## Board will keep Sunland

Following meetings of both the board of directors and the stockholders of Ruidoso-Sunland Inc. over the weekend, yesterday (Sunday) the firm announced its decision to continue operation of Sunland Park race track for the upcoming 1986-1987 season.

Sunday, The El Paso Times reported negotiations between El Pasoans Roy Salome and Jeff Keckley, and Ruidoso-Sunland, Inc., had broken off on Friday.

Track officials who were attending the Super Select Sale Saturday, said Ruidoso-Sunland, Inc. wanted to sell the Sunland Park track, but on their terms.

The officials, who asked not to be identified, would not elaborate on what conditions needed to be met for Sunland Park to be sold.

"We discussed the financial implications and marketing strategies surrounding Sunland Park at length," said Rick Henson, general manager of Ruidoso-Sunland, Inc., in a press release from the track.

"The board determined that in the absence of no valid purchase offers it is in the best interests of not only the corporation, but also the horsemen and fans to continue management of Sunland Park," Henson said.

The New Mexico State Racing Commission recently approved an 89-day meet for the track running October 11 through May 3, 1987.


Henson said improvements to the 27-year-old plant and changes in types of wagering and pricing structures at Sunland Park are under serious consideration for the upcoming season.

"We're taking a good look at the twin-trifecta wager, which has just been introduced recently to the sport and appear to be popular with the fans," Henson said.

Henson said the twin-trifecta type of wager could replace the "Pie-Six" at Sunland Park this season.

"Sunland Park has been impacted by the economics of the border and the West Texas oil slump," Henson said. "We realize that we're going to have to double our efforts to market the sport of racing by increased awareness through our advertising."

## Heavenly wins \$295,000 Gold Cup



Rider Jacky Martin pilots the speedy mare Heavenly to a half-length score over Sir Alibi in the \$295,000 All American Gold Cup Sunday at Ruidoso Downs. The Jack Brooks-trained stepped off the popular vic-

tory on the mountain tracks, 440 yard course in 21.38 seconds, a hundredth off the stakes record time of Danby Dream last year.

Heavenly boosted her lifetime earnings over the million-dollar mark and took the pole position for champion mare honors this year with a decisive victory in Sunday's renewal of the All American Gold Cup at Ruidoso Downs.

The fifth running of the Gold Cup featured some of the nation's best 4-year-old quarter horses racing for the winner's share of \$295,000 in prize money. Heavenly lined up for the quarter-mile dash only once beaten in five appearances this year. The daughter of Pie In The Sky won both the Gotogether Handicap and the Rainbow Silver Cup earlier this season at Ruidoso.

Heavenly loaded into the far outside post as the overwhelming 3-5 favorite to win the Gold Cup with rider Jacky Martin at the helm. Sir Alibi, winner of the World's Championship Quarter Horse Classic, stood four doors down in the five hole under Jerry Nicodemus. Flow Of Cash, who defeated Heavenly in the Kansas Derby last year over the same course, was in the No. 4 post with Alex Baldillez aboard.

When the gates flew open, Heavenly broke alertly and veered sharply toward the outside, but gathered herself quickly to take an early lead on the field. Sir Alibi held a half length margin over Flow Of

Cash as the two horses raced side-by-side down the lane.

"I thought I was in trouble the first two or three jumps," Martin recalled after the race. "She didn't get away like she can. About a hundred yards up there she opened up. We got about a length-and-a-half on them and I felt pretty confident."

Nicodemus and Sir Alibi began to gain on Heavenly through the final hundred yards of the dash, but couldn't catch the speedy miss.

Trainer Jack Brooks said he knew Heavenly had it won when she took the early lead.

"She can't run anybody down," the Oklahoma horseman explained.

"She's got to be close to the lead or on the lead. When she got away as good as she did and started hot-footin' it on the lead, I knew they wouldn't catch her today."

Flow Of Cash could mount no challenge under Baldillez, and finished a widening 1 1/2-lengths behind Sir Alibi for third. Big John Mito checked a neck back of Flow Of Cash for fourth.

It was more than just another stakes win for Heavenly's owner - Roy Browning of Fort Worth, Texas. Steve Harris, her regular rider for two years, was seriously injured in an accident earlier this year at Bluebonnet. Heavenly, page 10A

## McKnights hope for speedy solution of murders

Joe McKnight, father of slain rancher Thomas P. "Cotton" McKnight, predicts an arrest in the two-year-old murder case within the next few months. The elder McKnight is confident the New Mexico State Police (NMSP) will break the case.

"Let's put it this way," added Joe McKnight's wife, Mary. "We're hopeful."

Last Thursday Joe and Mary McKnight, in the dining room of their peaceful Roswell home, talked of the November 1984 murders of Cotton and Judy McKnight.

The two detailed their frustrations and disagreements with the way the Lincoln County Sheriff's Office has handled the murder investigation. Joe McKnight said he and a NMSP officer are the sheriff's prime suspects.

Sheriff Tom Sullivan, in an alternative writ of habeas corpus filed recently in Judge Sandra Grisham's court, named a NMSP officer as a suspect in the murders.

"It's bad enough to lose a son, have to clear the estate, and then have Joe be accused of the murders," said Mary McKnight, the elder McKnight's wife of three years. She said she and her husband have been harassed since the bodies of the young McKnight couple were discovered shot to death in the kitchen floor of their Picacho ranch home.

"I've been a suspect from the first," said McKnight. "I've never been able to understand why they think I had anything to do with it," pondered McKnight.

NMSP officer Phil Baiers is married to Vikki Baiers, the former wife of Cotton McKnight, and the mother of the elder McKnight's grandson, Judson, explained Joe McKnight.

"The relationship (between the Baiers and McKnights) has been

beautiful," said Mary McKnight, as Joe displayed a birthday card to "Dad" signed by "Phil Vikki and Judson."

It was Vikki Baiers who told Joe and Mary McKnight of the grisly discovery at the ranch house that long ago November afternoon, they recalled. Upon learning of the murders, McKnight said he asked Baiers to accompany him to the scene that day.

Although McKnight, Baiers, another state policeman and young Judson McKnight headed for the ranch house, Joe McKnight said they never actually got there that day. After meeting the ambulance heading away from the site with the bodies of his son and daughter-in-law, McKnight said he and his group turned back.

Baiers and McKnight returned the next day, but were asked not to enter the house, said McKnight.

Half of Lincoln County was in and out of the house," noted McKnight, who remembered sitting outside eating posole and talking with Lincoln County Undersheriff Charlie Cox that afternoon. The next day though, McKnight refused to be kept out of the house when he returned to the ranch to check on a place, see McKnights, page 10A

## Bourbon is better than Candy

Jockey Joe Martinez and Bourbon And Blues (No. 7) catch Candy Store at the wire to win the \$16,650 Ruidoso Sprint Championship Handicap on August 16 at Ruidoso Downs. It was the first stakes win of the summer meeting for trainer L.Z. Roberts. The final time of the 3 furlong sprint was 1:10 seconds—only three ticks off the track record. Bourbon And Blues is owned by Gerald Roberts of Lamesa, Texas. The winner's purse was \$9,990. Candy Store finished second under Pedro Benitez. Flemish Slipper was third with Glenn Lowry aboard.

## Bourbon And Blues sobers the field in Saturday's co-feature sprint

Bourbon And Blues made a late charge down the lane to capture Saturday's Sprint Championship Handicap at Ruidoso Downs, while Short Shrift posted a mild upset in the co-featured Gene Hensley Cap. Trainer L.Z. Roberts saddled his first stakes winner of the summer meeting on Saturday when leading rider Joe Martinez steered Bourbon And Blues to victory in the \$16,650 Ruidoso Sprint Championship Handicap.

Sharing the role of second favorite with two other contenders in the seven-horse field, Martinez held Bourbon And Blues within striking distance throughout the 6-furlong sprint as Candy Store cut all the early fractions under rider Pedro Benitez.

"Mr. Roberts wanted me to send him to the lead," Martinez commented after the race, "but old Candy Store has a lot of speed. So I laid a half-length off of him and waited until we headed for home."

Martinez sent Bourbon And Blues in the final furlong, catching Candy Store near the wire to pull ahead for a half-length win. The final time was 1:10 seconds—three ticks off the track record. Owner Gerald Roberts of Lamesa, Texas, took home \$9,990 for the winning effort.

Candy Store, who is owned by Edwin Mayer Jr. of San Angelo, Texas, and El Pasoan Robert Haynsworth, collected \$3,663 for third. Fred Danley conditions the Against The Snow gelding.

Flemish Slipper, the 8-5 favorite ridden by Glenn Lowry, ran an even third throughout, earning \$1,165 for trainer James Hambrick Jr. and his wife Helen of Canutillo, Texas.

Financial Aid dueted with three other contenders around the turn to the top of the stretch.

Short Shrift made his bid from the middle of the track as the field lined up for the final drive. He caught Financial Aid near the wire and went on to win in 45.52 seconds.

The \$8,550 winner's purse went to Mack Yates and Leach, who own the horse in partnership. Financial Aid, trained by G.R. Howell, earned \$3,135 for James Pirtle of Longview, Texas.

Valid Request, who raced forwardly throughout the sprint under Casey Lambert, was a length behind Financial Aid for third. Owner Walter Smith Jr. of Skidmore, Texas, earned \$1,425.







# McSween House didn't burn, she says

Clutching what she said was a picture of the McSween House taken between 1890 and 1900, an 85-year-old former Lincoln resident said the McSween House was never set on fire.

Ruidoso resident Frances Lueras Salas claims she lived with her relatives in the McSween home from about 1909 until about 1918.

Salas said the battle between two rival factions in the Lincoln County War (the McSween band and the Murphy gang), actually took place in the original Torreon in Lincoln.

Salas came to The News last Friday saying she was confused by the recent excavation of the McSween House.

She said she couldn't believe historians thought the kitchen and west wing of the house had been set on fire. She produced a photograph which she said was the same house she grew up in—the McSween House.

When Salas was five her mother died, and she and her father moved in with her aunt, uncle and grandmother in the McSween House, she said.

Her grandmother was Vivian Lopez, her aunt was Avelina Lopez Garcia and her uncle was Manuelito Garcia.

Her father, Arseato Lueras, died in about 1947 at the age of 106, according to Salas.

Though most of his life he was a nomadic New Mexico shepherd,

Salas said her father was once known as an Indian fighter.

In the early 1900s her father was one of the men who helped the U.S. Army and the Mescalero Indian tribe execute an agreement that guaranteed the Mescaleros would be fed if they stayed on their reservation, Salas said.

Salas said both her father and her aunt said the famous Lincoln County War battle had taken place in the Lincoln Torreon.

She said Billy the Kid probably escaped at night from the Torreon.

Salas said while she was growing up few people discussed Billy the Kid and the battle for fear of offending Susan McSween.

Salas said even after McSween remarried and moved to White Oaks, she took care of the people in Lincoln.

McSween and Salas' aunt were friends, and McSween often brought honey from her White Oaks ranch to the family that dwelled in her old house, Salas said.

Salas said McSween was "very nice" and well respected in Lincoln County. McSween died in 1934.

McSween did not charge rent to Salas' family because her grandmother and aunt had promised McSween they would keep the house in good condition, Salas said.

Salas said the McSween house had six large rooms but "very narrow" halls.

Salas said the land behind the McSween House was free of vegetation, but was bordered by a large gully or ditch.

According to Salas, to the left of her family's house (what she says was the McSween House) was another adobe home, the Penfield Store, the Fresquez House and the old Torreon.

Her 80-year-old husband, D.R. Salas, was one of the men who helped restore the Torreon in 1948, according to Salas.

Salas and her husband moved to Ruidoso in the late 1940s, according to the former Lincoln resident.

Salas admitted part of the house could have been restored after the fire in 1878 but she said, "I don't think so."


Salas said she believes Human Systems Research, the company that recently began the excavation was digging in the right spot, but she wasn't sure.

Salas said she doesn't remember the story of the McSween House battle as it is related today by historians.

She said she thinks the experts are "mixed up" on where buildings in Lincoln once stood.

Salas said she had never gone to state officials with her story because she was afraid they would want her picture of the McSween House, and she treasures it as a family heirloom.

No officials associated with the McSween House excavation could be reached for comment on the weekend, but some Lincoln residents said they would like to see Salas' picture to see what building is actually shown in the photograph.



# Gaddy becomes Episcopalian priest

The Reverend Anna Lee Gaddy is now one of only a handful of women Episcopalian priests in New Mexico.

The Ruidoso Downs resident was ordained August 10 at the Church of The Holy Mount in Ruidoso by the Right Reverend Richard Mitchell Trelease Jr., the Episcopalian Bishop of the Rio Grande Diocese. "I'm still up on cloud nine from the ordination," Gaddy said.

"An ordination is one of the most moving services, it was very moving. It is difficult to put into words," Gaddy said.

The 61-year-old priest was raised as a Presbyterian in West Texas.

She said as a child she had a burning desire to become a mathematician, but her mother told her not to enter what was then considered a man's field.

She joined the Episcopalian Church in Big Spring, Texas, in 1945.

Gaddy moved to Ruidoso Downs in 1975.

Because her position is not salaried, she will continue to work

as a seamstress, she said.

Gaddy was encouraged by the Reverend Burdette Stampley, priest for the Church of the Holy Mount, to begin to study for the priesthood at a time when Episcopalianism were beginning to allow women into the priesthood.

In 1982 she began to study Scripture with Stampley.

She studied with Stampley for about two years and then attended an Episcopalian seminary in Las Cruces for about one year.

After being ordained as a deacon of the church earlier this year, she spent six months in preparation for her duties as a priest under Stampley's guidance.

Though her quest for the priesthood was difficult and often emotionally draining, Gaddy said she always wanted to go as far as she could in the Episcopalian holy order.

Gaddy, who has the complete authority of an Episcopalian priest, will serve congregations at Saint Mathias in Carrizozo, St. Anne's in Glencoe, the Lincoln congregation, and one Sunday of every month, the Church of the Holy Mount in Ruidoso.

### Fletcher Dean Hornbaker


Fletcher Dean Hornbaker, 71, of Truth or Consequences, passed away Thursday at Presbyterian Hospital in Albuquerque.

Injury-wise the Warriors have been fairly healthy.


Defensive end-tight end David


Men's doubles action saw Bill Howell and Von Ray McClure beat Burton and Hugh Tucker, 6-3, 6-1, in 40-doubles play.







## Trustees talk bonds, Master Plan

Capitan Village Trustees approved bond money investments and accepted an engineer to begin Capitan's Master Plan at their regular meeting Monday.

Trustee David Rouleau stated the main concern of the finance committee was to be certain all investments were 100 percent insured, with varied maturity times, so money would always be available as the water project progressed.

Trustees approved the financial committee's recommendation for \$29,000 to be put in an on-demand checking account; \$75,000 in 30 day CDs with First National Bank (interest at 5.62 percent); \$100,000 in 60 day CDs with Bank of Ruidoso (interest at 5.86 percent); \$100,000 in 90 day CDs with Pioneer Savings (interest at 5.91 percent); \$200,000 in one year CDs with two United New Mexico Banks (interest at 6.18 percent) and \$100,000 in one year CDs with Ruidoso State Bank (interest at 6.18 percent).

R.L. VanNorman, Leon Eggleston and Rouleau told trustees

this financial plan should cover the interest costs that will be due next July on the bond loan.

Seventeen engineering firms presented bids for work on the Village Master Plan.

Hubert Quintana, Southeastern New Mexico Economic Development District, explained their criteria for reviewing the bids and recommended that Dennis Engineering of Socorro be awarded the Master Plan.

Mayor Coker and Jack Pogue had reviewed all the proposals with Quintana. "Out of 17 proposals, 11 or 12 were right in line with each other," Coker said, "they were all good, interesting bids."

After acceptance of Dennis Engineering the application for the Community Development Block Grant goes to the state finance department for approval.

The Master Plan will approach three areas specifically, including utilities and storm drainage, land use and streets with an overall plan for the growing needs of the village in the next 10 years.

In other business trustees: —accepted a high bid of \$705 from Johnny McCarthy for the village

1980 Ford Fairlane. —approved a beer and wine license for B and L Pizza.

—appointed Coker as a voting delegate to the New Mexico Municipal Annual Conference in Clovis, with Virginia Spall as alternate.

—accepted low bid for appraisers from Bill Carrigan to appraise property.

—recommended Jack Atkins continue with water pipeline plan right of ways and easements for the new well to the village.

—decided to call a special public meeting to discuss legal recourse for unpaid water bills. The meeting will be at 7 p.m. Wednesday, August 20, at Village Hall. Proposed measures include serving notice on unpaid bills after 15 days, at 30 days water would be cut off with periodic meter checks, if water is going through meter the meter will be removed at a charge of \$50 to the user.

—Coker presented a proclamation to N.C. Grantham for 20 years service to the Rural Water Users Association, stating in 20 years Capitan had been well represented by Grantham.

## School board seeks field bond bids

Capitan Board of Education authorized publication of notice for bond bids to issue bonds voters approved in the February 5, 1985, election. The bonds will pay for the proposed Capitan School Athletic Field.

Alan Clemmons and Bill Davis, of Quinn and Company, Albuquerque, prepared the legal financial documents to begin publication to receive bond bids for \$225,000.

Approving the resolution, board members James McDaniel, Tom Trost and Isidro Peralta set September 25 as the day the bids will be opened and the issue of bonds will begin. Money from the sale of the bonds will become available in October.

During discussion of bids received from paying agents (agents to

handle issuance of bonds), Sunwest Bank of Albuquerque was chosen. They are the paying agent currently being used for the first \$225,000 bonds issued.

The first interest payment on bonds will become due in September 1987. Clemmons said the cash on hand (\$14,000) will cover the payment.

Capitan school is an excellent candidate for a 60-40 funding split with the State Highway Department. According to Jim French, the funds would be used for highway access, engineering and paving of the athletic field. The board approved of French continuing negotiations with the highway department.

—awarded a new activity bus contract at \$1.20 per mile to Frankie Silva, negotiable according to increase or decrease of fuel.

riding lawn mower. McKnight said he told Cox, "the hell I'm not—this is my house," walked in and poured himself a cup of coffee that third day. He said Cox invited him into the bedroom and asked what McKnight called "stupid" questions.

That was the last time McKnight remembers being questioned by Cox, and nearly the last time he was questioned by anybody from the Sheriff's Office.

The McKnights said a Sheriff's investigator has visited their home once, but didn't question them about details of Cotton's life that they felt were important in tracking down a killer. Joe McKnight said the investigator didn't ask him about his son's friends or ranch employees.

When asked if he suspects anyone, McKnight said it would be unfair to point a finger at anyone without definite proof.

"You can't accuse someone unless you know," said McKnight, who said that is just what the Sheriff's Office has done to him. He said he has been called several times by friends warning that the sheriff was planning to pick him up in Roswell and arrest him.

A former law enforcement officer, McKnight said the Sheriff's Office "went about things wrong."

He said fingerprints were lifted from a bottle picked up at the murder scene three days after the bodies were removed.

"They missed a hell of a lot of things," said McKnight. He said the NMSF found two bullet fragments the sheriff's investigators missed at the scene.

"The area should have been cordoned off," added Mary McKnight.

Both McKnights have opposed efforts by other relatives to have a grand jury called in the case. They said Thursday they object to having what the District Attorney calls "tainted evidence" presented.

"We knew who it was they wanted to bring before a grand jury," noted Mary McKnight, who said her husband was the sheriff's target.

"It hasn't bothered me because it's a damned lie," said McKnight vehemently. He is unconcerned about the upcoming Lincoln County grand jury.

McKnight said he has no plans to hire an attorney.

"On this I wouldn't give a lawyer a nickel," said McKnight. "I don't need a lawyer," he added.

McKnight said he had nothing to do with the murders of Cotton and Judy McKnight. He doesn't think the case will be considered by the grand jury.

"They've got to have something to present to the grand jury," said McKnight. "They won't have to bring this case up," he added.

Just back from a vacation in Alaska, the McKnights are anxious to have some peaceful times, in spite of the unsolved case.

But Joe McKnight said the Lincoln County Sheriff's investigator has tried repeatedly to get him to go to Carrizozo to be questioned. He said he would fear for his life if he got into a car with a member of the Sheriff's Department.

"Why would he want me up there?" he asked.

When the reporting on the case appears one-sided to McKnight, he said he writes letters to area papers to get his view of the situation before the public. As he displayed a folder containing a dozen or so letters, McKnight complained that some of his letters have not been published by The News.

He denied published accusations that his letter-writing campaign was politically motivated, but admitted working to get Cox defeated in his bid for county sheriff. He said he didn't want any member of the present administration to continue in office.

"If they'd stayed in there much longer we'd have to get permission to go to Heaven," quipped McKnight. He said he and his wife met Republican Sheriff candidate

Don Samuels and visited with him just once before contributing to his campaign.

McKnight said his brother-in-law is Samuels' campaign manager.

As the NMSP and the Sheriff's Office continue to investigate, McKnight said he has some unanswered questions on the case.

McKnight said Charlie Cox took him into Judy McKnight's bedroom and showed him a full bottle of vodka, apparently hidden, in a drawer. He said Cox told him the bottle was bought the last day Judy McKnight was seen alive, taken to the house and hidden.

"How did he know that?" wondered Joe McKnight.

He also wondered why the under-sheriff's scenario had the victims sitting at the table when they were shot when the blood was some distance from the table.

"One thing I've never been able to understand is how they (people who found the bodies) could have looked in the kitchen windows and not seen the bodies," said McKnight.

He said he has read that Judy McKnight's sister, Terri Bussey, knows who killed the two.

"She couldn't know unless ..." began McKnight before his wife put a stop to that sentence.

And so the two wait, keeping up with the case through newspaper and television reports, and hoping for an end to the whole thing.

# Data brochure lists villages' vital statistics

A Community Data profile has been completed by the 1985-86 Business Research and Promotion Council and is available to anyone seeking statistical information about the Ruidoso area.

The profile was completed this spring by the council, a division of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce Economic Development Division. It contains a variety of information from population figures and recreational listings to lodgers' tax and building permit statistics. It is designed to assist individuals or business entities that might be interested in relocating to the Ruidoso area.

The data brochure lists monthly climate temperatures and

precipitation figures with February being the coldest month, June the hottest, July the wettest and April the driest.

It also contains a list of 17 churches and 32 service clubs. According to the brochure, there are some 80 local lodgers with "more than 3,000 beds," and 46 eating establishments.

Utility companies, financial and medical institutions, and post offices are also listed in the brochure.

It slates area schools, budgets and telephone numbers, enrollment figures and numbers of teachers for the 1975, 1980 and 1985 school years.

A transportation section describes airplane, bus and automobile rental availability. It lists the Ruidoso Municipal Airport facilities and charter services, and commercial airline facilities with

access in Roswell, El Paso, Texas, Alamogordo and Albuquerque.

According to the brochure, the Ruidoso Downs Race Track's attendance increased from 299,551 in 1985 to 316,194 in 1985. The average daily attendance during the 70 racing days of 1985 was 4,517. The pari-mutuel handle in 1985 was \$10,514,300 compared with \$33,781,719 in 1985.

Ski Apache statistics are also included. During the 1984-85 ski season, the ski area was open for 105 days and received 140 inches of snow. A total of 31,847 lift tickets were sold. In 1985-86, the area was open for 126 days with 150 inches of snow. The brochure notes that all but 35 inches of that snow fell in February and March, "too late for a good ski year." Lift tickets totaled 157,300 in 1985-86.

Real estate sales in the area jumped from \$781,106 in 1985-86 to \$79,418,463 in 1984-85. These figures "reflect sales transactions through the Ruidoso Multiple Listing Service and do not include for sale by owner and unaffiliated offices," the brochure states.

Ruidoso lodgers' tax collections went from \$35,802 in 1974-75 to \$115,816 in 1984-85 according to the brochure.

A few of the activities listed under the recreation portion of the brochure include horse racing, skiing, golf, horseback riding, camping, fishing, hunting, theaters and children's activities.

A map and area attractions is also included.

The brochure is available at the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce.

Kim is taking the whole experience with a positive outlook.


"I'm very glad I came here," she said with a grin.

They conducted two public hearings to gauge the public's feeling on what should happen with Grindstone, and were greeted with a flood of support for continuation of the project and strong backing for financing the added cost through revenue bonds.

So the project again was under way. And the good news is that the contractor on the project, ASI, of Buena Vista, Colorado, has nearly completed the dam already, way ahead of schedule and below budget.

## Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE—Political campaigns ought to teach us more about the candidates than we know when they start. Usually, they don't accomplish that.

Most of the elements of the campaign process, in fact, are designed to make us see those who are running only when they are on their best behavior; they are cosmetic activities, in other words, meant to make the candidates appear better than they really are.

Take as an example those TV commercials which seem to play the largest part in helping many of our citizens decide whom to vote for. Those productions are rehearsed, and polished, and shot over and over again until we can say they almost have no connection with real life. The same is true of practically every other campaign function. Speeches, for instance, are given repeatedly, so that those speaking them know where all the solid laughs are, and what we hear often has as little spontaneity as a fully rehearsed stage production.

All that may be okay, but what we really need to know about these people who tell us they want to hold office is precisely how they function under real-life circumstances, and we see too little of that.

Before we can make a sensible choice between two candidates, we ought to have some feel for how they analyze and handle problems, how they manage people and money—in short, we need some sense of the texture of their own unique approach to life. Instead, what we get is what some expensive "consultants" are seeing that we get, in an effort to make their tiger seem superior to the other at any cost.

Yes, sometimes "at any cost" even includes the cost of truth.

Actually, if we could come to know them as they campaign, we would be well served by the knowledge. Ask anybody who has run for an important elected job, and you'll be told that the process of getting there is one of the least pleasant experiences of the candidate's life. That's when we really ought to see them—as they are behind the scenes, when they are harassed and harried, pulled to and fro, and worn to a frazzle by the rigors of campaigning. Anybody who holds up even moderately well under that

experience is a person of some quality, and may be just what we are looking for in an elected official.

Just to name one thing that can drive any candidate over the hill, he or she gets advice from "friends" in quantities and directions that can hardly be put up with. Take any individual point, and the candidate will be told repeatedly it must be done, and with equal force and repetition that it must not.

How does an aspirant for office decide which side to listen to—and not to let the other side down easy? Consider, as a single example, the statement made more than once in this space that it is incumbent on gubernatorial candidates Garrey Carruthers and Ray Powell to outline for us how they propose to solve the state's financial problems. Persons of great political perspicacity on either side have taken this writer aside to say that is an unfair demand. Neither man, they maintain, should offer such a program now; to do so before election, each of these individuals insists, would be premature.

Others equally close to the candidates have taken the opposite tack. They have said, in one form or another, something like this: "By golly, you're sure right on that position. I'm making every effort to convince—(fill in candidate's name) that he has to do exactly what you say he should, and he has to do it soon."

As on other policy matters during the days of a campaign, both sides of this issue will get forcibly expressed to the two men, and those giving the advice will be persons who deserve to be listened to and respected.

If there were a way we could get some feel for how the individuals react when faced with that kind of dilemma, we'd learn something we need to know.

We'll never find that out, however. All we will get to see is the two men when they are all polished and clean, with their ties on and a shine on their shoes. As in a courtship, the aim is to make somebody look better than he or she actually is, when those of us who are being wooed need to know the real man, warts and all, underneath the presentation.

### PROFESSIONAL TREE CARE and PEST CONTROL

Spruce Trees are turning at this time and you might have problems with moths or caterpillars. I am sure you know that spruce trees are very valuable in this area and should be checked regularly.

Aphids winter in your spruce trees. Normally they move to fir trees during the summer, but if the tips or new growth on your spruce are turning brown, which a lot are in this area, they need to be sprayed.

If your Pine trees are turning brown this early, it could mean some kind of beetle infestation. If you have Yellow Pines and the limbs are brown, you could have an IPP infestation. Pine or Pinon needle scale starts on your needles, turning tips brown, causing a lot of shedding. It seems this year needle scale is more prevalent than in previous years.

Pine or Pinon needle scale weakens trees, giving the beetle a chance to enter.


