## Robbery suspects are caught

Two men charged with last week's armed robbery of Bennett's Shur-Sav grocery store are in police custody and will be arraigned today (Monday), June 30, in Magistrate Court, according to Ruidoso Police Detective Mike Lovelace said.

John Natale, 42, was arrested Thursday evening in Ruidoso Downs, and Audree Lacey McCullar, 30, was arrested Friday in Tularosa.

Natale was charged with possession with the intent to traffic heroin, armed robbery and false imprisonment, said Lovelace. He said McCullar is being held on the armed robbery charge and a Texas parole violation.

Lovelace said the Ruidoso Downs Police Department assisted in Thursday's arrest, and the Otero County Sheriff's Office and Alamogordo Department of Public Safety assisted in the Friday arrest.

The armed robbery and false imprisonment charges arose from last Saturday's incident in which it was reported that two masked men, armed with a 12-gauge shotgun, bound and gagged two Bennett's employees and stole the day's receipts.

The celebration featured a variety of activities, including a parade, live music, and a Texas-themed dinner. The event was a great success and drew a large crowd of people.

## Corporate Bug flies in to take Rainbow Derby

Californian Jack Munari bought a young quarter horse in a claiming race at Los Alamitos Race Course last summer for \$12,500. Sunday, the West Coast native watched his investment balloon into a \$222,000 payoff when Corporate Bug upset an all-star field of dashers in the \$640,000 Rainbow Derby at Ruidoso Downs.

Corporate Bug was in the toughest company of his racing career for the 22nd running of the Rainbow Derby. Among the 10 finalists were recent Kansas Derby winner Dashing Phoebe and multiple California stakes winner Raise A Secret. For added measure, top qualifier Mr Victory Devil started an undefeated record in four starts this year.

Dashing Phoebe went into the race as the 7-5 favorite with Mr Victory Devil second in the wagering and Raise A Secret third. None of the three contenders would finish in the money.

When the bell sounded, Jacky Martin broke on top of the field out of the rail post aboard Mr Victory Devil. Rider Nicky Wilson was a step behind coming out of the No. 8 post position under Cash Fever.

Kip Dederksen had Corporate Bug out of the gate right behind Cash Fever breaking next door in

the seven hole. He pounded away at Cash Fever's lead as Mr Victory Devil began to fade on the rail.

Dederksen got Corporate Bug up in the final strides to beat 60-1 longshot Cash Fever by a neck. Three-quarter lengths behind Cash Fever came Throb, a 72-1 outsider ridden by veteran Roy Brooks. The final time for the 440 yards was 21.94 seconds over a track rated as good.

Raise A Secret lost running room when Follow The Fox moved over into his lane after beating the colt on the break. Dashing Phoebe broke fifth and it appeared jockey Jerry Nicodemus never got the filly to run her race as she continued to lug toward the rail.

Munari accepted a winner's check of \$222,140 for Corporate Bug's effort. Bruce Jackson saddled the Shawnee Bug gelding, who was supplemented to the Rainbow Derby at a cost of \$15,000. That payment was more than the horse had earned in his 10 lifetime races.

Munari was humble about the horse's performance.

"I don't necessarily feel that he was the best of all the horses running in this race today," the real estate developer from Paso Robles, California, said. "But I think he went into the race running at his peak."

## Sierra Blanca Airport road is subject of controversy

Airport engineer Earl Cooke said Friday the much debated airport access road route in the 1976 Airport Master Plan was never intended as the final recommendation for the alignment of that road.

He said the purpose of the master plan was to develop, show and form the basis for a direct access from the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport to Highway 37. He said the plan indicates that a corridor along the ridge is feasible as a safe, efficient and uninterrupted route.

"This has been misconstructed and the basis for concerns," said Cooke, who admitted that no engineering has been done on the proposed route.

Property owners, the Lincoln County Commission and the Sierra Blanca Airport Commission (SBAC) have had an ongoing debate of late as to where the road should be placed.

The SBAC has endorsed the master plan route, and avers it has no authority to recommend any other alignment.

SBAC contract administrator Fred Heckman said land owners have offered right of way on much of the proposed route.

SBAC Chairman Ken Nosker said he is most concerned about the five right-angle turns on the present road. He said he is interested in the safest, fastest and most economical route to connect the airport to the Ruidoso area.

But Harvey Foster and a group of property owners affected by the proposed roads aren't convinced the master plan contains the safest and most economical road alignment.

Foster said a new road isn't needed, and recommends a major overhaul and realignment of the present Fort Stanton Road.

"In a town this size, you fix what you've got," noted Foster. Airport commissioners and

engineers have stressed the importance of getting the road up higher for solar exposure in snowy weather, but Foster said either location will require special maintenance in icy weather.

Foster and the Peebles family owners of a large area that would be intersected by the master plan alignment, are asking for public hearings before a road is engineered in either location.

He said the public input should be gathered before, not after, a definite alignment is established.

Since the state has said it will take over the new road only after certain traffic counts are met, Foster said the county will actually be adding one more road to the many miles already in its system.

Foster said right of way acquisition should be cheaper along the

present route where the road is already owned, at least in part. The proposed road would require acquiring 100 percent of right of way needs, noted Foster.

While the SBAC has selected numerous other sites of right of way along the route, the Peebles family members, who own much of the land, oppose the road alignment.

Let's not be swayed at this point by individual property owners who are only interested in personal gain, said Heckman.

We have a bad habit of putting roads down where wagons rolled, remarked Heckman. He said this is the ideal time to design a good road that will serve future generations.

There is no reason we can't bend the road around to meet everybody's needs," he added.

Cooke said at this point the

recommended corridor should be a rare find in a proposed alignment, showing all existing physical features. He said the existing property owner information should then be imposed on the resulting aerial photographed map.

He said the road engineers should come up with a set of criteria on road standards, site distance, gradients, degrees and curves. That information should then be shared with property owners.

A recommended alignment developed then should be discussed at public hearings, said Cooke.

"If the sponsoring agency has it set together then they'll go ahead and acquire right of way," said Cooke.

"I don't think it's appropriate that we go back and reinvent the wheel," said Cooke, who reiterated

the importance of developing the most efficient and safest road at the lowest possible cost.

Cooke noted the existing road has prompted realignment.

"Is that really compatible for the road that will be designed for 50 miles per hour traffic?" asked Cooke. He wondered if it would make sense to turn a residential road into a highway.

In the meantime the Lincoln County Commission has taken over the lead in the road building project.

They notified the State Highway Department of their intent, but the next steps choosing and hiring engineers will apparently be discussed at the next County Commissioner's meeting.

## Study pushes Ruidoso as airline destination point

Everything you always wanted to know about Ruidoso but were afraid to ask could be the title of a book designed to promote the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport as a destination point for major airline companies.

Information gathered for the book by Kevin Clear of Clear and Company may contain some surprises but nothing to fear.

The 75-page document is filled with positive facts and figures on a continuing growth-pattern in the Ruidoso area.

Tourist information in the book includes the fact that "the Ruidoso area ranks second only to Albuquerque in total sleeping accommodations."

With 3,000 units containing 6,000 beds, the Ruidoso area can accommodate more than 7,000 tourists.

Those units record a yearly occupancy of 225,100 which adds up to a 60 percent occupancy rate. Planners hope to boost that figure to 70 percent by 1990. The average length of stay, currently five days, is expected to jump to six days by that time.

Yearly totals of horse racing attendance and Ski Apache Resort ticket sales are listed. A Ruidoso Downs Race Track survey indicates that nearly 60 percent of tracksters are from Texas.

With the largest lift capacity in New Mexico, Ski Apache can handle 12,000 skiers an hour on the 30 miles of assorted-level trails. The ski area listed 11,000 paid skiers in 1961-62, 88,000 in 1971-72, 202,900 in 1981-82 and 274,000 in 1984-85.

Among tourist attractions listed are the Inn of the Mountain Gods, hunting and fishing, the Lincoln National Forest and the historic town of Lincoln.

Clear compared Ruidoso with three other resort communities: Aspen, Colorado; Durango, Col-

orado, and Jackson, Wyoming. The towns list the following permanent populations: Aspen, 4,500; Durango, 10,000; Jackson, 6,500; and Ruidoso, 8,000.

Ruidoso's 6,700 total tourist accommodations compared favorably with Jackson's 5,500, Durango's 3,400 and Aspen's 10,750.

Other local economic indicators cited in the fact-filled volume include statistics on utility meters. Electric company residential meters increased from 6,076 in 1980 to 8,193 in 1985. Telephones in Lin-

coln County and Mesalero went from 3,665 in 1975 to 6,810 in 1984.

The accumulated data was used to show "the degree of pressure being exerted on the limited airport facilities."

An announcement last week of Southwest Airlines' interest in landing planes at the SBRA is the first response to efforts by three local men to gain major air service to the airport on Fort Stanton mesa.

Clear was contracted by Ralph Petty, John Hall and Ken Green to prepare the promotional material.

## Don Edwards is dead at 69

Longtime Ruidosoan and former Village of Ruidoso Downs employee Buford D. (Don) Edwards died Friday in the Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Hospital.

Edwards was born January 1, 1917, in Okmulgee, Oklahoma, to J.B. and Gladys Edwards.

He was married to Carmen Keith Cook April 5, 1966, in Perryton, Texas.

The Edwards moved to Ruidoso from Perryton in January 1971, after Don Edwards retired from Phillips Petroleum.

Edwards owned and operated a motel in Ruidoso for a time, then worked for the Village of Ruidoso Downs for four years.

Survivors include his wife, Carmen K. Edwards, of Ruidoso; mother, Gladys Edwards of Austin, Texas; sister, Lorna Headrich, of Austin; sons Brian Edwards and Bruce Edwards of Fremont, Ohio, Greg Cook of Garden City, Kansas, and Mike Cook of Carlsbad; and 6 grandchildren and several nieces and nephews.

# Airport funding still uncertain

A tentative allocation of funds, the next step toward the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport, has not been issued.

Jerry Trujillo, Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) environmental specialist, said Friday funding is still not established for the first phase of airport construction on the Fort Stanton mesa.

Funding has been held up while all the steps leading up to a final environmental statement were completed. When the FAA issued a finding of no significant impact (FONSI) on the chosen site that cleared the way for funds to be allocated.

"Nothing happens until you get a tentative allocation," noted Trujillo.

He said a tentative allocation is a commitment from the FAA that funds are available.

A preapplication filed last week by the Sierra Blanca Airport Commission listed a project start date of July 14, 1986.

Trujillo said the date on the preapplication was not provided by the FAA.

"They (airport planners) say when they can start," said Trujillo.

He said the first tentative allocation will be for the \$1 million needed

to repay New Mexico State University for the airport land. The next available funds will be allocated for airport construction, said Trujillo.

Although the FAA is interested in the disposal of the Ruidoso Municipal Airport, Trujillo said the money from that land is not a factor in the initial construction funding.

"We're trying to get the construction money whether we get the \$2.6 million from Ruidoso or not," said Trujillo.

"We're encouraging strongly that they try to get the money from that site," he added.

# Chamber board elects officers

The Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors elected its president elect for 1987-88, four new vice presidents, approved the 1986-87 budget and discussed the possibilities of a Convention Visitors Bureau at its meeting Thursday at the chamber.

Bill Hirschfeld was elected board president last year and will take over Paul Crown's position July 1. Board members elected Barbara DiPaolo president elect for 1987-88. Elected to serve this year as vice presidents were Robert Boverie, advertising-promotional division; Roy Crocker, organizational development division; Becky Durham, community development division; and Don Shaw, economic development division.

Board members also approved a \$169,000 budget for the 1986-87 year. The budget was approved with a

motion for the executive committee to review the budget and make any revisions at a special meeting called for Tuesday at 4 p.m.

Chamber executive director John Jeffers introduced a preliminary outline for a possible Convention Visitors Bureau which would be created as a part of the chamber.

"It is vital and critical for our board to get this started," Jeffers said.

The board agreed that a letter of intent should be sent to Mayor Lloyd Davis Jr., outlining the board's plans to bid on the convention bureau.


The bureau proposal summarized some of the services the convention bureau would perform. It would "conduct surveys of potential advertising and media for promotion of Ruidoso's convention, tourism and recreational facilities; provide representation at conventions; design and place advertising, design and distribute pamphlets,

brochures, maps and other promotional material; conduct direct-mail solicitation of tourist and convention business; prepare and place publicity releases; and assist in obtaining appropriate facilities and provide registration services for conventions."

In other business, board members heard a report from Charlie Smith on the Art Festival scheduled for July 25-27. Smith said there will be 110 artists featured at the festival. Crown reminded board members of the importance of the festival.

"The Art Festival is the number one money maker for the chamber besides membership dues. It is very important to chamber operations," Crown said.

The board's annual meeting was also announced. It is scheduled for Thursday, July 17, at the Carrizo Lodge. The HN'ZHU'NE Building beautification Award will be presented at the meeting.

That and a personal presentation were forerunners to the positive response from Southwest Airlines.

They plan to continue their campaign and meet with other air carriers to ensure that the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport, expected to open next year, will be served by at least one major airline.

Hall said last week if just one airline offers just one charter flight a day from five different cities—that could boost the area economy. He said if each flight carried 90 people, and each visitor spends just \$100 a day, over a 35-week period the area will receive \$3 to \$9 million in added business.

"It's big money just doing it that way," noted Hall.

Village administrators will meet today (Monday), June 30, with representatives from the Federal Emergency Management Administration (FEMA) to present Ruidoso's case for a half-million-dollar flood-relief request.

Village manager Jim Hine filed a declaration in Santa Fe late last week in which a state of emergency was declared with damage estimated at \$500,000, said assistant village manager Frank Potter.

He said FEMA officials will survey the damage today and make a recommendation for the allocation of federal relief funds.

"This past flood was different in

that we didn't have localized flooding on the street," noted Potter.

He said the 10 to 11 inches of rain that fell on Sierra Blanca washed down a great deal of debris that amplified the water problems.

Potter said Ski Run Road was washed out, several bridges sustained severe damage and municipal sewer and water lines were broken and damaged in several places. He knew of just one residence that was damaged by last week's high waters.

"We don't know that much yet," said Potter, who said a complete survey will be finished today.

# P&Z moves to protect open spaces

What's in a name? asked the Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) during a special meeting Friday.

After months of debates and discussions of a proposed forest-hillside protective zone, the commission Friday changed that name to environmental conservation zone (ECZ) and approved a public lands zone designation.

It was learned that ECZ is the same as the forest-hillside protective zone, but adds wording to include golf courses.

Commissioners made the changes to provide protection from unwanted development on what is now the Cree Meadows Country Club Golf Course and the site of the Ruidoso Municipal Airport.

"We didn't have golf courses anywhere in the ordinance," noted enforcement officer Sandy Hall. She said the proposal will provide some control on future golf course

development without taking away any economic benefits from the property owners.

Commissioner Mary Underwood disagreed and wondered what might happen if the owners of Cree Meadows Country Club want to develop the golf course.

"I think you're taking rights away from those people," argued Underwood, but the proposed changes were approved over her dissenting vote.

Commissioner Martin Rose explained that anytime property is purchased in a town, the purchaser consents to abide by municipal rules and regulations.

"This keeps us just out of the woods," said P&Z Chairman Mike Callaghan. "I think this way kind of covers everything that was left in the gray area," he added.

Hall agreed to present the proposals to the Ruidoso Village Council.

The purpose of the special meeting was to review two separate commercial development plans.

Both sets of plans, one for a drive-up window at the Ruidoso Financial Center and the other for additions to Joe Wilson's medical offices, were unanimously approved in less than 10 minutes.

George Lore and Tim Collins explained The Bank of Ruidoso's plans for a drive-in window at the Ruidoso Financial Center on Mechem Drive.

Lore thanked the commission for taking the time for a special meeting to get the project under way.

"It's going to give you guys a new image," said Lore.

Joe Wilson said the addition he plans on lots 8A, 8B and the east half of Lot 9, Block 15, Palmer Gateway Subdivision, won't impact his parking or encroach in any way.

The next regular P&Z meeting is scheduled at 3 p.m. Monday, July 7.

# Task force names chairmen, organizes

The Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce Economic Development Task Force (EDTF) Thursday described its five sub-committees and appointed people to chair them.

The Finance Committee will be headed by Rod Adamson; the Budget Committee by Charlotte Jarratt; the Prospect Committee by Don Shaw; the Research Committee by Barbara DiPaolo; and the Public Relations and Promotion Committee by C. N. "Buddy" Bundick.

The Finance Committee will be responsible for fund-raising activities for the task force. It will

also seek out alternative sources of funding for the purchase of the existing airport land and make recommendations to the Ruidoso Village Council. Task force co-chairman Rick Evans stressed the recommendations would be just that.

"We should only give input as an advisory body. We are in no position to make any decisions," Evans said.

The Budget Committee will be responsible for the internal budget of the task force. Members agreed the committee should set up a non-profit foundation for operative

funds, Evans said. Shaw's Prospect Committee will contact potential businesses interested in locating in the Ruidoso area.

The Research Committee will gather data on economic, financial and other conditions in the Ruidoso area.

Task force co-chairman Bundick's Public Relations and Promotion Committee will oversee communications between the task force and any governing bodies involved with it as well as with the press. The committee will also prepare task force status reports.

An escapee from Camp Sierra Blanca was returned to the minimum security facility Saturday about 7 p.m., according to Capitan police reports.

Richard William Greenbaum was scheduled to return from a work release program at 2 p.m. Satur-

day, but failed to appear at the prison, according to a Corrections Department spokesperson.

Capitan police apprehended Greenbaum in Capitan. He is scheduled for arraignment today (Monday), June 30.

# Mescalero Tribe youth attend safety workshop

A youth safety workshop was conducted at the Mescalero Apache Community Center last Thursday.

Albert Platta, Mescalero Community health and safety officer, said Mescalero parents were concerned because the newly opened portion of Highway 70 near Apache Summit seems to have produced a greater flow of vehicles which travel at increased rates of speed through Mescalero.

During the summer, the youth in and around Mescalero often ride their bikes to the community center, Platta said.

The Mescalero Police, the Bureau of Indian Affairs, and representatives of the New Mexico State Police from District Eight in Alamogordo presented a special program on bicycle safety to a large group of Mescalero youth at the workshop last Thursday.

Mescalero officials also took the opportunity to discuss poison prevention at the youth workshop.

Dr. Saverio Sava, of the Public Health Hospital, warned the youth about the dangers of various poisons.

Sava told the Mescalero youth not to take any over-the-counter medicine that was in capsule form because of recent incidents in several communities in which products in capsule form were found to

be tainted. Sava also discussed alcohol and other substance abuse problems at the conference.

Platta thanked all the businesses and individuals in Ruidoso, Mescalero and Alamogordo who supplied door prizes for the safety workshop.

Like countless others her family moved west, when she was a small child, seeking the healthful climate of Colorado, New Mexico and Arizona, which later were to become the great "lands of second life" to countless thousands, had not yet begun drawing many settlers. This was about 1880.

Mother grew up in Denver, Colorado, and in East Denver High School she met her husband to be, Lynn Whippo Storm. They were married in the home of Grandpa and Grandma Kennedy on May thirty, 1906.

Our father had finished The Colorado School of Mines in 1902 as a mining engineer. It was about 1908 the gold strikes in Alaska called, and he answered the call, arriving at Valdez, where he became a government surveyor, prospector,

and also had his consulting geologist office upstairs in the small house where I was born.

In Early January, 1909, Mother and the eldest child, John, not quite two years old, set sail from Seattle on the steamship, Yucatan; and arrived in Valdez, about mid-January, in the middle of the heaviest snow fall on record at that village before or since. There are some rare photos in the house of that winter.

There are photos also of mother pushing a baby buggy with runners instead of wheels over the deep snow. Mother, who had played the pipe organ in the Denver Presbyterian Church on the Capital grounds, was the organist in the historic Little Episcopal Church in Valdez.

Of those early days, Mother often said: "I loved every minute of it. I was young and strong, and I would like to do it all over again."

I was born in Valdez October 27, 1909; and Mark on September four, 1911. John had been born in Denver, April fifteen, 1907. Joe was born February 28, 1913, in Denver, after we went back to "the states". Lynn was born November 28, 1914, in Juneau, after we went back to Alaska.

After living in Oregon, and California, we found ourselves away up in the wild mountains of the state of Sinaloa, Mexico, sixty miles inland from Mazatlan, where father was testing some mines and

working for a silver smelter in the town of Copala.

About 1923, we were again in "the states" in El Paso. Sixty one years ago, in 1925 we landed here "across the creek" in our 1917 Velie automobile.

As soon as we arrived, Mother's sky blue eyes brightened in a smile, as she said:

"I have traveled over half the world, and I am settling down right here."

With these words an everlasting benediction was given to this sacred spot; and it is with the deepest gratefulness that I feel our mother's spirit close beside me here today, on the approach of her birthday.

Mark's Art Show

I am looking forward to brother Mark's art show to be held over the week of the Fourth at the Artisan's Shop and Gallery in Ruidoso.

There is one picture I am anxious to see, of some early day Apache Warriors on horseback, pointing to an approaching cloud of dust. As near as I come to the pronunciation, the title is "Been-Dah-li-kai" (The White Eyes) meaning the approach of white men.

It is a coincidence that this July two is the sixtieth anniversary of our arriving at Mescalero during the four day celebration where we stayed four days, with our old car broken down. This was the beginning of fond friendship of the Storm family for the Mescalero Apache Indians.

"They played really well, but credit," said Stretch Meadows.


The Meadows brothers were semi-finals in a 1985 tournament before being eliminated.

They live in the Ruidoso area, summer, but were on the outskirts of El Paso.


It was the first time Smith had played in a tournament since he was in high school.

Saturday's race also will have a 5-K Fun Run. The competition will start at 8 a.m.







## Trustees open bids on G.O. bonds

Capitan Village Trustees met in special session Thursday to open bids for the general obligation bonds.

Mayor Benny Coker and trustees Norm Renfro, David Rouleau and Dave Strickland approved an ordinance to accept the low bid from Eppler, Guerin and Turner, Incorporated of Albuquerque at an interest rate of 7.79 percent.

That rate is lower than the rate approved by voters for the \$600,000 bonds to be used for a new water system in Capitan.

Nan Halligan, representative for Stern Brothers Financial Advisors, opened the three bids received from holding companies.

Boetcher and Company of Denver, Colorado, bid 7.89 percent, Quinn and Company with Keous and Company, Albuquerque, bid 8.02 percent. The Eppler, Guerin and Turner, Incorporated, bid was presented by United New Mexico Bank at Vaughn.

Halligan then opened three fiscal agent bids, explaining to trustees the fiscal agent will be the party responsible for payment schedules, interest payments and maturity of bonds. Fiscal agents must "trust

powers."

Sunwest Bank of Albuquerque had the low bid, charging \$300 set up fee and annual fee of \$200. First National Bank of Albuquerque bid \$500 set up fee and \$500 annual fee and United New Mexico Bank of Albuquerque bid \$678.44 set up fee and \$678.44 annual fee.

The bonds will now be printed, registered and placed with Sunwest Bank. Halligan assured trustees the transaction should not take more than 30 days to complete and said it was "important to have it done" before the new tax law goes into effect September 1.

Village clerk Virginia Spall asked

Halligan how a private investor could buy the bonds.

"Before a company bids they have a pretty good idea about who is going to buy them," he replied.

Coker appointed Rouleau, R.L. Van Norman and Leon Eggleston to a financial advisory board to investigate investments for the bond money and to keep the money invested until it is needed for the water system.

Trustees agreed wise investments could earn more interest than is being paid on the bonds.



IF LIBERALS HAD THEIR WAY...

The intersection of Fifth and D streets has become much busier in the past year than it had been.

The intersection passes close by the Ruidoso Care Center, and several years ago, primarily led to just that. With the construction of the Grindstone Dam, and the opening of subdivisions in Grindstone Canyon, traffic through the intersection has increased dramatically.

The increased traffic increases the need for proper traffic control signs at the intersection.

No traffic control signs limit eastbound traffic on Fifth Street, nor do any limit southbound traffic on D Street. That leaves open the possibility of neither lane yielding for the other—and a potential accident.

The intersection has changed from a little-used residential lane to becoming a busy traffic arterial.

We encourage village officials to study the intersection, and install a solution to the potentially dangerous problem before a serious accident occurs. DJP

Especially when our state's part-time legislators swoop into town for one of their hit-and-run sessions and join those already permanently employed under this circular roof, there are enough case studies in the building to make a psychiatric researcher's reputation.

You'd have to look a long way to find a better demonstration of that than we had during the 48 hours our Legislature was in session last week. On that occasion, our state Senate chose to change its leadership, and that action generated some conduct that strongly suggests the existence of some problems in the area of mental health. Can you imagine a group of grown men, for instance, who become so angry at the loss of some small amount of their power that they formally adopt a plan to ostracize those with whom they have fallen into dispute? Does that sound healthy—especially in those who serve in a forum that has been designed just to handle and resolve such disagreements?

We had that here, as the group of Houstonite Republicans in the Senate, after three hours or so of discussion, emerged to put the deep freeze on those four former members of their group, Senators Morgan, Budagher, Martin and Vandergriff, who chose to join Democrats in their body in voting for Senator Ike Smalley as president pro tem. No Houston follower will any longer speak to them.

Do you consider it an act of well-adjusted public servants to mobilize their own non-elected spouses in such a campaign of punishment? Should wives of some Senators treat other Senate wives with brutal disdain because their husbands are in legitimate discord between themselves?

We had that here too last week; and these snubs, designed only to be hurtful, extended even to the wife of Senator Caleb Chandler, also now viewed by the Houston group as traitor because he freely chose not to support their cause any longer.

And all this, mind you, went on between so-called adults, though it is an example of the kind of "poor-loser" attitudes Americans usually

try to train out of their children when they are of an age for Little League.

What is it all about? Power—and its loss.

Power means that much to some people, and their excessive reaction to its departure cannot fail to suggest that they value it over-highly. That may be hard for ordinary citizens, who lead sane lives without such power-drives, to understand. It's well to remember, however, that politicians seldom do drugs; their drug is power.

In a recent novel, Dan Wakefield describes how this hardest of opiates makes certain politicians feel: "There is a rush, an exhilaration, a buoyancy, a feeling of command, a sense of being taller, stronger, wiser, of imperceptibly lifting off the ground and having the capacity to look down and see things from the advantageous perspective of pinnacle vision, as if viewing people and events from the top of a private mountain or, more emotionally accurate, a Valhalla."

If you think this column makes too much of too little, you should have been here to observe at first hand the childish temper tantrums of those who had their Valhalla taken from them last week.

On the other side of the coin, nobody could have been happier than Toney Anaya at that same time.

Every deal he made before the special legislative session started had been with Gene Samberson in the House and Les Houston in the Senate. When he realized a move was on to defrock the latter of those two, he must have pictured his whole scheme collapsing around his ears, as so many previous Anaya plans have ended up doing.

Instead, despite the short, sharp war in the Senate, legislators did almost exactly what Anaya wanted, and they did it quickly. That's why he rushed to sign the bills they passed in the capital rotunda and urged lawmakers to be on their way out of town.

Like us, he must be praying that he and the legislators will never again be exposed to one another's official presence.




