At last—SBAC receives airport land deed

The Sierra Blanca Regional Airport (SBRA) is one giant step nearer to becoming a reality after the legal document transferring the land to the Sierra Blanca Airport Commission (SBAC) was handed over in special ceremonies Friday.

Federal, state and local officials and their representatives were on hand to celebrate when Bill Luescher, state director of the Bureau of Land Management, gave the deed to 1,663 acres on Fort Stanton mesa to Governor Toney Anaya for the SBAC.

"This is a day that's been a long time in coming," said Luescher, who reviewed steps that were accomplished between August 15, when President Ronald Reagan signed the land transfer legislation, and Friday when the deed was presented. He said the legislation had to be modified because of problems in the legal description, a resurvey had to be accomplished and the whole process coordinated among the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA), New Mexico State University (NMSU), the SBAC and BLM, a federal agency of the Department of the Interior.

The well-wishers gathered at Cree Meadows Country Club stood,

applauded and cheered when the governor accepted the deed.

"This truly is not just for this area," said Anaya. He said the airport will play an important part in today's economy, which is dependent on tourism.

"I can assure you that we will do everything in our power ... to get this project moving," added Anaya. He said he will continue to press for the earliest possible completion of the SBRA for the safety of area residents.

"We're ready to start work," noted Anaya, who joked that he brought a large plane from Santa Fe loaded with heavy equipment to get the project moving.

"A great number of people have contributed a great deal of time and effort to make it (SBRA) happen," said SBAC chairman Fred Heckman upon accepting the deed from Anaya.

Heckman then presented many of those people with specially designed plaques bearing a copy of the Department of Interior BLM brass caps that mark the corners of the SBRA property on the Fort Stanton mesa.

Among those receiving the special plaques were U.S. Congressman Joe Skeen, represented at the ceremony by Alice Eppers;

U.S. Senator Pete Domenici represented by Poe Corn, and U.S. Senator Jeff Bingaman, represented by Scott Alley.

Plaques were presented to Bob White of the State Transportation Department, former Ruidoso Mayor and Mayor-elect Lloyd L. Davis Jr., Ruidoso Mayor George White, Ruidoso Downs Mayor J.C. Day, former Ruidoso Downs Mayor Norman Wheeler and Captain Mayor Pro-tem and Mayor-elect Benny Coker. Coker serves on the SBAC representing Capitan.

SBAC members Ken Nosker, a Lincoln County commissioner; Conrad Buchanan, a Ruidoso Downs trustee; and Heckman, Ruidoso's appointed representative, also were honored.

An appreciation plaque went to Tim Morris, Ruidoso Municipal Airport manager and an ex-officio member of the SBAC.

Others receiving plaques of appreciation included former county commissioners John Hightower and Bill Hart, Lincoln County Commission Chairman Bill Elliott and Steve Sanders, attorney for Lincoln County and the SBAC.

Also thanked Friday were Fred D'Antonio of Rio Rancho, a SBRA neighbor on Fort Stanton mesa; Tim Palmer and David Sheppard, formerly of The Ruidoso News and

currently with the El Paso Times and Ken Green, publisher of The News.

U.S. Forest Service members Steve Sams and Steve Makowski, Ed Jungbluth of the State Department of Tourism, Jerry Trujillo of the FAA and State Transportation Department Secretary C. Patrick Montoya also received the special plaques.

Former lawmakers John Bigby and Harrison Schmitt were named Friday as recipients of the commemorative plaques.

"We thank you one and all," said Heckman.

While the presentation of the deed Friday completes decades of efforts to secure a site for a replacement for the Ruidoso Municipal Airport, termed one of the most dangerous in the country, several hurdles still remain before the SBAC.

A "finding of no significant impact" must be determined on the environmental assessment already completed at the site before the FAA can commit any funds for the project.

Commissioners will discuss funding, scheduling and related business during a special meeting at 1:30 p.m. Thursday, March 13, at Ruidoso Village Hall.

Three arrested on drug charges

The Lincoln County Sheriff's Department arrested three people on drug charges around 2 p.m. Saturday in the Ruidoso Downs and Capitan areas, according to Sheriff's Office reports.

Undersheriff Charlie Cox reported Javier Del Rio was charged with possession of heroin with intent to distribute. Del Rio, 36, is the main suspect in a two-month investigation with the sheriff's department, Ruidoso Police Department, New Mexico State Police and the Federal Bureau of Investigation, said Cox.

Although Del Rio lives west of Capitan, he was arrested at the Ruidoso Downs home of Betty Herrera, 23. Herrera was also arrested and charged with conspiracy in intent to distribute, said Cox.

A third person, Tomas Soler, was arrested at Del Rio's residence near Capitan and charged with conspiracy, said Cox. He said Soler is an illegal alien.

The Ruidoso Downs Police Department and Capitan Police aided in the drug bust, said Cox. Cox said a very small amount of heroin was seized in the raid.

Cox said a team of dogs from U.S. Customs were used to sniff out heroin in Del Rio's Capitan residence Sunday, but none was found.

"Apparently he got rid of it," said Cox, adding that heroin is used in small quantities and is hard to detect. He said police informers purchased heroin from Del Rio during the two-month investigation.

Cox said the three suspects remain in the Lincoln County Jail with bond set at \$50,000. They will be arraigned today (Monday), March 10, before Carrizozo Magistrate Judge Salvadore Ortiz, he said. Del Rio has an additional charge of possession with intent to distribute in Texas, said Cox.







ARAB ponders Meals on Wheels

The pros and cons of a meals program for the elderly and homebound again were debated during the Thursday meeting of the Adult Recreation Advisory Board.

A meals program—both at the Adult Recreation Center in the form of a "congregate" meal and to the homebound in a "Meals on Wheels" form—drew comments from most members of the group present.

"I have just heard reason after reason after reason why this thing can't succeed," member Bernette Stumpley stated. She wondered why "resistance" to the idea of a congregate meal at the center was being raised.

New member W.D. Tucker said he had spoken to many senior citizens who regularly use the center. He said they do not oppose the idea of a "Meals on Wheels" program, but fear a regularly scheduled congregate meal at the center may disrupt conventional activities.

"It may be settled in my mind, but it's not settled in the senior citizens' mind," Tucker said. He said congregate meal programs he had been aware of in other places had "completely destroyed" those senior citizens centers. He said center-goers would not like the thought of some paying more than others for the same meal.

"It will be hard to get it to accept the fact that the one page, three and a half and the other page is better," Tucker said.

Member Wagon Adams said she believes a sliding scale of payment for a congregate meal program is in order, especially when considering the fixed incomes on which many elderly survive.

Stumpley expressed his despair with resistance from group members to meeting the needs of the elderly in the community. He said he was considering whether to resign from the group and join a church-based organization that is actively pursuing a Meals on Wheels program.

"We need to create a center that really is a center," he said, pointing to an empty meeting room at the center. "It should be jammed with people. This has been a real shame."

Members also heard from Charlotte Jarrett, who is per-

petuating in the separate group pursuing the Meals on Wheels program. She reported that group's short-range goal of trying to get Meals on Wheels going along, then to establish a regular congregate meal as a long-range goal.

She noted that the project has followed a very positive theme and still is in the early formation stages.

In other business, the group: —Decided to send a representative to a meeting of the Ruidoso Village Council to seek guidance from the new council.

—Heard Adult Recreation Center director Betty Starnes report on programs at the center. She said about 20 people had signed up for the trip to Alamogordo. Also, she reported members of visitors and activities during February. She said the center was, which also picked up a check for Ruidoso Downs, increasing twice a week. She added that another sign for the center has been donated by Candy Garrett.

—Discussed that the Golden Age Club, through state funding, will purchase another van to service the elderly in need of transportation.

Downs election contested

Ruidoso Downs mayoral candidate Jake Harris will contest the results of the March 4 election and apply for a re-check and recount of the votes, reported Harris' attorney Sam Westgren Monday. Write-in candidate Carlton L. "Bones" Wright won the election with 111 votes. Harris received 92. Westgren alleged that write-in votes were counted improperly, in a manner that was in accordance with a statute regarding write-in votes. He said he will apply to the appropriate election officials for the recount.

Harris alleged that the names were written incorrectly on some of the ballots. He said that state statute specifically states how the names should be written. Harris said that Ruidoso Downs election judges were told to count the votes if intent was shown, even if the name was written incorrectly. Harris opined that this practice is in violation of the state statute.

Westgren said he would start with the request for the re-check and recount of the allegedly illegal write-in votes. If no relief is obtained, Westgren said "we will take whatever action is necessary, including a lawsuit."

Village clerk Wilma Webb said problems arose from the way in which Wright's name was written

by the voters. Webb said state statute requires a first and last name, but does not specify if a legal name is needed.

Wagon attorney Don Dutton said that state statute allows only votes in which names may be written on a written ballot, including initials and a first name, middle name and last name and misspelling.

Dutton said that 10 people wrote "Bones Wright" instead of "Carlton" or "C.L." However, Dutton said a Supreme Court decision states that any form of the name which does not cause confusion and from which the canvassing board can tell "reasonable intent" is acceptable. Dutton said the court's decision was based on a district attorney election in Albuquerque a few years ago.

Dutton said some voters reported that they did not receive instructions on how to properly cast their write-in votes. He added that Wright received an additional seven votes, not counted in the 111 total in the judge and trustee positions. He said he felt the ballots were written without confusion, with the intent of voting Wright.

Webb said the village will honor the election results until further contest. Wright is scheduled to be sworn into office at 7 p.m. today.

Director Tom Malm said the show will require at least 10 men and 10 women, however the cast can be much larger. Malm said hopes to include as many newcomers as possible in the production.

Malm said he chose "The Best Little Whorehouse in Texas" because it is a contemporary, funny, high-energy show with a big cast and southwestern influence. He said the music and dance routines are not difficult and will give participants a chance to learn something new.

RLT scheduled two nights of auditions to accommodate people who are busy on one night, but want to try out for the play. Previous experience in theater is not necessary, said Malm.

Backstage and technical workers also are needed and are encouraged to attend auditions.

Although the show deals with an adult theme, it is not vulgar, said Malm, explaining that some people who have not seen the play have misconceptions about it. Malm recited a line from the script which states "there's nothing dirty going on."

In other business, the board elected two new members to

Testimony on the tribe's water rights on the Hondo River and its tributaries is being presented in the case that is related to a continuing suit in the State of New Mexico and Pecos Valley Artesian Conservancy District vs. I.R. Lewis and others.

Wendell China, president of the Mescalero Apache Tribe, testified early last week on tribal history. He

was joined by Indian historian Alan Newell who gave details of Indians in New Mexico in the 1870s.

R.B. Collins of the State Engineer's Office in Roswell said Friday that testimony is expected to continue in this part of the suit for four to five more weeks.

"When the judge will make his ruling is anybody's guess," noted Collins, who was unwilling to discuss the details of the case until a decision is made.



It looked like the Ruidoso High School boys varsity basketball team, ranked last in District 3-AAA play, could topple the district-leading Silver City Colts Friday in the last regular season game.

But that was not to be the case. In spite of an intense game, reflected by a tied score for much of the match, the Warriors were defeated 60-54, Ruidoso and Silver City were tied 20-20 at half-time.

"We played them even the whole game," said Warrior head coach Gene Segura.

The high-jumping Warriors rebounded the Colts by 32 to 31, but they weren't so successful with field goal attempts, hitting just 18 for 60 tries.

"You've got to be able to score," said Segura. He said his team was hurt by a "mental lapse" during the end of the third quarter and the beginning of the fourth.

Although the Warriors started a comeback by the end of the fourth quarter, Segura said it was too late, since the team ran out of time-outs.

Silver City got the better of the Warrior's 30 percent success rate from the field, hitting 20 out of 53, for 38 percent.

But the Colts gave Warrior fans a look at what it takes to be number one in district when they hit 18 for 23 free throw attempts, a 78 percent success rate.

And Ruidoso wasn't far behind hitting 18 out of 26 shots from the line, for 69 percent.

Top shooters for the Warriors were Kirk Ryan, 12 points; Russell Easter, 13 points, Brian Davis, 14 points and Jeff Willingham, 8 points.


The Silver City Colts, coached by Connie Hewitt, kept the pressure on the Warriors throughout the evening, with both teams giving energetic, fast-paced efforts.

Troy Maxey was top scorer for the Colts racking up 18 points, with teammate Quintana hitting for 14 points and Shane Stevenson scoring 13.

Even though regular season play is over, the Warriors may yet have another chance at the Colts during District 3-AAA tournament play which begins Tuesday.

The Warriors ended regular season play with a 2-6 district record and 12-13 season record to rank fifth in the district.

All that's behind the Warrior roundballers now, with every team getting a fresh start in the district tournament.

Inside the Capitol by Fred McCaffrey

SANTA FE—One group with lots of clout in New Mexico government is the Legislative Finance Committee. Most citizens know at least vaguely that this is so.

They may also be aware that the Senate Finance Committee and the House Appropriations and Finance Committee rank equally highly among those who have a say in what actually makes its way into our lawbooks.

That's why those three groups get so much newspaper ink. The media are almost always fascinated with power, which these committees have in large quantities.

But we who report the news probably don't do as good a job conveying the message about those other legislative congregations called conference committees. In New Mexico at least, these could be the most potent of all.

They have advantages over those formally organized committees previously named. They are created to act only on one specific matter, and then they disband. They also meet and act in secret, and thus escape the scrutiny other legislative committees attract. Those facts give them the ability to hit and run, without hanging around to take the blame for their actions as members of other, more public committees must do.

Of course, such committees only come into being when certain conditions prevail. They are needed when a bill has passed either House or Senate and then been amended in whichever body adopts it second.

When that happens, as it frequently does when Legislators are meeting, especially in the case of omnibus legislation, the first house to consider the matter may be formal action concurred in the changes the other body has made, or invite that other body to recede from its amendments. When neither side is willing to change, a conference committee is chosen to attempt to fashion a bill both houses can agree with.

The members of such conference committees are named on the spot by the leadership in both houses, who thus have great power.

As we do things here in New Mexico, a conference committee is allowed to perform so much surgery on the two measures they are expected to meld that what results can be virtually a new bill altogether.

And since all this normally takes place in the busy and crowded final days, or even hours, of a legislative session, the conference committee report is liable to be received and adopted with only minimal scrutiny by those who make our laws.

Just to show how this system allows for a certain amount of manipulation, let's look at an entirely hypothetical situation.

Say we have a governor, a President Pro Tem of the Senate and a Speaker of the House who meet frequently and in private to decide what a legislative session should accomplish for our good, whether we want it or not.

Say they have prepared a bill of widespread interest and held

lengthy public hearings to give proponents and opponents the feeling they are being heard and their views heeded in the matter.

Then, if for some reason these leaders want to make major changes in the bill that is to be passed without having to make public appearance against it, all they need to do is be sure that the second house which passes it amends it in some ways, and the two houses then refuse to go along with one another's versions. That shouldn't be hard to do if the Pro Tem and the Speaker, in this completely hypothetical illustration, control the majority of votes in their respective bodies.

Then when these same people name conferees, they again pick

those who will do as they are told. Accomplishing that can involve so much cutting and slicing on that the bill finally reported out, under the very same title as the one that started the process some 30 days or so ago, is much closer to what the three "plotters" have decided is in our best interests than it is to the original bill some people think it still is.

Does that ever happen? That's not hard to answer. In New Mexico politics, the answer will always be, "If it can happen, it is going to."

Or maybe we should say, "It has."

In case you hadn't noticed, New Mexico politics can be downright fascinating. But then, you probably knew that already, didn't you.

DEAR EDITOR:

This letter would have been sent earlier, but I have had mid-terms this past week. My semester here in London is only 12 weeks long and, as I write, our spring vacation is into its second day; we have ten days off in all.

I thought I'd tell you a bit about where I live and go to school. I share a room with one roommate at Harrington Gardens House, a small hotel by American standards (only twenty rooms). The room itself, which is on the fourth floor, measures about twelve feet on a side. It includes a small stove and refrigerator, but the shower and toilet are down the hall.

The British have some interesting terminology concerning lavatory facilities. Whereas we use such words as "bathroom" and "restroom" interchangeably, the British are much more specific. A "bathroom" means a room with a bathtub, period. A room with a shower is, naturally, a "shower", while our "restroom" is called, offensively, a "toilet."

The shower and toilet I use are tiny rooms unto themselves. The shower is situated about six inches above the carpet. Its floor has raised ridges, which are meant to keep you from falling. They do this very well; so well, in fact, that my feet always become embedded in the surface, leaving red lines on my soles. The knobs are normal enough, but the temperature varies widely, which means I have to ad-

just the knobs every twenty seconds or so. Water comes out through a shower head which is attached to a metal hose. The whole apparatus can be removed to concentrate the water on one area. This is good because there is very little water pressure.

Harrington Gardens House is run by an eccentric, silver-haired woman, who I usually see only in the morning, when I am leaving for school. It is said she drinks more than she should, though I've never seen her touch liquor. She is kind and helpful, especially when I'm trying to figure out how to use the confusing pay telephone downstairs. Her voice, which might be described as a violin being played with a hacksaw, is recognizable from far away. The maids who clean our rooms each day probably appreciate this, as it gives them plenty of warning before the occasional white glove inspections of the rooms.

I enjoy listening to this woman. One evening at about 6:30, I found her outside, throwing bread crusts over an iron fence into a nearby courtyard. As it was about 25 degrees, steam was rising from the warm crusts. I wondered what she was doing playing in such cold.

Seeing the confused look on my face, she smiled and told me of the blackbird she had seen among the bushes in this courtyard. She had first spotted the creature three years before. Ever since, she had been leaving the crusts on cold winter evenings. She had read somewhere that blackbirds will die overnight in the cold "if they don't have a little something in their tummies." She added that, though she hadn't seen the bird at all this winter, the crusts were always gone the next morning.

Such acts of kindness are quickly forgotten when I am roaming about in a city of eight million or so people. Kensington, where I live, is a rather wealthy area in central London. There are many BMW's, Mercedes and even a few Rolls Royces parked on my street, most of them in front of the Gloucester Hotel, which is about a block away.

My street, Harrington Gardens, is just off Gloucester Road, a major street in the area. There is a "tube," or "Underground" station nearby; the British version of the subway. A "subway" in Britain is an underground walkway. The tube

in London is very safe compared to suburbs in America, with the minor exception of drunks, who are rare and usually do nothing more than mutter and spit on the floor. I use the tube to go everywhere—to school, to clothing stores, even to nightclubs and plays.

My school, which is also located in central London, is a 20 minute tube ride from my residence. Actually, it isn't a school per se; my classes meet in the University of London (ULU) building. The student pool, gym, travel agency, cafeteria and optometrist's office are housed here. At night, various student organizations hold meetings in our classrooms.

One cab driver, who brought a fellow student to class one morning, called ULU "the Redbrick building". This is two jokes together. "Redbrick" is the old term for non-Cambridge or Oxford colleges. In addition, ULU is notoriously left-wing, as are most student governing bodies in Britain; hence the "red" reference.

In my last letter, I mentioned the American Institute for Foreign Study, or A.I.F.S., which runs the London Semester. Under the program, each participating university sends students and (usually) at least one professor to London. Students take classes from the American professors. A.I.F.S. has offices near my motel in Kensington where I can collect my mail and sign up for sight-seeing trips, concerts, plays, etc., at much-reduced rates.

The A.I.F.S. staff are friendly and helpful, especially when consol-

ing students who have temporarily run out of money (a common problem). We are issued vouchers for our lunches in the ULU cafeteria. We may also use them in the nearby Imperial College cafeteria or in the Imperial College Shop, a tiny grocery store. I use this latter option quite often when my money runs low.

What do I think of the program? It's probably more expensive than many other ways of exploring London. In addition, taking classes from American professors, though likely easier than actually going to a British college, does nothing to add to the "Britishness" of the experience. Most of the people in my hotel are American as well.

On the other hand, A.I.F.S. does a good job of setting up social and cultural events, which saves students a lot of money and hassle. The British Life and Culture class, which A.I.F.S. sponsors and requires of all students, is quite good also. Each week, a different speaker lectures on a different aspect of Britain, from media to politics to education. Speakers have included an MP (Member of Parliament) from the small but much-publicized Liberal Party.

In general, then, I like the program. I feel fortunate to have the opportunity to live in London for these few months. Of course, there is much to see both in and out of London. I hope to do some traveling during this spring break. I will, of course, try to keep you informed.

Commission learns about health service

Lincoln County Home Health Services (LCHHS) started with a federal seed grant in October of 1976, LCHHS executive director Verna Adams told the Lincoln County Commission at its regular meeting March 4.

Counties that are medically underprivileged are eligible for the grant. In 1976 Lincoln County had only five practicing medical doctors, Adams said, as she gave a report on the organization.

LCHHS consists of skilled nursing personnel who travel throughout the county, giving needed medical care to home-bound patients. To qualify for services, a patient must be under the care of a personal physician, be home-bound and need skilled care.

The nurses are in constant communication with the patients' doctors, providing medical equipment and care under the doctors' orders.

In 1985 LCHHS cared for 178 patients scattered throughout the county, reported Adams.

Adams told commissioners that most of her patients are chronically or terminally ill and have insufficient or "shaky" insurance coverage. In certain circumstances, some hospital costs may not be covered by Medicare, if the only reason for hospitalization is that the patient is dying, said Adams.

"There are terminally ill patients who wish to die at home, within a familiar environment, with loved ones and dignity. LCHHS gives

these patients a choice, providing care for the patient and emotional support for the family," said Adams.

Funds are derived for LCHHS from three sources: 76 percent from Medicare, 15 percent from insurance and the remainder from Medicaid and charity. LCHHS tries to have one or two fundraisers each year. Since LCHHS is a non-profit organization, funds always are a pressing problem, said Adams.

The LCHHS Board of Directors consists of Winston Presnall, Burdette Stampely, Nancy Bowen, James Sanchez, Carol Ramey, Barbara Duff, Gene Sellers and Mozelle Vinsant.

With Commissioner A.W. Gnatkowski absent from the meeting, commissioners Bill Elliott and Kenneth Nosker heard Glenn Ellison discuss the need to reopen Water Canyon Road, which was closed in 1977. Ellison said many concerned people want the road reopened so they can gain access to public lands.

The commissioners were sympathetic to the public plea, telling Ellison they understand the hardships the closed road impose on citizens. However, they said the issue presents certain problems.

"It is debatable that we could terminate an agreement made in 1977. At that time the county abandoned the road and gave up all rights. The concerned citizens will need to challenge the 1977 decision with legal assistance to gain good, reasonable access to the forest land," said Nosker.

In other business, the commission:

—Approved payroll and warrant registers.

—Amended ordinance 1985-9, regarding solid waste.

—Approved an audit contract to Donald R. Wingfield.

—Approved Resolution 74-49, involving a budget transfer.

—Approved Resolution 74-50, regarding a budget increase.

—Tabled a road request by R.A. Canning.

—Proclaimed March as Mental Retardation Month. The purpose of the observance is to promote public education concerning mental retardation, its prevention and cure and the welfare of the nation's mentally retarded citizens.

—Discussed a road opening request near Carrizozo High School, outside the city limits. The commissioners viewed the sight and denied request, stating the subdivision does not meet county requirements.

—Agreed to post signs on Lincoln County bridges designating load capacity.



—Approved a cooperative agreement with the U.S. Forest Service.

—Approved the emergency purchase of automobile insurance for county vehicles. The approval includes an amendment to allow for the purchase of another policy, if a less expensive one is found.

—Heard State Representative Maurice Hobson request assistance for Corona roads. Corona has been awarded a grant that requires matching funds. The commissioners will schedule a meeting with the people of Corona to discuss this subject.

Math and science whiz kids display knowledge at the Ruidoso Middle School Bowl

Last Friday the Ruidoso Middle School gymnasium was filled with beeps, buzzes and puzzled faces.

Closed-in classroom learning took a vacation as the Middle School conducted its third annual Math and Science Bowl finals.

Teams could consist of sixth-graders and any combination of seventh and eighth-graders, according to Middle School teacher and math coordinator for the Bowl, Kathy Weems.

Over 165 Middle School students signed up to compete on one of the four-person math or science teams, Weems said.

In county and state-wide math and science bowl competitions sixth-grade students are not allowed to compete, Weems said.

However, science coordinator for the Bowl, science teacher Jackie Branum, said the Middle School faculty agreed sixth-graders should be allowed to compete at the school level.

Weems said the local Bowl became a reality when some teachers in the Ruidoso Municipal Schools (RMS) system decided it was time to "promote academic competition."

"Kids love competition, and it (the Math and Science Bowl) teaches them math and science can be fun," Weems said.

Branum said the competition seems to give the students "extra drive" and helps them learn complicated subject matter in a different environment than is found in the day-to-day routine of the classroom setting.

Branum said competition at the high school level can be especially "fierce."

Both teachers agreed that members of the four person science and math teams must have more than good memorization skills to compete.

Weems and Branum said students must be able to listen,

analyze and respond to questions quickly to be successful in a math and science bowl competition.

Middle School science teacher Page Hubbard built a timing and buzzer system for the Middle School competition that is similar to the systems used in county-wide and regional competitions.

On Wednesday, March 12, students in grades seven through 12 from RMS, Capitan, Carrizozo and Tularosa will compete in the County Math and Science Bowl, an all day double-elimination tournament at Ruidoso High School.

Ruidoso High School math and science bowl coordinators are Jim Dickinson and Rick Overdorf.

In April, RMS students in grades seven through twelve on the math and science bowl traveling squad will converge on Hobbs Junior College in Hobbs for a regional competition, Weems said.

"In the past we have had sponsors, but so far this year it looks like

students will have to pay for their motel room, meals and other expenses when they go to Hobbs," Weems said.

Branum said she hopes some area service club will help students with at least part of their expenses for the April competition at Hobbs Junior College.

Weems said though RMS students are competing with larger school districts, they manage to advance into the late rounds of regional events.


