Council considers administrative reorganization

Assistant village manager Frank Potter Friday proposed a new village organizational plan to the Ruidoso Village Council.

During a special meeting, Potter told councillors of his efforts to simplify village organization and establish a logical chain of command. He recommended implementing the plan on a trial basis, but councillors were unable to agree.

Potter's organization calls for four functional divisions with the four directors reporting directly to the village manager. The plan calls for commissions and advisory boards to report directly to the mayor and council.

The four divisions on the chart are assistant city manager/operational services, city clerk, city attorney and engineering.

The engineering director as provided in the new plan would function as public works administrator, said Potter. He listed planning, contractual services, building inspection and utility departments under engineering.

A change from current operations would also be in placing the personnel department under the assistant village manager rather than the manager.

Village Councillor Victor Alonso noted that the current organizational chart, adopted in 1980-81, has "Frank doing everything and reporting to Mr. Hine."

Alonso then talked of having a mission and a goal, and opened that goal for a village reorganization would be control, flexibility and accountability. He questioned the desirability of placing utilities under the engineer, and suggested another functional area.

"The problem with that is it would necessitate another position," said Village Councillor Ray Dean Carpenter.

Alonso and Mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr. then questioned Potter on combining the village's two vehicle maintenance garages, and heard that one specializes in very large equipment.

Alonso suggested having one supervisor even if the garages remain in two locations.

Village Councillor Jerry Shaw agreed with having fewer supervisors, and suggested placing the Senior Citizens Center under the Parks and Recreation Department to make better use of village employees.

Village Councillor Larry Simon

advocated "one big support system" for warehousing, inventory and car maintenance.

In discussions of enforcement and animal control, Mayor Davis wondered why Ruidoso "leases out everything anybody wants to lease." He added that he knows of no other town where Emergency Medical Services is run out of the hospital.

Alonso then suggested having all village enforcement under one department.

Village Manager Jim Hine agreed with Potter's recommendation for a trial of the plan, but councillors were still unwilling, and continued with discussions of village organization.

Alonso questioned whether the Police Department is top heavy, and wondered about placing codes enforcement, fire and police departments in a public safety department.

"It creates another administrative position which we can't afford," said Carpenter.

In discussions on accountability, Potter talked of council meetings where councillors would hear questions from the audience and be unsure to which member of the administration the question should be directed.


Potter read aloud a memo he sent to all village employees in which he asked that, to avoid embarrassment, any item placed on a council meeting agenda be discussed before the administration and affected departments prior to placement on the agenda.

There may be a need for unilateral department involvement," continued the memo.

Mayor Davis finally suggested that councillors study village organization and be prepared to discuss it more at a later meeting.

Councillors also agreed to reconsider at the next council meeting the low bid on painting the exterior of the municipal five-million gallon water tank. It was learned during last Tuesday's meeting that the low bidder, Jeff Maul of Ruidoso, was unable to acquire a bond for the job. Rather than accept the second lowest bid at \$60,000 higher than the low bid, councillors voted Tuesday to postpone the painting and put the tank back into service.

Hine announced budget workshops for 2-5 p.m. Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday, May 7-9, in council chambers of Village Hall.

Ruidosoan McCoy charged in Cruces in drug case

A Ruidoso woman, Helena McCoy, was arrested Thursday in Las Cruces and charged with involvement in a cocaine and marijuana smuggling ring operation in Kentucky, according to a published report.

It was reported that Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) agents arrested McCoy when she reported to begin parole on an earlier marijuana conviction. U.S. Magistrate Judge John Darden ordered McCoy held without bail.

McCoy's court-appointed attorney said his client thought charges in the month-old indictment were already taken care of in a 1983 plea bargain. The indictment alleges she conspired with others to import unspecified amounts of marijuana from Belize and Jamaica beginning in 1978.

McCoy also is charged with possessing and distributing cocaine and marijuana and with helping to import 1,200 pounds of marijuana from Jamaica in 1981.

The 45-year-old McCoy also was charged in 1976 with importing marijuana, money transfers and other overt acts, according to Ruidoso News reports. Investigators based that case concluded that McCoy was tried in federal court after her October 1976 arrest at her Ruidoso home.

"I was under the impression that she skipped the country and then came back and served some time in the federal penitentiary," said Captain Dave Pfeffer of the Ruidoso Police Department.

"I'm positive that she got some federal time," said Ralph Wrinkle, former Lea County Sheriff who was involved in the 1976 investigations. He recalled that his department got involved in 1976 when a woman, Cathy Stoll Berry, whose arm had been severed was dropped off at the emergency room of the hospital in Hobbs. He said her story prompted an investigation that led to indictments against McCoy and several others.

The investigation that began then went from Ruidoso to Chicago and all over the country," said Wrinkle.

According to the recent published report, McCoy was among 31 indicted. The indictment alleges drug deals that involve marijuana loads of up to 1,500 pounds and a 6.6-pound cocaine shipment.

Forest fire north of Alto is quickly doused

In a high-stakes residential fire battle last Friday, it was man one—nature one.

A fire started when lightning struck one tree and skipped across another, behind the John V. Hall residence, deep in the rocky, hilly Enchanted Forest residential subdivision near Angus Hill.

Had it not been for the quick response time of the Bonito Volunteer Fire Department (BVFD), assistance from firefighting crews of the Smokey Bear District of the U.S. Forest Service, and calm afternoon winds, the area could have been engulfed by flames according to sources at the scene.

"There was no wind at the time, and that was in our favor. Because of the location, if there had been some wind, this could have gotten real serious," BVFD Chief Howard Puckett said.

Puckett said the fire call went out about 2 p.m. Friday. Firefighters reached the scene about 2:15 p.m. and had a "fire line" in place about 2:30.

Flames in the grass and trees behind Hall's house burned for about an hour, Puckett said.

"I guess I got here from Ruidoso about 15 minutes after my husband and I heard from a friend our house might be on fire, and the flames were pretty high," according to Tina Hall, who arrived at her house just about the time the firefighters got there.

The firefighters stayed late in the afternoon to make sure all the ashes had cooled on the woody hill behind Hall's house.

Puckett said ten BVFD and four Smokey Bear District firefighters fought the "grass blaze," which covered about 20 yards.

Smokey Bear District sources said because of dry conditions, the fire danger in the area remains high.

Top DECA students reflect on Atlanta trip

Two Ruidoso High School (RHS) students found a lot more than peaches during their stay in Atlanta, Georgia in late April. In fact, to listen to them, they might have found themselves. RHS senior Mark Langston and junior Amy Evans were both named "top 20 Distributive Education Clubs of America (DECA) national finalists" at the national DECA convention in Atlanta last April 22-26. A total of 18 RHS students competed with thousands of other DECA high school juniors and seniors from all across America at the national convention. To finish in the top 20, both Langston and Evans had to take a 100-question written test and submit to an interview from business people in the Atlanta area. Langston and Evans said they took their written tests with over 500 other DECA students. Evans said she had to stand in line over an hour before she participated in her oral interview.

Langston won his award in the "service station supervisory" category. Evans won her award in the "restaurant marketing master employee" category. Both Evans and Langston said they could not have achieved their success without the help of DECA supervisor Eddie Parker. "Mr. Parker goes out of his way to help you in everything. He has time for each student. We were motivated to do well for Mr. Parker," Evans said. "He has a great sense of humor and he is a great teacher. He is the best in the state," Langston said. "I appreciate him. There is no way I can do some things without him," Evans said. Evans and Langston said they did much better in the personal or oral interview portion of the competition. Parker films the students in a mock interview, and then has them watch their performance as preparation for DECA competi-

tions, Langston said. "He (Parker) talks to us, gives us books to study, and builds us up so we are ready for the tests and interviews," Evans said. Evans said at the beginning of the school year she lacked self-esteem. But Evans said after she did well in the state DECA competition, and proved she was capable of even better things at the national DECA convention, she felt like she was "roaring with an increase in self-confidence." Evans enjoys gymnastics and aerobics. She is a Students Against Drunk Driving officer and was selected by her teachers to participate in the American Legion Girls State conference in June. Evans said she has no idea where she is going to college but she knows she is going to major in business when she enrolls. Langston said he, too, will be a business major when he enrolls in college. He plans to attend New Mexico

State University in the fall. Langston enjoys basketball and hackysack. He is an officer in the RHS DECA program. Students stayed at either the Hilton Towers or the Marriott Marquis during the national DECA convention. Evans and Langston had a chance to visit Lennox Square (one of the largest shopping centers in America), Stone Mountain, Six Flags, and many other popular spots during their stay in Atlanta. Evans is looking forward to the national DECA convention next year. "I really think I can do even better next year if Mr. Parker will keep helping me. Maybe I can be in the top three next year. I would like to do really well for Mr. Parker," Evans said.

Tuesday will be nurses' special day

Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Hospital (RHVH) administrators Ken Moore and Katie Wickware have one message for their nurses. "We couldn't make it without you!" Tuesday, May 6, is "National Nurses Day" and RHVH has quite a few special surprises planned for its 42 nurses, Moore said. "We have the best crew you are going to find anywhere around," Moore said. Moore said RHVH has nurses from all over the United States who have attended a variety of colleges. Compassion and expertise on a number of levels are needed to work at a hospital in a small community, Moore said. Wickware, assistant director for clinical services, said RHVH has operating room nurses, nursery room nurses, recovery room nurses, intensive care nurses, emergency room nurses, obstetric nurses and medical floor nurses.

Nurses have either eight-, 10- or 14-hour shifts, Wickware said. Often nurses are called on to work for 16 hours during critical situations, Wickware said. Moore said RHVH is "well staffed" now with nurses. At RHVH, surgical nurses have the responsibility for one to four patients, day nurses serve one to five patients, night nurses have the responsibility for one to seven patients, intensive care nurses serve one to two patients and obstetric nurses have a one-to-one nurse-to-patient ratio, Wickware said. Day nurses are kept busy with surgical procedures and assisting physicians besides routine patient duties. Night nurses might have to deal with an emergency situation like a car wreck while the staff ratio is low, besides their routine patient duties, Wickware said. "Each shift and each specialty has its own stresses in different situations," Wickware said.

"The day in the life of a nurse is demanding, and life-and-death situations create a tremendous psychological burden," Moore said. "Family grief, patient anger, government regulations, paper work, emergency responses and constant pressure to be absolutely correct in the execution of their duties, makes nursing a field which depends on a very special person," Moore said. Because of the current economic problems at RHVH the staff has not had as much counseling to avoid "burnout" as Moore would like, but nurses do participate in seminars to prevent burnout regularly, Moore said. "Professionals know how to handle burnout," Wickware said. Moore said he and Wickware would use Tuesday as a special day to say "thanks" to all the nurses at RHVH.

Board members argue handling of Meal Care

Chairman Barney Waldrop opened Thursday's meeting of the Adult Recreation Advisory Board (ARAB) for the Village of Ruidoso with prayer, before opening discussions on Meal Care, an upcoming noon meal program to be housed at the Senior Citizens Center. "We need to sell the majority of our people that this is the right thing to do," said Waldrop, who questioned whether a survey has been made to determine the need for a meals program. Center director Bette Romans said Meal Care organizers and Verne Adams of Home Health Care of Lincoln County have researched the need. Alma Russell, a visitor at the meeting, said the Ruidoso Downs Ladies Auxiliary has provided 45 names of people who have said they'll eat lunch at the center on the days meals are served. Further discussions followed on donations, cost of meals, equipment and other details of Meal Care. "What I want to know is what time can the ones of us that have used it (the center) can use it?" asked board member W.O. Rucker. He said he and other players want to know when tables will be vacated for their games. Sybil Riddle, a member of the board, told Rucker that programs of the center should be for everybody, "not two separate groups." She declined to second a motion to set game time at the center for 1:30 p.m., stressing the

importance of fellowship among those who attend the center now and new members who will be drawn in by the meals program. Village Councillor Jerry Shaw said she'd like to see senior citizens feel free to go to the center for games anytime, not just at set times. "You can just take the key and lock the door on it," said Rucker, who compared establishing a time for the games with scheduling church worship services. "It would save the city \$53,000 a year," said Councillor Shaw, who added she would favor closing the center "if we can't serve more than 20 people down here." She reminded the board that the Senior Citizens Center is a public facility funded with public monies. Romans said she encourages dual activities, and said the doors of the center remain open all day everyday. Russell told of visiting the Artesia Senior Citizens Center, which operates on a tight schedule, but warned that a definite time for clearing tables can't be firmly set until after the program has served its first meal later this month. Members agreed to "wait and see" as to how games and events may be scheduled along with the meals program.

Schools seek special session to deal with fiscal woes

Ruidoso Schools administrators have joined administrators across the state in their concern over what effect will result from the state Legislature's Education Reform Bill. According to a prepared statement released by the New Mexico School Boards Association, Regions VII and VIII, association members from 18 school districts in an April 30 meeting in Las Cruces passed a resolution expressing dissatisfaction with several sections of the reform bill. "Members were vocal about their loss of local authority and were visibly upset about projected staff reductions in some districts," the release stated. "Several members felt that budget restrictions in the Reform Bill, particularly language mandating salary increases, would force schools to make staff reductions. The power for local school boards to make decisions regarding salaries, while retaining adequate instructional staff, has been rescinded," the release continued. The association concluded by requesting that Governor Toney Anaya call for a special session of the Legislature to "resolve some of the problems discussed." Ruidoso Schools superintendent Sid Miller agreed with the request for a special session. He, associate superintendent

Mike Gladden and four members of the Ruidoso Board of Education attended the association meeting. According to published reports, hearings on New Mexico school districts' budgets were postponed last week for at least two weeks because of uncertainty over how much money the state will have next school year. House and Senate leaders are expected to meet sometime in the next two weeks to discuss ways of dealing with expected state revenue shortfalls. Ruidoso schools could face a three to five percent cutback in funding, Miller said. That would mean \$200,000 to \$300,000 less for schools here. If the schools are faced with such cutbacks, personnel will have to be cut, Miller said. He hoped a legislative special session could avoid that possibility. Miller pointed out that if schools were given the \$2,200 promised by the state as a raise for each teacher, and used that money for raises and other school costs, cutbacks could be avoided. Miller calculated the raise for the 102 Ruidoso teachers would be \$224,400. That, combined with the five percent raise promised other school personnel, would bring in about \$300,000 for Ruidoso, nearly equal the amount that otherwise would be cut. "The only other alternative is to release personnel," Miller said. "That's the simple fact."

Texas Appreciation Day is set

Spirit of Ruidoso members were reminded during Monday's regular meeting of the group's purpose: "to be a non-profit organization to promote and encourage activities within the Ruidoso Valley area which will promote tourism." In keeping with that purpose, members have set Saturday, June 28, as Texas Appreciation Day. Pauline Witt reported that on that day 12 Texas families will be selected at random as they drive into town. Each chosen family will receive a yellow rose, a bottle of champagne and a chance to win the grand prize to be awarded at a celebration from 6-10 p.m. that evening in the Sierra Mall parking lot. Witt said the grand prize will include lodgings at Shadow Mountain Lodge, gasoline from Ruidoso Chevron, and several meals at local restaurants. She said more winners may be possible if more prizes are collected. The celebration will include a cash bar, food and game booths and dancing to country and western music. Service clubs and organizations may rent a food booth for \$40, or a game booth for \$20. Merchants may participate in Texas Appreciation Day by purchasing a \$20 advertising package.

That package includes "I love Texans" flags and advertising in various Texas markets. Also Monday, members heard reports on: "Welcome Back Horsemen," planned for 6-10 p.m. Saturday, May 24, at Sierra Mall parking lot. Tickets, available at \$5 each, also provide one free ticket for a guest from the racetrack. The giant barbecue will include music by KREE Country Band and lots of prizes. "The Mountainmarchers' walking event that drew 314 participants last weekend. Walkers included 40 locals, and the rest visitors to the area. The next volkmarsch is planned for October 4-5, with planners expecting 700 people. "Lincoln County Show of Art and Sale, set for May 30-31, and June 1, at Cree Meadows Country Club. Charlie Kemp reported that 51 artists have been signed, and 3,000 invitations will be sent. "The Spirit membership drive, with a committee being appointed. The next regular meeting is planned at 5:30 p.m. Monday, May 12, at High Sierra Clubhouse. Meetings are open to the public, and members encourage everyone to attend.



Ruidoso qualifies eight more athletes at Lovington

Ruidoso High School's boys and girls track teams qualified eight more athletes for the state meet in Saturday's Lovington Invitational.

The boys have now qualified nine athletes for the state meet and the girls have qualified six.

In team competition, Ruidoso finished second in the seven-team boys scoring with 68½. Lovington won with 90. The Lovington girls also won with 101 points. Ruidoso was fourth out of seven teams with 34 points.

Warrior boys who qualified Saturday were Jeff Willingham, second in the javelin with a 165-1 toss; Clint Bob, sixth in the 1,600 meters with a 4:58.90 time; and Charles Smith, eighth in the 1,600 meters in 4:59.0.

The 800-meter relay team of Michael Williamson, Chuck Daniels, Matt Evans and Brian Davis also qualified, running a 1:33.4 for first place. The same foursome qualified in the 400-meter relay last week.

Warrior girls who qualified Saturday were Shannon Lee, fifth in the 110-meter intermediate hurdles in 17.50, and the 1,600-meter relay team of Linder Rad, Jana Johnston, Dori Stierwalt and eighth-grader Ardena Comanche, who were third in 4:35.25.

The Warrior boys showed their

strength in the running events, getting four firsts.

Besides the 800-meter relay, Ruidoso won the 400-meter relay in 44.48. Davis took the 200 meters in 23.1 (he ran a 22.60 in the trials) and Gabe Tam won the 1,600 meters in 4:38.51. Davis qualified in the 200 meters last week.

Davis and Tam came through with top performances in the 800-meter relay and 1,600 meters.

Davis overcame a Lovington runner down the stretch to give Ruidoso the relay win. Tam overtook Goddard's Kent Berryman in the last five yards to win the 1,600 meters.

Tam also finished second in the 3,200 meters, running a 10:02.94 as Berryman won in 9:45.3. Tam qualified in both the 1,600 meters and 3,200 meters last week.

Verlon Edwards, who qualified in the pole vault last week, took third in that event at Lovington with a 12-2 vault.

Other top Warrior performances

were Jeff Maxwell's fourth (131-8¼ in the discus, James Herrera's fifth in the shot put (42-10), Evans' fourth in the 100 meters (11.41) and fifth in the 200 meters (24.27). Russell Easter's third in the 300-meter intermediate hurdles (43.54), Mark Airington's fourth in the high jump (5-8), Ivan Scott's fourth in the 800 meters (2:08.83) and fifth in the 3,200 meters (10:54.58), and Rusty Shelton's fifth in the 110-meter high hurdles (16.36).

The Warrior medley relay team of Billy Harrison, Willingham, Sean Moore and Bob was third in 3:55.16. The 1,600-meter relay team of Williamson, Bubba Miller, Moore and Davis was fourth in 3:35.35.

"I think we did well," said Warrior boys coach Ronny Maskew. "A lot of kids improved their personal bests and I think we're right where we want to be before the district meet (Saturday, May 10, at Las Cruces High School)."

In girls' action, Lee and the medley relay team joined Sonya Urdiales on the state-qualifying

list. Urdiales qualified for the 3,200 meters last week with a 13:33 time. Saturday she ran a 13:58 but still finished in third place. Eva Montalvo took fifth in 14:03.1.

Urdiales just missed qualifying in the 1,600 meters as she took third in 6:09, a second off the qualifying standard. Teammate Hillary Heid was fourth in 6:22.45.

One of the big surprises for the Warriors was eighth-grader Chantel Bowen's 4-9 first-place effort in the high jump. Bowen's leap was just an inch off the qualifying standard.

Other fine efforts were freshman Linder Rad's fourth place in the 300-meter low hurdles (53.88), Cindi Harrison's fourth in the 800 meters (2:41.10), Stierwalt's third in the 200 meters (28.78), and Johnston's fourth in the 400 meters (66.7).

The 400-meter relay squad of Kristin Tidmore, Johnston, Stierwalt and Norma Murillo took fifth in 54.8. The 1,600-meter relay squad


Workers are getting ready to put the fencing up and putting wire through PVC pipes to connect the lights.

So about five years ago I met Howard and Catherine at the Canyon Cabins in Ruidoso. We had a grand feast cooked on the open air grill by Howard. I met their two daughters, Jane Thomson and

Mary Ann Wagner, and their husbands, Steve and Jim.

Howard that year came down and took color pictures of Solo Vino, the dog, and the calves and scenes along the river and looking up to the hills—and gave me a set. He came up two more times each time staying at the Canyon Cabins. He made a little wooden sign to hang over the archway of the yard gate reading: "Danny Storm."

Howard all his life had been a true brother to his fellow man, and a friend to all God's creatures. He often spoke of his Purple Martins that came every year to his place in Oak Hill just outside Austin.

He and Catherine had celebrated their golden wedding anniversary two years ago. They were married March eleven, 1934.

Howard had said to Catherine just Wednesday, April thirty; "I am going to send Danny some money to renew my subscription to the Ruidoso News."

Howard Wolff was fond of

Ruidoso and always looked forward to coming up here. He will always hold a fond spot in all those who knew him; and I will always treasure his friendship. We all rejoice that this beloved Christian gentleman has been welcomed into Heaven by Our Lord.

The Little Calf Named Lynette

Three Calves have been born to date close around the house; and it seems that each one is cuter still than the one before.

There is a young cow here that is much of a pet, with a round spot on her head just above the left eye. (Most all cows have markings from which you can identify them at a distance or a glimpse among the cedars and pinons.) This one I named "Spot Head."

She has a habit of waiting around the yard gate for a little extra tidbit of feed. And early evening of May second she came giving me a certain unmistakable look. She was soon to have a calf; and she seemed to say,

"I am going to need a little extra feed to tide me over." So I carried a block of hay up the hill near a spot she had been favoring lately. When I came back about sundown, Spot Head did not show up at the small barn at feed time with the rest of the cows.

As the years go by in my life around cows, over here across the creek, a close companion to trees, birds, the wind, the rain, the snow, the colors of the sunrise and sunset—in a way all by myself alone in a world of my own—When a cow goes into seclusion, hiding out to have her calf, there comes over you a feeling of reverence. There is something in the air that makes you hope and pray within yourself that all will be well, that this little life will come into the world without trouble, that you witness this thing that never ceases to be a miracle.

Just at dusk I went up the little slope from the house. Farther and farther through the cedars, feeling a little more anxious with each step. Then there was Spot Head

looking at me from behind a cedar. And sure enough, already, there was the tiny copy of herself drinking her milk.

There is something in this sight that makes you want to give thanks to God; and as I have done many times before I fell upon my knees and gave a little prayer of thanks.

This morning, May third, our father's birthday, the little heifer, twelve hours old first drank her breakfast and then lay down and practiced getting up. She lay down again and got up again. Then she gave a few jumps on unsteady legs, as if knowing what she would soon be called upon to do.

Spot Head after about a half hour gave a low call. The calf came close to her and the two started down the slope toward the creek, the calf leading the way.

Since the calf was born on the eve of our Father's birthday, I named her Lynette (from Lynn).

She is the very spirit of happiness and contentment; and like all the newborn calves, brings a blessing to the Springtime world.



Lincoln's water system a result of hard work

A new water system is now serving the growing community of Lincoln.

Residents of Lincoln kept the "pressure on government officials" to receive a grant for the new well, pump and storage tank.

Lincoln began their water project in 1957, before then water for the town was drawn from a ditch and hauled in buckets. In 1957 the

residents raised \$9,000 with refreshment stands for tourists and by having numerous enchilada suppers.

Attorneys Dan Brenton and Frank Boyce got a grant for an additional \$6,000 and located used invasion pipe (pipe used during World War II on the beaches of Normandy).

By 1974 the pipe and water system was "badly dilapidated" and Lincoln residents went to work to update the system again. A new well was dug and a 50,000-gallon

storage tank was added. New water lines replaced old lines and a six inch pipe was laid to accommodate fire hydrants "in case the town advanced enough to warrant the use of hydrants."

"The new well (in 1974) was in the wrong place, it was in a flood plain and when there were floods the well got badly polluted," Edward Penfield recalled.

Penfield, Maurilda Perry and Si Salas were "invaluable" to Lincoln's water system, working for a

good water system since its inception in 1957, said Rosalie Dunlap. From the beginning they worked very hard, they kept the pumps running and checked water levels day and night, she noted.

The brand new well, pump and storage tank are the end result of their persistence, Dunlap said. The new tank has been tied in to the old storage tank, making total storage capacity 100,000 gallons. The well is 175 feet deep and the pump is now setting at 162 feet.



'Cottage industry'

Hyman designs clocks from horseshoes

If Ruidoso businessman Ed Hyman has his way, the Ruidoso economy may soon be boosted by the impact of several "cottage" industries.

Hyman hopes that several small, home-grown businesses in the village can help to diversify Ruidoso's economy away from a complete dependence on tourism.

And the first of the cottage industries Hyman has in mind is ready to be marketed.

"Racing plate clocks" is what Hyman calls his creation. The patent-pending clocks are a combination of the rustic quality found in partially finished wood and the drama of the racing plates—horseshoes taken from Ruidoso Downs and Sunland Park racehorses.

Hyman explained that the racing plates are fastened to the wood, forming the face of the clock. Horseshoe nails in the wood indicate the hour of day.

Although similar in design, through various plate sizes and wood types surprising variety is possible.

Clocks have been made with ash, oak, barn wood, pecan and alder so far, and Hyman plans to try others, always searching for a wood type with "character." Some of the clocks are made to be free-standing, others will be wall-hung.


Hyman and several helpers have completed enough of the clocks to begin the marketing process. Hyman said a few local shops will carry the clocks.

Sales to shop-goers will form a small part of what Hyman plans to be a racehorse-industry-wide effort to market the clocks. He envisioned instances in which the clocks could be made from the racing plates of outstanding horses, such as winners of the All-American Futurity. Those clocks could then be given as keepsakes to owners and trainers of the horse.

Clocks could be made of the racing plates of horses of all levels, too, Hyman said. Just about any horse owner would be happy to have such a commemoration of his horse's achievements.



Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE—Jack Morgan may have saved our bacon. To understand how that is so, we have to flash back to the time when the 1986 New Mexico Legislature was in session. Senator Morgan is chairman of the Senate Finance Committee in that lawmaking body, and as such, he saw bill after bill that authorized more and more spending by the state move through his committee and on to the floor.

It might be worthy of note that almost every one of those spending bills passed Senate Finance by a margin of nine votes to five, with the majority there taking its voting orders from Senator Les Houston, a member of the group and the Senate's President Pro Tem. Strangely enough, all those who voted for these spending measures are the members who designate themselves as "conservative," while those who voted against were normally looked upon as being the kind of free-spenders we refer to as "liberals."

When those bills got to the floor of the Senate and House, they sailed right along, as they could not have done if the leadership of both houses had not wanted to see them enacted into law. Naturally enough, our Governor, who is a big spender by temperament, put his signature on almost every one.

But on the third floor of the Roundhouse, Jack Morgan and certain of the numbers-crunchers who staff the Finance Committee were doing some simple arithmetic. They were adding up all the numbers, which, it later became apparent, almost nobody else was. They got a discomforting feeling that New Mexico was on its way to authorizing the expenditure of more money than could be expected to come in.

Because Morgan, you see, had one doubt that some pooh-poohed. He expressed it once at a meeting in the office of Governor Anaya, attended by all the "big" in both House and Senate. He said he didn't really think the price of a barrel of oil was going to average \$22.40 over the period of the next 18 months, as Anaya administration economists were confidently predicting it would. "Nonsense," said our little Governor, or words to this effect.

"If those estimates are in error, it's because they are too low." None of the lawmakers gathered in the gubernatorial suite disagreed, leav-

ing Morgan all alone with his pessimistic beliefs.

To be on the safe side, Morgan acted. On the very last morning of the session he introduced a new bill, under the guise that is allowed when a lawmaker has access to a "dummy" measure. It authorizes the Governor, if pressed for money, to use up to \$15 million from the state's operating reserves to keep the state out of the red.

In the waning hours of the session, that bill passed the Senate unanimously and the House with only one dissenting vote, mostly because members thought passing it would do no harm.

Now we flash forward to the week just past, when those forecasters the Governor maintained might be guessing too high admitted that, because of the sharp declines in the price of petroleum products, they had estimated over-optimistically by about \$17 million.

The Governor had previously been given permission to use \$5 million in unappropriated surplus if necessary, but that alone would not have filled the gap between income and outgo during the current fiscal year. Since there are only two more months left in that period, it is also unlikely state government could cut itself, as Anaya has ordered it to do sufficiently to reach the total needed.

So the Board of Finance, which had to approve the action, gave the chief executive the power to tap the source Morgan's last-minute move made available, and thus to avoid unconstitutionally getting New Mexico involved in deficit spending.

We could draw several conclusions from this incident. One is the moral pointed out here more than once before. It simply reminds us that merely saying one is a fiscal conservative is of little utility if one then goes out and contradicts that statement by pushing government expenditures ever higher and higher. Let's put that one like this: "Not all who claim to be tigers turn out to be tigers when the chips are down."

To that we might add a simple addition: "Be like Jack Morgan, and prepare for the worst instead of the best. Life being what it is, the worst is what you will almost certainly get, especially if your line of work happens to be New Mexico State Government."


