Engineers visit, study dam construction process

Engineers and contractors from throughout the United States were in Ruidoso Thursday and Friday for a seminar on the state-of-the-art construction techniques being used on the Grindstone Canyon dam.

Nearly 150 people, including an engineer from Auckland, New Zealand, participated in the short course on roller compacted concrete (RCC) dam construction. About half the attendees were from New Mexico.

The group toured the Grindstone Canyon dam site Friday morning.

Portland Cement Association of Denver, Colorado, sponsored the event, which included a session by Ken Hansen on the latest developments in RCC dams. Hansen has written a book and has done extensive research on RCC construction.

Hansen showed slides and described the seven RCC dams that have been constructed in the United States. He said four are presently under construction, including the Grindstone Canyon dam.

RCC dams are designed and perform like concrete dams, but built like earthen dams, explained Hansen.

"Nearly all the roller compacted concrete dams completed or at present under construction in the United States were initially planned as earth or rockfill embankments," said Hansen in the January issue of "Water Power & Dam Construction."

The main reason for the change to an RCC gravity structure has been economic. While the decision to switch to RCC has been made on the basis of comparative cost

estimates, the actual bid prices have confirmed the economic advantages of this relatively new type of concrete dam," continued the magazine article.

Hansen said the rapid placement that is possible using RCC construction contributes to the reduced costs.

It was learned during Friday's tour that the Grindstone Canyon dam is now 40 feet high, and progressing at the rate of four feet a day. Crews on the dam are working seven days a week, 20 hours a day.

The 10-hour shifts utilized by contractors on the Grindstone project were also used during the construction of the Middle Fork dam in Colorado and the Galesville dam in Oregon.

Hansen said the first RCC dam constructed in the U.S. was the Willow Creek dam in Oregon. He said that dam experienced some seepage problems, but the Army Corps of Engineers addressed those with post-construction grouting. The result is a functional dam for about \$10 million less than the cost of a conventionally constructed dam.

The low bid on Willow Creek was \$14.1 million and the Corps of Engineers' estimate was \$17.3 million (without profit).

Willow Creek dam is 169 feet high, and 433,000 yards of RCC were used in its construction. It was built in 1982 at a cost of \$19 per yard.

The Upper Stillwater dam being constructed high in the mountains of Utah is the highest and largest RCC gravity dam to be designed in the U.S., according to Hansen. The dam is designed to a maximum 290 feet height, and will require 1,400,000 yards of RCC, at an estimated cost of \$23.81 a yard

Construction on the Upper Stillwater dam is scheduled to be completed in 1987. The engineers estimated the cost at \$75.9 million, and the low bid in 1983 was \$60.6 million.

Hansen provided complete information on the Grindstone Canyon dam, which was engineered to be 139 feet high. It is expected to utilize

114,500 yards of RCC at a cost of about \$25.58 per yard. The dam is scheduled for completion this year.

The dam, designed to serve as a water supply reservoir for the Village of Ruidoso, will impound waters diverted from the Rio Ruidoso and transmitted by gravity through a 16-inch diameter pipeline

to the reservoir. The reservoir capacity is 1,500 acre-feet at normal water surface elevation, and will have a surface area of 42 acres.

Grindstone Canyon dam engineer Fred Burns of Boyle Engineering of Albuquerque also was on the program for the RCC short course. Burns talked specifically of design

consideration for Grindstone Canyon dam.

A session on construction methods for Grindstone Canyon and Middle Fork dams was presented by Ron Southard of ASI General Contractors of Buena Vista, Colorado. ASI is the general contractor on the local project.

Sheriff's Office, Joe McKnight debate murder probe methods

Joe McKnight said last week his \$5,000 reward has resulted in several possible leads in the investigation of the murders of his son and daughter-in-law in November 1984.

McKnight announced in May he had established an account at Valley Bank of Commerce and would pay for any information leading to the arrest and conviction of the murderer or murderers of Thomas P. "Cotton" and Judy McKnight.

In a recent telephone interview McKnight stressed that information must be forwarded to the New Mexico State Police. He criticized The News for not stressing that the reward will only be paid if the information comes through the State

Police. "I don't think the sheriff will do a damned thing about it," noted McKnight, who has been openly critical of the Lincoln County Sheriff's handling of the 19-month-old murder case.

Sheriff Tom Sullivan, in a telephone conversation last week, was critical of Joe McKnight

and Don Samuels, Republican candidate for sheriff, have done everything they can to discredit this office," remarked Sullivan.

The sheriff said McKnight wrote several letters to the editor during the recent elections in an attempt to discredit Sullivan's undersheriff, who was running for the Republican nomination. Sullivan noted that he was constrained by a gag order issued last August by District Judge Richard A. Parsons,

and unable to respond to discussions of the case.

"When the time is right I intend to call a news conference," said Sullivan. He said the public needs to know the facts on problems his administration has had with the 12th Judicial District Attorney and the Attorney General's AG office.

Sullivan said he'll reveal a great many facts about the investigation before the November general election.

Among problems Sullivan said he's encountered since the AG took over the McKnight case last September, is a lack of communication between the two and the State

Police who are doing the actual investigating. He said he was originally told the groups would have periodic meetings.

"I am disturbed that we have had no meetings," remarked Sullivan.

Sullivan said his office has given the AG most of the evidence they gathered at the Picacho ranch house where the two slain bodies were found.

"I wish I had it back," he added.

Sullivan confirmed writing a letter to the AG in which he said no more information would be provided until certain conditions were met.

The sheriff has been accused of never visiting the crime scene, but he stated adamantly that he did visit the McKnight ranch two weeks after the bodies were found.

"I was in Texas interviewing Henry Lucas when this happened," recalled Sullivan. He said the murder scene was photographed and video-taped, and he has seen both.

Meanwhile his office has assigned two investigators to work on the McKnight case full-time, and relatives of the pair are working on various levels to get the case resolved.

While Joe McKnight continues to

trust in the State Police and wait for his \$5,000 reward to pay off, Terri Bussey, Judy's sister, and Pancho McKnight, Cotton's brother, are pushing for a grand jury to review the evidence that has already been gathered by the three law enforcement agencies.

Both Bussey and Pancho McKnight were disappointed last week when Judge Parsons failed to call the grand jury they petitioned for, as provided by the State Constitution.

The two said Friday they're working with attorney Gary Mitchell on filing a "writ of mandamus" to force Parsons to act.

State pitches in \$600,000 for airport road

The Sierra Blanca Airport Commission (SBAC) Friday heard details of a \$600,000 funding allocation from the State Highway Department.

State Highway Commissioner Bill Lee and State Highway Department District II Engineer Lou Medrano were on hand for a special meeting and assured commissioners of the availability of \$600,000 for the engineering and design of an access road to the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport (SBRA) on Fort Stanton mesa.

Lee said the \$600,000 figure was "more in principle than in quantity," since no concrete figures are available on the access road project.

"We need to start someplace," said Lee.

He assured the airport commissioners that the Highway Commission and Larry Larranaga, director of the State Highway Department, are committed to the whole project and will help with funding in any way possible. He suggested the road should be paid for with severance tax funds.

Both Lee and Medrano proposed that Lincoln County act as lead agency to administer funds for the

road, which will be a county road. Lee said the Highway Department will consider taking the completed access road into the state system after performing traffic volume studies.

But in the beginning, he said it will be a county road.

Lee said there are "no strings attached" to the \$600,000 seed money

for the access road, but that it was allocated for determining the right of way, engineering and designing the route for an access road to the SBRA.


Medrano told the airport commission that the engineering and development should be contracted, and stressed that the project will go more quickly under the leadership

of the local government than the State Highway Department.

Although Medrano and Lee reiterated the need to place the county in the lead for the project, the SBAC was hesitant to take that step.

First Wednesday card this season features Rainbow Division battles

Ruidoso Downs Race Track hosts an extended horse racing schedule this week with 12-race programs scheduled Wednesday through Sunday. First-round elimination trials for the \$700,000 (est.) Rainbow Futurity are carded Wednesday through Friday.

A total of 326 juvenile quarter horses will face off in the 36 divisions over the three programs, with the top two finishers in each heat advancing to time trials on July 3.

Wednesday's card spotlights 110 dashers matching quarter horse muscle in the first 12 Rainbow Futurity divisions. First post is 1 p.m., with Ruidoso's gates opening at 11 a.m.

The 11th-race feature promises to be one of the toughest heats of the day as Kansas Futurity winner

Ronas Ryon goes up against Glee Club, who captured the Sun Country Futurity this spring at Sunland Park.

Glee Club will be making his first appearance since posting a close victory in the \$209,000 Sun Country on April 27. Fred Danley will saddle the son of Easily Smashed with regular rider Salustio Burgos aboard.

Ronas Ryon will be seeking the second jewel in Ruidoso's famed Triple Crown after posting a head margin in the \$398,000 Kansas Futurity on June 1. Only one horse - Special Effort - has ever managed to win all three legs of the series, which includes the Rainbow and All American futurities. Jerry Nicodemus is named aboard Ronas Ryon.

Wednesday's eighth race brings out the speedy Oh Jet Van filly Delightful Mary. Trainer Jerry Lazenby campaigned her at Sunland Park earlier this year, where she finished second in both the West Texas and Sun Country Futurities. Terry Layton will be in the irons for her bid at the rich Rainbow Futurity purse.

Romas Magic, top qualifier for the West Texas Futurity, takes the measure of Reflections Of Belle in Wednesday's 7th Rainbow Futurity trial division. Reflections Of Belle drew into the first consolation of the Kansas Futurity after tying for the final qualifying spot. The two speedsters will have to contend with Kansas Futurity finalist Lets Go Crazy.

Riley Allison Futurity winner Big Bold Boz flashed a devastating stretch kick to draw away for a 1 1/2-length victory in Friday's trials for the \$154,000 Norgor Thoroughbred Futurity at Ruidoso Downs.

A total of 64 sophomore thoroughbreds faced off in six 5 1/2-furlong heats for the Norgor Futurity on Friday, with only the top two finishers in each division advancing to the final on June 22.

Big Bold Boz shared the fastest clocking with Partners Bid, who posted a widening 2 1/2-length margin in the third division. Larry

Byers piloted Big Bold Boz, while Mike Lidberg was aboard Partners Bid. Both horses stepped off their heats in 1:04.3.

Trainer T.E. Davidson saddled Big Bold Boz for owner Jackie Spencer of Alto. Cecil Crabtree sent out Partners Bid who carries the colors of Cleber and Patricia Massey of Abilene, Texas.

Byers also qualified Lightfoot Lil with a commanding 6 1/2-length win in the 4th Norgor Futurity division. The Muscovite filly is another Davidson trainee also owned by Spencer. Her final time was 1:05.

Joyce's Angel captured the opening division with Jerry Rodriguez up for conditioner Charles Mattox. Showboat' headed the favorite in the second division for a major upset. Mike Clark was in the irons for trainer Bill Leach. The final Norgor trial went to Royal Platoon, who was trained by Kenneth Wethington and ridden by his wife, Betty.

The second-place horses who will round out the Norgor Thoroughbred Futurity field are Whichway Did Shego, Pride N Loom, Prince Ego, Gallic Writer, Cliffs Place and Hookum Waldo.





shot a 61 Friday and a 55 Saturday.


There was a two-way tie for first in the second flight between the team of Roger Snodgrass and John Van Tussenbroek and the team of Ray Faulk and Jim Larkin.

As we near the halfpoint of the major-league baseball season, there have been quite a few surprises.

None of the defending division champions were leading their division as of Friday, June 13.

The defending World Champion Kansas City Royals were tied for second place with California in the American League's Western Division, four games behind the surprising Texas Rangers.

The Toronto Blue Jays, last season's Eastern Division winners, were in sixth place, 11 games behind the leading Boston Red Sox. Only 1984 World Champion Detroit trailed the Blue Jays in the standings.

In the National League, the New York Mets led the Eastern Division and Houston headed up the Western Division.

Defending National League champion St. Louis was mired in last place in the Eastern Division, 17 games behind the Mets.

Los Angeles has some excellent pitchers, but has had hitting woes this season and doesn't appear able (at this time) to overcome the Astros.

Of course, there's still over half a season to go. Anything could happen, and good teams usually rise to the top in the second half of the season.

But it looks like we'll have somewhat of a different look in the 1987 pennant playoffs.

Look for Houston to play the Mets in the National League playoffs.

The Mets' better talent and pitcher Dwight Gooden should be too much for the Astros.

I see the New York Yankees overcoming Boston in the last two months and winning the American League East.

In the Western Division, the Royals should begin playing like last year's World Champions.

The Royals should play the Yankees in the American League playoffs, thus becoming the only repeater from last year's playoffs.

Kansas City will defeat the Yankees and meet the Mets in the World Series.

But it won't be a repeat performance from last season. New York's superior talent should prevail in six games.



Environmental Division lists precautions for food handling

Hari Mukhoty of the local Environmental Improvement Division (EID) office is concerned that many people serving food to the public don't fully understand what the "critical" health and safety factors are.

Mukhoty said "critical items are those with the potential for causing food poisoning."

He said he and other EID representatives make inspections of commercial food establishments and deduct five points for any "critical item violation." If the problems continue for more than one inspection the facility is downgraded, said Mukhoty.

In order to help restaurant operators comply, Mukhoty has compiled a list of critical item violations which he provides at the

time of his inspection. The lists are also available at the EID office in Four Seasons Mall.

Although Mukhoty said Ruidoso has had no particular problems, he said some changes have been made in the laws. He wants food service businesses to be familiar with the changes.

"Sulfides have been banned," noted Mukhoty. He said products previously used to keep vegetables looking fresh may no longer be used in New Mexico.

"Foreign label food is not allowed," said Mukhoty.

Mukhoty said food sellers must get food from approved and authorized sources.

Besides a list of "spoiled" foods that are not allowed for commercial service, Mukhoty cautions

against serving contents of dented or bulged cans. Home-cooked or home-prepared foods also are not allowed, according to Mukhoty.

He said organizations having bake sales or other food sales are projects are required to obtain a permit from the EID. At that time project planners are given rules and regulations for selling food to the public. There is no charge for food service permits.

Since home-prepared food is not supposed to be sold to the public, Mukhoty said he recommends that groups borrow or lease an approved kitchen and cook the food there.

Temperature violations are also common, so Mukhoty includes information of food temperatures on his list.

Commercial food servers must

check food temperature with a thermometer and also mount a thermometer in walk-in or display coolers, said Mukhoty. He said milk, meat, fish, eggs, baked potatoes and cooked rice should be kept at 45 degrees or colder.

When kept or served warm those foods should be kept at 140 degrees or warmer, he added.

Room temperature offers the most potential for food poisoning, so Mukhoty said food should not be thawed or cooled at that level. He said frozen food should be thawed

under running water or in a microwave, and hot food to be stored should be placed directly in the ice box.

Other common infractions that Mukhoty finds on his inspections include storing chemicals or pesticides near foods. He offers a strong warning that chemicals, such as dishwashing detergent, should be properly labeled and stored well away from foods.

Mukhoty said food servers must not eat, drink or smoke when handling, preparing or serving food or

utensils. Businesses with repeated violations are downgraded to "UNSATISFACTORY," said Mukhoty. He said the ratings, by law, must be posted on the front door or window of restaurants.

If the ratings are not posted, Mukhoty suggests asking the operator for them, for if no satisfactory permit is issued it indicates "something grossly wrong."

The registrar (i.e., transfer agent and paying agent) for such issue will be designated at the time the Board adopts such bond ordinance on June 26, 1986. The Bonds will constitute the general obligations of the Village, payable from general taxes which may be levied without limitation as to rate or amount. The Bonds constitute all of the bonds authorized to be issued at the regular municipal election held in the Village on March 4, 1986. INTEREST RATES AND LIMITATIONS

The following interest limitations are applicable:

(1) The maximum net effective interest rate permitted for such issue is twelve percent (12%) per annum, provided, however, that if the net effective interest rate on such issue is greater than ten percent (10%) per annum (based on the actual price to be paid to the Village for such issue calculated to maturity according to standard tables of bond values), such rate must be approved in writing by the State Board of Finance, and the Village may not issue the Bonds before such approval.

(2) The maximum stated interest rate permitted is twelve percent (12%) per annum.

(3) Interest shall be payable July 1, 1987, and semi-annually thereafter on January 1 and July 1 in each year.

(4) No bid shall specify more than one interest rate for each maturity.

(5) Interest on the Bonds must be stated in a multiple of one-eighth (1/8th) or one-twentieth (1/20th) of one percent (1%) per annum.

(6) Subject to the foregoing limitations, it is permissible to bid different interest rates of interest.

In General, in the opinion of Sherman and Howard, Bond Counsel, interest on the Bonds is exempt from income taxation by the United States of America under present federal law.

Pending Legislation. On December 17, 1985, the United States House of Representatives passed H.R. 3838, the Tax Reform Act of 1985 (the "Bill"). The Bill is now pending in the United States House of Representatives in its present form. Interest on the Bonds will be exempt from federal income taxation (other than the insurance company minimum tax mentioned below) if the Bill is enacted into law.

Requirements imposed by the Bill which apply to obligations issued after December 31, 1985 (including the Bonds) are satisfied, some of which are required to be satisfied on a continuing basis.

On December 17, 1985, the United States House of Representatives also passed H. Res. 335 expressing the sense of the House "that the chairman and ranking member of the House Committee on Ways and Means are hereby requested, in conjunction with the Secretary of the Treasury and the chairman and the ranking member of the Senate Committee on Finance, to make public not later than December 31, 1985, an agreed-upon statement which would have the effect of postponing the effective date until January 1, 1987, of those selected items of tax reform the delay of which would reduce the adverse economic effects which might otherwise be caused by the automatic expiration of final enactment, while still recognizing the need for some retroactive dates for certain expiring provisions." On March 14, 1986, the chairman and ranking members of the House Committee on Ways and Means and the Senate Committee on Finance of the House of Representatives and the Secretary of the Treasury released a Joint Statement On the Effective Dates of Pending Tax Reform Legislation (the "Joint Statement").

The Joint Statement endorses a postponement until September 1, 1986 (or the date of enactment of tax reform legislation, if earlier) of most of the above mentioned requirements of the Bill which would apply to the Bonds. The Village will covenant in the bond ordinance which will be adopted after the bond sale to use the proceeds of the Bonds in such a manner as to comply with only existing law those requirements of the Bill whose effective date is not proposed to be postponed in the Joint Statement. In the opinion of Bond Counsel, interest on the Bonds will be exempt from federal income taxation (except the below mentioned insurance company minimum tax) if the Bill is enacted into law after the delivery date of the Bonds with the effective dates proposed in the Joint Statement but otherwise in its present form.

The Bill imposes a tax on the adjusted net gain from operations of certain insurance companies (generally, all insurance companies except life insurance companies) for taxable years beginning after December 31, 1987. Interest on the Bonds will be included in adjusted net gain from operations for the purpose of this minimum tax if the Bill is enacted in its present form. The Joint Statement does not propose to change the application of this minimum tax.

The Bill contains numerous other changes to present law which may affect an investor's decision to purchase the Bonds. Various other provisions of the Bill are being considered by the Senate including a proposal which would subject interest on tax exempt bonds to a minimum tax. The Senate Finance Committee in May of 1986, voted to approve a Tax Reform Proposal (the "Senate Finance Committee Proposal") which is not available as of this date. Summaries of the Senate Finance Committee Proposal indicate that tax exempt interest (including interest on the Bonds) will be included in pre-tax book income of corporations for the purpose of a corporate alternative minimum tax (effective for taxable years beginning after December 31, 1986) which includes as a preference item 50% of the excess of the corporation's pre-tax book income over its alternative minimum taxable income (determined without regard to this preference item and prior to reduction by net operating losses). Prospective investors should consult their own tax advisors with respect to the status of the Bill, other options for tax reform currently being considered and the impact of the Bill and options on their investment decision.

The Bill and options to it considered in the Senate are subject to change, and, if the Bill becomes law, it may contain requirements which differ from those contained in the Bill in its present form and effective dates which differ from those endorsed in the Joint Statement. There can be no assurance that the Village will or will be able to comply with those provisions of the Bill for which the Joint Statement endorses a postponed effective date or with any additional or different requirements imposed by the Bill as it may be amended.

BIDS Bidders are required to submit a bid specifying (a) the lowest stated rate or rates of interest and premium, if any, at which such bidder will purchase such Bonds. BASES OF AWARD

Said Bonds will be awarded to the best bidder considering the stated interest rate or rates specified and the premium offered, if any, and subject to the right of the Board to reject any and all bids and readvertise. The last paragraphs of such opinion shall be substantially as follows:

"Based upon such examination and in reliance on the covenants and representations contained in the Official Bid Form, the documents, it is our opinion as Bond Counsel that:

"1. Such proceedings show lawful authority for said issue of Bonds under the laws of the State of New Mexico; and

"2. Said issue of Bonds in the amount aforesaid is valid and legally binding upon the Village, and all of the taxable property in the Village is subject to the levy of a tax to pay the same without limitation of rate or amount; and

"3. Interest on the Bonds is exempt from taxation by the United States of America under present federal income tax laws; and

"4. The obligations of the Village are subject to the reasonable exercise in the future by the State of New Mexico and its governmental bodies of the police power inherent in the sovereignty of the State and to the exercise by the United States of the powers delegated to it by the Federal Constitution.

"5. If H.R. 3838, 99th Congress, 1st Session passed by the House of Representatives on December 17, 1985 (the "Bill"), were enacted into law with the effective dates endorsed in the Joint Statement by the chairman and ranking members of the House Committee on Ways and Means and Senate Committee on Finance and the Secretary of the Treasury on the Effective Dates of Pending Tax Reform Legislation (released on March 14, 1986), but otherwise in its present form, interest on the Bonds would be exempt from federal income taxation under the provisions thereof, except that taxable years beginning after 1987, the Bill would require the inclusion of such interest in adjusted net gain from operations for the purpose of the minimum tax imposed on the adjusted net gain from operations of certain insurance companies under Section 1023 of the Bill.

"As Bond Counsel, we are passing upon only those matters set forth in this opinion and are not passing upon the accuracy or completeness of the statements made in connection with any sale of the Bonds."

The successful bidder (without cost to such bidder) will also be furnished with the printed Bond and a complete transcript of the legal proceedings, including a certificate stating that there is no litigation pending affecting the validity of the Bonds as of the date of their delivery, and other closing documents. 





museum. Add a horse and the peaceful scene would be complete.




Tree limbs of all shapes and sizes form this rustic fence in Lincoln. Mountains and clouds form an ageless background for the historic little village.



Capitan athletic fields get school board approval

Capitan Board of Education approved final plans on the proposed athletic field Thursday.

Jim French displayed the final plans for the athletic field, all changes suggested by the board since the first plan had been incorporated into this draft.

Bids will be let on two different track surfaces, one for a poly surface and one for a latex surface. Board members James McDaniel, Tom Trost and Preston Stone decided a bid for an asphalt surface would not be needed since asphalt is too hard a surface and has a tendency to crumble.

"It's important to have the right surface on the track, to protect our athletes," McDaniel said.

Olympic tracks have poly surfaces, with latex being the next best, it was learned at the meeting.

The plans included total track and field events diagrams and areas designated for each event.

After checking with horticulturists, French had determined the best grasses for the field would be a mixture of Kentucky Blue grasses which could be placed in sod strips, rather than seed, to insure a solid turf.

The buried water well was pinpointed on the plans.

"Paul Jones showed us exactly where the well is buried and told us when they closed the well they put a five foot cement slab over it," French explained. "From everything I've heard the water has some salinity and gas in it."

At the appropriate time bids will

be let for the opening and water test of the well to determine if it can be used, it was reported.

The approved plans will now go to Santa Fe for final state approval.

The board then asked French to begin negotiations with the state Highway Department for an agreement on right of way and highway turnouts on Highway 48 to accommodate the proposed facility.

Superintendent Leonard Hays told the board discussion on the issuance of the bonds would probably begin at the August meeting and bond bids would be let in November.

The bonds for the athletic facility were approved by voters over a year ago and by law the bonds must be issued within two years of that time.

In other business, the board:

Agreed to continue participation in the New Mexico School Board Association.

Approved the transfer of line items and cash transfers to close out the year's accounts.

Accepted a cash return of \$384.76 from the state track meet for participation and percentage of gate receipts.

Agreed on drawing up a policy on job descriptions for noncertified and certified employees. Hays has been in touch with other school districts for recommendations and information on their policies.

The liability insurance on school grounds and buildings increased from \$18,000 last year to \$32,000 this year.

The next board meeting will be delayed one week, they will meet at 7:30 p.m. Thursday, July 17.

Trustees prepare for bid opening

Capitan Village Trustees set a date for the general obligation water bond bid opening and discharged varied village matters at their regular meeting Monday.

A notice of intent to adopt a bond ordinance has been put into publication, village clerk Virginia Spall reported. The date set for the opening of bids is 2 p.m. Thursday, June 26, at the Capitan Village Hall.

Mayor Benny Coker and trustees Dave Strickland, Kelly Beavers and Norm Renfro agreed to adopt the proposed date and bid opening.

The bonds will constitute the general obligations of the village, payable from general taxes which may be levied without limitation as to rate or amount. The bonds constitute all of the bonds authorized to be issued at the regular election held in the village on March 4, 1986. At that time the registered voters of the village authorized the issuance of such bonds in an amount not to exceed \$600,000 for the purpose of constructing and purchasing a system for supplying water for Capitan.

"The tax rate should not exceed what the voters voted for," Beavers stated, "twenty years at 12 percent per thousand. I will withdraw my vote if it turns out more than that."

Until the bids are opened, there is no way of knowing what the rate will be, Coker explained.

"We'll just have to wait and see."

Village attorney John Underwood presented the contract between the village and engineer Jack Atkins for constructing the new Capitan water system.

Beavers took exception to some of the wording in the contract. Trustees were assured by Underwood the contract wording was correct and the village was protected under the terms of the contract.

A roll call vote for the signing and acceptance of the contract was called. Strickland and Renfro voted for. Beavers voted against. Coker and Atkins signed the contract.

In other business, the trustees: —Agreed to pay clerk Dona Runnels six hours per week for the nine-week trial period as Motor Vehicle Department (MVD) clerk. Runnels will continue as water billing and MVD clerk without a pay raise.

—Announced the July 4 Smokey Bear Parade will be sponsored by the village. It can be covered under the village insurance policy without additional fees, trustees noted. Capitan Chamber of Commerce will coordinate the parade. Bart McDonough urged all interested participants to contact the chamber.

—Served notice about a proposed change in village law enforcement whereby village law enforcement would be turned over to the Lincoln County Sheriff's Department. The joint powers agreement states, in part, "the Sheriff's office proposal will provide services for \$28,000 per year and the assigning of the titles of police vehicles presently operated by the Village, to the Sheriff's office as well as other police equipment such as radar." A hearing on this proposal will be conducted at the regular meeting of the Village Trustees at 7 p.m. Monday, July 14.

A report on the final budget will be given at a later date.

County brochures planned

The Lincoln County Lodgers' Tax Committee gave the go-ahead for an ad agency to begin work on the county brochures and discussed problems at White Oaks at their regular meeting Wednesday.

Fifty percent of this year's budget has been dedicated to producing a brochure showing the beauty and diversity of Lincoln County outside of Ruidoso.

Kevin Clear, manager of a local ad agency, told the committee the advertising potential was unlimited in the county.

"600,000 tourists come to this area every year. That's not drive-throughs, it's people who stay at least two days or longer," Clear said. "Lincoln County has a lot to offer tourists."

Committee members Rich Seeley, Kay Dennis and Bob Boverie asked Clear to prepare a dummy card and layout for the brochure "emphasizing the historic interests" in the county along with a one year advertising plan proposal.

The White Oaks sign committee has received a sign permit and are now waiting for suggestions from the state agency said Patsy Sanchez of Carrizozo.

"The State didn't even know there aren't even any historical markers designating White Oaks, when I talked to them they thought historical signs were in place. So we will be getting historic signs up soon," she said.

Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) representatives Richard Ramsey and Greg Hausler were concerned about soil erosion in White Oaks, partially due to indiscriminate overgrazing by livestock.

"This condition could be arrested with fencing," Ramsey stated. "We have put together a plan which includes fencing, planting of trees and grass. We tried to make a plan suitable to everyone and includes about 80 acres, which is most of the townsite."

"Now we need sponsors for the project," Ramsey continued.

"This committee's purpose is to promote tourism in the county. Your project, while much needed, is not something that comes under this heading. While we are concerned with White Oaks, our purpose is to advertise it," Boverie said.

"If the historical society would like to do something on it we could probably let some funds to them for it," Seeley added.

White Oaks is deteriorating rapidly, the soil conservationists reported.

"Erosion is washing away the soil

and beginning to badly undercut some of the old building foundations," Ramsey said.

The committee indicated they hoped to be able to help in some capacity.

In other business, the committee: —Voted that Seeley represent them to the film commission. He will travel the county, looking at possible sites for filming the 10-minute advertising film promoting the county. The Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce will share jointly in the project.

—Were notified of Sterling Badgers' resignation. A new appointee will be needed for the committee.



Building permits are up

For the second month in a row new construction in Ruidoso increased in May with 31 permits issued with a valuation of \$809,681, up from April's 29 permits at \$702,927 and March's 31 at \$590,317. That increase still left village building down from last year when 78 permits with a valuation of \$2,116,078 were issued in May 1985. Ruidoso's 1986 year-to-date valuation of \$6,333,075 is more than two million dollars behind 1985's end-of-May total of \$8,395,981. Last month saw eight new single-family home permits issued with a valuation of \$613,354, up from April's seven new residential structures with a valuation of \$580,880. In May 1985 the village recorded 19 new home starts with a hefty valuation of \$1,583,756. Residential additions and alterations permits topped all categories in numbers during May with 16 permits issued with a valuation of \$122,776, a big dollar increase over April's 14 remodel permits at \$63,910. Last year in May the village issued 42 residential remodeling permits with a value of \$309,569. Two new commercial building permits were issued in May. Those two, with a valuation of \$57,552, were up from April when no commercial buildings were started, but still lag slightly behind May 1985 when one new commercial building permit with a valuation of \$107,776 was issued. Just one commercial remodeling permit with a valuation of \$1,000 was issued in May, down from April's seven with a \$58,117 valuation, and way down from May 1985 when 13 commercial addition/alteration permits with a \$114,977 pricetag were issued. Two demolition permits with a valuation of \$7,500 were issued in May. One grading permit at \$6,000 and one foundation permit at \$1,500 were also issued this May. Two jailed after wreck

Membership vacancies checker village committees

With vacancies on most village boards and committees, the Mayor of Ruidoso would have to make 15 appointments to fill all openings on those groups. According to records in the village clerk's office, one committee, the Grindstone Canyon Dam Oversight Committee, has been inactive for three years. In the meantime, the terms of all five members have expired. With three vacancies, the Planning and Zoning Commission could have difficulty making a quorum, as it did for a called meeting recently. The Library Board and the Personnel Board are the only village groups with a full membership roster. Ruidoso has its full roster of members on several joint boards and commissions. Leon Eggleston, village clerk, explained that while terms of committee members have actually expired, members of most commit-

tees continue to serve. He said the village ordinance establishing the committees and boards includes provisions for removing members who don't attend regularly. Eggleston said if a member has two unexcused absences in a row or three in a year, that person is off the committee, according to the ordinance. But, with inadequate reporting from the volunteers who chair and serve on the committees, Eggleston said that provision is not enforced. "I don't know who's absent, or if the absence was excused," said Eggleston. He said the only thing he has to maintain for official records are the minutes of the various meetings. Some village committees don't even meet regularly, added Eggleston. For instance the Adult Recreation Advisory Board has cancelled several meetings after the chairman determined that a quorum might not be present. Eggleston said Mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr. has sent personal letters

to members of the groups asking if they want to continue. He said not all have responded. Following is a breakdown of village boards and committees: Cemetery Advisory Board: a five-member board with four members now serving two-year terms. Members: Alma Russell, Helga Haake, J.D. James and Bob Pior. Billie Clarke recently submitted her resignation. Adult Recreation Advisory Board: a seven-member board to be comprised of four senior citizens and three citizens in service-oriented professions. Five members are currently serving two-year terms, with recent resignations by Chairman Barney Waldrop and member Cleve Kirby. Members: Burdette Stampley, Sybill Riddle, Verna Adams, Flora Elliott and W.O. Rucker. Airport Advisory Board, a five-member board required by law for the village to operate a municipal airport with members appointed for indefinite terms. Meetings are to be called as needed. Four current

members: Myrt Vitow, Wayne Dacy, Roy Parker and Howard Tate. Eagle Creek Board: a six-member board with three members from Capitan and three members from Ruidoso, six-year staggered terms. Members: Pat Thompson, Jim Hine and George P. White. Economic Development Board: a five-member board with members to consist of one from the lodging industry, two from tourist-related businesses, one at-large and one village councillor. Four members are currently serving two-year terms. Slover Cape, the lodging representative, recently resigned. Four members: Sid Miller, Jerry Shaw, Preston Isaacs and Ralph Petty. Extraterritorial Zoning Commission: a joint body with one councillor representing the Village of Ruidoso. Village Councillor Ray Dean Carpenter serves as Ruidoso's representative. Grindstone Oversight Committee: a five-member board, two-year terms. Members, whose terms ex-

pired in March 1986: Tim Collins, Fred Hughston, Rudy Flack, Barney Rue and Hari Mukhoty. Library Board: a seven-member board, two year terms. Members: Alton Lane, Jo Leland, Emadair Jones, Ann Denton, Ken Green, Howard Tate and Betty Foster. Personnel Board: a five-member board (the ordinance states not less than three nor more than five members), four appointed and one elected by employees, two-year terms. Members: Arnold Cantu, Don Weems, Jim Carpenter, Don Samuels and Jesse Reynolds. Ruidoso-Ruidoso Downs Joint Use Board: the mayor and one citizen representative Ruidoso on the joint group, two-year terms. Members: Mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr. and Dorothy Pope. Sierra Blanca Airport Commission: a joint commission with Ruidoso having one representative with a three-year term: Tim Morris.

Editorial

Bravo! The Ruidoso Village Council's decision Tuesday night to open use of the village trash compactor system to the public is a decision that should be applauded.

That action certainly follows what citizens were led to believe throughout the trash compactor's trek from idea to reality.

Indeed, the notion that residents could be saving themselves the 26-mile drive to the Fort Stanton landfill by instead driving a few miles to the compactor site was held out, like a Milk Bone to a puppy, to help convince us that we needed the \$350,000 system.

So now we have a compactor (the costs of which partially were planned to be met by increased fees from resident users) and some suggest the citizenry not be allowed to use the equipment!

The reasons listed for banning public use ranged from something you can almost sympathize with (like liability insurance concerns) to reasons a little silly (like "90 percent of people pulling trailers don't know how to back them properly" and "users might slip and fall in the equipment").

But even in the face of such possibilities, the council was swift and sure, through their unanimous vote, in allowing public use of the system.

What was promised was delivered.—DJP

Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE—New Mexico's constitution gives the governor the power to convene special sessions of the Legislature and to set the agenda for such gatherings by the items he includes in his "call."

It should be noted, however, that this document does not state at any point that a governor is allowed to demand that legislators comply with his will in advance of issuing his summons to them to meet. To do that, it appears to some, is as much a violation of the doctrine of separation of powers as anything Toney Anaya has heretofore attempted during his period in the governor's chair.

More musing over the numbers generated by last week's primary elections:

Those people who insist Dave Cargo is the man to beat Bill Richardson should mull a little over these results. With Democrats turning out in record low numbers, 47,000 numbers of that party bothered to push the lever for Bill. With Republicans voting at an all-time record high for a primary, only 13,000 of them expressed support for Cargo, the GOP's supposed white hope in the third Congressional district.

What that means is that the incumbent, drawing on a smaller number of possible voters, got six times as many votes as the interloper, for whom many Republicans could have cast their ballots. It has been previously stated here that Cargo, who was never very popular within his own party, either here or in Oregon, is likely to have more trouble holding his own people than he is in attracting dissident and disgruntled Democrats. With that large total rolled up by Our Bill, it's difficult to believe there are many Democrats in the district in those two categories.

Also of interest is the fact that Mike Runnels, in his first outing as a Congressional candidate, drew more than 33,000 votes to Joe Skeen's 19,000.

Don't waste much emotion on the idea that the board of accountancy is going to denounce the state's current Auditor, Al Romero.

All we have here is a disagreement between Porky Lithgow,

Cabinet Secretary for the Department of General Services, and Romero. Lithgow, as a certified public accountant, has more clout with that board than Al, a mere registered public accountant. Hence the board puffs itself up like a toad and makes threatening noises about punitive action against the State Auditor. That doesn't mean it's really going to do anything.

Query: Have you ever known one of the state boards charged with overseeing any kind of professional to embarrass any of their own members?

Without being unduly demanding on the point, don't we have a right to expect that a president of one of the state's universities express himself with at least a minimum of grammatical accuracy, not to say style?

Try this excerpt from a letter of Highlands University president Gilbert Sanchez to the State Auditor's office to see how it ranks in those areas: "Your report, although unpleasant to learn of exceptions to standard purchasing and procedures, is accepted as a constructive one to allow us to comply with all codes and regulations immediately and in the future."

That isn't a sentence so much as it a mere cluster of words. Any person heading a major educational institution should blush to have written it.

Two things you should keep your eye on:

—That attempt to reorganize the state Senate, which principally means to overthrow Les Houston, now the president pro tem of that body. He has held his post by only the narrowest of margins, and now seems likely to have lost that, after some Senators went home and discovered how their own constituents regard Houston.

—The state's Mortgage Finance Authority, which is making rumblings like Mount St. Helens before eruption. Some board members here seem intent on playing political games, which are being strongly opposed by others on the board. If the whistle gets blown, this could be another major embarrassment for the administration that named the board members.
