P&Z commissioners resign, cite Mayor's attitude

Three members of the Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) resigned Tuesday.

Chairman Mike Callaghan and vice-chairman Mary Underwood both referred to recent remarks by Ruidoso Mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr. in their letters of resignation.

In announcing his resignation, effective after Tuesday's regular meeting, Callaghan said Davis has an "I don't care" philosophy.

"I can't really support someone who doesn't care about Ruidoso," remarked Callaghan.

Underwood, too, decried the mayor's attitude toward P&Z. She pointed out that the commission, a

volunteer organization, is not appreciated for the work it does.

But Rose, contacted Wednesday, said he resigned because it was "time to go." Rose has been a P&Z member for eight years, and said he stayed long enough to see the upcoming Master Plan and zoning ordinance completed except for "fine tuning."

"I came in under Lloyd Davis and left under Lloyd Davis," noted Rose.

During a workshop session before Tuesday's meeting, Rose told members of the commission he believes any volunteer commission must adapt under changing administrations.

"That is our job," said Rose Wednesday. "By the same token I

wouldn't want anyone to build within a foot of my property line," he added.

Property line setbacks have been a bone of contention between the mayor and the commission for some time, and last week the council overturned P&Z's denial of a citizen's request for a variance to build a carport to within a foot of his neighbor's property line.

That action apparently precipitated at least two of the resignations from the nine-member board.

Commissioners have said a village ordinance establishing 20-foot front and back lot setbacks and 10-foot side lot setbacks should be upheld for new construction unless topographical conditions

preclude building within those boundaries.

But Mayor Davis has favored allowing variances to build within the setbacks, especially in older areas of the village.

"We've lost three of the hardest working members of P&Z we've had in a long time," said Commissioner David Smith, calling Tuesday a "black day."

"I almost resigned myself for some of the same reasons," he added.

Smith was then elected chairman, with Commissioner Pete Thompson, one of the three newcomers to the commission, elected vice-chairman.

Smith and Commissioner Eddie Nichols announced they'll be absent

from the next regular meeting, and wondered if a quorum will be on hand to enact business.

Village attorney John Underwood said he'll ask the mayor to appoint new members to fill the vacancies so that P&Z business can continue on schedule.

Callaghan recalled it took three months to get new appointees the last time they were needed.

In regular business Tuesday P&Z:

—Heard Underwood say he'll be attending most P&Z meetings to help members with legal questions.

—Discussed progress on the village zoning map.

—Heard questions from a citizen about a change in zoning on his property on Junction Road. He said he

bought his lot as residential and has seen it listed on various maps as both commercial and residential.

—Approved commercial development plans submitted by Jim Wilkerson for owner Dorothy Kimsey for a barbecue restaurant on lots 2A and 3-8, Block 3, Riverside Addition.

—Agreed, after hearing a recommendation from Underwood, to begin having a P&Z representative at meetings of the Ruidoso Village Council.

Commissioner Melody Vuich was absent from Tuesday's meeting.

Election Downs voters allow Sunday liquor sales

Ruidoso Downs voters elected to allow Sunday sales of liquor in their village by a more than two to one margin Friday.

The election apparently was the result of Downs restaurateurs' concerns that business is being lost to other area municipalities which do allow sale of liquor by the drink on Sundays.

Residents voted, 59-27, to allow the sale of liquor on Sunday in the Downs. Voter turnout was reported to be low in the election.

Downs village clerk JoAnn Jenkins reported area dispensers of liquor will probably begin serving on Sundays in about two weeks, after paperwork in Santa Fe is completed.

The Downs joins a growing list of other municipalities in New Mexico whose voters have elected to allow Sunday liquor sales.

The election took place from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m. in the Downs municipal building.

EID wants dumping ground cleaned up

The Environmental Improvement Division (EID) has written a letter to a local contractor regarding alleged violations of state water quality control regulations, according to local EID officer Jim Edwards.

Edwards said Barney Rue was sent an enforcement letter regarding dumping on Block 15, lots 1-6, Forest Heights Subdivision. He said the EID has documented the presence of water contaminants and other illegal materials disposed of on those lots.

Rue was asked in the letter to contact a representative of the EID with a plan to "contain and remove

or mitigate the discharge," on the lots that appear to have become a dump ground.

But Rue, contacted by telephone last week, said he hasn't placed any illegal materials on the lots. He confirmed that he has an agreement with the owner of lots two through six allowing him to place dirt, rocks, concrete and tree limbs on the undeveloped land.

"All we've dumped is just dirt and tree limbs," said Rue. He suspects that others have placed the huge assortment of trash and building materials on the land.

"I know what I haul in there," averred Rue, who added he spends \$50 to \$60 a month at the municipal landfill for the materials he disposes of there. Rue said if he was

dumping unwanted materials in Forest Heights he wouldn't be spending so much at the village facility.

Alex Puglisi of the EID in Santa Fe said his agency has asked Rue to submit a plan of compliance showing how he will mitigate the problem.

Rue insists he isn't guilty of dumping the unacceptable materials.

"As far as we know he's the only one dumping there," said Puglisi. He said he asked Rue to contact the local EID office and visit the site to point out what he has dumped and what he hasn't.

Dennis Walling of Paducah, Texas, is the owner of lots two through six. When contacted by telephone Wednesday, Walling said he visited his property about three

weeks ago, and wasn't pleased with what he found.

"It's turned into a dump ground," remarked Walling.

But he is sure Rue isn't responsible. Walling said he has an agreement with Rue about what can be dumped on the land, and maintains that Rue has lived up to his end of the agreement.

"I really don't care to make a statement on this," said Walling. He said he hasn't talked to the EID, but has been assured by Rue that he will fence and clean the area.

"I've just got to meet with them (EID) and see what they're talking about," said Rue. And Puglisi said his office is waiting for a reply from Rue.



New Mexico's Environmental Improvement Division is taking steps to get on six lots in Forest Heights Subdivision cleaned up. An assortment of building and waste materials have been dumped on the lots in violation of state regulations, according to the EID. The state agency is working with a local contractor on mitigating the problem.



Diabetics should have regular eye examinations so that any retinopathy can be caught in the early stages, when successful treatment is possible.

Antiviral drugs—against herpes, adenoviruses, even the flu—are being developed, and some have been approved by the FDA.

Another kind of bypass surgery: cerebral artery bypass graft to improve blood supply of the brain. It reduces the likelihood of stroke in people who have had transient ischemic attacks, sometimes called "little strokes."

Anti-hormone drug, tamoxifen, has been effective in postponing recurrence of breast cancer in certain cases, according to a panel at the National Institutes of Health. It's most effective for women over 50 whose cancer had already spread at the time of surgery or radiation. The drug has fewer side effects than toxic chemotherapy.

Do-it-yourself "Pap" test is said to be as easy to use as a tampon and effective in detecting cervical cancer. Should be available next year.

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CHEWY LUNCHEX BROWNIES
The school year is upon us and as unbelievable as it may seem, it's time to pack those lunch boxes again. What to put in a lunch is always a dilemma, but a special treat from Mom tucked in amongst the sandwiches and chips is always a welcome surprise. These chewy brownies will delight young and old alike. This delicious treat will be your way of saying ... you care.

Chewy Lunchbox Brownies
(serves 12-16)
1 cup flour
1/2 cup butter
2 cups sugar
2 tsp. vanilla extract
1/2 tsp. salt
7 Tbsp. cocoa
4 eggs
1 cup nuts

Prepare a 9 x 13 inch baking pan with a non-stick vegetable cooking spray and preheat oven to 325 degrees. In a small saucepan or in a suitable bowl in your microwave oven melt butter and stir in cocoa. In a mixing bowl combine cocoa mixture with the sugar, vanilla and eggs. Mix well. Add salt and flour, mix until smooth. Stir in nuts. Bake at 325 degrees for 30 to 35 minutes.

STORING HINT
When these brownies have cooled I cut them into serving size pieces and put each one into small a sandwich bag. I leave a few out for "immediate munching" and tuck the others into a large plastic bag to protect them from freezer burn and toss them into the freezer. This allows me to have a special treat on hand that is pre-wrapped, always fresh and ready to go. Another good idea is to bake two batches at once. These go really fast.

She was also a Girls State delegate her junior year and was a member of the National Honor Society. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William F. Gomez of Glencoe.

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

Top-ranked Ruidoso to test stingy Wildcat defense

Friday night, September 5, the irresistible force meets the immovable object.

The irresistible force is the Ruidoso High School varsity football team's offense and the immovable object is host Lovington High School's defense.

Game time will be 7:30 p.m.

The top-ranked and defending AAA-division state champion Warriors dumped Artesia, 43-23, last week. Lovington stopped AAAA-division Hobbs, 7-0, in a defensive battle.

But the Warriors are strong on defense also.

They limited the Bulldogs to 148 yards total offense last week, and one of the Artesia touchdowns was scored on an intercepted pass.

"Lovington is a good football team," said Warrior head coach Cooper Henderson. "They use three different defensive formations and that has confused some people."

The Wildcats are small, but quick in both the offensive and defensive lines. Noseguard Aaron Ochoa is a 200-pounder with speed and quickness.

Lovington probably will use three formations on defense, but a 5-2-4 alignment may be the one they use the most.

However, Ruidoso's offense gained 447 yards against Artesia and looks for more of the same against Lovington.

Quarterback Jeff Willingham and split end Brian Davis teamed for two touchdown passes against Artesia.

Davis caught eight passes for 241 yards and Willingham completed 11 of 21 passes for 287 yards and three touchdowns. Willingham also scored two touchdowns and intercepted two passes.

The Warrior running game also was effective against Artesia, gaining 158 yards. Senior fullback Billy Harrison gained 70 yards to lead the attack.

Harrison and wingback Bubba Miller scored the other Warrior touchdowns against Artesia.

Ruidoso's offensive line blocked

well against Artesia. There are no returning starters from last season, but the players more than held their own against Artesia.

Tackles Jason Hill (205 pounds) and Gene Mowdy (230 pounds) and guard Carl Bowden (230 pounds) give the Warriors lots of size up front.

On defense, Willingham leads a defensive secondary that intercepted three passes against Artesia. Willingham had two of them.

Other standouts on defense are end Matt Evans, tackle Colby Day and middle linebacker Chuck Daniels.

Evans and Daniels are returning starters from last season.

Lovington only gained 170 yards total offense (while holding Hobbs to 131) last week, but the Wildcats were called for more than 100 yards

in penalties.

Robert Arreola is the Wildcat quarterback. Lovington might run 60 percent of the time and pass the other 40 percent.

Jerry Dodd, a returning starter from last season, is the fullback. He also starts at linebacker on defense.

Matt Alexander is the tailback and Shay Wise will be at halfback.

Arreola also is the Wildcat punter. He averaged 41.5 yards per punt last week.

Ochoa handles the Wildcat place-kicking and kickoffs.

"We feel good about our kicking game," said Wildcat head coach Jerry Brown. "In fact, we just missed two field goals against Hobbs for a couple of reasons."

Ruidoso can counter with a good punter (Willingham) and a good place kicker (Garret Henson).

Henson kicked a 36-yard field

goal and four extra points against Artesia.

Both Henderson and Brown think the kicking game and turnovers will be a key to how the game comes out.

"They've got a good kicking game, like we showed last week," Henderson said. "The game should feature two good kicking teams."



A coed tournament will be played the last weekend of this month at Eagle Creek Sports Complex.

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


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
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


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

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

Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE—Who's working in New Mexico?

Well, it turns out that in June of this year 620,000 of us were gainfully employed. Given the size of our population, that's not an insignificant number. It is, in fact, up 7,100 from just the previous month, and a big jump of 29,100 over June of last year.

We thought, on reading those numbers in material prepared by the Department of Economic Development and Tourism, that it might be pleasant to pass them along, instead of some of the gloomy figures that have occupied this space many times of late.

It is also encouraging to note that total employment has increased annually in our state since 1982. Admittedly, that growth has not always been by leaps and bounds. From 1982 to 1983, for instance, the improvement was only seven-tenths of one percent, but at least that is expansion of a sort. From 1983 to 1984, the growth was much better; that year totals rose by 6.4 percent. From 1984 to 1985, even though we lost about a thousand jobs in the mining sector that year, we still went up by 1.2 percent.

That upward trend appears to be continuing in 1986.

Along with the increase in the number of jobs held, our personal income keeps climbing. In 1985, we all, taken together, had personal income of \$15.5 billion, which was a 6.5 percent improvement over 1985. That's better than the increase for the nation as a whole for that same time period, which was 6.3 percent.

Since this particular step upward in the amount of bucks we have to spend came in a year in which the inflation rate did not eat it up entirely, we probably made a real net gain, for the first time in many years.

We can tell something about whether or not discretionary buying power continues to increase from the rate at which our citizens are presently spending. An indicator of that, income to the state from gross receipts tax, grew by 10 percent between May and June of this year. That June figure is also 3 percent larger than the same time last year, so there is a strong likelihood that, unless the bottom falls out this winter, we will chalk up more economic expansion for this year as a whole.

And now a note of some gloom, brought about by reading an article

in the *Wall Street Journal*.

This piece was on Microsoft Corporation, the company that supplies the software for so many personal computers all over the world that the business press says it is like a firm that has all contracts to supply engines to everyone in the automobile industry internationally.

That company was founded in a relatively small metropolis named Albuquerque, in north-central New Mexico.

Now that it is a multi-million dollar industry, it is no longer located there. Its headquarters are in Redmond, Washington, a suburb of Seattle. It follows logically, does it not, that the state of Washington gets most of the benefits from the existence of this "now-mammoth" firm? Certainly the state of New Mexico, which could have had them all, gets few.

And why was Albuquerque the place to which the founders of that company came? Because it was also the town in which much of the truly pioneering work on the development of personal computers was done. It would seem to follow from that fact that our state would have a privileged place when PC manufacturing turned into the gigantic industry it now is.

Somehow, however, as with the software the PCs made necessary, we here in New Mexico lost out. The manufacturers are located elsewhere, along with the payrolls they generate. We have left nothing but the memories.

In addition, we now scramble around to get and keep the plants that supply some parts for this industry, when there was once a very real chance for us to have had it all.

Those who want to see our state's economy expand, like both our gubernatorial candidates want us to believe it will, might do well to study what it was that went wrong when we had these magnificent opportunities in our hands. Why did we blow them?

If we come to know that, maybe we can avoid the same tragic errors in the future.





Other tracks wager on Futurity

Ruidoso Downs capped its 1986 racing season on Labor Day with the highest handle of the meeting as 9,636 fans wagered a total of \$1,023,559.


For the first time in the 28-year history of the All American Futurity, the classic was simulcast to four separate racetracks—in Idaho, Oklahoma, Louisiana and Minnesota.

Combined wagering at those facilities totaled \$202,351, with Canterbury Downs in Minnesota taking the lion's share of the pool. The Midwest track, which will feature its first quarter horse meet this month, wagered more than half the total at \$103,969. Wagering on the All American Futurity at Ruidoso Downs was \$184,232.

Ruidoso Downs ended its 67-day stand chalking up a total handle of \$31,079,040. That figure translated to a daily average of \$463,866, which was down 3.9 percent from 1985.

On the attendance front, the mountain track fared well. During the four-month season, 297,251 fans attended the track. The daily average—4,437—was less than two percent off the 1985 total.

The management of Ruidoso Downs was pleased with the end-of-the-season statistics in light of downward trends experienced by the racing industry in New Mexico and nationwide. Several tracks saw both their handle and attendance figures drop by more than 10 percent.
