired for the program.

Swanton practiced obstetrics-gynecology for 15 years before becoming the District Four (Southeastern New Mexico) health officer for the state.

Swanton said similar programs have been very successful in the District Four health offices of Artesia, Clovis, Portales and Roswell, as well as in other health districts in the state.

## Police officer will implement fitness program

Corporal Oscar Villado of the Ruidoso Police Department is the first local officer to be certified as a physical fitness instructor.

Villado attended a week-long training session at the New Mexico

Police Academy, passed the certification test and is now charged with implementing a brand new program for the department.

"We all know we need to be in better shape," said Villado.

"As police officers we have a responsibility to the public—for us to do our job we have to be in good physical condition," he added.

Villado said police officers need to be in shape to respond to emergency needs, but added that the fitness program also is designed to improve each officer's total well-being.

Benefits he listed include alleviating stress, lessening lower-back problems associated with lengthy patrol duties and reducing absenteeism.

Presently, said Villado, participation is on a volunteer basis.

Police Chief Richard Swenor said the program will help reduce his department's liability, by keeping personnel in top condition to fulfill their duties.

He said the program initially will be required of the new officers who haven't been through the state academy, since the state has strict fitness requirements for the trainees. Swenor noted that only two members of the department are scheduled to attend the academy this year.

"Then we'll start working on the whole department," said Swenor, adding that it will be a matter of time before all officers are involved. He said the first step was to get an instructor, and now the program can begin.

Villado said the program is pretty well set up, and his training will enable him to implement it. The first step is a series of tests to evaluate the officers' current fitness level, he said.

Testing is performed in the areas of endurance, absolute strength and flexibility, explained Villado. He said results are calculated on an age-level scale.

After the initial testing, Villado has been trained in setting up individual physical fitness programs to bring each department member up to that officer's optimum fitness level.

Villado also received information on nutrition, and said the program may include discussions on healthy eating habits. He said the Ruidoso Athletic Club has agreed to help with fitness and nutrition planning.

## Water is top candidates' concern as March 4 election approaches

(Editor's note: due to space limitations, profiles of the five trustee candidates will be divided, to run in two issues of The Capitan Range. Mayoral and judge candidates also will be featured in upcoming issues of The Range.)

On March 4, Capitan voters will determine who will fill two seats on the board of village trustees. Dave Strickland, David N. Rouleau, Charles "Dave" Locke, W.F. "Fug" Eckland and Olan Booher are the trustee candidates.

Dave Strickland and his wife, Wanda, have one child, Steven, at home. Strickland has lived in Capitan for four years, "this time," he said. He first visited Capitan in 1951, but his work with offshore construction kept him on the move. He retired from construction in 1982 and is now with All-American Ford in Ruidoso.

Strickland said that when he first came to Capitan in 1951, the major village problem was water. When he returned in 1964, water problems still plagued Capitan; and in 1986, water continues as the major problem.

Strickland said he favors developing the new well and keeping other sources of water, such as Eagle Creek.

"We've gone this far, I hate to see it turned out to pasture," he commented about the well.

Strickland said he is satisfied with the existing well test, but supports running another test to satisfy others who are not.

"Whatever it takes to get this behind us," he said.

Strickland said he felt his career experience in filter plant installations in offshore construction will help him make decisions about the village filter system. He said he has looked at the existing filter. He said he felt that the present village water and filter system was designed for a much smaller community and was "never designed properly."

"Upgrading is no solution to the problem," Strickland said. He said he wanted the village to get the well into the water system, then to upgrade the filter for "pure, clean water."

Commenting on what Capitan might face in the future, Strickland said he feels the village is "foolish" not to take advantage of future growth opportunities, such as the airport and the enlarged race track.

Strickland concluded that he wanted to see the village resolve the water problems that "unfortunately have turned into controversy."

Dave Strickland came to Capitan about 11 years ago to begin practice as the village's only doctor. Now with his wife, Sheri, he continues his practice. Rouleau said he is running for office because of the health issue involved with the water problem.

"Water and sewer automatically come first," Rouleau said.

Rouleau said he is not against the new well, but he thinks the villagers need more information, primarily on the costs and water rights issues.

"We need more answers before we put all our eggs in the basket," he said.

Water quantity is the first priority and the quality is second, said Rouleau. The filter plant "definitely needs improvement because of the volume of water" used by the village.

"Pursue the quality first—update the filter and then develop the well," Rouleau said.

"Growth is dependent on the water and sewer. I think we're five to 10 years behind," he added.

Fire protection can be addressed only after the water situation is resolved, he said. He said that the area will grow, but he wants the water and sewer to be the priorities in the village.

Charles Locke (known in Capitan as Dave) has resided in Capitan for

three years with his wife, Vicki, and his two children, Kimberly and Jason. He is self-employed and is familiar with the village as he has owned property here for 16 years.

Locke said he is running for trustee because he feels he can do some good for the village. His experience in the military will help in making decisions for the village, he said.

The water situation is a big controversial item, Locke said. "It is the most heated item on the platform," he said.

"I believe Capitan needs an alternate source of water," he said.

He said he approves of the new well, if it proves (after testing) to be a "good sound well." However, Locke said he wants the well to be used as a supplemental source of water.

"We should never turn our backs on the Eagle Creek supply," he said.

Locke said the village needs some kind of filter plant, but he thinks a filter only will produce cleaner water, not pure water. To purify the water, Capitan would need a purification plant.

"People are expecting pure water. It won't happen with only a filter," Locke said.

He opined that the village never could afford a purification plant and that many residents are "misled" into thinking that a filter plant will purify the water. The water coming from a filter plant will be better than before, but not pure, said Locke.

The dry weather and decreased snow pack is a concern to Locke,

who feels the village should develop the well and bring it in "real quick."

"If there's no water in the lake, there's none in the village," he said.

He added that he felt Capitan residents should not be deceived into thinking half of the water in Alto Lake belongs to Capitan. The lake is fed by water from Eagle Creek, which supplies both Ruidoso and Capitan. Locke said most of the water stored in Alto is from the Ruidoso water tank that ruptured recently.

Locke did not place a first priority on either the well or the filter, but he said he felt the well could not be tested until the water rights protest is resolved in June.

He said he feels the village needs both a good well and a filter system. He commented that if the well water is brought into the downtown area, the water situation will be alleviated in the subdivisions.

Locke said he is concerned about fire protection, especially in the subdivisions of the village. "It is an issue to explore," he commented.

Locke said he feels he could work with either mayoral candidate—Vernon Beavers or Benny Coker. He opined that the village has split into separate factions over the water issue.

"The village has got to get back together and face the critical issues," he said. "When the village runs out of water, we all run out," he concluded.


