## New council gets right to work

The new Ruidoso Village Council came in like a lamb early this week with an organizational meeting Monday and a regular meeting Tuesday. Both meetings were short, less than a half hour, and characterized by a spirit of agreement among village councillors and Mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr.

"I hope that we can now, regardless of where we came from, pull together for the Village of Ruidoso," said Mayor Davis soon after taking the oath of office administered by village clerk Leon Eggleston.

Victor Alonso and William A. "Dub" Holt, both re-elected last week, were sworn in Monday and returned to the council table. New councillors Elmer Pirelli and Michael L. "Larry" Simon joined them.

Councillors Ray Dean Carpenter and Jerry Shaw remain in office for two more years.

First item of business for the Mayor was to appoint Jim Hine as village manager, Leon Eggleston as village clerk, Richard Swenor as chief of police and John Underwood as village attorney. The four appointees currently hold those positions, and will continue under the Davis administration.

Davis said the council will respond to "what the people have told us as we've been up and down the streets" by conferring in executive sessions with village administrators, department heads and members of village commissions and boards.

The only note of discord came during Tuesday's meeting when Al Junge, a member of the audience who was also a candidate for councillor in the March 4 municipal election complained that because of "lack of coordination in the clerical work" a number of people were unable to vote in municipal elections last week.

He spoke of the elderly and infirm who were unable to stand in the long line election day. Junge also related an incident involving a

voter who failed to vote in the last general election whose name was apparently purged from the list of registered voters.

"Election day was quite disturbing," agreed election judge Barbara Duff, who rose to respond to Junge. Duff, too, decried the fact that some people were unable to vote because of the current list of registered voters furnished through the County Clerk's Office in Carrizozo.

But she said the list was updated in accordance with the law, adding that voters who had not furnished a physical address to the Clerk could not be assigned a voting precinct.

Duff apologized for any inconveniences of election day, and said she has plans for way to improve procedures next time.

Tuesday's meeting began with a flag ceremony presented by the Ruidoso fourth grade Girl Scouts in honor of national Girl Scout Week.

Other troops were also at the meeting to hear Mayor Davis proclaim March 10-16 as Girl Scout Week in Ruidoso.

In other business Tuesday the council:

—Consented to Councillor Carpenter's suggestion to scheduled a budget hearing for 3 p.m. Tuesday, April 1.

—Heard from Councillor Holt of plans for a barbecue on May 31, to welcome track and horse people back to town. The council voted to sponsor the event along with Ruidoso Downs and the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce.

—Heard Mike Davalos, village engineer, report on two upcoming projects: (1) a joint project with the State Highway Department for a traffic light at the traffic Y, and (2) painting the interior of the village's five-million gallon water tank that was recently repaired.

—Learned of an April 2 meeting of the New Mexico Municipal League at Prime Time in Ruidoso Downs.

—Appointed Councillor Shaw as mayor pro-tem.

—Went into executive session to discuss personnel.



## Frosty branches

## Wright takes the reins as Ruidoso Downs mayor

The Village of Ruidoso Downs changed administrations Monday, when the outgoing officials wrapped up old business and the new ones were sworn into office.

At 6 p.m. the outgoing board of trustees met with outgoing Mayor J.C. Day. At Day's suggestion, the board voted to transfer \$50,000 in funds from investments to street improvements. Day said this gesture of goodwill is necessary to show the state highway department that the Downs is willing to pay its share of a cooperative agreement to pave schoolbus routes.

If the money is not used for roads, it will return to general funds. Day said he discussed the matter with new Mayor C.L. "Bones" Wright, who approved of the action.

Day reported on his term of office, noting various grants which the village did and did not receive. Day thanked many people who helped the village, including Governor Toney Anaya, Lieutenant Governor Mike Runnels, village attorney Don Dutton and Trustee Conrad Buchanan.

"We may have set a precedent in this council," said Day, adding that the board has never had to cancel a meeting due to a lack of people. The board of trustees under his administration has never lacked a quorum, even during many special called meetings, he said.

Day later thanked the village employees, the planning and zoning commission, the Ruidoso Downs Ladies Auxiliary, the volunteer fire department and his wife, Betty, for her support.

The new administration was sworn into office at 7 p.m. Wright took the oath as the new mayor, J.L. Wilson and LeVerne Cole as

trustees and Martin Valenzuela as municipal judge. An organizational meeting followed the swearing-in ceremony.

Wright named Trustee Jackie Branum as the mayor pro-tem, and the nomination was approved by the entire council.

The new mayor appointed Skip Hazel, current chief of police, to retain his position. Village clerk-treasurer Wilma Webb and the rest of the village employees also were retained by Wright and the new board of trustees.

Three of the four trustees served on the previous board. They will keep departments of authority under the new administration. Cole is the Commissioner of Parks and Recreation; Buchanan, Commissioner of Streets and Branum, Commissioner of Sanitation. New trustee J.L. Wilson is the new Commissioner of Water and Sewers, filling the position held by former trustee, Jake Harris.

The board passed Resolution 83-6, regarding the Open Meetings Law. Under the new resolution, three days public notice must be given prior to a regular meeting of the board of trustees. A special meeting requires 24-hour advance notice.

Wright and Buchanan will represent Ruidoso Downs on the Joint Use Board.

Village attorney Don Dutton told the mayor and trustees that a special meeting for an executive session is needed in the near future. Dutton said a number of challenges face the board, including personnel issues, legal matters, pending litigation and lawsuits and possible annexation.

In other business, the board: —Passed Resolution 86-4, giving signature authority to the new mayor, mayor pro-tem and the

village clerk-treasurer.

—Accepted the low bid from ATT for a new telephone system for the municipal offices.

—Approved April 19-May 3 as the period for a cleanup and beautification campaign, sponsored by Opal Armstrong and the Ruidoso Downs Ladies Auxiliary.

## Downs vote recount scheduled

The votes from the recent Ruidoso Downs mayoral election will be rechecked, and recounted at 1 p.m. Friday, March 14, at the Ruidoso Downs Municipal Building.

Candidate Jake Harris contested the election, in which he lost to write-in candidate Carlton L. "Bones" Wright by a vote of 101 to 92. Harris and his attorney, Sam Westergren, questioned the way in which Wright's name was written on some of the ballots.

According to Westergren, some of the ballots did not contain Wright's legal name or initials. He said the state statute specifically details the way in which a write-in candidate's name must be written.

"There's got to be some guidelines to eliminate confusion," said Westergren, adding that "nicknames are not enough."

Village attorney Don Dutton disagreed, stating the state legislation guiding municipal elections

—Accepted the termination of police officer Cathy Myers and her request for a personnel hearing. Dutton told the board that Myers has retained an attorney in Albuquerque. He later told The News that she was terminated for "dissension and disharmony."

"gives the edge to the voter." "The spirit and intent of the law is to preserve the voters' vote," said Dutton.

"A municipal election is democracy at its finest hour .... I think it is absolutely fatal, if not criminal, to strike a vote if it did not comply with the letter of the law," he said, adding that he felt that write-in votes showed that the citizens took more time to express their choice in leaders.

Dutton said he'll advise the election board not to count ballots with only "Bones" on them, but that "Bones Wright" is acceptable for a write-in ballot.

The precinct board will recount and recheck the votes in the presence of District Judge Richard Parsons, County Clerk Fran Sidens and municipal clerk Wilma Webb. The three will certify the election after the count has been made.

The municipal canvassing board will then canvass the returns.



## Police confiscate contraband worth \$400,000

State police officer Bart Skelton, while on routine patrol Wednesday, arrested a Wichita, Kansas, man and confiscated about 250 pounds of what is suspected to be marijuana, according to Assistant District Attorney Harry Wilcox Jr.

"Skelton, while on normal patrol on U.S. Highway 380 in Lincoln County, stopped a pickup truck for

allegedly following too close," said Wilcox in a telephone interview late Wednesday.

Wilcox said the driver of the truck was identified as John A. Shields.

A search of the truck revealed the approximately 250 pounds of suspected marijuana with an estimated street value of \$400,000, according to Wilcox.

"Third degree felony charges were approved and the suspect remains in Lincoln County Jail with bond set by the Honorable S.M. Ortiz, magistrate judge, at \$100,000 with no 10 percent allowed," said Wilcox.

The defendant will be arraigned before Judge Ortiz prior to further proceedings, said Wilcox, who added the matter is still under investigation.

Wilcox said Officer Skelton was recently nominated by the Twelfth Judicial District Law Enforcement Association as Officer of the Quarter.

The award was to commend "his excellence in police work resulting in the seizure of over \$350,000 worth of illegal narcotics while stationed at Carrizozo," said Wilcox.

## County lodgers' tax will help fund archaeological dig

At its budget hearing Wednesday, the Lincoln County Lodgers' Tax Committee voted to appropriate \$5,000 for an archeological dig in Lincoln.

Gary Miller, director of the Lincoln County Heritage Trust, presented a proposal for the McSween Dig. He said the \$5,000 from county lodgers' tax funds will be matched from the Trust. He said he will apply for \$15,000 in state funds through the Department of Economic Development and Tourism, for a total of \$25,000 to fund a test dig.

Miller said the project will bring national exposure to New Mexico through such publications as National Geographic and The Smithsonian, and draw enough interest for other parties to fund a more complete expedition.

The objective of the McSween Dig is twofold, said Miller. The first purpose is to recover historic artifacts and the second, to create publicity for Lincoln County.

"The media exposure should have a dollar value far in excess of the initial dollar investment," said Miller.

Archeologist Mike Taylor showed slides of work done and various artifacts found in Lincoln. He said the project will be open to the public and archeologists will announce "the finds of the day" to inquiring locals and tourists.

The committee set a two-year budget of \$21,000, for this year and next. The county began collecting the tax at the beginning of this fiscal year.

Committee members discussed areas of tourist interest throughout the county and expressed a need for a brochure to list the places. They earmarked \$10,000 for the creation of a brochure. The group set aside \$5,500 for media advertising and \$500 for committee expenses such as mileage and per diem.

Rich Seeley, chairman of the committee, will present the propos-

ed budget to the Lincoln County Commissioners at their April 15 meeting.

In other business, the committee accepted the resignation of Lydia Krupicka, and chose Bob Finley to replace Krupicka. The committee

will recommend Finley to the County Commission, which makes appointments to the committee.

The next meeting of the Lincoln County Lodgers' Tax Committee will be at 10 a.m. Wednesday, April 9, at the Lincoln County Courthouse in Carrizozo.

## Superintendent warns of hard times ahead for schools

Ruidoso Municipal Schools (RMS) superintendent Sid Miller and associate superintendent Mike Gladden, who had just returned from a New Mexico Office of Education budget workshop, told the Ruidoso Board of Education last night (Wednesday) hard times might be on the way for Ruidoso schools.

"I'm not against the education reform bill (Senate Bill 106), but they (the New Mexico Senate) don't realize what they have done to us," said Miller.

He said the bill was complicated, could restrict local school boards and made it difficult to make operating budgets.

One of the items of the bill calls for students to spend more time in the classroom and less time in non-academic activities, Miller said.

To help school boards accomplish this reform, the senate wants the boards to schedule extracurricular activities like sports, speech tournaments and organizational meetings on Saturday only.

Miller said RMS is too limited in space and transport vehicles to schedule multiple events in all school-related activities only on Saturday.

"It will be extremely difficult to operate under these circumstances," Miller said.

Gladden told board members he would like to discuss the reform bill in detail at the next regular Board of Education meeting on April 9.

In other business the board approved the school calendar for the 1986-1987 school year.

Teachers will report for a full day on August 27 and a half-day on both August 28 and 29.

The first day of school for students will be September 2.

Students will be dismissed for a half-day on November 26, and a full day on November 28 and 29 for Thanksgiving.

The Christmas vacation will be December 22 through January 2.

A holiday will be observed on February 16, Presidents' Day. Spring Break will be April 20-24.

Teachers will have a work day on June 3, and June 4 will be the last day of school for the 1986-87 school year.

The board also:

—Called for bids on a new sprinkler system at Ruidoso High School.

—Asked for bids on new band uniforms for RMS.

—Solicited requests for proposals for an independent financial auditor.

—Opened and called for more bids on athletic supplies and equipment for the RMS 1986-87 school year.

—Opened bids on athletic supplies from New Mexico Team Sales, M&W Sporting Goods and Champion Products of Albuquerque.

—Also opened bids from Alamo Athletics of San Antonio, Colby Incorporated of Silver City, High Country Sports/Mountain Ski Shop and T.L. Wilson Sporting Goods of Ruidoso, for athletic supplies for the 1986-87 school year.

—Recommended athletic director Cooper Henderson review the athletic suppliers bids and report to the board at their next meeting.

—Considered principal's and the associate superintendent's contracts in executive session.







## Hot Springs guard ends Ruidoso hoopsters' hopes

Ruidoso High School's boys varsity basketball team saw its season end Tuesday night in a fashion most of the players and coaches did not expect.

The Warriors lost to host Hot Springs, 63-57, in the first round of the District 3-AAA playoffs. It was Ruidoso's first loss to the Tigers in three meetings this season.

And the primary reason the Warriors lost was the hot shooting of Tiger guard Tony Lucero.

Lucero scored 25 points on 13 of 19 field goal attempts and three of five free throws.

The Warriors had contained him well in the first two meetings between the teams, but this time Lucero was virtually unstoppable with his outside shooting and driving layups.

"We weren't expecting it," Warrior head coach Gene Segura said about Lucero's performance. "Harrison (Chris) has always been the player that's hurt us in the past, but this time he was hardly a factor."

"It seemed like Lucero was putting them in from everywhere on the floor. I think the past two games we played them, we held him to three and four points. It's just one of those things."

Hot Springs never trailed in the contest, but had to hold off a Warrior rally for the victory.

Trailing at one time by 14 points, 32-18 late in the second quarter, Ruidoso cut the Tigers' edge to 43-35 late in the third quarter on a field goal by guard Jeff Williamson.

But Hot Springs hung in and led 48-41 entering the final quarter.

The Warriors cut the Tigers' lead to seven points several times and six points once in the final period.

However, Hot Springs' lead was too great to overcome and the Warriors' season came to a close.

In contrast to the first two games between the teams, Hot Springs got off to a fast start and led 8-0.

The Tigers had an 18-10 lead at the end of the first quarter, but Ruidoso battled the hosts evenly the rest of the way.

Ruidoso stayed in the game in the first half mostly on the outside shooting of Williamson and Kirk Ryan.

Williamson, who led the Warriors with 20 points, had eight points in the first half, as did Ryan.

Ryan finished with 14 points and junior Brian Davis added 11. Russell Easter scored six points and Trent Tolbert added four for the Warriors.

Besides Lucero's scoring, Tony Harrison scored 15 for the Tigers. Harrison scored four points.

Despite the defeat, Ruidoso finished with a 10-14 record, the most Warrior victories in five seasons.

Tolbert and Easter are the only seniors on the team, so Segura is

looking forward to next season.

"I think we've got the experience coach year," Segura concluded.

"Our two seniors played as this year to last year's team."

"That's going to help us next year. It's always a competitive, always positive."

From time to time troubadors would come around the camp with guitar, Ukulele or banjo. When one youth showed up, I thought to myself, "I wonder if this boy can play, 'Chinatown, My Chinatown.'" Rightaway he struck up the tune on his guitar and sang a verse or two.  
"What did you do, Read my mind?" I asked. "I was just wondering if you could play that song."  
He grinned and said that he thought I might like this number as he did.  
I asked one troubador if he knew any Mexican songs and he said that he knew many, and began singing an old Mexican favorite:  
"Adios, Mi Chaparrita. No llores por tu Pancho. Que si se va del Rancho. Muy pronto volvera..."  
(Goodbye my shorty darling. Cry not for your Pancho. Although he leaves the ranch. Very soon he will return.)  
He sang it with a slight accent: (Adiosse me chaparrita. No yoreez por tu Pancho.)

I went over there, and here was Cristie, at the bottom. My heart came into my mouth, for there were broken bottles all at the bottom. I jumped down there, about six feet to the bottom, fearing for his bare feet. Fortunately he was all right and I lifted him out. He has gotten too close and slipped in. The smile returned to his tear-stained face as he munched on a chocolate bar.  
"Are you all right, Cristie?" I asked.  
"Vis, Sar?" he said in his little sing-song voice.  
At age forty-nine, over across the blue Pacific, I hope Christototo Pagador remembers Me. I will remember him always.



Sorenson finally took his mount around the three horses as they entered deep stretch, and drove home for an impressive victory in 1:06.4 seconds. The win was worth \$1,740 to Alan Antwell of Hobbs, who owns Rawcut. Jess Alley conditions the 4-year-old son of United Holme, who raced as the odds-on choice to win Sunday's feature.

Gaelic Sam held on for second, finishing a head in front of third-place Easy Chief. Brooks Claridge trains Gaelic Sam for El Basoon

Bill Danner. Easy Chief, also a Claridge trainee, carries the colors of Lawrence Blackmon Jr. of Dallas.

Racing resumes next weekend at Sunland Park with 12-race programs scheduled Friday through Sunday beginning at 1 p.m. Friday's card opens with a Pic-Six carryover of \$5,081. Sunday's card is highlighted by the \$12,500-added Sunland Park Derby, featuring sophomore thoroughbreds stretching out to a mile.

## Romas Magic emerges as leading contender for \$165,000 West Texas Futurity finals

Dr. Donald Strole's Romas Magic emerged as the leading contender for the finals of the \$165,000 West Texas Futurity after stepping the fastest time in trials for the stake on Friday, March 7, at Sunland Park.

Seventy-nine of the region's most promising 2-year-old quarter horses faced off in eight 330-yard heats on Friday's card, with the 10 fastest contenders qualifying for the Grade II West Texas Futurity scheduled for March 23.

Romas Magic posted a widening 1-length victory in the opening trial division to stop the timer in 17.005 seconds - a time that stood up as the fastest of the day. Romas Magic is trained by J.B. Montgomery for owner Strole, who resides in Abilene, Texas.

Montgomery, who is trying for his fourth win in the West Texas Futurity, will also be sending out Bedouin Prince for the 15th renewal of the stake. The Bedouin colt stepped the seventh fastest time in winning Friday's second heat. Bedouin Prince is owned by the Post Oak Farm of Pilot Point, Texas.

Gilda Ryan, the only \$5,000 supplement to the West Texas trials, sped a wind-aided 17.020 seconds in the seventh division to grab the No. 2 qualifying spot. The Windy Ryan filly is trained by Allen Wilmoth for Darrell Russell of Arlington, Texas.

Longshots ruled the scene in the featured 10th race Friday, March 7, at the Downs at Albuquerque at the 25-1 outsider Forthetwo Ofus prevailed over the 15-1 shot Weeditit.

Under jockey Fred Watson, Forthetwo Ofus raced close to the lead throughout the six furlong dash but was forced three wide at the top of

the lane. Forthetwo Ofus drew away from Weeditit to get the win by a half length with Holme Guy finishing third in the field of 12.

The Max Bastian trainee covered the six furlongs in 1:12 and returned \$53.20, \$20.60, and \$9.80. Weeditit paid \$11.60 and \$7.00; Holme Guy paid \$19.60 to show. The \$2.00 exacta was worth \$361.60.

## Special Hank earns eighth stakes victory

Special Hank, a nine-year-old gelding who is a legend in the 870 yard sprints, added his eighth stakes tally over the Albuquerque track when he cruised to a two and one-quarter length victory in the \$11,750 Chaparral Handicap Sunday, March 9, at the Duke City track.

Sent to the post as the heavy 3-5 choice in the field of seven, jockey Casey Lambert had Special Hank third, just off the pace set by Tooters Son and Raisearig, as the field raced on the turn. Lambert then unleashed the Doyal Roberts trainee and Special Hank responded with his customary closing kick to annex the win by two and a quarter lengths over Raisearig. Bob and Ben finished third while Tooters Son held on for fourth.

The second choice in the wagering, Shoe Bull, did not break well from the gate and failed to menace. The Jimmy Jones trainee had defeated Special Hank twice at the current meet.

Special Hank has now won eight stakes races here in Albuquerque, including three wins in the Governor's Speed Handicap run at the New Mexico State Fair.

Special Hank covered the 870 The stakes win netted Special Hank's owner Lowell Hankins of

Rock Springs, Texas, \$7,050, yards in :46.48 second and returned \$3.20, \$3.60 and \$2.60. The 25-1

Glover D. rallied from well off the pace to finish third in the field of eight.

The win was the first in five starts at the meet for Market Junction. In his most recent outing, Market Junction had finished fifth but lacked racing room through the stretch.

Market Junction covered the six furlongs in a fast 1:11.3 and paid \$14.40 for the win, \$8.20 and \$3.60. Ghetto Blaster paid \$10.40 and \$4.80; Glover D. returned \$3.40 for the show. The \$2.00 exacta 3-2 paid \$114.80.

## Longshot Bombay Bet pays \$101 to place

The 80-1 longshot Bombay Bet held on for second behind another outsider, Mahmoud's Axe, creating a record place payoff of \$101 in the opening race Friday, March 7, at the Downs at Albuquerque.

While the \$101 place payoff on Bombay Bet may not be the highest ever at the Albuquerque track, long-time horse players were not able to remember another horse

ever paying more than \$100 in the place position.

Bombay Bet was making only his third lifetime start after finishing eighth and beaten fifteen lengths in each of his last two outs. Friday jockey Rick Houghton had the four-year-old on the rail throughout the seven furlong contest. He was just off the pace as the field hit the top of the lane and actually had a short

lead in midstretch before being caught by Mahmoud's Axe.

The even money choice, Big Train Sorel, finished third. Big Train Sorel had finished second in his prior seven outings. He had an overwhelming amount of money bet on him to place and when he failed to finish second, the large payoff on Bombay Bet was created.

## Gallant Red Wing is surprise victor

Gallant Red Wing took full advantage of a slow break by top-weighted American Moon Fun to post a widening 1/3-length victory in Saturday's John Phillips Handicap at Sunland Park.

After beating Gallant Red Wing in three of four stakes races this season, American Moon Fun was backed down to the 3-2 choice to win the 400-yard John Phillips, with Gallant Red Wing the third wagering favorite behind Buy My Act.

When the gates flew open for the feature dash, Salustio Burgos shot into the lead aboard Gallant Red Wing, matching strides from the far outside post with 8-1 shot Truckle Wind, who raced strongly on the rail under Darrell Blevins.

The two horses appeared to be evenly matched as they approached the wire, but Gallant Red Wing began to move ahead with each stride and pulled away to win in a

wind-aided 19.61 seconds - the fastest 400 yards run at Sunland this season.

Truckle Wind held on for second, finishing three-quarter lengths in front of Jet Dancing, who went postward at 5-1 with veteran rider Larry Byers at the helm.

American Moon Fun raced an even seventh. Jockey Lyndell Rutherford said after the race that "the mare stepped back when they kicked the gate open."

The victory was worth \$7,485 to Albuquerque native Jerry Vernon, who owns Gallant Red Wing. Fred Danley, who trains the 6-year-old son of Gallant Jet, was pleased that his charge drew the far outside post position for the John Phillips.

"Gallant Red Wing has always been a good gate horse," Danley commented after the stakes victory. "And he got away real good today. It helped coming out of the

number ten hole, because there was a lot less chance for interference."

Regarding the season-long rivalry between Gallant Red Wing and American Moon Fun, Danley said: "It's really hard to say which is the better horse. In our races against each other it seems like the horse that gets the best break from the gate wins."

"American Moon Fun got a terrible break in this race. If she had come out of the gate better, she would have run a much different race. I'm sure. She's a nice horse, and it's a real pleasure to compete against her."

Truckle Wind collected runner-up money of \$2,745. G.R. Howell trains the gelding for Sam Henderson of Odessa, Texas. Jet Dancing's connections pocketed \$1,497 for his third-place effort. Larry Dunbar of El Paso, Texas, trains and owns the horse.

# Sunland Park Hoofbeats

DR. DONALD STROLE of Abilene, Texas, must be feeling he got a great bargain when he purchased Romas Magic for \$3,300 last summer at the All American Select Quarter Horse Yearling Sale at Ruidoso Downs. On Friday, March 7, the colt established himself the horse to beat in the \$165,000 West Texas Futurity when he turned in the fastest qualifying time among 79 entrants trying to earn a spot in the Grade II stakes race.

Romas Magic ran in the first of eight trial heats and covered the 330 yards in 17.005 seconds, the fastest time over the distance at Sunland Park this season.

Trainer J.B. Montgomery and jockey Larry Byers, who went to the winner's circle in the race, came back in the second race for a Daily Double sweep and a second qualifier for the finals. In the second race, Bedouin Prince turned in the sixth fastest time with a 17.110 seconds.

Trainer Jack Brooks also qualified two horses for the futurity with Murphys Jet Barred (17:070) and Vital Dash (17:090). Bobby Willis also had two horses win trial races, although only one qualified for the finals. La Milagrosa turned in the third fastest time of 17.035 in winning the 4th division, while Mr Kay Sykes had a 17:445 in winning the third.

Delightful Mary and Quickstep Lady tied for the 10th and last spot in the futurity field. But it didn't make much difference which one won the shake to determine who would go into the finals. Both horses are owned by Jack Evans Jr. of Allen, Texas, trained by Jerry Lazenby, ridden by Terry Layton and sired by Oh Jet Van. Delightful Mary will be in the futurity.

A STIFF TAILWIND helped establish the season's best times in three quarter horse distances over the weekend at Sunland Park. On Friday, March 7, Romas Magic was timed in 17.005 seconds over 330 yards in trials for the West Texas Futurity. On Saturday, March 8, Gallant Red Wing won the 400-yard John Phillips Handicap in 19.61 seconds. On Sunday, March 9, Viking Royale equalled the time over 400 yards, while Swoon's Mood set the mark over 440 yards with a 21.68.

AMERICAN MOON FUN and Gallant Red Wing are now neck-and-neck in races in which they have faced one another this season at Sunland Park. After six starts in races against one another each has three victories following Gallant Red Wing's win in the \$12,500 John Phillips Handicap on Saturday, March 8. American Moon Fun broke poorly in the gate and was never a factor in the race.

In the winner's circle following the handicap, Gallant Red Wing's trainer Fred Danley said "it's really hard to say which is the best horse. In our races against each other it seems that the one who gets the best break from the gate wins. American Moon Fun is a nice horse and it's a pleasure to compete against her."

SUNLAND PARK GENERAL MANAGER Rick Henson, a former race caller at Santa Fe and Delta Downs, was pressed into service at the microphone when veteran announcer Bob Dudich entered the hospital on Thursday, March 6, for tests after suffering chest pains. Henson called the races for Friday and Saturday's programs while Randy Summers, a former announcer and Director of Sales at Ruidoso Downs last summer, stepped in on Sunday.

Larry Byers, Leroy Coombs and Danny Sorenson each went to the winner's circle four times over the weekend to share Jockey of the Week honors. Byers' performance moved him into third in the standings, while Carlos Rivas took over sixth and Jimmie Hunt eighth. Eugene O'Neill still holds the lead.



## Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE—A reader who would like state government to start practicing some sharp economies instead of spending money like it's going out of style raises a good question. Why, he asks, do we need two comprehensive, and presumably expensive, budgets prepared each year? Wouldn't one do the job as well?

He's right that all this costs a lot of money. Just printing the documents that result, one 592 pages in size and the other 547 pages this year costs a lot of bucks. In point of fact, producing these two documents is the largest element in the total annual workload of both the staff of the Legislative Finance Committee and the Budget Division of the Department of Finance and Administration.

But most of the people who study state government closely will agree that this is money well spent. Maybe we wouldn't have to be quite so elaborate in the process as we presently are, but certain stages in it we could not get along without.

We have to see to it that government agencies make concrete plans for the coming year, and budgeting is one way to achieve that end.

To ask the question, "How much money do we need?" will normally move the mind to other questions, such as "What exactly do we intend to accomplish?" and "How do we propose to go about that?" Those are queries that must be repeatedly asked.

And if we didn't have the final numbers this process produces, we would never know what amounts of money the Legislature must appropriate to get the state's jobs accomplished. Without those numbers, taxation would just be something done by the seat of our pants.

But the question that initiated this discussion was more specific. Why do we need two such budgets? Wouldn't one do?

Probably not.

That's because there are two parts of government, the executive and the legislative branch, concerned in this process of appropriating and spending. The two have different reasons for existence, and so they have countervailing points of view. Allowing each to develop its own budget proposals gives us a good fix on where the two branches agree and where they disagree.

In practice, these two parts of government act somewhat like the two sides represented when a family is setting allowances for its children. The kids want the final figures to come in as high as possible, and the parents want to keep the totals within reason.

Consider those employed by government the recipients and those in lawmaking the potential givers, and you'll appreciate the difference of their views.

Maybe—just maybe—these divergent viewpoints could be blended into a single budget document in the first stages of this process, but our state's experience shows that we work best when each is developed individually and those final version emerges from serious consideration of the two.

Far be it from this writer to use the federal government as an example of everything that is bright and shiny in governmental operations, but there is some point in remarking that Washington, which for a long time operated only on an executive budget, finally switched in recent years to the same two-budget system that has worked for us for years. (As a matter of fact, the Senate Budget Committee, headed by New Mexico's Pete Domenici, just did something historic last week when it totally rejected the entire budget the White House had prepared and submitted for consideration. Here in New Mexico, we at least give the executive budget a chance, and reject only parts of it instead of the whole.)

There are lots of places where state government could and should save money, but cutting out one of these budget documents would more likely contribute to expansion rather than contraction. This doesn't seem to be the moment at which we should lighten these controls.

The writer got one of those anonymous letters dripping scorn last week. ("Why are you so anti-teacher? Didn't they teach you anything? Or was your I.Q. too low?")

Nothing new about that, but this one was notable because it bore one of those soppy sentimental stamps the post office now sells, in large letters dedicated to "LOVE."

## Editorial

A Roswell youngster killed last week in a motorcycle accident left a legacy that will enhance the quality of several lives through organ transplants. His heart, lungs, kidneys, corneas and major bones were used in transplant operations.

Although many people are aware of the gifts they can leave behind, very few New Mexicans become organ donors—even those who have expressed a wish to do so—because of a state law requiring the signature of the next of kin in addition to any other authority for organ donation left behind by the deceased.

"We have to rely on the State of Texas," said Bill Allen of the Ruidoso Valley Noon Lions Club recently. Allen, who works closely with the New Mexico Lions Eye Bank, explained that in New Mexico a donor card or donor designation on a driver's license do not ensure your becoming an organ donor after death.

Since time is of the essence on organ transplants, the clock runs out for many potential donors while survivors are located and notified.

State legislation will be required to declare a donor card or driver's license designation sufficient legal authorization for the organ donor program. Allen said the New Mexico Lions are lobbying for such legislation.

March has been named National Eye Donor Month. What better time to fill out a donor card, add the required designation to a driver's license and inform your next of kin of your wishes. To be sure your wishes will be honored, write to your state representative asking for a change in the law.

Why not give of yourself by becoming an organ donor; it will be your last chance to be generous.—fj
