Candidates express views as March 4 election nears

Candidates for Ruidoso municipal offices spoke Wednesday to the Ruidoso Federated Woman's Club (RFWC) during the third candidates' forum of the campaign.

Before a group of about 50 club members and guests gathered in the Woman's Club building, the 13 candidates presented prepared speeches before answering questions from the audience.

Mayoral candidates, candidates for a two-year term on the Ruidoso Village Council and candidates for three four-year council terms gave their views with mayoral candidate J.D. James speaking first.

"I'm a candidate for all people ... no certain group," said James, who also stressed teamwork in his speech.

James called for reducing waste and duplication of services in the village and said he'll ask for monthly budget comparison reports if he's successful in his bid for mayor.

Mayoral candidate Lloyd Davis Jr., recalled meeting in the Woman's Club building with the Boy Scouts in 1939-40.

"The operation of the Village of Ruidoso sometimes becomes fractured," said Davis, calling for more cooperation to solve village problems, including the "ongoing" water problems.

"If we can promote a new image in new areas we'll be going 100 percent in the right direction," said Davis.

Bill Karn, a candidate for mayor, told of his accomplishments as a member of the present village council, including testifying before state committees and obtaining direct appropriations to repair

village bridges.

Karn reminded listeners that the appraisal on the Ruidoso Municipal Airport land won't be complete until after municipal elections. He said the next council will need to negotiate with the Federal Aviation Administration on terms for keeping the airport land.

"I'd like to use the experience I've had in the past to help negotiate better deals for Ruidoso," said Karn.

Rick Evans, a mayoral candidate, said Wednesday that of the many critical issues facing Ruidoso, the handling of the disposition of the current airport land is the most critical.

Evans stated that it is feasible to expect that a privately funded

educational institution can be persuaded to locate a college or university on the airport land.

"We must get over this political hurdle," said Evans, referring to convincing the next governing body that Ruidoso should keep the airport land. He added that by keeping the land and locating a university there, Ruidoso will begin to diversify the local economy.

William A. "Dub" Holt, a member of the present village council, was the first of seven candidates for three four-year council seats to speak.

"I've seen the ups and I've seen the downs just like you have," said Holt, who said he has been in business in Ruidoso for 10 years.

Holt listed the village economy as

a critical issue for the next council, and said new markets must be sought to expand the economic base. Ruidoso can't afford any new taxes, warned Holt.

"The village is a business," said Holt. "You must spend no more than what you're taking in," he added.

"One of the great moments of being a candidate is to be invited to the Woman's Club," said Mike Radziewicz, a candidate for a four-year village council term.

Radziewicz said Ruidoso has weathered a very strong downturn in the economy, and noted that the people here now are those who will stay.

He called for better communications among elected and paid of-

ficials and the citizenry, adding that he favors strong management that will lead the village into spending money wisely.

Radziewicz also called for establishing new markets in areas like Tucson, Arizona, which is close, large and has a diverse economy.

Councillor candidate Larry Simon, campaigning for a four-year slot, reminisced of growing up in Ruidoso, graduating from Ruidoso High School and spending 11 years on the Ruidoso Police Department.

He recalled how the department had just six officers, three dispatchers and "three old broken down cars" in 1972, when he went to work there.

"We've improved things quite a

bit there, but it was a long, hard battle," said Simon. He said one of his strong points is getting along with people, and told listeners he'll be able to work well with fellow councillors and village officials.

Milt Alcorn, also a candidate for four years on the village council, told of his 60 years as a Boy Scout, counting his administrative career and his membership as a boy.

"You don't know how fast that 60 years went by," said Alcorn. He explained that he learned a lot as a Boy Scout executive about working with volunteers and handling money.

Alcorn, who has questioned village administrators about some financial procedures, said he has "had a little trouble getting some of that information out of city hall."

Councillor candidate Rick Davis, running for a four-year term, told the group that he moved to Ruidoso because of its beauty and "because I wanted to be here."


"The past's over with, we can't do anything about the past," said Davis, calling for Ruidoso to move forward keeping a positive attitude.

"I want to see this town progress again ... get back on its feet," added Davis.

Michael Callaghan, a candidate for four years on the village council, told of a previous bid for a council seat, and of his attendance at council meetings and service on the Planning and Zoning Commission.

"I want to work for the people of this town," said Callaghan.

Elmer Pirelli, also seeking a four-year council term, told the group that he has been in Ruidoso for many years and in that time has served on the village council and

Village, county groups call meeting

Mayor George White and Lincoln County Commission Chairman Bill Elliott have called a joint meeting of the Ruidoso Village Council and the Lincoln County Commissioners for 2 p.m. Friday, February 23, in council chambers of Village Hall.

Purpose of the meeting is to discuss Emergency Medical Services and ambulance services in Lincoln County, according to the call.

It was learned that Mayor White called the council meeting in response to a letter signed by county attorney Steve Sanders.

White confirmed receiving a letter that revealed problems between county ambulance services, adding that Sanders requested the joint meeting.

"The county is concerned about making sure that the person who calls for an ambulance receives the

fastest service," said Sanders.

He said the feeling of the county commissioners is that sometimes the call is not going to the closest ambulance.

"We feel as though we shouldn't get involved, it's none of our business," said White, who added that he has invited Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Hospital administrator Ken Moore to the meeting.

"I think it's real good that we're meeting," said Moore.

Village manager Jim Hine explained that the village has a contract with RHVH on emergency medical and ambulance services. Under that contract, Hine said Ruidoso provides a building and equipment and up to \$138,000 a year for the service, and management is provided through the hospital.

Elliott said he preferred to comment on reasons for calling the meeting after commissioners and councillors have met.

Three hurt in accident

Three people were injured Tuesday in a three-car accident on Sudderth Drive near Safeway, according to the Ruidoso Police.

Aubrey Imoe, 63, of Ruidoso, was westbound on Sudderth, attempting to make a left turn into the Safeway parking lot, according to police.

Imoe told police that a laundry truck was in the roadway blocking her vision, causing her to collide with an eastbound vehicle driven by Dolores F. Booher, 45, of Ruidoso, said the report.

Police reported that the collision pushed Imoe's vehicle into a vehicle driven by Thelton Lester, 24, of Mescalero, in the Safeway parking lot entrance.

Booher and her passenger, Tooti Booher, 6, along with Corrina Coonie, a three-year-old passenger in the Lester vehicle, were treated and released at Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Hospital, said a hospital spokesman.

Police said Imoe was cited for right of way violation, and Lester was cited for driving without a driver's license and failure to show proof of insurance.

New hospital birthing room simulates at-home atmosphere

Last Friday marked the grand opening of a new type of birthing room at Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Hospital (RHVH).

Katy Wickware, assistant administrator of RHVH; Ruth Moore, president of the RHVH Hospital Auxiliary; and Ellyn Anderson, swing-bed coordinator at RHVH, were present at the ribbon-cutting ceremony in the birthing room on Friday.

In May 1985, the RHVH Auxiliary voted to donate \$25,000 toward the development of a birthing room with a special "home like" atmosphere, Wickware said.

The Hospital Auxiliary members donated equipment, furniture, drapes and rugs to RHVH to help create a household like atmosphere for the birthing room, Wickware said.


The mother and baby are allowed to stay in the birthing room until discharge, Wickware said.

Wickware said a special criteria has been approved which defines a "low-risk," uncomplicated pregnancy.

Mothers who meet the criteria for this category may use the room, Wickware said.

If a problem should arise during

labor, delivery would take place in the regular hospital delivery room, which is equipped for more complicated deliveries.

Temporary buildings concern Planning and Zoning members

The Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) Monday approved three requests and didn't act on two agenda items during its regular meeting.

Although P&Z scheduled reviews on two sales offices—temporary buildings—in Pinecliff Subdivision, the group opted not to act since a spokesman for Crownpoint Corporation, the requester, wasn't on hand for the meeting.

Temporary approval previously granted on the two sales offices expires on February 22, according to village enforcement officer Paul Davis.

During a workshop session preceding the commission meeting, members reviewed the history of the two temporary buildings located on Tract L of Pinecliff Subdivision.

P&Z chairman Mike Galagher reminded commissioners that Crownpoint Corporation originally asked for temporary approval for one building, and it was granted for six months. He said the expansion, in which another temporary sales office was installed, was done without asking for P&Z approval.

Although P&Z eventually denied a request on the temporary building that was already in use, Galagher

said the Ruidoso Village Council approved the request, and set an expiration date to coincide with that of the first building, February 22.

Member Ken Carr noted that the application for an extension didn't specify a length of time, and commissioner Leon Griffin asked about progress on the requester's permanent building.

Carr noted that the user will still be able to operate from the temporary structures, even when the approval period expires.

"All he's got to do is get the city council," said Carr.

During the regular meeting, commissioners voted unanimously to wait for Crownpoint Corporation to contact the commissioner before considering the extension application.

Commissioners also discussed a portion of the village sign ordinance calling for the removal of signs belonging to businesses that close permanently and don't remove their own signs.

Davis explained that the ordinance calls for the enforcement officer to "remove" such signs, and said he has no secure storage place.

"I hate to see us go into the sign removal and storage business," said Davis, who agreed to ask the village attorney to make a recommendation at the next council meeting on that section of the ordinance.

After Monday P&Z met in a workshop session, commissioners approved a resolution to wait for Crownpoint Corporation to contact the commissioner before considering the extension application.

William A. "Duffy" Holt presented that follow-up council report. He said he was asked to participate in the study because he chaired the group that drafted the village's association policy.

Stores react to Tylenol capsule news

Most stores contacted Wednesday by The Ruidoso News said they had never seen any of the Extra-Strength Tylenol capsules from the stores.

A spokeswoman for Walgreens said they didn't have the capsules off their shelves until a day or two after the "scare" when a Shively drug store in Ruidoso had a few capsules.

A manager at the Shively store said he had not carried Extra-Strength Tylenol capsules since the first "scare" in 1982.

A manager at New Franklin Family Center said his company immediately called their suppliers to see if their health centers of Extra-Strength Tylenol capsules carried the "scare" capsules, and they didn't.

The New Franklin manager said he had never seen any of the

Strength Tylenol capsules on the shelves, but now said they saw them in their stores.

Dave Schaeffer, of Don's Hardware Store, said he had the capsules off his shelves after the "scare" but the "scare" just to be certain and "get customers' attention."

Bill Long and Robert Lohm, managers at Hovco Discount Drug Center, said as soon as they heard there was a problem with Extra-Strength Tylenol capsules, they pulled all Tylenol capsules from their shelves.

"It was a professional judgment," Lohm said.

A few days after the news of the tainted capsules had circulated, Lohm said he got a message from Hovco's headquarters in Reno, Nev., saying the capsules were safe.

The Hovco corporate offices in Reno said they had never seen any of the

members of Extra-Strength Tylenol capsules, to all their stores. He said he had never seen any of the capsules off the shelves, Lohm said.

Most of the officials for the various Ruidoso stores felt the members of Extra-Strength Tylenol capsules would change the problem capsules for different Tylenol products.

It looks like the same old story in the National Basketball Association (NBA) this season.

The defending champion Los Angeles Lakers and the 1984 champion Boston Celtics again appear to be the top teams in the league. They've met for the league title the past two seasons.

As of this writing, Boston is leading the Eastern Conference's Atlantic Division by eight and one half games. The Lakers are leading the Western Conference's Pacific Division by 12 1/2 games.

In the past six seasons, the Lakers have won the title three times, the Celtics have won twice and the Philadelphia 76ers have won once.

Those three teams have been the league's powerhouses in the 1980s, but even the 76ers have not approached the consistency of the Celtics and Lakers.

But even though the Lakers and Celtics are dominating this season, there's some hope for the future.

Houston appears to have the makings of an excellent team, currently having a 35-18 record and leading the Midwest Division.

Milwaukee also has an excellent team, in fact its 37-18 record is the third best in the league.

However, the rest of the league is stuck in mediocrity and getting worse.

For example, the Golden State Warriors (with the league's worst record) have not made the playoffs since 1977.

Teams like Golden State, Indiana and Sacramento have been in the bottom rung of the league for several seasons and don't seem to have the coaching or organizational ability to break out of their losing streaks.

So, it appears the Lakers and Celtics will again meet in the league championship series.

And that's beginning to sound like a broken record.

Turning to local basketball, the Chiefs of the Ruidoso Parks and Recreation Adult Basketball League have a long winning streak going.

The Chiefs are 12-0 this season and have won something like 25 straight games going back to last season.

They'll also be pretty busy in the middle of March. Besides the local recreation tournament, the Chiefs will be competing in some other tournaments in the area.

But the season is not over, and there are some other fine teams in the league.

Look for the adult league to have some exciting action the rest of the season.

District mat touney should be close

The title fight will be the main event in the District 3-AAA tournament Friday, February 21, at the Ruidoso High School.

The host Warriors and their Ochoa, Silver City and Grants opponents will meet in the final at the Deming, New Mexico, Military Institute and New Mexico State for the Varsity Championship City and State at the Ruidoso High School.

Warrior has the most depth in the title fight, said Warriors head coach Gene Segura. Ochoa, Silver City and Grants are also strong contenders.

The competition will begin at 11 a.m. The second round will be from 12:30 to 1 and the third one from 2:30 to 3.

The consolation finals will be from 3:30 to 4 and the championship final will start at 4. The top four wrestlers in each weight class will qualify for the state tournament.

Ruidoso finished the district mat season with an 11-3 record, its best ever.

However, two of the losses were to Grants and Silver City.

"All of the wrestlers have three or four wrestlers who could win titles," Harris said. "It should be very close."

Harris thinks the Warriors' best chances will be in the 105-pound weight class with Jeff Schmidt, 105-pound weight class with Mike Valenzuela, 125-pound weight class with Zach Swindler, 145-pound class with Kerry Johnson and 165-pound class with James Herrera.

Herrera has the Warriors' best record at 2-5. Valenzuela is 2-5, Schmidt is 2-2, Swindler is 1-1 and Johnson is 1-1.

Herrera figures to battle for the 165-pound crown with North's Scott Robinson. The two wrestlers have met four times this season, each winning twice.

Valenzuela did not compete in last week's Pecos Valley Tournament because he was sick, but he

should be OK for the district tournament.

Another Warrior wrestler who has been sick is Kyle Johnson. Johnson is scheduled to go at 157 pounds, but Harris says might wrestle at that class if Johnson is unable to.

Kyle is 1-1 on the season, but was 1-2 before he became sick.

Other Warrior wrestlers who will compete include Scott Yostman at 134 pounds, Gary Garcia at 121 pounds, Al Holt at 138 pounds, Brian Herrera at 134 pounds, Jason Hill at 138 pounds and Phillip Herrera at heavyweight.

Phillip Herrera is the defending district champion, but got off to a slow start this season.

However, the senior has come on strong in recent weeks and has a five-2-1 record.

Herrera will automatically qualify for state since there are just four wrestlers in his weight class.

The state 3-AAA division tournament will be in Bismarck, Friday and Saturday, February 28-March 1.

Some excellent rebounding and a 20-point scoring output by Russell Easter opened the Ruidoso High School boys varsity basketball team to a 68-52 win over visiting Tularosa Tuesday night.

Ruidoso, now 9-20 on the overall season, will resume District 3-AAA play Friday, February 21, at Deming, Saturday, February 22, the Warriors will host Hot Springs, the state's second-ranked team. Ruidoso is 1-3 in district play.

If Ruidoso can rebound as well against Deming and Hot Springs as the Warriors did against Tularosa, Ruidoso could emerge with two wins.

Ruidoso broke the game open in the second period, outscoring the visitors, 24-9, for a 37-25 halftime advantage.


The Warriors continued their impressive play in the third period, outscoring Tularosa, 22-12, for a 59-37 edge.

Reading program promotes interaction

A new reading incentive program for second- and third-grade students at White Mountain Elementary School (WMES) has been instituted by Karen Tillman, Ruidoso Municipal Schools special education director and principal of WMES.

Tillman said the Parents And Teachers Helping (PATH) program, distributed by World Book-Childcraft, Inc., is designed to promote interaction between parents and their children.

Tillman said statistics show parents only spend 12 to 15 minutes per day with one child, and many experts feel half of that time is spent telling the child what to do.

Many educators feel television has interfered with parent-to-child interactions in a harmful way, Tillman said.

Tillman introduced the reading program at a meeting of over 75 parents at WMES last month. She feels almost every child at White Mountain Elementary will be enrolled in the program eventually.

Many second- and third-grade students who have begun the reading program are enthusiastic about it, Tillman said.

Second- and third-graders usually do respond well to programs that involve their parents, Tillman said.

By the time a high school student graduates he or she has spent over 15,000 hours watching television, but only 11,000 hours, or 14 percent of the total time from birth to age 18, in school, Tillman said.

This program is not only designed to help a child become a better reader by interacting with parents for 15 to 20 minutes nightly, but also

to promote better parent-child communication, Tillman said.



McMillan announces governor's office bid

Support for a new airport and concern about the source of state revenues were top concerns of gubernatorial candidate Colin McMillan who visited Hudson recently.

McMillan announced his candidacy for the Republican nomination for governor January 16.

McMillan told The News that he has piloted aircraft in and out of the Hudson Municipal Airport many times, a task he describes as "a white knuckle experience."

The candidate said state support of a new airport here is necessary. He believes placing the airport development in a realistic way to build the facility, and said he will work with the Hudson community to attract scheduled airline service to the airport.

McMillan sees a new airport as a boon to the tourism industry here, and statewide.

The Roswell resident said traveling to his ranch and farm operation near Three Rivers has made him very familiar with this area. A geologist by trade, McMillan has served 12 years in the state

Legislature.

This emphasis on growing state revenues from the automotive industries must be changed, McMillan said. He proposed a gradual switch to a tax on car light manufacturing industries.

The candidate said state government also must change. He argued that government has not had the priority it is getting over the past 15 years. McMillan said New Mexico has twice as many state employees as are needed, as compared to most other states, as a result of the state's overexpansion as it grows its economy. Only when government is running at peak efficiency does McMillan believe a tax raise could be considered.

On education, McMillan said teachers' salaries should be increased. He pointed out that although New Mexico ranks in the middle nationally in the level of teachers' salaries, New Mexico is last in the percentage of the budget that goes toward teachers' salaries, compared to other states. McMillan said a larger portion of the budget should go toward teachers' salaries and education.

The candidate said he supports the death penalty in New Mexico.

He said he feels it is important to improve and expand the current tax on all businesses when a higher or lower rate fits the appropriate.

If elected governor, McMillan said he would like to work with legislators since he has so much experience working as a legislator. During his years in the House of Representatives, McMillan said he worked on bills on the House floor and in the

Committee. McMillan is registered with the New Mexico State Bar.

"We need to give the confidence of the people of the state and the business community," he said. "A stable state government, good educational system and good tax structure and the state is going to prosper."



Editorial

Is it fair for a municipality to enforce some ordinances, and leave unenforced those that appear too complicated or sensitive? We think not.

Consider the case of the Sutphen sign. A village regulation calls for the removal of a sign soon after the business ceases operations. The regulation calls for the owner of the sign to remove it, but if that doesn't happen, responsibility for removal falls on the village.

In the case of the Sutphen sign, removal is particularly important as it partially blocks the view of a sign of an adjoining business—that is *in business*.

Only after the adjoining businessman complained did village officials really get serious about removing the sign, and even now roadblocks to removal of the sign seem to rise quite frequently.

Difficulties in notifying Sutphen's owner, how to remove such a large sign and where to safely store it certainly are concerns to be taken seriously, but they must be overcome.

In the meantime, an obsolete sign continues as an eyesore and as a detriment to a local businessman, and some village ordinances are being enforced while others are not.—DJP

Any replacement airport will serve almost exclusively as a private use facility, just like the present. Should the taxpayers, here or anywhere else, pay for benefits accruing to the private sector? After Ruidoso gets a new airport, if at all, where will the money come from to pay for maintenance, payroll, supplies, etc? The existing airport is presently subsidized, but the airport plan that the developers have foisted on you will cost many times more to operate. Fellow citizens, it will come from your own pocket book. Think about it!

If a new airport is needed, why not scale it realistically to a demonstrated need? Let's use existing resources like the Carrizozo Airport as a starting point, or even, dare we look at our own Ruidoso Airport, by cutting down a hill or two there?

Money never grew on trees, and the possibility of that happening today, with the Gramm-Rudman-Hollings Deficit Reduction Bill, destroys such adolescent dreams. I say, let's get on with it, but with a project that we can all live with.

Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE— Maybe Paul Becht is just not the guy.

There would appear to be lots of feeling among New Mexico voters that we could use the return-to-religious-basics in government that Becht says he stands for. If so, there are few present signs that the people who want that are out to sweep this particular gentleman into high office.

It was widely bruited about that 2000 such persons would break bread together when popular TV evangelist Pat Robertson appeared in support of Becht at an Albuquerque function. Actual turnout was less than half that number.

Cash contributions to the Becht campaign also appear to be slow in coming, and the candidate himself reports he only has organizations in a few of our 33 counties. When last heard from, he still had a long way to go to collect the number of Republican signatures he's going to have to have on petitions to get into the primary.

In fact, so soft does the Becht support appear to be at the moment that some cynics might suspect the religious candidate is playing it down in an effort to throw off the opposition.

That, however, raises certain ethical questions. Certainly a man who stands for strict adherence to moral values wouldn't lie, even to newspaper reporters, simply to give himself an advantage over those running against him.

Meanwhile, elsewhere in the Republican primary, things seem to be going about as expected. That means they aren't going like a house afire. Given the fact that there are eight members of this party seeking the gubernatorial nomination alone, not to mention others who also want to run for statewide office, collecting the bucks has turned out to be a discouraging activity.

Colin McMillan, of course, reported his take to date, in what can only be called a slightly boastful manner. It was a healthy wad, though some of the cold-eyed among us did note that something approaching half of the total was given by the candidate himself. McMillan also decided not to report his expenditures, which might be because he doesn't want us to know how little is left after all he spent on

those well-produced but expensive TV spots and for the time to run them in.

What other Republican candidate has done that same thing? Why, Joe Mercer, of course, though his TV spots, run just before a statewide survey to see what candidate had best name-identification, were aired so early they have now all but fled from the memories of everyone but the most tenacious political aficionados among us.

Boy, it's easy to pour political money down a rathole!

Some of his opponents have tried to make something of the fact that Mercer failed to admit he voted against the current death-penalty law when he was in the Senate. He did appear to some to glide over that fact very lightly, while Becht was bravely admitting that he voted no, and explaining why he has since changed his mind on the subject.

Jack Morgan, another candidate, is busy in the state Senate, and Garry Carruthers is probably spending his time deepening his organization and begging for dollars.

And off out there in the tules, Frank Bond is applying his battle-scarred knuckles to front doors somewhere. Last time we talked with him, he was just about to complete his 11,000th such call, on his way to the 30,000 New Mexico homes he plans to visit before primary day comes.

Nobody knows whether all that work will pay off, but it's an imaginative gamble. This writer has heard U.S. Senator Lator Chiles describe how, by walking the roads of Florida, he beat an incumbent and made his way to Washington.

Sometimes the traditional ways of seeking election are the ones that are no longer applicable.

Bond, for instance, has gathered \$134,000 into his campaign war-chest, and only \$3000 of that came out of his pocket. That suggests some people think his non-traditional candidacy has a good shot at the title.

It's early to be making any predictions about this unusually large crop of Republicans who all want the same job, but we can tell already that it's going to be an interesting contest.



Prize money for Sunland Park's thoroughbred and quarter horse racing programs has been increased approximately \$75,000 for the remainder of the 1986 season, general manager Rick Henson announced Tuesday.
 The boost, which represents a 7.4 percent increase in the track's purses, goes into effect with Friday's program, the racing executive said.
 Henson said the decision to raise purse money was made after reviewing budget figures for the current season.
 "Since the first of January our

handle has been above projected budget figures," he said. "This is a reflection of strong support by the horsemen at the track."
 Fields for Sunland's races have averaged 9.7 horses per race since the first of the year, Henson said. Purse money is calculated on a percentage of the track's total wagering, which has increased significantly by the fuller fields, he added.
 "The horsemen deserve all the credit for the increase in purse monies," Henson said. "They've been working overtime to offer the

public quality racing programs. We're extremely pleased that their efforts will be rewarded."
 Henson said purses at Sunland will increase \$100 to \$300, with the higher class races receiving the largest increase. The track's bottom purse will jump from \$1,700 to \$1,800.
 "This will result in an average increase of \$2,600 per day in the purse money," he said.
 A total of 33 racing days remain in Sunland Park's 1985-86 season, with 11-race programs scheduled Friday through Sunday until May 4.

Jerry Hill, who had demolished a short field of routers at 1/16 miles on January 25, was backed down to the 9-5 choice to win Sunday's Marathon, which was contested at 1/36 miles.

Bakery's Dozen led the 11-horse field for the Marathon to the half-mile mark before firing, with Mi Dewan and Grand Performance stalking the leader around the final turn.

Mi Dewan took command of the race at the top of the stretch and raced unchallenged through the final furlong to win in 2:00.2 seconds.

Grand Performance held on for second, finishing in front of

Delpour, who made a bold move in deep stretch to capture third. Jockey Mark Hadley had the riding assignment aboard Grand Performance, who is owned and trained by Ben James of El Paso, Harla Webb rode Delpour for trainer Bill Thompson.

Favored Jerry Hill was never in the hunt, running sixth out of the final turn and crossing the wire in the same position.

Mi Dewan's victory was worth \$1,800 for owner Martinez. Oscar Cavalin trains the gelding. He returned \$11.60. Cavalin commented on the horse's performance in the winner's circle after the race.

"This is a very good distance horse," the conditioner said. "When he passes the mile mark, he really begins to stride out. In this race, he just ran faster as the race went on."

"We get him in condition for the distance races by running him at a mile. In the mile races, if he feels like running we let him go... if not,

we don't push him." Cavalin said Mi Dewan's next big assignment will come in the fifth and final leg of the Rio Grande Marathon Series on March 29.

Dust to Riches easy victor in feature race

El Pasion Francisco Gonzalez had his picture taken in the winner's circle Saturday at Sunland Park after his thoroughbred Dust To Riches blew to an easy victory in the feature event on the 11-race program.

Among 2,800 fans attending the afternoon card, only two handicappers held perfect tickets in the Pic-Six, each returning \$2,280.

Saturday's fifth race marked the opening of the 2-year-old thoroughbred racing season.

Trainer Terrell Davidson's Lightfoot Lil got the best of eight juveniles facing off at a half-mile. Jimmie Hunt rode the filly, who is owned by Jacqueline Spencer of Alto.

Jockey Carlos Rivas took advantage of a swift early pace to ride Incredible T. to a decisive four-length victory in February 14's mile-long allowance feature at Sunland Park Race Track.

A little more than 1,900 fans backed the New Mexico-bred down to the 4-5 choice to win the route, with Magic Street second in the wagering and Bold Battle Ax third.

Dynamic Senta led the six-quarter mile mark with Bold Battle
