
Airport Commission will meet today

The Sierra Blanca Airport Commission cancelled a special meeting scheduled for 1:30 p.m. last Thursday, and will discuss items scheduled for that meeting during a regular commission meeting at 1:30 p.m. today (Thursday), March 20.

Today's meeting will take place at the Lincoln County Sub-office in Ruidoso.

Items for discussion will include the joint powers agreement among the five governmental agencies on the commission, a report on the environmental assessment, a funding status report, and a report from the Ruidoso Airport Liaison Committee, according to Fred Heckman, commission chairman.

Ruidoso, Sunland tracks are for sale; no agreement yet, track officials say

Ruidoso Downs Racetrack and Sunland Park race track are for sale, but negotiations for sale of the two facilities are still under way, members of the Ruidoso-Sunland, Inc. Board of Directors confirmed Wednesday.

"Yes, they're both for sale at some price," Board President A.D. Bowen told The News. But he noted that no agreements have been made with any of those considering purchase of the tracks.

Bowen emphasized that Ruidoso Downs Racetrack will open this summer as planned.

"Ruidoso's going to open and be OK," Bowen said. "We're looking forward to a good season."

Bowen confirmed that longtime horseman R.D. Hubbard is among those considering purchase of the

tracks, but Bowen said, to his knowledge, no sale agreement had been reached.

"He is one of several people who have looked at it," Bowen said. The board president said any definite plans for sale of the track would be made public through a press conference. He said an actual sale will be very involved and require several steps to complete.

Bowen refuted statements contained in a story in The El Paso Herald-Post this week which name Hubbard as the negotiated purchaser of the tracks for \$15.2 million.

"Hubbard is one of the more active ones right now but we certainly haven't reached an agreement," Bowen said.

Another board member, who wished not to be named, also said the tracks are for sale but no agreement for purchase has yet been reached.

Efforts to reach Ruidoso-Sunland, Inc. general manager H.

Rick Henson for comment Wednesday and Thursday were unsuccessful.

Jess Burner, past president of the board of directors of Ruidoso-Sunland, Inc., said from his El Paso home Wednesday night the story in The El Paso Herald-Post was not true in his opinion.

"They don't have the sale price right, and if they don't have that right, what the hell makes you think the story is right," Burner said.

However, when asked for further comments, Burner said he had heard negotiations might be taking place with Hubbard.

"As far as I am concerned, nothing is for sale, but I don't really have anything to do with the track anymore either," Burner said.

"I'll tell you this, if R.D. Hubbard buys that track in Ruidoso, the people should be jumping for joy, and not panicking, because that man will sink a wad of money into anything he buys," Burner said.

A track official, who asked not to

be identified, said it would not be "incorrect" to say negotiations for the sale of the tracks are taking place.

The track official said he had learned that the tracks' attorneys and some of Hubbard's attorneys had been negotiating on the sale of the tracks, but information had yet to be released to anyone involved with the tracks to the best of his knowledge.

Both Burner and the track official said there had been negotiations concerning the sale of the tracks, but Hubbard was not necessarily the only person interested in purchasing Sunland Park and Ruidoso Downs.

Hubbard was unavailable for comment.

"The main concern is getting the track open," Bowen said of Ruidoso Downs. "Ruidoso is going to open and that's what the community is interested in."

P&Z handles several development plans

The Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) Monday approved plans paving the way for four major projects to begin soon in Ruidoso.

During a regular meeting, members reviewed and approved plans for a clubhouse and indoor pool for Tiara Del Sol Condominiums, a go-cart track and outdoor skating rink for Funtrackers, Inc., the second phase of The Springs Condominiums and phase two of Sierra Mall.

Steve Horn of Tiara Del Sol displayed plans for a two-story clubhouse to be built on concrete piers to accommodate the terrain on the proposed location at Lot 11, Block 1, Camelot Mountain Condominiums.

In approving the clubhouse and indoor pool plans, P&Z also approved a replat on the unplatted portion of the land.

Horn said Tiara Del Sol will move utility lines under the clubhouse site at company expense and will comply with a number of recommendations made by the village Building Department.

Ray Eidson of Funtrackers, Inc. got the go-ahead on a proposed recreational project on Lots 82-97 of Skyland Addition at the site where a go-cart track has operated in the past.

Eidson, who told of his plans in a previous P&Z meeting, answered questions posed by commissioners during that meeting. He reported that he won't need a permit from the U.S. Corps of Engineers to implement plans effecting the Rio Ruidoso.

He explained how go-carts and gasoline will be stored and assured commissioners of the safety of his development.

Architect Al McChesney was on hand with large pictures and artist's renderings of The Springs Condominiums, and explained that in spite of increased density in phase two, the project still complies

with village regulations. P&Z previously approved the entire project, and Monday the commission approved minor changes presented in phase two.

The other large project reviewed and approved Monday was the second phase of the Sierra Mall.

Wayne Dacy of C.S.D., Inc. reported the mall will be lengthened and a second front entrance added north of Kelley's restaurant.

Dacy said he plans to pave the remainder of the Sierra Mall parking lot "as soon as feasible," and will also comply with a state requirement to add an acceleration/deceleration lane on Mechem, which is also State Highway 37.

After recalling previous problems with "sloughing backfill and such" behind True Value Hardware, commissioners were shown photographs indicating those problems have been solved.

"I'm very pleased to see that all has been done," said commissioner Don Shaw.

Dacy also revealed plans to change the use of the Sierra-Sinema from a movie theater to a nightclub. He said he'll pour a concrete slab to level the floor, remove interior walls and build a couple of bars in the building.

Commissioners approved the change in use, although it was learned during the meeting that P&Z approval is unnecessary since the proposed use fits the area's zoning.

Much of Monday's meeting was spent in considering a request by Ralph Bellon of Buck's All American Ford for a sign ordinance variance.

Commissioners recalled two temporary variances amounting to nearly 18 months were previously granted on the excess signage. The

second of those variances expires March 30, noted Paul Davis, village enforcement officer.

Although the business is entitled to just 75,392 square feet of signage according to the sign ordinance formula, Buck's All American Ford has in place 131 square feet of signage, not counting the many 12-square-foot flags, which are also classified as signs.

Bellon said the 73-square-foot pole-mounted sign in front of the building is required by the Ford Motor Company in order to retain the dealership, and the 45-square-foot sign mounted on the building is a State of New Mexico requirement.

Commissioners recalled conversations when the first 12-month variance was granted about 18 months ago in which a Ford Motor Company representative said the dealership would be in a new facility within a year.

"It's taking a little time," said Bellon of negotiations to acquire a new building.

"It's just been one delay after another," said commission chairman Mike Callaghan. "Out of fairness to other businesses, it (sign ordinance) should be enforced," he added.

Bellon wondered if taking down the over 100-feet of flags and perhaps part of the building-mounted sign would satisfy the commission. He also suggested a compromise in which the variance would be granted for six months instead of a year.

But commissioners didn't favor those concessions.

"We have a city ordinance and we have a responsibility to other businesses in town," said P&Z

Board fails to get quorum

The Appeals Board, Abatement of Dangerous Buildings for the Village of Ruidoso met for a very short time Thursday.

With just two members present, Bill Carrigan and Bill Cornelius, the board was unable to transact any business at the regularly scheduled meeting.

Jimmy Neeley reported the contract was awarded on demolishing buildings already deemed unsafe by the commission. He said D&J Service Company was the successful bidder.

Absent from Thursday's meeting were members Noel Bowley, Lori Griffin and Sue Taylor.

Two speak for economic diversity in village

"This is an important time for Ruidoso," said Buddy Bundick Tuesday.

Bundick, general manager for Texas-New Mexico Power Company and a member of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors, told Ruidoso

Altrusa of the formation of a Chamber of Commerce task force to identify and attract to the area major revenue producing entities from the public or private sector.

Also Tuesday, former Ruidoso Village Councillor Rick Evans addressed the Ruidoso Rotary Club, updating them, too, of the progress of the chamber Economic Development Task Force.

"We've got to diversify our economy ... we've got to save our businesses," said Bundick after relating the economic woes of Ruidoso's major tourist markets

that have had a negative impact on the local economy.

The task force is working to obtain a private university or training school on the site of the present Ruidoso Municipal Airport, the two reported.

They presented figures indicating an economic impact of millions of dollars to the area if efforts to gain a university or college are successful.

Besides the proposed institution's operating budget and faculty and staff salaries, Bundick and Evans presented figures on impacts from local contracting services, cleaning supplies, paper goods and student expenditures for personal supplies, clothing, entertainment, food and housing.

Evans reported that the economic benefit from an educational institution here could reach \$50 to \$100 million per year. He said

such economic activity would justify costs to the village of locating a school here (such as purchase of the land) through increased gross receipts tax collections alone.

Evans said he believes the state government and the Federal Aviation Administration will support the educational institute concept. He pointed out that since the real estate market is "soft" now, the FAA probably is not going to insist all the airport land is sold now. Evans said the most important step to be taken before the concept has a chance of success is that a "political decision" must be made.

Evans said if the current village council decides to support the idea, they will receive support from the FAA and state.

Evans said the council has to come up with a plan and must allow

time and flexibility to the task force if the concept is to succeed.

Bundick expressed his enthusiasm for the project.

"We pull tourists from West Texas—why not pull students from West Texas," said Bundick, who is optimistic that Ruidoso can succeed in locating some kind of educational facility in the area.

"The fact is there are more new universities going in every year than close," said Bundick. "You can't succeed unless you try," he added.

Evans invited Rotary members and anyone else in the community who wants to join the task force.

"We can have prosperity, we can have a diversified economy," Evans said. "If we don't take the initiative today and start working, we'll have nothing."

Democrats hear candidates speak

The Lincoln County Democratic Party met Saturday, and the Lincoln County Democratic Women met Tuesday to hear from primary candidates and begin planning strategy for November's general election.

Gary Mitchell, county chairman, appointed Bill Jarratt party treasurer during the Saturday meeting.

Mitchell encouraged Democrats to run for county and state offices and to work for the candidates already announced, before giving the candidates at the meeting an opportunity to speak.

"I feel that I do have a good knowledge of the county and its problems," said Ralph Dunlap, candidate for county commissioner District 1. Dunlap said his 30 years as county agent acquainted him with Lincoln County.

Dub Williams will oppose Dunlap in the Democratic Primary. Although he was not at Saturday's meeting, he spoke briefly Tuesday.

"I am a genetic Democrat from Southern Louisiana," said Williams, a retired Ruidoso school teacher. He said he is ready to serve the people of Lincoln County.

John Hightower, a former member of the Lincoln County Commission, is apparently unopposed for the Democratic commissioner nomination in District 4.

"If I get elected you can expect about the same out of me you got

before," said Hightower Saturday. "If you didn't like what I did then, don't vote for me," he added.

Two candidates for the District 3 slot on the commission spoke to the assembled group.

Jim Woodridge, a New Mexico native, pledged to educate himself on county issues and spend the time required to do a good job.

"I know I'll do a good job for you and the county," said Woodridge.

Jerry Shaw, a member of the Ruidoso Village Council, also a candidate for commissioner from District 3, assured her fellow Democrats of the propriety of holding both jobs.

"My main reason for running is to help bring unity between the two governing bodies," said Shaw.

Democratic incumbent Jackie Martin, running for a second term as Probate Judge, will be opposed in the primary by former Ruidoso Mayor George White.

Unable to attend the Saturday meeting, Martin was present Tuesday and asked members to consider her record of service.

"My interest is to serve the public and serve it well," said White Saturday. He listed his educational qualifications for the office.

"I'll run hard against the Republicans," noted White.

Carrizozo Magistrate Judge S.M. Ortiz is apparently unopposed in his bid for re-election.

"I've been in this game for several years ... since 1949 ... and all that time I've had to fight Republicans," said Ortiz.

"I shall continue to give you justice and protection," remarked Ortiz.

Barbara Langley of Carrizozo announced Tuesday that she is a candidate for Lincoln County Treasurer.

"I can handle the office," said Langley, who told of six years service in the County Courthouse.

Bill Elliott, chairman of the Lincoln County Commissioners, recalled serious problems with the current county treasurer involving endangering over a million dollars in county funds. He said it is "vital" to elect Langley to take over that office.

Jim Nesmith, Democratic candidate for county sheriff, told Democrats Saturday of his 20 years in law enforcement. He said he is retired from the Ruidoso Police Department and is able to handle the job he is seeking.

"I'm the man who took slot machines out of Ruidoso," said Nesmith.

Mitchell called Nesmith, who apparently has no opponent in the primary election, a "fine law officer."

Both Mitchell and Coleta Elliott, president of LCDW, encouraged Democrats to seek candidates for the remaining county offices.

Workshop deals with cancer issues

The Lincoln County unit of the American Cancer Society (ACS) and Home Health Services of Lincoln County are co-sponsoring an eight-week education and support workshop for cancer patients and their families.

Mary Heller, a nurse practitioner at Dr. Arlene Brown's office, and Geri Collins, a registered nurse with Home Health Services of Lincoln County, are co-facilitators for the special seminar which is part of a national program developed by the ACS called "I Can Cope."

The "I Can Cope" program is designed to help cancer patients and their families deal with cancer-related issues.

The workshop is scheduled to begin Monday, April 7, and participants will meet every consecutive Monday for a total of eight

weeks. Workshops will be conducted on Monday's from 7 to 9 p.m. at Dr. Brown's office in The Sierra Professional Building.

The "I Can Cope" education and support workshop is free to interested persons, but registration is required for all participants.

Only adults are allowed to attend the ACS workshops.

However, parents of children with cancer, or people who live in Lincoln County but have relatives or friends with cancer in another part of the country, are welcome to register for the workshop.

A different topic will be discussed each week.

Collins said some of the topics scheduled for discussion are side-effects of cancer treatment, family adjustment to cancer, cancer pa-

tient self-esteem, physical fitness for cancer patients, cancer patients and proper nutrition and pain management for cancer patients.

Collins was trained to facilitate an "I Can Cope" program at a special training workshop that was offered by the ACS to interested medical personnel in the Southwest last October in Ruidoso.

Over 40 professionals in various medical fields attended the conference, Collins said.

Dr. Brown's office will only take messages related to the ACS and Home Health Services workshop, however someone associated with the "I Can Cope" program will be in touch with interested callers within 24 hours, Collins said.

member Martin Rose.

Shaw's suggestion to table the request until the P&Z meeting of April 21, passed unanimously after he instructed Bellon to appear at that meeting with square-footage figures and a plan to bring his signs nearer village regulations.

After hearing an annexation report from commissioner Melody Vuichich, P&Z voted to recommend the establishment of a boundary commission. Vuichich said state law requires that members of the commission: include at least one attorney; be from three different counties; and that no more than two be from the same political party.

The commission endorsed the names Vuichich suggested for consideration by the Ruidoso Village Council: Ron Harris, a Lincoln County attorney; Robert Hays from Otero County; and Malcolm Burdett of Dona Ana County.

"Basically the individuals are pro-growth, but they feel utilities must be provided," said Vuichich, who added establishing the commission will be "setting in place the mechanism for annexation."

If the mayor approves the recommendations, the names must then be submitted to the governor, said Vuichich.

In other business Monday the commission:

—Approved a new commercial building as an annex to the Covered

Wagon Curio Annex for Ralph and Marion Treat.

—Approved a replat of Lots 10, 11, 12A, Cochran Subdivision for J.B. Cochran and Ruidoso State Bank.

—Approved a replat of Lot H-1, Block D, Singing Pines for T.E. Arrington.

—Approved a replat of Lot 2B and a part of Lot 3, C.A. Eiland Tract for C.S.D., Inc.

—Discussed whether bed and breakfast businesses are limited under the current zoning ordinance to commercial areas, and told Barbara DiPaolo that requests to locate them in other parts of the village will be addressed on a case-by-case basis.

—Heard recommendations from Jimmy Neeley, village building inspector, on bonding regulations and the possibility of requiring an architect's rendering including landscaping plans on proposed commercial developments.

—Discussed requiring an improvements survey on replats.

—Heard that public hearings on the proposed comprehensive master plan and zoning ordinance will begin at 3 p.m. Thursday, April 10, at Village Hall. The 3 p.m. meeting will be on the master plan and a 6:30 p.m. meeting that day will cover zoning proposals. Members discussed the importance of public participation in those hearings.

State seeks proposals for Moon Mountain

State Land Commissioner Jim Baca is asking professional consulting firms to submit proposals for preparation of a land-use master plan for development of about 630 acres of state trust land near Ruidoso.

The land, about a mile east of Midtown Ruidoso, includes all of Moon Mountain and is held in trust for New Mexico State University.

The Moon Mountain tract is bounded by village land on the west and the north, and by county and U.S. Forest Service land on the south and east, according to Paul Davis, village Planning and Zoning enforcement officer. He said one corner of the state land is bordered by Ruidoso High School land.

"Right now we're at square one," said John Arnold, assistant land commissioner, in a telephone interview Wednesday.

He welcomed that requests for proposals on the preparation of a land-use master plan for the acreage will be mailed to consulting firms throughout New Mexico. Other firms may submit proposals, according to Baca.

"We haven't mailed anything out yet," said Arnold. He said Land Office projections call for a four-month study of the optimum use of the land.

"Creating a land-use master plan for the potentially valuable but under-utilized Moon Mountain property will both provide sound planning

for the timely development of the Ruidoso area and ensure increased revenues for New Mexico State," said Baca in a prepared statement.

"This is the second master plan we've sought for development of state trust land and I am convinced such plans increase the value of the land," he added.

Although state lands held in trust are usually not sold, Arnold said the Land Office has not ruled that out.

"We might consider selling part—say 50 acres to act as an anchor for the rest of the land," said Arnold. He said the buyer would be constrained by restrictive covenants and the land-use master plan the Land Office eventually adopts.

Another option for development is a long-term lease, said Arnold.

"We're interested in getting top-dollar value for the land and quality development," said Arnold. He envisions a development with some housing, some business and plenty of open space to accommodate the land's topography.

The State Land Office has scheduled a briefing for interested parties at 10 a.m. Wednesday, April 2, in Morgan Hall in Santa Fe. Arnold said further information may be obtained by contacting Pleas Glenn, director of the Planning and Commercial Leasing Division of the State Land Office at 827-5760.

DECA hopes for more wins

When most of the current Ruidoso High School (RHS) Distributive Education Clubs of America (DECA) members were entering kindergarten about 12 years ago, distributive education teacher Eddie Parker became the RHS DECA sponsor.

By the time most of the current DECA members were entering the fourth grade, the RHS DECA program had become one of the strongest in America.

Parker said his students' formula for success has always been to "work harder" than the other DECA groups.

And the 1986 RHS DECA members have not let the past tradition of DECA excellence at RHS fade.

At the National DECA Career Development Conference from April 22-27 in Atlanta, Georgia, RHS will have the largest DECA delegation from New Mexico.

Seventeen RHS students qualified at the state DECA convention in Albuquerque earlier this month for the national DECA convention. RHS DECA members will select one more DECA student to represent the local chapter in the Pepsi Learn and Earn Project at the Atlanta conference and competition.

The Ruidoso DECA chapter has placed their Pepsi Learn and Earn Project, a project which must demonstrate the ideals of American enterprise, in the top eight in the nation for the past nine years, according to Parker.

The National Pepsi Learn and Earn winners will receive Pepsi Inc. stock as part of their cash prize, Parker said.

Parker said the 18 students that will represent DECA at the national competition have a good chance of gaining national recognition for RHS.

Parker said the members in the community who sponsor or help support the RHS DECA chapter deserve a great deal of the credit for the club's continued success.

Parker said the present RHS DECA members will try to uphold the tradition of excellence that has gained RHS recognition for the past nine years at national DECA conferences.

DECA students who place at least third in their category of competition at the state convention are eligible for the national DECA convention.

Alcorn is dead at 73

Milton Rorex Alcorn kept himself deeply involved in local events, and throughout his recent campaign for the Ruidoso Village Council he talked of his concern for the people and the future of this community.

Alcorn died Monday in the Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Hospital. He was 73.

Alcorn and his wife, Barbara, moved to Ruidoso in 1978 upon his retirement from Boy Scouts of America. Although retired from a 32-year career as a professional scout, Alcorn continued to be involved in civic and governmental activities until his death.

When he resigned several months ago from the Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission and the Extraterritorial Zoning Commission after serving on those two planning bodies for three years, it was so that he could become a candidate for the Ruidoso Village Council.

"I think we have some great, wonderful people here," said Alcorn during a candidate forum before the election on March 4.

Last year during a special ceremony in Roswell Alcorn was honored for 60 years of service to the Boy Scouts of America.

Alcorn was past president of the Golden Age Club and Neighborhood Watch, and a past board member of the Police Athletic League.

Alcorn was born November 25, 1912, in Little Rock, Arkansas. He was married to the former Barbara L. Munster on July 20, 1948. Alcorn was a veteran of the U.S. Navy.

Besides his wife, Barbara, Alcorn is survived by two sons, James Martin Alcorn, M.D., of Bloomington, Illinois; Milton Rorex Alcorn Jr., of Dallas, Texas; and a daughter, Victoria Sally Alcorn Trujeque of Farmington, Michigan. He also is survived by a grandson, Jason Alcorn of Miami, Florida.

Survivors include sisters Marion Alcorn and Mrs. E.G. Burden, both of Dallas, Texas; and Mrs. Edell Brown of Houston, Texas. He is survived by a brother, Rex Alcorn, of Roswell.

Alcorn was preceded in death by his parents, Ezra Milton and Minnie Evelyn Alcorn; and three sisters—Maude, Mildred and Frances Alcorn.



A Village of Ruidoso pickup was involved in a one-car accident Monday at Del Norte and Vanado drives, according to a State Police report.





Editorial

As a tourist area, we must make every effort to attract people here, especially to interesting events and happenings.

An excellent way to spread the word is the Sundial calendar of state events in each month's New Mexico Magazine.

Entries in the calendar are free and a magazine spokesperson says they'll use about as much as they can get of events that are of interest to out-of-staters as well as locals, and open to the public.

In a magazine that circulates to 91,000 readers, mostly residents of the Southwest, publicizing of Ruidoso events is especially vital.

A quick look at the past year shows a total of 13 entries under the "Ruidoso" heading. Some of those appeared in the same months, and nothing was said about Ruidoso in five of the past 12 issues of the magazine.

Compared to Taos, a "rival" tourist area, we didn't fare too well. That community managed to announce 87 events that were scheduled in their town!

Ruidoso Chamber of Commerce Director John Jeffers says he'll contact the magazine about anything he finds out about, but many times groups' events are not organized far enough in advance to meet the magazine's two-and-a-half-month in advance deadline.

But Taos manages to organize their events for enough in advance. If we expect to compete with Taos and other rival resort areas—particularly for the attention of 91,000 New Mexico Magazine readers—we'd better get organized.

Otherwise, at least 91,000 people are finding out most months that almost nothing happens in Ruidoso. How can we expect them to visit here?—DJP

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Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE—About all lieutenant governor candidates contribute to New Mexico political campaigns is a lot of confusion.

Each runs independently in the party primary, and is presumably chosen on the basis of his or her individual merits, as contrasted only with those of others running for the same office in the same primary.

But immediately upon completion of the vote canvass in each LG race, the person chosen is irrevocably joined in a strange kind of matrimony to the party's candidate for governor. The two must run together as an entry even if the only relationship they have managed to achieve in life is one of mutual antipathy.

Under such a system, any party's gubernatorial candidate may be faced with the problem of running with a person who has little to contribute to the contest. Or, in the alternative, the minor member of the two-person team could turn out to be the pair's real vote-getter. Either way, the person at the top of the ticket has no choice in the matter and must play whatever hand fate deals him or her in the matter.

Just as an example, take the problem in this regard New Mexico Republicans face this year.

Jack Stahl, Albuquerque realtor and state Senator, is a lieutenant governor candidate. If he should be

chosen to run with Joe Mercer, who is also from Albuquerque, the GOP ends up with a Big Town ticket not likely to be entirely palatable to voters whose part of the state might suffer sharp neglect if the urbanites pick up all the marbles.

On the other hand, it's possible that Hoyt Pattison of Clovis could end up as lieutenant governor candidate, running with Colin McMillan from Roswell. That combination would almost certainly be stigmatized by Democrats as too representative of the East Side mentality to be sympathetic to the North or Albuquerque.

Either way, the party loses. Undoubtedly, Marge Chambers, running for the LG slot from Los Alamos, will say she'd make the perfect half of the duo with any of the top candidates on the Republican side. But since the two get selected separately, the ordinary voter doesn't normally choose along such rigorously logical lines.

At the national level, presidential candidates can, because of the method used to choose their running mates, try for some species of "balance" on the ticket. Not so here—and this year, when Republicans smell a real chance at reclaiming the Roundhouse for the first time in 16 years, that fact could end up making a great deal of difference.

Haddens' colorful background shines in performances

When the small mobile home from Mackinac Island, Michigan, pulled into the First Christian Church parking lot, chugging and choking from the weight of two baby-grand pianos, it seemed hard to believe its two inhabitants had at one time or another entertained people all over the world.

But out stepped Frances and Richard Hadden, the husband and wife team that have performed as The Haddens for over 40 years. They bill themselves as the "diplomats of music" or as an unusual "duo-piano" team, but their personal history is the essence of entertainment.

Richard Hadden said he was an Ivy leaguer when the Japanese invaded Pearl Harbor.

He had graduated from Rutgers (where he wrote the school fight song—still played to date) and attended Princeton to partake in the rich musical and theatrical opportunities that Princeton was known for before World War II.

Frances Hadden had a very different background.

She was born Frances Roots in Hankow, China (in central mainland China). She lived in Hankow with her parents, who were Episcopalian missionaries, until her early adult years.

Her father, Bishop Logan Roots, knew and often exchanged points of view with both Chou En-lai and Chiang Kai-shek, Frances Hadden said.

But the Japanese invasions of mainland China before the invasion of Pearl Harbor forced her back to the United States.

She then went to visit her oldest brother at Princeton and was introduced to Richard Hadden.

They discussed musical composition and played the piano for and with each other (the beginning of their duo-piano act) and decided to become a composing and musical entertainment team.

They haven't been apart since.

The U.S. government asked them to join the World War II Civil Defense effort in America, and they toured the country with a musical review called, "You Can Defend America," the Haddens said.

Many of the performers in their troupe went on to some degree of Hollywood and radio stardom, according to the Haddens.

The Haddens were the first American entertainers to perform in England after World War II.

They said they can still remember starring in the play "The Forgotten Factor" in England, and looking out on a "sea of rubble" while they performed.

"Somehow world leaders found out that we, an American group

of performers, gave a morally uplifting act without being preachy," Richard Hadden said.

The Haddens have performed all over the world at the personal request of many heads of state, the Haddens said.

The Haddens said they played before Chou En-lai, Chiang Kai-shek, Nehru, Richard Nixon, and 14 other heads of state.

The couple, who were married in Switzerland after World War II, are both in their 70s.

They have slowed down in their world travels, but they still perform in America and Canada for most of the year, every year.

Last Sunday's performance for The Ruidoso Summer Festival, Inc., at First Christian Church, was the last of their winter tour, the Haddens said.

They are headed back to Mackinac Island "to relax," they said.

Frances Hadden will "relax" by composing and working on a book about her childhood experiences in mainland China.

Richard Hadden will "relax" by composing and serving as manager for The Haddens and several other entertainers.

"We communicate by performing, and we love performing. We just don't know any other way to live," Richard Hadden said.
