Ronas Ryon wins All American

The Southern contingent prevailed at Ruidoso Downs on Labor Day as Ronas Ryon joined an elite club of millionaires by winning the 28th running of the \$2 million All American Futurity.

The Florida-bred colt was sent out by Mississippi native Arnold Simmons Jr., who was saddling his first contender for the nation's richest quarter horse race. Joining the conditioner in the winner's circle were owners Ben Benham and Sarge Darder of Florida, and James Plummer of Alabama.

The 1986 renewal of the All American featured the 10 survivors from two rounds of trials racing for a winner's purse of \$1 million. Rainbow Futurity winner Lil Bit Shiney went postward as the 9-5 favorite for the quarter-mile dash, with Kansas Futurity champion Ronas Ryon the second choice at 7-2.

Jerry Nicodemus piloted Ronas

Ryon from the No. 3 post position after turning in the fifth-fastest qualifying time for the Grade I stakes race. Lil Bit Shiney loaded into the nine hole under rider Jeff Williams with a qualifying time only five thousandths of a second behind that of Ronas Ryon.

Nicodemus, a 41-year-old veteran seeking his third win in the All American, got Ronas Ryon out of the gates with a clear lead and raced straight as an arrow down the course. He dropped his whip a few strides down the lane, but continued to draw away from the field and held a length or more advantage at the midway point.

Williams got off to a slow start aboard Lil Bit Shiney. The Hugh Tucker trainee lugged slightly to

Football season begins

Ruidoso crushes Artesia, 43-23

What can the Ruidoso High School varsity football team do for an encore after winning the state AAA-division title last year?

Well, merely defeat traditional powerhouse Artesia, 43-23, Friday night in the season-opener at the Warriors' stadium.

Despite the fact that Ruidoso only led, 22-15, at the end of the first half, the game was even more lopsided than the final score would indicate.

Ruidoso rolled up 447 yards total offense to just 148 for the Bulldogs.

One of Artesia's touchdowns was scored on a 63-yard pass interception return by Mike McPherson (he scored all three Bulldog touchdowns). Another one was scored when a pass bounced off an Artesia player's helmet and landed in McPherson's hands.

And the Warrior passing game was awesome!

Quarterback Jeff Willingham completed 11 of 21 passes for 287 yards and three touchdowns. He also scored two touchdowns and intercepted two passes.

Willingham's first touchdown pass was to all-state split end Brian Davis, who caught the ball near the sidelines, and outran two Artesia defenders for a 48-yard score.

The extra-point run was just short, but Ruidoso led 8-0 with 10:27 left in the opening quarter.

Willingham had a touchdown run called back on Ruidoso's next series.

Two plays later, McPherson intercepted another Willingham pass and raced down the left sidelines for the first Artesia touchdown.

The do-everything junior kicked the extra point and Artesia led, 7-6, with 6:06 left in the first period.

But that was the only time Artesia led in the contest.

Ruidoso came right back in the ensuing series, with Willingham and Davis again hooking up for the score.

On second and six, Willingham again found Davis near the sidelines, and the 6-3 senior raced in for a 58-yard touchdown.

Another extra-point run failed. However, Ruidoso had the lead for good at 12-7 with almost six minutes still left in the first quarter.

Ruidoso struck again with 5:56 left in the second quarter.

The Warriors drove 80 yards for a score with Willingham going over from the three. He handed the ball to Kirk Taylor, but the tailback then lateraled the ball back to Willingham, who then raced in for the score.

Garret Henson's extra-point kick was good and Ruidoso led, 19-7.

An Artesia fumble at its 49 set up the next Warrior score.

With fullback Billy Harrison and

tailback Chuck Daniels gaining 31 yards in four carries, Ruidoso moved to the Artesia 19.

On fourth down, Henson kicked a 36-yard field goal to give Ruidoso a 22-7 lead.

But the Bulldogs refused to quit and came back for a touchdown in the closing seconds of the half.

Behind the passing of quarterback Clay Foster, the Bulldogs moved 60 yards in six plays.

McPherson just made it over the goal line on a one-yard run for the score. He then ran over for the two-point conversion and a 22-15 Warrior halftime lead.

But the rest of the night belonged

to Ruidoso.

After Artesia failed to get a first down on the opening series of the second half, Ruidoso drove 67 yards in 10 plays for the score.

Willingham found Davis for 18 yards and Bubba Miller for 13 yards to help set up the score. Willingham went in from eight yards out with 4:53 remaining in the third period. Henson's kick was good and Ruidoso led, 29-15.

The Warriors added two more touchdowns in the final period, a two-yard run by Harrison and an eight-yard pass from Willingham to Miller.

The final score of the night came on the pass from Foster to McPherson which initially bounced off another Artesia player's helmet.

Besides Willingham's passing, Davis caught eight passes for 241 yards. Harrison led the Warrior rushing game with 70 yards in 11 carries. The Warriors had 158 yards rushing as a team.

"No, I didn't expect us to score that many points in the first game," said Warrior head coach Cooper Henderson. "I thought it would be a low-scoring game."

"I thought our offensive line did a great job blocking. Jeff only got sacked twice out of 24 times attempting to pass."

"Our defense played really well. It's definitely the best we've played in an opening game since I've been here, although we still made some mistakes."

Toby Rue intercepted a pass along with Willingham's two interceptions as the Warrior secondary was outstanding.

The Warriors will now travel to Lovington Friday, September 5. The Wildcats beat Hobbs, 7-0, Friday night.

WARRIOR NOTES-Davis won the coaches' Golden Helmet award. Taylor was named top offensive player, Colby Day won the defensive player honor and Henson was the top kicking team player. Results of other games involving District 3-AAA teams saw Silver City dump Moriarty, 33-8; and Goddard topple Deming, 23-10.

Voters will decide fate of tax increase in December

"We're going to have an election," said Village Clerk Leon Eggleston late Friday.

Eggleston said he verified more than the required 135 signatures on a negative referendum petition on an ordinance passed by the Ruidoso Village Council calling for a .50 cent gross receipts tax increase.

The petitioners have asked that the voters decide on the fate of the .50 cent sales tax hike.

Eggleston said he validated 298 of

the 342 signatures on the 34 petitions presented at his office on Wednesday. He said he purged 44 names—four signatures being duplicates and 40 signers were found not to be registered voters in Ruidoso village limits.

During the verification process, Eggleston said he went to the Lincoln County Clerk's office and compared the signatures.

"It was all aboveboard," remarked Eggleston.

He said he'll report on the petition during the September 9 council meeting, and will recommend that the governing body adopt an election resolution, setting an election as soon as possible after the November general election—probably on December 20 or December 22.

"If they fail to adopt an election resolution they will be in violation of state law," noted Eggleston.

"The petition is founded on the

original ordinance," said Eggleston. "The election process is started and you can't stop it," he added.

If voters pass the .50 cent tax increase, the council will have to amend the ordinance changing its implementation date from January 1 to July 1, 1987, said Eggleston.

"If it fails, it's just dead," said Eggleston.

The council implemented the ordinance on July 29, and earmarked

the proceeds from the .50 cent tax to pay debt service on the \$2.6 million the village is expected to invest in the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport. Once that obligation is paid and the Ruidoso Municipal Airport site is vacated to the new facility, the Federal Aviation Administration will release the current airport land to the village.

Councillors who favor the tax hike have said repeatedly the cur-

rent airport land will have to be sold if the tax fails.

Opponents of the tax have proposed a smaller increase combined with cuts in village spending to keep the land.

If the negative referendum stops the tax increase, it will also constrain the council from any other increases in gross receipts tax rates for 36 months.


The extended forecast for Thursday through Saturday will be partly cloudy skies with widely scattered afternoon and nighttime thundershowers.



Final racing day is packed with action

While the final of the \$2.53 million All American Futurity held the limelight on Monday's closing program at Ruidoso Downs, the mountain track's season caper featured three stakes races in addition to the rich Labor Day classic, The \$290,000 All American Futurity First Consolation went to country and western singing star Jody Miller's De La Cruz. A brown filly by Ichibon, De La Cruz went postward at more than 25-1 odds with veteran jockey Jerry Burgess in the irons. The filly stopped the clock in a zippy 21.63 for the 440 yards. Trained by Monty Brooks, De La Cruz earned \$45,000 for owner Miller who resides in Blanchard, Oklahoma.

Another longshot, Flyin Fols, finished second in the rich event a half-length behind the winner. Flyin Fols had Jeff Williams in the saddle for owners Delton and Betty Dodd of Ruidoso. Hugh Tucker is the trainer. Second place in the Consolation was worth \$40,000.

Wichita Equine's well-bred colt Streak It To Em finished third, a head behind Flyin Fols. Away slowly, Streak It To Em closed sharply in the final stages of the race to nab the show spot. Jockey Stuart Dolphus got the leg-up from trainer Larry Keiter for the 440-yard Journey. Third place earned her connections \$35,000.

The 7-5 betting favorite Make An Effort again broke slowly and was no factor, finishing fourth.

"We thought the inside was a little better and she out broke 'em, so we let her go over there," said winning conditioner Brooks after the race. "She left great and she can run on the end, so I thought we had a great shot," he continued.

Jockey Jerry Burgess agreed, "I stepped away real good and I thought I'd better get to that better gait over close to the rail and I think it helped," the veteran rider recalled.

The rest of the field in the Consolation checked in like this with money earned: 5th - Irish Moon Lass, \$27,500; 6th - Big Boy Smashed, \$26,250; 7th - Paa Lei, \$23,750; 8th - Special Hi, \$22,500; 9th - Pines Continued, \$21,250; 10th - Master Bryon, \$18,750.

Leading Jet and Whata Lucky Jet renewed their rivalry in the Monday's Ruidoso 550 championship. The two long distance specialists faced a stellar field in the \$14,825 stakes event and again finished one-two in a 550 handicap, with Leading Jet getting a nose in front of his rival to earn the \$8,895 winner's check for owner LeRoy Spires, of Snyder, Texas.

Earlier in the meet, Leading Jet recorded wins in the Zia Handicap, Jet Deck Handicap and the 550 yard

Big Profit Handicap. In the latter stakes test, Leading Jet beat Whata Lucky Jet in a tight photo finish, again leading the way by a nose.

Jockey Casey Lambert had the mount on Leading Jet for trainer Clifford Lambert, while Rudy Bustamante was up on Whata Lucky Jet for Nerrel Bruney. Lambert and Leading Jet stopped the clock in a good 27.02 seconds over a fast track.

Sent off as the 7-5 favorite, Leading Jet broke alertly from post three showing the way with Big John Mito, Whata Lucky Jet and Sitting On Go not far behind. While Big John Mito faded to sixth place, the other two speedsters turned in game efforts finishing second and third.

"He kinda hung a little in the middle of it and the outside two (Whata Lucky Jet and Sitting On Go) went by me, but he came on again and got 'em. He was really running strong on the end," jockey Lambert said after the race.

Morrell C. Gist, of Andrews, Texas, will receive the runner-up check of \$3,261 for Whata Lucky Jet's effort and Robert Haulik will deposit \$1,482 for Sitting On Go's third place finish. Darrell Blevins had the mount for trainer Jack Hemby.

Jockey Leroy Coombs brought Madam's Pleasure from just off the pace to take the lead around the bend. Madam's Pleasure continued to draw away down the lane to win by 5 1/2 lengths. The timer stopped at 1:34.2 seconds. Owner Forest McAden from Millsap, Texas, picked up a winner's share of \$10,260. Coy Hendrix trains the Pleasure Flight gelding.

Farmer Brown held on for second to earn \$3,782 for Guy Bowers of Ruidoso. Lewis Germany conditions the True Balcony son. Son To The King closed from seventh at the head of the stretch to finish third under Mike Lidberg. The show banked \$1,710 for Kenneth and Betty Brown of Austin.

Cruisin' Prince wins Ruidoso Mile Handicap Sunday

Jockey Carlos Rivas piloted Cruisin' Prince to a close decision in the Ruidoso Mile Handicap on Sunday at Ruidoso Downs, while Beat The System captured the All American Futurity Second Consolation in the day's co-feature.

The Mile Handicap featured a full field of 12 veteran thoroughbreds racing for a \$50,000 purse. Multiple stakes winner Flemish Slipper loaded into the gates as the 9-5 favorite with Forever A Ruler the second choice coming off an impressive win in the Ruidoso Thoroughbred Derby earlier this month.

Reinsman Danny Sorenson moved within striking distance aboard Forever A Ruler as the field raced through the backstretch with Flemish Slipper showing the way into the final turn. Sorenson stalked the leader around the bend, while Rivas began to move Cruisin' Prince up from just off the pace.

Rivas drew alongside Forever A Ruler at the head of the stretch and began to take command of the race as the two horses drove to the wire. Sorenson's mount began to tire in the final furlong, while 17-1 outsider

Makum Trimble made a strong late charge under apprentice rider Lewis Germany Jr. Cruisin' Prince held on to win by a neck, with Makum Trimble a widening 1 1/2 lengths ahead of Forever A Ruler.

"I was laying a little off the pace," Rivas said of his strategy for Cruisin' Prince's bid in the Mile Handicap. "There was some cheap speed in there, but it wasn't a problem. I just went to the front five and started moving on the backside at about the three-eighths pole. I just let him go and hand rode him in."

The final time for the mile journey was 1:43.3 over a heavy course.

The Mile Handicap was a major payday for El Paoan Lewis Germany and his two sons - Barry and Lewis Jr. Barry trains Cruisin' Prince, who earned a \$30,000 winner's check for Lonkita Farms of Vaguita, N.M. Second-place finisher Makum Trimble is conditioned by the elder Germany. Guy Bowers of Ruidoso took home \$11,000 for the gelding's effort.

Trainer Jimmie Claridge saddled Forever A Ruler for William

Burgess of Alto, who collected \$5,000.

Beat The System, a \$4,000 purchase at last year's All American Select Sale at Ruidoso Downs, held on for a narrow neck victory in Sunday's All American Futurity Second Consolation, which offered a gross purse of \$145,000.

The Beat A Native colt went postward at more than 5-1 odds racing from the rail post under rider Lyndell Rutherford. Rutherford had Beat The System away from the gates in good order, taking a half-length lead on the seven-horse field a few strides down the lane.

"I didn't think he was going to break half as good as did," Rutherford commented after the race. "He was kind of bunched up in the gate and we had to let him break like that."

Cash Wagon, the 7-2 second choice with Alex Baldillez in the irons, got out a step slow on the break and was forced to make up ground as Fols Laico Bird matched strides with Beat The System from the No. 3 post. The 10-1 outsider held on for second for most of the journey, but began to fade from

contention about 50 yards from the wire.

Baldillez stormed past the tiring filly to make a run at Beat The System, who held on to collect the \$21,416 winner's purse. The final time for the 440 yards was 22.01 seconds.

"He was kind of floundering in the middle of it and I thought they were going to catch us," Rutherford recalled. "But he didn't let em go by. He just ran a super race."

Reflections Of Belle and jockey Jerry Nicodemus finished a half-length ahead of Fols Laico Bird for third. Even-money favorite Ruler Oak checked in fifth, with Running Masked sixth and Easy Delta Jet seventh.

Trainer Charles Harper tightened the girth on Beat The System, who is owned by George Wilson of Perry, Oklahoma. Cash Wagon, a Dwayne Gilbreath trainee, picked up \$19,679 for the partnership of B.F. Phillips, Mary Lee and Carroll Hopper of Frisco, Texas. Reflections Of Belle's third was worth \$19,390 to J.H. Crouch Jr. of Midland, Texas. Larry Keiter is the trainer.

Draconic Code captures Saturday's Ruidoso Thoroughbred Futurity

Neal Musgrove and Terry Walker's Draconic Code outdueled heavy favorite Big Bold Boz in a thrilling stretch drive to take the top spot in Saturday's running of the \$141,398 Ruidoso Thoroughbred Futurity, while the speedy colt The Quarter Master took the co-

featured All American Futurity Third Consolation as Ruidoso Downs continued its final weekend of racing action.

Also in Saturday's action, one lucky better picked up over \$40,000 as she successfully selected six winners in the afternoon's Pic-Six

wagering.

Draconic Code, a New Mexico bred daughter of Draconic, came into the Thoroughbred Futurity sporting only one win from her three lifetime starts while Big Bold Boz is generally known as the most talented freshman sprinter in the

Southwest. The filly's lone win came against state-bred maidens on Aug. 1 where she drew out to an awesome 15 length margin as the 2-5 betting choice.

In the Futurity, Draconic Code was sent postward as the 2-1 second choice despite having three coupled entries in the final. The entry of Big Bold Boz, owned by Jackie Spencer of Alto, was the betting favorite at 3-5.

Big Bold Boz, under rider Casey Lambert, held the lead for much of the six-furlong sprint but Draconic Code and jockey Darrell Blevins were never farther back than third. When the field turned for home, Lambert had the favorite on the rail ahead by two lengths but the Riley Allison Futurity winner could not hold off Draconic Code's strong bid. The filly stopped the clock in 1:13.2 over a muddy course and held a 3 length advantage at the wire.

Owners Musgrove and Walker, of Hobbs, will pocket a smooth \$70,899 for the win - while Mrs. Spencer will receive \$31,107 second place money. Terry Walker also acts as Draconic Code's trainer.

"I did just what I wanted too, I layed behind Big Bold Boz on the backside 'cause I knew that if I was within 5 lengths of him when we hit the turn, I could outrun him," said Blevins after the race. "I drew just where I wanted to, with Big Bold Boz on the inside of me, 'cause my filly doesn't have that much speed early. She's still green, but she gets better everytime," continued Blevins.

Sonic Shecky, part of the Charles Mattox trained entry finished third just ahead of stablemate Cowboy Posee. Sonic Shecky finished a length behind the tiring Big Bold Boz and 10 lengths in front of Cowboy Posee. Third place money of \$16,987 will go to owner Morris Cannon, of San Antonio, Texas.

while Mollie B. Kelly and Lorrain Mattox of El Paso, Texas, collect \$8,483 for the fourth spot.

The \$65,000 consolation featured seven of the 10 horses who posted the third-fastest qualifying times for the Grade I race. Sikkem Sweet, who had lit the board in four straight efforts, was the 6-5 favorite under leading rider Jacky Martin.

Facing the public choice were The Quarter Master, Kiddin N Streakin, Streakin Rampage, Luckguy Chicdelite, Cowboy Serenade and Bid To Wind. The pre-race favorite - Solid Policy - was an early scratch, with Go Little Firebug and Classy Jeans withdrawing the morning of the race.

Jockey Joe Martinez, who was taking his first assignment aboard The Quarter Master, said trainer Jerry Lazenby had some last-minute instructions for riding the horse.

"He said there was kind of a trick to him," Martinez said. "You got to stay in the middle of his back, 'cause he likes to buck."

Martinez appeared to have little trouble with the Texas-bred breaker from the rail post in the 440-yard dash. He got The Quarter Master out to a quick lead on the field and never looked back in

drawing out to a three-quarter length victory. The final time over a sloppy track was 21.79 seconds.

"Today he didn't act like he was wanting to buck at all," Martinez said. "The horse ran one heck of a race."





Padilla's opening kickoff touchdown helps Tigers shut out Eunice, 26-0

It took exactly 15 seconds last Friday afternoon for Capitan High School's varsity football team to equal last season's win total.

Troy Padilla ran the opening kickoff back 85 yards for the first touchdown of an eventual 26-0 Tiger victory over visiting Eunice in the season-opener.

After Padilla's touchdown (he took a lateral from Jay Eldridge), there were still 59 minutes and 45 seconds left in the game.

But for all practical purposes it was over.

Capitan forced the AA-division Eunice team into six fumbles, while playing solid defense. The Cardinals never threatened to score.

"Our defense dominating the line of scrimmage was a key," said Tiger head coach Zale Woodward after the game. "It was a big game for us, to equal last season's victory total this early in the year."

Following Padilla's touchdown, Mike Lunn kicked the extra point and Capitan had a 7-0 lead before many spectators were even settled in their seats.

Capitan added a second touchdown early in the second quarter on a five-yard run by fullback Doug Eckland. Eckland broke two tackles and ran into the end zone for the score.

Eckland's score finished a 60-yard drive in 12 plays.

Capitan gained a 20-0 halftime lead when quarterback Ronnie Sanchez hit Kerry Clements with a 10-yard pass for a score.

The score came with 6:35 left in the first half. A Eunice fumble set up the touchdown.

The Tigers finished the scoring with a 12-yard pass from Sanchez to Eldridge in the second half.

Another Eunice fumble set the final touchdown up.

It occurred on a punt and Capitan recovered at the Cardinal 16.

Eckland scored an apparent touchdown, but the run was called back because of an offside penalty.

No matter, two plays later, Padilla gained nine yards to put the ball at the 13. Eckland then gained one yard before Sanchez hit Eldridge with the final score.

Capitan dominated the offensive

statistics, although neither team's offense was very consistent.

The Tigers had 110 yards rushing and 23 yards passing for 133 yards total offense. Eunice had just 34 yards rushing and 15 passing for a 49-yard total.

Capitan will play at Tatum Friday, September 5. The game will start at 7:30 p.m.

Zoning Authority OKs new power substation

The Lincoln County Extraterritorial Zoning Authority approved with a contingency the proposed Texas-New Mexico Power Substation in Woodland Hills Subdivision at a special meeting Tuesday.

Leo McCaslin, representing property owners in Woodland Hills, told the Authority the property owners were concerned the power substation would be unsightly. They did not object to the substation and the only objection to location was they wanted it in the southeast quadrant of the southeast quarter of the property, hidden from view.

Dennis Fisher, representing Texas-New Mexico Power Company (TNMP), assured committee

members Bill Elliott, Ken Nosker and Ray Dean Carpenter his company had every intention to leave the site as natural as possible. Plans for the substation include low profile equipment with minimum noise. A masonry type wall was also being considered by engineers.

Plans for the 7,200 volt power substation are still on the engineers' drawing boards and will be for at least another year. Building will begin in approximately two years with a finish date sometime in 1989, according to TNMP officials.

After an on-site inspection, a special use permit was granted to the power company, with the restriction not to build within 200 feet from the north boundary of Woodland Hills.

Streets Superintendent LaMay leaves a road paved with progress

When Ruidoso Street Department superintendent Jack LaMay took on the Street Department nine years ago he found "an old worn-out road grader, two old trucks and two sweepers."

But when he turns in his keys for the last time Friday afternoon, he's leaving behind a department with over \$1.5 million in equipment, including a lay-down machine, three road graders, two loaders, five dump trucks, three rollers, one bulldozer, a grid roller and a water truck.

"We started out with nothing when I started here," said LaMay Wednesday. "Now we have the capability of paving any road out there," he added proudly.

LaMay feels building the department into perhaps the most capable street department in the state is his greatest accomplishment as street superintendent. He said the biggest change has been in having the right kind of equipment to perform much-needed road work.

"The streets in Ruidoso were in terrible shape when I took over," recalled LaMay.

"I've enjoyed my nine years," said LaMay, taking a few moments Wednesday to reflect on those years. "It's time to move on," he added.

LaMay, seen most often atop the large equipment his crews use to maintain and pave village streets, was spending a rainy afternoon in his office at the Street Department

shop. That shop is one of the additions the Street Department has seen under LaMay's leadership. He said he worked out of a trailer until the big metal building was built about three years ago.

Just outside the shop is a hot mix plant, also installed during the past few years. That, along with a lay-down machine, are primarily responsible for the village's ability to do its own road building, said LaMay.

Projects his department has completed during the last few years include the Ruidoso High School football field and track, the Eagle Creek Sports Complex, Grindstone Canyon Road and two county roads—Gavilan Canyon and Carizo Creek.

Savings to the village in completing those projects rather than hiring an outside contractor are in the millions, explained LaMay.

The Lincoln County native is quick to say he can't take all the credit for his department's accomplishments.

"I've always had good cooperation from the council," said LaMay, stressing that without such support he couldn't have built the department to its present size and efficiency.

LaMay is just as quick to praise his crews.

"I've got the best crew in the country," remarked LaMay.

Ruidoso Mayor Lloyd Davis Jr.

was the mayor when LaMay joined the village staff. He hired LaMay, then working for the Lincoln County Road Department, and put him over a department with five employees.

LaMay will leave behind a department employing 22 people and having a yearly budget of over a million dollars.

Nine years ago the new superintendent went right to work to improve village streets.

"Ruidoso is very unique," said LaMay, adding that his crews have only about five months to do paving and road construction projects. He has supervised as more than 35 miles of gravel streets were reworked and paved.

Besides maintaining over 200 miles of village roadways, LaMay said his department is called out during floods and snowstorms. He has seen seven or eight serious floods, which he says are harder on roads than snowstorms.

LaMay worries that budget cut-backs in the village will make it difficult to maintain the village streets.

Assistant village manager Frank Potter said Thursday that LaMay has been a good street superintendent, and will be missed. "Jack's knowledge is very valuable," noted Potter.

Although he's leaving village employ, LaMay plans to stay in the area. He and his wife, Linda, have a home in Ruidoso Downs, and are

parents of a four-year-old son, Matthew. LaMay's grown son, Jonathan, runs the village hot plant. "Ruidoso's been good to me, and

I think I've been good to Ruidoso," said LaMay. "I'm leaving with a good taste in my mouth," he added. His advice to the person who will take over the street superintendent

position? "Treat people the way he wants to be treated—especially his men," advises LaMay.

Hospital cuts cost of breast X-ray

Because physicians in the area are requesting more mammograms for their female patients, Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Hospital (RHVH) is able to reduce its price on the special screening procedure, according to RHVH administrator Ken Moore.

The price for the mammogram, which is usually painless according to RHVH officials, was \$176.25 but is now \$120.

Moore said he hopes the reduced price on the special procedure will keep women interested in having it done locally.

RHVH radiologist Dr. Stephen Crowley said certain women in the general population need the breast X-ray on a yearly basis.

"According to many large medical groups like the American Cancer Society, women over 50, who have had a history of cancer in their family, should definitely have the mammogram on a yearly basis," Crowley said.

Crowley said many large medical associations also recommend women between the ages of 35 and 40 should have one mammogram done as a baseline reference for later in their life.

Women, in any age group, who have given themselves a self-examination of their breasts, and feel they have a problem or some type of a lump, should not be afraid of having a mammogram, Crowley said.

"Most of the time a mammogram relieves a woman from worry, especially younger women," Crowley said.

Both Crowley and Moore said physicians all across America are requesting more mammograms for their female patients because the type of X-ray machine now being used gives off very low dosages and the procedure is considered very safe when prescribed by a physician.

Moore said most insurance companies cover mammograms in their policies.

The up-to-date X-ray equipment for mammograms at RHVH was donated about two years ago by the hospital auxiliary organization.

Village personnel ordinance may be changed

A new personnel policy to be considered September 9 by the Ruidoso Village Council would reorganize the village government under four divisions—with division heads reporting directly to the assistant village manager.

"We're trying to get our operations costs down," said assistant village manager Frank Potter last week. Potter said the plan calls for key people to run divisions with the least amount of staff and still provide the best service.

Village manager Jim Hine said Friday the plan is one he, Potter, personnel director Debbie Rogge and village clerk Leon Eggleston have been drafting. He said the Village Council instructed the administration some time ago to revise the ordinance to comply with all state and federal regulations.

"Theoretically, there are not too many changes," remarked Hine. But he added the new ordinance will address problems the village encountered last year when it was learned that the police and fire departments were out of compliance with the Fair Labor Standards Act.

Hine said Village Councillor Larry Simon asked three things: a complete personnel ordinance, an accurate job classification plan and a reorganization plan.

Potter displayed an organizational chart showing the village manager reporting directly to the mayor and village council and the assistant manager reporting to the mayor. Proposed divisions include operations and services, clerk's office and finance, the village attorney and engineering and community plan.

While still functioning as assistant manager, Potter said he'll also fill the operations and services division head slot. The police, fire, cemetery, parks and recreation and personnel departments are in operations and services.

A change in the new plan includes adding the finance director title to that of village clerk. Potter said village clerk Eggleston already has assumed many finance-related responsibilities, but hasn't had them spelled out in his title and job

description. Matching up job responsibilities with classifications and descriptions was a major goal in reorganizing the village, noted Potter.

The engineering and community plan director would direct village infrastructure departments, planning and building inspection.

Potter said when he and the rest of the group began looking into village personnel policies they identified a number of problems.

"Some positions are not being treated equitably," said Potter. He said he is doing a complete job audit of every village position. That includes evaluating the current job description versus the actual requirements of the job, as well as any special certification or other unique job requirements. He hopes to incorporate his findings into a new job classification plan that will include equity in pay and responsibility.

A serious problem identified in the study is the high rate of turnover among village staff, said Potter.

"If we're going to save the people money, we've got to raise the entry level pay," said Potter. "Turnover just costs too much," he added.

A part of that problem, said Potter, has been hiring people without the proper qualifications and then spending time and money on their training, only to have them move elsewhere after the training period.

"The city is out of the training business," remarked Potter. He said with a staff cut to the "bare bones" the village will hire people who are already trained.

For instance, the village is currently advertising for a utilities department cashier, and will make a hiring decision through a new rating process that relies heavily on past experience, said Potter.

"Ultimately, the plan is designed to decrease the number of employees," said Hine.

Potter said the village staff is already down by about 10, and could be down by 20 in a very short time if past turnover rates continue. Ruidoso employees numbered 150 in 1984, dropped to 146 in 1985, and currently are below that number, he said. That 1984 figure was the peak, said Potter, adding the staff numbered 110 in

1980, 115 in 1981, 128 in 1982 and 138 in 1983.

In spite of efforts to cut the size of village government, both Potter and Hine noted that a demand for village services continues to increase.

"Even though some indicators show the village economy down, Hine said the demand for services this year is the same as last, or perhaps more.

"We have cut employees, but we haven't cut services," remarked Potter. He said the eventual answer may be to hire temporary employees during busier months.

Hine said the council will review and act on the ordinance, and then the classification plan will be presented.



But the county is responsible for following handicap regulations in their buildings, as they are responsible for determining who resides where in county buildings in what amount of space.

The squabble is doing nothing good for the public, and the public is who public officials are answerable to.

In this case, we believe the answer the public wants to hear is that this matter is settled now, before more of the public's time and money is wasted.

Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE—The *Washington Post* asks, "Is the governor of New Mexico about to be indicted?"

That's a good question, to which all New Mexicans, without exception, would like to know the answer. So far, we don't have any dependable feeling for what the ultimate response will be. That's because, as the *Post* story goes on to say, "the embattled Anaya has been in and out of court all summer with federal prosecutors, the FBI and the Internal Revenue Service, but a federal judge here (in Santa Fe) has locked the courtroom door and refused to reveal what is happening."

The newspaper reminds its readers (and the millions of others in cities where its news service makes the story available) that we know U.S. Attorney William Lutz, whom it specifically identifies as "a Republican," is investigating political contributions and our Governor's personal finances. It adds, "It also appears that Anaya has filed a lawsuit, evidently charging the Reagan administration with harassing him for political purposes. But U.S. District Judge Santiago Campos has granted Anaya's request that all proceedings in the case be closed."

That closure is one point of frustration for New Mexicans, though not the only one, as the *Post* article makes clear.

That comes across in a quote from William L. Dixon, an Albuquerque attorney retained by KOAT-TV in its attempt to shine some light into this pit of darkness. He says, "Here you've got the senior elected official in the state suing the senior federal law-enforcement officer, allegedly charging political abuse of power. How can you possibly say the people have no right to know?"

What we do know, as this newspaper of national record makes clear, comes almost entirely from leaks and coincidences. One of those occurred when KOAT-TV sent a camera crew to shoot some file footage of Campos in the federal courthouse here just as, to the camera crew's amazement, Governor Anaya, his wife and attorneys appeared, along with FBI and IRS agents and several federal prosecutors. They all disappeared into a hearing that went on for seven hours behind the judge's closed doors. This was, as the newspaper laconically adds, "the first public indication of the extent of federal

interest in the governor."

Has all this effort to keep things secret worked? Not in the *Post's* opinion. Its story says, "Just about everyone agrees that Anaya's effort to keep his legal troubles quiet has backfired." If then goes on to quote Republican state Senator Victor Marshall from Albuquerque, who told the reporter: "There used to be a feeling that none of the troubles reached Toney himself. Now people are thinking, you know, if there's so much smoke . . . How much smoke is there?"

The Washington paper was successful in getting more information on that than most of us here in the state have gotten.

It quotes U.S. Attorney Lutz as "indicating" he had been suspicious of Anaya since 1984, when Lutz's office indicted two mid-level members of the Anaya administration on charges of extorting political contributions from banks seeking state contracts. Lutz then went on to say, in the kind of direct quotes he has been reluctant to supply for those of us here at home, "We brought extortion charges, and a jury returned convictions. You would think a governor, if he were remote from that kind of activity, would run away from those defendants. But Governor Anaya attacked us when we brought that case and said we were out to get him. . . . And when you hear something like that, you start to say, 'Hey, maybe there's something we missed.'"

Lutz further goes on to observe that "this has been an interesting lawsuit already. But it's going to be a lot more interesting when all these records are unsealed."

We can hardly wait. Nor can we fail to note the timing. As Steve Arias, staffer to Congressman Bill Richardson, also admitted to the Washington paper in phrases he probably would not have chosen had he expected to see them quoted here: "For the Democrats, this has been terrible. Toney has been deeply unpopular anyway, and now all this comes out just in time for the election of a new governor."

So you see, it's now only some eternally suspicious correspondents in New Mexico who sniff something unpleasantly fragrant in our wind. When the news folks from the Big East start paying heed to our provincial affairs, there's reason to believe deep trouble is brewing.


