Ruidoso Downs

Some horsemen are here, some await track's finish

Horsemen began arriving Monday at Ruidoso Downs Race Track, and as of Wednesday about 100 horses were in residence, according to Rick Henson, general manager. "They'll just be trickling in," said Henson, who said some trainers may be waiting for the two newly constructed racing surfaces to be open for workouts before bringing horses to the stalls. Henson said horses will begin workouts on the racing tracks sometime next week. "We had horses on the training track this morning," noted Henson. He said anyone may watch the daily workouts at the training track,

located below Triple Crown Condominiums. A "bonanza" of stall applications were received by the racetrack—3,800 for the 2,000 stalls at the track. Track officials said the number of applications was one of the highest in the track's history. Racing continues at Sunland Park Race Track through Sunday, May 4, and Ruidoso Downs will open its 29th racing season on Friday, May 16. The summer meet at Ruidoso Downs will cover 67 racing days and will end with the \$2.53 million All-American Futurity on Labor Day, September 1.

Village continues paving program

Dusty roads raise clouds of concern

Some Ruidoso residents complained Monday and Tuesday of unusual amounts of dirt and dust being raised on unpaved village streets.

"We got complaints from everywhere," said assistant village manager Frank Potter Wednesday. He said he heard complaints from residents of Pinecliff, Ponderosa Heights and the Grindstone Canyon area.

Although the village was unable to offer any immediate solution to the dust problem, the contractors on the Grindstone Canyon dam project alleviated problems on Grindstone Canyon Road by watering the gravelled surface.

Mrs. Gerald Storey, a Grindstone Canyon Road resident, said that solution is "very temporary," settling the cloud of dust for only about an hour.

The construction company repeated the watering process again Wednesday morning in efforts to lessen the dust on Grindstone Canyon Road.

However, residents in other areas suffering from dusty roads may need to stock up on dust cloths.

"We have about 100 miles of dirt streets," said Potter. He said the Village of Ruidoso has a paving program that calls for paving those streets over the next six years.

Street Department crews are currently paving Carrizo Creek Road, and will begin paving Grindstone Canyon Road as soon as that project is finished. The Ruidoso Village Council, after hearing complaints from Gerald Storey, recently instructed village engineer Mike Davalos to come up with a solution for Grindstone Canyon Road residents.

That's when he moved that paving project up on the paving schedule.

Potter said 17 miles of graveled roads will be paved in Ruidoso in 1986. He has a chart showing Ruidoso with 110 miles of paved and nearly 100 miles of unpaved streets at the end of 1985.

In 1980, according to Potter's chart, Ruidoso had nearly 150 miles of unpaved roads, and fewer than 90 miles of paved streets. Potter said progress is obvious, since by the end of 1985, for the first time, paved street miles outnumbered unpaved street miles.

Potter said the powdery dust formed by traffic on graveled roads occurs about this time every year, but is becoming more noticeable as main arterials are more heavily traveled.

Apache Summit

reopens Friday

U.S. Highway 70 through Apache Summit will reopen Friday, after being closed for about two years for construction work, according to New Mexico State Highway Department officials.

Project manager Clifford Bryan reported that all Highway 70 traffic will be rerouted from the Highway 70 Goat Canyon detour through Apache Summit temporarily on two lanes, with all four lanes of the Apache Summit highway opening in a few months.

The Goat Canyon highway will remain open for local use. Motorists should use caution throughout the area and strictly observe the no-passing zones, highway officials said.

Signs, lot lines and designs keep Planning and zoning busy

The Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission handled three different sign variances Monday three different ways—approving one, denying one and hearing that one is no longer needed.

During Monday's regular commission meeting, Ralph Bellon of Buck's All American Ford reported that signs at the car agency at the traffic 'Y' were altered to comply

with the village sign ordinance. During the March 17 commission meeting Bellon asked for a 12-month extension on a previously approved 12-month variance, but Monday that request was cancelled.

Ken Whipple of Fantasy Island Spas said he thought his building at the 'Y' was in Ruidoso Downs when he installed signs he moved from his former location on Mechem Drive without applying for a permit.

Commissioners questioned Whipple on bringing the oversized sign into compliance, and he said reducing the letters would ruin the expensive sign.

"I'm trying to hang in this town with a few others—not very many," said Whipple, who said he needs the coverage provided by the large sign. "I don't think it's a detraction to the building or the area," he added.

P&Z finally approved a variance to allow for the letters spelling out the company name on the building, but didn't allow auxiliary signs designating service and repair.

Commissioners Martin Rose, Ken Carr and Don Shaw opposed the compromise. Shaw warned the group of handling sign ordinance variances on a "case-by-case basis," and called for a more consistent approach.

A request by Southland Corporation for sign variances at two locations was unanimously denied Monday.

"The 7-11 stores in this town have just put up signs without coming before this body," said Mike Callaghan, P&Z chairman. "This isn't the first time," he added.

Martin White of Southland Corporation admitted that Citgo logo signs were erected without a permit on canopies at both the Hollywood and the Midtown 7-11s. He asked the commission for direction, and said his company is willing to cooperate.

"He's already in excess in both locations even without signs on the canopies," said Callaghan, but Paul Davis, village enforcement officer, said the signs in place were allowed under the previous sign ordinance.

Commissioners argued as to

whether the signage already in place could be considered along with the 27-square-foot of new signs, then denied the request.

In other business Monday commissioners:

—Denied rear and side lot line variances requested by John Chappell for new construction on Lot 2, Block 2, Skyvue Heights. Chappell said he didn't obtain a building permit for the nearly completed storage shed because he didn't know one was required. Commissioners Carr and Underwood voted to approve the request.

—Unanimously approved a request by Mike Mitchell to temporarily locate a shaved ice stand at 1203 Sudderth Drive and another at 504 Mechem Drive.

—Discussed with Debbie Jeter her tentative plan to locate a day care center on Lot 11, Block 9, Country Club Drive. Members voiced concern about traffic congestion at the proposed location.

—Voted to draft a resolution notifying the Ruidoso Village Council that P&Z has discussed outdoor displays and found that the problem is not severe and has no changes to recommend at this time.

—Agreed to meet with Steve Makowski, fire management officer with the U.S. Forest Service, for further discussions on a proposed zoning ordinance. Makowski recommended changes to the ordinance and warned the commission of possible enforcement problems with current provisions in the proposal dealing with trees.

—Discussed, but didn't act on, the proposed zoning ordinance.

The Swallows Arrive

All around the world, people are happy to welcome the Swallow, that true messenger of summer and bearer of glad tidings and good fortune.

A little scout showed up circling the house on the nineteenth; and yesterday, the twenty-first, sky was full of circling swallows. These are the tamest of the swallow clan—the ones mentioned in Story and song, "La Golondrina" (The Swallow). They build nests shaped like a bowl or half a bowl, of mud, under the eaves of the house or in the barn.

Then there is the cliff swallow who builds his nest of mud, under the ledges of cliffs or in culverts. He is the genius of the mud nest builders with the doorway at the bottom of his cone-shaped dwelling which extends downward from the overhanging shelf. Did the early people learn to make mud dwellings from the swallows? This upside-down architectural masterpiece of the Cliff Swallow is a "hard act to follow."

Another member of the clan up from Mexico for the summer is the green and white and black river bank swallow.

They have certainly brought the summer with them up from the southland, because today in early afternoon it is an even eighty-two. It is a joyful thing to see the swallows every year; and you never cease to marvel at the miracle of their arrival in good weather after their long flight. And today I heard something even more amazing along this line.

The March Butterfly

I was down at the home of Ernest and Robert McDaniell today, the twenty second. Robert and I were admiring the new leaves and green fields and young sweet cherries and all the other things of spring time in full tide, when an orange butterfly trimmed in black, flitted past nearby. You have seen this butterfly many times. He is a typical American.

I learned something new when Robert told me that this trail look-

ing creature migrates in flight far up to two thousand miles, through tropical, desert, mountain and rain forest.

One of their breeding grounds is Pacific Grove, California, and from there they fly to all points of our country, and even into Canada. It is wonderful enough to think of a swallow making a long flight, but this small little butterfly—and to think, the children know the way back to their southern home. Who told them?

It calls to mind William Callen Bryant's masterpiece, a favorite among American poems, "To a Water-bug."

"There is a Power Whose care Teaches fly way along that pathless coast."

"Through desert and limitless air Love wanders but not lost."

Spring and Summer Are Both in The Land

The last high winds called to the shimmering leaf buds, bringing them out in the delicate and bright colors of rapid growth. Like magic the oak brush on high has given the hillsides a vast mantle of glowing translucent golden green.

Everything is fresh and new and bright and cheery, and you can feel their renewal in your spirit.

In the yard you walk from the lilacs to the white bridal wreath, and from the small pear trees with red checked small pears, and on over the purple iris. And each one speaks a message from the ones who planted them; so that they may bloom forth in glory every spring.

I remember the long sign exten-

ding at Conley's Nursery. "Plant today for a beautiful Tomorrow."

Some of the early spring visitors are lingering while some from the summer have arrived ahead of time. The early Spring Wren is singing from the fields while on the face of the cliff the sparkling crimson-crowned bluebird of the cliff cooets are something out of dream land. To see such brilliant flowers on the silver face of a cliff is always a pleasant surprise, and especially so because this cooet usually waits until late May to bloom. At the foot of the cliff is the Mesquite in full bloom. This is a first cousin to the Yucca with much the same stalk which appears, delicate and crystal white just above the dagger-like leaves of the plant.

The Dove, the bird of mid-summer, blends his powerful call with the early spring voice of the House Finch (the Water-bird). And just a touch of water remains with us still, as we see the white tail feathers of the show bird flapping as they stream the waters, telling us:

"Have a good summer, and thanks for your kindness this past winter."

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
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

Ruidoso top sound stage site, chamber members hear

The Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce conducted a quarterly membership meeting last Thursday at Whispering Pines. Members heard that Ruidoso has been named one of the two best locations in the state for a film sound stage, heard reports from chamber committee chairpeople and learned of chamber executive director John Jeffers' recent appointment to the state Economic Development and Tourism Advisory Board.

Member Barbara DiPaolo reported that Ruidoso had been chosen as the best site for a sound stage in Southern New Mexico. That decision was reached in a state-funded study by film industry consultant Milton Forman, who suggested that the present Ruidoso Municipal Airport buildings could be made into a sound stage when airport operations move to the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport. Jeffers, who was unable to attend

the membership meeting due to another meeting out-of-town, reported later that he was notified of his appointment April 14. The first meeting of the board Jeffers will attend is today (Thursday), April 24. Jeffers said the appointment will present a good opportunity to ensure that the interests of Southern New Mexico and particularly Ruidoso are represented.

In other business, the members: —Heard from member Melody Vuich that the Ruidoso Valley Greeters' flower barrel sales are continuing in conjunction with the Keep Ruidoso Beautiful campaign. Flower barrels are \$35 and \$20 for replanting. The Ruidoso Garden Club is helping and flower barrels may be had by calling any Greeter.

—Heard DiPaolo report that the Business and Research Committee has completed a statistic-packed community profile of Ruidoso. Copies of all or part are available at the chamber.

—Learned that the Task Force appointed by the chamber Board of Directors is continuing its efforts to attract a major economic entity to the village.

—Heard member Frank Potter report on the progress of the Community Development Division, Centennial Committee and Beautification and Clean-up Committee.

—Were told of the progress of the Nominating Committee by member Duane Byars. He reported that 15 members have been nominated for five three-year terms on the chamber Board of Directors.

Ballots were to be mailed to chamber members early this week, and are due April 29 at noon. —Heard member Bill Hirschfeld report on the activities of the chamber Advertising Committee. He noted that the summer advertising chamber-track-state funded campaign will include billboards in Texas cities and brochures.

—Heard Paul Crown, president of the board of directors, report that the Tele-Auction brought in more than \$6,300.

—Were updated on the progress of the Art Festival, which will feature 110 artists, and the second annual Mother's Day picnic at the Cedar Creek Recreation Area.



FOOD PROCESSOR TIPS AND TRICKS

Food processors can't do everything, but they can save you lots of time and effort in the kitchen. You don't have to be a gourmet cook to use a food processor, but you may become one when you discover that your food processor can be enlisted as that extra pair of hands you're always needed in the kitchen. The following tips are real time savers.

1. Keep your processor handy on the counter, ready to use. Don't hide it away under the counter. You won't use it if you have to drag it out each time you need it.
2. Use your processor safely by thoroughly familiarizing yourself with your instruction manual. Take time to read your manual carefully. Remember that processor blades are very sharp and treat them and your entire processor with respect.
3. For quick clean ups when you intend to process several times consecutively, process dry foods first (e.g. bread or cracker crumbs, nuts, parsley, grated cheese or cheese). Use a paper towel to wipe out the bowl quickly if you're in a hurry. When you come to processing messy foods, rinse the bowl and blades quickly and go on to your next processing job. After you've finished the day's food processing tasks, put the bowl and blades into the dishwasher for a thorough cleaning.
4. When your recipes call for 1 cup of food, fill the food tube full. It will hold one cup on standard models.
5. Process more food than you need for a recipe (e.g. crumbs, cheese, nuts, chocolate and spices) and store these items in the refrigerator or freezer for future use. It is so great to reach for these pre-prepared items when you are preparing a recipe, and you're in a hurry. You'll actually feel organization creeping into your life! It may be a foreign sensation at first, but it'll help you begin to like it. A food processor can help you become organized in the kitchen. It can also save you time and work. Cooking becomes more fun and chances are you'll become more creative in the kitchen with your food processor at your side.

Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE—Maybe it's time to do some arithmetic.

Certain of those whom destiny has appointed to supervise state government at just this time either cannot comprehend or fail to accept certain arithmetical conclusions some others of us find irrefutable. So let's have a shot at explaining how the thinking on our side goes. If it turns out we are the fiscal numskulls, others will undoubtedly be kind enough to point out exactly where our errors lie.

Our disagreement is over expectations for income to the state during the months ahead. Predictions on this point are crucial to operation of the state, since all decisions on what we legally authorize for spending during any period of time must be based on what we will be taking in during that period.

Crucial to such estimates of income is the price of oil. Taxes on that product and its production are by no means our only source of revenue, but they are an important segment of that income. In addition, such prices also track closely with prices paid for natural gas, and oil and gas together have traditionally generated almost half the money the state takes in.

Economists retained by the state to estimate future income, after practicing whatever arcane steps they take to achieve their prophecies, originally fixed on an average price of \$22.40 per barrel of oil during the 18 months between January of this year and July of next as a safe figure for us to base planned spending on.

It now appears that figure may be overly optimistic. Currently, the spot price is nowhere near that level, as everyone knows who follows the international news. In point of fact, for much of the time lately, the price has hung at a point that is about half what our soothsayers suggested it might be. "Not to worry," some presently tell us. "The estimates we depend on are only averages. The price could still rise enough to average out at that level over the 18 months. If it does, we're in find shape."

Yeah, but how likely is that to happen?

In the first place, the knowledgeable people we are presently hearing from say spot prices for oil aren't going to get up to something like \$20 a barrel, which is still below the figure the

state is counting on, till sometime after the first of the year. Of course they aren't sure that will happen even then, but for the sake of the present argument, let's agree that it is going to. We folks on this side of the debate will still be going around looking gloomy because we understand what "average" means, and it doesn't seem to us that our opponents do.

This is a simple fact: for every month the price is around \$10, there will have to be a later month, during this specific 18 months, when the price is \$34 a barrel if we are to achieve \$22 as the average price.

We have searched and searched, and can find nobody, in or out of the oil industry, who is willing to predict that will happen.

To the credit of those who prepared the state's revenue estimates, they are already hinting their figure will be adjusted downward. But do Toney Anaya and the legislative leaders hear them?

These are the folks, after all, who passed and signed into law expenditures that will eat up every dollar of state income during the relevant 18 months if that \$22.40 figure turns out to be real—which it won't. In addition, they authorized spending another \$150 million to be generated by changes in the tax laws, and they may actually have approved putting out another \$100 million or so they just seem to hope we are going to find in the road somewhere.

Yet are these people prepared to correct what looks like a very big and important error? Not at the moment. If they did that, they would first have to admit they were wrong, which would prove embarrassing to all 113 of them. They would also then be forced by logic to make substantial cuts in government spending, which they so far haven't had guts enough to do; and/or face the prospect of genuine tax increases, which thought sends shivers through these cravens that are heightened because this is an election year.

If there are mistakes in arithmetic as this column proposes it, we will jump with joy if some benefactor points them out to us. If there are no such mistakes, however, it appears a meeting of our Legislature, to undo what it did earlier this year, is inevitable, no matter who tells you it isn't.

The brief story of Bobby Thomason's acquittal reminds us again how often the media plays up the bad news and plays down the good news. You gave considerably more space and attention to the raid on Mr. Thomason's home, the arrests and charges, etc., than you gave his exoneration.

Many people who were present at the trial expressed surprise that The Ruidoso News did not have a reporter on the scene. When you consider the number of people involved in the fiasco, the fact that three law enforcement agencies participated (the F.B.I., the State Police, and almost the entire Ruidoso Police Department), that a number of well-known locals were arrested, and a greater number detained and harassed—when you consider all these facts, your weak, second-hand account of the outcome seems downright curious.

Of course, it has occurred to us that The Ruidoso News merely procrastinated, thinking the trial would last longer, and that someone would get to Carrizozo in time to hear the verdict. If the State of New Mexico and the Assistant District Attorney had presented a case it might indeed have taken a little longer to turn it over to the jury. What they did present was so ridiculous as to anger any tax-paying citizen. The defendant's costs cannot even be added up, but we can estimate the price tag of this alleged case from beginning to end, and it is staggering. Who pays? We do, all of us who live in this fair state.

When law enforcement agencies and prosecutors pursue and persist in cases where there is no evidence to support charges, where warrants are issued frivolously on the basis of hearsay from unknown sources, when prosecution becomes persecution—, we believe, Mr. Editor, you have an obligation to report such matters fearlessly. You can shine the spotlight of public attention on these shabby, costly exercises. Any reporter with eyes and ears would have seen and heard the truth of what I've said here. You just needed to be there.

Mr. Thomason's many friends are happy that justice was finally triumphant, and hopeful that no one in the Village of Ruidoso will be victimized in this manner in the future.

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March building permits reflect upsurge in remodelings, repairs

With the arrival of spring, Ruidoso property owners apparently turned their minds to remodeling.

Residential addition and alteration permits dominated building permits issued in the village last month. With just 31 permits issued in all categories, 14 were for residential remodeling and five were for commercial remodels and two for apartment additions and alterations.

Total valuation of the 31 permits issued in March, was \$590,317—down dramatically in dollar value from February's 14 permits which had a hefty valuation of \$1,336,361. The March figure also was down from March 1985 totals of 47 permits with a valuation of \$1,421,671.

However, 1986 year-to-date totals are still more than \$200,000 ahead of the 1985 three-month valuation total, due mainly to the \$1 million-plus Safeway project on Highway 70 that got under way in February.

Through March 1986, the Building Department has issued 68 building permits with a valuation at \$4,820,467. Last year after three months the village had seen 107 permits issued for \$4,639,509.

In March the village issued three new single family home permits

with a valuation of \$256,160, up from February's two new residential permits with a \$109,899 valuation, but down sharply from last year's 11 single family home permits with a valuation of \$979,112.

The 14 residential remodeling permits issued in March carried a pricetag of \$91,521, nearly tripling February's totals of five permits with a valuation of \$27,396. But March permits were down drastically from March 1985 when the village issued 28 residential addition and alteration permits with a \$262,746 valuation.

New commercial building permits issued last month numbered four with a valuation of just \$101,441, down from last month's one permit with a valuation of \$1,147,233, but up from last year in March 1985 when just one new commercial permit was issued with a dollar valuation of only \$53,969.

The five commercial remodel permits issued in March had a valuation of \$20,602, close to February's four commercial fix-up permits with a dollar valuation of \$25,833. In March 1985 four commercial addition and alteration permits were issued with a valuation of \$58,472.

Permits were issued in March for two apartment addition and altera-

tion projects that carried a valuation of \$111,366, up from February's two apartment remodeling permits with a valuation of just \$26,072 and over March 1985's one apartment fix-up permit with a valuation of \$69,072.

Two demolition permits, with a valuation of \$627, and one grading permit, with a valuation of \$8,600, were issued in March.

Doctor Brown enjoys working in mountains

Family medicine specialist Dr. Arlene Brown worries about the future of medicine in America. She thinks certain government regulations are driving some physicians out of the field and driving other physicians crazy. But she won't let government regulations keep her from practicing medicine in the mountains of New Mexico, which fulfills one of her lifetime dreams. "Once you live in the mountains of New Mexico, you can't leave, or you always want to come back," Brown said.

Brown doesn't know why, but most people are surprised when she tells them she is a native New Mexican.

Though she is a captive of the Ruidoso mountains and lifestyle, she spent most of her formative years in Los Alamos.

While she was growing up in Los Alamos she began a love affair with music. She still practices with her violin and occasionally gives a performance for small groups, Brown said.

But when she enrolled at the University of New Mexico (UNM) as a music major, she found the program extremely demanding and took the "easy" way out as a biology major.

After UNM came Washington University in St. Louis, Missouri, and the completion of her residency at a hospital in Milwaukee, Wisconsin.

Then she headed back to New Mexico, passed her state medical

boards, and decided to practice in Ruidoso.

She's been practicing in Ruidoso for about three years, but she knew the first couple weeks after she opened her practice she would always want to live in Ruidoso.

Brown said young people, especially young women who want to enter the medical field, should work hard in school and not be derailed from their dreams by anyone.

"If you work hard in school you will give your self choices in life. Not everyone can do everything, but people should give something they really want their very best shot," Brown said.

Brown enjoys practicing family medicine, she said.

"I enjoy delivering a baby one day, and treating that baby's grandfather the next day," Brown said.

Brown said the emphasis at UNM was on the family.

"I try to look at patients in terms of their family structure. When I make medical decisions for one member of the family I think it is important to keep the well-being of the entire family in mind.

When Brown has any free time she plays the violin or concentrates on the construction of her new house in a "secret" location somewhere in the hills of Ruidoso with her husband, Paul Vordermann.

"I have a very supportive husband, a real close friend, and I spend a lot of time with him," Brown said.

The only thing that really makes Brown unhappy is rising medical costs and government regulations.

Brown said the government is trying to standardize the cost of medicine and medical procedures across the nation, but has not dealt with the rising cost of equipment and runaway insurance hikes for both the patient and the practicing physician.

Preventive medicine may be the only solution to rising medical costs for both the patient and the physician trying to provide the best in medical care, Brown said.

Brown said patients need to lead a healthy lifestyle.

No one should smoke, everyone should have a proper diet that promotes good health and some people need to take themselves out of

stressful situations to protect their health, Brown said.

"The human body works, it can communicate health needs to patients," Brown said.

Brown said most people don't believe it, but skin cancer is more prevalent in the mountains because of the altitude in relation to the sun.

Brown suggests people use products with strong sun protection ingredients when they go outside for long periods of time.

Brown has enjoyed working and

living in Ruidoso and tries to give something back to the community.

She is proud to be a member of or offer her services to Alturas, the Rotary Club, the Family Planning Clinic at the Lincoln County Sub-Office, Ruidoso Municipal Schools, the Girl Scouts and other organizations in the community.

As medicine moves into the next century, Brown hopes she can bring the beneficial advances in medicine to her people, the people of the mountains she loves.

Dentist Waters mixes interest in teeth, birds

Did you ever have a cavity filled by an expert on mountain birds?

If Ruidoso dentist Sally Waters finds any free time to get away from her battles with plaque and gingivitis, she likes to roam the mountains looking for bluejays and other mountain avian delights.

She may be the only dentist in Lincoln County who is a bonafide card-carrying member of the National Audubon Society.

When Waters graduated from Clovis High School in 1972 she

decided to major in wildlife studies at Eastern New Mexico University (ENMU).

But sometime in her four-year stay at ENMU she also became a biology major.

"I had wanted to be a dentist ever since second grade, and though I loved studying wildlife at ENMU, I always knew I would become a dentist," Waters said.

Her father, a longtime Clovis dentist, did not push her in any career direction, but still was the motivational factor in her decision to become a dentist, the tall, clear-eyed Waters said.

In 1976, Waters applied and was accepted to Tufts University School of Dental Medicine in Boston, Massachusetts.

Tufts has a reputation for having competitive and exceptional students in most of their programs, according to many higher-education experts.

Waters said she had to maintain a rigorous pace to keep up with or stay ahead of her peers.

The traditional Boston school was not without its sexist, according to Waters.

"I didn't meet male students who thought I couldn't succeed in the program, but I had some difficulty with some instructors," Waters said.

"It was as if they wanted to know how I had the nerve to take some male student's place at Tufts' and in the professional world," Waters said without her usual warm smile. "But this just gave me more drive," she said.

In 1979 Waters graduated from Tufts, fulfilling her schoolgirl dream. She was a dentist.

Waters practiced in Clovis with her father for about four years, practiced in Hobbs, in Albuquerque (for a matter of weeks), in Socorro and finally in Ruidoso.

Ruidoso captured her heart. She knew Ruidoso would be the place she would sharpen her drill and roll out her floss for a long time.

Waters said she loves the mountains, the birds and the small town friendliness she finds in Ruidoso.

Once in a while she has the time to visit her family in Clovis, Waters said.

She has a brother who practices dentistry with her father in Clovis,

a brother who is in chiropractic school, a sister who is an artist and a mother who has heard about clean teeth most of her adult life.

Waters is married to Jim Wilkerson, of Wilkerson Construction. Her husband's firm has been busy remodeling her office in recent months.

Waters said she is busy, but is "very proud" of how her practice in Ruidoso has built up recently.

But Waters said her practice would be smaller if people would take better care of their teeth.

"If everyone did what they were suppose to, and there were no accidents or wisdom tooth extractions, people would keep their teeth for life," Waters stated.

"People should brush, eat the proper foods and go to their dentist to make sure they are doing the things that prevent gum and other diseases," Waters said.

"The best tooth has never been drilled," Waters said.

Waters said the future of dentistry lies in dental aesthetics.

"We can do bondings or veneers that change the shape, size or shade of the tooth without actually changing the tooth itself," Waters said.

In the future people can look forward to drugs that remove tooth decay, new procedures to dull pain in the mouth and new methods of preventive dentistry, Waters said.

Waters said she is always glad to answer questions on crowns or razor-billed auks.

Sunland Park Hoofbeats

The Riley Allison Futurity will be well represented by graduates out of the 1985 Summer Sale For Selected Thoroughbred Yearlings at Ruidoso Downs. Six of the 10 finalists in the \$248,363 race came out of the sale.

The bargain-priced qualifier was Pat's Fantasy, who was purchased by Frank Tisdale III of El Paso for \$4,500. If the colt wins, he'll return the investment with a \$119,181 payoff that goes to the first-place finisher. Other horses purchased in the sale who made it into the finals include Big Bold Boy, for \$14,500; Mighty Class, \$10,000; and Silver Package, \$8,000. Qualifiers repurchased were Lady Waygood for \$13,500 and Proud Cup for \$6,500.

Two horses also made it worth the \$5,000 supplemental nomination fee their owners paid to enter the futurity. Masters First Lady and Make My Mark each made it into the May 4 finals.

Trainer Tommie Morgan and jockey Allen Dupuy combined to put two horses into the finals. Cliffs

Place automatically qualified by winning the third division, while Make My Mark finished second in the 5th division and drew a spot in a shake held among the six place horses. Salustio Burgos also rode two second-placers - Silver Package and Proud Cup - that benefitted from the luck of the draw and will be in the finals.

American Moon Fun will be hard to overlook in the upcoming vote for Sunland Park's Handicap Horse of the Meet. On Saturday (April 19) the mare won her fourth stakes race of the season at the track in the \$13,000 Ruidoso Handicap. Earlier this season she won the Juarez Handicap and two of the three legs in the Savannah Swinger Series. Following her win in the Ruidoso Handicap, trainer Dan Howard said American Moon Fun would compete in the trials for the World's Championship Quarter Horse Classic this summer in Ruidoso.

South American rancher James Patron flew from Lima, Peru, to El

Paso to see Cesar T. win the Riley Allison Derby on Sunday (April 20). He went home a happy man.

"I love this horse," said Patron, the owner of Pine Crest Stables in Ocala, Florida, where the colt was foaled. "He has such good speed. You could tell he was going to win almost from the beginning of the race. He was extremely fast going around the final turn."

Patron, who had never seen Cesar T. run before Sunday, was in the winner's circle along with the 3-year-old's owner Irvin de Cordova. "I thought he ran a very true race," said the resident of Groesbeck, Texas. "He has been running against tough stakes competition since his very first race and has given us the very best he's had every time."

Cesar T. will be campaigned in stakes competition in Ruidoso this summer and de Cordova said he would also run in Louisiana, and is currently considering a shot at the prestigious Hollywood Park Derby.

Peachy Manners wins Saturday

\$28,500 La Primavera Handicap

Peachy Manners established herself as the queen of the distaffs at the 1986 spring Downs at Albuquerque meet as she earned her second stakes win this season by capturing Saturday's \$28,500 La Primavera Handicap.

Under jockey Richard Bickel, winning his third stakes of the meet, Peachy Manners led every step of the way in the seven-furlong La Primavera to win by a length and one-half over Miss Jubilation. Holly Locks rallied from well off the pace to finish third in the field of 10.

Trained by Kevin Cross, Peachy Manners had already scored a victory in the La Femme Handicap. With her win in Saturday's La Primavera, she is clearly the top mare on the grounds.

Peachy Manners covered the seven furlongs in 1:32.4, earning \$12,100 for her owner Joe E. Dawson of Albuquerque. The victory also qualified the five-year-old mare's lifetime earnings to more than \$218,000 during her brilliant career encompassing several wins in major futurities as a two-year-old. Miss Jubilation, who also finished

second in the La Femme, earned \$5,000 for her efforts in the La Primavera.

Peachy Manners covered the seven furlongs in 1:32.4 and returned at \$2.10, \$5.50 and \$1.50. Miss Jubilation paid \$1.40 and \$1.40 with Holly Locks returning \$5.00 for the race. The \$28,500 purse was split with \$24,000.

Crusin' Prince wins at Downs

Crusin' Prince, a 3-year-old colt, won the \$10,000 Crusin' Prince Handicap at the Ruidoso Downs on Saturday. The colt, trained by Tommie Morgan and ridden by jockey Allen Dupuy, won by a length and one-half over the field of 10.

Crusin' Prince, who was purchased by Tommie Morgan and jockey Allen Dupuy, won the \$10,000 Crusin' Prince Handicap at the Ruidoso Downs on Saturday. The colt, trained by Tommie Morgan and ridden by jockey Allen Dupuy, won by a length and one-half over the field of 10.

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Longshot winners return \$1,000 payoffs at Downs

It's a rare occurrence when a single ticket at the race track is worth \$1,000. It's almost unheard of when there are two \$1,000 payoffs created in the same race. This nearly impossible event happened twice Saturday afternoon at The Downs at Albuquerque.

Longshot players had their day when Sapello Saboteur captured the second race and paid \$63.40 for the win. The \$300 quiniela in the second race combining Sapello Saboteur with Busy Busy Alice returned \$1,108.50.

The Daily Double was the highest of the meet but fell just short of the record \$1,740 payoff of last year. The quiniela payoff fell far short of the \$1,722.90 returned to bettors on

March 22 of this year.

A longshot once again beat the odds in the seventh race on Saturday when Erica of Tiar at odds of 25-1 shared a deadheat for the win with Eterna Warrior.

Erica of Tiar returned \$5.50 for the win while Eterna Warrior paid \$5.50 on his winning ticket. Just a three-year-old filly, Erica is in the show position and returned \$1.50.

The deadheat created two trifecta payoffs, each returning more than \$1,500. The trifecta with Erica of Tiar on top and Eterna Warrior second paid \$2,351.50. The trifecta with Eterna Warrior as the winner and Erica of Tiar second returned

\$1,380.40. Players who backed Erica of Tiar and Eterna Warrior with Cured in their combinations saw both trifectas.

Writer was third another three-quarters of a length back with Bord of Hope fourth and Market Junction finishing fifth.


The even money favorite, First Natomas, who along with Bord of Hope were denied their second stakes win of the meet, finished eighth.

Favorite wins Sunland race
