Referendum: Will voters have say on tax raise?

Despite predictions by members of the Ruidoso Village Council, no group or individual has come forward to petition for a negative referendum on last Tuesday's council action increasing sales taxes in the city from 6 to 6.5 percent on January 1.

The tax increase, adopted during a regular council meeting, will give

Ruidoso the highest gross receipts tax rate in the state, followed by Raton at 6.25 percent in second place. Taos, Questa, Red River and Clayton all charge 6.125 percent, Bayard 6 percent, and all other cities in the state charge less than Ruidoso's present 6 percent rate.

The village ordinance passed included stipulations that the tax revenues from the increase be earmarked for keeping the Ruidoso Municipal Airport land by investing

its assessed value of \$2.6 million into the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport project. The Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) has told the village it is obligated to invest the value of the current airport into the new airport.

The council voted some time ago to keep the old airport site as a way of tempting soft industry into the area. Some groups have proposed building a convention center on that site.

Tuesday's tax hike was described by Mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr. as the only "viable" way of coming up with the funds to keep the airport land.

FAA officials have encouraged Ruidoso to invest the funds "up-front" to keep the airport project on schedule.

The motion, made by Village Councillor Ray Dean Carpenter, also called for paying the debt incurred early, if the tax nets more

than expected. Carpenter included a provision for removing the .50 percent tax when the debt is paid. It has been estimated the \$2.6 million can be repaid in seven to 10 years.

Although he doesn't claim credit for starting a negative referendum petition drive, Al Junge confirmed Friday that some citizens asked him to investigate the procedures. Junge said he checked with Village Hall, found out details on what is involved and prepared petitions ac-

ording to state regulations.

Junge testified before the council in favor of a compromise measure increasing the sales tax by just .25 percent and raising the difference needed through cutting village government costs.

"If they'd give a little, we'd give a little," noted Junge.

Dangerous curve

Officer Steve Standridge said Chavez and a passenger were injured in the accident that occurred about 3:30 a.m. Friday about three miles east of Fox Cave. Standridge said the pickup went off the roadway and traveled down the mountain

side for nearly 100 yards before dropping off a 30-foot cliff into the river. Standridge said the passenger, who was injured, crawled up to the highway to flag down a passing motorist and get help to the scene. Both the driver and passenger were treated at Ruidoso Hill Valley Hospital, said Standridge. He said the accident is still under investigation.

Cree membership, village will have special meetings

A special meeting scheduled at 4 p.m. Tuesday, August 5, by the Ruidoso Village Council will be preceded by a 3 p.m. workshop session, and followed by a workshop on a proposed personnel ordinance.

The meeting was scheduled to discuss Community Development Block Grants (CDBG), but the 3 p.m. workshop session will be on plans to replace five village

bridges.

Assistant village manager Frank Potter will present portions of a proposed personnel ordinance after the CDBG presentation is complete.

Village manager Jim Hine said Hubert Quintana, executive director of the Southeastern New Mexico Economic Development District, will conduct the CDBG hearing. Hine said the purpose of that

meeting is to offer members of the public an opportunity to let the Village Council know their desires on CDBG funding requests. He said the council will evaluate input from the public before deciding on proposals to present to the state commission that allocates CDBG monies.

A public meeting to discuss a possible transfer of ownership of

Cree Meadows Country Club is scheduled at 9 a.m. Friday, August 8, at Cree Meadows.

Planners encourage public input at the meeting, and ask everyone interested in having a public golf course open to locals and visitors to attend the meeting.

Community service

Time, fines worked off through civic work

The alternative sentencing program is alive and well in the Ruidoso area, reported Laura Ashley, community services coordinator.

"We haven't had any problems," noted Ashley, who said misdemeanor offenders assigned through the community services program completed 1,692 hours of work during July. She said 1,656 hours have been assigned and are being completed by the offenders.

Community service is used to sentence misdemeanor offenders who cannot pay a fine or who a judge feels could benefit more by contributing service than by paying a fine or serving jail time, explained Ashley.

Ashley said the program is so successful that she is adding something new.

Clem Clutter, owner of the Clutter Shop on Sudderth Drive, recently volunteered to take on enough community service participants to clean up a portion of Sudderth Drive. Ashley said he supervised the workers she assigned, who cleaned the public portion on both sides of the street from the Paradise Canyon intersection to Two Rivers Park.

"It worked out great," said Ashley, who is now asking other merchants to supervise offenders while they clean more public areas of the town.

Ashley said supervision doesn't entail on-the-job observation, but merely acting as a check-in point and making a quick survey that the work was done.

Since so many program par-

ticipants work Monday through Friday, Ashley said merchants can help by being available to supervise on Saturdays and Sundays when many businesses are open anyway.

Ashley said she needs merchants or any other individual interested in getting some public areas of town cleaned up, who will take on the responsibility of assigning and following up on an assignment of at least eight hours.

"If you're upset about something, do something about it," recommends Ashley, who spends 20 or more hours a week as a volunteer for the program.

Ashley said Roy Seay was concerned about the condition of the Little League ballfields, so he asked for and got enough community service help to get them cleaned up. Ashley said Seay furnished the equipment for the ballfield projects.

Ashley said she has assigned hours on sentences from judges John Cupp, J.R. "Jim" Wheeler, Robert Cordova and Richard Parsons, as well as probation officers Rick Austin and Jim Parnell.

Ashley has asked that merchants or individuals interested in putting offenders to work call her at 257-9055.

Jockey Casey Lambert gets Leading Jet (No. 3) up for a nose verdict over Whata Lucky Jet (No. 8) in the \$10,100 Big Profit Handicap run last Saturday at Ruidoso Downs. The son of world champion Easy Jet went postward as the third choice to win the Big Profit Handicap shouldering high weight of 122 pounds. It was the colt's third stakes win at the mountain track this summer. He accounted for both the Zia and Jet Deck Handicaps earlier in the meet. The Big Profit win was worth \$8,060 to owner LeRoy Spires Jr. of Snyder, Texas. Cliff Lambert Sr. trains Leading Jet, who stepped off the 55-yard stakes race in 27.29 seconds into a moderate headwind. The photo-finish camera put Leading Jet a nose in front of Whata Lucky Jet, with Blade Seeker (No. 2 on the inside) finishing another nose behind Whata Lucky Jet for third.



Gordon Graham sets deadline for race stalls at Sunland Park

Racing Secretary Gordon Graham has announced an Aug. 15 deadline to apply for stalls at the upcoming Sunland Park meeting following recent approval of an 89-day schedule by the New Mexico State Racing Commission. The Commission awarded a 29-week meeting to the Southern New Mexico track running Oct. 11 through May 3, 1987. Also approved was the 1986-87 stakes schedule for Sunland, which features 42 events offering nearly \$300,000 in added prize money. The track's 27th season features a mixed fare of both quarter horse and thoroughbred racing. Highlighting the stakes events for quarter horses are the nationally recognized \$275,000 (est.) Sun Country Futurity and the \$150,000 (est.) West Texas Futurity, which will be contested next spring. Complementing those two races are a set of high-dollar stakes slated for the fall portion of the meeting. The \$175,000 (est.) Sunland Park All American Sale Futurity is set for Nov. 16, with the \$125,000 (est.) Fall Quarter Horse Futurity scheduled Dec. 27. The 24th running of the Riley Allison Futurity tops the list of big-money races for thoroughbreds. The half-mile sprint traditionally closes out the season, offering a purse projected at \$350,000. It ranks among the nation's richest early season stakes for 2-year-olds.

Big profits for Leading Jet in wild finish Saturday

Leading Jet notched his third stakes victory at Ruidoso Downs this summer posting a whisker win over Whata Lucky Jet in Saturday's \$10,100 Big Profit Handicap.
 Leading Jet went postward as the third choice to win Saturday's Big Profit Cap. Rainbow Derby finalist Mr Victory Devil was the 6-5 favorite with Bar Forth - who was returning to the track off an 11-month rest - the third pick of more than 5,700 fans on hand for the afternoon program.
 Leading Jet took a narrow lead in the 10-horse field breaking from the No. 3 post with jockey Casey Lambert at the reins. Blade Seeker, a 14-1 longshot ridden by Joe Martinez, kept pace with the leader running next door in the two lane, while Whata Lucky Jet made up ground from the nine hole under Rudy Bustamante.

The three horses matched strides through the 550-yard test with little more than inches separating them at the wire. The photo-finish camera put Leading Jet in front of Whata Lucky Jet by a nose, with Blade Seeker a whisker behind in third.
 It was Leading Jet's fourth trip to the winner's circle this year. He accounted for both the Zia and Jet Deck Handicaps earlier this season to earn more than \$18,000 in seven appearances. Owner LeRoy Spires Jr. of Snyder, Texas, added another \$6,080 to that figure with Saturday's Big Profit purse. Trainer Cliff Lambert Sr. attributed Leading Jet's win to his fast-breaking form.
 "He likes the longer distances and he got a good break out of the gate," the horseman said. "That was the difference between today's race and the trials for the World's

Championship Quarter Horse Classic. He stumbled real bad coming out of the gate and got bumped a little and couldn't make up for it. Today, he ran a good clean race."
 Whata Lucky Jet's surprising second at more than 19-1 odds banked \$2,222 for Morrell Gist of Andrews, Texas. Nerrell Brunst conditions the What Luck colt. Blade Seeker earned \$1,010 for third. Ralph Shamas saddled the Texas Blade gelding after claiming him last week for \$6,250. He carries the colors of Elizabeth Shamas of Roswell.

Ad committee holds off on 'newswrap' campaign

Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce Advertising Committee members agreed to postpone commitment of a "newswrap" contract proposed by Epstein Communications Wednesday.

Epstein Communications, in conjunction with Crume Public Relations of Irving, Texas, were the agencies chosen by the committee to conduct its advertising and public relations campaigns for the 1986-87 fiscal year.

The newswrap project involves a 90 second to two minute videotaped news story about the Ruidoso area. It will eventually be sent to television stations nationwide to use at their discretion.

Bob Epstein, proposed a newswrap utilizing the "Labor Day/All American Futurity as the initial angle for the story." Two versions of the video were proposed, one without the racing angle for a longer distribution period. He wished to begin actual shooting of the video August 5. Committee members agreed this was too sudden.

"I still like the concept, but my

experiences with rushing through things have not been very good. I worry about the quality of the work when it is done in such a hurried fashion," committee chairman Robert Boverie said.

The committee stressed it will have a newswrap, but does not want to commit to a contract until further details can be reviewed and discussed.

Committee members also discussed a familiarization tour of Ruidoso involving 20 oriental tour operators who will be visiting the western United States. The one-day tour is scheduled for September 23.

In other business, the group agreed to gather the necessary information about Ruidoso to be included in the state sponsored, 24-page pull-out article on the state of New Mexico. The state is expected to spend \$500,000 on the article which will appear in the December issue of Travel and Leisure magazine and the January issue of Spirit magazine.

The committee also discussed a market research survey which will help identify prospective markets, both geographically and demographically, and the "Ruidoso image."

The Thirty-Eighth Lincoln Days

This is being sent to you in mid morning of August second, right in the middle of the thirty eighth presentation of Old Lincoln Days. The celebration was begun in 1940 as a feature of New Mexico's four hundredth birthday, or "Cuarto Centennial."

The first pageant was held with the streets of Lincoln as the stage, and Peter Hurd as Billy The Kid. There were ox carts stage coaches, wagons, buggies and pack mules in the show on that first day.

The pageant became so popular that a pageant grounds was built for an outdoor show with the main landmarks of Lincoln Town in the background, so that horsemen could come galloping off and on stage.

Last night's performance of "The Last Escape of Billy The Kid" was one of the very best in the thirty five years I have been privileged to play in the show. There was a large crowd for the Friday night performance.

It has struck me that through these years, the crowds have been the most appreciative, kindly and friendly of any group of spectators I have ever seen.

And the actors, young and old have responded, trying year after year to do better.

In Honor of Pioneers

I think the magic touch to the show is the fact that it is put on in honor and appreciation of the pioneers of the American West, the Southwest and in particular the early people of Lincoln County one hundred years ago. And yes, also, the pioneers going back to the beginning of our Country—the Founding Fathers—and the stalwart colonists who stood with them in the struggle.

In other words, the Pageant is typically American, and the actors and the audience feel this.

My thoughts went back to the pioneers who welcomed us here in 1925. They were the finest friends you could have. Many of them were friends of Billy The Kid, which cannot help but speak well for the Kid. One thing that did your heart good was to see so many young actors—teenagers about the same age

as the actors in the real drama one hundred years ago—doing such splendid work in depicting the action the way it happened in the real show one hundred years ago.

The folks from tiny toddlers up to elderly ladies and gentlemen are cut out of the same cloth as the early pioneers.

Ronnie Barone, supported by his brother, Randy, as his voice in the sound booth, made one of the best Billy The Kids we have ever had. And was well supported by the great host of fine actors who put on a great show.


Your mind drifted back to actors in the shows of former; we missed them but they were there in spirit.

Among these are Edward Penfield, of Lincoln, who was a mainstay in the sound booth since the beginning of the show. We were fortunate to have his nephew, Johnny Amastae, who made us a hand with the voices.

A little shadow was cast over Friday's show with the news that Ralph Dunlap and his wife, Rosalie, on their way back from Albuquerque to be in the pageant, were involved in a car accident. Ralph was to play the voice of Buckshot and others, and his place was taken by Johnny Amastae.

Ralph also was to play Old Man Goss. Billy Shrecengost, Jr., a former Billy The Kid, took over and brought the house down.

It is a greater honor each year to be in the show and I thank the director Diane Shrecengost, the actors and the folks in the crowd, and all who helped out, from the bottom of my heart.

One sure sign of fall is that the National Football League (NFL) pre-season schedule starts in earnest this week.

Teams will be looking at all their players in an effort to find the best combination for the regular season.

But who will be the teams in the Super Bowl at the end of the season?

For starts, you probably can rule out the defending NFL champion Chicago Bears and the defending American Conference (AFC) champion New England Patriots.

Although both teams are talented, it's very hard to repeat in the NFL, or in pro sports in general.

The Patriots also have some drug problems which could prevent them from repeating as conference champions.

Let's look at the AFC first.

In the Eastern Division, the New York Jets look to beat out defending division-champion Miami and the Patriots for the division title. The Jets are solid offensively and defensively. Quarterback Ken O'Neil has developed into an excellent passer and leader.

Despite their already strong defense, the Giants went heavily for defensive players in the draft, thus making themselves even stronger in that area.

But the 49ers' defense has slipped a bit, while the Rams have improved in that category. This division could go either way.

In the playoffs, the Rams will top Dallas again in the wild-card game.

The Giants will defeat the Rams and the Bears will top the 49ers in the semi-finals.

Then the Giant defense will out-maul the Bears in the championship game, to the tune of 17-14.

Thus, we should have a Giant-Bronco finale.

The past two Super Bowls have seen NFC teams win going away.

This year will be no different as the Giants' balance will be too much for Denver.

Look for New York to breeze, 38-7. Who ever heard of a close Super Bowl?



Aspenfest and full slate of activities promise busy fall

"A Century of Fun in Ruidoso," commemorating the village's centennial birthday celebration, is this year's Aspenfest theme with festivities beginning September 12 and running through October 31.

The Aspenfest Parade and Street Festival will highlight the fall events Saturday, October 4, with the parade beginning at 11 a.m. and the festival taking place from 1 to 5 p.m.

Aspenfest organizer Nancy Rad-

zewicz said some 500 parade invitations were mailed out in April. She hopes this year's parade will be bigger than ever, but says it cannot be done without community support.

"So far, we're getting good, positive response. Last year we had seven bands. We're hoping to get at least 14 this year," Radzewicz said.

Radzewicz co-chairs the Aspenfest Parade and Street Festival along with Cal Cowden and Barbara Downs. They say what they need now is community-wide

participation.

"What we need from the community is participation. This is a celebration of the village, and the people need to become involved," Radzewicz said.

Owners can also decorate their store fronts to coincide with the centennial theme. Individuals wishing to enter a float, or any other parade entry are urged to

"This year, we decided not to bring in a celebrity because we felt our centennial should be something for the local community to celebrate. We are looking for someone from Lincoln County who is 100 years old to be our grand marshal. People 90 and older should be honored on a float," she said.

thopaedics can expect to be very busy, Moore said.

Lahey said he would enjoy conducting sports treatment and injury clinics for trainers in the area, especially those who work in a school setting.

Lahey has degrees from Dartmouth, the University of Colorado and the Medical University of Nebraska.

He has nearly completed the requirements to become a member of the American Board of Diplomates in orthopaedic surgery.

Building permits reach \$1.6 million in June

Village building is on the rise—with permits issued by the Village of Ruidoso Building Inspector increasing during June for the third month in a row.

A total of 31 permits valued at \$1,582,332 were issued in June in all categories, up nearly \$800,000 from May's 31 permits worth \$809,681. June's permits were also worth slightly more than the 57 issued in June 1985 with a dollar value of \$1,522,634.

The three-month trend of increasing building activity still leaves total 1986 permits trailing 1985 by \$2 million, with the current year-to-date figures at 159 permits worth \$7,915,751, compared to last year's 344 at \$9,918,614.

During June 13 single-family residential (SFD) permits were issued worth \$1,222,473, nearly twice the value of May's eight SFD permits valued at \$613,354. Last year in June the village issued 15 SFD permits with a \$1,243,374 price tag.

Residential remodeling permits continued a decline in June with 11 issued worth \$54,122, down significantly from May's 16 residential addition/alteration permits valued at \$122,776, and way down from June 1985 when 33 redo permits priced at \$226,633 were recorded.

Just one new commercial building was started during June—a commercial office and clubhouse in the Camelot addition valued at \$134,755. In May two commercial permits were issued, but the value was less than half that of the June commercial building—\$57,551. Last year no commercial building starts were recorded in June.

Four commercial addition/alteration permits with a \$13,350 value were issued in June, way up from May's one commercial remodel permit valued at \$1,000, and down from the six issued in June 1985 with a dollar value of \$41,137.

No demolitions were recorded in June. A year ago two were authorized at an estimated \$9,990 cost, and this May two were issued for \$7,500.

A new apartment/condominium permit worth \$142,632 was issued in June for a four-unit condominium

project in the Panorama Lodge Addition. No permits were issued in that category in May or a year ago in June 1985.

One grading permit was issued in June with a value of \$15,000.



in brief

According to a provision of the Food Security Act of 1985, farmers who want to stay eligible for most federal farm programs will have to control erosion on their highly erodible land, U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) officials say.

In the past, soil conservation has been "a voluntary program. This is the first time that price supports, disaster payments, loans, crop insurance and other USDA programs will be dependent on a farmer taking care of his land," a news release said.

Farmers need to be aware of the new provisions.

"Some of the provisions are in effect now, and others are keyed to 1990 and 1995. Under the 'sodbuster' provision, farmers who apply for next year's farm programs must

certify that they have not broken out highly erodible land to produce agricultural commodities since December 23, 1985, unless they followed a locally approved conservation plan," the release states. This applies to lands where farmers did not produce a crop from 1981-85. "Under 'swampbuster' rules, they must certify that they have not drained or converted wetlands to produce crops since the December date."

The Soil Conservation Service in New Mexico estimates that more than 1 1/2 million acres of New Mexico cropland are considered highly erodible. Highly erodible land is defined as land with a slope steepness of 8 percent or higher, but some gently sloping land is also considered.

Third, to cross the finish line was Mascarenas Arabians, Espanola.

The three teams finished the race within 10 minutes of each other.

Mascarenas lodged a protest against Clements and Cunningham as soon as they dismounted, stating in the protest that Clements and Cunningham had violated the rules by not carrying the mail pouch

from the school house (where horses were changed on the north side of the Capitans) to White Oaks.

Clements told judges Johnson Stearns, Gordon Bigger, Carl Hanson and Butch Gifford that the official at the school house, Allen Lewis, had told him to "ride on without the mail pouch he didn't need to carry it from there."

After nearly three hours of deliberation, the judges decided the official was at fault and the winner of the race would remain the same.

The Pony Express race is a grueling endurance race, crossing some of the roughest country in the county. Beginning at Double Crossing, three miles west of Lincoln, the course goes over the Capitan Mountains and through the Jicarillas, ending in White Oaks. Teams are allowed up to four horse and rider changes at specified stations along the route. Six teams were entered this year, the last team finishing three hours after the winner.

A full day at White Oaks followed the race, and included a barbecue, rodeo and dance.





Though the researchers have not yet found the clues they need to prove they have found the McSween House, they have made what one researcher called "exciting" finds such as the 1861-1901 cavalry button found last Saturday and shown in the picture at left, along with a cartridge and musket ball from before 1890. The experts have found many clues to the lifestyle in early Lincoln.

When asked about negative referendums, village manager Jim Hine said any group or individual has the privilege of asking that the tax increase be brought to a vote. He said a petition signed by five percent of the number who voted in the last general election is needed for such an action.

Hine said that means 135 or more qualified electors who reside within the corporate limits of Ruidoso must petition for a vote within 30 days after the date the ordinance was enacted.

He said the petition would be presented to the Village Council, and that body would be required to set a date for an election.

Village clerk Leon Eggleston said Tuesday the soonest an election could be scheduled is December 22. Hine said no village elections can be scheduled within 45 days of November's elections.

Eggleston said if a negative referendum is called and the tax increase is approved by the voters it won't then be implemented until July 1, 1987.

Tuesday's decision split the coun-

cil down the middle. Councillors Elmer Pirelli, Victor Alonso and Dub Holt voted against the tax hike, and councillors Ray Dean Carpenter, Jerry Shaw and Larry Simon voted yes. That left it up to Mayor Davis to break the tie with his "aye" vote.

Although a negative referendum hasn't been announced, councillors Tuesday all expected such a response to their action.

"It's going to delay the airport," said Alonso, who was "very, very disappointed" with the outcome of Tuesday's meeting.

"I went in there saying no new taxes, and the .25 percent compromise was a last resort," remarked Alonso, who proposed the amendment calling for the lesser tax increase. He said the balance could be raised through cutting village government and using part of the lodgers' tax matching funds.

None of the councillors contacted Friday had seen a petition, but Alonso said he'll sign it if one exists.

Councillor Holt also favored a smaller tax increase and called on the city to "tighten its budgetary belt."

Councillor Pirelli remained firm

in his stand against any increase in taxes, voting against Alonso's amendment and the ordinance that was passed.

The three who favored the increase stand behind their votes.

"All I've had is phone calls from people congratulating me," said Councillor Carpenter Friday.

Carpenter, Shaw and Simon were concerned with raising enough revenues to pay off any indebtedness incurred within a short time.

Several councillors mentioned that a .25 percent hike would hit citizens just as hard as the .50 percent. They said some merchants, especially those using computerized cash registers, would round up to 6.5 to avoid odd numbers.

The three proponents cited figures of how much the village will save in interest costs by inebting itself—through whatever means—for a shorter length of time.

Simon said debt service on a 10-year debt would probably run about \$392,240 a year—\$1,172,500 over the life of the debt. He said the interest rate could be expected to go up a half percent if the pay-back

time is increased to 15 years.

Debt service on a 15-year debt is estimated at \$312,508 a year and \$1,937,625 over the life of the debt, said Simon.

He said by lengthening the indebtedness to 20 years, the village could expect another half percent interest rate hike and would pay about \$280,200 a year in interest, \$2,654,000 over the 20 years.

"You're paying more interest than principal," noted Simon of long-term financing.

Shaw, Simon and Carpenter stressed that the moment the indebtedness is paid off the .50 percent increase will be rescinded.

And in the meantime, what will they do about a negative referendum?

"We'll just have to go out and sell it (the tax)," said Simon.

"What it boils down to is we got used to having government grants and such," remarked Simon. "This is a time and an era when it's not going to happen. If we want it we're going to have to pay for it," he added.

Judges dispute El Paso Times' McKnight story

An El Paso Times report of a "bitter controversy" among judges over some aspects of the McKnight murder case has sparked written rebuttals from two district judges.

In a byline story, Times staff writer David Sheppard quoted district judges Robert Doughty and Richard Parsons on their views on an alternative writ of mandamus signed by District Judge Sandra Grisham.

Language in the writ indicated that Judge Grisham ordered investigating agencies to turn over evidence to a "special, independent prosecutor" in the old murder investigation, according to the story. Judges Parsons and Doughty were quoted by Sheppard as saying a judge hasn't the authority to appoint such a prosecutor.

"I don't believe there is any authority on a writ of mandamus or anything else to appoint a special prosecutor other than the attorney general," said Doughty, according to the Times report.

"If I could appoint my own pro-

secutor whenever I wanted, I would have total control over justice in Lincoln County," said Parsons, according to the story.

Grisham, in a letter to Sheppard, said her writ did not call for the appointment of a special prosecutor, but rather scheduled a "show cause hearing."

"Either the attorney general was to appoint a special prosecutor or show cause why he should not," said Grisham in her letter. She asked Sheppard to "correct the record."

Doughty indicated in a letter to Sheppard he was "very disappointed" in the article. He emphatically denied a statement in the story that he (Doughty) "indicated her order violates judicial standards."

"I have consistently told the press that I would not second guess Judge Grisham, that her actions were only of the nature of scheduling an Order to Show Cause hearing at which all sides would be given an adequate opportunity to be heard, and that I did not have the pleadings," said the Doughty letter.

"I do stand by the story," said

Sheppard, contacted at his Alamogordo office. "I think her writ speaks for itself," he added.

"Is it or is it not a ruling?" asked Sheppard. "The story says it is and I believe it is," he added.

"She says either do it and certify you have done it or come to the hearing," he noted.

Sheppard said he has responded to both judges in writing.

The controversy is just one more in a list of disagreements over the investigation of the murders of Thomas P. "Cotton" and Judy McKnight. Their slain bodies were discovered in the floor of their isolated Picacho ranch home in November 1984.

Since then investigations have been conducted by the Lincoln County Sheriff's Office, the New Mexico State Police, the 12th Judicial District Attorney and the Attorney General.

Lincoln County Sheriff Tom Sullivan has announced he has evidence to support his request to the District Attorney (DA) to bring a suspect (or suspects) to trial, but the DA has said the evidence is "tainted."

Meanwhile Judge Parsons nearly a year ago issued a gag order on all the officials in the case.

Although Judy McKnight's sister, Terri Bussey, petitioned Parsons to call for a grand jury, he refused to act on the petition, and also denied a Lincoln County grand jury access to information on the case, according to a member of that jury.

Gary Mitchell, Bussey's attorney, took the petition to the State Supreme Court early in July, and that body gave Parsons 60 days to act on the petition.

After Bussey and Sullivan filed affidavits of disqualification to have Parsons and Doughty barred from the McKnight case, Parsons reported last week he is calling a grand jury.

After Grisham signed the alternative writ of mandamus on a petition by Sullivan and Bussey, the State Supreme Court issued a "stay order," apparently to stop further court action until the state court can rule on who has jurisdiction in the case.

Divers retrieve truck from bottom of Alto Lake

Scuba divers were called in Sunday to locate a pickup that was accidentally driven into Alto Lake Friday night, according to Lincoln County Sheriff's Office reports.

Deputy Dale Patrick of the Sheriff's Office said Betty Wethington, also known as Betty Harless, wandered into High Country Lodge about 10 p.m. Friday and said she had driven her 1985 Dodge pickup into the far side of the lake. Patrick said Wethington, who was treated at Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Hospital, told officers she thought the road went all the way around the lake, but was already in the water before she realized the road ended.

The 34-year-old Wethington, a jockey at Ruidoso Downs Race Track, told investigators she rolled the vehicle window down, rolled out and swam to the surface before walking back around the lake and across the highway in search of help, said Patrick.

New Mexico State Police scuba divers Mike Hill and Chris Jaramillo began an underwater search about 10:15 a.m. Sunday, and located the vehicle within the hour, reported Patrick. He said the pickup was in 25-foot water about 60 to 80 feet from shore.

Patrick said the pickup was impounded by the Sheriff's Office while the investigation continues. He said no charges have been filed. Patrick praised the members of the various agencies that cooperated in locating and retrieving the pickup, and investigating the accident. He said Laura Ashley of the Ruidoso Police Department acted as communications coordinator for the divers.

Patrick said Don Masters of the Water Department and members of the Bonito Fire Department, the Bonito Ambulance Service and White Mountain Search and Rescue all aided in the successful operation.


The conference was sponsored by the 500,000 GFWC Free Enterprise program. The program is dedicated to encourage better understanding

A guardrail could make the difference between life and death on one lonely stretch of Highway 70.

Near mile marker 272, just past Fox Cave on the way to Roswell, Highway 70 follows the curve of a hillside on the left and the Rio Ruidoso on the right through several turns. At highway speeds, one particular corner becomes a little tight—for an alert driver, during daylight.

But at night, or early in the morning with the glare of a rising sun, or for a driver who is inattentive for the wrong moment, the corner can be a-killer.

From roadbed to riverbed is a dropoff of maybe 100 feet.

No guardrail there separates safety from danger.

In the past month, two vehicles have crossed from safety to danger at the corner, plunging down the rocky embankment. One driver was lucky—he and his passenger survived. The other died on the unforgiving cliff-face.

Dan Storm, who with his brothers owns the green-grassed ranch that stretches across the valley from the bottom of the cliff, says last week's wreck is just the latest in a string of five or six such accidents on the corner.

We encourage the State Highway Department to study the situation and install a solution. A simple mistake on the highway doesn't have to be a death sentence.

Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE—Television "debates" between the gubernatorial candidates may be of extreme importance this year.

The public has never had a chance to see how either Ray Powell or Garrey Carruthers operates in elective office, for the simple reason that neither has ever held one. Because that's so, we need much more than ordinarily to get some feel for the quality of each man's thinking. Side-by-side appearances on television can serve that purpose.

The two joined Ernie Mills on educational TV over the three last weekends, and those shows suggest something of the way later ones may go.

Those who predicted that Carruthers, with his years of experience in the classroom, would eat the lunch of Powell, admittedly a man of much lower key, were far from right. When Powell is given sufficient time and opportunity, his depth of experience in both state and government and life makes itself apparent. As those who ran against Carruthers in the Republican primary know, some of his remarks that are overly pointed hurt, but the fact that this is almost their only purpose can decrease his standing in the estimation of the audience.

The danger of that happening is multiplied when the medium is television. For one thing, the audience is not present in the studio, so it is difficult to gauge their reaction. For another, that audience is likely to be many times the size of any drawn to a "live" political affair, so both strengths and weaknesses are perceived by enough voters to make a serious difference on election day.

The Carruthers campaign was undoubtedly aided by the announcement that Pete Domenici will be out on the hustings encouraging us to vote for Garrey.

When can we expect to hear that his adversaries in the primary will be publicly joining the campaign?

Something that might be whispered into the ear of both those gubernatorial candidates: When some of us call for an almost total change in the way in which our

state government is run, we don't mean they should call in an air strike and blast what's there off the face of the earth.

While our present governmental structure could stand some tightening up, there is almost no reason to make major adjustments in the system. What is needed, rather, is to use what's there as it was designed to be used.

One way to accomplish that is for the governor to choose high-quality Cabinet Secretaries, whose judgment can be respected, and then let them function in the jobs they are given to do.

There is probably nothing more destructive of governmental order than the "lightning" telephone call from the governor's office, as the present state of disarray among those who work for the state makes perfectly clear. No governor functions well whose ego makes him demand that those he chooses for high office be totally subservient to his will. That condition grows worse when it is not even the governor himself, but merely one of his aides who is on the phone frequently to demand unquestioned obedience.

Regular followers of what is written in this space know we deprecate any effort to turn this year's governor's race into a contest to see which of two men can promise to privatize the largest segments of our state government.

As observed here before, that notion of "privatization," or turning governmental functions over to those in the supposedly hardheaded business world who allegedly can do almost everything better than bureaucrats can, is a fad at the moment. To many who are out of office seeking to get in, or to some who are in office but can't find other solutions for government's current ills, the word has a lot of charm. Talking about it, after all, distracts the citizens and can make it sound like some real thought is taking place.

These facts, however, remain true: Most functions of government may not legally or morally be transferred to others to perform; and this whole process, despite the loud voices raised in its favor, has not yet been experimented with enough to give us much fix on what success we may expect from it.


