

## Tax rate petitions are circulated

The Ruidoso Village Council could be barred from changing the village gross receipts tax rate for one year.

If petitioners calling for a negative referendum are successful, and voters repeal the ordinance increasing village sales tax from 6 to 6.5 percent, the council cannot change the tax rate for a year, said Bob Jerkins, director of administrative services for New Mexico Municipal League.

The council recently voted to increase the tax to raise \$2.6 million to invest in the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport (SBRA) giving Ruidoso a clear deed to the current airport site. The ordinance, to become effective January 1, 1987, will give Ruidoso the highest sales tax rate in the state.

Opponents of the tax hike have begun circulating a petition, asking to take the question to the voters.

Al Junge, leading the petition drive, said he favors a .25 percent

increase, and hopes the council will amend the ordinance rather than let the whole process continue through an election.

But, according to Jerkins, once an election is scheduled, the council will be unable to turn back. He said if there is a move to change the ordinance rather than repeal it, action will have to be taken before the petition process is completed.

Village clerk Leon Eggleston said August 28 is the final date for the petitions to be turned in. He said even though they may be submitted earlier, the law sets a 30-day timeframe for this particular petition, so the process won't be complete until that day.

Jerkins said the petitions to be valid must be signed by five percent of the number of registered voters in Ruidoso as of the last general election. Eggleston said that number, verified with voter registration lists he obtains from the county clerk, is 135.

Junge said Friday several people are circulating petitions, so he doesn't have an exact signature

count, but he said he has about 35 or 40 on his petition. Petitions at the Ruidoso Public Library and the Senior Citizens Center had about 15 signatures each on Friday. The Board of Directors of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce voted not to allow petitioners to leave a copy at the chamber office.

Petitioners are sure they'll be able to get the required number to sign. Junge said 99 percent of the people asked agree to sign.

Eggleston said he'll begin canvassing the names of the signers on August 29.

Jerkins said Eggleston will have 10 days to canvass and rule on the petitions. If they are valid, having the required number of legal signatures, then Eggleston will take the petitions to the Ruidoso Village Council, and an election will be scheduled.

The council may amend or repeal the original ordinance until that election is set, said Jerkins.

Eggleston said the soonest the election can be conducted is December 22. Jerkins agreed, ex-

plaining that municipal elections cannot be scheduled within 45 days of the November general elections.

"All I'm trying to do is get the .25 percent passed," stressed Junge.

He hopes the council will amend the tax increase from .50 to .25 percent before an election is scheduled.

"If they amend before August 28 the petition would be invalid," said Eggleston. Jerkins said in that case if the voters wanted to have a say in that tax hike, the whole process would have to begin again with a new petition.

Eggleston, who is required by law to approve the petition form, said Friday he has been criticized for not drafting the petition. He said he was told not to write the petition by a legal advisor for New Mexico Municipal League. He said he was told he could not legally design and then approve the form.

Eggleston said he will provide copies of the state law on petitions to any citizen, but is unable to offer legal advice or write anyone's petition.

## Airport commission discusses finances

The Sierra Blanca Airport Commission (SBAC), during a special meeting Thursday, established financial procedures, revised plans for a logo contest, discussed recent criticisms of commission expenditures and went into an executive session to discuss litigation.

SBAC Chairman Ken Nosker reminded the group that Lincoln County serves as its fiscal agent. He said the county has stringent rules to follow on authorizing and paying bills, and asked county manager Suzanne Cox to explain the required procedures.

Contacted after the meeting, Nosker said the discussions on procedures weren't prompted by any problems, but were a safeguard to ensure that those rules and regulations are followed.

Commissioners agreed that all bills will be paid through resolutions adopted during SBAC meetings. Nosker said Thursday a resolution was adopted to pay \$158,710.49 in outstanding bills. Bills approved Thursday included:

The commission accepted the engineers' recommendation not to add a slotted screen and liner to a completed water well at the airport site. During discussions of that \$76,994.47 well, contract administrator Fred Heckman reminded the commission that a "local businessman" accused of throwing money down that hole.

He said during a Ruidoso Village Council meeting a member of the audience questioned why the airport well cost so much more than that man's domestic well of comparable depth and size—drilled for just \$10,000.

"I painted a picture that we were fools and didn't know what we were doing," remarked Heckman, asking the commission and the airport engineer to explain the big difference.

Engineer Earl Cook of Leedshill-Herkenhoff said he really couldn't make valid comparisons without specific data on the domestic well, but said publicly used wells have very rigid specifications. He said four bids were received on the project, and the bid was awarded to the lowest bidder.

Nosker said the State Purchasing Act was followed, and he knew of nothing the commission could have

done differently.

"Are you trying to say that a majority of the State Purchasing Act is going to cost seven times what it should?" asked Commissioner Conrad Buchanan.

SBAC attorney Steve Sanders said the contractor that drilled the well was bonded and the contract included a two-year warranty. He said if a contractor could have drilled the well for \$10,000, that contractor would have bid on the job.

Nosker invited anyone with questions or criticisms to attend SBAC meetings and even volunteer to become a member.

"I'd be glad to give them my position," noted Nosker.

Buchanan said the public also needs to know that all five members of the SBAC contribute equal amounts to the commission.

## Game and Fish officer has hands full with bears

"This is a new experience for me," said Roy Hays Friday.

Hays, new Game and Fish district wildlife officer in the area, has been chasing bears ever since he was transferred to Ruidoso from Santa Rosa a few weeks ago. Problems he faced during his two-and-a-half years in Santa Rosa just didn't include trapping bears.

Three bears have been caught in Ruidoso recently, and two have been returned to higher, less-populated areas, said Hays.

But one bear trapped last week in the Upper Canyon was freed from the mobile bear-catcher before the wildlife officer could transport the wild animal back into the hills.

"Traps are dangerous," said Hays, cautioning anyone seeing a trap—empty or occupied by a bear—to leave it alone. He said the culvert-on-wheels-type trap he uses has a grate at one end and a "guillotine-type" door at the other end which is released when an animal enters and takes the bait.

Hays said the door is released after the bear is well inside the structure, so it doesn't harm the bear, but it is potentially very dangerous.

Even though the bears that have

been foraging for food in village dumpsters are young, probably yearlings, weighing from 150 to 200 pounds, Hays said they, too, should be left alone. He said the young bears are probably last year's crop, turned out by their mothers when this year's baby bears were born.

The sad thing about releasing a trapped bear is that, once educated to the trap, the bear probably won't be tempted into the contraption again, said Hays.

"If he comes back I won't be able to trap him," said Hays. "He'll have to be destroyed," remarked Hays, adding he hopes the experience scared the bear enough to keep it in the hills so that won't happen.

Hays said anyone tempted to free a bear from the Game and Fish trap needs to know they're endangering the bear's life.

Besides leaving the traps and bears alone, Hays recommends keeping all garbage picked up and off porches and decks, since that's what draws the animals to civilization.

Ernie Sandoval, former district wildlife officer, also recommends wrapping edible trash securely in plastic before placing it in

dumpsters.

Hays said he, his wife, Roberta, and six-year-old daughter, Leshe, are happy to be in Ruidoso.

"This sure is nice country," said Hays, who expects to be pretty busy enforcing game and fish laws in his district. For now, Hays is responding to several bear calls a day.



## Extra work is rewarding for Make An Effort on Thursday

Jockey Steve Renteria takes Northern Writer to a commanding 5-length victory in the \$17,325 Ruidoso Speed Handicap August 9 at Ruidoso Downs. The five-year-old daughter of Staff Writer stepped over a track listed as sloppy from early afternoon rain-showers. Joe Merrick, who owns the mare in a partnership with George Suthers of Sayre, Oklahoma, collected \$10,395 for Northern Writer's impressive effort. It was her third career stakes win. She accounted for the Las Donas Handicap on July 6 at Santa Fe Downs and won the Tom Cullison Handicap at Albuquerque last year.

Rainbow Futurity finalist Make An Effort turned in one of the most stunning performances at Ruidoso Downs this summer in winning his elimination trial Thursday for the \$2.53 million All American Futurity.

Thursday's program featured the second in three days of eliminations for the world's richest quarter horse race. The top three finishers in 36 divisions will advance to time trials slated Aug. 20.

Make An Effort went postward in Thursday's final All American division as the 2-5 favorite under rider Larry Byers. When the gates flew open, the Special Effort gelding broke in the air and found himself a good three lengths off the pace.

Byers got the favorite back in line for an astounding drive that found him a head in front at the wire with a respectable time of 22.21 seconds running into a moderate headwind. Terrell Davidson trains Make An Effort for Jackie Spencer of Alto.

Jockey Jerry Nicodemus and trainer J. Rodney Reed took Bunny Rockette to the fastest clocking among Thursday's 12 divisions. The daughter of Sail On Bunny drew off

to a daylight margin in the third race to stop the timer in 21.81 seconds. Bunny Rockette is the property of Mark and Wilford Miller of Bartlesville, Oklahoma.

The filly was one of two contenders Nicodemus booted into the winner's circle. He was back getting his picture taken in the next race after Kindergarten Futurity finalist Will Be Easy went wire-to-wire for a 1 1/2-length win. Charles Cascio saddled the winner for Kenneth Keeping of Huntsville, Texas.

Reinsman Roy Brooks had a big day, winning three of Thursday's All American elimination trials by no more than a head. He was up for Go Little Firebug's neck verdict in the second race; fired back in the fifth to win by a head with Irish Moon Lass; and then prevailed with Bug Commander in the 10th with another head margin.

Steve Fuller accounted for two wins with Absolutely Dynamic and Princess Truckle. Absolutely Dynamic is conditioned by R.W. Werner, who also won Thursday's opener with Luke Myles upsetting 2-5 favorite Solid Policy aboard Running Masked.

## Favorite Some Power Play dominates action Wednesday

Some Power Play, runner-up in the \$686,000 Rainbow Futurity, justified a last-minute \$50,000 investment by posting the fastest time of the day in first-round eliminations for the \$2.53 million All American Futurity run Wednesday at Ruidoso Downs.

Wednesday's card featured the first in three days of eliminations for the world's richest quarter horse race. More than 300 juveniles were scheduled to face off in 36 trial divisions Wednesday through Friday, with the top three finishers in each heat advancing to time trials slated Aug. 20.

Some Power Play was one of seven horses whose owners paid \$50,000 to allow them to take a shot at the million-dollar purse awarded the winner of the All American Futurity on Labor Day. Three of the remaining supplements - Ronas Ryon, Jet Go Chick, and Marthas Six Moons - also went to the winner's circle in Wednesday's trials.

Some Power Play raced as the 6-5 favorite in Wednesday's 11th All American division. Breaking alertly under rider Jacky Martin, the Easy Jet colt rocketed to an early lead and never looked back in taking a 1 1/2-length win. The final time was the fastest of the day at 21.59 seconds for the 440-yard course.

Some Power Play is owned by a Norman, Oklahoma-based partnership of Melvin Hatley, renowned thoroughbred trainer D. Wayne Lucas and Eugene Klein, former owner of the San Diego Chargers. Jack Brooks conditions the stakes-placed runner.





# Business

## Brunell has watched Ruidoso grow

The Brunell family has been in the retail business for some 51 years. Herbert Brunell Jr. has seen his store evolve from a small dry goods store to one of the biggest men's and women's clothing stores in Ruidoso.

Herb Brunell Sr. came to Ruidoso from Alamogordo in 1946 and built Brunell's Dry Goods store at Brunell's present location, 2316 Sudderth Drive. Additions to the store were made in both 1963 and 1972 when a shoe store was added.

Brunell Jr. majored in electrical engineering at the University of New Mexico in Albuquerque where he graduated in 1955. He worked as a field service representative and traveled the country for Hughes Aircraft Company. He was based at Holloman Air Force Base.

"After five years with Hughes, I decided I'd rather work for my dad," Brunell said.

He managed his father's store in Alamogordo until 1964, when he moved to Ruidoso. Brunell Sr. returned to Alamogordo where he

died in 1968. The Alamogordo store was sold four years later.

Brunell Jr. recalls the 1963 addition of the largest room of the store.

"We designed the building ourselves and were looking for someone who could build it. They were all telling us we had to have posts to support the roof. We did meet some people in El Paso who helped us build the 50-foot free span room without posts. That made it one of the bigger buildings in Ruidoso at the time," Brunell said.

Brunell's remained somewhat of a dry goods store, carrying everything from men's, women's and children's clothing to sewing accessories, until 1972. That year, Brunell's began specializing in men's and women's apparel.

The business industry in Ruidoso seems to have "paralleled with its growth," Brunell said.

"We opened our store in 1946, the year Ruidoso became an organized municipality. It has been steady growth ever since," he said.

Brunell has seen some changes in area business practices.

"Recently, in the past eight to 10 years or so, businesses in Ruidoso

don't seem to close in the winter like they used to. Most businesses stay open year-round now.

"We have seen an increase in winter business since the ski area opened. We used to sell ski wear, but Ruidoso has so many specialty ski shops, we stopped," he said.

Brunell thinks there are some misconceptions about the image of Ruidoso.

"So many people think Ruidoso is a winter resort, when actually, our busiest season is during the summer," he said.

When asked if this year has been one of the worst years business-wise, Brunell hesitated to use the word "worst."

"From 1974 to 1977, we were doing the same annual gross volume I expect to do this year, and it was good. Then we had a peak period of business in Ruidoso. We are down now from that peak, but that doesn't mean it's one of our worst years," he explained.

Brunell's is seeing its third generation of customers.

"We have some wonderful customers who have traded with us since the day we opened. Just wonderful," Brunell said.

When he is not working, Brunell enjoys his "therapeutic" hobby, photography.

Brunell and his wife, Anne, bought a 35mm camera.

"Anne always liked being out of doors," said Brunell, adding they both enjoyed taking pictures.

One Christmas, Anne gave Brunell a kit which enabled him to develop contact prints.

"When I saw the magic transformation, the print actually appearing, I was very excited. I received the kit on December 25; by December 30, I had bought an enlarger and set up a darkroom," he said.

In the future, Brunell hopes to spend a little more time with his photography, and a little less time at work.

"Photography is something I have always enjoyed," he said.



## McSween Dig: The past uncovered

As the McSween Dig in Lincoln enters its final week there is still an "air" of expectation on the site. Each day of the last three weeks has been filled with discoveries, surprises and, always, speculation. The Human Systems Research (HSR) archaeological team, from the first day, has kept the "dig" friendly and informative. A living history lesson.

Hundreds of tourists and locals have visited the site, some have sat for hours on the bench in front or on the grassy slope, watching the professional work of the HSR team, asking questions and sharing answers with each other.

A chronology of the McSween property, researched by Nora Henn, has given the following information:

—March 1875—Alexander and Susan McSween (Mac and Sue) arrive in Lincoln.

—Sometime, 1876—John D. Bail filed patent on land that had old Murphy and Company La Placita Store and sold land to Murphy.

—January, 1877—McSween purchased this property for a homestead and site for future Tunstall Store.

—Sometime, 1877—Structure (La Placita Store?) converted into a house for two families.

—August, 1877—Construction completed and house occupied by McSweens and Shield families (Susan's sister, Elizabeth, husband, David, and five children).

—December, 1877—Shields buy half of house and property.

—February 18, 1878—John Henry Tunstall killed by members of sheriff's posse.

—February 21, 1878—Tunstall buried near the stables behind his store.

—July 14, 1878—five day siege at

the McSween house begins. Adobe bricks placed in windows and rifle holes made in adobe walls.

—July 19, 1878—(early in the day) Colonel N.A.M. Dudley arrives in Lincoln from Fort Stanton. In spite of a directive from the War Department stating that "he could not become involved in the civil affair," the Colonel's men intimidated McSween men in the Montana Store with a howitzer—and they fled to the hills north of town. There they were joined by the McSween partisans from the Ellis Store, McSween lost nearly two-thirds of his force by this blow.

—July 19 1 p.m.—Deputy Long and Octaviano Salas attempt to set fire to Shield kitchen on the northeast wing.

—July 19 2 p.m.—Fire set in summer kitchen on McSween side of the house (northwest) and burned down west wing, across parlor and up the east wing to the Shield kitchen.

—July 19 dusk—McSween house defenders break out from the Shield kitchen, heading for shelter in the adjacent Rio Bonito valley. McSween and three others killed between kitchen and outside north wall. Billy the Kid and others escape through the east gate (during an inquiry hearing Salazar stated, "George Bowers was killed early in the battle and placed in the cellar and Thomas Cullins was badly wounded, not being able to make a break for it he perished in the burning house").

—September 1879—Shields sold property with McSween house ruins to Ira E. Leonard. Wall fragments reported present.

—April 1885—Leonard sold property to J.J. Dolan for \$100.

—September 1888—Dolan sold property to M.L. Gorton.

—October 1888—Gorton given

butchers bond, approved by county officials.

—March 1892—Gorton sold property to William Rosenthal and Company, no reference to improvements to property.

—1894—Rosenthal and Company sold lot to Mrs. John C. West, mention made of a shingle roof house known as old Gorton Butcher Shop.

—1895—West's house rented to attorneys Jewett and Matthews for offices.

—1903—Occupied by H.B. Hamilton (attorney) and wife.

—1908—West died and husband sold house and property to Henry Lutz.

—1909—Lutz sold property and house to Teofilo Sisneros and Isidro Fresquez.

—1912—Sisneros sold his share to Fresquez.

—1930s—Fresquez lived in house.

—1961—Fresquez sold house and property to Frank C. Boyce who deeded the property to the State of New Mexico, now part of the New Mexico State Monuments property.

Members of the HSR team have memorized this chronology to aid them in their cataloging of artifacts, to determine the best sites for the test pits and trenches and to formulate "a very interesting tour" of the site.

Everything done at the site has been mapped, recorded and photographed, all with scientific exactness.

Project Director David Kirkpatrick, after studying all information about the property, discovered there is no evidence of how rooms were arranged inside the house.

"We know the McSween house had a summer kitchen in the rear and the Shield's side (of the house) had the regular kitchen in the back," Kirkpatrick explained, "but in the sheriff's inventory (taken

because of a lawsuit against McSween) he mentions an east bedroom in the McSween house. According to our information about the house, there couldn't have been an east bedroom unless the parlor was divided."

Theories abound as the mystery continues. Pete Eidenbach, consulting archaeologist, believes the closet was actually the entrance to the McSween house from the outside, making the closet a mud room or foyer. And, perhaps, the U shape of the finished house was a shape of the finished house, with an L shape attached to an existing building.

In the final week the pits moved closer to the Watson house, with increasing evidence the McSween house was further to the west than expected.

The dig has been rich in artifacts, dating from the mid 1800s to the present, a living history lesson and a mystery yet unsolved. Some of the artifacts are on display in the Fresquez house: two rosaries, two Teddy Roosevelt buttons (celebrating New Mexico-Arizona joint statehood), a 50-70 cartridge, toys, cavalry buttons and a bridle rosette and numerous other interesting pieces. The artifacts and the east room, where the adobe McSween wall is, will be open after the dig ends for this year.

The dig was originally planned for eight weeks, but, a week before it started, funds were pulled out of it, shortening the total time to four weeks. The HSR team decided to take pay cuts and cut back some expenses to do the McSween dig because they felt, "it was so important for the historical information hidden there to be found and shared."

Today (Monday) the test pits and trenches will be closed, covered until additional funds can be found to continue work on the mystery of the McSween house.

## Capitan Corner

One of my assignments as a reporter for The News is to cover and report on all County Commissioners meetings.

At the recent court hearing, District Attorney vs. County Commissioners, most of the testimony given were facts I had reported occurring in regular commissioner meetings.

One question that kept recurring in my mind during the proceedings was, why would the DA bring suit over this action by commissioners?

No answer was forthcoming during the proceedings, although Assistant District Attorney Harry Wilcox, Jr., alluded to expenses of moving the office, he did not enter the expenses of an office move into court record.

I was present at the June 6 meeting when Wilcox requested additional space for the DA's office and reported on it and the subsequent June 17 meeting when ASCS vacated their offices.

Wilcox was told at the June 6 meeting, with assessor Marian Schlarb present, that additional office space in the assessor's office was not possible because the assessor was using and needed all available space. Commissioners promised Wilcox they would do whatever they could do to see that the DA got additional space with the privacy requested, as soon as they could.

I went with commissioners to the vacated ASCS offices for an on-site review and was present as they discussed the office as a possi-

ble solution for the DA's need for the requested additional space and privacy.

In my rounds as reporter, I have never had the need to meet with or attend to any business with the DA's office, so, perhaps, my opinion of the just past proceedings is prejudiced toward the commissioners. But, it certainly seemed to me that the commissioners were duly concerned about achieving the requested space for the DA's office, with everyone's best interests in mind.

The court proceedings disturbed me on two levels: one was the expense to county taxpayers. Present at the hearing were one judge, two county attorneys, one assistant district attorney, three county commissioners, county manager, county clerk, county assessor and three hours of court time. And two—what is going on between Lincoln County and the DA's office? Where is the communication, so important, between county agencies and the DA?

After the hearing I asked attorney Steve Sanders if the commissioners had been approached by the DA before suit was brought against them. He told me, "no effort was made to communicate with commissioners. every year. He said some are questioning why Ruidoso is expected to contribute \$2.6 million, and don't know that all five entities make regular contributions.

Cox said each member—Ruidoso, Ruidoso Downs, Capitan, Lincoln County and the Mescalero Apache Tribe—pays \$500 a year into the SBAC regular fund. She said Ruidoso Downs has paid \$300 ahead of schedule, Mescalero is two payments (\$1,000) behind and the other three members are up to date on the obligation.

Buchanan said some people apparently don't understand why the Village of Ruidoso is obligated for the \$2.6 million value of the Ruidoso Municipal Airport because the current airport was funded by the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA). He said the \$2.6 million will go directly into the replacement airport.

"The FAA considers itself as being partners with the city in the acquisition and development of the airport," said Cook. "As partners they take the equity from the old facility and place it in the new airport," he added.

Commissioner Tim Morris reported on plans for a logo contest announced last month. He asked the commission to increase the pro-

posed prize money from \$250 to \$500, and members agreed to ask their respective governing bodies to allocate \$100 for that purpose.

Although the contest was announced for area artists to have the opportunity to design a logo for the regional airport signs, the SBAC decided Thursday to allow any individual to enter the competition.

Cook, whose company graphics artists already have designed symbols for the airport, was told the artists may submit their designs, but the prize will go to an individual, not a company.

Heckman later asked the commission to authorize an order for 1,000 sheets of letterhead bearing the Leadshill-Herkenhoff artist's design. He said he has been using SBAC stationery ordered years ago, and has run out. He said the 1,000 sheets would fill in until the logo contest is complete.

After learning the 1,000 sheets and matching envelopes would cost \$1,500, commissioners instructed Heckman to make copies of the old letterhead until a new logo is adopted.

Water rights acquisition and litigation was discussed during an executive session, said Nosker.

The next regular meeting of the SBAC is at 1:30 p.m. Thursday, August 21, in the Lincoln County Sub-office behind the Ruidoso Village Hall.

# Cree share offering ends tonight

At least 50 people attended a meeting at Cree Meadows Country Club Friday to learn more about the "true" condition of the club.

Cree Meadows Country Club Men's Golf Association President Bob Chrisman, Vice-President Leroy Gooch, Secretary-Treasurer Joe LeCrone and lawyer-stockholder Sim Christy answered questions from the crowd and also explained a prospectus that has been issued offering shares in the club.

The prospectus was put out July 11 by the company that owns Cree Meadows. The prospectus was required by law "to show the worst possible condition of the club, out of fairness to the buyers," according to membership officials.

A total of 500 shares of stock are being offered for \$4,000 each to put the club in the hands of the membership.

The club is currently owned by Johnny Durham, Sam Dazzo Sr., Ralph Petty and Ben Lanford Sr.

All offerings of stock must be returned, accepted or rejected by midnight today (Monday), August 11. This applies only to current members of the club.

Most of the people at the meeting appeared to be in support of buying or keeping shares in the club.

It is estimated that at least 200 people still belong to the club. At one time, the club had around 350 stockholders.

Christy said he was speaking as a stockholder, not as a lawyer.

"In my personal opinion, the club needs about 300 stockholders to stay afloat," he said. "If we had 500, we'd probably be debt-free."

People who do not belong to the club and want to should buy stock before the club's next meeting Monday, August 17.

At that meeting, the club will try to elect a board and buy off the owners.

# Bingo attracts players from all over

Only about 10 to 15 percent of the clientele at "Mescalero Bingo" are guests at the Inn of the Mountain Gods, according to Mescalero Apache Tribe (MAT) manager Jack Valliant.

Valliant said bingo is drawing an average of about 250 people per night.

"We have tapered off some since the first night so there are plenty of good seats," Valliant said.

"We've done some informal checking and we're pretty sure the majority of our bingo players are from the area, and don't stay at the Inn (Inn of the Mountain Gods)," Valliant said.

"We are getting a lot of people from El Paso, (Texas), Alamogor-

do, Roswell, Lubbock, (Texas), and Odessa, (Texas)," Valliant said.

"They may come in just for the night, or they spend another night in another motel," Valliant said.

"We feel we are helping the area a lot because we think people are coming to play bingo and eating and staying and shopping at different places," Valliant said.

Valliant said the bingo operation was running smoothly.

"We were able to break in the operation and people seem real pleased and tell us we are doing an excellent job," Valliant said.

"Plus, we have had lots of winners. We have had a \$9,000 bingo winner, a \$1,500 bingo winner, and lots of 'pull-tab' winners (instant prize cards), one person won \$1,000 on the 'pull tab' cards," Valliant said.

Valliant said the tribe is still discussing building a special bingo center at the Inn of the Mountain Gods, but said the bingo operation was too new to be evaluated on a long-term basis.

"We know we are generating income for the area with our bingo operation, and people know some night if things go just right, they have the chance to win \$60,000," Valliant said.

The group expressed concern that it has been "sidetracked" due to recent activity involving the funding for the purchase of the land and the construction of the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport.



# Officials refute charges at Fort Stanton Hospital

Governor Toney Anaya and state Health and Environment Secretary Jerry Manzavol say U.S. Justice Department charges alleging civil rights violations at Fort Stanton Hospital and Training Center are ungrounded, according to a published report.

Charges filed in U.S. District Court in Albuquerque name the state, Anaya and other state officials with violating the rights of 140 mentally retarded residents at the center by misusing restraints and providing inadequate care.

Anaya told the Albuquerque Journal that a December 24, 1985, letter from the Justice Department prompted a number of changes at the

state facility. He was quoted as saying the Justice Department wants the state to enter into a consent decree.

The governor said none of the clients' civil rights were violated so the state declined to enter into such a decree, continued the report.

Lawmakers have been critical of other consent decrees, especially the Duran prison reform case and the Human Services Department child abuse protection programs. A bill was introduced and failed in the state Legislature that would have prohibited state agencies from entering into consent decrees without legislative approval.

## Inside the Capitol

**SANTA FE**—The numbers, not the words, tell the story.

While the candidates for governor are out making nice-nice to potential voters, technicians here labor over the books. What their arithmetic discloses tells us more about the direction our state will be taking than any number of partisan campaign speeches. It's easy to boast and talk big about what a candidate plans to do when elected to office, but it's the presence or absence of dollars that decides what can really be accomplished.

And as you know if you've been paying attention, the numbers currently available don't auger well for the state of New Mexico.

That idea is finally working its way into the thought pattern of certain legislative leaders, after what even the most charitable of observers must note has been a remarkable reluctance on their part to allow it entry. After months of mincing around about 2 or 5 percent cuts in the size of state government, the Legislative Finance Committee, most prestigious of such gatherings of lawmakers, is now starting to study cuts in the more realistic double-digit range.

This committee, which is made up of both Senators and House members, including the chairmen of the groups that deal with all money matters during formal legislative sessions, has as its major assignment to prepare a proposed budget for all of state government during the coming fiscal year. Its practice, at least in recent years, has been to budget expenditures of no more than can reasonably be expected in revenues; that way it avoids proposing tax increases, since planned spending would be no more than we expect to take in under the existing tax structure.

It is already apparent to the LFC, whose final budget won't be completed till the end of the year or later, that to follow that rule now will require that they recommend cuts on the order of 15 percent from the spending authorized this year.

Say that over again to yourself: 15 percent. If you heard the cursing and moaning that cuts of one-third that scope or less brought from agency heads and others involved in state government during the early part of 1986, you can imagine already what we are in for by the

time the next Legislature is assembled.

And there's a further problem connected with that figure. If only minor cuts of 2 to 5 percent are going to be made in the cost of government, it is sometimes relatively easy to do that by ordering them across the board. That way every agency suffers equally. But when you start getting up into the area of 10 percent or more, that system is no longer applicable. Now it is necessary to target very specific programs for cutting.

Legislators and governors don't traditionally like to take on that job of making concrete recommendations for such cuts, but doing it is their responsibility. In fact, as this column has previously pointed out, hearing where the two candidates now running for the governor's office plan such surgery, at least in a general way, is essential to any well-informed choice between them on election day.

They will avoid like poison those of us who insist they take a stand on such matters. When they are asked, the doubletalk and "on-the-one-hand-and-on-the-other" will flow like May wine, but the fact is that we have a right to hear at least an outline of their ideas on how such cutting should be accomplished.

As Governor Toney Anaya is now going around saying, at least they have the privilege of knowing what they are in for before the election, as he did not.

If you want a feel for the extent of the slicing that has to be done to keep spending in line with expected income, here are the figures for recent years. In 1984-85, appropriations were \$1.36 billion. In 1985-86, they rose to \$1.41 billion. In 1986-87, they were originally scheduled to rise to \$1.49 billion, but the June special session of the Legislature pared them back to \$1.47 billion.

To cut 15 percent from that latter figure means to reduce spending by \$220,500,000, which is not a paltry sum. It can't be achieved by slicing away a dollar here and a dollar there. To reach that goal means cutting government back to total costs of around \$1.24 billion, or around 9 percent less than we spent in '84-85, and doing it at today's prices.

Anybody who wants to attempt that job should have his head examined.

home birth is a special event as other siblings are able to witness the birth of their little sister or brother. The trained midwives monitor the birth, both the mother and child, and are trained to respond to any potential problem.

I advocate home birth for any healthy woman wanting an alternative. Midwives monitor prenatal development. By New Mexico law the midwives must work with a physician by having the mother checked twice during pregnancy to screen any potential problems.

Dr. Harrison and former associate Dr. Fields were very helpful with my visits. I also would like to thank Winona Stoffles, then with the Lincoln County Health Department; for her wonderful help.

I feel the midwives provide an invaluable service to the community by offering an alternative to hospital birth. They also help relieve some of the overload on the obstetrics field.

New Mexico legislators revised midwifery laws in 1981, allowing midwives to legally practice delivering babies. They are strictly trained and are a legitimate part of the health care field.




