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## Bingo! Tribe OK's ordinance

On April 15 a quorum of the Mescalero Apache Tribal Council (MATC) passed a bingo authority ordinance by majority vote.

Bureau of Indian Affairs (BIA) area director Sidney Mills approved the bingo ordinance on April 17, BIA branch chief for tribal operations, Ron Toya said from his Albuquerque office.

Toya reviews gaming procedures and ordinances, as well as law and order codes, on Indian reservations in New Mexico and Colorado.

"The ordinance is not that big of a deal," Toya said.

"It's very similar to a civic organization asking a city council for a bingo permit," Toya said.

The MATC ordinance acts as "an umbrella" for future bingo operations on the Mescalero reservation.

"It does not mean the Mescaleros will operate any bingo games in the near future," Toya said.

Wendell Chino, tribal president, was on "travel status" and could not be reached for comment.

All other MATC administrators said only Chino could speak for the tribe on any matters related to bingo.

Tribal councillor John Shendo Jr. resigned from the tribal council the day the bingo ordinance was approved.

In a public statement, Shendo said he did not support bingo games on Mescalero lands.

Shendo said he did not resign because of the bingo ordinance.

He said he stood by his previous public statements, but would not make any further comments on any tribal business matters.

Media sources in Texas have speculated the Tribe would use the Inn of the Mountain Gods for bingo operations.

The ordinance allows the Tribe to turn over their bingo operation to a management firm, Toya said.

However, if the Tribe contracted with an outside agency to conduct bingo games on the reservation, that agency would be subject to an FBI review, Toya said.

No matter what the FBI review revealed, the BIA would have to approve the bingo management agency, Toya said.

However, the Tribe could offer entertainment during bingo games at the Inn of the Mountain Gods, or anywhere on reservation property, without violating BIA guidelines, Toya said.

"The BIA supports bingo activities on reservations because they do generate incomes for educational projects, social programs and general economic development," Toya said.

The Tribe told BIA officials they planned to use any revenue generated from bingo games for educational projects and increased social services for tribal members, Toya said.

"We feel the tribes can handle bingo in a responsible manner," Toya said.

## Council cautions police officers; citizen suggests police shakeup

Ruidoso Police Chief Richard Swenor and Captain Dave Pfeffer got a warning from the Ruidoso Village Council Tuesday.

After more than an hour in executive session, councillors warned Pfeffer campaigning while on duty will result in disciplinary action. Pfeffer is a candidate for Lincoln County Sheriff.

His candidacy already has raised questions, since a municipal ordinance states that a village employee may not seek public office without first resigning.

Pfeffer, represented by attorney Gary Mitchell, is seeking an opinion through district court on the constitutionality of that ordinance.

Meanwhile, he continues as operations commander for the

Police Department, and has stated that he will resign if need be to pursue the office of sheriff.

Tuesday's executive session, called after a regular meeting to discuss personnel matters and pending litigation, was scheduled on the request of a private citizen, Paul Sanders.

Sanders, a former member of the U.S. Border Patrol, presented councillors with a proposal to reorganize the Ruidoso Police Department, reducing the force from 34 to 24 officers. His three-page proposal includes numbers and costs of the local department and six other New Mexico police departments.

When Village Councillor Ray Dean Carpenter suggested the proposal was a matter for public meetings on the budget, Sanders said he had specific names and incidents to relate in the closed meeting.

Although Sanders said Wednesday he wasn't at liberty to reveal discussions that occurred in the executive session, he said his proposal wasn't discussed. He said that document will be a part of budget workshops.

"I have seen evidence of abuses and unprofessional actions by the Police Department," said Sanders. He said he is simply a concerned citizen with no axes to grind.

"I'm not out to get Mr. Swenor," said Sanders.

Swenor said Wednesday that he wasn't included in the closed session.

"Apparently allegations were made that Pfeffer was campaigning on duty," said Swenor, adding that his department has received no

## Hoofbeats hit new track today

Sometime today (Thursday), May 1, the first horse will step onto a new racing surface of either the quarter horse or new seven furlong thoroughbred track at Ruidoso Downs Race Track, according to track officials.

Track officials said the new racing rail should be completed "sometime Thursday."

When the new breakaway rail is

completely finished the horses can begin working out on either of the tracks, racing officials said.

Special permission and design plans were obtained from the U.S. Corps of Engineers to install culverts in the Rio Ruidoso to allow the new seven furlong racetrack to pass over the river at two points.

A 400,000-gallon water reservoir

was constructed for fire protection, track officials said.

Over \$6.5 million in capital improvements have been implemented over the past three years at Ruidoso Downs.

The 29th season at Ruidoso Downs, which will feature 67 programs, will begin on Friday, May 16.

## No signal at the 'Y' this summer

A State Highway Department engineer said Monday that a traffic signal scheduled to be installed at the traffic "Y" won't be completed in time for the racing season.

"I wouldn't anticipate that signal being in operation until after Labor Day," said District Traffic Engineer Tim Basler in a telephone interview.

Although engineering is complete, and the bid was awarded to low bidder Thomasson Construction of Hobbs, Basler said the contractor hasn't been given a "notice to proceed." The contract calls for 110 "weather working days" to complete the project, but the clock won't start running until a notice to proceed is issued, said Basler.

Basler said traffic signal jobs take a long time because the specialized equipment required is sometimes difficult to acquire. Contractors don't usually order such equipment until they are named low bidder and given notice to proceed, said Basler.

Plans call for making some geometric changes in the islands on Highway 70, noted Basler. The two turn lanes from Sudderth Drive eastbound onto Highway 70 will be widened from 10-feet each to 12-feet each, said Basler.

He said improvements will include allowing for two lanes of through-traffic in both directions on Highway 70.

Design changes won't affect the area west of the intersection where

the "Welcome to Ruidoso" sign stands, according to Basler. A landscape project is under way in that area which apparently won't be impacted by the change in configuration.

An enhancement provided by the new traffic signal will include loops in the pavement on Sudderth Drive near Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Hospital. Basler explained that those loops will be programmed to actuate the lights according to the amount of traffic.

Deputy Chief Jim Alston of the Ruidoso Police Department said traffic control will be provided on

race days by police officers. Alston said in years past two officers have spent two hours around noon and two hours in the evening directing traffic at the "Y."

"It is a drain on manpower," said Alston, adding that no additional salary expense is required because officers assigned to traffic control are on duty anyway.

In spite of high traffic counts at the "Y," Alston could recall few accidents at that intersection.

"When we do have an accident down there, it's usually a hump-dinger," he added.

## Benefactors beautify 'Y'

Smokey Bear District ranger Steve Sams said the landscaping program at the special garden section near the "Y" intersection is nearly finished.

Sams said he has a permit from the State Highway Department to landscape the area around the "Ruidoso-Playground of the Southwest" sign.

The proposed signal light at the "Y" intersection will not affect the status of the permit, Sams said.

"We are designing our project to interface with the new traffic pattern," Sams said.

Sams credited the Rotary Club, the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce, Lincoln Cablevision, Paul Crown, Contel, Sierra Blanca Motors and other private donors for the progress the project has already made.

Sams said white firs, blue spruces, white pines, Rocky Mountain red maples and Ponderosa pines already have been planted near the "Y" intersection.

The total cost of the beautification project is about \$4,000, Sams said.

such complaints.

He said he presented councillors with a written rebuttal to Sanders' proposal.

In other personnel discussions Tuesday, councillors adopted a policy that precludes the hiring of family members within the same department.

"A serious flaw in our law has allowed abuses to take place in several departments within our village," said Councillor Victor Alonso in proposing the policy change.

He said with the village being one of the biggest employers in the area, he is concerned that all citizens have an equal opportunity to fill vacancies.

"I don't want department heads to hire their families—it's that simple," said Alonso.

Village Councillor Larry Simon suggested a hiring freeze.

Also Tuesday the council overturned Planning and Zoning's (P&Z) denial of lot line setbacks for new construction on John Chapel's Skyvue Heights property.

Mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr., arriving late for the meeting which was convened by Mayor Pro-tem Jerry Shaw, said the question should never have come up. He said lot line setbacks were meant for new subdivisions only, not for areas already settled when the ordinance was adopted.

"This town feels that they are in a police state," said Mayor Davis, who questioned why P&Z inter-

preted the ordinance "to apply to everyone in the world."

Davis recalled a time when he had business with P&Z.

"I said if I ever came back before P&Z I was coming with a baseball bat," said the Mayor.

Upon hearing later that the low bidder to paint the five-million gallon municipal water tank is unable to meet bonding specifications, Mayor Davis lambasted state regulations.

With a \$60,000 difference between the local contractor with the low bid of \$37,000 and the second lowest bid, Davis suggested that the village bond the job.

"State statutes don't give you that right," said Frank Potter, assistant village manager.

Mayor Davis suggested that Ruidoso be the first town in the state to stand up to Santa Fe. He apologized to Jeff Maul, the low bidder on the paint project, after the council voted to put the tank back in operation, and delay painting until after peak water demands of the summer season.

In other business Tuesday, councillors:

—Heard Diana Meyer report that ticket sales are under way for the Welcome Back Horsemen barbecue co-sponsored by the village.

—Heard Paul Crown of Lincoln Cablevision ask councillors to speak directly into microphones and require members of the audience to come to the microphone to speak so that his equipment will pick up all voices.

—Approved Councillor Elmer Pirelli's suggestion to purchase video tapes of council meetings. "I

hope you have to watch them twice weekly for the rest of your lives," commented Mayor Davis.

—Approved an art exhibition at the Ruidoso Public Library in spite of village attorney John Underwood's warning of \$1,000 in liability insurance costs for the \$126,000 collection. Works of Manuel Gregorio Acosta will be on display from July 1-24.

—Approved P&Z's recommendation to zone land on Hull Road, the former site of the village water treatment plant, as multi-family residential (R-2).

—Scheduled a public hearing for May 27 for Carrol Collier's appeal on P&Z's denial of his request to rezone seven lots in Ruidoso Springs Subdivision from R-2 to light commercial (C-1).

—Heard Tim Morris, co-chairman of the Sierra Blanca Airport Commission, report on airport progress.

—Removed discussion on the Lodger's Tax Committee's budget proposal from the regular agenda. Mayor Davis said the proposal will be included in upcoming budget workshops.

—Approved a nuisance control ordinance after its originator, village enforcement officer Paul Davis, asked the council to postpone acting on it. "This is not even close to what was submitted for adoption," said Davis.

—Approved an ordinance clarifying responsibility for water service costs, deposits and requirements for discontinuing service.

—Approved an ordinance on notifying the Utility Council of excavations.

—Approved amendments to the village sign ordinance after hearing Alonso say it is still too restrictive. "I'm tired of fighting it," added Alonso.

—Approved a resolution and ordinance related to a bonding issue previously adopted.

—Heard Councillor Larry Simon thank the Ruidoso Federated Woman's Club and the Mountaineers for involving many visitors and locals in last week's folksmarch walking event.

—Heard Councillor Shaw report on April Showers, a kick-off for the Meal Care program at the Adult Recreation Center.

—Heard Jim Stover, Emergency Medical Services director, explain a disaster drill planned this week.

—Awarded bids for sodding and fence construction at the Eagle Creek Sports Complex. Low bidder for the sod was A.G. Sod Farms at \$8,500, and successful bidder on the fence was R&R Fence at \$5,100.

—Discussed change orders and costs of the Grindstone Canyon dam project, and finally approved change order #1. Pirelli cast the lone dissenting vote on extending the contract time by 21 days and the price by \$32,336.

Mayor Davis told village engineer Mike Davalos, who presented the report, that the construction engineers should report to the council. "The engineer is so popular right now in Ruidoso that at least we'd get this room bombed off the building tonight," said Davis.

"I would hope that there would be no more change orders until they get dam well finished," added Davis.

—Scheduled a special meeting to review a reorganization chart for the village, and directed village manager Jim Hine to schedule budget workshops.

—Reconvened after an executive session to direct Davalos to enact terms of an agreement with Brait Construction in which the village will complete the Upper Canyon diversion project and use funds retained from Brait payments to pay subcontractors and state liabilities incurred by Brait.

—Directed the village attorney, after the closed session, to research all contracts with Boyle Engineers.

## Chamber loses '84 ski race power bill suit

A jury in District Court found in favor of the Otero County Electric Co-op Tuesday in a case that could cost the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce \$7,257.94.

More than two years after members of the chamber Board of Directors agreed to pay past due electric bills at Eagle Creek Ski Area to enable the 1984 U.S. Open Ski Race to be run, a jury in Judge Robert Doughty's court ruled that the bill should be paid by the chamber.

Paul Crown, chamber president, said Thursday that he has called a special board meeting for next Wednesday to decide whether to appeal the ruling. He said they have 30

days to appeal the decision.

Board members signed a promissory note after hearing that Otero Electric would otherwise discontinue electric service to the ski area on March 1, 1984, according to John Jeffers, chamber executive officer.

He added that March 1 was the first day of the racing event, and skiers and celebrities were already in town.

Jeffers said legal advisers later informed the board that the action was taken under economic duress, leading to their decision not to pay the bill and eventually filing suit against Otero Electric, alleging that the chamber was not responsi-

ble for the bill.

"We don't have the money to pay," said Crown, adding that legal fees of \$1,300 have been accrued during the two-year case. He fears that an appeal would cost the chamber much more.

He said he is particularly disappointed with the verdict since the chamber just "went \$400 in the black," for the first time since he took over as president in July 1985. Crown said his administration has worked all year to eliminate the \$32,000 deficit present when he took office.

Jeffers said he hasn't received the written judgment yet, but will review it carefully with the board as they consider an appeal.

## Former Mayor George White spends time in hospital

Former Ruidoso Mayor George White recently was a patient in the Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Hospital (RHVH), according to Katie Wickware, nursing supervisor.

White's physician, Lance Kirkegaard, said Tuesday that White was admitted to the hospital with "some stroke symptoms."

Kirkegaard said that after

undergoing therapy at RHVH, White had complete recovery from those symptoms.

White traveled to Albuquerque by private car to undergo some tests, explained Kirkegaard.

Wickware reported that White was in stable condition when he left RHVH.

## Preschoolers screened, registered at Nob Hill

An "exceptionally good" number of children turned out for the kindergarten registration/preschool screening Saturday at Nob Hill Elementary School, according to school principal Roger Sowder.

He noted that 97 future students registered, up from 85 last spring. Sowder said he expects that number to represent about 55 percent of the total number of students who will start classes next fall as kindergartners.

Sowder said the registration, in its third year, becomes more efficient every year. The registration provides school administrators with a valuable preview of what to expect for the next year.

Also valuable is the information gained in the screening, which checks for developmental lags children may have. Sowder pointed out that such information can be a

valuable jump in helping students, often years before they enter the school system.

The screening of future students was carried out by Region IX Cooperative Center. Region IX physical therapist Shirley Cliff said the registration and screening involved the help of about 40 volunteers. Doctors, dentists, nurses, school workers and others worked from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. Saturday to process the children.

Cliff reported that 60-70 preschoolers were processed, with fewer problems showing up than in years past.

Testing included developmental checks of motor, speech, language and social skills; vision tests; nutrition tests; hearing tests; and dental tests.

The next Region IX screening for preschoolers will be in Capitán from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. Friday, May 9.

## Fire danger prompts ranger's warning

Fire and smoking restrictions are in effect on the Lincoln National Forest, according to Smokey Bear District ranger Steve Sams.

Sams said the fire danger in the Smokey Bear District was ranging from "high to very high."

People in or out of the forest area should be aware of the potential for fire at the present time, Sams said.

"When the winds pick up, there is extreme fire danger," Sams said.

The devastation to the Lincoln National Forest as a result of fires

in the early 1970s began with similar moisture and wind conditions, according to U.S. Forest Service sources.

Because the summer vacation season is beginning and turkey season will not be over until May 4, more people will be in the forests, Sams said.

Campfires are allowed only in designated areas of the forest at the present time, Sams said.

If winds are strong no fires will be allowed in the forest area, Sams

said. People outside the forest area should not dump their hot ashes after a barbecue.

If people are going to burn any of their property they should be careful to clear the area they are burning down to the mineral soil to avoid ash blazes, Sams said.

In times of high winds no burning should take place, Sams said.

Sams is concerned vacationers from warmer climates will still want to use their fireplaces.

Sams warns people who start chimney fires to use spark arresters, especially in high wind situations.

Though the Cedar Creek Picnic area and several fuelwood areas are open, Sams said the Lincoln National Forest is being closely monitored because of the present dry and windy conditions in the area.

## State reduces paving grant for Ruidoso Downs

The New Mexico State Highway Department informed the Village of Ruidoso Downs that the state would not be able to carry out a cooperative road paving program as proposed, according to Ruidoso Downs village clerk Wilma Webb.

The original agreement called for the state to supply the Downs with a grant of \$150,000, according to Webb.

However, the state informed officials at the Downs they could allocate just \$25,000 for a cooperative road paving program in the Downs, according to Webb.

Webb said the Ruidoso Downs Trustees were looking at other ways to get more funds for the road paving project.

The trustees met Monday.

In other business Monday, the

trustees:

—Accepted the bid of Wingfield and Company of Roswell for a village audit.

—Postponed accepting bids on a Wood Lane waterline until they obtained more information.

—Discussed new sewer lines.

—Approved a new sign at Ikard-Newsom.

—Approved a proposal to support

the Ruidoso Downs Ladies Auxiliary arts and crafts sale the Friday, Saturday and Sunday before Labor Day.

—Discussed a covered dish supper on May 5 at All-American Park in support of the Ruidoso Downs clean-up campaign.

—Approved a Redman Lounge sign near Fantasy Mountain.

## Domestic violence is an increasing problem

As you are reading this, one or more incidents of domestic violence are likely to occur somewhere in the United States. FBI statistics indicate that such violent episodes occur once every 18 seconds.

Ruidoso Police Chief Richard Swenor said recently that it is happening right here in Ruidoso.

Statistics gathered by the National Coalition Against Domestic Violence (NCADV) show that one in 10 American women are beaten by the men in their lives every year. Men, too, are sometimes victims of spouse abuse; but in 97 percent of the cases reported to police women are abused.

Attacks by husbands on wives cause more injuries requiring medical treatment than rapes, muggings and automobile accidents combined, according to a report by the National Center for Disease Control.

The ultimate result of family violence is death, and studies indicate that 40 percent of all female

murder victims are killed by a husband or lover.

This crime, one that occurs behind closed doors in all types of neighborhoods, reaches out to affect all of society.

Children in violent homes are often battered, too, and recent studies show that these same youngsters grow up to become violent members of society—the NCADV reports that over 85 percent of men in prison and 90 percent of rapists grew up in violent homes.

Taxpayers bear part of the burden with 20 percent of police deaths and most police injuries resulting from domestic calls—their most frequent and most dangerous.

Swenor said those alarming statistics are borne out by recent trends in the village.

In a status report that Swenor submitted to the Ruidoso Village Council for June through December 1985, he said:

"...although not a crime unto itself, incidents of domestic disturbances/violence; marital discord, inter-family

disputes divorce/civil actions, child custody disputes continue to require an exceptional amount of police services expertise and resources."

Although present reporting procedures do not offer cumulative statistics on domestic calls, Swenor admitted that such calls are on the increase.

"My main concern is that more officers get hurt on domestic calls than anything," said Swenor. He added that his officers have had specialized training in responding to cases of domestic violence.

Swenor estimated the department receives at least 20 calls a month where violence has actually occurred, and many more calls for information and help.

"We really need a crisis center," said Swenor. He said a hot-line will relieve the burden on his staff, as well as offer the specific kind of help needed by a caller.

Since the police are unable to follow-up on the needs and problems of abuse victims, Swenor said the community will benefit

greatly from an agency now being formed.

Family Crisis Center, a non-profit organization, recently organized in Ruidoso with Arlene Brown, M.D., as chairman of the board.

First item on the agenda for the Family Crisis Center is a local hotline to be put in operation very soon. Victims who call that hotline will be put in touch with trained volunteers who can offer immediate emergency help, transportation and lodging and appropriate referrals.

Meanwhile, Swenor said his department will continue to provide as much assistance as possible.

"We need that hotline," noted Swenor.

## Cleanup is this weekend

The Keep Ruidoso Beautiful Campaign will continue this weekend with a massive clean-up effort in the village.

Campaign chairperson Sue Taylor reported that last weekend's clean-up effort was cancelled due to windy conditions, but all is ready for this weekend.

Volunteers will gather at 9 p.m. Saturday, May 2, at the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce for a three-hour clean-up effort. Trash bags will be provided and awards given to those youth who collect the most garbage.

Volunteers will be awarded with

a picnic after the cleanup, with hot dogs and sodas being furnished free.

Village sanitation trucks will be available to pick up large trash items from businesspeople and homeowners who participate in the cleanup. The village landfill and trash compactor will be open all weekend free of charge, Taylor said.

To have a load of large trash items picked up, call 258-4090. Trash collectors are reminded that pine needles must be bagged or bound and all loads going to the landfill must be covered.

## Students excel at science fair

# Chamber stands firm on '800' numbers policy; Boverie, Crocker, Durham, Hill, Shaw named to board

Talk of changing the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce's policy in giving out "800" numbers to callers was "disconnected" Wednesday when the Board of Directors voted to continue the current procedure.

Directors voted unanimously to continue the chamber's current policy of handling phone queries of lodging facilities in the village.

Chamber executive director John Jeffers reported that the current policy includes offering to send a brochure of information to callers, then offering specific information on the phone, such as the phone numbers of lodgers, only if asked.

"They have made a phone call to us and we feel like we owe them a service," Jeffers said.

Board ex-officio member Clabe Webb read a letter from members of the Ruidoso Lodgers Association that asked the chamber to reconsider the handling of phone queries, especially when chamber

employees give out 800 numbers. The letter asked that only local numbers be given out to avoid being "unfair."

Clabe called the topic of 800 numbers "quite a heated topic," even among the lodgers.

Webb said a "P.S." to the letter included a comment by one lodger that questioned the integrity of the chamber staff when giving referrals.

Board member Ken Moore called the topic "a very small issue."

"I see a lot of innuendos and I'm tired of it," he said. He suggested any specific complaint about favoritism be addressed to Jeffers and he should handle them administratively.

Other board members agreed that a major problem doesn't exist, and that the central purpose of the chamber is to give information to tourists.

"We're trying to please the tourists," Director Floodie Wilson pointed out.

Also during the meeting, board members learned of the election by

the membership of five new directors. Elected from a field of 15 nominees were Robert Boverie, Roy Crocker, Becky Durham, Buster Hill and Don Shaw.

In other business, the Board of Directors:

—Heard Director Bill Hirschfeld report that the remainder of the summer advertising budget—\$6,000—will be concentrated in the Albuquerque market.

—Heard Jeffers report on the outcome of the Tele-Auction. He noted that just \$117 of the total \$6,725 remains uncollected, with five items still to be picked up.

—Heard a report that plans for the Art Festival are on schedule. So far 50 of the 108 artists have made payment for their spaces.

—Heard a report that the Mother's Day picnic plans are on schedule. Tickets for the Sunday, May 11, event at Cedar Creek Recreation area are \$5 for adults and \$2.50 for children. Games are planned as well as horseshoe pitching contests.

—Heard a report on the Saturday,

May 24, Welcome Back Horsemen barbecue at Sierra Mall. Tickets for the event are \$5 each, which also pays the way for one horseman.

—Voted to have the annual Board of Directors' retreat in Albuquerque at Barcelona Court of Albuquerque the weekend of June 7-8.

—Heard Harvey Foster announce that Travel and Leisure Magazine will be doing a section on New Mexico. Foster suggested that the chamber contact the magazine for a possible article on this area.

—Heard member Barbara DiPaolo report on the progress of the Business and Research Committee. The committee is scheduled to meet this week.

DiPaolo also reported on the Economic Development Task Force. She said the Task Force has been asked to research the possibility of an expanded medical community here. In addition, the Task Force has been offered training in economic development by Texas-New Mexico Power Company economic development specialists.

### by Daniel Agnew Storm Birthday Of Our Father

After the stroke of good fortune that resulted from my saying a few words about our Brother, John Whippo Storm, I feel encouraged to say a little something about our father, a few days before his birthday.

Lynn Whippo Storm was born in Rochester, Pennsylvania, May 3, 1879 to Francis David Storm and the former Althea Ellen Reno.

In those days, Tuberculosis was rampant back in the eastern states, and the only known cure was the dry high climate of the western states. New Mexico and Arizona became the leaders of the "Land of Second Life" to countless thousands who were cured of their lung trouble and went on to live happy and productive lives.

However, the southwest was not settled up very much in that time, so the people in various kinds of ill health headed for Colorado, "The Centennial State." (Colorado was admitted to the Union in 1876)

So our father's parents arrived in Denver, Colorado when their eldest child, Lynn, was very young. Here he grew up along with his brother Jerome Vincent Storm, Frank Agnew Storm, and his sister Leonora Maria Storm, affectionately known as Aunt Nonie, whom Uncle Jerome calls "The Greatest of The Storms" because she overcame physical handicaps, and lived a life of cheering and inspiring others.

While attending East Denver High School, our father met his wife-to-be, the former Bertha Cathering Kennedy.

Our father went to the Colorado School of Mines graduating in the class of 1902 with high honors as president of his class and also class poet.

This was prophetic; because although he was good at math and engineering, he was greatly fond of fine literature and wanted to be a writer, and remained always a poet and dreamer at heart.

He and Bertha Kennedy were married May 31, 1906 in Denver and raised five sons, John Whippo Storm, Daniel Agnew Storm, Marcus Kennedy Storm, Joseph Duffield Storm, and Lynn Walter Storm.

After working as a government surveyor and gold mine superintendent in Valdez and Juneau, Alaska, he went to work for a silver mining company in Copala, Sinaloa, Mexico. Here, the family stayed for a year and came to El Paso, and later to Lincoln County.

In the meantime, father became a geologist for the Sun Oil Company and worked for thirty or more years.

When he retired, he lived here at the place, where he was able to devote himself to writing.

Among his works are a book which was in the process of finding a publisher when our father was called Home by Our Lord. Other writings were a number of children's stories, a collection of the

folk tales of the Dinah Indians of Alaska; poems, and short articles and stories.

Also, he wrote technical articles on oil geology which are used in universities; and articles on suggestions for studies for his alma mater. These were published in The Mines Magazine. One article which received favorable comment was about the importance of studying more English in the School of Mines. In an article about our father in The Mines Magazine, it was stated:

"Lynn Storm was universally liked and admired."

On this dreamy and lovely day of light clouds and a balmy breeze singing through the new leaves of the river trees and the branches of pinon and cedar, the great blessing our father has been in our lives fills me with gratefulness; and his spirit is livingly close, here on the approach of his birthday.

Phillips was cited for driving left of center, said police.

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



### LAYERED SALAD

This salad is a favorite at family gatherings. It serves the whole clan, and better yet... it can be made a day or even two days before you plan to serve it. You do not toss this salad before serving. The layering of this salad gives it charm and lots of flavor.

Layered Salad (serves a bunch!)

- 1 pkg. chopped fresh spinach
- 1 lb. fried bacon, drained and crumbled
- 1 pkg. frozen green peas, uncooked
- 1 bunch fresh green onions, chopped
- 1 head of lettuce, chopped
- 1 dozen chopped boiled eggs
- 1 cup mayonnaise
- 1 cup salad dressing
- 2 Tbsp. sugar
- Parmesan cheese to taste

Layer the ingredients above in a large glass bowl or serving dish. Begin by layering chopped spinach on the bottom and continue to layer ingredients in the order given above.

After you have layered the boiled eggs, mix the salad dressing and mayonnaise together and frost the salad like you would a cake.

Sprinkle on 2 Tbsp. sugar. Next sprinkle liberally with Parmesan cheese. Cover salad with plastic wrap and refrigerate for at least 12 hours in order to allow flavors to permeate the layers.

This salad will keep for 3 to 5 days.

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

Plaintiff and the Parties who have judgments may be purchasers at the sale and apply in full or in part their judgments rendered to them.  
The Special Master will sell the real and personal property as a whole or in parts, as he may determine to be appropriate.  
The redemption period shall be thirty days after the sale as provided in the Summary Judgment.

The Governing Body of the Village of Ruidoso, New Mexico (hereinafter Municipality), hereby gives Amended and Corrected notice of the adoption of its Ordinance No. 344 on the 23rd day of March, 1986. The title of said ordinance is:

**AN ORDINANCE DECLARING THE NECESSITY OF ISSUING JOINT UTILITY SYSTEM REVENUE BONDS OF THE VILLAGE OF RUIDOSO, NEW MEXICO, FOR THE PURPOSE OF ACQUIRING, CONSTRUCTING, IMPROVING, ENLARGING AND/OR EXTENDING OF THE JOINT UTILITY SYSTEM; SUCH REVENUE BONDS AND THE INTEREST THEREON TO BE PAYABLE SOLELY FROM THE NET INCOME OF SUCH SYSTEM, PROVIDING FOR THE PAYMENT OF SUCH BONDS AND THE INTEREST THEREON AND OTHER DETAILS IN CONNECTION THEREWITH, AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF JOINT UTILITY SYSTEM REVENUE BONDS OF THE VILLAGE OF RUIDOSO, SERIES 1984, AND CONSISTING OF ONE BOND IN THE DENOMINATION OF \$100,000.**

The premises recite the corporate existence of the Municipality, the desire by the Municipality to issue Joint Utility System Revenue Bonds to improve and extend the sewer system of the Municipality, and the necessity of the Municipality to issue revenue bonds to complete the project.

The ordinance clause is then set forth:

**SECTION 1.** Authorizes the issuance of the Municipality's Joint Utility System Revenue Bonds, Series 1984, in the principal amount of \$1,250,000.

**SECTION 2.** Provides for the terms of said bonds, including date, denomination and method of execution and prior redemption of the bonds.

**SECTION 3.** Provides for the form of the bonds and the registration and record of advances.

**SECTION 4.** Provides for the issuance of the bond proceeds, for the creation of a construction account and the method of making payments from such account and for the disposition of monies in the account upon completion of the project, and further provides that the purchasers of the bonds are not responsible for the application or disposal of the bond proceeds by the Municipality.

**SECTION 5.** Provides for the registration of the bonds.

**SECTION 6.** Provides for advances from time to time to the Municipality, the method of recording same and limits of liability.

**SECTION 7.** Provides that the entire income and revenue of the system are to be deposited in a fund known as the "Joint Utility System Gross Income Fund" and provided for the maintenance of such fund including provisions for operation, and maintenance expenses, payment of principal and interest on the bonds, the creation of a Bond Fund, a Reserve Fund and a Repair and Replacement Fund and for the investment of monies in such funds.

**SECTION 8.** Provides that the bonds issued by the ordinance have a second, but not exclusively second, lien upon the revenues of the system.

**SECTION 9.** Makes provisions for the issuance of additional bonds, limits additional parity bonds, provides for certification of earnings, and prohibits the issuance of superior obligations.

**SECTION 10.** Defines the events of default.

**SECTION 11.** Provides remedies available to the bond holders in the event of default.

**SECTION 12.** Provides for the duties of the Municipality in the event of default.

**SECTION 13.** Provides for the enforcement of the terms of the ordinance by the bond holders.

**SECTION 14.** Provides certain protective covenants and agreements with the holders of the bonds including covenants as to operation of the project, selling the project, keeping books and records, providing insurance, prohibiting free service, inspection of records, no competing franchise, the use of proceeds from the bonds and compliance with the letter of conditions of the Farmers Home Administration.

**SECTION 15.** Provides for the payment of costs and expenses in connection with the issuance and payment of bonds and interest thereon.

**SECTION 16.** Provides for the deposit of the proceeds of the bonds issued and the disposition of the proceeds.

**SECTION 17.** Authorizes municipal officials to execute and deliver all documents related to the Bonds and to take all steps necessary to carry out the intent and purpose of the Ordinance.

**SECTION 18.** Is a repealer clause.

**SECTION 19.** Is a non-arbitration covenant.

**SECTION 20.** Makes the Ordinance an irrevocable contract with bondholders with certain exceptions.

SECTION 21. States that paragraph headings are for convenience only. COMPLETE COPIES OF THE ORDINANCE ARE ON FILE IN THE OFFICE OF THE MUNICIPAL CLERK, VILLAGE HALL, RUIDOSO, NEW MEXICO, FOR INSPECTION DURING REGULAR OFFICE HOURS. THIS NOTICE ALSO CONSTITUTES COMPLIANCE WITH CHAPTER 350, LAWS OF NEW MEXICO, 1975.







## Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE—"You need some new topics, McCaffrey," says the Man in the Corner, authoritatively. "You've been writing about the same things entirely too much lately."

The rest of the crowd at the lunch table agrees. "Yeah, yeah," they say. "Too many downers. . . You're too depressing. . . Try not to be so negative."

Sound advice—and well meant. But is that the whole story? Hey, nobody would like to have every day be sunny and cloudless more than the poor wretch who has to pound out a daily column. To a man, those of us who do that simply love to accent the positive.

But then, what we write is supposed to have some reference to the world around us—in this case, specifically to the world of the New Mexico statehouse. And things there just haven't been looking too good lately.

How would you put a smile on the face of the fact that the state's money problems grow deeper every day, while those who ought to care about them are taking care of their own interests instead? Should a fearless commentator be fearful of saying that is so, just because he doesn't want to bore his regular readers?

No, that's not what it's about. When you honestly think—as this writer does from the bottom of his heart—that things in government are bad, conscience demands that

you say so, even at risk of offending somebody. If anything, we've got too many political columnists, especially at the national level, who have for too long been too kind to the people in power. They don't seem to want to talk about the fiscal burdens on our national government; they apparently don't want to point the finger of shame at the man at the top, possibly because

they think he is so popular the ordinary reader will resent it. Besides, readers have their own lives to lead and are not always paying the strictest of attention to each and every one of the pearls we cast here. A little repetition may sometimes be necessary to get the message across.

Do you know what a "blue-ribbon committee" really is? We're hearing lots about such groups of late, as some of the candidates for governor tell us that's what they're going to appoint every time someone asks what they plan to do to solve such and such a problem. "Oh," the standard answer goes, "I'll name a blue-ribbon committee to study that subject."

Now in the first place, we all know that many of the most difficult problems of government are not subject to solution by committee. Some, you should not be surprised to hear, can best be solved by some lonesome soul thinking deeply about what needs to be done and then having the courage to get up and go do it. Some even think

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that's what a governor's for. In the second place, turning problems over to committees is one good way to defer reaching conclusions, and there are difficulties that just won't allow for that to happen.

And finally, there may not be enough "blue-ribbon" people in our state to be named to all such gatherings. The phrase, after all, is

meant to imply something very special about those who are asked to serve, and not all of us are that special.

Well, at least the candidate who has made this promise most often hasn't talked nearly as much about "task forces," which is just another group we promise to convene when we want to be a little evasive about answering the citizens' questions.

The cable industry is making laws for their benefit. Private satellite dish owners should and can organize and improve their situation.

My neighbor can now be a small home business and our family a subscriber to his expensive satellite dish.

Spring forward—fall back. Those are the key words for clock changes in April and October as mental, physical and every kind of clock must adjust to a federally mandated change of perspective.

I survived the springing forward OK last Sunday, but I haven't always. It's pretty embarrassing to walk into Sunday morning worship just as the preacher utters the final "amen."

One not so lucky newsman revealed that he and his family drove to church last Sunday to find a nearly empty parking lot, with a straggler or two just leaving the last worship service of the day.

That's when he realized that he forgot to spring forward. Once this guy sets his clocks forward though, he says he's all set. His mind and body believe the clock.

That's not true for me, though. When my alarm clock buzzed at 6 a.m. Monday, I knew that it was really 5 a.m., so I went back to sleep.

That set off a chain reaction setting the tone for the rest of the week—Bethany missed the school bus, Bud was late for work and I was late, too, since I had to take Bethany to school.

Even Pupcake, the family dog, hates Daylight Savings Time (DST), since we forgot to feed her in our mad rush Monday.

Things have settled down now, but I'm still complaining. Needing someone to blame, I headed for the library to see who really started all this nonsense.

This is one of those times when ignorance is bliss, though, because I have enjoyed blaming Richard Nixon for the twice-yearly time changes. He just isn't to blame, though, because the Uniform Time Act was passed by the U.S. Congress in 1966, during Lyndon Johnson's administration.

Since that legislation, clocks are set one hour ahead of standard time on the last Sunday in April, and set back on hour the last Sunday in October. Any state legislature may choose not to participate in DST.

One early proponent of utilizing daylight hours to the maximum was Benjamin Franklin, who came up with a plan to save on candles.

ings plan in 1907 in his book, "Waste of Daylight."

Although the issue was often debated in the British Parliament from 1908 until 1918, Willett, who was born in 1857, didn't live to see his plan become law. He died in 1915, and Parliament adopted a daylight savings plan in 1916.

With Europe in the midst of World War I, Germany beat Great Britain to the clocks, becoming the first nation to adopt a daylight savings system.

Since such plans are supposed to conserve fuel and power, other nations followed suit during World War I. The United States adopted DST in 1917, but repealed the plan in August 1919, after hearing objections from farmers.

World War II set off another rash of daylight savings adoptions with the United States setting clocks forward an hour from February 1942 until October 1945.

After World War II the choice of standard and DST was left up to local and state governments. The confusion that resulted from differences in times among various cities in the same state and/or time zone, was one reason for passing the Uniform Time Act.

Still some nations, like Mexico, France and Spain, remain on advanced time all year. The State of Arizona remains on standard time.

That takes care of the history, but I was looking for logical reasons. Some say that DST conserves energy, but I'm not sure how or even how much.

Asking around, I found that most people are quite happy with DST, giving more time to enjoy being outdoors in the evenings as a major reason.

That goes along with what I read in the *Encyclopedia Americana*: "During much of the year people experience several hours of darkness before they retire and particularly in summer months, sleep through several hours of early morning daylight."

My advice to those folks would be to get up earlier, enjoy the early morning sunshine and leave my clocks alone. After all, that sun is out there shining whether we're awake or asleep.

I'm already looking forward to "falling back" the last Sunday in October. I want my hour back.



## Glee Club runs in harmony

The young quarter horse Glee Club survived a stewards' objection to walk away with the winner's share in Sunday's \$183,000 Sun Country Futurity at Sunland Park after leaving the gates at more than 5-1 odds.

The 21st running of the Grade I event featured the 10 survivors from 90 head who faced off in 350-yard trials on April 11. Mr. Master Jet stepped off the top qualifying time to head the field, and was backed down to the 6-5 favorite for Sunday's final.

The Jack Evans Jr.-owned entry of Delightful Mary and Quickstep Lady went postward second in the wagering, with Glee Club the third choice of 3,014 fans on hand for the afternoon program.

When the gates opened, Bedouin Prince, a 35-1 longshot ridden by veteran Larry Byers, broke on top of the field from the No. 7 post. Three doors down, Glee Club was a half-stride back under Salustio

Burgos, with Delightful Mary making a strong bid from the two hole with Terry Layton in the irons.

Glee Club caught Bedouin Prince midway through the dash and matched strides with Delightful Mary for the remainder of the journey, pulling away on the final jump to win by a head. The final time was 17.87 seconds.

The victory marked a \$73,000 payday for owners Robert Haynsworth of El Paso, Texas, and Edwin Mayer Jr. of San Angelo, Texas. For trainer Fred Danley, it was the first accounting in the rich stake. The win also pushed him to a 3-race lead on conditioner Cliff Lambert Sr. for the trainer championship at Sunland this season.


"This has been a real good week for me," Danley remarked in the Sun Country winner's circle. "In the last two weekends I've won 12 races. We laid off a lot of horses over the winter and they are just coming back right now."

Jerry Lazenby's Delightful Mary upped her earnings past \$60,000 finishing second to Glee Club. The Oh Jet Van filly was the third-fastest qualifier for the Sun Country Futurity, and finished second in the Grade II West Texas Futurity at Sunland last month. Owner Evans Jr. is a native of Allen, Texas.

Sunland Park presents the final three programs of its 1985-86 season next Friday, Saturday and Sunday beginning at 1 p.m. each day.

Saturday's card is highlighted by the track's simulcast of the 112th running of the Kentucky Derby from Churchill Downs. The classic shares the spotlight with the Sunland Park Handicap, which traditionally brings out some of the top distance horses in the region.

Sunday, Sunland closes out the season with the 23rd running of the Riley Allison Futurity, a \$250,000 event recognized as one of the top spring stakes in the nation for juvenile thoroughbreds.

In Friday's main event, Tough Teddy and Make Out locked horns a few strides out of the gates in the 5

½-furlong allowance sprint, racing side-by-side around the far turn and through deep stretch with no challenge from the remaining five contenders.

Tough Teddy, who went postward as the 6-5 choice to win the race, had the most left as the two sprinters drove for the wire,

posting a 1 ½-length victory in 1:06 2 seconds. The win was the second this year for the Texas-bred son of Merry Battler, who has finished in the top three for all of his four ap-

pearances in 86.

Terrell Davidson trains Tough Teddy for Basden, a native of

Burselson, Texas. The victory was worth first-place money of \$1,380.


## Shaddai streaks

Shoe Bull broke very quickly from the one post in the 870 yard stake and never looked back on his way to the three and a half length win over Raisearig. The 3-5 favorite, Special Hank finished another half-length back in third in the field of seven.

The Jimmy Jones trained Shoe Bull has now beaten Special Hank three times this season. In his only loss to Special Hank, Shoe Bull broke very slowly in the Chaparral and failed to challenge.

Under jockey Casey Lambert, Special Hank got away clean from the six post in the Tijeras and was within three lengths of Shoe Bull on the turf, but never closed with his usual strong finish.

Using somewhat unusual tactics, Big Chill under jockey Steve Valdez wore down My Friend Adios to post a one length win in the \$41,400 Old Town Derby Saturday afternoon at The Downs at Albuquerque.

Known for his late running style, Valdez used unusual tactics by laying just off the pace set by My Friend Adios and Western Schley.

At the top of the stretch, Big Chill hooked up with My Friend Adios and the pair drew clear from the rest of the pack. They raced as a team to the 1-16 pole when Big Chill drew clear for the one length win.

My Friend Adios, under jockey Kenny Iles, ran a strong second, five lengths in front of the show horse Forever A Ruler. Diablo's Touch finished another head back in fourth in the 12-horse field.

Big Chill earned \$24,840 for his Old Town win to move his lifetime earnings to more than \$86,000 for owners Peter Beaudette and Don Rodgers of Albuquerque.

Big Chill earned his third straight win at the meet. The three-year-old colt won a pair of allowance races by coming from way off the pace this season. Included in those wins was the first lifetime setback for Eldorado Handicap winner My Friend Adios.

Big Chill covered the mile and one-sixteenth in 1:46.2 and returned \$3.40, \$2.60 and \$2.40 as an entry with Bail Me Quick. My Friend Adios paid \$5.20 and \$4.60 with Forever A Ruler returning \$5.80 for the show. The \$2.00 exacta 1-3 returned \$16.40.

## Handle down at Downs

A total of \$32,756,540 passed through the mutual windows during the 60-day Spring Downs at Albuquerque racing season which concluded Sunday. The average daily handle was \$545,942.

Old Town Derby runner-up and winner of the Eldorado Handicap My Friend Adios was named top development at the meet. The David Short trained colt won his first two lifetime starts, including the Eldorado, then ran into Big Chill in an allowance race and the subsequent Old Town Derby.

Cruisin' Prince scored three victories at the meet, two in allowance company and the big — and deciding — win in the \$55,300 Albuquerque Handicap. The Barry Germany trained horse also was nosed out of a victory in the Coronado Handicap by Bord of Hope.
