

State explains specifics of property reappraisal

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Two will be tried for robbery of Bennett's

John Natale and Andree Lacey (previously identified by police as Audrey Lacey) McCullar will stand trial in district court for the June 21 armed robbery of Bennett's Shur-Sav grocery store.

After two hours of testimony Thursday, Magistrate Judge J.R. "Jim" Wheeler ruled that probable cause had been established and bound Natale, 42, and McCullar, 30, over for trial in district court.

Both are charged with armed robbery and false imprisonment, and Natale is also charged with trafficking in a controlled

substance (heroin) with the intent to distribute.

Early in the preliminary hearing, Bennett's assistant manager Keith Borah confirmed that Natale is his brother-in-law. He said in a telephone interview Friday that his wife and Natale's wife are sisters.

Borah testified Thursday of following "normal procedures" the Saturday evening of the robbery. Borah said he unlocked the back door for Bennett's checker, Tom Baca, to take out the trash, went to the restroom and returned to find Baca "down on the floor tied up on his stomach."

Borah, who testified that he and Baca were the only two people in

the store, said he saw a tall person in coveralls wearing a brown mask standing over Baca. Upon realizing the intruder was unarmed, he said he looked the other way only to "encounter a shotgun pointed right at my head."

Borah said he heard the shotgun cock and immediately ducked.

"It was a real shock it scared me to death," said Borah seriously.

Borah, a slender five-foot eleven, said the armed man, described as tall and wearing coveralls and a mask, told him to "stop right there, turn around and take me to the cash."

Borah testified the intruder used a "disguised stern, low voice" and

told him to put the cash receipts into a bag. He further testified the man warned if there were any more people in the store he would kill them.

During questioning by Assistant District Attorney Harry Wilcox Jr., Borah said he stuffed the cash, about \$8,000, into a purple The Bank of Ruidoso ziplock bag as the intruder pointed the cocked shotgun at his chest.

"It didn't take long," noted Borah. He then told of being returned to the back room where he, too, was tied with cord and blindfolded with duct tape.

Borah said he then waited and listened for a while before calling

out to Baca.

"I couldn't even remember his (Baca's) name," said Borah.

He went on to testify how Baca rolled over to him, and using a box cutter from Borah's pocket, cut him free. Borah said he gave his key to Baca, told him to lock the back door and immediately called the police.

Borah revealed that Natale, with another man in the car, came by Bennett's about 5 p.m. the Saturday of the robbery.

He was trying to be real cordial," said Borah.

In spite of objections from public defender Gary Mitchell, a photo line-up was entered into evidence. Borah testified that he identified

McCullar as the other man in the car from the photos.

Mitchell said the photo lineup was "far too suggestive," and noted that hair styles of the men in the photo were different than incidents.

Mitchell entered several objections during the hearing, including a vehement objection to Judge Wheeler's request that his clients stand for purposes of identification while Borah speculated as to the height of the armed robbers.

For purposes of this hearing,

Mescalero bingo Tribe will start games late July

Bingo is coming to the Inn of the Mountain Gods at the end of this month.

But officials for the Mescalero Apache Tribe, MAT, would not speculate on exactly how their bingo operation would be run.

"It's going to be regular bingo, bingo, and it is going to be operated by the Tribe," MAT administrative assistant Richard Wardlaw said when asked to describe what people could expect if they attended a bingo game at the Inn of the Mountain Gods.

Wardlaw was more specific on when the bingo operation would begin.

"We are definitely going to crank it up at the end of the month," Wardlaw said.

The Inn of the Mountain Gods, director of sales and marketing, Steve Tally, told The News he wanted the public to know bingo would be available at the Inn of the

Mountain Gods at the end of the month.

But he said he did not know exactly how the bingo operation would be run.

Tally did say the bingo game would be played at the Mescalero Room at the Inn's convention center, which holds more than 300 people.

Larry Perriman, one of the managers at the Inn of the Mountain Gods, said not say how the bingo games would be run either, but he felt bingo would be a plus for the popular area inn.

"We're pretty excited about it," Perriman said.

"We feel it's going to complement our other attractions. We hope to get both tourists and the locals involved," Perriman said.

In the spring, the Mescalero Apache Tribal Council voted to allow bingo to be played on the reservation.

However, the decision to have the tribe manage the bingo operation, instead of a management firm, was

only made recently, according to tribal official who asked not identified.

"For a while we thought the games were going to be run at the Mescalero Apache convention center. These people were saying going to be high stakes bingo, are only speculating," the tribal official said.

The tribal official said the tribal council was anxious to see how bingo at the Inn of the Mountain Gods would fare.

A spokesman for the Bureau of Indian Affairs, BIA, office in Albuquerque said bingo operation on Indian reservations are not usually subject to any caps on prizes or prize money in an earlier interview with The News.

The BIA spokesman said the MAT could be able to use any profits from the bingo operation to help support the general welfare of its members.

Primary candidates list final expenditures

Final financial disclosures filed last week by candidates in the June primaries offered few surprises. Most reports indicated only minor changes in either contributions or expenditures from the figures filed 10 days before the Democratic (D) and Republican (R) primary elections.

Candidates for sheriff remained top spenders with all four spending well over \$9,000 in the race. Sheriff candidates also racked up contributions of close to \$7,000 to finance the hotly contested race.

Lincoln County Undersheriff Charles Sims Cox, who lost his bid for the Republican nomination in that race, reported additional expenditures of \$1,582.80, making him the top spender in the June primary. Records indicated Cox spent a total of \$3,940.26.

He reported additional contributions of \$100, half from Raymond Reeves of Ruidoso and half from Johnson Stearns of Carrizozo. Total contributions to the Cox campaign

were \$1,700.

Don Samuels, winner of the Republican nomination, was top fundraiser reporting \$350 last week bringing his total contributions to \$3,525. Latest contributions were from Bob Rush (\$100), Ralph Petty (\$200) and William M. Underhill (\$50).

Reporting \$1,582.80 in added expenses, the Samuel campaign disclosed a total of \$3,584.53.

Democratic candidates for sheriff trailed the two Republican contenders in both spending and contributions, with the Democratic nominee, Jim Nesmith, filing a certificate stating he spent and received less than \$500 for his successful campaign.

David Pfeffer revealed \$482.66 in the 30-day disclosure, bringing his total spent to \$1,763.81. He received total contributions of \$1,505.32, with \$176.56 of that reported on the most recent disclosure. That came from All American Ford (\$75), Carla Tam (\$1.56) and Doin (\$100).

According to the latest reports other candidates spent and received the following:

DISTRICT MAGISTRATE DIVISION I

S.M. Ortiz (D), certified spending and receiving less than \$500 in his 10-day report, but reported total expenses of \$654 in the 30-day disclosure. Ortiz also reported the following \$200 in contributions:

- Harry Wilcox \$50

Alfred Leroy Montes (R), certified spending and receiving less than \$500 in both the 10-day and 30-day reports.

Gerald Dean Jr. (D), reported \$275 in contributions and \$763.93 in expenses in his 10-day disclosure, with no change in contributions on the 30-day report. Dean reported additional expenditures of \$145.24.

DISTRICT MAGISTRATE DIVISION II

Charles D. Flanagan (R), certified less than \$500 in expenditures and contributions in his 10-day report, but reported total expenses of \$2,295.59 in the 30-day disclosure. Flanagan reported nine anonymous donations totaling \$535.80.

J.R. "Jim" Wheeler (R),

reported contributions of \$1,230 and expenditures of \$2,261.02 in his 10-day report, with no change in expenditures on the 30-day disclosure. Wheeler reported additional contributions of \$250, \$200 from Guy Bowers and \$50 from Don Dale.

COUNTY COMMISSIONER DISTRICT I

Dennis Nosker (R), certified contributions and expenditures of \$500 or less in his first report. On the 30-day disclosure Nosker reported no change in contributions, but disclosed \$347.91 in expenses.

George F. Lore (R), reported his original report of \$400 in contributions remained unchanged, but disclosed an additional \$137.26 in campaign expenses bringing his total spent to \$507.69.

Ralph Dunlap (D), his under \$500 certificate for both contribution and expenses was reported unchanged for donations. Dunlap reported \$34.08 in additional expenses.

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

Big tipper

After being purchased for \$8,000 in the Walter Merrick Near Dispersal Sale at Ruidoso Downs on July 5, Keep The Change recovered his owner's investment with a one-length upset victory over stakes winner Special Hank in the \$12,475 Flying Charm Handicap run July 13 at Ruidoso Downs. Jockey Joe Martinez steered the six-year-old over the mountain track's 870-yard course in a

sizzling 44.26 seconds to establish a new track record. Fred Danley saddled the son of Such a Rush for owners Robert Haynsworth (El Paso, Texas), Edwin Mayer Jr. (San Angelo, Texas) and Phillip Mote (Ruidoso). Special Hank finished second to the 25-1 longshot with Financial Aid third. The winner's purse amounted to \$7,485.

Lovely Glass drinks from cup of victory

El Pasoans Carol and Frank Tisdale III sent out their well-bred mare Lovely Glass for a handy win in Friday's featured allowance sprint at Ruidoso Downs.

Apprentice rider Quyet Bui held Lovely Glass a few strides off a swift pace set by 26-1 outsider Natayo Prospect in Friday's 5 1/2-furlong feature race. Easy Chief, a 5-1 shot ridden by Jim Powell, drew alongside the mare as they moved within striking distance on the final turn, overtaking a tiring Natayo Prospect as the field hit the top of the stretch.

Bui rode away on Lovely Glass in the final furlong to post a 3 1/2-length margin in 1:04.1 seconds. Easy Chief held on for second, finishing a half-length in front of Zeviken, the

second favorite with apprentice Lewis Germany Jr. at the helm.

After finishing second or third in six of her seven races this year, Lovely Glass was finally greeted in the winner's circle by the Tisdales, who collected \$2,520 for her victory. Alberto Dominguez conditions the daughter of Pass The Glass who was bred in California.

Easy Chief banked \$924 for second. Brooks Claridge trains the Delaware Chief gelding for Lawrence Blackmon Jr. of Dallas, Texas. Zeviken, a Lewis Germany trainee, was seeking his third straight win at the summer meet. Beth Rodgers of Andrews, Texas, earned \$420 for the colt's third-place finish.

Sorenson on top

Jockey Danny Sorenson and trainer Jimmy Claridge teamed up for a big weekend at Ruidoso Downs.

Sorenson earned Jockey of the Week honors after taking 10 horses to the winner's circle. Five of those was for Claridge who was Trainer of the Week.

The duo teamed for four wins on Saturday, including the Jockey Club Handicap. Sorenson rode one more winner for Claridge on Sunday.

Sorenson's performance moved

him into third place in the jockey standings. Jacky Martin added four more wins to his lead in the rankings, while Joe Martinez held on to second with five wins. Apprentice Mike Clark had three wins to move into sixth, while Darrel Blevins climbed into eighth with two wins.



Kentucky-bred Ruffetta showed the way past every pole to post a relentless 8-length victory in Thursday's feature allowance sprint at Ruidoso Downs.

Racing as the third choice behind Ed. Duchess and Candid Commentary, Ruffetta was never seriously challenged in Friday's 5 1/2-furlong main event. The well-bred daughter of Sharpen Up got an early one-length lead as the 8-horse field left the gates and continued to draw

away with apprentice rider Quyet Bui at the helm.

Bui had the filly 1 1/2 lengths in front at the half-mile marker, stepping off a quick fraction of 44.2 seconds. Candid Commentary stalked Ruffetta around the final turn, but could not get within striking distance as the filly hit the top of the stretch with a 3-length lead. She drew away easily in the final furlong to win by 8 1/2 lengths in a time of 1:04.1 seconds.

Sorensen tops Handicap

Trainer Jimmie Claridge and jockey Danny Sorenson were four-for-four on Saturday's program at Ruidoso Downs, including a popular victory in the \$17,850 Jockey Club Handicap among their wins.

Claridge sent out Forever A Ruler in Saturday's 7 1/2-furlong Jockey Club Handicap after accounting for three races earlier in the program with Sorenson aboard each winner.

Forever A Ruler went postward as the even-money choice to win the Jockey Club after missing the winner's share by a half-length in the Governor's Handicap last week at the same distance.

Sorenson held the Forever Casting colt two lengths off a swift pace set by 4-1 Tilt The Odds, who joined Sam's Wish (25-1) in leading the 11-horse field through fairly fast fractions. They went the half-mile in 47 1/2 seconds, stepping off the three-quarter mile mark in 1:11.4.


As the two pacesetters moved out of the backstretch into the final turn, Sorenson sent Forever A Ruler around the two leaders. The field straightened out for home with no more than a head separating the three horses.

Sam's Wish faltered for a moment under rider Jim Powell, and it appeared that Tilt The Odds and Forever A Ruler would battle to the wire.

Sorenson grabbed a narrow lead in the last 200 yards and held on as Sam's Wish fought back to head Tilt The Odds in the final strides.

Forever A Ruler added another \$10,710 to his \$20,000 bankroll this year with a neck margin. The final time - 1:31.1 - knocked more than a second off the 7 1/2-furlong track record. William Burgess of Alto campaigns the Florida-bred stakes winner.

Claridge was pleased with his strategy for the Jockey Club Cap. "We knew there would be a lot of speed in this race, so we planned to come off the pace," he said. "It looks like it worked."







Weekend will soar with kite-flying activity

The Ruidoso Public Library will conduct a kite workshop from 3 to 4 p.m. Friday, July 18, at the library, and a kite flying contest at 11 a.m. Saturday, July 19, at the White Mountain Elementary school grounds.

Conducting the kite workshop, which will cost 50 cents, will be Nancy Caduff, a nationally known expert on kites.

Caduff, who usually flies her kites around Madison, Ohio, is a member of both the American Kitefliers Association and the Ohio Society for the Elevation of Kites.

Her daughter, Cirri Sanchez, and her granddaughter, Marisa Sanchez, live in Ruidoso Downs, and while she is visiting them, she will present the kite workshop and be

present at the kite contest.

Caduff says in her kite press kit that kites originated in China and Malay about 3,000 years ago, and were either hexagonal or diamond shaped.

Kites first got caught in Europe in the early 1600s and were often shaped like dragons of the day, Caduff said.

Americans first got strung out on kites in the late 19th century, according to Caduff.

According to Caduff, since World War II just about anything has been possible in the world of kites, and specially designed stunt kites have


become very popular.


Anyone of any age who is interested in learning how to make—and then go fly—a kite, is invited to attend the Friday kite workshop at the library.

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State office clarifies recent property tax provisions

The Property Tax Division of the New Mexico Taxation and Revenue Department clarified Friday ques-

tions raised regarding 1986 property appraisals and the "yield control" provision.

The Legislature mandated the County Assessors office to update property values from 1975 levels to



at higher than the county average. But, the increase is less than it would be without the yield control formula.

"If a taxpayer stays within the county average, they should experience no more than five percent plus whatever net new construction

is," Baca said.

An example of three properties which were valued differently is also given. The example shows the amount of taxes due each property when there is a 10 percent increase in budgets and when there is no increase in budgets.



- A. **Grossly undervalued** - may face hefty tax increases; however, it will be less than what it would have been without formula.
- B. **Undervalued** - taxpayer whose property was undervalued about the same as county average will find only small difference in taxes due.
- C. **Properties at higher than county average** - Those taxpayers with higher than the average will be surprised with lower tax bills after the updating of county valuation.

1980 levels by 1986 and to 1984 levels by 1988.

These reappraisal updates are being used to create "equity" in the property tax system.

Area residents are concerned that large increases in their appraisals will result in substantial increases in their property tax.

An appraisal valuation is made up of full land and full improvement (everything on the land) values. These figures are multiplied by one-third to give net taxable values.

A statement from the Taxation and Revenue Department says, in 1985 the state Legislature passed a yield control provision which limits the amount of money entities who

share property-tax revenue can raise their budgets. This limitation is supposed to hold tax rates down.

The statement reads: "Two variables are used: one is an index for inflation and the other is the percentage growth in property base or new construction. These two variables when combined dictate the allowed increase in budget."

Legislators passed a five percent index for inflation. The net new construction figure will not be deter-

mined until September.

"The yield control mechanism limits the budget side of the property tax equation. That limit is five percent plus new properties that were added to the tax rolls," Victor Baca, deputy director of the Property Tax Division said.

An example from the statement follows: "If the index for inflation is five percent and the new construction is five percent, then budgets in that district may grow by 10 percent. A property which was valued correctly before reappraisal would see a 10 percent increase in taxes even though the valuation increased higher than 10 percent. Only those taxpayers who were undervalued prior to reappraisal would see more than a 10 percent increase in taxes. Those who were overvalued would probably see less than a 10 percent tax increase and in some cases, would see no tax increase or possibly a tax decrease."

A diagram of yield control and its effects on individual taxpayers shows that people who were "grossly" undervalued at the time of the last valuation will pay higher taxes than those who were valued

 This example only shows the effect yield control has on operating budgets. Bonded indebtedness tax rates are generally self adjusting due to their payment schedule, so that they adjust similarly as operating budgets under yield control. However, new bonds that are issued or new tax rates that are authorized due to taxpayer approval are a direct increase to all the tax rates produced through the yield control law.

Crime Stoppers conduct meeting

Ruidoso Crime Stoppers Thursday approved a \$500 reward for a tipster who provided information leading to the June arrests of Pamela Z. Day and Dennis Clemmer on narcotics charges.

Police said Day and Clemmer were arrested on June 24, at 502

Wingfield, as a result of surveillance efforts prompted by the Crime Stoppers tip.

Day was charged with trafficking cocaine and possession of a controlled substance; and Clemmer

was charged with possession of a controlled substance (hashish), according to Magistrate Court records.

Those same records indicated the two have been released on bond, with Day's trial set for 10 a.m. September 11, and Clemmer's trial scheduled at 11 a.m. September 25.

During a regular meeting Thursday, Michael Lovelace, coordinator for the local Crime Stoppers program, reported seven coded calls were received in June, with just the one call resulting in an arrest. The

hotline received six calls in May, according to the coordinator's monthly report.

In its first regular meeting since hosting a state Crime Stoppers seminar April 30-May 1, members set plans for a radio auction fundraiser.

Members said the event will raise funds for the Crime Stoppers reward fund and also re-acquaint the public with the organization.

"We need to get some more members," noted chairman Richard Sandoval.

pneumonias and cardiovascular disease will be presented at the seminar.




This Taxation and Revenue Department chart describes the effects on property taxes due for three houses each valued differently the previous year.

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




Psychic dowses for clues at McSween Dig

Psychic sensitive Byron Summers, standing just east of the Fresquez House in Lincoln, explained to news reporters during a scheduled press conference Friday his impressions of where the walls of the long-buried McSween house will be found and where some artifacts and skeletal remains of at least two bodies will be located during an archaeological dig beginning Saturday, July 19.

While cameras clicked and videos zeroed in, Summers stood quietly in one spot, holding copper dowsing rods in his hands. Pointing with one rod toward the corner of the field where the house once stood, he indicated the spot he believed to be the corner of the house. He had grim words about the spot.

"There was a violent, terrible death, right there. I get an awful feeling when I stand there," he said.

One of the people in the crowd replied, "Salazar was shot, beaten and left to die in front of the McSween House."

Summers explained the strongest feelings he received, during his examination of the site, were where he believes bodies will be found. "They will be found towards the rear area, one inside and one outside the walls. The one inside is from the gun battle, but the one out-

side is more primitive and has nothing to do with the shooting. There won't be a body in the front, only the impressions have been left there," Summers stated.

Summers arrived in Lincoln Thursday and performed a survey of the site. He explained he had started from the side of the Tunstall Store, working west to the Fresquez house then to the Watson house (currently offices of New Mexico State Monuments). He placed small flags where his dowsing rods crossed. The result was a line of flags beginning at the front east corner of the Fresquez House, going parallel with the road, then turning north and then west at the rear of the house, roughly making a square, attaching to the existing house front and back.

The Fresquez house is probably built on the west wall of the McSween house, Summers continued. He pointed at crossed flags within the square.

"Guns will be found there and Susan McSween's piano will be found there," he said, rod pointing to the outside center portion of the house. "Although I believe the piano is scattered in pieces, the main portion will be found there," he said.

It has been rumored that Susan McSween played her piano during the five day gun battle. The battle ended when the Dolan-Murphy fighters set fire to the McSween house. Billy the Kid, with other par-

ticipants, fled the fire through the rear of the house and escaped along the river.

Summers was asked if he could receive impressions about people from articles belonging to them. After replying that he could, he was handed a pair of Billy the Kid's spurs.

Standing with a spur in each hand, eyes closed, he paused for moments.

"I have a strong impression of his mother, I don't know much about him, I can't quite figure out the relationship. He had to prove his power and strength through an emotional center, rather than through direct action, an explosive temper. He needed this kind of environment for his temperament. He had a scared 11-year-old living inside of him," Summers said. Then, almost to himself, he said, "so these are Billy's spurs."

"I looked for Billy's escape route and followed the rods out of the back and down to the bank this morning. The people who were here left mental and spiritual feelings, they left an imprint on this area. I concentrate on one question at a time and wait for the rods to cross in answer to the question," Summers explained his technique.

In answer to what his batting average was at finding objects, he said he had pretty good luck at finding a lot of water and had never done an archaeological survey before.

"If they dig it up and I'm right, that's relevant. If they dig it up and I'm wrong, that's irrelevant," he said with a grin. He added, "he would be interested in doing more surveys, 'if it doesn't pan out, I'd be interested in doing something else, like mounting tires,'" he said with a laugh.

Residing in Santa Fe, Summers plans to travel to Lincoln at different times during the dig.

The dig will be conducted by Human Systems Research in Tularosa, they will base their selection of five test pits and one trench on written descriptions of the site and surface features.

Thomas Caperton, director of the Monuments Division of the Museum of New Mexico, stated, "It's (the McSween dig) one of the most important pieces of real estate from the Old West, since it was occupied for such a short time, basically the years 1877 and 1878, it offers a time capsule of that particular period. And this is a relatively rare circumstance in an archaeological setting."

Summers has made a map of his findings and impressions, they have been sealed in an envelope for safekeeping until thorough excavation within the next few years has either proven or disproven them. The Lincoln County Heritage Trust is sponsoring the dig.

Asked, how sure he was about his findings, Summers replied, "as sure as I can be," with a grin.

Property tax is a subject of commission meeting

Lincoln County Commissioners rapidly attended to regular business, giving special attention to a report from Marian Schlarb, county assessor, Burdette Stampley from the Family Crisis Center and the Lincoln County Fair Ordinance at their meeting Tuesday.

Schlarb told commissioners her phone had not stopped ringing since she had sent out evaluation notices on June 30, she wanted it understood she is following state law to bring property evaluations up to date.

"Property evaluations and taxes are two different things, I just want everyone to realize that," she said. County attorney Gary Mitchell told commissioners Bill Elliott, Ken Nosker and A.W. "Gnat" Gnatkowski, property evaluations in New Mexico were at a 1975 rate and were so far behind they have to be brought current. The schedule is to bring the county up to the 1980 evaluation this year and be at the 1985 appraisal by 1988. The appraisers are following state law and using state guidelines that they cannot deviate from.

Representative Ben Hall made a call to Santa Fe confirming the taxes on evaluated property will only raise five percent per year even

though the property evaluation will be much higher than that.

Mitchell agreed it is against the law for the taxes to be raised higher than five percent per year, but "they will continue to rise at five percent per year until the state law is repealed. One way to explain it is, if your taxes were \$700 last year, they will be \$735 this year, regardless of the new evaluation, even if the valuation doubled the taxes can't, that's the law," Mitchell said.

Reverend Burdette Stampley, on behalf of the Family Crisis Center of Lincoln County, told commissioners he was originally on the agenda to ask for assistance in obtaining liability insurance for the center, but since the request he had been informed they may obtain the insurance from other sources. "But, since I am on the agenda, I would like to take the opportunity to tell you something about the program," he continued. "Lincoln County is faced with a serious problem in domestic violence, everybody suffers from it, the participants, their families, police and taxpayers." Twenty percent of police deaths are a result of domestic violence. Eighty-five percent of our prisoners were raised in homes with domestic violence. One of every 10 women suffer battery (1.8 million women a year). In 50 percent of the homes where the wife

is abused the children are also abused. This crime is no respecter of race, creed or color, Stampley said. "We want to furnish these victims with a safe house, a place where they and their children can stay, to get their lives in order, to get over their fear and start new lives."

"How do you get involved in someone's personal life," Nosker asked.

"As a pastor I am often called for help and to take them to the hospital," Stampley said. "Then I call the police for a restraining order, then we offer moral support to give them time to reflect, make decisions about their lives."

"We want to help the victims to find the courage to change their lives, so they aren't victims anymore."

Elliott offered the commission's help in Stampley's project.

The public hearing and final adoption creating the Lincoln County Fair Board was signed into effect by the commissioners.

President of the Fair Board, Ralph Dunlap, gave commissioners the fair board's deeds to the fairgrounds. The county attorney and Dunlap are investigating clearing the titles to small pieces of property within the grounds.

Dunlap asked to present the lease agreement at the same time and was told by Mitchell the lease can-

not go into effect until after the 30 days for the adoption of ordinance. It was agreed to accept the lease, after review and after the ordinance was completed.

In other business the commissioners:

—Decided to review and present at a later date bid opening for comprehensive general liability insurance coverage.

—Did not waive the \$5 penalty of delinquent taxes for 1986.

—Accepted contract and notification of grant award for Senior Citizens Center.

—Approved agreement with Predatory and Rodent Control.

—Approved memorandum of understanding with New Mexico Cooperative Extension Service.

—Approved lease agreement with Magistrate Court. County manager Suzanne Cox will send notification to the court of rent increase from \$75 to \$150 next year, the rent includes all utilities.

—Appointed Bill Gallagher and Walt Jones to the Animal Control Board. Nosker voted against the appointment, explaining he would like to see someone appointed from the valley to the board.

—Awarded a 30 day extension to Mountain Lakes Subdivision for compliance.

Sheep seminar is July 22

A sheep seminar, including a discussion on the Angora goat and mohair situation in New Mexico, will begin at 9 a.m. Tuesday, July 22, at the Swiss Chalet Inn, Ruidoso according to Jim Seacase, sheep specialist for the New Mexico State University (NMSU) Cooperative Extension Service.

The sheep school will precede the annual convention of the New Mexico Wool Growers, Incorporated, scheduled July 23 and 24 at the same location.

Bob Paschal, executive director of the Mohair Council of America, will speak on the Angora goat-mohair situation. Bryan May, manager of the Ozona Wool and Mohair Company will address problems encountered in marketing New Mexico mohair.

Doctor Don Beerwinkle, manager of Estacado Industries, will discuss how feeder lambs might be treated

to increase their profitability for both the feeder and producer.

Parasites of sheep and the development of a sheep keds-free state will be discussed by Seacase.

Another Extension specialist, Mike Jones, farm and ranch management specialist, will talk about record-keeping systems for the rancher and NMSU research will be reviewed by a panel of animal scientists. Doctor Bob Rankin, head of the NMSU Animal and Range Sciences Department, will moderate the panel. Areas of discussion will be reproductive physiology, nutrition, management, embryo transfer, epididymitis and other diseases.

Doctors Bob Bond and Steve England will round out the program with a discussion of footrot, a disease that has become epidemic in neighboring states.

Lodgers' Tax Committee discuss film commission

The Lincoln County Lodgers' Tax Committee heard a report on the county film commission and received a bid for creative marketing at their regular meeting Wednesday.

Bob Boverie reported the Film Commission sent three people to tour the county and took film footage in Lincoln, Hondo, Capitan, White Oaks, Corona, Carrizozo, the Malpais, Three Rivers and various views from Sierra Blanca. The film has been processed in Santa Fe and the "rushes" should be sent for viewing by next week.

The result will be a 10 minute collage of all areas in the county.

"They want things that movie studios would be interested in," Boverie explained. "The finished film will be placed in major movie studios to show producers what Lincoln County has to offer for future movies."

The tax committee had agreed at a previous meeting to share expenses with the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce and the state to produce this 10 minute film showing the beauty and diversity in Lincoln County. With the correct marketing it could bring movie makers and added tourism to the county, members agreed.

County manager Suzanne Cox told members Rich Seeley, Kay Dennis, Bob Finley and Boverie, she had received a call from film producers six weeks ago, and they

were specifically interested in White Oaks and any old movie theaters.

"I took them on a tour to White Oaks and the old theater in Carrizozo, they were really interested and took lots of pictures," she said.

Kevin Clear of Clear and Company presented an itemized bid for creative marketing.

"What the county has to sell is history," he said. "Lincoln County is rich in history and when tourists get tired of the races and shopping they look around and say what can we do now. They need to know about all the various attractions outside of Ruidoso and the way to do that is with creative advertising."

Clear's proposal was broken down into three parts, a brochure (10,000 copies), magazine advertising (with ads placed three times a year in a major publication) and public relations (including innovative activities to bring tourism to the county). The total marketing bid was \$14,675.

Cox explained this bid could not be accepted since any expenditure over \$5,000 had to go out for sealed bids according to the state procurement act.

The county attorney will check on this and advise at the next meeting. The total cost for the "White Oaks, Ghost Mining Town" sign will be \$1,300, Patsy Sanchez, told

the committee. The sign will be eight feet high and sixteen feet wide with lettering on both sides.

Bud Payne offered to help with the sign.

The commission agreed to donate \$500 toward the sign as a media ad line item.

"We hope it really works and it brings in a lot of tourists to White Oaks," Seeley added.

White Oaks is in the national registry of historic sites. The state will be placing two signs there, one at the cemetery where the first governor of New Mexico, W.C. McDonald, is buried, and the second sign will be in town with a little of the town's history included on it.

Richard Ramsey and Howard Harkey of the Soil Conservation Service showed the tax commission and the 14 guests attending the meeting how soil erosion is becoming dangerous in the town and where the proposed boundaries for a fence protecting the town could be placed.

Attractions planned in the near future include:

—McSween Dig, set to begin July 19 in Lincoln.

—Lincoln County Pony Express Race, to begin at 8 a.m. August 2, from Lincoln to White Oaks. Breakfast will be served in White Oaks at 7 a.m. and a barbecue at noon followed by a rodeo and dance.

Bob Watson, chairman for the event, reported letter drop boxes have been placed Capitan, Carrizozo and Lincoln, a box will also be placed in Ruidoso. To mail a pony express letter, address a regular envelope with lettering low and to the left of the envelope's center, to allow space for the pony express seal and place that letter and a dollar in another envelope and put it in a pony express drop box, Watson explained. These letters will be distributed between the riders and carried to White Oaks, then sent on to their destinations. "Mail early," Watson advised.

Also during the meeting, White Oaks Historical Society President Bessie Lester invited everyone to their meeting at 7 p.m. Friday, July 25.

New Mexico State Advertising Agency will have 24 pages advertising New Mexico in the Travel and Leisure Magazine, two pages will be on Lincoln County, exclusive of skiing and horse racing, which will be treated separately. Publication date is in December.

Seeley, Dennis and Boverie have been reappointed by the county commissioners for two years. They will remain in their respective offices with Bob Finley as secretary.

The meeting concluded with a "fascinating" tour of White Oaks, conducted by Patsy Sanchez, Bud Crenshaw and Bob Watson.

your attorney doesn't get everything he wants," Judge Wheeler told Natale and McCullar. Mitchell noted for the record that his clients were the only ones in the room wearing orange coveralls sitting with the defense lawyer. Although Wilcox noted the defendants could have worn "normal attire" for the hearing, Natale said he was denied such a request at the Lincoln County Jail. As Wilcox entered a number of photographs into evidence, Mitchell questioned whether a search warrant was used to seize a pair of shoes pictured. Ruidoso Police investigator Mike Lovelace testified the shoes were seized at the Tularosa address where McCullar was arrested. He said McCullar asked police to get his clothes from

a closet and the shoes were in that closet. Lovelace said he and other officers at the scene had verbal permission to search the mobile home where they found McCullar lying on the floor between a bed and the wall in a bedroom. Pictures of the shoes and pictures of footprints behind Bennett's were entered into evidence. As Ruidoso Police investigator Danny Steward testified of the scene where Natale was arrested in Ruidoso Downs, Mitchell entered further objections. Before Wheeler announced his finding of probable cause, Mitchell recalled a Brooklyn Dodgers Hall of Famer, Gil Hodges. "Even if you had Gil Hodges at first base you couldn't catch this ball," said Mitchell. He said there was no probable cause to bind over his clients on the armed robbery charges.

Wheeler returned the two defendants to Lincoln County Jail, announcing their bond remains at \$250,000 each with no 10 percent. A third defendant in Thursday's hearing, David Lambert, was referred to district court for a ruling on whether he is competent to stand trial. Mitchell said Lambert's mother questioned whether he is competent to stand trial, and said he suffered a "major brain injury" in 1976. Lambert, 23, was arrested at his Ruidoso Downs trailer home at the same day Natale was taken into custody, according to police reports. He was charged with possession of a controlled substance (heroin) with the intent to distribute. Wheeler set Lambert's bond at \$20,000 with no 10 percent during his first appearance hearing on June 30.

Appalachian clubmembers build trails

Six volunteers from different parts of the United States recently spent seven straight days clearing about two miles of trail in the White Mountain Wilderness for the Smokey Bear Ranger District. The hardy volunteers are members of the Appalachian Mountain Club (AMC), the oldest hiking club in America, which currently has more than 38,000 members, according to Kevin Peterson of Dillon, Colorado, the local leader of the volunteers who made the journey to the Lincoln National Forest this year. Every year AMC members maintain trails of more than 1,000 miles of wilderness land as part of their

clubs' activities, Peterson said. Peterson said AMC members also participate in education, conservation and research programs. The trail work in the White Mountain Wilderness was difficult this year because the recent rains had washed out almost all of the trail the AMC members were clearing, Peterson said. It rained every day the AMC members were clearing the trail as well, sometimes so hard the group couldn't do anything but take shelter, Peterson said. AMC members must provide their own transportation to the areas they volunteer to work in, but the club provides the necessary

food, gear and tools during the volunteers' stay in a wilderness area, Peterson said. AMC members who volunteered to clear the trail in the White Mountain Wilderness, besides Peterson, were Chris Mason and Rich Goldhammer of Cambridge, Massachusetts; Amella Debaggis of Brighton, Massachusetts; Jamie Rachlin of New York, New York; and Jim Snipe of Lovington. Officials at the Smokey Bear District Ranger Station said AMC members have been coming to Ruidoso for the past two years and have provided a valuable service to people who enjoy the White Mountain Wilderness area.

Artesia man's body is found near Fox Cave

An air search Saturday resulted in the discovery of the body of an Artesia oilman reported missing by his wife July 5. New Mexico State Police officer Steve Standridge said early today (Monday) he was contacted by searchers after they spotted a 1986 Mercedes near the Rio Ruidoso off U.S. Highway 70. Standridge said he located the

body of Frank Yates Sr. on the side of a cliff near the vehicle about three miles east of Fox Cave. He said the Bonito Volunteer Fire Department assisted in retrieving the body of the 48-year-old man. "There's nothing left of that Mercedes," noted Standridge, who determined the one-vehicle crash occurred when Yates, travelling at a high rate of speed, failed to make

a curve. "He flew through the air for about 200 feet," said Standridge. Medical Examiner David Pfeffer was called to the scene and the body was transferred to Albuquerque for an autopsy, said Standridge. According to a report in The Roswell Daily Record, Yates had been missing since July 2.

highest tax rate

Ruidoso will have the highest sales tax in the state if the Ruidoso Village Council adopts a proposal to increase gross receipts taxes by .50 percent. The council will conduct a public hearing during a regular meeting at 6:30 p.m. Tuesday, July 29, to discuss increasing gross receipts taxes from the current 6.0 percent rate to 6.50 percent. Councilors set the hearing after Mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr. said recently the tax increase is the only "viable" source to raise \$2.6 million needed if the village wants to keep the Ruidoso Municipal Airport land when the Sierra Blanca Airport replaces it. Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) officials have notified the Village of Ruidoso that the village is obligated to invest the airport's appraised value (\$2.6 million) into the regional facility being constructed. FAA has said funding may be affected by the timing of the village's investing funds into the construction project.

But some councilors said during last week's meeting that the increased sales tax is too big, especially since the rate just went up to 6 percent on July 1. That increase was mandated by the state Legislature when it raised the statewide rate from 5.75 percent to 4.75 percent. That statewide rate had not been increased since 1983. The legislature also raised the maximum municipal gross receipts tax that can be imposed from 1 to 1.25 percent. Raton, in Colfax County, currently charges the highest gross receipts tax in the state at 6.25 percent. Taos, Questa, Red River and Clayton all have rates of 6.125 percent; and Bayard and Ruidoso have rates of 6 percent. Other New Mexico cities have tax rates that vary from 4.75 percent up to 5.875 percent. In Lincoln County tax rates are: Capitan.....5.75% Carrizozo.....5.75% Corona.....5.0% Ruidoso Downs.....5.75% Remainder of county.....4.75%





Secondly, the dig will be the center of substantial media coverage, which planners hope will boost tourism to the area.

The McSween Dig certainly will be a boon—both historically, and economically through the presence of all those associated with the dig, and those who come to this area to view the dig.

Congratulations to those who are making the dig possible, for bringing a piece of Lincoln County's history alive.—DJP

RE: Your appointment as new state chairman for the Democratic party.

The first thing you have to understand, big fella, is that there is no such thing as a state Democratic party.

Oh, sure, there's an entry like that on the ballots we will use to vote this coming November. But that doesn't prove the words, as printed on a piece of paper, signify anything really existent.

If you think there's an organized group of people out there who answer when that titled is called, check carefully with your predecessor, George Fettingler. He found out the hard way that when you come around begging with the old tin cup, which is what the bigwigs want you to do, there's seldom anyone at home.

Some of its "leaders"—i.e., those who command the loyalty of at least 12 other activist members—insist that polls show the general populace has shifted gradually to the right and that the party ought to go where the people are. But Teddy Kennedy and his

hand-picked national chairman of Democrats everywhere froth at the thought that this could be so. Why, a couple of guys even wrote 11 pages, dense with charts and graphs, for a recent issue of Atlantic Monthly to demonstrate no such shifting has ever taken place. Read all those words and you'll be guaranteed to come up with a headache.

Maybe what you ought to do is concentrate on getting those folks who carry the party banner elected in the fall, and then pay the bills later.

To do that, you're going to have to hunt a way to keep anybody anywhere from saying the dread words "T—A—," which you can be sure the opponents are going to throw around more than a little.

That second name, they suggest, could make the difference in a campaign where all the other guys have is such guaranteed WASPish monickers as Carruthers and Stahl.

Others suggest you should run a campaign in that third Congressional district that says, "Dave Cargo is not really a Democrat; we got ourselves this fouled up without his help."

Finally, Sam, old friend, don't be disturbed if some people mumble that you shouldn't be state chairman because you didn't come up through the chairs of the party hierarchy. Just point out to them, accurately, that there really are no lower ranks to come up through in the Democratic party of New Mexico, so it's okay for a guy to start from the top.


