## Spencer picks a champion

A hunch on an ugly horse nobody wanted may make Alto resident Jackie Spencer happy for a long time to come.

The horse nobody wanted, Big Bold Boz, easily posted a three-length victory in last Sunday's \$238,363 Riley Allison Futurity at Sunland Park.

Spencer paid \$14,500 for Big Bold Boz.

Spencer's prize money for the first-place showing was \$119,181.

"That just shows you the quality of that selected thoroughbred sale they have at Ruidoso Downs. They deserve a lot of credit for running a great sale at the Downs," Spencer said.


Spencer acquired Big Bold Boz at the 13th annual Summer Sale for Selected Thoroughbred Yearlings on July 26, 1985.

"I bought the colt from a cotton rancher in Carlsbad who was trying to put enough money together to buy a much better horse in Kentucky," Spencer said.

"Nobody wanted him. He was the ugliest colt people had ever seen—short coupled. I mean he was ugly. All my friends told me he wasn't built to run. They thought he was ugly," Spencer said.

"But I loved Bold Ego," Spencer said.

Bold Ego, who won the 1980 Riley Allison Futurity, as well as the 1980 Arkansas Derby and the 1981 Preakness, sired Big Bold Boz.

"To me Big Bold Boz showed courage. He was super macho, he was a strutter. I look for a horse with personality, that's aggressive, not timid or shy," Spencer said.

"I bought him and now he is good on his feet. He doesn't show much when he trains, but when he gets around the other horses in a race he loves to compete. And he won Sunday out of the 10 hole. Nobody could believe he won from the 10 spot," Spencer said.

Big Bold Boz drew the tenth position in last Sunday's race. The farther a horse is from the inside rail the more distance a horse must cover in a race.

"No horse in the history of the Riley Allison Futurity has won it from the 10th position," Spencer said.

"My jockey (48-year-old Larry Byers) ran it (the race) just right. He is the Willie Shoemaker of the Southwest. I just love him," Spencer said.

"We had the strategy to keep an eye out on number eight (Court Shot—who finished second in the race) cause he is a fast horse. Then at the stretch, Larry (Byers) signaled, and his horse pulled ahead. Can you believe we won by three lengths? It was great," Spencer said.

"And my horse is fit. My trainer, Terrell Davidson, he conditioned him just right so good," Spencer said.

Davidson earned his first stakes win in the 1986 running of the Riley Allison Futurity.

Big Bold Boz has run in three races and hit the boards three times—always in first.

"Wouldn't it be great if I had a horse that went undetected. That would make me so happy," Spencer said.

Spencer will campaign Big Bold Boz at Ruidoso Downs this summer.

## Police dispute Sanders' claims

Paul Sanders says he can save the Village of Ruidoso nearly a quarter of a million dollars a year.

Sanders, calling himself a concerned citizen with no axes to grind, last week presented the Ruidoso Village Council with a proposed reorganization plan for the Ruidoso Police Department.

A former agent with the U.S. Border Patrol, Sanders proposes to lower the Police Department budget while improving service and enhancing the department's image.

The proposal calls for reducing the force from today's 34 officers to 24 officers by a process of attrition and dissolution of some jobs. Sanders recommends revamping the overtime system, and hiring off-duty police and deputies for traffic control on race days only.

Deputy chief Jim Alston confirmed that the Ruidoso Police Department employs 34, however not all of that number are certified officers. He said the force includes 22 officers (including the chief, deputy chief, operations commander and three detectives), 10 dispatcher/jailers and two civilians (a secretary and computer operator).

Alston explained that the 16 patrol officers are scheduled four at a time for 12-hour shifts, working three days and taking three days off. He said they alternate day and night shifts.

Sanders suggests a department with a chief/investigator, captain/investigator, lieutenant/investigator, three sergeants, 12 patrol officers, six dispatchers, a secretary and a computer operator. His proposed budget includes funds to pay off-duty police for four hours on 70 race days.

He recommends an across-the-board pay raise for the remaining members of the force, using funds saved by cutting staff from 34 to 24.

Benefits that Sanders lists include a better trained and more professional department, increased drug enforcement and more attention to burglary and theft problems.

Sanders said last week that the Ruidoso Village Council, in executive session, was unwilling to discuss his proposal. However, during the last week's council meeting, Councilor Ray Dean Carpenter suggested that the proposal be included in a budget workshop.

deliberations.

In Police Chief Richard Swenor's written reply, he said the proposal didn't warrant a response. However, he did respond referring to his "abhorrence of such indirect or surreptitious methods being used by an apparently uninterested or misinformed individual."

Sanders, who compared Ruidoso's Police Department with six other New Mexico departments, said the method he used was to contact the various communities, identify himself to the chief of police and ask for public information.

He compared population increases with department growth.

## Higher court may settle chamber-Otero clash

The Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors has voted to continue the fight not to pay a 1984 bill of \$7,257.94 for electric services from Otero County Electric Co-op that the board claims was signed under duress.

Chamber President Paul Crown reported that the board voted Wednesday to appeal the April 28 decision of a District Court jury in favor of Otero. He said the chamber vote was not unanimous, but all members agreed to back whatever the majority decided.

Crown said chamber board members felt the jury should have taken into account all the information presented. Crown said the jury was instructed not to consider cer-

tain evidence by District Judge Robert M. Doughty, who presided over the case.

The appeal will go to New Mexico Supreme Court, Crown said. Attorney for the chamber, Ron Harris, was unavailable for comment.

The chamber does not dispute that chamber officials at the time agreed to pay the bill for past due electric bills at Eagle Creek Ski Area, but the chamber does maintain that the agreement was made under duress with no other alternative available, Crown said.

Crown explained that when the agreement was made, the 1984 U.S. Open Ski Race was about to begin, and a disconnection of electricity would have caused cancellation of

the event which may have resulted in lawsuits from ski racers, promoters and others.

Crown said it will take at least six months for the court system to find

whether grounds for an appeal exist.

If he had been faced with the decision past chamber officials faced in 1984, Crown said he would have acted the same way.

## McKnight relative seeks grand jury murder probe

Terri Bussey, sister of Judy McKnight who, along with her husband Thomas P. "Cotton" McKnight, was slain in November 1984, said Tuesday she's tired of waiting for the state Attorney General (AG) to end his eight-month long investigation into her sister's death.

Bussey is taking matters in her own hands now by circulating a petition calling for a grand jury to investigate the case.

The petition, which will be presented to District Judge Richard A. Parsons, also asks that an attorney "other than the District Attorney and/or the Attorney General or their assistants" present the case to the grand jury.

Although just 200 registered voters' signatures are required to present the petition, Bussey said she plans to have 400 or more citizens sign the document.

"We're going to push this thing through," said Bussey. She said Cotton's brother, Pancho McKnight, has indicated his support for getting the case into the courts.

The McKnight's bodies were discovered in mid-November 1984, on the kitchen floor of their Picacho ranch home. Both had been shot.

The Lincoln County Sheriff's Department and the New Mexico State Police worked jointly on the murder case in late 1984, but by January 1985, the State Police removed themselves from the case.

Last September, 10 months after the grisly discovery was made in the isolated ranchhouse, the AG's office took control of the case after 12th Judicial District Attorney James Weldon and Lincoln County Sheriff Tom Sullivan had separate press conferences in which differences between the two agencies were aired.

Also, as a result of the two conferences, Judge Parsons called a halt to public disclosure by issuing a gag order constraining investigators and attorneys from discussing the case.

And that was the end of that, according to Bussey, who said the AG's office has had "no comment" for the past eight months.

Last August, in his news release, the sheriff revealed that he had sufficient evidence to bring the murder case to trial, however Weldon refused to give the go-ahead for an arrest warrant.

"They (Sheriff's Department) have the case solved as far as I'm concerned," said Bussey, who said she knows who they suspect and is convinced that person (or persons) is guilty.

Bussey praised the sheriff's staff for their time and effort on the investigation. She said members of the sheriff's staff have always taken the time to talk with her.

She wondered why the DA was unwilling to take the case before a grand jury.

"I'm not going to give up," stated Bussey.

"Two people have been murdered and somebody needs to pay," she added.



## Fire threat "extremely high"

population figures taken from the 1980 and adjusted 1982 census—asserting that Ruidoso has an average daily population of 14,000 to 16,000.

Sanders, in a reply to Swenor's response, said his 1985 population figures were taken from village hall as of October 1985.

Sanders also compared Ruidoso's \$1,024,303 police budget with other towns:

- Artesia—\$904,000
- Carlsbad—\$1,700,000
- Deming—\$675,000
- Grants—\$550,707
- Los Alamos—\$1,162,875
- Portales—\$671,000

He reported that Carlsbad and Los Alamos budgets include animal control and detention, and noted that Portales has 4,000 to 5,000 university students in addition to their recorded population.

Swenor also checked budget figures for the six towns, and came up with slightly higher figures.

Swenor said comparing Ruidoso to "stable population com-

munities" is unjustifiable. He talked of seasonal, population and traffic influxes as well as different environmental and weather conditions.

He said Ruidoso exceeds the six communities in "annual motor vehicle accidents and other law enforcement dilemmas." He explained differences in organization among the municipalities.

Sanders continues to stand by his facts, and Swenor to disagree, and both have indicated their willingness to discuss the proposal further before the Ruidoso Village Council.


Other members of the department have voiced displeasure with the proposal, and Investigator Lanny Maddox spoke of the document during Monday's meeting of the Service Club Council.

"A man comes along and says he can cut personnel, increase efficiency and save the taxpayers \$221,000 should not be a police chief," said Maddox, who said he was speaking as president of the Ruidoso Sertoma Club and as a private citizen. "He is a genius; he needs to be the governor," he added.

"Statistics show crime is almost dormant in Ruidoso, and now a man comes along that wants to change that," remarked Maddox, who referred to the plan as "a lot of propaganda."

However Mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr. noted during a recent public meeting that citizens feel that they "live in a police state." He said he heard complaints from citizens regarding the Police Department.

"We are not effectively doing our work in law enforcement," said Davis, who is apparently willing to listen to a proposal purported by its author to change that.

# Village department heads may face budget battles

Village department heads began their quests for next year's funds Wednesday in the first of three budget workshops at Ruidoso Village Hall.

The Ruidoso Village Council heard from Virgil Reynolds of the Fire Department, Sandy Hall of Planning and Zoning (P&Z), Jimmy Neeley of Building Inspection, Mike Davalos of Engineering, Bette Romans of the Senior Citizens Center, Mary Lou Gooch of the Ruidoso Public Library and Tim Morris of the Ruidoso Municipal Airport.

Department heads requested from zero to seven percent in salary increases, and Councillor Jerry Shaw suggested the council should set some overall guidelines on salaries.

"I have asked you for guidance," commented Jim Hine, village manager, who noted that most village employees have had no raises in two years.

"I think that we have to look at some salary increases," said Mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr.

He proposed gathering all requests and evaluating revenues versus departmental needs before preparing a final budget.

Reynolds asked for increases for insurance, building maintenance, equipment maintenance and travel and schools. He revealed that his department got an increase of \$11,625 from the State Fire Marshal, bringing the state fire fund portion of his budget to \$68,008.

It was learned during Wednesday's workshop that a decrease in personnel in the Planning and Zoning Department also will lessen that budget. Hine explained that the position vacated when Hall was named enforcement officer will not be filled.

The P&Z secretary was budgeted at 50 percent, and will spend the other half of her time in the accounting area, said Hall.

The Building Inspection Department's proposal reflected a decrease since Neeley will be the only employee in that department next fiscal year. Last year he had a half-time plans checker, but Hine

said the cutback was initiated when building "fell off."

Engineering's proposed budget included a doubling in the salary portion, and Davalos explained that another village employee was recently transferred into Engineering, which is the newest village department, and was a one-man division until recently.

Changes proposed by Romans in the Senior Citizens Center budget included higher costs for a van driver due to increased hours, and \$1,200 for Meal Care.

After presenting a proposal with only minor suggested changes, Gooch asked councillors if the library can keep funds received for fines and book sales.

Even though councillors favored using fine and book revenues at the library, Councillor Larry Simon cautioned of keeping bookkeeping straight.

"It's real simple," said Frank Potter, assistant village manager, but Hine disagreed.

"It creates a bookkeeping nightmare," Hine noted.

Gooch suggested that funds could go through the Friends of the Library, a group that has contributed \$50,000 to the library. Councillors agreed to consider the idea.

Tim Morris, airport manager, announced that his department will show a net profit of \$16,711 next year. The revenue and expense projections presented are more than \$40,000 over last year's figures.

Morris, the last department head on the agenda, asked councillors if they'll report back to various departments as they deliberate the budget proposals.

"Where do we go from here?" he asked, and was assured that he'll be informed as the budget is prepared.

Budget workshops scheduled for 2-5 p.m. today (Thursday), May 8, in village hall include the Police Department, Shop, Solid Waste, Emergency Medical Services, Lodgers' Tax and the executive departments.

Friday councillors will meet from 2-5 p.m. to consider budget proposals from the Street, Water, Wastewater, Wastewater Treatment and Parks and Recreation departments.

## Church youth plan car wash

The youth of Trinity Mountain Fellowship will have a free car wash from 2 to 6 p.m. Sunday, May 11, at the old Pioneer Savings & Trust building on Sudderth Drive.

The youth have sponsors who will pay them on a per-vehicle basis, so the more cars washed, the more funds raised.

# P&Z welcomes Sandy Hall as enforcement officer

"Sandy Hall is Planning and Zoning enforcement officer effective today," said Paul Davis Monday as he announced his resignation to the Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) during a regular meeting.

Commissioners thanked Davis for his efforts, and welcomed Hall who has served as field officer for P&Z.

In Davis's letter of resignation, addressed to village manager Jim Hine, he said recent court decisions involving zoning and land-use have "created a monster," adding that village zoning and land-use maps need to be reconciled. He said discrepancies in the two maps have led to incorrect information being provided.

"In addition, recent actions and comments from the governing body indicate problems exist between the council and the P&Z Commission," continued the letter. Davis said he enjoyed his time as enforcement officer and thanked the village manager and assistant manager for their support and assistance.

Commissioner Don Shaw also resigned from the commission Monday. He said his term actually expired in March.

"I just don't feel comfortable having not been reappointed," said Shaw, adding that he has enjoyed his two-plus years on the commission.

When asked by P&Z Chairman

Mike Callaghan if he would reconsider, Shaw answered, "only with a baseball bat."

"I do think it should be a smoother process," added Shaw. He said he respects the volunteers who serve on the commission and "take a lot of heat."

Davis said Reed Stirman is no longer a commissioner, having missed three meetings without an excuse. Other commissioners wondered whose terms have expired, and whose haven't.

It was learned that Stirman's term also expired in March, and Mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr. said in a telephone conversation Tuesday that Stirman indicated to him that he doesn't want to be reappointed.

During regular business, P&Z paved the way for Ron MacWhorter to open a Chrysler dealership on Mechem Drive in a vacant building formerly occupied by Village Hardware.

Commissioners approved MacWhorter's request to rezone from light commercial (C-1) to general commercial (C-2) lots 13-16, Block 1, 3rd Addition to Cree Meadows Heights Subdivision. Davis said final approval will come from the Ruidoso Village Council.

P&Z also granted approval on MacWhorter's site development plans conditional on the village engineer's approving of drainage plans.

In other regular business P&Z:

—Approved site development plans for A.D. Powers to locate The Camel House on Lot 2, Block 11A,

Cree Meadows Country Club Subdivision. The site, on Mechem Drive, was previously approved for a hamburger chain, but commissioners learned that those plans have changed.

—Denied a front lot line variance for Mike Morris on Lot 1, Block 13, Town & Country North, Unit 1. Morris plans to build a two-car garage, and commissioners recommended that he reduce the size to conform with legal setbacks. Commissioners Martin Rose, Lori Griffin, Ken Carr and Shaw opposed the request, and commissioners Mary Underwood and Melody Vuichich voted to allow the eight-foot, seven-inch variance.

—Denied a request by Bruce Peterson, representing Helen Peterson England, for an eight-foot side lot line variance on Lot 8, Block N, Ruidoso Springs Subdivision for new construction. Chairman Callaghan broke the tie on the denial after Rose, Carr and Shaw opposed the variance.

"Essentially I'm being penalized for somebody's error in the past," said Peterson, who talked of "shacks down the street that look like Dogpatch." He said his carport will conform with the current structure, and not detract from the environment.

Peterson also stressed his desire to keep several large trees that would have to be cut if the carport were placed differently on the lot.

"What would Ruidoso be without

your trees?" asked Peterson.

—Unanimously approved a revised plat of parcels A, B and C, Phase III, Alto Alps, for Jim Wimberly.

—Refused to hear a variance request that was not presented in time for a site review. William Jacks, representing Mrs. Gene Duvall, said time was an element so that logs can be ordered for a custom home.

—Told Slover Cape that P&Z will accept whatever the Building Inspector requires to consider a commercial addition for his ski shop.



## Warrior tracksters seek crown, qualifying marks at district

The district title and more state qualifiers are the Ruidoso High School boys and girls track teams' goals when the Warriors compete in the District 3-AAA meet at Las Cruces High School Saturday, May 10.

Ruidoso already has qualified nine boys and six girls for the state meet Friday and Saturday, May 16-17. Saturday's meet will start at 9:45 a.m.

But the Warriors hope to qualify more athletes and maybe win the district championship.

"We're the favorites for the title, as far as I'm concerned," said Warrior head boys coach Ronny Maskew.

"I think the girls will do well," said Warrior head girls coach Jim Hofstad. "I think they really want to do well in this meet."

The Warrior boys finished second to Silver City last season, and Maskew thinks his team has a good chance of taking it all this time.

"Silver City could be tough and Cobre could be right there, too," he said.

Ruidoso should be favored in the 1,600 meters and 3,200 meters when state qualifier Gabe Tam will compete. Ruidoso's Jeff Willingham (another state qualifier) should be the favorite in the javelin with a 175-7 best.

Tam has bests of 9:51.0 in the 3,200 meters and 4:30.72 in the 1,600 meters this season. Charles Smith and Clint Bob will join Tam in the

1,600 meters. Both have qualified for state in that event.

Ivan Scott could score points in the 800 meters and 3,200 meters.

Ruidoso also should be tough in the 400-meter relay, 800-meter relay, 200 meters (with state qualifier Brian Davis) and the pole vault with Verlon Edwards, another state qualifier.

Davis, Michael Williamson, Chuck Daniels and Matt Evans will run both short relay events. Ruidoso qualified in both events with a best of 44.33 in the 400-meter relay and a best of 1:32.93 in the 800-meter relay.

Davis and Williamson will join Bubba Miller and Rusty Shelton in the 1,600-meter relay.

The 1,600-meter relay could be critical for Ruidoso.

Silver City has run a 3:28.14 in that event, while the Warriors' best time is 3:33.49.

But Maskew is optimistic.

"I think we can run a 3:27 or 3:28 if we don't have poor passes and we run like we're capable of running," he said.

Other athletes who have good chances of scoring and qualifying for state include discus-shot putter Jeff Maxwell, shot putter James Herrera, intermediate hurdler Russell Easter, Shelton in the intermediate hurdlers and 110-meter high hurdles and high jumper Mark Airington.

Freshman 300-meter hurdler Linder Rad and 800-meter runner Cindi Harrison could be the girls' best hopes for first places.

Rad has run a 51.0 in the hurdles (a school record) and Hofstad thinks she can run faster.

Harrison ran a 2:41.10 in the 800 meters last week, ranking her among the district leaders.

Ruidoso should be strong in the distance races with Sonya Urdiales leading the way.

Urdiales has already qualified for state in the 3,200 meters. She will run the 1,600 meters and the 800-meter leg on the medley relay Saturday.

Tabby Williamson, Hillary Heid and Eva Montalvo also could score in the distance events.

Shannon Lee (a state-meet qualifier) should do well in the 100-meter hurdles. Discus thrower Rachel Wilson, eighth-grade high

jumper Chantel Bowen, 800-meter runner Linda Orosco, eighth-grade 3,200-meter runner Ardena Comanche, sprinter-long jumper Norma Murillo and sprinter Dari Stierwalt also could score points.

Last week Comanche ran on the Warrior medley relay team which qualified for state in 3:45.29.


However, Urdiales will take Comanche's place this week, joining Stierwalt, Rad and Jana Johnston.

The school district plans to have the seating increased on both sides of the field, install a complete new lighting system, increase the size of the press box and possibly install new walkways, concession stands and bathroom facilities.

Bids on the projects may be made Tuesday, May 13, with work starting in the latter part of June, according to Ruidoso School District superintendent Sid Miller.

"We plan to increase the seating capacity," Miller said. "We possibly might double the capacity if there's enough money," Miller said. "Right now the home side holds at the most 1,500 and the visitors' side at the most 500."

The visitors' seating is old and unsafe, according to Miller. And anyone who has seen it knows that more seating on that side is needed.

The home side also has been overcrowded in recent seasons. With the Warrior football team's recent success, many people have attended the games and a large number of them have had to watch the games on either side of the stands.

Improved lighting also would be nice. I've taken hundreds of photos at football games in the stadium and the lighting just has not been as good as it was at some other stadiums.

"The press box might be tripled in size," Miller said. "But again, that might depend on how much money we have."

The present press box is really too small for coaches, game announcers, radio broadcasters and sometimes even sportswriters to pile into.

Increasing its size even a minimal amount would make things more spacious for people who needed to be in the press box.

So I'm looking forward to the improvements slated for the stadium over the summer.

Covering football in the stadium has always been nice, but the improvements would make it even nicer.







## Utility council improves one-call system

Amendments to the "one-call excavation ordinance" passed last week by the Ruidoso Village Council will save utility companies as many as 14 man-hours a day every day, said Paul Crown, Utility Council president, during a regular meeting Wednesday.

"This has been a long time in developing," said Crown, who wants all area contractors to be very familiar with the new provisions as soon as possible.

"The one-call system is as much to protect contractors as utility companies," said Crown.

The ordinance requires that anyone planning to excavate within the Village of Ruidoso and a five-mile area around the village, notify the one-call dispatcher (258-KATY) 48 hours before digging. The dispatcher then notifies all utility companies of the place, time and type of excavation so that any

underground utilities may be identified and marked.

One amendment to the ordinance calls for the excavator to "locate with visible markings the areas of the proposed dig."

Crown said Wednesday that callers currently identify a proposed excavation simply by an address, causing each utility to spend considerable time searching for underground cables. With a clearly defined area to consider, he said utility company representatives will save on time and the amount of paint required to mark their cables.

In the past problems have occurred when a job lasts so long that the utility company markings have washed away, said Crown.

The amended ordinance requires excavators to re-notify the one-call system of any project that will continue after seven days, and again for each seven-day period

thereafter.

Crown, as Utility Council president, is also authorized to file complaints in Municipal Court.

"We owe individual contractors in town the courtesy of letting them know what the law is," said Crown, and members of the council agreed to be lenient until they get the word out on new requirements.

Crown said he plans to ask the Ruidoso Downs Board of Trustees to add the new reporting requirements to their municipal ordinance, too.

Although this doesn't prevent contractors from having to pay damages, Crown said it benefits everyone involved when excavators report on proposed digs, and municipalities and companies respond by marking their buried utility lines.

When in doubt, call 258-KATY, before digging, advised Crown.

## Community service is an alternative to jail time

Community service as an alternative to fines and some jail time for misdemeanor offenders is working even better than expected, according to Laura Ashley, a volunteer who coordinates the program.

Municipal Judge John Cupp told the Ruidoso Village Council last year that community service sentences benefit the community and the offender. He asked for help in putting offenders assigned to the project to work.

"That's when I got involved," said Ashley. Since a Community Service Committee organized late last year, Ashley has spent 30 to 40 hours a week implementing the project.

Ashley said the process of coordinating jobs with offenders' assigned hours is working very well. Although she recently became a full-time member of the Ruidoso Police Department as a dispatcher, Ashley said she plans to continue spending a day or two each week on the community service program.

She meets once a month with offenders assigned through the various courts and considers each individual's physical and mental capabilities as well as the number of hours to be worked and the times available for work before matching an offender with a job.

Currently assigned hours total 358, with 640 hours on-hand until the offenders complete jail-time that must be served before working the hours, according to Ashley.

Ashley attributes the success of the young program to the cooperation she's received from the courts as well as citizens and organizations utilizing the workers. The coordination requires a great deal of clerical support, and Ashley said Municipal Court Clerk Debbie Floyd has spent many hours of volunteer time on the project.

"She's been right there every time," said Ashley. Ashley says she oversees community service sentences from Judge Cupp, Magistrate Judge J.K.

"Jim" Wheeler, Judge J. Roy Cordova of Alamogordo, the 12th Judicial Court, adult parole/probation officer Rick Austin and children's probation officer Jane Farnell.

"I've never had any from the Ruidoso Downs Municipal Court," noted Ashley.

The Ruidoso Care Center, the Village of Ruidoso, Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Hospital and Home Health Services of Lincoln County are among the users of the service.

"We have had no complaints—just praise—for our workers," remarked Ashley. "We haven't had a single offender that caused any problems on the job," she added.

"I feel like it's so worthwhile to the community as well as beneficial to the whole judicial system," said Ashley.

Benefits of the alternative sentencing for minor offenses include money savings to those utilizing the hours of service, said Ashley. She recalled a woodcutter who fulfilled a six-and-a-half hour sentence by removing a very large tree for the village. Ashley said the value of the job was estimated at \$600.

"That's the biggest savings we've seen," she said.

She listed benefits in increased self-esteem for offenders. Another benefit for some offenders is being able to work off a fine they haven't the money to pay, or being able to work at a regular job instead of spending further time in jail.

"Offenders feel good about being able to work it off," said Ashley. She said one worker completed an assignment at Home Health Services, but volunteered more time after observing the needs for volunteer help.

Ashley said she is always happy to hear of jobs for community service workers, but needs to know how long a job will take before making an assignment.







## Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE—Jimmy Carter got in trouble for using the word "malaise" to describe the spirit of the nation back in the summer of 1979. Leaders, he was told, are expected to accent the positive, not talk about the down side.

That limitation doesn't apply to columnists, so maybe we can get away with stealing Carter's word. It seems to fit the way New Mexicans feel as we get ready to start the summer of 1986.

What the word itself means, if you extrapolate a little from the purely dictionary definition, is the sort of feeling of discomfort generated by awareness of an indefinite and ill-defined weakness. It is as though we are positive that something is lacking but can't be sure exactly what.

If you follow the course of New Mexico politics, you have to admit there's reason for lots of that feeling at just this moment.

Let's skip quickly over the well-known inadequacies of the state's chief executive. Those have been listed and analyzed enough by now to have bored all of us silly.

If there's a ray of hope to pierce the gloom of malaise, it isn't going to come from that quarter. So let's look somewhere else. But where?

None of those who tell us they want to be Anaya's successor in the governor's job has so far turned out to be a real barnburner, for instance. Not one of them stands out from the pack in such way that we can say the savior is at hand.

Mostly, these candidates seem to be campaigning on little more than the fact that they are decent, hard-working, honest citizens, which

may not be enough. What we need is someone with more than the ordinary citizen's share of vision, someone who knows how to break us out of this rut and get New Mexico moving again.

So sick is the state's oil business that the bankruptcies are only now beginning to make themselves notable. There are more still to come—some of them, the knowledgeable tell us, of companies worth \$100 million or more, and our state has never even had many of those.

In the face of that fact and others equally discouraging, what do those in charge at the moment propose? Have you heard a ringing plan of any kind coming from down there in Lovington, where Gene Samberson, the Speaker of our House and leader of the junior body, resides? Has the normally self-confident Les Houston, boss of the Senate, who is usually full of words on all topics, shared with us his plan for leading the state out of this morass?

No. Our "leaders" do not seem to want to lead us at the moment.

Perhaps they too are overcome by this free-floating discomfort. Perhaps they have not the slightest idea what needs to be done.

Unfortunately, what these high-ranking legislators have practiced during their terms as head of House and Senate is much like what Alexis de Tocqueville calls "administrative despotism." It is a kind of paternalism, rather than true leadership, and it creates passivity and dependence on the part of those who serve with them.

That renders all other lawmakers impotent, for one reason or

another, at a time when we need men and women capable of vision and of creative action.

Our elected officials appear to be

notably lacking in ideas about which way our state should turn at this juncture. Even more, they appear to lack the skills needed to turn ideas into reality; without that, ideas, in government at least, are virtually useless.

We have mere talkers, when what we need is managers—and the times are so tough that even the

talkers grow increasingly silent.

If Jimmy Carter had manufactured a positive, up-beat ending for his famous "malaise" speech, almost nobody would have criticized him for it. What people complained of was the fact it left them discouraged and down.

The same can undoubtedly be said for the ideas touched on here.

But Carter was describing conditions as they really were. So are we—and the happy ending hasn't yet shown us where it's coming from.

## Reporter's Round

Billy The Kid fever has reached epidemic proportions down in old historic Lincoln.

There is an underground movement among some of the fine folks of Lincoln to bring Billy's remains to Lincoln for eternity or until Lincoln gets a K-Mart, which ever comes first.

I usually don't rally to any public cause or support any organization but I am in support of the Lincoln townfolk who want Billy back in Lincoln County.

Bring Billy Home! Let the campaign begin. Bring Billy Home!

Of course it may not be that easy to bring "The Legend of Lincoln" home for a lot of reasons.

I talked to Tom Caperton, the director of New Mexico State Monuments, at his Santa Fe office the other day.

He told me Billy The Kid rates as a true historical and psychological phenomenon.

Caperton said in recent times as many books and articles have been written explaining why "Billy" is still a folk hero as have been written on the life of Billy The Kid.

I pressed Caperton to tell me why he thought with all the attention Billy The Kid had received near the time of his death, not one person preserved a bullet, a scarf, a knife, a lock of hair or anything from one of the most famous men in the history of New Mexico.

Caperton said the state had such a tumultuous history, the shooting, death of another cowboy did not cause the hysteria that is associated with the memory of Billy The Kid today.

Who would have imagined back in the 1880s "The Kid" would still be a well-known folk hero near the year 2,000?

In the 1880s people in the Southwest didn't even think ice-cubes would ever catch on, let alone a lonesome, misguided, unsettled youngster with a malocclusion.

The other day, late in the afternoon, I got a call from a sweet sounding young nine-year-old girl from Tularosa who said my "Billy" articles had inspired her to name her newborn goat "Betty The Kid."

They never taught me how to react to a situation like that in my graduate journalism courses. Though flabbergasted, I was still pretty flattered.

Here is to your health, young "Betty." To the youngin' who called me—as you go through life, don't let anyone ever get your goat.

Anyway, Caperton told me an attempt about 10 years ago to bring the remains of Billy The Kid to Lincoln really stirred things up across the state.

It turned out the folks around

Fort Sumner were not too excited about losing one of their great tourist attractions, and an expanded version of the Lincoln County War was on the verge of breaking out.

To make matters worse, some historians in the state had uncovered some documents that indicated sometime in the 1880s a Las Vegas physician had exhumed the "Kid's" grave, and departed with the remains for parts unknown.

The Fort Sumner people said there had been so many floods and so many soldiers buried in that part of New Mexico it would be impossible to know who was being dug up.

There are some expensive techniques, such as computer enhanced sculptures which are based on a person's skeletal structure, that might shed some light on the true occupant in "Billy's" gravesite.

But, if you haven't noticed lately, the state is broke.

Some of my sources in Santa Fe told me Governor Toney Anaya has personally sells sandwiches around the capital to help defray some of the costs of operating the state.

"Hey Toney, I need some roads in my district paved, give me six bologna sandwiches," a state legislator was heard to say the other day.

To move old "Billy" from Fort Sumner to Lincoln could be mighty expensive. Would Lincoln get the real "Billy"?

If it's feasible I still would like to see Lincoln finally bring its most famous "some time" citizen home. I still say (if possible), "Bring Billy Home!"

By the way, Caperton told me the New Mexico Humanities Council would probably be making its decision in late May on the "McSween Dig" (whether to grant funds for the excavation of a site that was characterized by a gunfight and a fire that involved Billy The Kid.)

Caperton said archaeologists have found that locations that might have been completely burned down tend to have charred artifacts which are actually better preserved because the extreme heat of the fire may have made them more resistant to the elements of nature.

If the dig is approved, Caperton and a specially trained team will begin the hunt for clues to Lincoln's past in about mid-July, he said.

Could be exciting! Let's invite Gerardo Rivera.

Yes, to all you people who have called me, I am investigating "Brushy" Bill Roberts, the man who claimed he was the real Billy The Kid until his death in 1950.

It is an incredible story in itself.



Alto resident Jackie Spencer surprised a large crowd at Sunland Park last Sunday—the final day of the season at the Sunland track—when her horse, Big Bold Boz captured the \$248,000 Riley Allison Futurity. Spencer earned \$119,181 in prize money as Big Bold Boz, ridden by 48-year-old veteran jockey Larry Byers, finished three lengths ahead of second-place finisher Court Shot. Spencer said she played a hunch when she bought Big Bold Boz though she liked him because he showed a lot of "courage" and "was super macho." To date, Big Bold Boz has never been beaten in an official thoroughbred race.

## Spencer's horse shocks Sunland in stunning Riley Allison upset

Inspired by Willie Shoemaker's upset victory in the Kentucky Derby, 48-year-old rider Larry Byers breezed to a 3-length victory aboard Big Bold Boz in Sunday's Riley Allison Futurity at Sunland Park. The win was one of the most popular in recent years. Big Bold Boz was following in the footsteps of his father - Bold Ego - who captured the stake in 1980 before going on to win the Arkansas Derby and Freakness the following year.

Bold Boz last year for \$14,500 at the Ruidoso Downs Summer Thoroughbred Sale. His impressive effort in the Riley Allison was worth first-place money of \$119,181. Although a 3-length winner in his trial division for the Riley Allison, Big Bold Boz raced as the third wagering choice for the 86 renewal of the stake after drawing the far outside post position for the sprint. Master's First Lady, a \$5,000 supplement, was the 2-1 favorite, with California-bred Court Shot third at 7-2. Court Shot took an early lead on the 10-horse field coming out of the No. 8 post with Joe Martinez

aboard. The colt battled Cliff's Place (6-1) and Big Bold Boz around the far turn to the head of the stretch, but could not match Big Bold Boz's stretch drive. As the field straightened out for home, Byers let Big Bold Boz loose. The victory marked trainer Terrell Davidson's first thoroughbred stakes win, and Byers first accounting in the Riley Allison, which has been run at Sunland since 1964. "Watching Shoemaker ride in the Kentucky Derby really inspired me," Byers commented after the race. "This race was just a really great win for me. I probably have the same feeling Shoemaker had in winning the Derby." Owner Jacqueline Spencer said she purchased Big Bold Boz last summer because "he was so macho. He wasn't very pretty, but he showed a lot of guts and courage and I liked that. "We don't know if he's going to be as good as his daddy, but I'm hoping we get a chance to find out. I'd love to take him to Kentucky to run. Especially in the Derby." Spencer said Big Bold Boz will campaign at Ruidoso Downs this summer. "That's where I live and that is the only place I'm going to run him," she added.

## Curribot Wins

Curribot's stunning victory in the Sunland Park Handicap on Saturday capped an exciting program that saw 4,069 fans wager nearly \$74,000 on Ferdinand's upset win in the Kentucky Derby.

Sunland Park conducted its second simulcast of the Run for the Roses as the focal point of "Derby Day" Saturday, offering win, place, show and quinela wagering on the classic. The total handle for the simulcast was \$73,834. The wagering surpassed Sunland's inaugural simulcast last year, when the same number of handicappers bet \$71,461. Sunland finished the day with a total handle of \$437,703, ranking among the top 50 best wagering days since the track opened in 1959.

Curribot, Sunland's Horse of the Meet for the past two seasons, was backed down to the 2-5 choice to win Saturday's featured Sunland Park Handicap with regular rider Casey Lambert in the irons. Makum Trimble was the closest contender heading postward at more than 8-1 on the boards.

Lambert held Curribot well off the pace to the three-quarter mile mark, as outsider Addendum matched strides with Makum Trimble and Mi Dewan around the far turn. As the horses moved into the turn, Lambert urged Curribot to the outside, taking the long way to the lead as the field straightened out for home.

He flashed his patented stretch kick in the final furlong breezing to a 3 1/2-length win in 1:51 2 seconds. The victory upped his lifetime earnings to more than \$377,000. Owner Juliana Winters of Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, collected \$10,170 for the 9-year-old gelding's effort. Trainer Doyal Roberts commented on Curribot's performance after losing by a nose last week in the Albuquerque Handicap at the same distance.

"He ran down the lane today like

he should have last weekend. Last weekend, when he came down the stretch he was just goofing off. He just didn't seem sure of himself like he did today."

Previous to his whisker loss in the Albuquerque Cap, Curribot had notched three consecutive victories, including the Mr. Vale and El Paso Times Handicaps at Sunland.

Makum Trimble drew away from a spent Addendum in front of the grandstand to finish second with Vickie Smallwood at the helm. Another five lengths back came Addendum, who was ridden by Jerry Rodriguez.


In Saturday's co-features, Coirs To Spend, a 14-1 outsider ridden by Joe Martinez, came from off the pace to post a daylight victory in the \$10,000 consolation of the Riley Allison Futurity.

Lightfoot Lil, a Muscovite filly who had been no worse than third in three appearances this spring, went postward as the 7-5 choice to win the 5-furlong sprint. Sid's Ego, a son of 1980 Riley Allison winner Bold Ego, was second in the wagering at 2-1.

Through the backstretch, Sid's Ego and Royal Platoon (5-1) battled for the lead to the half-mile mark, with Lightfoot Lil drawing alongside the leaders on the far turn.




