

New airport

Will plans remain on schedule?

The Santa Elena Airport Commission (SEAC) Tuesday said the Santa Elena Regional Airport construction schedule will likely be completed by November 1986, but that plans for an expanded facility by November 1988 are in jeopardy.

There's a chance that we can pull the schedule out of the hat," said Commission Chairman Frank Robinson. In spite of Cook's warning that the project will be delayed to complete the project after the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) makes a funding decision.

Cook said that could be solved with a funding decision made through the FAA.

Robinson reminded county commissioners that the FAA's requirement for clearing title with an environmental statement is complete, and the environmental statement on the SEAC's side is complete. He said that as an environmental species, the SEAC's budget is complete and the FAA is now working on a decision for the east board of the Fort Stanton Messeria.

He pointed out that the project will be issued by April 1. Cook and Robinson had an exchange of views on the environmental statement, the funding decision and a question of title and came up with a number of places looking at SEAC in the summer of 1986.

"This has always been the project plan to complete the task," said Robinson, saying the FAA Master Plan which called for distributing the project over two to three fiscal years. He said the most optimistic schedule was adopted with the realization that money would be needed to get the project started.

"Right now this community and the county is in an economic depression," Robinson said. "If there's one thing we need it's a spark to get some activity going again." "This airport is one thing people are looking at—one of the more positive things we've got going."

Robinson recommended county commissioners delegate Cook to help get the project back on a "fast-track" schedule and Robinson agreed Robinson would contact the Secretary of Transportation and ask her to talk with the Secretary of the Interior.

Robinson commended the committee who have remained on schedule in spite of funding delays. He also commended the Board of Land Management for completing the survey and transferring the title to the airport land on a timely basis.

He said the SEAC will continue reviewing the local documents concerning the land in a special advisory March 7.

Robinson displayed brass plaques of the airport site corner markers that will be presented to some people who have helped get the airport project this far.

Commissioners also discussed the possibility of commercial and residential service to the SEAC. After hearing Ruidoso Municipal Airport manager Tom Moore describe several contracts he's made on that subject, the group voted to go to the next step of contacting the Lincoln County, Wyoming and the Grand Canyon.

It was learned that the contracts under consideration were proposals by two candidates to oversee the construction phase of the airport project. Proposals were submitted by Robinson, SEAC chairman, and Mark Wright of Roswell.

Lincoln County Commission Chairman Bill Elliott, in a telephone interview Thursday, said the SEAC will recommend one of the two proposals to the county commissioners, fiscal agent for the airport group, and the county group will act on that recommendation.

Robinson, who said he will not be involved in discussion of the proposals, said no action was taken after the executive session and the rest of the commission will consider the proposals at next month's meeting.

Wardell Chino, representative of the Mesquero Apache Tribe, was not present for the meeting.



"I can contribute to the village," said Elmer Pirelli during a recent interview.

The long-time Ruidoso resident listed past Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce activities, involvement in the Lions Club and city government experience as assets in his bid for a four-year term.

He isn't totally pleased with the present council or the village administration, and wants to contribute to a change.

"It disturbs me that they (village council) don't allow people to express their opinions at meetings," said Pirelli, who has some questions on procedures leading to the development of the Eagle Creek well field.

"If the water's there we ought to go for it," he said, but wonders why a "finder's fee" was paid for a discovery that he says was common knowledge since the Bear Creek Mining Company did some drilling in that area years ago.

Although Pirelli says he supports a dam, he added that he has opposed the Grindstone Canyon dam because of its location. He also wonders why village officials entered into the dam contract with a "reversion clause" on the land.

"They're not getting good advice from somebody," said Pirelli. "What happened to the lawyers... what happened to the engineers?" he asks.

"The town's going to grow regardless," said Pirelli when asked about Ruidoso's future. He fears that Ruidoso has become known as a "tourist trap" and wishes locals would look to the future and treat visitors better.

Pirelli agrees with the current council's decision to retain the Ruidoso Municipal Airport land when the current airport moves to Fort Stanton Mesa.

"I think it should be retained mostly for the municipality," said Pirelli, who said he would like to see a youth center there. He recalls drawing plans for one at one time. Pirelli added that the village also needs a convention center, perhaps on the airport land.

Pirelli opined that Ruidoso should only be expected to invest in the new airport the amount the Federal Aviation Administration contributed to building the Ruidoso airport.

On declining village revenues, Pirelli says he advocates a reorganization to cut back manpower and still maintain the current level of services. He opposes a raise in taxes.

If elected Pirelli says he will represent the people, and be attuned to what's best for the town.

"I think I have more common sense or horse sense than most people," said Pirelli. "And I can visualize," he added.

Three seek Downs trustee spots

George Smith

"I think we need a little more common sense on the council. I will be fair-minded and unbiased, and look more to the needs of the community instead of myself," said George Smith, candidate for Ruidoso Downs Trustee.

A main concern of Smith's is what he said appears to be personnel problems in the Downs. Smith said the Downs needs to form a more varied personnel board and establish better hiring practices.

Smith feels a need for a "cohesive attitude" between village departments, staff and trustees.

Smith feels there is too much turnover in the police department. He would like to have police salaries raised to compete with Ruidoso.

A five-year Downs resident, Smith is the owner of Draperies (a window covering store in Ruidoso). Prior to moving to Ruidoso Downs, Smith owned a window covering company in California in which he employed 50 to 75 people for five years. In 1981 he received the Good Business Award from a California newspaper.

Smith feels his business and management experience would be an asset as a trustee.

He cited annexation of land into the village as one of his main goals as a trustee. Annexation would create a broader tax base, which would provide more funds to improve village services. Smith's other goals include a new village hall, increased park and recreation programs and street paving.

On growth, Smith would like to see light industry or warehousing in the Downs to create more jobs.

"Any growth in Ruidoso, Ruidoso Downs or the Hondo Valley is good for the total community. The communities need to work together, not at odds."

The candidate said the Downs has been looked

down upon as a "second-hand area." Smith would like to see a continuation of the upgrading which has begun under the present administration.

Smith is a member of the Downs planning and zoning commission (a position he has held for two and a half years). He also is a member of the Rotary Club and serves on a committee of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce. In California, he served on a chamber board of directors and as a chamber president.

Smith and his wife, Barbara, have twin 18-year-old sons—Jim, of Ruidoso, and Mike, who is a Rotary foreign exchange student in Austria. Both sons will attend New Mexico State University in the fall, said Smith.

J.L. Wilson

"My platform is promoting stable, controlled growth of Ruidoso Downs," said LeVerne Cole, incumbent candidate for village trustee.

Cole's major goals for another term are street paving and more sewer and water lines. Cole would like to see the construction of a new village complex (on land purchased for such use) during the next four years. Cole said the present facility is small and office employees work in small quarters.

"As trustees, we all work together," said Cole of her current term. In the past four years, the trustees saw many improvements, including completion of the sewer system, a new water tank and drilled well, a new fire station and increased police patrols and cars.

Six streets are set to be paved in the spring. Cole wants another term to see the paving completed. She said the prospect of receiving state funds "looks good in Santa Fe."

Cole has lived in the Downs for 15 years, operating Gibson's, a variety store which she recently closed in Ruidoso. She was with Gibson's for 26 years and now serves as a director of the Gibson's Distribution Center.

"In running a business, you have a government set up with rules, regulations and budgets," she said, adding that she feels her business background helps her as a trustee.

The incumbent is proud of last year's clean-up campaign and related projects.

Of the future, Cole said she supports stable growth, as long as the village does not have a lot of bonds or

debts. She said the proposed luxury hotel would be good for the Downs.

Cole serves as a director of the board of Ruidoso State Bank and the board of the Ruidoso Summer Festival. She is a member of the Ruidoso Valley Greeters, Eastern Star, Altrusa and P.E.O. Club.

Cole also completed a partial term (for a resigning trustee) under former mayor Jack DiPaolo.

Cole has four daughters: Clarice, Karen and Tama in Dallas, Texas, and Kare, who lives in Ruidoso Downs.

"My specialty is to communicate and get people to work together," said James Lee (J.L.) Wilson, Ruidoso Downs Trustee candidate.

Wilson is a psychological counselor and director of Professional Counseling Associates, a non-profit counseling center in Ruidoso. He has served as president of the Inter-Agency Council (1985) and on various boards connected with mental health and human service work here. He now is involved in forming a shelter for victims of domestic violence, something he said is needed here.

To Wilson, the most important aspect of village government is public safety and the groups that protect it—the police and fire departments. Wilson said that necessary things—such as streets, sewers, growth planning, parks and recreation—are important, but public safety is his priority.

"Because the primary business is the track, growth should hinge around it, with support services, restaurants, etc.," said Wilson. He favors a planned growth community and/or a retirement area in the Downs.

His goals for his term, if elected, are to establish better communication and provide more educational services to village employees and officials. He said he also would like to see an end to the "petty bickering" between some trustees and village employees that he has heard about.

On progress, Wilson said "any idea that worked 10 years ago won't cut it today."

He said the Downs has a problem with its reputation and often is associated as a part of Ruidoso, not as a village in its own right. He said the Downs also is identified as a poor, non-progressive town.

"But we can change that," he emphasized.

Wilson said he would enter the trustee office as a businessman, keeping village finances and management in mind. As a racehorse owner, Wilson said he has an interest in racing and Ruidoso Downs.

Wilson is a four-year Downs resident. He and his wife, Irma, have a seven-year-old son, Jason Lee.



Candidates campaign for three four-year council seats

"If you're interested in improving the administration of our village council, I can help," said Milton Alcorn. Alcorn said his years of administrative experience and training, much of it during his career as an executive with the Boy Scouts of America, will help him do just that.

Alcorn said Ruidoso may need to consider a change in the form of government, perhaps to "home-rule" with a full-time paid mayor.

Although Alcorn favors continued growth for Ruidoso, he stressed that he wants that growth to be directed.

"I don't want to see it (Ruidoso) loused up just for the sake of change," said Alcorn. "Ruidoso is unique."

The candidate said he's deeply concerned about some of the administrative procedures used on the Eagle Creek well field and the Grindstone Canyon dam projects.

"You hear me harping on administration because we don't have any," stated Alcorn, who wants to know where administrators planning those two major water projects got their training.

Another issue Alcorn said will require careful planning is the disposition of the Ruidoso Municipal Airport land.

"The land is good land," said Alcorn, adding that the planning process must include both long- and short-range plans.

"I do not think we should move that fast," he said. On problems caused by apparently declining village revenues, Alcorn said he opposes raising taxes.

Alcorn said his love for people is one reason he is seeking a seat on the council. He said he advocates drawing more of Ruidoso's many qualified people into participating in government.

"I think we have some great, wonderful people here—let's don't run them off," noted Alcorn. "They can make a contribution."

He stressed his willingness to use the people resources in Ruidoso in order to get the best information available on council issues.

"You can't ever stay the same," said Simon, who compared the growth of a town to the way individuals grow and mature. He wants village leaders that will direct and plan for Ruidoso's growth.

"I see Ruidoso (in 20 years) as a safe, nice place to live," remarked Simon.

One thing he said he wants to do is ensure an adequate water supply for the present and future residents.

In spite of questions surrounding the Eagle Creek well field, Simon said he's "hoping, like everybody else, that that's as good a water find as we think."

Simon recalled that the village pumped "quite a bit of water" from Eagle Creek wells last summer to meet water needs.

"Most decisions have already been made on the Grindstone Canyon dam," noted Simon. He said he has a great deal of confidence in the citizenry and advocates making information on water projects, and other projects, available to the public.

The citizenry should have a say on the future of the Ruidoso Municipal Airport land, said Simon. He said keeping the land is a good idea, but added he'd want to have an intense study of projected revenues before

making any decision on the land.

Simon said the next council should negotiate with the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA), consider the projected effects of keeping or disposing of the land and then design a plan.

Although Ruidoso may have experienced declining revenues, Simon said the village will continue to progress, and what happens with the airport land could be a part of that progress.

Simon said he'd oppose raising taxes to cover revenue shortfalls.

"When the citizens are having a hard time making ends meet, it's not a good time to raise taxes," remarked Simon. He said councilors may have to prioritize expenditures in order to cut costs.

Another possible solution—annexation of surrounding areas—should be approached very carefully, warned Simon, who feels that increased taxes should pay for providing additional village services.

Beefing up training, pay and benefits for village employees will eventually pay off by cutting turnover, said Simon.

Simon stressed that one strength he'll bring to the village council is a willingness to listen, talk to people and get various viewpoints.

"It's the people that commission us to sit out there and take care of the city—the village council should listen to them," said Simon.

Holt promises: "Because I love Ruidoso, I'll do what's right for it and what the people think is right."

William A. "Dub" Holt, appointed eight months ago to fill the vacancy left when Village Councillor John Underwood resigned to become village attorney, stresses that one of his strong points is a willingness to listen to what citizens have to say.

"I'm willing to ask," said Holt, recalling an informal survey he took on one issue before the council. He said he considered what people said along with his own instincts before making a decision.

Holt said the people he called were surprised to have a member of the village governing body ask their opinions.

"We've got to expand our markets," said Holt. He said such an expansion will lead Ruidoso into a healthy growth period in spite of a depressed economy in the village's traditional West Texas markets.

"You either grow or you die," remarked Holt. Major decisions on water, a critical ingredient for continued growth, were made before he became a village councillor, explained Holt.

In spite of questions on the Eagle Creek well field, Holt said the 80 million gallons of water pumped from those wells into the municipal distribution system, last summer "saved our necks" when the Hollywood well became contaminated.

On the Grindstone Canyon dam, Holt still believes the people should have had another chance to speak when the cost of the project increased drastically. But now that financing is arranged, Holt says it's

time to "get the show on the road."

Holt agreed that councilors already have agreed to keep the current municipal airport land when the facility moves to the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport, however he added "you do what you can afford to do."

Holt favors negotiating with the Federal Aviation Administration regarding a reasonable pay-out plan, if the village keeps that land.

"I hope this is possible," he added. "The village is a big business," noted Holt, when asked about declining village revenues.

"You have to budget," he said, explaining that a common business sense approach to running the municipality would require that no more money be spent than the income available.

"The village has to face up to this," said Holt, who opposes any increase in taxes.

In response to discussions on a municipal convention center, Holt said he favors a partnership approach between the village and private enterprise for the benefit of the village.

"I don't think government needs to get any bigger," commented Holt.

Callaghan's promise: "I'll sit down and talk to anybody, just call me anytime."

Mike Callaghan wants to put his 25 years of experience in the construction industry to work for the Village of Ruidoso.

"Everybody's running off in a million directions," said Callaghan in a recent interview, naming nearly a dozen village projects that he feels may not be well-planned to their conclusions.

"Let's get all our marbles in one line," commented Callaghan who advocates completing the Grindstone Canyon dam project and putting the Eagle Creek well field on hold until the legal questions surrounding water rights are answered.

Callaghan also wants to know how much water is in the Eagle Creek field and whether the area is one basin before spending any more money equipping wells.

"We're not getting the best advice we could," said Callaghan, citing problems he's seen on the diversion structure and pipeline project in the Upper Canyon.

The candidate says he suspects current members of the Ruidoso Village Council are not getting all the information they need because they don't know the right questions to ask, and he's ready to serve and get the village back on track.

On growth, Callaghan is sure Ruidoso will continue to grow. He says the "current recession has put us on a more solid growth period instead of a time of flamboyant growth."

"I look at the airport land like I look at my own budget," said Callaghan when asked his position on keeping the land. "If I can't afford it, I don't buy it," he added.

Although Callaghan says the land would be "fantastic" for parks and a convention complex, he says the village should buy "only what we can afford."

When village officials come up with a disposal plan for the land, Callaghan is sure the Federal Aviation Administration will be flexible in helping Ruidoso meet its obligation.

Callaghan admits that strong measures will be called for as village revenues continue to decline, but says with stricter cost accounting within village departments, a tax increase won't be needed.

"Let's control it—work it as a business," said Callaghan, who says increased taxes would hurt people as individual incomes are not increasing.

Callaghan feels the first priority for Ruidoso, before building a convention center, is to set up a tourist bureau with funds already allocated from lodger's taxes.

He wants that bureau to advertise and promote Ruidoso within the state, not just in Texas.

If elected to the council, Callaghan says he'll listen to anyone who comes to council meetings with something to say.

"I know the questions to ask, and I'm planning to do it" said Callaghan.

Radziewicz promises: "Innovation, communication, good management and a lifetime of experience to the good of all the people of the community."

"There are many things I'd like to see changed," said Mike Radziewicz of village government.

Radziewicz said he'll try to create a better business attitude on the local governing body that will be reflected in appointments and local lawmaking. He also would like to see better communication between the citizenry and the council.

Although he says the village will grow regardless of who governs, the candidate said it's up to village officials to make sure that orderly, positive growth occurs.

He said he sees Ruidoso maturing in the next 20 years to become a full year-round community, with larger stores, clean industry and perhaps small corporate offices.

On water, Radziewicz said the current council "showed good foresight in trying to discover new wells," but added that he still has some questions on processes of the Eagle Creek well field project.

He recalled disputes and discussions leading up to the development of the Grindstone Canyon dam, but said too much is invested to change directions on that project now.

"I would like to see a referendum on the disposition of the current airport land," said Radziewicz. He said the amount of debt needed to keep that land should be reasonable.

"The Federal Aviation Administration owns the deck of cards," noted Radziewicz, who said negotiations are needed with that agency before any decisions can be made.

"Transportation in and out of a resort area is essential," added Radziewicz. He said any transpor-

tation additions—the airport, a four-lane highway, a railway system—will prove beneficial to the village.

"There's room to cut in Ruidoso," remarked Radziewicz, adding that in spite of declining revenues taxes should be raised as a very last resort.

Radziewicz feels a general purpose convention center without lodgings would benefit the economy. He doesn't advocate "going out and building it tomorrow," but calls for beginning with what is available and working toward a full-scale facility in the future.

"Let's do it a step at a time," suggested Radziewicz.

Davis promises: "a new fresh attitude as far as this community is concerned... a positive new view of the future."

Richard A. "Rick" Davis, although a relative newcomer to Ruidoso, is a lifelong New Mexican who tells of his and his family's years of involvement in state politics.

He feels his "young, aggressive, successful business attitude, combined with experience in state and local government" are just what the Village of Ruidoso needs.

"I'd just like to see the town continue to grow as far as people wanting to move here and businesses wanting to come here and stay," said Davis, who feels that the village council should be looking for ways to aid the business community.

Davis remarked that the Planning and Zoning Commission "needs to loosen up... be a little more relaxed."

One issue that Davis is ready to see resolved once and for all is water.

"I think it's been over-addressed—this has been going on since 1946," remarked Davis. "We need the water—I want to get in there, get it over with and move on," he added.

One of the other things he wants to move on to is the disposition of the current Ruidoso Municipal Airport. "That is a prime area—valuable land with great access and good roads," said Davis.

He recommends keeping at least a portion of the land, and selling a portion to somebody with a good plan for development.

As chairman of the Parks and Recreation Committee, Davis said he has a particular interest in developing parks and recreation areas for the town, and would like to see an open park and some tennis courts on part of the airport land.

The candidate also agrees with the need for a convention center, but warns that such an operation can be very costly.

Davis, although concerned about declining village revenues, is opposed to increasing taxes.

"We just need to look into each department and make sure it's being run efficiently," said Davis, who predicts that the economy will soon be "moving again."

"The new airport is very important to this community," said Davis, adding that the village needs to start preparing for that.

"The airlines that are going to give us access to larger markets," noted Davis, who feels that expanding Ruidoso's tourism market into New Orleans, Louisiana; Tucson, Arizona; and Dallas and Houston, Texas, will head the town to economic recovery.

Two years ago I said in my ad that the old airport land should be retained for Parks and Recreation, Green space, a Convention Center and future school expansion.

He said that, after the Village receives the appraisal, we can 'sit down' and see what can be worked out.

Since the appraisal will not be finished until after the election, it will be your next Council and Mayor who will negotiate the FINAL agreement with the FAA.

As your elected representative, I testified at C.D.B.G. hearings (\$250,000), lobbied in Santa Fe for Direct Appropriation (\$583,500) and negotiated with the Board of Regents, N.M.S.U. (the letter which cleared up misunderstandings).

I would like to continue to represent you as your Mayor.

Warriors gain first-ever district mat championship

Ruidoso edges Colts for title

District 3-AAA champions, Ruidoso High School's wrestling team can claim that honor after stopping challenges by Silver City and Cobre Friday night in the district meet in the Warrior gymnasium.

The Warriors scored 116 points to top Silver City's 113½ and Cobre's 112½. Deming was fourth at 100½, Goddard had 93½, New Mexico Military Institute (NMMI) had 55½ and New Mexico School for the Visually Handicapped had none.

"Oh, yeah, it was a total team effort," a happy Warrior head coach Gerald Ames said after the Warriors were presented with the district pennant. "Everybody came through. We had two district winners."

The two wrestlers who won district titles were Jeff Schmidt at 101 pounds and James Herrera at 170 pounds.

Herrera's 5-2 win over NMMI's Scott Robison in the 170-pound final virtually cinched the title for Ruidoso. It gave the Warriors their full amount of points while Silver City had just 109½ and Cobre had 112½.

The score was tied 2-2 at the end of the second period, but with less than a minute left in the third and final period Herrera got a cradle on Robison, got him on his back and scored a near-fall for three points.

As the final seconds of the match ticked off, the Warrior fans shouted "James, James," encouraging the Ruidoso wrestler to win the match. "We were both equally tired," Herrera said about his match. "We both gave it our all. I just came out on top."


Silver City's Fighting Colts had a chance to win the title in the 188-pound and heavyweight matches. However, the Colts lost the 188-pound match to end their championship hopes.

Schmidt gained a measure of revenge when he topped Silver City's Shawn Grizwald, 14-8, in the 101-pound match. Grizwald had beaten the Warrior in their only previous meeting.

"I just wrestled better this time," Schmidt said.

That win seemed to give the Warriors momentum the rest of the way. Silver City had five athletes in the finals, compared to four for Ruidoso, but only one Colt wrestler won a title.

Call the Ruidoso High School boys varsity basketball team the Giant Killers.

Ruidoso gained its second victory over top-ranked Hot Springs this season with a thrilling 50-47 win over the visiting Tigers Saturday night in a District 3-AAA game.

The win gave the Warriors a weekend split. Friday night Ruidoso lost to host Deming, 69-44, in another district game.

But it was the game with Hot Springs that left Warrior fans with a sweet memory of the weekend's events.

But the Tigers had to foul to get the ball back.

Toby Rue made two foul shots and the Warriors had their final margin.

Hot Springs tried for an inside shot, but it missed and Trent Tolbert grabbed the rebound to secure the win for Ruidoso.

Ruidoso built a 17-point lead (42-25) midway through the third period, but the Tigers scored six straight points to close the gap to 11 (42-31) at the third-quarter break.

The defending district champions gradually fought back in the fourth period.

Before Easter's heroics, Ruidoso's only fourth period scoring was a field goal by Kirk Ryan.

Ruidoso jumped off to a 14-12 first-quarter lead and increased it to 28-19 at halftime, forcing Hot Springs out of the zone.

Both teams were in foul trouble early.

Easter, Ryan and Brian Davis had three fouls in the first half for Ruidoso. Mannon had three fouls for Hot Springs.

Davis had one of his best offensive games of the season, scoring 17 points on eight field goals and one free throw.

Ryan added 10 points, Easter and Rue scored six, Garret Henson scored five, Tolbert scored four and Carl Lueras added two.

Against Deming Friday night, Warriors' fortunes were totally different.

Deming jumped off to a 16-10 first quarter lead and increased its

margin the rest of the way.

The Wildcats led, 34-21, at halftime, and 49-33 at the end of the third quarter.

Tolbert had 11 points to lead Ruidoso. Davis added nine, Ryan scored eight, Easter and Jeff Willingham each scored six and Rue scored four.

"The two games were as different as night and day," said Warrior coach Gene Segura. "Against Hot Springs, we did what our game plan was."

"We got out to a lead and forced them out of the zone. I'd rather play man-to-man than zone anytime."

The Warriors are now 2-4 in district play and 10-11 overall.



However, Hall said Goldwell Banker told him the concept is good, and to try to use it if possible. With \$1,500 of his own funds devoted for production costs, Hall approached other Riohondo real estate agents to join forces and use the "Vail, We're Not" concept.

Interested agents formed a coalition, of which Hall, Richard Lloverin and Bill Birchfield are the directors. All participating agents have votes, said Lloverin.

The four-color ad will appear in Southwest Airlines' in-flight magazine, "Spirit." It will occupy one-half of a page in the April, May and June issues.

The magazine has a circulation of 100,000. Lloverin hopes the publication could reach some new markets, such as traveling businessmen and professionals, that usually visit in Riohondo.

Currently, approximately 40 real estate agents are in the group. He said he hopes to involve more agents before the middle-March extended deadline.

The ad gives a toll-free phone number to which interested people may call for information on Riohondo. The calls will be taken by an independent company in Albuquerque and real estate leads will be given to group members on a rotating basis.

Business classes and buttons that proclaim "Vail, We're Not" and "Discover Riohondo" will be distributed throughout town.

"We want to pull the community together and keep everyone pumped up," said Lloverin.

The ads will include the New Mexico, USA emblem, making them eligible for matching funds from the state department of economic development. Hall said the funds probably be matched 60 cents on the dollar.

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


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
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Booher seeks Capitan trustee seat

Olan Booher, his wife, Glenda, and their two children, Daniel and Oscar, are life-long residents of Capitan.

Booher said he decided to run for trustee to "see what is happening in the village." He said he thinks the village needs both the water well and an improved filter plant. However, he said he does not think an expensive new filter, as designed by Ted Asbury, will solve the water problem; He feels the village cannot afford the new filter expense and the operation costs after completion. He thinks the new filter will have problems of being "plugged" because of its design to remove minerals.

"I want to see the (present) filter fixed, not abandoned," Booher said. He thinks the new water well will take some of the pressure off

the present filter.

Booher said he went to the new well during the testing and found "nothing wrong with the water."

"They hit good water, why not use it," he said. He opined that the well will need no filtration, only treatment, which is much less expensive. Booher said he thinks the village needs more finished water storage. He said he is against raw water storage because if any problems arise with the filter, the raw water is of no use to the village. He added that evaporation also is a problem with a raw water storage pond.

Booher said he thinks Capitan is experiencing the same problems that any growing community faces—water, sewer and a lack of funds for other projects such as streets.

Eckland campaigns for trustee

W.F. "Pug" Eckland and his wife, Ruth, retired in Capitan in 1974, but have lived in Lincoln County since 1964, operating the Continental Oil Distributing Company.

Eckland said he believes the new well is compounding the village's troubles because the water distribution is from the opposite direction of the power, filter plant and water transmission lines. The

flow from the new well will be against gravity, creating the need for booster pumps and reservoirs, Eckland said.

Eckland suggested putting the well where the filter plant is. By doing this, the problems created by the new well, which is located east of town, will be eliminated, he added.

He said he believes there is quality underground water in the area of the existing filter plant which is south of the village. He said he thinks a well drilled near the filter

would be the cheapest alternative source.

Eckland said he does not trust the San Andreas water layer, into which the new well east of town is drilled.

"There are so many problems with that well," he said.

Eckland said he wants fire protection and paved roads in the village subdivisions. He said he would like to see the population grow, but he thinks the village cannot handle more people until the water problem is resolved.



Capitan candidates discuss issues at open forum

The candidates for Capitan mayor, trustee and judge spoke to an audience of more than 100 people at the Capitan Chamber of Commerce Meet the Candidates Night Thursday.

The eight candidates discussed their qualifications and presented answers to a set of questions given them a week before the forum.

Candidates for the four-year term for mayor—Kelly Beavers and Benny Coker—and two four-year positions for trustee—Dave Strickland, Olan Booher, Pug Eckland, Dave Locke and Dave Rouleau—responded to each question.

The forum began with municipal judge candidate Jimmie Stewart. Candidate Charles Beck was not present at the forum.

Stewart, incumbent judge, gave his qualifications as his 20 years prior experience in law enforcement in Texas, Alamogordo and Lincoln County. Stewart summarized his views about driving while intoxicated (DWI) by saying the law determines the fines and sentences for the offense.

"I have no qualms about putting someone in jail for drunk driving," he said.

He approves of public service work for selected cases and concluded that he "really likes to do this work."

The forum turned to the mayoral candidates and trustees. Each was addressed equally on topics composed by the chamber.

Mayoral candidate Coker said his supervisory background in large construction work for Shell Oil Company and the management of his own business in Capitan for the last 11 years contribute to his knowledge of budgets.

He also listed the last eight years as Capitan trustee and his position as president of the New Mexico Rural Water Association as advantages to his being mayor of Capitan.

"I will work with and support all the people as a full-term mayor," Coker said.

Concerning the Eagle Creek Water Users Association (ECWUA), Coker said that the six acre-feet of flow credits from Eagle Creek is Capitan's main water source, as the village has no rights to Bonito Lake.

Coker listed the new water well as a first priority (as a supplemental source) and a redesign of the filter plant if tests show that the well is a viable source.

Coker said the village tax rates could increase to \$60.06 per thousand assessed value, which he felt would not discourage growth in the village in the future.

He said the transfer of water rights is still being challenged, but the village might receive between 40 and 75 acre-feet in effluent flow credits from the sewer lagoons for the new well.

He said power to the well would cost about \$30,000 to \$40,000 from Otero County Electric Co-op. He ad-

ded that the costs for the project could not be determined without knowing the design.

Concerning future sewer problems, Coker opined that the village should continue to monitor the current system and begin to work on proposals to have funding plans for a new system by 1990. He said the lagoons are "on the way out."

Coker also said he is in favor of the Sierra Blanca Airport as it will

WUA questions by saying the village, as of July 1984, is entitled to 2,014 acre-feet per year in surface and groundwater from Eagle Creek. He opined the village could "not afford" to let the Eagle Creek water go, as it is the primary water source to the village.

Beavers said that he is not against the water well, but said he thought the new filter plant should receive first priority, because the well could take a "long time" to

the village.

"No one should profit from your taxes," Beavers said.

Beavers commented that the proposed planning and platting regulations were good until they were reworded by the village attorney.

Beavers concluded that traffic problems in the village will have to be worked out between the parties involved.

Strickland, a candidate for trustee, cited his experience on a

and then good storage of finished water. He said he didn't know if the village could afford an expensive filter designed to remove minerals as proposed. He also said the increased taxes, if the bond passes, would not hurt growth, because "it is still cheaper here," relative to other communities.

Booher said the well development costs are unknown until all the design factors are known. He also said that a new sewer facility would

Locke said he has lived in Capitan three years and would like to have ample safe water for the community. He said he hopes the community can pull together for the water situation.

Locke opined that Eagle Creek is the primary source of water, but that the well should be "brought to town to avoid problems" during drought years. He lists the well, if it proves good, as his first priority, then storage and upgrading the filter system as his next priorities.

Locke said a good water system will offset additional taxes, as far as future growth is concerned. Locke did not address the costs for the well because there is no present design.

Concerning the sewer, Locke opined that with future growth, the village will have to consider a treatment plant financed with federal or state money.

Locke said he has mixed feelings about the airport, but sees benefits from increased jobs.

Locke also said that waivers to annexation depend on the circumstances. He said he favors the planning and platting regulations and enforcement of them.

Locke concluded that the village could not afford to lose a business because of the traffic problems on the corner of highways 48 and 380. He suggested a caution light be installed if no alternatives can be found.

Rouleau, a medical doctor, said he came to Capitan 10 years ago for the climate, clean air and "supposedly" clean water. He listed his background in microchemistry as an aid to understanding the water problems.

Rouleau said he wants the Eagle Creek source developed to the fullest extent and that he supports the ECWUA. He said he places the new chemical treatment filtration plant as the first priority and development of wells in the Eagle Creek area as a second priority.

Rouleau did not emphasize the new water well as a priority, because "there are no guarantees," he said. He also listed problems with the high cost of water rights acquisition and the length of time involved in settling the water well issue.

Rouleau opined that the need for a new sewer facility would depend on the demand, but said the village could seek state and federal funding in the future.

Concerning the airport, Rouleau said he has mixed feelings but foresees new employment and increased gross receipts. He also said he foresees problems with added taxation through bonds and competition for water.

Rouleau concurred with the other candidates that waivers on annexation be given if water rights are brought in, and only after the new filter and extra water is provided for the village. Rouleau also favors the planning and platting regulations.

The traffic problem, Rouleau concluded, can be resolved between the village and the business involved and with the school.

Present mayor David Cummins concluded the audience segment of the forum by announcing "I have every reason to believe we will have a certified test on the well by March 4 (election day)."

employ local residents and attract tourists to the Capitan area. He said the only detriment could be the noise. Coker said the county taxpayers would not be asked to pass a general obligation bond to fund Phase I of the airport.

Coker said he would favor a waiver to the annexation moratorium in certain circumstances, such as if a subdivider or individual offered water or rights to the village and if the planning and platting committee found the situation acceptable. Coker also said he favors the planning and platting regulations and would enforce the ordinance if it passes.

Traffic issues comprised the final set of questions at the forum. Coker said the village should work out the problems at the corner of highways 48 and 380 and with traffic at the elementary school.

Vernon "Kelly" Beavers said his 27 years in the U. S. Air Force, with a supervisory position as chief master sergeant, will help him deal with budgets and fiscal planning in the village. Beavers said that he served as trustee since March 1984.

"I want to unite the village to make it safe, healthy and prosperous," Beavers said.

Beavers said he wants water improvements. He also said he wants to rebuild roads with state cooperative agreements, improve the sewer system and have recreation for the village's youth.

Beavers responded to the EC-

develop.

Beavers said he found a taxation increase would make Capitan's tax base the highest in New Mexico, with Ruidoso coming second and Albuquerque third. He said he thought the rate increase would discourage people from moving to Capitan.

Beavers said that the bond money, if passed, should be used for the water well if the tests prove good quantity or quality of water.

Beavers expressed his concern about the pending litigation over the transfer of water rights to the new well and the expense of bringing electrical power to the well site.

Concerning the sewer plant, Beavers said that the open lagoon sewer system would not be allowed after 1990. Beavers said he thought the village could seek and receive low-interest loans to construct a sewage treatment plant in the future.

Responding to questions about the Sierra Blanca Airport, Beavers said the village will be affected. He said a possible general obligation bond of \$1.6 million could be levied to property owners. He also cited increased population and the associated problems the airport could create. He believes the airport will create more jobs, mostly in the services categories.

On the annexation moratorium, Beavers said he would not allow waivers unless the subdividers brought enough water rights into

village council in Texas, and his understanding of water and sewer systems, as benefits to his candidacy.

Strickland also said that Eagle Creek water is a primary source to the village. Strickland said he wants funding put into the new well, but said that he is for the filter system while the well system is being built. He commented that he is in favor of the well because of the favorable results of the tests already completed.

He concurred with the tax rate increase possibility, but said there is no way to know the real rates until the bond is sold. He said the sewer system is subject to EID regulations.

Strickland said he favors the airport for added jobs but sees the noise as a detriment.

Strickland said he favors waivers on the annexation moratorium in certain circumstances and favors the planning and platting regulations. Strickland concurred with the other candidates that traffic problems should be worked out with the parties involved.

Booher is a life-long resident of Capitan with an understanding of water systems because of his work in construction, he said. He also said Eagle Creek is a primary source of water, but supports the well as an alternate source when the primary source "turns bad."

Booher said the well is a first priority, with an updated filter next

depend on village growth.

Booher said the airport would not affect his candidacy, but felt Fort Stanton would be most affected.

The guidelines for planning and platting, of which Booher approves, would determine the waivers for annexation. He also said he supports the village police in handling any traffic problems.

Eckland said his desire to have good drinking water prompted him to run for office. He said he worked for 28 years as a mine foreman before coming to Capitan.

Eckland approves of ECWUA, and said that Capitan is entitled to half of the water in Alto Reservoir or to drill wells in Eagle Creek. Eckland set the new filter plant, with storage, as his first priority. He added that he is not against the well, if it proves good, but opined that the location is not the best choice.

Higher taxes would discourage growth, Eckland said.

The sewer plant issue could not be addressed until studies are made, said the candidate. Eckland said the airport will bring increased taxes, noise and air pollution.

Eckland said he favors the planning and platting regulations and annexation waivers in certain circumstances.

As for traffic, Eckland said he would support a traffic light at the corner of highways 48 and 380 if there is no other alternative to the problems.

Ellyn Anderson, swing bed coordinator of Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Hospital (RHVH), released some of the results of a specially funded community assessment survey at a regular meeting of the Inter-Agency Council (IAC) Thursday at K-Bob's.

Anderson, who also is president of the IAC, has been working on the survey since last August.

The survey, which was funded by a special grant from the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation, was sent out in August to community organizations and churches in hopes of reaching about 2,700 people throughout Lincoln County, Anderson said.

About 30 percent of the surveys were responded to and sent back to her, Anderson said.

Though Anderson is still analyzing the surveys, some interesting data has been observed.

For instance, of the people that responded to the survey in Lincoln County, the mean average age was 57.7, Anderson said.

Of those who responded to the survey, Ruidosoans had the highest mean average income among people in the towns of the county.

People in general, especially elderly citizens of the county, said they needed more information about the government and social agencies and their services in Lincoln County.

Anderson said she will continue to analyze the survey to establish trends among the people of the county and give input on desired services to RHVH.

Detective Lanny Maddox, of the Ruidoso Police Department, said thanks to Crisis Center volunteer workers like News reporter Frankie Jarrell, Ruidoso was now eligible to participate in the National Victim Assistance Program, which provides various types of aid to victims of violent crimes.

Fund drop may cut mental health care

A cut in state funds for mental health services, and the prospect for federal funding cuts to social agencies through the Gramm-Rudman Act, has local mental health professionals on the defensive, according to psychiatric consultant, Dr. Wyeth Eugene Owens.

Owens, medical consultant for Professional Counseling Associates (PCA), formerly the Counseling Center, said "the quality of life" in Lincoln County could suffer if PCA faces further fiscal cuts.

J.L. Wilson, PCA director, said the non-profit organization had already suffered a six percent across-the-board staff salary decrease which began in November of last year.

PCA also has been forced to give up 50 percent of their total floor space and eliminate janitorial services, Wilson said.

The state did not actually reduce funds to PCA, but "redefined" their status as a mental health agency. Under their new status, even though PCA is trying to avoid any type of cut in services, they qualified for fewer state funds, Wilson said.

Owens, who practices at the Counseling Center in Alamogordo, which operates PCA, said the burden of being one of only two practicing psychiatrists in both Lincoln and Otero County threatens his ability to provide "quality" psychiatric care in the area.

"The national average is one psychiatrist for every 10,000 people, and here (in Lincoln and Otero County) there are two psychiatrists for a population of 60,000," Owens said.

Only psychiatrists may prescribe medical treatment for mental disorders.

Owens often assists PCA in the decision-making process in cases where patients must be admitted to state hospitals for special treatments, he said.

Owens might also assist PCA when they devise treatment plans for people suffering mental health problems—ranging from job-related depression to a more severe psychosis, he said.

"If I get to the point where I can't make good medical judgments because I'm overwhelmed by my caseload, I'll stop practicing," Owens said.

"And the same goes for J.L. and his staff, who are a quality group of professionals. Imagine the morale problem that J.L. had when he had to tell a staff that was already working close to the bone, they had to take a six percent pay cut," Owens said.

Both Owens and Wilson said PCA is the only facility in Ruidoso which offers counseling to indigents with mental health disorders.

Wilson said PCA provides mental health care based on a sliding fee scale, or a scale based on ability to

pay. "If a person has no money and needs our services, we still see them," Wilson said.

Owens said if a person who is being treated by professionals for a mental health disorder suddenly stops a treatment program, all of society might pay.

"When treatment stops, there are more drug overdoses, more people going to state funded alcohol treatment facilities and more people spending time in jail because their behavior warrants police action," Owens said.

Wilson said PCA was in a "crisis" situation in terms of their ability to finance quality mental health services in the Lincoln County area.

Owens said he felt he had the responsibility to take the problem of reductions in state-funded mental health services to the public.

"People have to write or call us even better ... both their state and national legislators and express their opinion on the issue of quality mental health care," Owens said.

"And they (voters) have to pay attention to the people they elect in the first place. They have to ask candidates their positions on mental health care," Wilson said.

Owens said stigmas associated with mental health care have to be overcome before further cuts are made to state-funded mental health programs, or before mental health care facilities can no longer afford to meet basic operating costs.

Inter Agency Council learns of survey results

Mayor George White and Lincoln County Commission Chairman Bill Elliott have called a joint meeting of the Ruidoso Village Council and the Lincoln County Commissioners for 2 p.m. Friday, February 28, in council chambers of Village Hall.

Purpose of the meeting is to discuss Emergency Medical Services and ambulance services in Lincoln County, according to the call.

It was learned that Mayor White called the council meeting in response to a letter signed by county attorney Steve Sanders.

White confirmed receiving a letter that revealed problems between county ambulance services, adding that Sanders requested the joint meeting.

"The county is concerned about making sure that the person who calls for an ambulance receives the fastest service," said Sanders.

He said the feeling of the county commissioners is that sometimes the call is not going to the closest ambulance.

"We feel as though we shouldn't get involved, it's none of our business," said White, who added that he has invited Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Hospital administrator Ken Moore to the meeting.

"I think it's real good that we're meeting," said Moore.

Village manager Jim Hine explained that the village has a con-

tract with RHVH on emergency medical and ambulance services. Under that contract, Hine said Ruidoso provides a building and equipment and up to \$138,000 a year for the service, and management is provided through the hospital.

Elliott said he preferred to comment on reasons for calling the meeting after commissioners and councillors have met.

White may run for county seat

Although Mayor George P. White recently announced plans to run for the Lincoln County Commission from District Three, he said late last week that he may be ineligible for that race.

"From what we can gather I won't be eligible to run in District Three," said White. "There's some question as to which district I'm in," he added.

"I'm right on the line," noted White.

However the map that White displayed indicated that he may reside six or more blocks into District One.

White said he won't run if in fact his residence is in District One because he doesn't want to run against his "good friend Dub Williams."

Late last week the County Clerk was rechecking official records to give White an answer as to his voting district, according to White.



Being a long time resident of Ruidoso, I am deeply concerned. In my opinion to a run-away local government, especially the management of this village and the real estate interests seated on our council.

Many items have been mishandled, some of them I will mention as follows.

One. Expenditures of approximately 1 1/2 million dollars on the Eagle Creek Wells after the city attorney advised Mr. Hine, the city manager, against the contract submitted for the job by the contractor

and engineering firm was in his opinion open-ended and could cost Ruidosans millions, which came to pass and we still have no guarantee of water. Good management?

Two. Near double contract price for the Grindstone Dam Project Transmission Line (water) and now a possibility of legal action against the contractor to fix some faulty work and possibly digging up the line and re-laying it. Remember they dug up the paving on Main Street that had been paved approximately a year and a half before and have spot paved parts of it since. Now they may have to re-do

DEAR EDITOR:

We are writing this in the hopes that people of New Mexico will be more aware of how our justice system works. When you are a victim of a crime, you begin to fully understand how the victim has no rights and the laws are intended to benefit the criminal.

On January 30, 1985, our 20-year-old daughter, Ebby L. Smith, was cold-bloodily murdered. Shot four times with a .357 magnum pistol. She was also a victim of "attempted rape." The 19-year-old murderer, Jerry D. Kame, was not a stranger, but her friend for over a year. A friend she helped get a job where she worked, a friend whom she gave rides to on cold wintery days, a friend she brought into our home for a home-cooked meal, who sat at our table and by our fire.

To show his gratitude, he stole a pistol and for two weeks prior to her death, he plotted to kill her.

Hidden in a dark alley, he waited for her to come home, and he detained her in front of our home and asked her to go with him, as he "needed" to talk to someone! He forced her at gunpoint to disrobe

and shot her in the back as she tried to escape. He left her to lay in a field of snow and her tiny body froze before she was found.

His reason for killing our daughter was, he just wanted to see how it felt to shoot someone and he was angry, angry at the world.

In July 1985, in a plea bargain agreement with the District Attorney, he entered a plea of guilty and was sentenced to prison for the rest of his natural life, under Section 31-21-10 NMSA, Parole authority and procedure. Which defines "the rest of your natural life" as 30 years for a first-degree capital felony in New Mexico.

We were assured he would be in a "maximum" security prison, and were to find out later that he was in Las Cruces Southern Correctional facility, "medium security." We also have recently been informed of another law, Section 33-2-34 NMSA, Meritorious Deductions.

Where as "any" inmate is eligible for good time, if he participates in any programs offered at the prison. These cold-blooded killers can get a four year college degree at your expense and get good time as well. (Check your local library under Criminal Law & Procedure Volume 6, chapters 29 to 39.) They can be back out on your street or in your town in 15 years and possibly even less time than that, if the prison becomes overcrowded.

Our prisons may be overcrowded, but so are our cemeteries!

How many more first degree murderers are cutting their sentences in half under "Section 33-2-34 NMSA?"

How do you feel about a first degree murderer getting a college degree at your expense?

New Mexico is inviting these murderers into our state by the laws we have set up to protect them.

Let's make our voice be heard to the lawmakers who make these laws and demand some changes to keep these habitual offenders of first-degree capital crimes behind bars for life, with no exceptions and elect a Governor who will stand behind the "death penalty."

Ebby L. Smith and Linda Lee Daniels are gone, and tomorrow, it could be your child. It can happen until the people of New Mexico stand up and demand that it stop!

Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE—How was their arithmetic?

That's the question that niggles those of us prone to be niggable after lawmakers pack it in and go home.

During any legislative session, the air is filled with numbers of all kinds, including, at least in the early days, what pretend to be in-depth analyses of the economic impact of bills that make appropriations. That helps make everybody feel good, but what does it have to do with reality? The depth of thought that goes into producing most of these estimates of what effect this bill will have is, under the circumstances, almost negligible.

This year, because we were ostensibly trying to cut the cost of everything almost to the bone, accuracy in such matters became especially essential. The surgeon's scalpel must be wielded with precision; "close enough" isn't close enough.

In the final days of any session, when it always feels as though it's nearly midnight in the Roundhouse, it's possible—indeed, almost inevitable—that gross mathematical errors will creep in.

There's no place that's more likely to happen than in those hard-pressed conference committees, trying to put together in the waning hours some major money measure in a form that will make it magically acceptable to the members of both houses. To achieve that aim, there has to be a lot of that kind of talk that says, "If you'll shave a few thousand dollars off over there, we'll cut back some here." With those words, two changes have been generated—and we'd better hope somebody is there to keep strict track of every such modification and to see that it is precisely recorded.

What our constitution requires, after all, is books that are strictly balanced—that is, not so much as a dollar in over-spending. Legislatures have to go for that, but it's a fact that we often can't tell whether they have hit that target till many months after their work is done and they have gone home.

There's more to that story of why the Governor withdrew the name of Joe Goldberg from consideration as a nominee for membership on the

Corrections Commission than the reason that was publicly given. That was, Governor Anaya assured us, because he might want to name Goldberg to another and conflicting post.

That probably wasn't untrue at the time it was said, but it was hardly the whole truth either. Governor Anaya had been advised not to send this man's name down for any job requiring Senate confirmation. That kind of blessing, the word was, he could never get.

All that came in a private conference between Anaya, who has much faith in Goldberg and his ability, and House and Senate leadership, including the chairman of the Senate Rules Committee, which has the responsibility of advising and consenting to gubernatorial appointment to many higher offices.

Goldberg, as you may remember, was originally Anaya's Cabinet Secretary for Human Services. Then he moved on to run that not-altogether-happy Department of Health and Environment, as the third appointee to that post during the Anaya term. (We've run through five of those so far.)

Such experiences gave legislators a chance to know Goldberg well. Some found him charming and highly voluble; others though him considerable of a hot dog. What bothered many of them most, however, was that, while he was engaged in those high and well-plaid posts with the state, he was retained by plaintiffs attacking the job of redistricting done most recently by the House. That suit was successful, and to some lawmakers, including some who did not return to the House when their districts were shifted to fit the demands of the people Goldberg was assisting, that kind of double-dipping is totally abhorrent.

That experience also reportedly contributed to the decision that Goldberg and others at UNM's law school must now take the state bar exam if they are going to practice here as attorneys.

Besides, many legislators resent Goldberg's *eminence gris* role at the university, where they picture him whispering advice into the ear of Tom Farer. What's worse, they fear Farer is following it.

Section 6. Voting shall be by ballot machine, except for absentee voters, who shall be by paper ballot. At least one voting machine shall be used at the polling place for the consolidated precinct.




