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Southwest Airlines shows interest in new airport

Southwest Airlines has expressed an interest in serving the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport, said airport administrator Fred Heckman early today. He said a letter is on the way with that news.

"We are ecstatic," very pleased," said Heckman.

"I think it shows how important this airport is to a major supplier of transportation services," he added.

Heckman said a group of local businessmen deserve credit for this major step. He said John Hall of SDC Coldwell Banker, Ralph Petty of The Bank of Ruidoso, and Ken Green of The Ruidoso News have been working behind the scenes to acquire major commercial service to the regional facility on Fort Stanton mesa.

Green confirmed that the three have worked behind the scenes to gain the interest of commercial carriers with Southwest Airlines as their first big pitch.

"We just felt that it (Southwest Airlines) was a natural," said Green. He said Southwest is the largest carrier in Ruidoso's market area.

After hiring a consultant, Kevin Clear of Clear and Company, the group contacted the Jackson Hole Airport manager in Jackson, Wyoming.

They found that Southwest Airlines serves that resort area, which parallels Ruidoso in size, altitude and economic base.

"We thought, if they can do it why can't we?" remarked Green. He said they then added Jackson, Wyoming, consultant Mark Altman to their team.

After months of gathering statistics and figures about the Ruidoso area, the men met with Southwest officials in late April.

Clear said a letter is on the way from Southwest Airlines indicating an interest in this Ruidoso area as a destination. He said the southwest officials have reviewed the 10 pages of facts and figures the local group provided.

Clear said Southwest indicated an interest in offering input into the proposed facility so that it will meet Southwest's minimum standards.

Heckman said he and members of the Sierra Blanca Airport Commission are prepared to meet with Southwest. He said he'd like to talk with their technical people before going out for construction bids.

Before we made contact with anybody, we talked to the airport commissioner and he really noted Green, when Heckman said they will continue to work with the

commission. "I'm feeling very good," said Heckman in a telephone conversation this morning. He said the group has plans to contact other airlines, and will meet soon with another major carrier.

Hall said any airline service, even just chartered flights, could boost the area economy by \$50-60 million a year.

"I would like to see the town get behind making a major package deal with one or two of the major airlines," noted Hall.

Rains wash out bridges

A sudden storm on Sierra Blanca late yesterday sent torrents of water down the already sodden Rio Ruidoso drainage, washing out bridges and stranding several homeowners.

Ruidoso assistant village manager Frank Potter reported the damage and amount of washed-down debris was the most he had seen since 1978.

Bonito Volunteer Fire Department Chief Howard Puckett reported this morning that 14 to 15 homes in the Shangri La area of Eagle Creek Canyon Road were cut off by flooding waters.

All of us are stranded," Puckett said. The chief reported that no one was in imminent danger, though.

Puckett said the first bridge on Eagle Creek Canyon Road was completely washed out and the second under water, condition unknown. In the Shangri La subdivision, the whole roadway was underwater.

Puckett said the cut-off area is still in telephone and two-way radio

contact with other areas.

Reports say the problem began early last evening. Potter said Ski Apache Resort officials called to warn of heavy rains on the mountain last evening. Later reports put the total rainfall on the mountain at more than nine inches.

Puckett said Eagle Creek rose two and one-half feet from 6 to 7:30 p.m., and continued rising until 2 a.m. He said the waters subsided gradually until about 7 a.m. when they appeared to rise again.

In Ruidoso, several calls of high water were received by Ruidoso Police about 11:30 p.m. Deputy Chief Jim Alston reported this morning that no Ruidosoans were stranded or in danger.

The Paradise Canyon Drive bridge went out and all bridges down to and from Paradise Canyon are temporarily closed due to the high waters, Alston reported.

Ruidoso officials gathered this morning at Village Hall to plan a strategy to deal with the flooding. Potter was hopeful all damage would be repaired by the weekend, if the rains subside.

Airport planners believe airport land may be paid for by FmHA loan

The Ruidoso Village Council Tuesday resolved to attempt to retain the Ruidoso Regional Airport land when the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport (SBRA) is opened and begin exploring funding possibilities for the project.

The council approved a resolution to keep the airport land in the village and to explore the possibility of a loan from the Federal Mortgage Administration (FmHA) to help pay for the project.

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the village is obligated to contribute the appraised value of the airport land into the construction of a new airport as a condition of any federal loan for the project.

"It would certainly help our cause to be able to bring the two and a half million up front," noted Heckman. He said the SBAC project could be cheaper and

more efficient if revenue bonds were issued to help pay for the project. The concept of keeping the land when the airport moves to a new location on Fort Stanton mesa, they apparently weren't part of the SBAC proposal.

Underwood, who questioned the accuracy of transferring the deed to public lands, agreed to review bond possibilities, as well as the FmHA loan proposal and report back to the council at the next meeting.

Heckman explained the procedure to SBAC is a portion of the 1976 Master Plan, a segment of an access road from Highway 37 to the airport land. He said Lincoln County will take the lead on the access road project.

The grant said property owner have offered to give right of way for a portion of the proposed road.

Lincoln County representatives at the airport group reported a water well at the airport site has been completed and will be tested after the week.

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County Commission will be lead agency on airport road

The Lincoln County Commission got the go ahead Monday from the Sierra Blanca Airport Commission (SBAC) to serve as lead agency in the planning and building of an access road to the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport (SBRA).

That agreement came during a joint meeting resulting from last

week's dispute over whether the county or the SBAC would control a State Highway Department grant of \$600,000.

The grant was announced recently by State Highway Commissioner Bill Lee as seed money for a feasibility study or whatever else is needed to engineer and design an access road to the proposed airport on Fort Stanton mesa.

The first problem at Monday

joint meeting was who would get the county and airport commission members voted for seats at the head table. That problem settled, with county commissioner Bill Elliott and A.W. Groat, Gnatkowski seated in the center of the table and airport commissioners Leonard Buchanan, Jim Morris and Benny Coker crowded around one end. SBAC Chairman Ker Nosker, also a county commissioner, first took a seat with the airport group and then moved to join the county commission.

After calling the meeting to order, Elliott told the standing-room-only crowd that the County Commission had a personnel problem and the three commissioners retired for the next hour and a half into executive session.

Airport contract administrator Fred Heckman later suggested to Morris, SBAC vice-chairman, that

the county commission should be the lead agency on the project. He said the county commission should be the lead agency on the project.

Three plea for relief to council

The Ruidoso Village Council, during a regular meeting Tuesday, heard emotional pleas from citizens on three unrelated subjects.

Rex Vaughan of the Hollywood Inn asked the council to stop Ruidoso Police officers from stopping in his parking lot. Charlotta Stewart related a problem she had with the Water Department and a group of Humane Society members questioned municipal animal control procedures.

"I don't really believe that this

council knows what's going on," said Vaughan. He said it hurts his business to have police cars in his parking lot and driveway, and asked the council to stop the practice.

Mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr. read a memo from Ruidoso Police Chief Richard Swenor instructing officers not to park in the lot or driveway of the Hollywood Inn.

Stewart's problem arose over a village ordinance requiring property owners to pay a minimum monthly charge to the Water Department or have their water meter removed. She explained that the ordinance cost her over \$500 when she

finally sold a building on Mechem Drive.

"To me it's extortion and it's unjust gain," complained Stewart. She said she was also treated rudely by a Water Department employee.

Village councillors sympathized with Stewart over the rude treatment, but stood by the ordinance.

Heated exchanges between Humane Society of Lincoln County members and animal control contractor Jim Wooldridge preceded a council decision to amend Wooldridge's animal control proposal before awarding a new con-

tract for his services.

Wooldridge submitted a proposal for a three-year contract at \$48,536.33 per year, but the council added a clause calling for a yearly review with the option to renew or terminate before accepting the proposal.

Village Councillor Jerry Shaw opposed the contract. She proposed negotiating with the Lincoln County Sheriff, who submitted a letter stating he could provide the service for \$30,000 a year.

Shaw said by accepting the lower bid, the village could help the Humane Society complete a facility to house abandoned and abused animals locally.

Humane Society members expressed a desire to work with animal control by providing confinement facilities. It was learned that the group needs \$20,000 to complete a building under way on Gavilan Canyon Road.

Berney Farwick, a Humane Society member, said conditions at the Fort Stanton pens utilized by Woodriddle are "deplorable." He challenged Woodriddle to "clean up his act" before asking for a new contract.

Woodriddle and his wife, Jan, said they want to work with the Humane Society, but have been rebuffed. Jan Woodriddle said she provides the services the Humane Society professes to provide reuniting owners and animals and finding homes for abandoned animals.

"So many of you don't know what we do," said Jan Woodriddle. She said her office often is called into the county because the county animal control officer can't be found.

In other business Tuesday, the council:

—Approved a land exchange in Midway Townsite previously approved by the Planning and Zoning Commission.

—Unanimously approved an amendment to a village ordinance, lessening requirements for building permits on structures not adding square footage.

Repealed the Abatement of Dangerous Buildings ordinance.

Adopted the village budget for the 1986-87 fiscal year.

Accepted Mayor Davis's appointments to various boards and commissions. The mayor said some members will continue to serve and some are new appointees.

Task force devises strategy to diversify Ruidoso

The Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce Economic Development Task Force (EDTF) said Thursday one of its goals will be to establish a four-year college in Ruidoso.

"Our focus, in relation to the already existing airport land, is to attempt to attract a college, a privately funded, four-year college," co-chairman Rick Evans said.

Evans stressed that the committee will actively pursue other possibilities to help diversify the economy in Ruidoso.

"We need to bring jobs into the

community and make Ruidoso a more year-round place to live.

"Beginning today, we're looking at three to five years before we get any results," Evans said.

Guest speaker Terry Beck, of Fort Worth, Texas, presented an introductory program on economic development to the committee. Although his presentation was primarily focused on industrial development, he said there are four basic steps to developing a successful task force of any kind.

"First, there needs to be organization, which Ruidoso already has. Second, you need preparation. Third, you need actual

implementation of training members of the group, and finally, once the committee has started, you need to go out into the community and evaluate the problems and assets it has," Beck said.

Many communities are actively looking into economic development of their areas, Beck said.

"What Ruidoso needs to do is go out into the community and focus on what is unique about Ruidoso and sell that aspect hard," Beck said.

Ruidoso's primary assets include the aesthetics of the town itself and the existing airport land, Evans said.

"The land is so unique. It is the only game in town, in terms of its size and utilities available. That land could be available to us," Evans said.

He said the EDTF was originally designed to serve only the Ruidoso area.

"Originally, we were limiting the task force to Ruidoso, but the door is open to anyone who wants to come in and participate," Evans said.

Evans said the EDTF will have four subcommittees: a budget committee, a contact team, a communication group and a research committee.

He's mad about mud

Joe Wheatley says he is "fed up" with being flooded out.

His mobile home lot, located in River Park, a subdivision behind the Bill Pippin Real Estate building in Ruidoso Downs, is subject to constant flooding.

The recent rains in the area have brought the problem to what looks like a beach head.

By Monday, his front and backyard were soaking in pools of water.

"I have spent a lot of time and money trying to solve the problem myself, but I want the Village of Ruidoso Downs to do something about it right now," Wheatley said.

When Gary Mitchell gets back into town, I am going to instruct him to file a lawsuit against the village of Ruidoso Downs for both property damages and my mental anguish," the Lincoln County tax appraiser said.

I have called everyone in the village since September of 1985 and have gotten no satisfaction," Wheatley said.

All last Monday I got the run around, so Monday night I called Jake Downs mayor J.C. Jake"

Harris." Wheatley said. "At first he explained things to me that made sense, but I got mad and told him the village was going to pay for the damage to my property," Wheatley said.

"He just said 'we'll see about that,' and hung up," Wheatley said. Ruidoso Downs Trustee and street commissioner Conrad Buchanan said, "I have to admit he (Wheatley) has come to my office at least three or four times to discuss his drainage problems.

"They do have a serious problem in River Park, but I hope in two or three weeks we will have a solution for him," Buchanan said.

The village is seeking permission from private property owners above Wheatley to dig a ditch to temporarily solve the problem, Buchanan said.

Ruidoso Downs Village engineer Barrett Atkins said, "We will have a short-term solution.

But, though it will take quite a bit of planning and money, a long-term solution, such as a master drainage plan for the entire village, is the only answer," Atkins said.

Lifetime love for horses brings watercolorist sudden recognition and praise in the Southwest

Watercolorist Gay Stokes may finally be hitting her stride. She is sure the first picture she ever drew was of a horse, and now horses may help her prove her ability as an artist to the public.

Her love for horses began when Bill Nicholas, her grandfather, gave her a Shetland pony when she was three years old and living in Littlefield, Texas.

Nicholas had a profound influence on both her personal and professional development, Stokes said.

In her late 20s, after being a secretary in Houston, Texas, for most of her adult life, she decided she needed a change, even though she was married and had a child.

Everyone in her family, including her husband, Ted R. Stokes, who is now a racehorse trainer at Ruidoso Downs, knew she had artistic

talent. Just as Stokes began her college career, her grandfather—the man who had always had faith in her—died.

Stokes was depressed, and the abstract and surrealistic form of art being taught at UH seemed to be well suited to her state-of-mind.

But when she recovered from the depression caused by her grandfather's death, she returned to equine and western themes in her work.

Most of her neo-expressionist classroom peers at UH were shocked by her choice of seemingly common subject matter, but her professors were complimentary and encouraging.

A ceramics instructor at the University of Houston, Huey Beckham, was one of the first people to tell Stokes she had a lot of artistic potential.

And as she began to gain confidence in her work, she realized she needed to challenge herself as

painting of their horse for \$75. She sold about 20 commissioned paintings from her photo efforts.


Eventually her husband became a full-time trainer in Ruidoso and Stokes found herself working in jewelry repair for Ruidoso goldsmith Tim Wishard.

bronze molds. Stokes was honored when Wishard asked her to become more involved with Snidow's saddle series, because she had always admired Snidow's work.

When the bronze saddle series was completed, part of which is now on display at Gray Fox Gallery, Snidow returned the compliment.

After seeing Stokes' watercolors, he encouraged her to become a full-time artist.

When Stokes' husband began training horses in Del Rio, Texas, she kept busy with freelance work.

Since Stokes had never had problems selling her work, she decided to enter some art shows.

In February of this year, she came back to her Ruidoso residence and sent three pieces of her work to the prestigious Irving Arts Board/Texas Neighbors Art Competition in Irving, Texas.

Stokes was also awarded \$250 for this piece, entitled "Bandana," from the Llano Estacado Art Association.

"Bandana," and several other watercolors by Stokes, are now hanging in the gallery at Carrizo Lodge, which was recently reopened by its new management.

"As soon as I asked the owners if they were interested in displaying Gay's work, everyone wanted to know how much they were and how soon they could get one. And the guest artists are impressed, too," new Carrizo Lodge art director Carla Tam said.

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For a festive buffet, a party, a barbecue or any special gathering ... what could be more attractive and delicious than a tasty fresh fruit salad in a watermelon boat? Be creative with your watermelon half or boat! When carving mine, I leave a "handle" of sorts in the middle of the half I will use for the boat, and I carve a decorative border on the watermelon's edge. Don't let summer go by without making one of these! It's such a colorful and refreshing addition to any summer meal.

Festive Watermelon Boat

- 1 watermelon
- 1 cantaloupe
- 1 honeydew melon
- ½ fresh pineapple
- 1 quart strawberries
- 2 lbs. peaches
- 1 lb. seedless red or green grapes
- one-quarter cup sugar
- poppy-seed dressing (see recipe below)

Cut watermelon in half, leaving the "handle" in the middle and removing the meat. Carve a decorative border on the edge and cut the watermelon into bite-size chunks. Peel the cantaloupe and honeydew melon and cut into chunks. Peel and core pineapple; cut into bite-size pieces also. Wash and stem strawberries, leaving whole. Peel and slice peaches; sprinkle with lemon juice. Wash grapes and remove from stem.

Mix all fruits and sugar together in a large bowl. Pile into watermelon half. Extra fruit may be refrigerated until needed to refill "boat." Serve with poppy-seed dressing (below).

Poppy-Seed Dressing

- 1½ cups sugar
- 2 tsp. salt
- 2 tsp. mustard
- 5 Tbsp. grated onion
- ¾ cup vinegar
- 2 cups salad oil
- 4 Tbsp. poppy seeds

Combine all ingredients in a food processor with the exception of the oil and the poppy seeds. Mix well. With machine running, gradually add oil. Stir poppy seeds in by hand. Refrigerate.

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
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


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
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Tucker, Hall win Cree ladies title

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

There will be four new steel poles with lights on them in place of the current wooden poles. The lights will be behind the bleachers and have more power.


The current press box will be moved from the home side to the visitors' side, and a bigger one will be put on the home side.

Was Billy the Kid really killed by the guns of Pat Garrett in 1881?

The next sequence in the "Billy the Kid" series, or "Billy the Kid," covers Roberts' story of his escape from Sheriff Pat Garrett and a Fort Sumner posse in July 1881.

Once again, Roberts' story is based on research by historians C.L. Sonnichsen and William Tunstall. Roberts' led an active and bizarre life, parts of which Tunstall has documented, until his death in 1950.

Many people believe Roberts was Billy the Kid, many do not, but Roberts' story of his escape from Fort Sumner and his actual life after 1881, the year Billy the Kid was supposedly killed by Sheriff Pat Garrett in Fort Sumner, is fascinating.

As Roberts told it, he and Garrett had a very secret arrangement planned that would enable him to leave New Mexico.

The "Kid" was considered a killer by some, but Garrett had family ties to friends of Billy the Kid, and considered the "Kid" a friend.

The fact that Billy the Kid and Garrett had drinks together in El Paso, Texas, Mesilla and Roswell is documented.

So who was killed the night of July 14, 1881, in Fort Sumner?

As the legend goes, Billy the Kid had been dancing with other young people at a friend's house near Fort Sumner the night he supposedly died.

As is often the case with young people, when the food is gone they believe the party begins to dull.

The Kid and his good friend Billy Barlow, a fun-loving, Spanish speaking teen-ager, knew the Max-

well family—who was friendly with Billy the Kid—had food.

The Kid was supposed to leave the territory that day or night and Garrett was secretly in Fort Sumner to see his political problem (the Kid) headed for Texas. He knew he might talk to the Kid at the Maxwell's and he waited there for him.

Garrett did not inform any authorities he was in Fort Sumner, and a posse led by U.S. Deputy Marshal John Poe was also keeping tabs on the Maxwell house to try and capture Billy the Kid.

The Kid feared Poe and Garrett because both were under tremendous pressure from territorial Governor Lew Wallace to capture him.

But, since he was having a good time, he sent Barlow down to the Maxwell house to ask for food while he waited on a nearby hill.

Barlow stumbled into the dark Maxwell house and sensed someone was sitting in the bedroom.

"Who is it?" he asked in Spanish.

"Who is it?" he asked again.

Garrett got nervous because he believed the stranger (Barlow) had pulled out his knife.

He shot and killed Barlow.

Billy the Kid, hearing the shots, ran to check on Barlow, and Poe's posse had also headed toward the shots at the Maxwell house.

The Kid called to the posse to tell them he was alone, but he also began to fire at them.

The posse unloaded a barrage of bullets in the direction of the Kid. One went through his mouth and out his jaw.

As he ran away clutching his jaw, another bullet grazed his scalp.

The Kid escaped to the safety of friends in the area who treated his wounds and suggested he go to Mexico.

He entered Mexico through An-

thony, Texas, about 10 to 15 days after he was shot, and was known as Ollie L. "Brushy" Bill Roberts the rest of his life.

Barlow was secretly buried by Maxwell and Garrett.

The funeral for the Kid was carried out under mysterious circumstances.

The Fort Sumner townfolk wanted to attend, and press from the The Las Vegas Optic, then the paper from the largest city in New Mexico, were in the area on another matter.

But, the funeral was carried out secretly, and the man buried was not Billy the Kid, not Billy Barlow, but according to Poe—and witnesses who saw the casket before the funeral—not even a man at all, but a side of beef!

Garrett needed a coroner's report to collect his \$500 reward from the state for the death of Billy the Kid.

Much to the dismay of Garrett, Poe said he had killed the wrong man to witnesses at the scene of the Kid's supposed death.

Garrett filed two separate death reports after the incident.

Garrett never filed a certificate with the local sheriff's office which stated he had slain the Kid in the line of duty.

Much to the surprise of recognized historians, no coroner's report was ever completed or filed with the state, and Garrett was denied his \$500 reward by state officials, but Wallace paid him from miscellaneous state funds.

In 1949, the Secretary of State of New Mexico, Alicia Romero, told William Morrison of El Paso (who had tried to prove Roberts was the Kid until his death) there was no coroner's report in state records on the Kid's death.

She said, "Our records failed to disclose the location of or coroner's report with reference to the

purported death of William H. Bonney, alias the Kid, alias William Antrim."

Also in 1949, the clerk of the District Court in Las Vegas in San Miguel County told Morrison in an official document, "There is no record in this office of any coroner's verdict in the purported death of William H. Bonney."

Some historians say they have seen a coroner's report on the inquest into the Kid's death.

But it appears the only official documents on the incident in Fort Sumner were generated by Garrett, who gave Wallace an official report in order to collect his \$500 reward for killing Billy the Kid.

Was Billy the Kid actually killed that July night in 1881, or was he the wounded victim of a secret plan that backfired?

Did Billy the Kid escape to Mexico, and eventually live out his life under the alias of Ollie L. "Brushy" Bill Roberts?

(Next—the strange, strange life of "Brushy" Bill Roberts after 1881—which includes fighting in the Spanish American War along with a man who claimed to be Jesse James, fighting for Pancho Villa, rounding up Indians who would not stay on the reservation, joining a rodeo, joining an anti-horse thief society, marrying five times and finally, asking the Governor of New Mexico for a pardon for crimes he committed as Billy the Kid, just before his death in 1950).

Downs Trustees don't act on 'invalid' petition

Based on a legal opinion by acting Village of Ruidoso Downs attorney Richard Hawthorne, the Village of Ruidoso Downs Board of Trustees decided not to act on a petition which asked them to consider a resolution to change the size of the governing body in the Downs.

At a regular meeting of the trustees last Monday, Ruidoso Downs Mayor J.C. "Jake" Harris read the petition from the Ruidoso Downs residents to the other trustees and those present at the meeting.

He also read Hawthorne's legal opinion on the petition.

Village clerk JoAnn Jenkins read a letter on an interpretation of the intent of the statute to change the size of a mayor-council governing

body from New Mexico Municipal League (NMMML) lawyer, Steve Barshov.

Barshov's letter simply explained the procedures by which governing boards can be increased or decreased, and which members are subject to a special election.

In a phone conversation yesterday (Wednesday), Barshov stated from his Santa Fe office he could only interpret the intent of municipal statutes (many of which he wrote) on changing the size of certain governing bodies, not comment on actions by the trustees or the petitioners.

However, he did say he did not believe there was a way to recall a mayor in a mayor-council form of government in New Mexico.

Barshov said people in villages who feel unhappy about a certain law, or a lack of a law on a particular subject, should make their feelings known to state legislators.

Organizers and supporters of the petition to conduct a special trustees and mayoral election in the Downs said the trustees had not heard the "end of things."

Gary Mitchell, attorney for the petition organizers, could not be reached for comment.

Harris told those present at the regular meeting, "We have determined the petition is invalid and not subject to debate."

In other business the trustees: —Adopted an ordinance on new business registration. —Adopted an open meetings act.

—Heard the Downs was in need of better drainage facilities, streets and curbs from residents at the meeting.

—Discussed the best procedures to apply for Federal Community Development Block Grants and funds from the New Mexico Community Assistance fund.

—Accepted the lowest bid for a new four-wheel-drive vehicle for the Downs street department.

—Heard there were problems with the DiPaolo Hill Road paving project.

—Accepted the lowest bid for maintenance on the Ruidoso Downs Municipal Building.

—Adjourned into executive session to discuss personnel and other matters.



Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE—They were called Omegas in Salt Lake City, but their real name is Amigos. They're a serious group, whose tours almost certainly do New Mexico a lot of good.

This is the 24th year the organization called New Mexico Amigos has been in existence; it was started by Ed Mechem and Merle Tucker (remember them?) back in 1962, while big Ed was in the last of his four terms as governor of our state. Each year, its members, all of whom pay every cent of their own tab as well as picking up the check for breakfasts, luncheons and dinners for a variety of groups in the towns they visit, make a trip aimed at upping the balance in New Mexico's goodwill account.

This year they were 110 strong, and they went to Denver, Salt Lake City, Boise, Seattle and Calgary, aiming to tell the residents in each of those cities some things they might not previously have known about our part of the world and to thank them for their continued relations with us and our business communities.

Many members say this year's was one of the best excursions ever. Led by Richard Kazlaric of Gallup, this year's president, the 1986 contingent represented 25 different New Mexico communities. That means they can speak up in response to questions of almost any kind, to let those in the cities they visit know more about this state which seems to be such an unknown to so many of our fellow citizens. It also means that not all the emphasis during the presentations is on only one or two towns, as some of

us are inclined to suspect it may be under other circumstances.

Along for the trip as guests of the membership this year were former Governor Jack Campbell and Economic Development Secretary Bob Gold, both chosen for their skill in telling our state's story. Amigos report the message they delivered was exceptionally well received.

And that's the point of the whole thing—to acquaint leaders in a variety of communities with New Mexico. It isn't to sell them on moving their factories here—though Bob Gold admits it's a temptation for him to take that line when he's on his feet before such prime targets for that message. It is purely to act as what the organization's title declares its members to be, friends and neighbors.

Gary Blakeley is this year's man in charge of arrangements for the tour. He admits that job isn't easy. To get everything from hotel reservations to meeting rooms to entertainment set up in a half dozen towns, and then see to it that nobody gets left behind and no detail is overlooked takes considerable skill. Those on the tour say Gary has it.

And for those who have tended in the past to think this is maybe just a fun time for a bunch of good old boys, the schedule for one day in Seattle tells how much hard work goes on. It began with a breakfast for about 20 business executives, including the president of El Paso Natural Gas, in town just to meet with the Amigos, and the vice-chairman of the board of Burlington Northern, of which EPNG is a subsidiary. Then there was a tour

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of the Seattle harbor, followed by a large luncheon for civic leaders, and then an extensive tour of the plant where Boeing builds its passenger aircraft. That doesn't sound like the kind of activity that would be very attractive to the social butterflies in the state's business community.

Next year, under the guidance of Vic Worley, the new president, the group will make its 25th anniversary tour to New England.

The extra bonus to the annual trip, one who made it this year tells us, is in getting to know New Mexicans from all parts of the state on a

familiar basis. "There's no better way to develop lasting friendships," he says, "than to share transportation and rooms with people over a good period of time." He went on to add that he was especially pleased that the presidents of New Mexico State and Eastern had chosen to make the tour this year. "I am sure their schools will benefit from the contacts they developed and the acquaintances they deepened," he says.

As for the Amigos, after a day or two of rest and recreation in Lake Tahoe to complete their tour, they are looking forward to next year.

Riding a bicycle? That's something I haven't done for almost 20 years.

But a desire for physical fitness and some savings on car gas and mileage prompted me to buy a three-speed bicycle last week.

And it was quite an experience getting used to riding the bicycle.

When I tried the bike out at Western Auto, I couldn't remember how you were supposed to get on and off it.

The seat seemed higher than it was when I was a young teen-ager, and getting on and off it seemed like stepping off a skyscraper.

I walked with the bike about two-thirds of the rest of the way to my apartment.

Over the weekend, I had the same problem riding uphill.

However, I gradually found a solution to the problem.

When I was young, I sometimes peddled with my body off the bicycle seat. That way I would get more power, particularly going up steep hills. It also would put less strain on my legs.

But it's an awkward and funny way to ride a bicycle.

In my younger days, other kids would tease their peers who rode a bicycle that way. I had a friend who rode his bicycle constantly with his body off the seat, and he was always teased about it.

But it's still easier to peddle with your body off the seat, so I tried it.

Letters to the editor

DEAR EDITOR:

I have followed with interest The News' coverage of both the McKnight murders and the Ruidoso Downs Municipal election. While I will reserve comment about the blandness and generality with which The News has presented each issue, I must say that the letters to the editor have more than compensated.

Specifically, I refer to the letters printed in your June 19, 1986, edition from Neale and Karen Williams (nee Parsons) and from attorney Charles E. Hawthorne. Although each writer has an obviously biased view, given the fact that the former are relatives of the judge and the latter enjoyed a favorable ruling from him on a controversial case, I feel that they each presented the clearest picture of our District Judge since his election. To the reader who may lack the legal sophistication of an attorney, it may have been easy to form the opinion that Judge Parsons was exercising his personal preferences in the referenced cases. Such an impression would be

mistaken. I certainly would not presume to state what the judge's personal feelings are, but for a person to believe that his rulings are based on anything but statutory or case law is patently wrong. The parameters within which a judge must operate are strictly controlled and subject to the closest scrutiny.

Additionally, he is effectively unarmed due to restrictions by statute and professional ethics from discussing, debating, or publicly reacting to the barbs thrown at him by his critics. Some tend to forget that, although a District Judge is an elected official who runs on the ticket of a particular political party, he is expected to discharge his duties in an impartial and non-partisan manner; just as we expect of a county clerk, a village councillor... or a sheriff. Political expediency must take a back seat to justice. In this district it does.

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

Germany and Zeviken could combine for win in Friday's feature race

Beth Rodgers' Zeviken fires back off a commanding victory two weeks ago to head the field for Friday's 5 1/2-furlong main event at Ruidoso Downs Race Track.

The feature race, which headlines a 12-race card that gets under way at 1 p.m., spotlights ten 3- and 4-year-old thoroughbreds chasing a \$4,200 purse under allowance conditions.

Trainer Lewis Germany opened Zeviken's sophomore campaign on June 8 off a nine-month layoff, sending the colt against high-dollar claiming horses at 5 1/2 furlongs. The Texas-bred turned in a respectable fifth-place finish with Lewis Germany Jr. taking the riding assignment.

Germany lowered the horse into the \$6,250 claiming ranks for his next race on June 15, where Zeviken found the company much more to his liking. He drew out to a 2 1/2-length margin to step off Ruidoso's 5 1/2-furlong course in 1:05 4.

Although Friday's climb into allowance company may appear to be a tough assignment for Zeviken, he ran with some of Ruidoso's top juveniles last summer and should

fare well with Germany Jr. going out with a light 110-pound load.

The two likely choices to upset Zeviken appear to be Natayo Prospect and Wolfbane.

Natayo Prospect was a finalist in both the Riley Allison and Norgor Futurities last year, and already has notched one second with allowance horses at Ruidoso this season. Following that good effort, trainer Doyal Roberts Sr. entered the colt with extremely tough horses for the Memorial Day Handicap on May 26, where Natayo Prospect finished last in the 12-horse field beaten by more than 32 lengths.

He went 5 1/2 furlongs under allowance conditions three weeks ago to finish eighth. But the son of Be A Prospect sports a bullet 4-furlong workout since that race (46 3) and should improve under the handling of jockey Casey Lambert.

Wolfbane is a lightly-raced Noble Kingdom gelding who went wire-to-wire for a 7-length victory at 6 furlongs his first start at Ruidoso on June 14. The speedy thoroughbred finished the three-quarter mile race in 1:11 3 and must be considered a threat off that impressive effort.

Top Rainbow qualifier

Rider Jacky Martin takes Mr. Victory Devil to a four-length victory in trials for the \$640,000 Rainbow Derby, scheduled for Sunday, June 29. The son of Victory Stride, owned by the Circle M Ranch of Manor, Texas, stepped the 440-yard heat in 21.255 seconds to earn the top qualifying spot for the rich stake. Off that im-

pressive effort, he'll head postward as the likely choice to share the role of favorite with Raise A Secret and Dashing Phoebe in the Rainbow Derby. Jack Dube trains Mr. Victory Devil, who was bred by Oklahoma-based Bud Boschert's Stables Inc.



Special thanks for Special Hank

Jockey Salustio Burgos runs down Geers Pat (No. 5 on the inside) aboard Special Hank (No. 9) to post a close "in front" margin, as Ruidoso Downs track announcer Bob Dudich would say. Special Hank broke as the favorite in the \$10,050 Master Salls Handicap on June

21, despite a poor post position. Doyal Roberts Sr. saddled the nine-year-old son of Special Secret for owner Lowell Hankins of Rocksprings, Texas, who collected \$6,030 for Special Hank's winning effort. It was the third stakes win for the Texas-bred this year.

Handle Hotline

The current handle at Ruidoso Downs, after 23 race days and 279 races, is \$8,664,843. The current daily wagering average is \$376,732 with current wagering per race at \$31,057. At the same time last year, after 24 race days and 293 races, the total handle was \$9,577,065. The wagering average at this time last

year was \$399,044 with average per race wagering at this point last year \$32,686. The daily wagering average is down 5.59 percent and the wagering per race is down 4.98 percent when compared to last year at this time. Average attendance at the track is down 4.01 percent below that of last year.

Track Talk

Only three of the 72 horses who advanced into the time trials for the \$700,000 Rainbow Futurity managed to break 20 seconds for the 400 yards in the first round of elimination heats this week at Ruidoso Downs. Lil Bit Shinye posted the fastest time with a 19.75 seconds in the 34th division, which was run on Friday, June 20. On Thursday, June 19, Jet Go Chick was clocked in 19.84 and Bunny Rockette in 19.99.

Trainers Jack Brooks and Dwayne Gilbreath each qualified nine horses into the time trials, to be run on July 3. Jacky Martin was the leading qualifier among the jockeys with 14, while Alex Baldillez Jr. had nine before being injured during the second day of trials.

Baldillez fractured a leg when he fell from his horse during the 11th race on Thursday, June 19. The quarter horse specialist, who was ranked fourth in the jockey standings going into the week's action, said he hoped to be riding again in three weeks.

Trainers Clifford Lambert Sr. and Doyal Roberts Sr. are dominating thoroughbred stake races this season at Ruidoso Downs. Lambert won his fourth stakes race on Sunday, June 22, when Cliffs Place beat Big Bold Boz

in a photo finish in the Norgor Thoroughbred Futurity. His other wins have been in the Rio Grande Kindergarten Futurity, Norgor Derby and the Mescalero Apache Handicap.

Roberts won his third stake race with Special Hank in the Master Salls Handicap on Saturday, June 21. He also has won the Barlaris Handicap and the Memorial Day Handicap.

In the winner's circle following Cliffs Place's win in the Norgor Thoroughbred Futurity, trainer Clifford Lambert Sr. said that he hoped to enter the colt in the Hollywood Juvenile, to be run next month at Hollywood Park.

"I wasn't really surprised," said Lambert of the upset win in the Norgor. "I thought he had a chance because he has so much early speed. He shipped in from Louisiana and has had some problems getting climatized. He tired in the Riley Allison, but he ran a big race in the trials for this race. I felt the good race in the trials helped him today."

That's Incredible tied the season's best time for 7 1/2 furlongs Saturday, June 21, with a 1:32.3 seconds. He shares the clocking with Forever A Ruler.

Fans may find Ronas Ryon somewhere over the Rainbow

Kansas Futurity winner Ronas Ryon fired back for an easy victory in first-round elimination trials for the \$700,000 (est.) Rainbow Futurity held Wednesday at Ruidoso Downs.

Ronas Ryon drew away for a 1 1/2-length margin in Wednesday's 11th Rainbow division with Jerry Nicodemus aboard to step off his 400-yard heat in 20.11 seconds. Glee Club, who won the Sun Country Futurity this spring at Sunland Park, was second under rider Salustio Burgos.

Ronas Ryon is trained by Arnold Simmons Jr. for owners Ben Benham and James Plummer of Arlington, Texas. Glee Club is the property of El Pasoan Robert Haynsworth and Edwin Mayer of San Angelo, Texas.

The trainer/rider combination of Dwayne Gilbreath and Alex Baldillez Jr. stood out in Wednesday's opening Rainbow trials. They teamed to qualify four horses by winning three of the divisions and running second in another.

Baldillez capped off the program equalling the day's fastest time while taking Cash Of Cash to a neck margin in the 12th Rainbow division. The final time was 20.08 seconds over a track listed as muddy from early afternoon rain showers. Baldillez also accounted for two additional wins with Mary Dash and Mr Trophy Hunter. He

Jet Go Chick shows no fear as she circles track in fastest flight

El Pasoan George Houser's Jet Go Chick stepped off the fastest time in elimination trials for the \$700,000 Rainbow Futurity on Thursday at Ruidoso Downs.

Jet Go Chick upset favored Mr Master Jet in the final trial division on Thursday, racing to a 4-length victory with Rudy Bustamante aboard. The Chicks Go Man filly stopped the timer in 19.84 seconds for her 400-yard heat. Ruidoso's racing surface had been upgraded from good to fast three races prior to Jet Go Chick's trial.

Trainer Johnny Bustamante was making his second trip to the Ruidoso winner's circle with Jet Go Chick. She gave notice on May 25 with a half-length win over allowance company going 400 yards in a speedy 19.83 seconds.

The Bustamante's teamed to also qualify Wrangler Time with a second to Rambling Effort in Thursday's fifth race. Rambling Effort was one of two Special Effort colts qualified by trainer Leo Wood and rider Donald Knight. They won the opening division with Flying Effort.
