Wright retains mayoral win after election recount

After two hours of dissension, deliberation, ballot counting and surprise votes, the Ruidoso Downs Precinct Board recertified the March 4 mayoral election with Carlton L. "Bones" Wright at 93

The recheck and recount was demanded by Harris and his attorney, Sam Westergren, who claimed write-in ballots for Wright were unacceptable if his nickname, "Bones," was written in lieu of his legal name or initials.

Westergren and village attorney Don Dutton disagreed loudly on interpretation of the state law regarding municipal elections.

Dutton contended votes for "Bones Wright" are valid, as they show the intent of the voters and include a first and last name.

The two attorneys addressed the precinct board, presenting their differing interpretations of the law. At one point, Ruidoso Downs Police Chief Skip Hazel stepped between the two lawyers, apparently to prevent a fight.

The original count after the March 4 election gave Wright 101 votes, which included ballots cast for "Bones" and "Bones Wright." Upon re-counting the votes Friday, the precinct board was split down the middle about accepting the nickname ballots.

Board members Alice Allison and Anna Carpenter voted not to accept eight votes for "Bones Wright." Board members Dale McCleskey and Mellie Randolph chose to accept the votes. All four voted to disallow two votes that had only the name "Bones."

After rechecking absentee ballots, the board found two write-in mayoral votes for Wright which had not been counted.

"We blew it. We didn't register them," said McCleskey.

With the two additional votes, the board certified Wright the winner with 93 votes to his credit, two disallowed votes and eight votes in question by the split board.


District Judge Richard Parsons and County Clerk Fran Siddens were present to acknowledge the recertification. Village clerk Wilma Webb said the canvassing board will meet on Monday to canvass the results.

Westergren said he and his client will evaluate the situation and decide on further action.

Dutton said he is pleased with the outcome of the recount.

State tourism director talks promotion at area meeting

heads addressed a small group at the Swiss Chalet Thursday morning. Gold also spoke at the Ruidoso Lodgers' Association's second annual spring meeting at Cree Meadows Thursday afternoon.

Gold said he sees excitement in the southern New Mexico tourism trade.

"I don't think they've even scratched the surface yet," he said.

Gold said New Mexico experienced an increase in gross receipts tax collections last year despite the drop in oil and gasoline prices. The lower gasoline prices will encourage more tourism, said Gold who predicts this summer will be a good one for Ruidoso.

Gold said the state is trying to encourage more light industries to locate here. He said 33 communities, including Ruidoso, are part of a business information program. The Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce economic development committee is eligible for cooperative funds to promote the area to industry.

In a discussion of cooperative advertising, Gold encouraged the participation of private entities with the village, which receives 34 cents on each advertising dollar spent. He challenged the lodgers to participate in such an endeavor.

The state has \$1 million in its cooperative advertising budget and \$600,000 for generic state advertising for the coming fiscal year, noted Gold.

"I'd rather count the entire \$1.6 million as cooperative funds if we can agree to cooperate," said Gold, encouraging private sector participation from lodgers, retailers and restaurateurs.

Currently the state has an \$80,000 advertising campaign in targeted cities in Texas and other states. Gold said it is the state's first multimedia program.

Gordon Thompson, state division director of economic development, discussed some of the state's major programs. One is a partnership cer-

tification program in which communities such as Ruidoso learn how to attract prospective businesses to the area. The "Buy New Mexico" program encourages local shopping, he said.

Paul Lazarus, state film commissioner, said Ruidoso is one of the locations being considered for the construction of a soundstage. He said a soundstage expert will be in the state soon and will visit the hangars at the Ruidoso Municipal Airport, a possible soundstage site.

Lazarus said the film industry brings millions of dollars to location areas, and a soundstage in the state would keep film crews here longer. He said the Southern New Mexico Film Commission is in the formation stage, as is a film foundation to raise funds to bring productions to the state.

Ruidoso is one of five communities included in a pilot videotape program, said the commissioner. Videotapes with area locations will aid in attracting producers, he said.

Mark Sani, editor of New Mexico magazine, discussed the state-owned publication. He said the magazine's goal is to promote tourism in the state and 65 percent of its subscribers live out of state.

Sani said he is working to include more material about the southern half of New Mexico. In April the magazine will begin a new series of "loop tours" of area attractions. The first, highlighting Alamogordo, will list Ruidoso as a nearby area.

Tony Martinez, division director of housing, said interest rates are coming down. He said the state has two programs to rehabilitate old houses.

The National Weather Service in Roswell has issued a travelers' advisory for snow and blowing snow above 7,500 feet for today and Tuesday, and a separate advisory for strong winds in the Ruidoso area. Library pursues strict overdue policy

Municipal Judge John Cupp has issued 30 criminal summons since the Ruidoso Public Library (RPL) implemented its new overdue books policy in January, according to head librarian Mary Lou Gooch.

"We are pursuing this (the overdue book policy) and I am having results," Gooch said.

In January the RPL Board of Directors voted to begin a new overdue books policy when Gooch informed them over \$8,000 worth of library books had not been returned to the library after a reasonable time limit.

If a RPL cardholder does not respond to overdue book notices after about two months, Gooch said she fills out a criminal complaint against the offender.

The criminal complaints are sent to Cupp who issues criminal summons and has them mailed to the overdue book offenders.

At last count five criminal summons had been answered, nine had been returned as undeliverable by the post office and sixteen were still outstanding, Gooch said.

Though only five offenders have responded to summons, Gooch said she still considered the new overdue book policy a "moderate success" because of the dollar value of the books offenders have returned.

Gooch said the five offenders turned in over \$500 worth of books. Cupp has not issued any bench warrants for people who refuse to respond to summons, but he is considering such action, Gooch said.

Gooch said she is determined to pursue the new overdue book policy because she feels every cardholder should have access to all the books in the library.

State librarians plan meeting

Over 450 university, state and public librarians will meet next April at The Inn Of The Mountain Gods for the 1987 New Mexico State Library Conference, according to Ruidoso Public Library director Mary Lou Gooch.

A special committee of state librarians and officials selected Ruidoso and The Inn Of The Mountain Gods as the location for the 1987 conference.

The 1986 conference will begin in Albuquerque on April 23.



Haddens lead Ruidoso crowd on 'Excursion in Music and Diplomacy'

Ruidoso Summer Festival, Inc. sponsors piano concert

A world of entertainment stopped in Ruidoso Sunday when The Haddens, the global diplomats of music, performed for a near-capacity crowd at the First Christian Church.

The Haddens, a duo-piano team, demonstrated their musical virtuosity by jointly playing a variety of musical selections from different times and different genres.

The Ruidoso audience heard the Haddens demonstrate their precise and elegant musicianship on compositions by jazz legend Benny Goodman as well as classical selections by Handel and Schubert.

The husband and wife team of Frances and Richard Hadden also performed their own compositions for the Ruidoso audience.

The Haddens called their show "Excursions in Music and Diplomacy," and in the second half of their performance they played Frances Haddens' "Lu Shan-Suite for Two Pianos," while narrating slides from their seven week visit to China in 1972.

In 1972 The Haddens became the first American act to play in mainland China since 1949, when Premier Chou En-Lai invited them to perform for him and the people of his country.

Richard Hadden said he and his wife were greeted by "tumultuous and enthusiastic crowds" wherever they played in China because the Chinese people seemed to be "starving for Western entertainment."

Frances Hadden, who was born and raised in mainland China before World War II, said Chou En-Lai seemed to remember her from her childhood.

Her parents were Episcopalian missionaries in China.

Frances Hadden said Chou En-Lai and her father, Bishop Logan H. Roots, had many philosophical discussions in pre-World War II China. They also joined forces to defend the Chinese people against Japanese invasions which began in 1938, Frances Hadden said.

She believes Chou En-Lai invited The Haddens to perform for him, in part, as a way to show them the respect he had felt for her father, who was no longer living by 1972.

The Haddens, who enjoy the media referring to them as "musical diplomats," say their true message is "we must all learn to communicate with each other no matter the cultural, linguistic, or ideological differences."

The Haddens, who travel (along with their pianos) in a motor home, said they like to stay in a place they are visiting long enough to "get a feeling" for the people and area where they perform.

Frances Hadden said her first impression of Ruidoso was that it was "just gorgeous."

The Haddens, who perform most of the year, have a home in Mackinac Island, Michigan.

Their mobile-home was specially designed to carry, load and unload their baby-grand pianos.

The Ruidoso Fire Department volunteered to load and unload The Haddens' pianos and Richard Hadden said he was "most pleased" to have their assistance.


Mary Margaret Petty, a member of the board of directors of the Ruidoso Summer Festival, Inc., said she was very happy with the turnout for The Haddens concert.

Ruidoso Lodgers' Committee freezes funds for remainder of fiscal year

The Ruidoso Lodgers' Tax Committee (LTC) voted to freeze contingency funds for the remainder of this fiscal year at its regular meeting Wednesday.

Although they could not agree on a figure, committee members discussed a shortfall in tax collections this year. LTC treasurer Don Parsons said January collections are down 46 percent from last year. Committee member Rod Adamson said collections are down by eight percent—approximately \$14,000—for this fiscal year so far.

"That wipes out our contingency fund," said acting chairman Bill Rawlins. LTC member Phil Hamilton

estimated a \$35,000 shortfall for the 1985-86 fiscal year as a "pretty realistic figure."

Hamilton advised Bill Hirschfeld of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce advertising committee that the summer campaign budget may have to be cut.

"The bottom line is—don't commit to any more advertising or we'll be in deficit spending," said Hamilton.



Hirschfeld agreed to hold \$15,000 back from the summer campaign until April or May, when more definitive figures will be available. If the cut becomes permanent, it will not affect the cooperative program with the village and the

Ruidoso Downs Race Track.

In other business, LTC: —Refused funds for Nancy Radziewicz to attend a trade show in Houston, Texas. Radziewicz will attend shows in Dallas and San Antonio with funds already collected from LTC and chamber members.

—Heard Charlotte Jarratt request funds to promote two "volksmarches" to take place in Ruidoso. Although LTC could not give contingency funds for the spring walk, members agreed to consider an October "volksmarch" in planning next fiscal year's budget.

—Set a budget workshop for 1 p.m. Tuesday, March 24.







Look up—Halley's comet lights the sky

To get the best view of Halley's comet, Ruidoso residents should set their alarms for 5 a.m. or earlier, said Dr. Herbert Beebe Monday.

Beebe, head of the Department of Astronomy at New Mexico State University, was in the village to tell the Ruidoso Federated Women's Club all about comets, with an emphasis on the Comet Halley (name some astronomers prefer).

Although the Comet Halley (rhymes with valley) is getting a lot of good press, with rave reviews from television commentators on its "spectacular" appearance, Beebe said it is far less spectacular than some other comets that have been documented.

Nevertheless, thanks to Edmund Halley's research which identified the regular recurrence of the comet, Halley has been long awaited, widely celebrated and closely studied on its 1985-86 journey through the skies.

Halley, who was a contemporary of Sir Isaac Newton, was able to calculate the comet's orbit using Newton's law.

The comet is expected to make its final close approach to Earth around April 11.

However, Beebe said Comet Halley may not be the most visible on April 11, because it will be in close relation to the sun.

Now is a good time to have a look at the comet, said Beebe. He said it should be visible through binoculars in the early morning hours in the southeastern sky near the constellation Sagittarius, which Beebe said looks most like a teapot.

"You've got to work at it," said Beebe. He said to locate Sagittarius and then move the binoculars to the left and down a little.

"Halley's comet is not going to last forever," remarked Beebe. "Maybe another 100,000 years or so," he added.

But Beebe said a short period of time is defined by astronomers as less than human history, while a long period is considered as a span longer than human history.

Beebe said the nucleus of any comet is made up of gases that are in constant motion, with the comet Halley's nucleus about the size of the village of Manhattan.

He demonstrated the kinds of action that might be occurring in the nucleus of a comet by pouring water over dry ice.

Beebe reminded the club that the nucleus of a comet is made out of ordinary things—such as the carbon

dioxide that makes up dry ice, and ordinary water.

Since the Comet Halley's next appearance is expected in the year 2061, now's the time to check it out.

"The next couple of weeks are pretty damned good," said Beebe.



State lawmakers apparently believe learning experiences are most beneficial when confined to the traditional classroom.

As a part of the educational reform package passed this session, legislators saw fit to mandate, in detail, how much time students from kindergarten through high school will spend in the classroom studying the basics.

Although some parts of the bill are still not clear to school administrators, it looks like schools may be required to schedule most extra-curricular activities outside of school hours—preferably on Friday evening, Saturdays and holidays.

While an actual definition for "class time" is not in the bill, the strictest interpretation might constrain teachers from some activities that look to some of us very much like learning opportunities.

More than 300 students participated for a whole schoolday in the recent Science Fair. It looked like they had learned a lot.

Many students demonstrated their knowledge recently in the Ruidoso and the County Math and Science Bowls—both taking up the major part of a schoolday. It looked like education at its best.

Athletics, musical programs, DECA, OEA, field trips and the like may be greatly limited with new daily requirements of time to be applied to certain subjects.

Can learning really be limited to the classroom? How about assigning our legislators to some classtime before turning them loose on the educational system?—fj

Mr. Cave was kind enough to put it in writing for me, giving the Geological reasons therefore, and they are as sound as our dollar used to be. You may rest assured that our friends in the PVACD will be the last to bring up that issue, for if they did, we would all be home free, and no legal entrapment for 25 years.

One has only to study the Water Manual put out by our Institute at New Mexico State University entitled the "Tenth Annual Water Conference" with the theme The Rio Pecos Watershed, to understand what is taking place in our area, and understand the true facts regarding the predicament the PVACD has gotten itself into. This Manual was published in 1965. When a home is built in our recreational area, and the lot is cleaned up, 30 to 55 percent more runoff occurs, so says the Manual of 1965. We feel that difference down the valley, along with the tremendous impact made by the Lake at the Inn of the Mt. Gods. It is wonderful!

SANTA FE—"WANTED: To run for high government office in Sunbelt state, men and women who know how to create wealth, not merely distribute it."

If somebody will tell this writer where to insert that ad, he'll pick up the tab for running it.

Just at this point in New Mexico's history, that's what we need at the top in our government—the kind of people who grasp the basic ideas of capitalism and understand how to make it work. That system, after all, with all its faults (like the fact that its roots grow in the earth of greed), has an attractive side effect. While capitalists grow richer, even to an unseemly degree, other people at least have jobs, and general prosperity is generated.

What we suffer from in our state is too many would-be big shots who salivate at the thought of distributing wealth but haven't an inkling of how to go about creating it.

In a nutshell, the reason Toney Anaya ran for office was so he could pass the money around. He'd say it was so he "could achieve certain social goals," but when looked at closely, the heart of every one of his personally sponsored programs turns out to involve an increase in

government spending.

Handing out bucks takes little real ability—and we've had governors who could do it like nobody's business. When are we going to get one who can teach the state how to make, instead of spending, them?

Just to choose one example, isn't it time we had a chief executive who is philosophically deep enough to at least question whether the "help" our agencies go on giving the poor is actually helping them? It's easy to perpetuate a "culture of welfare," but is it morally acceptable to do so?

In practice, the leaders of our Legislature, who have the power to counterbalance a governor's weaknesses, act as though they are equally ambivalent about the engine that makes the state's economy run. In their three-piece suits, they may look like thoroughgoing capitalists, but they assemble to pass laws and spend money in ways that would warm the heart of a Eurosocialist. Whenever they come to Santa Fe, the same tired old programs that didn't hack it in the War on Poverty get re-funded, usually at higher levels than last year. But in New Mexico, those who get tapped to pay the bills are not capitalists,

with great concentrations of wealth at their disposal; we don't have many of those. They are the ordinary folks whose brows are furrowed about how they're going to make the next mortgage payment; of those, we have great numbers.

So when do we get the chance to try out some leaders who can honestly say, "I took this job, not to show my fellow citizens how to spend what little wealth our poor state has, but how we can come together to generate some more?"

Where do we find, so we can put them into office, the men and women who are thoroughly dedicated to creation of wealth, not just to passing out the last few bucks that may be left in the pot?

Give us some unabashed capitalists, of the sort who can make that system work in ways other than the dog-eat-dog, unfettered manner of the nineteenth century. In our state, at just this time, "capitalism" should not be a dirty word; it's what we desperately need more of. ***

As a kind of footnote to the above, it might be worth noting that it's time to look closely at the record of what we call (this year) the Department of Economic Development and Tourism. How much capital formation has this operation, or any of its predecessors, ever really generated? It's hard to say, but it does not appear to have been much.

Maybe the reason for that is the same one suggested above. Somehow it turns out, year after year, that those named to run the various divisions in this department are usually the kind of "promoters" whose track records clearly indicate they know all about spending other people's money but little about bringing it into places where it has not been before.

Yet, year after year, those in charge of New Mexico's government go on disbursing funds for this purpose, apparently more because of habit than because of demonstrated performance.

That's not the kind of thing a true capitalist, if we had one in charge, would continue to allow happening.

World Wide Saint Patrick's Day


