



## Motorcyclists ready for festival of events

The Golden Aspen Rally got off to a roaring start early this week as motorcyclists from all around the country glided into Ruidoso.

The two- and three-wheeled vehicles became a familiar sight this week on Ruidoso roads as the rally entered its 17th year.

The rally runs through Saturday with organized events, although cyclists often remain in the village after the official rally has been completed.

The rally is headquartered at Carrizo Lodge, a few miles up Carrizo Creek Road on the way to the Inn of the Mountain Gods.

The Golden Aspen Rally registration booth opens each morning at 9 a.m., closes at 5 p.m. each evening early in the rally, and closes for 1986 at 7 p.m. Friday, so be sure to register in time.

A Hospitality Room at the lodge will be open from 10 a.m. to 9:30 p.m. each day of the rally except Saturday, when it closes at 7 p.m. The Christian Motorcyclists Association will have a non-denominational service today (Thursday), September 25, through Sunday, September 28, in the Hospitality Room at 8 a.m.

The rally trade show will open today and Friday at 1 p.m. and 11 a.m. Saturday. The show closes at 8 p.m. today and Friday and 7 p.m. Saturday.

The big event—the Motorcycle Parade—is Saturday morning. Motorcyclists will begin lining up at the parking lot of the Safeway on Mechem Drive in the Sierra Mall at 9:15 a.m. The 1986 Motorcycle Queen and King will lead the parade, which starts at 10 a.m., down Mechem and Sudderth drives.

# Embezzlement charges made

Raymond Reeves of Ruidoso is accused of embezzling \$13,700 from the Steve Harris Trust Fund, according to Ruidoso Police and Magistrate Court records.

The 51-year-old Reeves is free on \$25,000 bond following his arrest Monday, said Magistrate Judge J.R. "Jim" Wheeler, after conducting a first appearance hearing Tuesday.

Wheeler said he explained the charges and possible penalties during the hearing, and appointed public defender Gary Mitchell to represent Reeves, who filled out paperwork indicating he has no funds to hire his own attorney.

Reeves faces two third-degree felony charges, with possible penalties of three years in jail and a \$5,000 fine; and one fourth-degree felony charge with a possible penalty of 18 months in jail and a \$5,000 fine, explained Judge Wheeler.

On a form entitled "eligibility determination for indigent defense services," Reeves, former manager of The Barn, listed his

weekly salary at \$200, and claimed his only asset is a 1977 Cadillac. He listed a \$30,000 outstanding "blanket" note at the Ruidoso State Bank.

A telephone call to The Barn on Wednesday was answered by Gene Reeves, who identified himself as the new manager. Gene Reeves, Raymond Reeves' son, said he is operating The Barn until a new management group takes over next week.

Wheeler said Assistant District Attorney Harry Wilcox Jr., who approved the charges, will determine whether to present the case to a Lincoln County grand jury or to have the defendant appear for a preliminary hearing.

Ruidoso Police gathered information on funds missing from the Steve Harris Trust Fund after Charles Hawthorne, attorney for injured jockey Steve Harris, filed a complaint on his client's behalf on September 19. Please see **Embezzlement, page 2A**

## Judge supports Downs election petition

District Judge Sandra Grisham has ordered the Ruidoso Downs village clerk to verify signatures on a petition calling for an election to increase the size of the Ruidoso Downs Trustees from five to seven members.

The alternative writ of mandamus served on the trustees Wednesday charges the governing body to honor the petition, or show cause why they won't, at a Wednesday, October 1, hearing.

The petition was filed June 9 with

the village clerk by a group of Downs residents, but apparently never was acted upon. It seeks a special election polling voters on the question of increasing the size of the Downs Trustees to seven members, including the mayor. Presently, five members make up that group.

If the petition is found to contain the required number of signatures (five percent of the number of registered voters in the Downs), the trustees must pass a resolution

within 10 days calling for a special election on the question of "a change in the number of the governing body of the Village of Ruidoso Downs from five members, including the Mayor, to seven members, including the Mayor," according to the writ.

The election must take place within 90 days after adoption of the resolution, and if voters choose to increase the size of the governing body, the terms of all present trustees will expire 120 days after the election results are certified. A special election to elect "the required number of councilmen or trustees" must be scheduled within 120 days after certification of the election, according to state

statutes.

Whether Downs Mayor J.C. "Jake" Harris would be affected by such a special election apparently still is uncertain. A similar petition was filed and a special election called in 1984 that increased the size of the Ruidoso Village Council, but then-Mayor George White was not included in the election.

Gary Mitchell, attorney for the petitioners, was unavailable for comment as was Richard Hawthorne, Ruidoso Downs village attorney.

The hearing before Grisham is scheduled for 10:30 a.m. Wednesday, October 1, in the courtroom at the Ruidoso Police/Courts Complex.

## Water users may unite against Indian claims

Valley water users may unite to challenge claims on Pecos River Basin water rights by the Mescalero Apache Indian Tribe.

Following presentations by members of the State Engineer's Office staff, valley residents Mike Hurd and Calvin Wesch called on their neighbors to join them in forming an organization of water users from Ruidoso Downs to Riverside.

"As individuals we don't have the money to fight city hall," said Wesch, adding that valley residents between the Downs and Riverside have conflicting interests on one side with Roswell and on the other with Ruidoso, Ruidoso Downs and the Mescalero Apache Indians.

"The value of your lifestyle—everything—is on the line," noted Hurd.

Vickie L. Gabin, a special assistant attorney general for the Office of the State Engineer, Maryann Wasiolek of the hydrology section and legal assistant Ann Figueira told more than 100 people gathered in the gymnasium at Hondo High School of a court case involving the Mescalero Apache Indian Tribe, the U.S. Government and the State of New Mexico.

Gabin said the Mescalero Apache Tribe, during a five-week trial, presented plans for two projects that could deplete water for downstream users. She said the state contested the tribe's plan, and disputed testimony claiming the reservation was established in 1852.

The date the reservation was created will be the priority date for surface water, and the state presented testimony claiming the reservation was established in 1873.

Gabin said the judge didn't settle the question of when the reserva-

tion began, so water right holders with priority dates of between 1852 and 1873 will probably be challenged in upcoming hearings.

Gabin said the state has completed its work, and is now out of the case. She said she and other members of the State Engineer's staff are available to answer questions, but are constrained from giving legal advice.

"The state's had its turn, now it's your turn," said Gabin. She said packets containing a "notice of intent to participate" will be mailed to area water users by the third week in October. Anyone wishing to participate in the water case must fill out and return the notice of intent and appear for a pre-trial conference on November 24 at the federal courthouse in Roswell.

"If you don't show, you won't have another opportunity to participate," said Gabin. She said anyone not receiving the packet of

information by the third week in October should call her office at 827-6150.

The 22-volume transcript of testimony in the case between the state and the tribe will be available in most area libraries by next week, said Gabin. She recommended a careful study of the pre-trial summaries in those documents.

The upcoming proceedings are a continuation of the March and April trial, noted Gabin.

Audience members questioned Gabin on the Indian claims and project plans, and how much water the tribe can legally claim.

Wasiolek said Indian water rights have been determined by the Supreme Court to be that tribe's practically irrigable acreage, and that amount will be determined in this case by the court after hearing testimony from both sides.

The affidavit for arrest indicated that Ruidoso Police Detective Lanny Maddox "was advised by Ruidoso State Bank Executive Vice President Preston Isaacs that \$13,700 was withdrawn from account #8056080, a trust fund in the name of Steve Harris, without Steve Harris' knowledge."

Three counts of embezzlement were filed listing withdrawals of \$5,000 on July 22, \$6,700 on August 7 and \$2,000 on August 14. Police said Reeves signed for those withdrawals at the Ruidoso State Bank North Branch.

The affidavit for arrest states Reeves made the withdrawals "without written or verbal permission of Steve Harris and did convert this money to his own use with the fraudulent attempt to deprive Steve Harris."

A bank teller told police that Reeves wired \$5,000 to the Continental National Bank in El Paso, Texas, after making a withdrawal on August 14, according to police records. A representative of the El Paso bank confirmed receiving the funds in payment for a lease payment on The Barn, continued the report.

Travis Hausler, listed in Lincoln County records as owner of The Barn, was unavailable when contacted by telephone Tuesday and Wednesday. However his receptionist said Hausler, who declined to talk to The News, suggested calling The Barn with any questions on the operation of that business.

According to court records, Hausler filed for bankruptcy in 1984 in Western District Court in El Paso, Texas.

The Steve Harris Trust Fund was

established in June after Reeves; Erik Satie, then an employee of The Barn; and Ruidoso Downs Race Track publicity director Mike Fones organized a benefit to help Harris with expenses he's incurred since he was paralyzed in a riding accident.

Published reports promoting the benefit said The Barn would donate half the receipts for the night of the party and auction to the fund. People who attended the party recall "hundreds" of items being auctioned with proceeds to go to Harris.

A videotape of the party shows a huge crowd at the event, with so many items to auction that time ran out. Satie announced to the crowd that another auction would be conducted to sell all the donated items, and Reeves said on September 7 that the second auction was conducted.

Although Satie, who moved to Denver, Colorado, on July 5, said a list of the items donated and auctioned was made, that list couldn't be located early this month.

Hawthorne said bank records indicated the trust fund totaled \$24,181.50 at one time, but had dwindled to about \$10,000 when Harris contacted the bank early this month.

He said Satie and Reeves are listed as trustees on bank records.

When contacted Wednesday, Reeves said he didn't want to make any statement on the case.

Meanwhile, Harris, beneficiary of the fund, has not received any money from the trust account.

Hawthorne said Harris has requested the balance of the account, but the bank wants him to sign an indemnity agreement before releasing any more funds.

## Council OKs float expense, appoints new P&Z members

The Ruidoso Village Council, during a special meeting Monday, gave village administrators a blank check to build an Aspenfest float.

"I think we ought to have a load of mules right in front of us and let them guess which one's the council," quipped Village Councillor William A. "Dub" Holt.

Village manager Jim Hine said councillors set a \$750 limit on last year's float, recalling that it finally

cost much less.

Village Clerk Leon Eggleston said this year's parade entry should be very inexpensive, noting it will be built by village employee Larry Hill.

When questioned after the meeting as to exactly how much last year's float cost, Hine said the final figure was \$372. He said the amount approved was probably \$450 or so, rather than the \$750 mentioned in the meeting.

But according to minutes of the September 24, 1985 Village Council,

councillors limited the amount to be spent on the 1985 parade entry to \$300.

Also during the special meeting Mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr. appointed four members to the Planning and Zoning Commission.

J.D. James, Ellen Long, Jess Stinson and John White were named to the nine-member commission that has been plagued lately by resignations. Three members resigned during a recent meeting, and another submitted a letter of

resignation later.

The mayor said all four appointees had called him indicating their desire to serve on Planning and Zoning, and councillors unanimously approved his recommendations.

Davis noted the commission, while short several members, has always had enough members to make a quorum. He said two members are out of town for the next week.

## Property tax rate lessens after reappraisal

Property tax rates, distributed by the state early this week, dropped 46 percent in the Village of Ruidoso with similar drops in other areas of Lincoln County.

The new rates came as a result of a state-wide reappraisal that hiked the taxable value of some properties by several hundred percent. Legislation calling for the new valuations also set strict limits on the amount taxing authorities could collect, limiting any increases in spending to five percent.

"Ruidoso will no longer have the highest tax rate in the county," said village manager Jim Hine in reviewing the Certificate of Tax Rates Tuesday.

Ruidoso property owners, using the new tax rate, effective July 1, 1986 through June 30, 1987, will owe \$30.609 per \$1,000 taxable value of residential property, and \$32.432 per \$1,000 on non-residential property within Ruidoso village limits. The rate last fiscal year was \$56.753 per \$1,000 for both residential and non-residential.

Capitan, with a new tax rate of \$39.993 per \$1,000 residential and \$41.662 non-residential, has the highest property tax in Lincoln County, according to the certificate.

The document lists Ruidoso's residential taxable value as \$95,689,225 and non-residential tax-

able value as \$38,462,726. In 1985, prior to the reappraisal, those values were \$47,921,332 for residential and \$22,001,768 for non-residential.

Hine noted the increase in tax base is partly because of new buildings and property. He said the new rates reflect school bonds issued last year by the Ruidoso Municipal Schools.

Net taxable value of all property in Lincoln County is \$251,362,529, nearly twice last fiscal year's pre-reappraisal total of \$140,500,336.

Property taxes are apportioned for state debt service, county operational and county debt service, municipal operational and municipal debt service, school district operational, debt and capital improvement, Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Hospital and Carrizozo Health Center.

The state debt service is .75 per \$1,000 throughout the county.

All Lincoln County property owners, both in municipalities and outside village limits, are assessed county taxes of \$5.093/\$1,000 for residential property or \$6.106/\$1,000 for non-residential property. County operational is \$4.925 per \$1,000 for residential property and \$5.938 per \$1,000 for non-residential; and county debt service is \$0.168/\$1,000 for both residential and non-residential.

School District 3—Ruidoso Municipal Schools—receives \$8.427/\$1,000 for residential proper-

ty and \$8.591/\$1,000 for non-residential. \$7.087/\$1,000 of that goes to debt service, and \$1.072 residential and \$1,203 non-residential to capital improvements. The balance of the school district's share goes to operations.

School District 7—Carrizozo—receives \$8.956/\$1,000 residential and \$9.176 non-residential. Capitan school taxes are \$6.357/\$1,000 residential and \$6.340 non-residential.

Corona school district levies are \$2.081/\$1,000 residential and \$2.500/\$1,000 non-residential.

Taxpayers in Lincoln County pay \$1.808/\$1,000 residential and \$2.181/\$1,000 non-residential to RHVH and \$0.556/\$1,000 residential and \$0.671 non-residential to Carrizozo Health Center.

An update on the final preparations for the Aspen Festival was heard Wednesday at the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors monthly meeting.

Nancy Radziewicz was applauded by the members for her "tremendous accomplishment in the organization and follow through" on various festival projects. Radziewicz focused on parade activities, asking for "support from all merchants by allowing use of available street space" during that time. She also requested that businesses decorate their buildings and sponsor one of the many costume "characters" who will intermingle with street crowds.

Due to the difficulty in finding healthy people in their 90s to ride the chamber's grand marshal float, Duane Byars asked that it carry "early settlers," as well. All were in agreement.

Radziewicz broke down the \$2,500 of the lodgers' tax monies spent for advertising and promotion of the local fall activities, noting the three commercials produced and aired on KBIM regarding the mule races, Aspenfest and activities thereafter. Coverage was greatly expanded due to Public Service Announcement exposure time.

Mary LeCrone asked members' support in helping Cree Meadows Country Club.

"We are making every effort to keep it open to the public but we desperately need your support," she said. LeCrone said monthly operational costs run between \$40,000 to \$60,000 and there are only 152 current shareholders and 148

"dues-paying" members. A final decision on whether to make Cree a private membership club will be made sometime after the first of December, she reported.


## Signature quilt

### CATFISH STEW

1/2 cup chopped bacon	1/4 cup catsup
1 cup chopped onion	2 tbs. worcestershire sauce
1 (28 ounce) can tomatoes, undrained	1 tsp. salt
2 cups diced potatoes	1/4 tsp. pepper
1 cup water	1/4 tsp. whole thyme leaves
1 pound fresh or frozen catfish fillets, skinned and cut into 1 inch pieces	

In a large skillet or soup pot, fry bacon until it becomes transparent; add the chopped onion and saute until bacon is brown and onion is tender. Drain off excess grease from pan and add the remaining ingredients, except fish; cover and simmer for 30 minutes. Add fish; cover and simmer for an additional 15 minutes or until the potatoes are tender.

### A Word About The Apples

Since we are now over into the fall of the year, we might have just a word about the different varieties of apples which grow on the slopes of the White Mountain. Let us take first the Double Red Delicious, the world's favorite apple for eating out of the hand.

Although the horticulturists such as Luther Burbank, deserve a lot of credit for the development of outstanding varieties of apples, pears, peaches and other fruit, the great majority of them were brought out by Mother Nature herself.

Many years ago at the Stark Brothers Nurseries in Louisiana, Missouri, an apple tree sprung up by itself on a hillside. Nobody paid any attention to it until one day it bore apples and somebody just out of curiosity bit into one of them. It turned out to have a flavor of one apple in a thousand, sweet and vanilla-like.

This apple caught on and became the famous Stark's Delicious apple of years back, and which bear fruit in many of the orchards today, in our valleys.

Years after the arrival of the

Stark's Delicious, but still many years ago, a man out in the state of Washington noticed in his orchard a Stark's Delicious tree with a branch of bright red apples in early August. He could not believe his eyes, this branch of red apples while all the rest were still green as a gourd.

He got the Stark's people on the long distance phone and they told him to guard that branch with his life. They sent out some of the top horticulturists who took cuttings and buds. And from this came the Stark's Double Red Delicious, which replaced the old Stark's Delicious all over the nation.

When full ripe, this apple is a deep dark red with a flavor so rich that when you pass the orchard, you can almost taste these apples on their trees—so powerful is the flavor that is breathed out of the fully ripe apple into the autumn air.

Although different folks have their own favorite apples, the Stark's Double Red Delicious is generally the favorite for eating out of the hand and salads, it is also fine for cider, apple sauce and pies.

Later on we will go over some of the other varieties, and their outstanding qualities. Now is a good time to visit the orchards and find out first hand.

## Ruidoso to play pesky Rams

Ruidoso-Portales games have always been tough in the past and Friday night's (September 26) clash at Eastern New Mexico University Stadium in Portales should be no exception.

The Warriors are 3-1 on the season and ranked third in the Associated Press state AAA-division poll. Portales is 0-3 and unranked.

But past games between the two teams give an indication that Friday's 7:30 game should be a good one.

Last year Ruidoso was undefeated and top-ranked going into the game. But Portales gave the Warriors all they could handle before Ruidoso prevailed, 13-6.

The previous year the teams tied, 20-20, and in 1983, Portales won, 32-13.

"We've got to keep improving our team effort," Warrior head coach Cooper Henderson. "And we have to keep on playing with more enthusiasm."

The Warriors are coming off a 29-7 win over Tularosa last week. Previously, Ruidoso crushed Artesia, 43-23; lost to top-ranked Lovington, 28-19; and edged Goddard, 7-6.

Portales lost to defending state AAAA-division champion Clovis, 14-6; was edged by Deming, 7-6; and was smashed by Friona, Texas, 41-0, last week.

Ruidoso's offense and defense have steadily come together in the past two weeks since the Lovington game.

The Warriors have scored 98 points and given up 64 in four games. Ruidoso has gained 1,271 yards total offense and given up just 721 in those four games.

Quarterback Jeff Willingham has thrown six touchdown passes and run for five more.

Split end Brian Davis has caught five of Willingham's passes for touchdowns and also run back a kickoff for another touchdown.

Fullback Billy Harrison and tailbacks Kirk Taylor and Chuck Daniels have provided steady running for Ruidoso.

Wingback Bubba Miller, tight end Bryan Richardson and split end Garret Henson also are good receivers.

The Warriors have good size in both the offensive and defensive lines. Daniels also is a standout on defense at middle linebacker.

But Portales should not be taken lightly.

"They lost a couple of tough games," said Henderson about the Ram losses to Clovis and Deming. "In the Friona game, I think they had to start out a couple of drives from their two- and three-yard lines."

Michael Tillman is the likely Ram starter at quarterback. He is a 6-0, 150-pound sophomore.

Portales runs out of both the Wing-T and split-back veer

offenses.

The Rams run an eight-man line on defense, similar to what Lovington and Goddard ran effectively against the Warriors.

The Rams have good size in both the offensive and defensive lines.

Wayne Ashmore is the starting center at 200 pounds. Mark Gormley is a 200-pound tackle and Ray Aragon is a 195-pound guard.

Ashmore also starts on defense as do Aragon, 6-3, 210-pound Cress Lee and 6-1, 200-pound Varen Daugherty.


## Jv, frosh gridders to play

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# Planning and Zoning Commission welcomes new members

With four of six commissioners brand-new appointees, the Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission approved two variances and a replat during a special meeting Wednesday.

After cancelling two meetings scheduled last week for lack of a quorum, the nine-member group met Wednesday with the four members appointed Monday by Mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr.

Vice-chairman Pete Thompson presided in the absence of chairman David Smith. Thompson and Commissioner Marie Rooney, appointed to the commission

themselves less than three months ago, welcomed newcomers J.D. James, Jess Stinson, John White and Ellen Long.

Smith, Ken Carr and Eddie Nichols were not present for the special meeting.

Village enforcement officer Sandy Hall announced that commission secretary Melody Vuicich Allgood had submitted a letter of resignation. After both women on the commission declined nominations for secretary, Commissioner Stinson agreed to take the office.

Commissioners James and White were elected to serve with Thompson on the Extra-Territorial Zoning Commission (ET). Hall said the ET is concerned with the area that lies

within a one-mile radius of Ruidoso, and meets once a month.

"I missed the only meeting that I could of went to," remarked Thompson, one of P&Z's three representatives.

In regular business, the commission unanimously granted a variance requested by Waltraude C.U. Waters to replat lots 1 and 2, Block 1, White Mountain Heights into four lots.

Waters said each of the two lots has a cabin on it, and she wants to subdivide the less than quarter-acre plot into four lots of less than 1/10 of an acre each so that they can be sold separately.

Hall said a village ordinance requires that land to be divided be at

least an acre and be replatted into lots of at least a half acre.

Commissioners also unanimously approved Waters' replat request. Thompson noted the largest of the four lots is 3,000 square feet and the smallest 2,044 square feet.

Discussions included stipulating that no additions be made on the cabins, however the motion adopted included no such conditions.

Commissioners also unanimously

granted a 3.20-foot east lot line variance requested by Gwen Robbins to build a bedroom and bath on her home on lots D and E, redivision of Lot 74, Singing Pines Subdivision. An objection by an adjacent property owner was noted.

In discussions after regular business, members agreed to alternate alphabetically in representing P&Z at Ruidoso Village Council meetings.

"Y'all may have read in the

paper when we made headlines," remarked Thompson, explaining a request for a nine-foot lot line variance denied by P&Z and then approved by the council.

"There may have been a communications problem," said Thompson. He said the mayor told him he understood the variance was for one foot rather than the building to be within one foot of the adjacent property line.

## Sanders seeks House seat

Steve Sanders announced recently he is seeking the office of state representative from District 52 which encompasses Alto, Angus, Carrizozo, Corona, La Luz, Mescalero and Sierra County.



## Inside the Capitol

**SANTA FE**—Pete Hidalgo shouldn't worry too much about getting fired.

He's our state's Investment Officer, and he has gotten himself crosswise with Governor Tony Anaya over divestiture of stock in firms doing business in South Africa. Anaya wants to speed up that process, which he had to break a tie in the Investment Council to order, while Hidalgo wants to proceed more deliberately, because, he says, to do otherwise would violate the law. Hidalgo's views are supported by the Attorney General and the Legislative Finance Committee.

That's not what's going to keep him from getting fired, however. The reason that won't happen is that, in the first place, he was appointed to serve a term, which does not expire until June 30 of next year. Secondly, it's tough to get rid of an Investment Officer. The law says to dispose of one of those you have to go to as much work as you do to remove a regent of a university or a member of the Highway Commission.

Though Anaya gives every evidence of wanting to sack Hidalgo, his legal advisors must by now have told him how tough that is to do. In the few short weeks of the Anaya reign still remaining, the Governor isn't likely to want to demand a hearing before the Supreme Court just for the purpose of getting even with an Investment Officer who dragged his feet because he felt that is what the law instructed him to do.

In the harsh light of day, that move toward divestiture that Anaya led didn't turn out to have any more hard content than his call for sanctuary in

New Mexico for illegal entrants from certain Central American countries.

In both instances, he seems to have been more intent on impressing Jesse Jackson or otherwise making a name for himself than on solid accomplishment.

Watching the amount of stir and the quantity of attention generated by such hollow shams could easily give citizens the impression that all of state government is, from the top down, nothing but one big charade.

That's not true—but unfortunately, it's not entirely untrue either.

It's been hard to understand why certain of the Republicans in the legislature were so dead set against the establishment, even at this late date, of an interim legislative committee on taxes.

Nobody likes to talk about such unpleasant subjects, but if we are going to have to make some adjustments in our present tax system next year, we ought to be working on the fairest way to accomplish that at this time.

GOP legislators, as it turned out, were worried about something else, not just unpleasant.

Some of them feared if such a committee was established, like Smalley of Deming, newly restored to his job as president pro tem of the Senate, would almost surely name Senator Eddie Lopez of Santa Fe County to chair the committee. They figured Lopez, an old political pro, would use his new position to put the sleeve on lots of companies and associations looking for preferential tax treatment to raise funds for the Democratic party, to which he belongs. That money, some of them

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felt, would then be turned against Republican House members trying to win their way back to the Legislature in the November election.

Hence we won't have such a tax committee till after November 4—if we have it then.

This year's candidates for Land Commissioner are pretty far apart philosophically. Brant Calkin, for the Democrats, and Bill Humphries, for the Republicans, come at the job they both want from very different

directions.

Both, however, agree on one thing: Campaigning in New Mexico is not at all the burden they thought it might be before they tried it. Both say they have met hundreds of fine people they would otherwise not have known in process of touring the state to find votes for their cause.

As Calkin puts it, "Win or lose, I'm glad I had this opportunity. I come away full of admiration for most of the state's citizens, who appear to me to want what's best for New Mexico, even if that means some sacrifice on their party."

## Reporter's Round

"So, Mom, now that I'm not going to be around, what are you going to do with the rest of your life?" Stunned at his question, I looked into the concerned eyes of my 17-year-old son.

"Eric!" in a jokingly annoyed voice, was about all I could manage.

"I'm serious, Mom, what...?"

"Eric," I interrupted, "Will you get off my back?!" A large lump was quickly forming in my throat.

Head down, he quietly persisted, "Well, I think you should give it some serious thought."

We had spent the afternoon in our Houston apartment, practicing watch commands, verbal drill-basics and saluting the mirror. Finally, we had collapsed with laughter on the living room floor at the futile attempts of this lanky man/child with overgrown hands and feet, precariously trying to do an about-face in rubber-soled tennis shoes on the thick carpeting.

In just two weeks, he would leave for U.S. Naval Recruit Training Command in San Diego. We were just beginning to organize some of his "treasures" for storage, when the question hit.

No doubt every parent has either feared or felt the emotional impact of such a moment. Do mothers feel it more, having experienced the pain and pleasure of actual childbirth, or are we just allowed to more openly express our emotions? Do we single parents feel the loss more deeply—or housewives whose whole world has been their families? Is there any possible way to prepare for this inevitable time?

Eric's enthusiastic preparation last September reminded me of my own, 20 years before. From the small town of Jal, New Mexico, I too had joined the Navy "to see the world" and of course to do my patriotic duty in the "fight for right" against "communist oppression" in Vietnam. People did that in those days.

I remember my tender laughter at my mother's tears. I comforted her and shared my dreams of becoming an adventuresome photojournalist in exotic and faraway places. Though I did indeed receive the Naval training I requested, my journalist career was thwarted by the military's need of a good P.R. person during those controversial times. I would handle all civilian tours aboard N.A.S. Alameda, while fending off the angrily-abusive U.C. Berkeley students, who often surrounded the main gate.

I wasn't prepared for the heart-break of those years. I wasn't prepared for so much of what life was to offer, least of all—having been reared in a family of girls—my tiny son.

That last year, his 16th, had been especially difficult for us both. There had been many tears, much frustration and phenomenal growth. Finally, a great bond of mutual love, respect and friendship had formed. I had learned as much from him as he had from me. He had a dream, and it was time for me to let him go.

Those next months would sometimes seem unbearable. I would miss him terribly as I painfully grieved my way through the self-analysis, solitude and grief over the loss of my only child to adulthood.

I would end up here, in Ruidoso, perhaps not so "faraway" or "exotic," but full of some pretty terrific people who would patiently wait, until I was able to receive their many gifts.

At this point, I find it only fitting that I should dedicate this first column of "... the rest of my life," to my son, Eric—whose name I can now say without the "lump." With it is much love, and appreciation for the immeasurable richness and joy he has given me. May he, unlike his "Mom," always be the hero of his own life.





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


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# Motorcyclists will rally to Ruidoso

The Golden Aspen Motorcycle Rally festivities will begin in Ruidoso for the 17th year on September 24-27. The rally committee—president Con-

nie Brown, vice president Howard Brown and secretary Flo Maul, with directors Skip Maul and Adrian Matkin—have filled in a busy schedule

of events for the over 1,800 motorcycle enthusiasts expected to attend this year's rally.

Organizers expect the event to bring nearly \$1 million into Ruidoso and Lincoln County economies.

Motorcyclists from all over the U.S. and some foreign countries will begin arriving as early as Monday, September 22, to begin enjoying the beauty and hospitality of Ruidoso and Lincoln County. Many of the people attending have returned every year for the rally.

This year the rally will be headquartered at Carrizo Lodge on Carrizo Creek Road, with most, but not all, festivities centered there.

There will be a Poker Run every day beginning with Wednesday, September 24. The Early Bird Run will begin from Carrizo Lodge for breakfast at Swiss Chalet and Taster Freeze.

On Thursday there will be a Centennial Run visiting historical places around Ruidoso.

The Wild West Sombrero Poker Run will be Friday with a trip through Capitan and Lincoln to the Hondo School for a Mexican lunch and entertainment by the Hondo Fiesta Dancers. Or participants may eat in Lincoln during a tour there on their way back to Ruidoso.

Everybody will want to line up for the parade at 9 a.m. Saturday, beginning in the new Safeway parking lot on Mechem Drive.

A hospitality booth will be set up for the duration of the rally, hosted each day by a different group. Ruidoso Lodgers' Tax Committee, Ruidoso Chamber of Commerce, Ruidoso Valley Greeters and Spirit of Ruidoso will host the hospitality booth. The Lioness women will have a home bakery every day in the game room, adjacent to the hospitality booth. Movies and seminars will also be presented in the hospitality booth each day.

Harley-Davidson will be sponsoring a "Hog Party" from 8 to 10 p.m. Friday at Cree Meadows Country Club for


members only.

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# Parade will celebrate 100 years of Ruidoso

Anyone who loves a parade will want to find a good spot to watch the Aspenfest 1986 parade set to roll down Sudderth Drive at 11 a.m. Saturday, October 4.

A century of fun in Ruidoso, the theme of Aspenfest 1986, will be displayed in floats and displays in a parade that promises to be bigger and better than ever.

"This is going to be the parade of parades," said Nancy Radziewicz, Aspenfest chairman. Radziewicz and committee members Cal Cowden and Barbara Downs are gathering entries and putting together a giant centennial event they hope will be remembered for the next 100 years.

While the parade won't begin until 11 a.m., floats, bands, drill teams, color guards and the like will line up beginning at 9 a.m. for judging. Radziewicz said floats will be assigned spots along Mechem Drive and other entries will line up down Sudderth toward the Ruidoso Post Office.

But spectators won't have to wait until 11 a.m., since street festival food booths and some displays will open along Sudderth Drive by 10 a.m.

As a preview to the parade, a group of antique cars, owned by Ron MacWhorter, will be driven down Sudderth Drive from the Mechem Drive intersection to Safeway and then return to the Nottingham's parking lot about a half hour before the big event kicks off.

Parade marshals will be area residents who are 90 years old or older. Radziewicz said the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce is sponsoring an old-time trolley drawn by Belgian horses for the grand marshals to lead the parade.

"This year we're real lucky to have 15 units of Shriners," noted Radziewicz. She said Shriners from throughout the region will add color and variety to the parade. Among the groups will be a Shriner oriental band and a bagpipe ensemble.

Other musical groups already signed up for the parade include seven school bands and a colorful calliope on wheels.

"There'll be more in this parade for kids than we've ever had before," remarked Radziewicz, naming a whole list of well-known characters who will be on hand for the day.

Dumbo, Tweety Bird, Goofy, Pinocchio and Sylvester are scheduled for the parade, all sponsored by Brunell's. Bennett's will sponsor Snow White, George

Lore will be a gorilla and Lincoln Cablevision will present Cookie Monster.

Radziewicz said other businesses may sponsor "characters" for the parade and street festival for a \$50 fee. She said the character costumes, to be worn by Ruidoso High School students or the sponsors themselves, are being coordinated by Georgia Griffin.

Of course old favorites Smokey Bear, Woodsy Owl, Sparky the fire dog and McGruff will march in the parade, and Baskin-Robbins will present clowns. Radziewicz said McDonald's character Ronald McDonald or the Hamburglar may be in the parade.

Spectators will be entertained by a variety of performing groups, including precision rifle drill teams from Cannon and Holloman air force bases. Bands and other performers will stop at three predetermined locations for one-minute performances.

Float entries include the Greeters with a horse-drawn carriage, the Mountainmarchers, lots of politicians and many, many more.

Judges for the parade will set up in Midtown. Judges include Win Christian of the State Department of Education in Santa Fe who was formerly state director of music; J.J. Johnston, director of the Roswell Chamber of Commerce who also is a symphony musician; Dr. Bill Clark, director of bands at New Mexico State University in Las Cruces; Sondra Tye of KBIM Television in Roswell; and artist/sculptor Dave McGary of McGary Studios in Nogal.

Aspenfest planners expect a big crowd from throughout the region for the parade and other events.

"We've done more extensive advertising than we've ever done before," remarked Radziewicz, explaining that about \$2,500 in lodgers' tax funds was used for media advertising.

She said \$2,000 was spent on 300 television spots on KBIM Television in Roswell and \$500 for advertising on 10 radio stations. As a public service, Radziewicz said KBIM prepared promotional tapes to be shown in other areas, and contacted stations in Albuquerque as well as El Paso, Midland, Odessa and Lubbock, Texas.

The committee sent press packages with information on Aspenfest event to 50 newspapers, distributed 3,000 flyers and 150 posters.

Publicity will continue with an appearance on October 1 on a 30-minute television show on KBIM in Roswell,

"Good Morning New Mexico" with Sharon Bell.

Locals and visitors won't want to miss the centennial parade, presented as a follow-up to last year's 40th birthday celebration which commemorated the

incorporation of the Village of Ruidoso.

"Time goes fast when you're having fun," noted Cowden. And he, Radziewicz and Downs are sure everyone will have fun at this year's Aspenfest activities.

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
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

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
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# Street festival

## Midtown will buzz with celebration

A hot-air balloon, provided by Sonic Drive-ins, will be on display all day in the municipal parking lot near Not-

tingham's. Radziewicz recommends seeing the balloon early since it will have to descend if temperatures reach 72 degrees.

Cinderella pageant and Emergency Medical Services will have displays, as will a number of other organizations and businesses, said Radziewicz.

Festival-goers won't have any excuse if they go home hungry. Food vendors will sell popcorn, sweets, Mescalero Apache fry bread, hamburgers, hot dogs and soft drinks.

Ruidoso Gymnastics Association will sponsor a new addition to Aspenfest with a huge arts and crafts fair on the vacant lot across the street from the Gazebo Shopping Center. The arts and crafts fair will continue both Friday and Saturday, October 4-5.

Radziewicz and members of the Aspenfest Committee invite people of all ages to have fun at the festival.

"Don't miss it!" warned Radziewicz.




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
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
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
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
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# Fall colors highlight Aspenfest

The green of the forests surrounding Ruidoso are already beginning to turn to aspen yellow, maple red and oak bronze, and as the two major weekends of Aspenfest arrive, so will the best fall forest hues.

Foresters report that some damage has been done to the fall display, especially aspens which were stricken by blight, but the overwhelming spectacle of fall in the Sacramento Mountains promises to be nearly as colorful as it is each year.

The primary sites for viewing fall foliage near Ruidoso are near Mon Jeau Lookout and up Ski Run Road (State Highway 532). The large stands of aspens on Ski Run Road, which leads to Ski Apache, should provide some of the best viewing this year. The road is paved, and aspens can be viewed beginning after the Buck Mountain turnoff.

Just before that turnoff is the Oak Grove Campground where fall enthusiasts can see the colorful leaves of oak, locust, ash and maple trees. The facility is equipped with picnic tables, cooking grills and toilets, but no running water is available. There is no charge for use of the facility.

Mon Jeau is reached by Forest Road 117, which branches off early from Ski Run Road. Although aspen viewing in the area is not as good as in years past, the lookout provides an advantageous point overlooking other stands of deciduous trees highlighting the dark evergreens.

The road is unpaved and some areas are rough, so plan to drive slowly. A picnic site is just downhill from the lookout.

Mountainsides around Ruidoso also will see a change in color as leafy trees, especially scrub oak, are affected by the approach of winter.

The changing of the leaves on the mountains is a spectacular sight not to be missed in the Ruidoso area. It all provides an exciting backdrop to the festivities of fall in the mountains.

The event is scheduled for all day.

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
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

Tickets, priced at \$10, are available from members of the LCDW or by calling Elliott at 258-4455.

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
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# Cyclists will tackle Ski Run Road

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
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# Harmony Festival set for Oct. 11

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
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
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
