## Sheriff takes bold stand in McKnight case

### State Policeman is suspect; Attorney General, State Police, DA restrained from case

Lincoln County Sheriff Tom Sullivan, in a petition filed Thursday, July 24, in Twelfth Judicial District Court, named a New Mexico State Police officer as a suspect in the murders of Thomas A. "Cotton" and Judy McKnight.

The petition, filed before District Judge Sandra Grisham, also accused the District Attorney for the 12th Judicial District James J. Weldon (DA), the New Mexico State Police (NMSPP) and its Chief Maurice Payne and the Attorney General of the State of New Mexico Paul Bardacke (AG) of interfering with the Lincoln County Sheriff's Office investigations into the McKnight slayings.

Grisham immediately issued an alternative writ of mandamus (see adjacent text) ordering the appointment of a "special and independent prosecutor" to "direct, counsel, advise and present all evidence" in the McKnight case to a Lincoln County grand jury to be convened within 60 days of July 2.

Grisham further ordered Attorney General Paul Bardacke to instruct the New Mexico State Police to discontinue any more investigation of the case until further notice.

All the paperwork was in order for an alternative writ," said Judge Grisham in a telephone conversation Sunday. She was unwilling to comment on the merits of the petitioners' claims, but confirmed that two affidavits of disqualification were filed Thursday, removing district judges Richard A. Parsons and Robert Doughty from the McKnight case.

Sullivan filed one affidavit and co-petitioner Terri Bussey, a sister of the slain Judy McKnight, filed the second affidavit. Grisham said anyone involved in a case may file to disqualify one judge.

Judge Robert Doughty, contacted by telephone Sunday, said he had no idea why either of the petitioners asked to have him disqualified.

"I've never taken any action in the case," said Doughty, adding he has never met Bussey, and has had no problems with Sheriff Sullivan.

"I feel a little bad," he said. Doughty said he hasn't read the alternative writ filed in Judge Grisham's court, but explained what the document is designed to do. He said such a writ orders someone to do something (as stated in the writ) or show cause why they can't or won't.

"There are more mandatory writs," he noted.

All we're asking for is a fair and impartial grand jury and a prosecutor from outside the county," said Gary Mitchell, attorney for the petitioners.

In an exclusive interview Friday, Mitchell and Sullivan stressed the intent of the petition and writ to let all the evidence from all investigating agencies in the hands of a special prosecutor for an impartial presentation before a grand jury.

"I want to be able to tell my story," said Sullivan. "I have been suppressed from doing that," he added.

"I don't believe it could be told fairly with a member of the DA or AG's office in the room. They can control the questions," remarked Sullivan.

Part of Sullivan's untold story is apparently contained in the writ of mandamus and involves the NMSPP. A thread of NMSPP involvement runs through the McKnight murder investigation from that agency's early involvement, their agreeing to withdraw re-entry by the NMSPP into the investigation of the request

of the AG and a remainder in Thursday's writ that a relative of the McKnight family is a member of the NMSPP.

Joe McKnight, father of Cotton McKnight, revealed in a story in the May 22 edition of The News that he was with two state police officers that he drove toward the ranch the day of the murders.

McKnight said he asked state police officer Phil Bowers, the husband of Cotton McKnight's first wife, Vikki Bowers, to take him to the Phecho ranch where the murders occurred. The three never actually reached the ranch according to McKnight, who said they turned back upon meeting the ambulance transporting "the bodies" from the scene.

"We claim him, Bowers, as a substitute," we claim Vikki as a daughter," noted Joe McKnight last May.

The writ also says the NMSPP was returned to the case in a petition warning by Sullivan that a "conduct" of tampering and obstructing justice. Sullivan says the writ is a "substantive" one.

The writ further says the NMSPP investigators have interfered prospectively with the grand jury's conduct of the investigation. Sullivan says the writ also alleges the State Police, by "visiting" witnesses that are "interfering" would not in fact be available.

### Mescalero Tribe to begin games Wednesday

High-stakes bingo begins Wednesday, July 30, at the Inn of the Mountain Gods.

Doors will open at 5:30 p.m., and when the first game starts at 6:30 p.m., players will have the chance to win up to \$50,000 in cash, according to a release from the staff at the Inn of the Mountain Gods.

"Bingo of Mescalero," as it is called by Mescalero Apache Tribe (MAT) officials, will be played in the Mescalero Room at the nationally known inn's convention center.

The release from the officials at the Inn of the Mountain Gods said people would be allowed to "enjoy concessions" while they played bingo.

The MAT recently appointed

Ruidosoan, Jack Valliant, a manager of the Tribal bingo operation, according to inn officials.

Valliant could not be reached for comment.

The Mescalero Room was being prepared for the MAT bingo operation for most of last week.

Several electronic master number bingo screens and television monitors were being installed in the Mescalero Room last week, indicating the bingo games might be run "Las Vegas" or "casino" style.

MAT and Inn of the Mountain Gods officials would not discuss the specifics of their bingo operation other than to say it was originally designed for the typical guest at the Inn of the Mountain Gods.

Inn officials are expecting locals to show an interest in "Bingo of Mescalero."

Last spring, the Mescalero Apache Tribal Council voted to allow bingo to be played on the reservation in accordance with

## FAA urges village to pay airport land \$2.6 million



## No alibis needed

"I really thought I could win the race with him," Jacky Martin commented after taking Sir Alibi to a three-quarter length victory in the \$100,340 World's Championship Quarter Horse Classic Sunday at Ruidoso Downs. The veteran reinsman is shown trotting Sir Alibi back to the winner's circle to pick up a \$50,170 first-place check. Larry Keiter, who conditions Sir Alibi, was posting his first grade 1 stakes win in winning the Classic. Sir Alibi stepped off the 440-yard dash in 21.45 seconds—the second fastest clocking in the 18-year history of the event.

## Lubbock County captures Kachina

Lubbock County ran down even-money favorite Lightfoot Lil to post a widening 4-length victory for the inaugural running of the Kachina Stakes on Saturday at Ruidoso Downs.

Saturday's Kachina Stakes featured 12 juvenile fillies testing their abilities over 6 furlongs for \$90,509 in prize money. Lightfoot Lil went postward as the even-money choice to win the sprint with veteran rider Larry Byers at the helm.

Byers took the Muscovite filly to a 2-length lead through the backstretch as Total Proof, I'm Sweet Bombay and Lubbock County raced just off the pace to the three-eighths pole. Total Proof broke stride as the field entered the turn and never recovered.

Reinsman Glenn Lowry cut Lubbock County loose around the bend and drew alongside Lightfoot Lil at the top of the stretch. A few strides back, Danny Sorenson held I'm Sweet Bombay in third.

The three horses raced through the final furlong with Lowry and Lubbock County drawing away to win by 4 lengths. The final time was 1:13 1/2 seconds. Lightfoot Lil held on for second. Sonic Pearl stormed to the wire to steal third from I'm Sweet Bombay, who managed to hold off Prima Priscilla for fourth by a neck.

Here's how the rest of the field checked in: 6th - Pukka Anne, 7th - River Bend Jamie, 8th - Dart N Strike, 9th - Wheels Away, 10th - Chrystal Lark, 11th - Total Proof, and 12th - Flaring Lady.

# Mescalero youths keeping in shape during the summer





lump sum payment, but disagreed with the inverse being true if the village opts for a five-year plan.

Carpenter opined the passage of a gross receipts tax increase earmarked to repay the \$2.6 million would show a "good faith" effort.

"If we had five years to pay it we would be in better shape," said Carpenter, revealing that a .50 sales tax hike should net the village \$560,000 a year toward the \$2,676,000. He said by going that route the airport funds could be raised without paying large amounts in interest.

"I'm not saying we'll think any less of you if you do that," said Howard, adding it's a matter of priorities. He said when funding is discussed within the FAA, the question always comes up as to when Ruidoso will put \$2.6 million into the airport.

"It detracts from our position," said Howard.

Howard allayed the fears of some audience members concerned that a five-year plan might increase Ruidoso's obligation because of possible changes in property values.

"Once we've agreed to the funding strategy then we're out of it,"

assured Howard.

But he said competition for funding is very great, and could be even greater with the enactment of the Gramm-Rudman legislation. He cautioned Ruidoso officials that the current airport's funding program, a five-year plan, expires in 1987.

When the program comes before Congress for renewal, Howard said it could be changed. He recalled in previous programs the participation level on airport funding was 50-50, compared with the current 90 percent federal to 10 percent local participation.

"It could go back to that level," warned Howard.

Members of the audience raised questions of how the money could be raised—whether by a Farmer's Home Administration loan, a sales tax increase or bonding.

"These people don't care where the money comes from; they want \$2.6 million to go toward the airport," said Mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr. "It's going to require maybe a little bit more than good faith," he added.

Other discussions centered on when the first phase could be completed and how much it will include for the estimated \$13.5 million pricetag.

"We can have the airport operational by fall of next year," said airport engineer Earl Cook. His projection is for phase one, a useable airfield and temporary terminal facilities.

Ken Nosker, chairman of the Sierra Blanca Airport Commission (SBAC), made an emotional statement regarding Ruidoso's obligation to the FAA, and reminded the audience that area residents and business owners contribute heavily to the village's sales tax base.

Fred Heckman, SBAC contract administrator, answered questions on future funds for the airport, and said the facility is projected to be self-sustaining in the second year.

By the end of the meeting, more than one councillor noted that the FAA's position is clear.

"If we want to land out there next fall, we'd better come up with the \$2.6 million," remarked Carpenter.

## Sunland sale still unsettled

A published report in the July 21 edition of the El-Paso Herald-Post, said negotiations for the sale of Sunland Park racetrack had stalled.

The two El Paso businessmen trying to buy the racetrack in Sunland Park, Jeff Keckley and Roy Salome, told The News in an

earlier interview the sale would probably be approved if they could find a few more financial backers.

A Ruidoso-Sunland, Inc. official, who asked not to be identified, said the management at Ruidoso-Sunland, Inc. was hoping the sale would go through, but would not speculate on the status of the

negotiations with the two El Pasoans.

Officials at Ruidoso-Sunland, Inc. will have until July 30 to apply for racing dates for the upcoming racing season at Sunland Park, according to a spokesperson for the New Mexico Racing Commission.

## Judge blocks county decision to move DA office to Ruidoso

District Judge Richard A. Parsons issued a temporary restraining order Wednesday directing the Lincoln County Commission to delay moving District Attorney offices in Carrizozo until after a new commission takes office on January 1.

Parsons ordered the county commissioners to "show cause" at 10 a.m. Thursday, July 31, why the temporary order should not be made permanent.

But Commission Chairman Bill Elliott has filed a statement of disqualification challenging Parsons' ability to preside over the case with impartiality.

Gary Mitchell, county attorney, said Friday the commission voted to move the offices from their present location on the first floor of the Lincoln County Courthouse after Assistant District Attorney Harry

Wilcox asked for more space.

In a response filed Friday, Mitchell asked to have the restraining order "quashed."

Mitchell said the space allocated for the DA's office was larger, as requested, and adequate. In his response he compared the location with other district attorney office locations in those counties.

"The crux of the motion seems to be that the District Attorney's office wants its choice of offices, and they do not have the authority or the jurisdiction to determine where they will be housed in the County Courthouse, but that is left in sole discretion of the governing body," continued the response.

District Attorney James J. Weldon wasn't available Sunday for comment on the motion or response.



"This is really the first exhibit he has ever done," Smith said.





Unearthing the first positive indications of the McSween house—burnt adobe walls—are archaeologists in the east room of the Fresquez house. Consulting archaeologist Pete Eidenbach, New Mexico Monuments Director Tom Caperton and project director David Kirkpatrick were key members of the excavation team making the finds.

## Researchers unearth clues at McSween site

"The Mystery Continues," is the phrase in Lincoln these days, as work continues on the McSween "dig"—for every question answered, a dozen more questions replace it.

After nearly a week of largely "disappointing" discoveries, Tom Caperton, New Mexico Monuments Bureau, authorized subfloor explorations of the Fresquez House.

In the east room, against the east wall, flooring was torn up to reveal rubble and fill from previous renovations of the Fresquez room. As debris was cleared (everything being taken to the screens so no treasure would be lost), portions of an in-place adobe wall began to appear. "The picture was somewhat confusing, this older wall had been disturbed by construction of the existing Fresquez wall," Pete Eidenbach, consulting archaeologist said. "The interior deposits within the room outlined by the older wall had been disturbed by excavation of a large pit, thought at first to be a rumored dug cellar."

Artifacts from this area were mixed, including historic materials as well as more recent trash dating to the 1900-1930 period. The artifacts include a wide variety of primarily domestic items—clothes pins, cold cream jars, china and

glass plates, rosary beads, jewelry fragments, buckles, buttons, garter clips, marbles, toys and mixed construction scrapes.

Finding this area more confusing than definitive, project director David Kirkpatrick, Caperton and Eidenbach decided to move over against the west wall. With the removal of flooring, a similar picture presented itself—loose trash, broken, adobe bricks and wood scrapes.

With the clearing of this "rubble" another adobe wall stub was located, the characteristic brick red color of burnt adobe began to reveal itself, chunks of burnt adobe, charcoal and charred and rotted wood scraps appeared. The small room seemed to fill with the smell of mold and mystery, fine silt and sand. The excitement shared by those in the room was tangible. At this point no one dared to say "McSween walls," what they said was "perhaps, maybe, could it be" and as Eidenbach slowly scraped and brushed, one adobe after another became visible totally separate from the Fresquez House, running in a different direction, not connected to the existing house at all. One question answered—the Fresquez builders did not use the McSween foundation or walls when they

built their house.

The belief that the McSween house was part of the Fresquez house led researchers to believe the McSween house would be found squared or parallel to the Fresquez house. With the wall found running in a different direction, Caperton brought out maps of the Tunstall Store and using the original building, a line was drawn from the store to the Fresquez house. This line was square to the McSween wall, making the Fresquez house lopsided.

The Fresquez house is squared to the newer addition of the Tunstall store and the McSween house was square to the original store building.

Finally, after all this checking and hesitation, the words were spoken, passed from person to person, through the house and into the yard, work stopping in the lab, at the screens, in the outside test pits, as the message circulated—"we have a McSween wall!"

The mystery and the dig continue. Sunday, the "possible McSween floor" was found approximately three feet deeper than the top of the adobe wall, larger parts of the top of the wall were exposed,

showing intense burn. "An inside wall or an outside wall?" Kirkpatrick and Eidenbach asked

each other. Kirkpatrick said although most brick adobe walls fall inside, these walls fell to the outside.

Could they have been braced

from the inside by those trapped there, in daylight, waiting for dusk to aid in their escape? Braced so they would fall outward, not inward. In the harrowing five hours, from the time the fire began to rage, until the safety of dusk, what did those desperate gunfighters do?

Moving from room to room, away from the fire, with windows closed because of other gunfighters outside waiting to pick them off, with smoke swirling and bellowing, the heat from the fire, the fear, as they waited, fighting to make their escape.

Are the answers to those last desperate hours still written somewhere on this quiet, peaceful site. It looks like, maybe, they are.

## Archaeologists dig pueblo site north of Capitan

North of Capitan, on privately owned land, archaeologists have been working for three summers. Their diligence has been rewarded with the find of a large pueblo with a central plaza and numerous outlying buildings.

It is estimated 100 to 200 people occupied the pueblo between 1200 and 1400 A.D.

"They were heavy duty farmers and hunters," co-project director Jane Kelley said. "The primary crop was corn, then beans and squash. They hunted antelope, which was plentiful."

With testing by carbon 14 and archaeomagnetic dating, the data processed thus far has determined that botanically the land was much the same then as now with the exception of walnut and cattails, experts said. As many techniques as possible are used for the dating and identification of materials found at the site, "so you have better technical checking and cross-checking." All discoveries from the dig are being sent to universities in the U.S. and Canada for identification and classifying then will be returned to New Mexico for display.


The large population of the pueblo supported themselves within a two mile radius, hunting parties traveled to grasslands (not too distant) and into the mountains. There are indications of trading between other pueblos ranging throughout this area and into Arizona.

At summer's end the digs are filled in, covered over and grass seed sprinkled over the spot, so the land returns to the natural.

"We urge protection of these areas and any area suspected of supporting prehistoric civilization," Kelley stated. "So that trained archaeologists can work these areas and share their finds with everyone, not just a few."

Funding for this project has ended this summer and the crew has been disappointed by the heavy rains this year slowing their work, so they didn't accomplish as much as they hoped to. However, they hope with the information and the papers that will be published from this site, more funding will become available so they can return.

"We've barely touched the surface, at this site and in this area, we really want to continue," Kelley said.

months of frustration for the Lincoln County Sheriff's Office. Sullivan said his office gathered evidence and presented the DA with names of two suspects before the heated dispute between the two offices got under way. Sullivan confirmed that one of those suspects is, in fact, a New Mexico State Police officer.

"It's time to let the people of Lincoln County, through the grand jury, hear that evidence and decide if there's enough to indict the people they (Sheriff's Office) feel they have probable cause to indict," said Mitchell.

A legal imbroglio has seemed to hamper the McKnight case for the past year, and Thursday's petitions and writs join a host of others filed by principals in the case.

Soon after Thursday's petition was granted, the State Supreme Court apparently acted by issuing a stay order. Judge Grisham, who said she hasn't seen the Supreme Court document, speculated the order was to stop any further court actions until a writ of superintendency hearing can be conducted to establish which court has control.

The motion will be heard at 9 a.m. Wednesday, August 6, before the Supreme Court in Santa Fe.

It took an order from the Supreme Court to get the grand jury process in motion, after Judge Parsons failed to act on a valid petition filed in his court seeking a special grand jury in the case. The Supreme Court on July 2 gave Parsons 60 days to call a grand jury.

At the time, Parsons stated he had no authority to appoint a special prosecutor, and said the Supreme Court failed to address that issue. Parsons was unavailable for comment this weekend.

But petitioners said neither the DA nor the AG had indicated any willingness to present the evidence against the two murder suspects, so they asked Judge Grisham to order the special prosecutor, and she did in Thursday's writ of mandamus.

The DA was unable to come to the telephone when called at his home on Sunday.

"The Attorney General's Office has indicated through one of its'

(sic) assistants, that the mere fact that a grand jury was convened, did not mean that the McKnight murder had to be considered," according to one section of the legal document.

Bussey was concerned that a grand jury might be manipulated by the agencies that opposed bringing the evidence together for an official review.

She said Sunday she is very pleased with the writ of mandamus.

"We wanted to get them (DA and AG) out of the picture ... to keep them from getting the grand jury in there and making a mockery of it," said Bussey.

Parsons issued an order Thursday, even as Bussey and Sullivan were in Alamogordo presenting their petition, directing the Attorney General to assist the grand jury and present evidence in the case.

According to a story in The El Paso Times on Thursday, Parsons said he will begin sending notices to prospective jurors today (Monday). The report said Parsons will begin qualifying jurors the week of August 25.

That story revealed that Parsons had sequestered all files related to the case.

"It's always amazing to me that anyone would sequester public records," said Mitchell Friday. "There have been numerous things that have happened in this case which I haven't understood—this is just another one," he added.

Last August Parsons imposed a gag order on all officials involved in the case, and apparently that order is still in effect.

"We've lost sight of the objectives," said Mitchell Friday. He said he and his clients wouldn't be involved as they are now, had the system worked.

Cotton and Judy McKnight were brutally murdered in their isolated Picacho ranch home in November 1984, and the case has been a matter of controversy almost from the beginning, with investigations being conducted at various times by the Sheriff's Office, the DA, the AG and the NMSP.

Sullivan said Friday his office is still actively investigating the murders.

"We're using all the talent we have," he said.

Both Sullivan and Mitchell said they are determined to see a resolution to the murder case and the problems among the various agencies.

"The only thing missing from these Lincoln County wars is the gunfire," said Mitchell.

"And it ain't over yet," remarked Sullivan, adding that he isn't threatening anybody.

"It's like the old Texas Ranger said, 'You can't stop a man who's right—he just keeps on a'comin'," said Sullivan.

7. The incidents complained of in the Petition primarily occurred in the County of Lincoln, State of New Mexico.

8. On or about the 15th day of November, 1984, in the County of Lincoln, State of New Mexico, Thomas P. "Cotton" McKnight and Judy McKnight, husband and wife, were found dead, with death occurring as a result of apparent gunshot wounds.

9. The bodies of Thomas and Judy McKnight were found inside their residence which is located in the County of Lincoln, State of New Mexico.

10. The Sheriff of Lincoln County has jurisdiction over crimes committed within the County of Lincoln and assumed jurisdiction over the investigation of this particular homicide.

11. Deputy Medical Investigator Rosemary Zink determined that Thomas and Judy McKnight were dead as a result of apparent gunshot wounds. This was confirmed later by an autopsy performed by the Medical Examiner's Office of the State of New Mexico.

12. In the very initial stages of the investigation, a member of the McKnight family requested that the New Mexico State Police be involved in the investigation.

13. A relative of the McKnight family is a member of the New Mexico State Police.

14. Due to this reason and others to be made known at hearing herein, if necessary, the Lincoln County Sheriff's Office requested the New Mexico State Police withdraw from the investigation.

15. The New Mexico State Police initially agreed to withdraw from the investigation.

16. The primary laboratory to consider trace evidence, fingerprints, and ballistics, is the New Mexico State Police Crime Lab, which is under the jurisdiction and directed by the New Mexico State Police through its Chief and Commission.

17. In order to avoid a conflict and for reasons which will be made known if necessary at hearing hereon, and because a relative of the McKnight family was a State Policeman, it was determined that it would be in the best interests of the investigating agency, the Lincoln County Sheriff's Office, to utilize laboratories other than those under the control and auspicious (sic) of the New Mexico State Police.

18. The Lincoln County Sheriff's Department conducted an extensive investigation, said investigation pursuing all leads which became known or were made known to the Lincoln County Sheriff's Department as to the assailants.

19. That investigation led to the belief by members of the Lincoln County Sheriff's Department and Sheriff Tom Sullivan that certain individuals first committed the murders of Thomas P. and Judy McKnight.

20. The names of those particular individuals were made known to James J. Weldon, District Attorney in and for the Twelfth Judicial District, together with evidence establishing probable cause of the arrest of those individuals.

21. Despite there being probable cause to effect an arrest and a plea by the Lincoln County Sheriff's Department as to further guidance, James J. Weldon, District Attorney in and for the Twelfth Judicial District, failed and refused to properly advise, instruct, and consider said reports.

22. The District Attorney in and for the Twelfth Judicial District in fact ridiculed in a press conference, the investigation by the Lincoln County Sheriff's Department.

23. The District Attorney in and for the Twelfth Judicial District, did at that press conference, make known to the public certain facts of the investigation which have hampered and/or interfered with further investigation by the Lincoln County Sheriff's Department.

24. A conflict and dispute arose between the Lincoln County Sheriff's Department and the District Attorney with the ultimate result being that the legal advisor and prosecution of this case would be turned over to Paul Bardacke in his capacity as Attorney General and to the Attorney General's Office, by and through its assistants.

25. Despite ample warning and written reports that the New Mexico State Police Department had a conflict and that they should not be involved in the investigation, the Attorney General's Office in and for the State of New Mexico, asked and directed that they become involved in the investigation.

26. Those investigators for the New Mexico State Police who had been directed by the Attorney General's Office to investigate have tampered and obstructed the investigation by the Lincoln County Sheriff's Department in several ways, including but not limited to, advising prospective witnesses not to have anymore contact with the Lincoln County Sheriff's Department, not to give information to the Lincoln County Sheriff's Department, advising witnesses that a brother officer would not murder anyone, and failing and refusing to turn over evidence that they had taken from the Lincoln County Sheriff's Department back to the Sheriff's Office, despite a written request to do so, so that the Sheriff's Department could have conducted further examinations of said evidence.

27. This has been with the knowledge, advice and counsel of members of the Attorney General's Office.

28. The New Mexico State Police Department has certain procedures which it follows in investigating any type of criminal complaints alleged against any of the members of that agency.

29. The New Mexico State Police have failed to follow that procedure in this particular matter and in fact, have largely ignored that particular procedure and have not conducted in accordance with its guidelines, a proper, internal investigation.

30. The District Attorney in and for the Twelfth Judicial District has received certain evidence and has in his possession, certain evidence which is relevant to the investigation of the McKnight murders, but despite requests from the Lincoln County Sheriff's Department to have that evidence, has failed and refused to turn that evidence over to the Lincoln County Sheriff's Department for examination by experts.

31. The Office of the Attorney General, despite a written request from the Lincoln County Sheriff's Department, has failed and refused to turn over certain evidence to the Lincoln County Sheriff's Department for further examination.

32. It is believed to be critical by the Lincoln County Sheriff's

Department that the evidence held by both the District Attorney and the Attorney General's office be examined by a laboratory other than that of the New Mexico State Police, and further, that the Lincoln County Sheriff's Department as a primary law enforcement agency with jurisdiction in this cause be allowed to have that evidence and transfer it to the proper authorities for examination.

33. On or about the 2nd day of June, 1986, at approximately 9:40 A.M., Terri Ann Bussey, Petitioner herein, did file a petition with the District Court Clerk in and for the Twelfth Judicial District, County of Lincoln, State of New Mexico. Said petition was signed by at least three hundred eighty seven (387) registered voters of the County of Lincoln, State of New Mexico, said signatures have been verified by the duly elected County Clerk in and for the County of Lincoln, State of New Mexico.

34. Said petition petitioned the Honorable Richard A. Parsons, District Judge, Division III, in and for the County of Lincoln, State of New Mexico, Twelfth Judicial District, to convene a grand jury and to empower said grand jury to try and determine cases of capital, felonious or infamous crimes, and specifically to try and determine the case of the murder of Thomas P. "Cotton" McKnight and Judy Lee McKnight, husband and wife.

35. Said petition further petitioned District Judge Richard A. Parsons to appoint an attorney or attorneys licensed to practice in the State of New Mexico other than the District Attorney and/or Attorney General and/or their assistants to present the case of the murders of Thomas P. "Cotton" McKnight and Judy Lee McKnight, to said grand jury.

36. The Honorable Richard A. Parsons failed and refused to convene said grand jury.

37. A petition for a writ of mandamus was brought before the Supreme Court of the State of New Mexico and on Wednesday, July 2, 1986, in the Supreme Court of the State of New Mexico, it was ordered that the Alternative Writ of Mandamus brought by Terry (sic) Ann Bussey, shall be issued unless the District Judge empanels a grand jury within sixty (60) days of the date of the Supreme Court order, being July 2, 1986. A true and correct of said Order is attached hereto as Exhibit "A" and by reference thereto made a part hereof.

38. Various and sundry letters, newspaper comments by the Sheriff's Department, the District Attorney's Office, and the Attorney General's Office, have been made regarding the disputes between them over the investigation of the McKnight investigation.

39. The Attorney General's Office has indicated through one of its' (sic) assistants, that the mere fact that a grand jury was convened, did not mean that the McKnight murders had to be considered.

40. Furthermore, the Attorney General's Office in and for the State of New Mexico and the District Attorney's Office in and for the Twelfth Judicial District, opposed the convening of a grand jury and the Attorney General's Office argued against it in the Supreme Court of the State of New Mexico.

41. To properly assist the grand jury, it is necessary that an attorney or attorneys familiar with the laws of the State of New Mexico and familiar with prosecutions in criminal cases and presentations to grand juries, present all of the facts, both exculpatory and inculpatory, to said grand jury, which must be convened between sixty (60) days of July 2, 1986.

42. The laws of the State of New Mexico provide that the Attorney General's Office may appoint a special prosecutor.

43. The Courts, including the District Courts, the Court of Appeals, and the Supreme Court in and for the State of New Mexico, have the inherent authority and power to appoint a special prosecutor.

44. The Attorney General of the State of New Mexico and the District Attorney in and for the Twelfth Judicial District have opposed the convening of a grand jury, and have deliberately obstructed and hampered the investigation of the McKnight murders by the Lincoln County Sheriff's Department.

45. Were the suspects, which the Lincoln County Sheriff's Department has indicated committed the murders of the McKnights, indicted, it would be politically embarrassing to the New Mexico State Police, the office of the Attorney General in and for the State of New Mexico, and to the office of the District Attorney in and for the Twelfth Judicial District.

46. In order to insure that the matter is properly presented to the grand jury to be convened, in order to see that justice occurs in all branches in all levels as it relates to this particular case, in order to insure that the grand jury is not used as a political device, in order to insure justice and fairness to all, including the investigatory agencies and the prosecuting agencies and any prospective defendants, it is necessary that an independent prosecutor, independent of the District Attorney's Office in and for the Twelfth Judicial District, and the office of the Attorney General, the Lincoln County Sheriff's Department, and any and all witnesses and/or family members be appointed to present the facts.

47. The independent prosecutor should be a lawyer or lawyers knowledgeable (sic) in the field of criminal prosecutions, particularly murder prosecutions.

48. Petitioners have no adequate remedy at law and there is not an adequate remedy in the ordinary course of law for them to pursue in this particular matter to insure that an independent and special prosecutor be appointed to present the McKnights' murder cases to the Lincoln County grand jury when it is convened.

49. Petitioners seek an injunction prohibiting either the Twelfth Judicial District Attorney and/or the Attorney General from presenting the case, a writ of mandamus directed to the Attorney General's Office to appoint a special and independent prosecutor and a writ of prohibition prohibiting either the District Attorney and/or members of the District Attorney's Office and/or the Attorney General and/or members of the Attorney General's Office from presenting the matter to the grand jury.

50. There is a possibility the District Attorney and Attorney General may do nothing in the way of prosecution and due to the short period of time involved, this matter should be heard at once.

51. The District Court should order and prohibit the New Mexico State Police from continuing any further investigation in this matter due to the obvious conflict.

52. The Court should further issue it's (sic) Order to Show Cause directed to the New Mexico State Police, the office of the Attorney General, and District Attorney in and for the Twelfth Judicial District, to appear before it and show cause why the New Mexico State Police should not be removed from any further investigation in this particular matter, and why a special prosecutor other than the District Attorney and/or Attorney General and/or members of their respective offices, should not be appointed to receive all evidence, all reports, and to proceed with a proper and due and fair presentation to the Lincoln County Grand Jury when it is convened.

53. The Court should further direct the Respondents to show cause why a preliminary and permanent injunction should not be issued, prohibiting the District Attorney and Attorney General from any prosecution presentation of the case and appointing a special and independent prosecutor(s) to investigate, prepare, present and try the McKnight murders before the Grand Jury to be convened in Lincoln County, New Mexico.

NOW, THEREFORE, you are ordered to appoint a special and independent prosecutor, special and independent of you and/or your assistants in each of your respective offices, to direct, counsel, advise and present all evidence, both inculpatory and exculpatory, regarding the homicide of Thomas P. "Cotton" McKnight and Judy Lee McKnight, to that Lincoln County Grand Jury to be convened within sixty (60) days of July 2, 1986, in the County of Lincoln, State of New Mexico, and further, to instruct the New Mexico State Police to discontinue any further investigation in this particular matter until further order of the Court and turn over all evidence to the independent and special prosecutor appointed by the Court and/or the Lincoln County Sheriff's Department who has jurisdiction over this matter, and return this Writ with your certificate stating that you have done as commanded or show cause before this Court on the 5th day of August, 1986, at the hour of 9:30 o'clock, a.m., at the District Courtroom in the District Courthouse of the County of Lincoln, located in Carrizozo, New Mexico, why you have not done so.

IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that an independent process server, independent of the office of the Sheriff of Lincoln County, serve this Alternative Writ of Mandamus upon you, PAUL BARDACKE, Attorney General in and for the State of New Mexico, and JAMES J. WELDON, District Attorney in and for the Twelfth Judicial District, without unnecessary delay and return to this Honorable Court said service of process.

## Users protest Otero Electric demand-metering policy

The staff of the New Mexico Public Service Commission (PSC) is conducting an investigation into the appropriateness of Otero County Electric Cooperative, Inc.'s (OCEC) use of demand metering for its residential customers, PSC Chief Staff Counsel James Martin said.

The investigation is a result of a hearing before the PSC July 3, when two Alto residents protested the OCEC's demand meter rate increase. The protests were dismissed by the PSC and the cooperative was allowed to increase its rates.

After that hearing, the PSC staff agreed that the protests raised "a legitimate issue about Otero's residential demand charge. It is undisputed that Otero is the only cooperative, indeed, the only electric utility, in the State of New Mexico that has such a charge. Otero's uniqueness in this respect is sufficient by itself to call into question whether this demand charge is appropriate," the staff stated.

"The staff will look into the demand metering rates and make any recommendations to the commission. At that point, we will make a decision of whether or not to have a hearing," Martin said.

Alto resident Jeanie Clancy said she is in the process of compiling a list of people interested in intervening and becoming parties to a hear-

ing before the commission.

"Originally, there were only two parties. Now, I have a list of 125 people who are concerned with what is going on," Clancy said.

She said people who have demand metering have to be cautious of how many appliances are being used at one time.

"When you live in an all electric home, you have to be careful of what you're doing all of the time. You cannot run two major appliances at once, or you will end up paying for it.

"They are penalizing us for asking too much of their system at one time," Clancy said.

Electricity is measured in two quantities: volume and usage per hour. It is the volume, or demand, of electricity used that determines the size of wires and electrical facilities needed to service the consumers, OCEC General Manager Bill Mershon said.

"Our meters are the same as other meters, but have an added feature that measures demand," Mershon said.

"The demand charge does not apply until a residential consumer exceeds 10 kilowatts in any month," he explained.

OCEC began using demand metering in 1972. The cooperative is one of 13 rural electrical cooperatives that own a generating

and transmission cooperative in Albuquerque, Plains Electric. About half of OCEC's power comes from Plains Electric's new generating plant west of Grants, the rest is generated from hydroelectrical power. Plains Electric charges OCEC a demand charge for the volume of electrical power it uses, Mershon said.

That demand rate has increased due, in part, to the construction of Plains Electric's new coal powered generating facility near Grants, he said.

Mershon explained if the volume of electrical usage was graphed over a 30-day period, there would be a system peak near 8 p.m. during the summer and 5 p.m. during the winter months. "If we can trim the peak off, that improves our load factor, and saves us money and the consumers money," he said.

Demand charges are motivations for consumers to find ways to lower that peak and decrease the demand on the system during the peak period, Mershon said.

"The system is time sensitive. We give consumers the incentive to spread out the usage of their electricity which could potentially reduce the cost of their electric power," he said.

Mershon said consumers can lower their demand in one of two ways. One is to make sure two ma-

nor appliances are not running at the same time.

"People can manually turn off the water heater before turning on the dryer," he said.


Mershon explained that a water heater kicks on during or after a load of wash has been done and is probably still running when the dryer is turned on. Turning on an additional appliance would use more than the allotted 10 kilowatts. Another way to cut down or eliminate the demand charge is to install a device that cuts off circuit breakers when the demand meter is approaching the 10 kilowatt limit.

"The consumer can establish a priority of what circuits he wants to turn off first," Mershon said.

He explained the device can be set at any kilowatt level to accommodate heavier electrical usage without breakers being turned off. Average installation of the device costs about \$500. The device can potentially pay for itself in one year, Mershon said.

## Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE—"Power: If You've Got It, Flaunt It." That seems to have been the motto of some of those recently shorn of their primacy in our state Senate.

Take that flight two members of the "in" group in our state's senior legislative body made earlier this year to Lexington, Kentucky. What was going on there to attract these stalwarts was a conference of state racing commissioners, though neither of our Senators making that trip strictly fits into that category.

Admittedly, racing is an important industry in this state, and as one of the two said, "If you're going to have an industry the size of racing in New Mexico, it's certainly beneficial to meet with legislators from other states periodically."

But what looks like bad judgment about that trip, or perhaps a spirit that says, "I can do anything I please," is that the lead member of the partnership making it, Senator Les Houston of Albuquerque, is attorney of record and on an annual retainer to the New Mexico Horseman's Association, made up of those who race their horses.

The records show the state paid him \$965 for this journey. Mightn't we then ask whether it was the state or his private clients who got the ultimate benefit from what the taxpayers paid for?

The Senator told a reporter he was invited to the nationwide conference because of his longstanding interest in the racing industry. Doesn't that sound like he made that impression in his private capacity, but charged the state for a round trip in his official one?

And he has yet to explain why he needed the assistance of Senator Billy McKibben of Lovington, on this journey, since nothing in McKibben's role with state government has anything directly to do with the racing industry.

All in all, it looks like New Mexico, which can't afford any luxuries at the moment, had the privilege of paying Houston's way to a meeting in that state where he grew up, and sent along as a companion one of his best friends in the Legislature to keep him from growing lonely.

(If you're asking this question in your own mind, no, the two were not there during the weekend in which the Kentucky Derby was run. To be in Kentucky then might have seemed a little too flagrant even to "raw power" advocates.)

The other big spender in this case

is Senator Ellen Steele of Las Cruces, who bought first-class tickets on flights to Atlanta and Williamsburg. On one of those trips, her air fare was \$1,110, which was a whopping \$825 more than Representative Pat Baca of Albuquerque spent on the trip to the same destination.

The regs allow legislators to be reimbursed up to the amount of a first-class air ticket on such travels, but they certainly do not mandate that lawmakers travel in luxury. New Mexico, after all, is a poor state—and that shouldn't be news to Senator Steele, who has access to all the figures about our financial condition.

And while we're talking about airplanes, we might direct our attention to the \$7,500 or more Lieutenant Governor Mike Runnels has spent flying about the state in New Mexico-owned aircraft since last February.

What makes that look a little unusual is that Mike didn't once fly in either the Highway Department or the Energy and Minerals Department planes for at least six months before February. Then, just about the time he is making up his mind to run for Congress in the second district, he finds it necessary to make at least 12 flights to destinations that all lie within that district.

And those flights aren't cheap. The two planes Runnels prefers to use each cost \$225 an hour to operate. Though we are told either the governor's office or the lieutenant governor's office picks up the tab for these journeys, we know whose pocket that money comes from, don't we?

Maybe everybody in state government is overcome with a "what-the-hell" attitude at the moment. After all, this administration has only six more months to serve, so those in charge may plan just to coast till year's end.

But to hear, as this writer did, a noisy party being held in one portion of the Department of Regulations and Licensing, complete with guitar-player and some raucous community singing, at 9:30 in the morning on a workday suggests things are badly out of hand.

It's hardly cheering to realize that in this instance, as in those discussed above, public servants appear to take a pretty defiant attitude toward throwing away our public funds.
