Council, commission adopt ambulance policy

Lincoln County and Village of Ruidoso officials Friday agreed to adopt policy guidelines to coordinate all emergency medical care providers in Lincoln County.

A joint meeting called for 2 p.m. at Ruidoso Village Hall got off to a late start after commissioners, Ruidoso's mayor and legal advisers for both governments and the Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Hospital (RHVH) conferred.

More than 50 people listened as county attorney Steve Sanders explained that the meeting was called to hammer out an agreement leading to the "quickest, most expedient, most well-trained response" to any emergency.

Sanders presented four points of a "basic" agreement he and Diane Fisher, attorney for Southwest Community Health Services (parent organization for RHVH), had drafted.

That agreement states in item one that ambulance services in this county are normally dispatched by the Sheriff's Office or the Ruidoso Police.

Item two continues: "a dispatcher ... shall in all instances direct the call to the service with the closest available ambulance."

The third point of the agreement says in some cases the dispatcher may determine the patient's condition calls for "advanced life support services (ALS)" and in that case both the RHVH ALS unit and the closest county ambulance may

be routed to the scene.

Sanders said point four states that in cases where a call goes directly to any ambulance service "that service shall respond to the call if it has an ambulance available."

Discussions centered on how the dispatcher can determine the closest ambulance service, and the suggestion was made that "response time" should replace wording that suggests physical proximity.

That point—which ambulance to call—was apparently what precipitated the meeting, according to one source.

Although it wasn't discussed during the meeting, one area ambulance service member said in some past instances the Ruidoso EMS has been called instead of the closest ambulance.

"I don't really give a damn if the city and the county are going to argue ... about who in the hell's going to get 40 bucks for going out and picking somebody up," said village attorney John Underwood, describing how he'd feel if he was in need of an ambulance.

"I don't mind competition, I'd like you both racing to get there to get me," said Underwood who called for "common sense" and working together.

"But after you get well, you still have to pay the bill," said County Commissioner Ken Nosker who reminded Underwood that if two ambulances respond, two bills will probably be sent.

Village councillors voiced concern about placing the responsibility for "judgment calls" on dispatchers, however Bill Elliott, chairman of the County Commission, said those dispatchers make such decisions all day everyday.

In each town, open positions include the office of mayor and councilors. Capitan and Ruidoso Downs residents also will vote for a municipal judge.


SKI REPORT

Yeatman records best S.A.T. score ever in Ruidoso

No one in the history of Ruidoso High School (RHS) has scored as well on the Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT) as 17-year-old senior Jeff Yeatman, according to RHS counselor James Sanchez.

Yeatman took the Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Test (PSAT) last year along with many other high school juniors all over the world.

However, a few months after Yeatman took his PSAT, Sanchez was notified by the National Merit Scholarship Program that Yeatman's PSAT score placed him in the "top half of the top one percent" of all students who took the college entrance test that year.

Yeatman took the SAT again in the fall of this year, as a senior. Yeatman knew another good score might qualify him for an academic scholarship when he enrolled in college.

Once again, a few months after Yeatman took the SAT, Sanchez was notified by the National Merit Scholarship Program that Yeatman's score was exceptional.

Yeatman had gone from being one of 13,500 finalists across the nation to be eligible for academic scholarship funds, to one of 5,800 students across the nation to be eligible for special academic funding.

Sanchez said Yeatman joined a very elite group of students because of the results of his performance on the SAT last fall.

In May, Yeatman and Sanchez will be notified by the National Merit Scholarship Program as to the extent of financial support Yeatman will receive when he attends college.

Sanchez said Yeatman is already assured of receiving some funds from the National Merit Scholarship Program, and his excellent SAT score might earn him additional support from the college he chooses to attend.

Yeatman's character and SAT scores would make any college interested in him, Sanchez said.

Yeatman is interested in the mass communications program at Texas Tech University.

"I have family in Lubbock, and it is not hard to drive from there to Ruidoso. I think Texas Tech would be a good starting place," Yeatman said.

Yeatman recently attended orientation for high school seniors at Texas Tech University.

Yeatman is interested in broadcast journalism as well as drama, he said.

He said he would like to discover

more about computerized film production and editing.

Yeatman said he performs best in subjects in mathematics and science. His weakest scholastic subject is English, he said.

Yeatman tries to maintain good study habits, he said.

He said sometimes he sees other students "give up on school" when they do poorly on a test they have prepared for.

But Yeatman is not discouraged by setbacks or afraid of work, he said.

Yeatman is president of the Ruidoso High Math Club, National Honor Society and Computer Club. He is historian for the Science Club.

He said he is a ski instructor at Ski Apache and also works at the

Texas Club.

Yeatman said he maintains a 3.8 grade point average at Ruidoso High and hopes to graduate cum laude (with honors).

His mother, Kay Yeatman, is a nurse at Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Hospital.

Yeatman said after his father died about nine years ago he learned to be independent.

He said he hopes a full scholarship will keep his mother from being placed under any financial hardship related to his education.

"College can be pretty expensive these days," Yeatman said.

Sanchez calls Yeatman "tops."

"Obviously he is a good student, but he is a great person just to know," Sanchez said.

Drifter walks for charity

Paul Hardy made a promise to a dying girl more than 20 years ago. He kept his promise by walking around the country to raise money for the March of Dimes.

With his tattered clothes and shopping cart of belongings, Hardy admits he looks like an average bum. He sleeps outside each night, in a bedroll he keeps in his cart.

"I'm not a bum. I won't take something for nothing," he said, adding that he does not refuse rides when offered.

Hardy supports his pilgrimage by selling ornaments he makes from aluminum cans. His creations include rocking chairs, motorcycles and race cars.

Since he began his journey in 1982, he has walked through all 48 continental United States. He will finish his trek in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, where he will place his

shopping cart in a museum for the March of Dimes, he said.

Hardy does not accept any money for the organization. He asks that people send their contributions directly to the March of Dimes, an organization that exists to prevent birth defects. He said he does not know how much has been collected from his efforts.

The walking man started his journey in 1982 to fulfill a promise he made to a little girl in 1964. He said he held the child in his arms when she died of polio and promised her that he would do something that no one else could or would do to raise money to prevent the disease.

It took nearly 20 years for Hardy to find something that had never been done. Now, four years and 48 states later, he nearly is done with his mission.

A former circus clown, Hardy said he will return to his home in Arizona where he pans for gold in the Superstition Mountains.

William L. Karn For Mayor

Recently a group of retired citizens were visiting about the upcoming village election. We discovered that we knew little about the candidates for Mayor. We agreed we wanted respect for both ourselves and our TAX MONEY. We do not want to be spoon fed and do not want to be told what we should do and not do by the village officials or anyone else.

Most of us knew the record of Mr. Davis from his years as mayor, filled with irresponsible remarks and actions, not the least of which his wish that the senior citizens would all go away, also declaring himself a hater of animals and animal lovers. We could recall little that was done for Mr. and Mrs. Public — only special interest groups.

We understand Mr. James is a retired business man and no doubt a successful one but we feel that this would have little value in Municipal government. As far as we could ascertain he has no experience with Municipal problems and law. No doubt some improvements could be made in the village administration but any attempt to shake it up could be a disaster.

Many of us first questioned Mr. Evan's judgement when he broadcasted from Washington that Senator Domenici had refused to help Ruidoso with a new airport, only to hear the senator say the following day that he (the senator) could support the choice of the site if the village could reach agreement with the school.

Analysis of Mr. Evans college appears to be more fiction than fact as we can find no mention of it prior to his present mayoral campaign. We also hear that he told the Rotarians that "it could fall on its face in two years." Mr. Evans advocates village control of the old airport land to "keep it out of the hands of speculators" (His ad). Yet when Councillor Karn made the suggestion to rezone and protect it for schools, parks, etc., Councillor Evans did not support it and spoke against it.

A comparison of the voting records by Mr. Evans and Mr. Karn (both on the present council) was very enlightening.

Mr. Evans voted to buy the Cree Meadows Golf Course. Mr. Karn opposed and we can all be thankful that the Village did not buy it as the annual deficit would have probably resulted in increased taxes.

Most noteworthy to us is the amendment to the Lodgers' Tax bill pushed through by Mr. Evans which obliges the village, each year, to match dollar for dollar (without ceiling or restriction) each dollar collected by the lodgers' tax.

To raise this year's \$110,000, the Council has made three budget cuts and reduced needed services, so if your streets have potholes, this may be the reason. Mr. Karn opposed the lodgers' tax ordinance, but he lost. One-third of this super-fund (all your tax money) is designated to hire a tourism and convention director which will in most cases duplicate the efforts of our Chamber of Commerce which is financed (and rightly so) primarily by the members whose interest it serves. This means that this year approximately \$110,000 of YOUR TAX MONEY will flow into this fund financing special interests. Incidentally, one of our very vocal council persons also supported this while worrying about the much smaller amount in the Senior Citizens department budget for we locals.

The voting records of Mr. Evans and Mr. Karn reflect their differing political philosophies.

Mr. Karn opposed the paving of private property with our tax dollars. Mr. Evans voted to pave.

Mr. Karn proposed that the village change the zoning on Cree Meadows fairways from R-1 (single family dwellings) to golf course. Mr. Evans opposed.

Mr. Karn proposed that the Council keep a close check over the millions (OF OUR TAX DOLLARS) being spent on the Grindstone project, Mr. Evans did not support the proposal.

Mr. Karn proposed the creation of municipal zone to protect parks, playgrounds etc., by law instead of variance. Mr. Evans opposed.

Mr. Karn's motion to redraft the paving ordinance passed unanimously. Then after paying attorney and publication fees, Mr. Evans joined in defeating it 5-1. The village can still pave my street without cost to me while making you pay for your own. Failure to pay can result in a lien against your property and/or possible forced sale.

Mr. Evans and a fellow councillor chartered an airplane (with our tax dollars) to fly themselves, one village official and a newspaper reporter (now an editor) to Santa Fe for the first reading of a bill that would be amended many times. Since it would be changed before passage. Mr. Karn drove to Santa Fe at his own expense.

Both, however, did vote against the \$4,000,000 tax increase.

We respect Mr. Evans but we know he is in the real estate business and is supported by that group and he should, and no doubt would, look out for his and their interests. We support our local merchants, tourism and growth but strongly opposed use of our tax money to do so.

It is apparent that Mr. Karn is supported by the largest special interest 'THE PEOPLE' and in turn he has supported them. There is not space enough to mention his many accomplishments while on the council.

But three major achievements: the letter from NMSU, the half million dollar grant and the recent change in the sales tax law were the result of his personal negotiations and perseverance.

His ability to communicate intellectually with officials in both Santa Fe and Washington and his access to their 'ear' has and will be invaluable to the village. His experience with and understanding of the many problems facing the village, in our estimation, places him head and shoulders above the other candidates.

"Dispatchers receive specific training to do the kind of thing you're talking about," said Muriel Kirchmeier, executive director for EMS Region III. She said the Lincoln County situation necessitating a mutual aid agreement is not uncommon.

Kirchmeier said documentation is available on response times, adding that such information can be used in drafting protocols to enhance the basic agreement.

Participants all agreed that the meeting and agreement are "first steps" for the groups involved to begin to communicate and work together.

Before commissioners and councilors adopted the agreement, attorneys drafted a fifth point: "to establish a joint medical review panel that will meet regularly to

establish protocols and review the performance of the ambulance services."


It was suggested that the medical directors of the RHVH and the Carrizozo Health Center, medical directors of the two ambulance services and a representative of EMS Region III serve on the review board.

"We will pledge our support to the concept," said Ken Moore, RHVH administrator, who issued a public apology to county manager Suzanne Cox for complications caused by the ambulance situation.

Jim Stover, Ruidoso EMS director, added his apology to county ambulance personnel, and said the new agreement will benefit the public and enhance emergency service in Lincoln County.

Mayor White also apologized on behalf of the Ruidoso service, in case "he's (Stover) stepped on anybody's toes."

"I pledge to you the hospital board's cooperation 100 percent," said RHVH board chairman R.L. "Pinky" Jones.

Wrestlers take 10th at state; Herrera is second at 167 pounds

Ruidoso varsity wrestlers started out strong in the weekend state AAA-division championships in Bloomfield, but later faltered to place 10th in the 26-team competition. Wrestler James Herrera continued his winning ways this season by turning in an outstanding individual performance and placing second in the state.

Traditional wrestling powerhouse Los Lunas won state honors, followed by Bloomfield and Aztec. Taos was fourth and Albuquerque Academy was fifth.

The Warrior team performance was highlighted by excellent efforts by all 10 wrestlers who traveled to Bloomfield. Most of the grapplers lost close decisions to eventual state champions or near champions.

Wrestling team coach Gerald Ames said Ruidoso's weekend record was riddled with near losses against eventual top finishers. He noted that Ruidoso wrestlers had beaten all of the top finishers at one time or another earlier in the season, but just could not go all the way last weekend.

"We just didn't have the intensi-

ty," Ames said of the second round of competition. Of Ruidoso's total 51 points, 47 came in the first round of competition.

At 98 pounds, Jeff Schmidt lost by one point to the eventual second-place finisher. Schmidt ended the tournament with a 2-2 record and an overall 19-14 record.

Mike Valenzuela lost by one point in 105-pound competition to Billy Gordon of Taos, the eventual fourth-place finisher and last year's second-place wrestler. Valenzuela was 2-2 for the championships and 23-8 overall.

Scott Yeatman beat two grapplers at 112 pounds, one who was the number two seeded wrestler. Yeatman then lost two matches to take a 2-2 tournament record. He was 20-13 overall.

At 119 pounds, Cory Garner lost one match by one point to the wrestler who eventually placed first in that weight class. Garner was 1-2 for the day and 23-19 overall.

Ruben Herrera lost by just two points to an Aztec wrestler who eventually took third. Herrera was 0-2 on the day and finished with a 13-13 record.

Zach Swalander, at 138 pounds, wrestled well throughout the tournament, posting a 3-2 record. He

lost to tough competition. Swalander finished the season with a 22-11 record.

Kerry Jameson, at 145 pounds, lost two and won one match. One of his losses came with just 10 seconds left in a match he was winning against the eventual second-place finisher. Jameson finished the season with a 19-13 record.

Second-place finisher James Herrera, at 167 pounds, captured a 3-1 record, losing only to the state champion. Herrera's season record was set at 33-6.

Jason Hill finished the tournament with a 1-2 record at 185 pounds. He lost two matches to tough competition. Hill finished the year with a 10-11 season record.

At heavyweight, Phillip Herrera beat two high-ranked wrestlers, then lost to the number one seeded wrestler and the eventual state champ. Herrera's 2-2 performance brought his season record to 26-12.

Ruidoso ended the year with an 11-3 record, and placed second in two tournaments.

"It was a wonderful season," Ames said. "It was outstanding."

Five of the ten wrestlers who competed in the state tournament will graduate this year, leaving five top grapplers to start next year.



Well tests are started

On Thursday afternoon, Smith Machinery of Roswell arrived at the Capitan well to begin a 72-hour test of the well.

From a depth of 360 feet, the pump began the test at 6:37 p.m. The water level at that time was 289 feet.

Water samples were taken from the well at three different times to be tested for purity. The samples were taken to the Roswell office of the State Engineer for testing. Representatives from the State Engineer's office were present at the well site throughout the 72-hour period to monitor the testing, according to Virginia Spall, village clerk.

At the end of 72 hours, 650 gallons of water per minute had been pumped from the well. There was no noticeable drop in the water level, according to officials.

The well, located about three miles east of Capitan, was test-pumped as a result of a bid awarded by the Capitan Trustees to Smith Machinery for \$3,934. Smith Machinery was the only bidder on the project, Spall said.

Village officials expect a report of results from the testing in the near future.





When the four million dollar tax increase was proposed, we had available approximately \$750,000 to phase water projects without raising water rates or taxes, so I voted against it.

When the village was told we did not need to change the 1% supplemental gross receipts tax, further investigation revealed that we did. Through negotiation, the law has been changed, signed by Governor Anaya and allows us to issue additional bonds without raising taxes.

When the bridge bill died in the regular session and the village was informed that we could not qualify for the special session, a phone call revealed that there was a way and that if we could reach the Governor's desk, it would not be vetoed. By negotiation and lobbying, we received the \$583,500 to rebuild four new bridges.

When, as a new councillor, I was advised to "Hang up if contacted by the Regents of NMSU," the advice was ignored. The result was the meeting on the Mesa with the BLM and the NMSU Regents that led to their giving me a copy of the letter which stated the conditions under which NMSU would agree to move their grass study.

All of these were the result of negotiation after being told "no".

Your new Council and Mayor will face similar situations. Among the major decisions will be the new zoning masterplan that will affect the village for years, and the negotiation of the final settlement of the old airport land that will affect the village forever.

Most people favor the enlargement of our primary market area, an increase in tourism and the expansion of economic development.

The record shows that, as one of your elected representatives, not only have I supported them, but have helped to achieve some measure of progress in their realization.

As mayor, I will be equally diligent and I ask for your support and your vote tomorrow.

STOP!

EMS warns drivers to observe light

Jim Stover, director of Ruidoso Emergency Medical Services, and Dave Pfeiffer, operations commander for the Ruidoso Police Department, caution local drivers to be aware of emergency lights on Sudderth Drive just east of the Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Hospital.

Stover said the red signals were installed recently to help warn people when an emergency vehicle is going through the intersection.


"Unfortunately the public has been ignoring them," said Stover, who fears an accident will occur when an emergency vehicle driver activates the red flashing light and enters the intersection assuming traffic will yield the right of way.

The lights stay on only 30 seconds when they are activated by a switch in the emergency vehicles, said Stover. They flash in all four directions, he added.

"We're asking the public to yield so we can get to the scene of an emergency as quickly as possible," said Stover.

"We're going to go down and monitor that intersection within the next few days," said Pfeiffer.

"If people continue to ignore it, essentially they're going to be cited for it," warned Stover.






Editorial

Respecting the right of way of an emergency vehicle when that vehicle is responding to an emergency is the duty of all drivers.

Ruidoso drivers in particular must be cautious near the Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Hospital. A recently installed stoplight there is designed to stop traffic so Emergency Medical Services (EMS) ambulances responding to emergencies may more easily enter Sudderth Drive.

EMS director Jim Stover said the light should be observed as any other red light, but many times drivers do not stop. He said drivers may not yet be aware of the light, even though signs are posted to remind drivers to "stop here on flashing red."

Also a problem is when drivers fail to yield the right of way to emergency vehicles on calls. Stover reminded drivers that when emergency vehicles approach—sounding sirens or flashing lights—other drivers must pull to the right side of the road. If in an intersection when an emergency vehicle approaches, drivers must clear the intersection.

Stover said emergency vehicle drivers can file complaints against drivers who do not yield. Also, he noted that Ruidoso police plan to watch for drivers who do not stop for the stoplight.

More awareness on the part of drivers when emergency situations arise is not only a good idea, it's a responsibility backed by law.—DJP

With a federal deficit that has already passed the point of insanity, rapidly falling revenues from oil and gas on a state level, and an ever expanding list of unmet needs, it is time we all put our energies into thinking of alternative new and imaginative solutions to our problems. We should change our basic philosophy, our building mania and our belief that vast sums of money poured into new facilities are

always a solution.

Why can't existing airport facilities at Roswell and Carrizozo be utilized? Ruidoso could provide luxury charter buses with refreshments and escorts with area information and give people an experience that could be a drawing card in itself. There have been some imaginative proposals put forth about rail links in this area. Why not a rail link to the Roswell airport? The present airport could be closed and the land used for a convention center suitable for major cultural events at a fraction of the cost of a new airport. There are no doubt a host of other possibilities as alternatives. If Ruidoso wants to be a first-class resort, the private business sector ought to look more closely at what they have to offer. They need more cultural events, a number of interesting shops and galleries, cosmopolitan restaurants, unique intimate inns—and, I might add, a friendlier attitude on the part of many shopkeepers, motel owners and restaurant personnel.

Conservation of our dwindling resources, including money, need not be negative. As a people we possess enormous reserves of energy, flexibility, imagination and inventiveness. We should start putting those qualities to work. Then growth and change can mean a better quality of life for all of us.

Inside the Capitol by Fred McCaffrey

SANTA FE—Governor Anaya is exultant. "I don't know if there has ever been a more productive 30-day (legislative) session in memory," he told one interviewer.

About all that really tells us is that to him the phrase "in memory" is synonymous with "during my term in office."

And, of course, Senator Les Houston is grinning like the 200-pound cat who has just feasted on canary. In interview after interview, he's now singing high praise for the spirit of peace and concord between executive and legislators that prevailed this year.

Some do not fail to note that this is the same Senator Houston who told us all last year how virtuous—indeed, essential—it is to be contentious. "Our system is by its nature adversarial," he repeatedly notified us, in almost literally these words, "and we legislators would be remiss if we did not fight the governor and one another."

About all that can be safely concluded from this volte face is that whatever mood Senator Houston happens to be in is inevitably praised by Senator Houston as being the totally appropriate one.

There is a difference between knowing something and realizing it completely.

We know, for instance, that there were human beings on earth by the middle of the Pliocene period; but that kind of knowledge remains remote and distant, unrealized, at least in the sense that it does not impact on our daily lives. What is real to us is now—the feel of sunshine or cold one our skin this day, or the amount of change in our pockets at this moment.

That psychological disquisition is the wind-up for a couple of remarks that dissent from the generally blue-skied views being expressed about this year's first lawmaking gathering.

One: This year's crop of legislators evidently knew (because they said so) that it was incumbent on them to cut the overall cost of state government to our taxpaying citizens. What's clear now, however, is that they did not realize, or make real to themselves, that thought. If they

had, how could they have done what they just did, which is to give us the most expensive state government so far in our state's history?

Two: They knew our taxes should not be raised in one fell swoop, but they didn't realize that concept either. That's why, with almost embarrassing ease, they agreed to load onto our backs the largest tax raise in one package New Mexico has ever seen.

From those acts we might conclude that in future we need politicians who realize what our lives are like, not just those who know about us.

In one of the paragraphs above, you will find the phrase, "this year's first lawmaking gathering." Does that indicate that the author of that line believes there will be a second such gathering?

Unlike Governor Anaya, whose glands appear to be pumping his small frame excessively full of adrenalin at the moment, the writer does not adhere to the belief that revenues during the coming fiscal year will be higher than they have so far been estimated to be. Quite the contrary.

And if the economists we retain to make their auguries turn out to have misjudged affairs badly, you can be sure another session our solons will have to be convened to trim back those appropriations they authorized, because the bucks just won't be there.

Not all the oil-producing states in our neighborhood, after all, are so ebullient as to forecast a \$22.40 per barrel price for the product during the year ahead.

What's more, it remains the firm belief of this observer that when all the expenditures these people approved are totted up, the total will come out considerably higher than they were telling us from the floor it would be.

Maybe all those lovefests that were going on in the Governor's office carried almost everybody in the leadership away.

It's even possible that Senator Houston was right in his previous observation that these people should oppose one another instead of getting into bed together.

Not liking the feeling of powerlessness it gave me, I forced myself to make a mental list of things I know or have learned about all the candidates. I considered what they've done in the past and what they say they'll do in the

future.

Yes, Frankie, there is a difference among these 13 candidates. Apparently I was so enraptured with covering the campaign that I lost touch with what it is all about.

We, the voters of Ruidoso, are preparing to choose a mayor and four village councillors, but once we have weighed their words and their records and come up with the ones we feel will lead us best, our job isn't complete.

That's where the power comes in, and that's what reminded me of that long and powerful freight train paralleling my route.

Sure, we'll elect a mayor and four councillors from among these 13 guys, and maybe there are some areas where they are alike—there are some definite differences, too.

Once they are elected they'll take off just like those three lead engines—leading Ruidoso down one track in a brand new way by combining their diverse personalities, hopes and dreams to become one village council.

Book Review

(Editor's note:) the following is the first in a series of book reviews by members of The Writer's Guild. The Lincoln County and Otero County area club members only will review books that are available at the Ruidoso Public Library.

Although there is something in "Jacob's Well" for those who prefer adventure stories and for those who deign to read romances, Stephen Harrigan's is much more than a formula novel. There is suspense, there is tension, and there is a lovers' triangle, but those basic elements do not describe the richness of this work.

In the basic plot of the book, Sam Marsh, a geologist and the protagonist, has separated from his wife, Libby, after the death of their infant. Initially, we find Sam and Libby searching for their individual identities. Libby becomes involved with Rick, a dedicated (maybe somewhat compulsive) scuba diver. She meets Rick when she takes his diving course. She finds the sport inspiring and devotes much time and energy to it.

Sam tries to immerse himself in his work, but he is continually drawn toward Libby. When he, too, decides to take up diving, Libby accuses him of "tailgating." But it is Rick who draws Sam into their search for a "secret passage" in Jacob's Well. He needs Sam's expertise as a geologist to sort out the layers of rubble and interpret the strata around the bottom of the Well. The climax of the story appropriately unfolds in this setting.

Harrigan is a poet, as well as a novelist, and I think this side of his talent is evident in the symbolism, the mysterious "unknowns" in the novel, that can't be rationally defined. Many of these symbols are connected in a way that gives the novel a powerful spiritual texture. There are references to the child who had died just after birth, and to the dark, frightening journey for the infant, after death. His memory haunts the parents throughout the book. Sam sees the baby's strife in the agony of dying animals in the wilderness; he imagines the child's plight in the "instant of ex-cruciating awareness" of each tiny life in the coral polyps of the sea.

Then there is the mythical quality of Jacob's Well itself. It is described as a refuge apart from the mundane world. Rick "could not wait to get back down there. This was his place; it had been assigned to him."

The journey into this cave is not unlike a passage into the Underworld. The first scene involving the

Well has Rick going into it to recover the bodies of two men who had drowned: "Here in the Well, in these dark chambers where the surface world was only the dimmest memory, he tended to get crazy sooner." This is not to imply that the Well exists primarily on a distant, mystical plane. The place is described in precise detail (there is even a map of it on the dustjacket). But like any rich symbol, the Well has meaning on more than one level.

One of the most captivating chapters in the book is an early one in which Sam finds himself in the shack of an old healer, Don Ignacio, after having been bitten by a blacktail rattlesnake. There is an hallucinatory feel to this episode, partly attributable to Sam's delirium from the poison.

In one scene, the old man looks into the future through a bunch of cards with pictures on them. As he does so, the room begins to vibrate and "a great shuddering noise descended upon them... The curandero hardly noticed the commotion... As the noise grew louder, his attention grew more focused... Sam gripped the edges of the bed-frame, feeling if he let go he would be swept out of the room. It seemed alarmingly natural to him that such pandemonium could break loose, such devils could be released, as a result of the old man's intrusion into the vaster world."

As it turns out, the "earthshaking" was caused by the helicopter landing to take Sam to the hospital, return him to civilization. But again, the event takes place on more than one level. The medical attendant shatters our dreamscape when he peals the healer's cactus pad off Sam's arm, asking, "What is this? Voodoo?"

But the curandero gives Sam a prophetic message, as the geologist departs:

"What was in the future?" Sam asked.
"Your wife. But not as she was before. You will be together in a very beautiful and dangerous place, and you will need each other then. Keep an eye out for the snake, also. He wasn't trying to kill you, only to get your attention. He's your ally!"

The chapter ends with the attendant singing, "Ooh ee ooh ah ah, ting tang walla walla bing bang."

I suspect that some of the ideas and inspiration for this chapter came from the Castaneda books (about the Yaqui mystic, Don

Juan). It is a credit to the author's unique style that the chapter does not seem derivative.

Part of the chapter's charm is in the way a balance is maintained between the hallucinatory quality and certain humorously commonplace elements. The old man is wearing "a faded T-shirt advertising the Terlingua Cook-off." On his wall he has, among other pictures, a 3-D postcard of the crucifixion. He feeds Sam a cup of canned alphabet soup and crackers, rather than some unidentifiable, exotic potion. Many of Harrigan's minor characters are perfectly captured with such descriptions of local color.

Another delicate balance we find in the novel is between the visionary insights, on the one hand, and astute, precise descriptions of the physical world, on the other. The minute details of scuba diving and geology which the author introduces to us are so intricately woven into the plot and character development that we may not be aware of how much we are learning about the natural world. The viewpoint of the geologist serves both to ground the novel in the material world and to give it a broad perspective. Sam experiences events with the patience of someone who has grasped the finite but timeless quality of his environment:

"Every day the world changed form, and from the human time-track, this riotous activity seemed labored, incremental, eternal. From that vantage you did not see the molten rock in bloom, or see it weathered or cooled or crushed. You did not see it ground and worried into sand, you did not see it disappear."

"That was a question he would have liked answered. Did rock, finally, pass out of being? At what point did the microscopic grains cease to exist, become the materials of spirit and mingle with the souls of the organic dead? Geology, Sam suspected, was as much as anything else the study of morality, the true analogue for our own flickering lives and deaths."

"Jacob's Well" is a powerful modern journey through the separation and reconciliation of two people. It is a journey to the very edge where life and death choices must be made. The path of this novel is lined with rich symbolism and colorful characters.
