Sale plans for Sunland track nearly complete

United Tote, Inc., a leading national supplier of pari-mutuel wagering equipment, announced Saturday a \$3.5 million purchase agreement for Sunland Park Race Track.

United Tote will operate the track under a wholly owned subsidiary to be called Nuevo Sol Turf Club Inc. Sunland Park opened its 28th season on Saturday, featuring both thoroughbreds and quarter horses over an 89-day season that runs through May 3.

Under the transaction, which is scheduled to take effect Saturday, November 1, Sunland Park will be divested from Ruidoso-Sunland Inc., the firm that currently owns and operates both Sunland Park and Ruidoso Downs racetracks. Ruidoso-Sunland will continue to operate Ruidoso Downs.

The agreement is subject to a number of contingencies, including the approval of United Tote's board, the New Mexico State Racing Commission and Ruidoso-Sunland Inc. securing a financial package.

The sale is part of a refinancing plan for Ruidoso-Sunland, which requires additional financing to meet current and long-term obligations. The corporation purchased both race tracks from San Diego, California-based Fortuna Corp. in 1978.

Lloyd Shelhamer, president and chief operating officer of United Tote, said "both parties will continue the strong relationship that has existed between Ruidoso Downs and Sunland Park as regards horse racing."

"We're going to bring in a management team to look over the situation," Shelhamer added. "We don't anticipate any drastic changes." A new management team will be brought in when

Warriors tame timid Tigers

It was supposed to be the District 3-AAA opener, but all the Ruidoso High School varsity football team really got from host Hot Springs Friday night was a good workout.

The defending state AAA-division champions crushed Hot Springs, 57-0, in a "game" that was not even as close as the score indicated.

Ruidoso, now 6-1 overall, scored on eight of its nine offensive series. The only time the Warriors did not score was when placekicker Garret Henson missed a 59-yard field goal in the final quarter.

The Warriors gained 399 yards total offense and limited the Tigers to 114 yards total offense.

Ruidoso built up a 21-0 lead in 15 minutes of play using just 10 plays.

Fullback Billy Harrison, who gained 121 yards in just five carries, opened the Warrior scoring with a 13-yard run with 10:37 left in the opening quarter.

Harrison set up his own touchdown with a 32-yard run to the 15. Two plays later, he slashed up the middle for the touchdown. Henson's extra point kick was good and Ruidoso led, 7-0.

After holding the Tigers on the ensuing series, Ruidoso got a good punt return from Brian Davis to the Hot Springs 47.

Harrison then rambled 35 yards to the 12. Two plays later, he ran eight yards for the touchdown.

Henson's extra-point kick was again good and Ruidoso had a 14-0 edge with 4:40 left in the first quarter.

Early in the second quarter, the Warriors drove 68 yards in four plays for their third score.

Kirk Taylor had the big play in the drive, running 28 yards to the Tiger five.

From there, Willingham connected with Davis on a five-yard touchdown pass and Ruidoso led, 20-0. Henson's kick was good and Ruidoso led, 21-0, with 8:52 left in the second quarter.

On Hot Springs' next series, Bubba Miller intercepted a Tiger pass and returned it to the hosts' 19.

A penalty put the ball back at the 24, but Willingham then found Henson in the end zone for the touchdown with 6:32 left in the half.

The snap on the extra point attempt was high but holder Toby Rue hit Willingham with a pass for the two-point conversion.

The Warriors concluded their first half scoring with a 34-yard pass from Willingham to Davis.

Taylor set up the touchdown with a 31-yard run to the 34.

After Henson kicked the extra point, Ruidoso took a 36-0 lead into the lockerroom at halftime.

Chuck Daniels opened the second-half scoring with a three-yard run with 8:11 left in the third period.

Colby Day set up the touchdown by blocking a Tiger punt. Matt Evans recovered at the three, and Daniels scored on the next play.

Ruidoso concluded its scoring with a six-yard run by Taylor (his first touchdown of the season), and a four-yard pass from reserve

Water suit

Tribe's request to silence state engineer denied

Efforts by attorneys for the Mescalero Apache Tribe to silence the State Engineer's Office were squelched Thursday.

Vickie L. Gabin, special assistant attorney general, confirmed Friday that District Judge Pro Tempore LaFel Oman denied a motion by the tribe's attorneys which sought to restrain State Engineer's Office staff from discussing pending water rights litigation.

Judge Oman, a former appellate court judge, although not presently serving on a district bench, has been specially appointed to hear the water case involving the State of New Mexico and the United States of America on behalf of the Mescalero Apache Indian Tribe. Oman was unavailable for com-

ment on Friday. Attorneys for the Mescalero Indian Tribe filed a motion for a temporary restraining order and permanent injunction to silence employees of the Engineer's Office on the water case.

Leslie Seckler, attorney for the tribe, called statements attributed to employees of the Engineer's Office in two articles in The Ruidoso News "unethical" and "inflammatory," according to a story in the Albuquerque Journal.

"The Mescalero Apache tribe presently depends for income upon tribal recreation and tourist enterprises, particularly the Inn of the Mountain Gods, Ski Apache and hunting and camping activities which are particularly sensitive industries to public sentiment and publicity," the motion said. "Immediate and irreparable

harm will result if the State of New Mexico is not restrained from making statements to the public and the press on factual and legal issues in the case," continued the motion.

Upon denying the motion Judge Oman was quoted as saying he saw nothing improper about the statements.

"If there were any misstatements, I fail to see them, frankly, I'm not going to restrain them in any way," Judge Oman reportedly said.

The tribe's request apparently was the result of a public meeting at Hondo High School on September 24, when Gabin, along with Engineer's Office employees Ann Figueroa and Maryann Wasiolek, spoke to a group of about 100 Hondo Valley residents.

Gabin stressed in her remarks that she could not give legal advice,

but could explain what has happened so far in the litigation. She also explained what is to come in the complicated suit, and told members of the audience how they may become involved.

Gabin, who reportedly said she feels people have a right to understand certain facts, was pleased with the outcome of the hearing conducted in Judge Oman's office.

During the meeting in Hondo, Gabin, Figueroa and Wasiolek revealed details of the tribe's plans they said could divert about 91 percent of the surface water from the Rio Ruidoso.

A follow-up meeting last week ended with valley residents organizing to fight those claims by the Mescalero Apache Tribe. Mike Hurd of San Patricio and Calvin Wesch of Glencoe called the special organizational meeting.



Andrew Paul Haddix Jr. Services were held October nine at the First Christian Church for Andrew Paul Haddix Jr., who was called home by our Lord on October six.

The Reverend Ken Cole opened services by reciting verses from the twenty-eighth Psalm:

"The Lord is my strength and my shield; My heart trusts in him and I have been helped."

Selections from the gospel according to Saint Matthew were read by the Reverend Mr. Cole:

"I will liken him unto a wise man who built his house upon a rock." The Reverend Mr. Cole explained that Andy, as he was widely and affectionately known, had indeed built the house of his life upon the sure foundation of the word of Our Lord.

Prelude numbers were played on the piano by Karita Ratliff: "It Is Well With My Soul," "The Old Rugged Cross," and the postlude hymn was "How Great Thou Art."

"What A Friend We Have In Jesus" was sung by Helen Kilgore.

Masonic graveside services were held under the direction of acting Worshipful Master Ray Dean Carpenter, who said of Andy: "Our temporary loss is his eternal gain."

Acting chaplain Bob Chamberlin recited the prayer, a passage of which says:

"A tree cut down shall not cease. A branch thereof will sprout again."

Andy was a charter member of the recently organized Veterans of Foreign Wars Jerome Don Klein post 7072, but had not received his membership card.

At the graveside a delegation of the local V.F.W., headed by Commander V.F.W. Griffin, placed memorial buddy poppies on the casket, and gave the hand salute.

And Romeo Klein, for whose son the post is named, presented Andy's card to his mother, Mrs. Bessie Edmonson.

Besides Harry and Romeo, other D.S.V. members present were Merrill Peet, Pat Huffsmith, Dan Storm and Elwood Gradine, who also took part in the Masonic rites.

A Hero In Every Day Life

A historian writing about President Ulysses S. Grant, commander in chief of the Union forces in the Civil War, described how Grant finished his two volume memoirs while dying of cancer, said: "Here Grant accomplished an act of heroism far exceeding anything on the battlefield."

Andy received many decorations during his service as a Marine in World War II. Seriously disabled, when he got home he set about making a new start in life by doing leather work, in order to regain his skill and coordination. By faith and determination he became greatly skilled in leather work of all kinds, and then went into leather art, through which he became world famous.

Simon Benally, a Mescalero Apache Indian, was present at the ceremonies. Simon spoke of the fond friendship of the Mescaleros for Andy, and mentioned the leather work Andy had done for him and many other Mescaleros. From these people Andy drew much of the inspiration for his leather art.

He made all the creatures and much of the plant life of our White Mountain country come to life, and be known nationwide. This includes deer, squirrel, pinon jay, roadrunner, yucca blooms, coyote, rabbit, blue jay, the acorn from the oak brush, pine needles, and many many more of our favorite fellow dwellers in the land of the pinon and pine.

It was always a joy to visit Andy at his little shop near his home in the pines with the wood stove burning cheerfully and listen to his

wonderful stories of Australia and other places made to come alive by his mastery of dialect and his happy laughter.

Andy once said, "I thank God every day that I am blessed by living among these everlasting hills

among the finest people in the world."

During the last year or so, Andy struggled with arthritis which little by little stopped his beloved leather art.

And still last year he made a final effort and completed memorial plaques for Larry A. Ankham and Jeannette Browning on the occasion of their retirement from the forest service.

Andy will always be an inspiration to all of us, setting an example as a worthy son, father and husband and a friend in need and Christian gentleman. And we know that our Lord has said to Andy: "Well done, thou good and faithful servant."


Kountry Kwik features 'one-stop' shopping

Other communities to be highlighted in features include Albuquerque in October, Las Cruces in November and Santa Fe in December.



DEAR VOTERS:

I believe that the state legislature must make major changes in this state's Criminal Justice System.

First, my background in criminal justice. I served as a criminal prosecutor from 1975 to 1986. From 1980 to 1984, I was the district attorney for the 12th Judicial District. From 1983 to 1985, I served as president of the New Mexico District Attorney's Association, a position elected by the other district attorneys in the State.

As president of the District Attorney's Association, I worked hard with the legislature to get tougher laws on the books. I worked for training programs for prosecutors and against proposed laws that would reduce penalties for convicted criminals. I worked for laws against child pornography and I also worked with victim's rights organizations. In fact, I currently serve on the board of directors of the New Mexico Coalition for the prevention of Sexual Assault.

STIFFER PENALTIES: I will first work to increase the penalties for violent crimes and hard drugs. For instance, a person convicted of rape can serve as little as 1½ years. A person convicted of second degree murder can serve as little as three years. A person convicted of first degree-premeditated-capital murder is given a LIFE SENTENCE—and is back on the streets in 30 years (possibly 15 years of good behavior). In my book, 30 years is not a life sentence.

I intend to introduce laws which will dramatically increase the time violent criminals must serve. I will also introduce a law to make life imprisonment mean what it implies—the rest of a person's natural life.

GOOD TIME: In New Mexico every sentence handed out by a judge can be cut in half if the criminal's behavior is good while in prison. The people are being misled by the system into thinking a convicted criminal will be off the streets for the length of a judge's sentence. NOT SO! The criminal serves only one-half of the time the judge imposes.

I believe the sentence should be exactly what the judge said—not one-half of what he said. If a criminal's behavior in prison is not "good" he should be further punished—not rewarded for doing what he is supposed to do by getting out of prison early.

BAIL: No violent criminal should be allowed to post bond and remain out of jail. I will sponsor a law to keep these criminals in jail.

PLEA BARGAINING: When I was elected district attorney in 1980 the plea bargaining rate was in excess of 85 percent of all cases filed in the 12th Judicial District (Lincoln and Otero counties). Without increased staff we immediately reduced the rate to 15 percent.


I believe there needs to be tighter controls placed on plea bargaining by prosecutors. First, a plea bargain should NOT be entered into for violent crimes or hard drug offenses unless the prosecutor has first consulted with the victim. Second, the prosecutor should be required to certify to the court that he has consulted with the victim and the victim agrees, or if the victim does not agree, the prosecutor should be required to prove to the court that the plea bargain is necessary. Third, no plea bargain should be allowed for second or subsequent felony offenders.

These are just a few of the changes I advocate. If you believe as I do that there must be a major overhaul of our criminal justice system, then please vote for me, Steven Sanders for State Representative on November 4th. I look forward to discussing these and other problems with you in the coming weeks.

Judge asks service clubs' participation

The Ruidoso Service Club Council heard pleas from law enforcement agencies at their meeting Monday.

Judge John Cupp, on behalf of the Community Service Committee, asked for volunteers to serve on the committee. Cupp plans to approach each service club in the area to ask for volunteers on a rotating basis.

The committee has been meeting every Monday but, lately, interest has waned. Cupp believes by inviting one person from each service club to participate in the program, interest will be renewed.

According to Cupp, the Community Service program saved the community about \$17,800. The program sentences offenders to public service projects in lieu of fines or jail time. Offenders only may work at jobs that are for non-profit organizations.

Contributors to the program are Cupp, Judge Jim Wheeler, State Probation Office, Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs police departments and a reciprocal program with the Alamogordo and Roswell police departments.

Also during the meeting, Ruidoso Police Chief Richard Swenor explained a "yes" vote on Constitutional Amendment 5 would not take anything away from the school funds, but would put money back in-

to our economy since everything confiscated in a "drug bust" would convert back to the arresting agency.

In many instances there are cars, money, airplanes, trailers and numerous other "money items" confiscated. These goods could be used in Ruidoso and Lincoln County rather than going into state funds.

There are currently 47 states who have put this law into effect recently, Swenor reported.

It is possible a misconception of the amendment could "kill" it, stated Swenor, many people are afraid a "yes" vote will take money away from our school system.

"That just isn't so," he said. "School funds come out of the state general fund and would not be affected at all by voting yes. To keep confiscated goods right here, to be used by our police department, could be a tremendous boon to our economy," Swenor concluded.

In other business, the council heard:

-Aspenfest activities termed a huge success, with the biggest parade in the history of Ruidoso.

It was reported that the Chili Cookoff was so popular, cooks ran out of chili samples before 2 p.m.

The Ruidoso Noon Lions fed 650 band members. The bands competed in a marching band contest at the stadium.

-Fall events coming up include the Harmony Festival—75 to 100 singers were expected to perform in the Barbershop Quartets at Ruidoso Middle School Saturday.

-Wurstfest will be Friday through Sunday, October 17 to 19, featuring "Oompah" bands and Polish and Norwegian folk dancers. Authentic "old world" beer and wine will be imported for this event. If this event goes well this year, it will be nationally advertised next year, organizers said. Times for the performances will be from 5 p.m. to midnight Friday, October 17, 1 p.m. to midnight Saturday, October 18, and 1 to 5 p.m. Sunday, October 19.

-Ruidoso Cub Scouts will be selling popcorn very soon. They have just received 4,000 pounds to sell as a fund raiser.

-Sertoma Club will honor their "Man of the Year"—Wendell Chino—at a banquet at the Inn of the Mountain Gods. The banquet will begin at 7 p.m. Friday, October 24. Tickets can be purchased from any Sertoma Club member.

-Lanny Maddox ask the service clubs to consider a \$100 donation to Crime Stoppers, their funds are getting very low and the program has been very successful. Crime Stoppers has only one fund raiser a year and must, otherwise, depend on private donations.

Pink shop reopens after remodeling

The Ruidoso Hondo Valley Hospital Auxiliary was organized in June 1965, by Melba Frankum, who served as president until 1970.

The auxiliary had a "very meager" beginning with a group of dedicated, caring women who wanted to be of service to their community.

The original "Pink Shop" was a closet four by eight feet in size. The door was cut in half with a removable shelf over which they sold peanuts, gum, candy, cookies and at Christmas and Easter boxed chocolates suitable for gifts. They also had toilet articles needed by patients during their hospital stays.

Coffee was made in an eight cup pot and at times would run out, so someone would have to run home to get some more.

The original membership was very small but has now grown to more than 100 "Pink Ladies" and eight "Pink Gents."

The "little cubbyhole" has grown into a room adjoining the hospital waiting room and has served well for many years as the Pink Shop.

The Pink Shop has been remodeled and decorated. It has a pale pink glow, with new tables, chairs, snack bar and stools, an array of new gifts, toys, magazines, books

and cards, plus much more.



The "face lift" for the Pink Shop was financed by the Pink Ladies and Gents, with the help of many people who donated their time, money, materials, labor and services.

Schools consider lunch policy changes

The Ruidoso Board of Education discussed the possibilities of changing the lunch program at all schools and handled general business at their meeting Monday.

Superintendent Sid Miller reported he has been investigating several hot lunch alternatives.

Due to the problems involved with a satellite lunch program, Miller suggested that program not be considered.

The satellite program would have utilized one kitchen to prepare all meals, then transported the meals to the other schools for serving. There are times, in this program, when the prepared food could set for up to four hours between preparation and consumption.

Preliminary plans for hiring a cafeteria management firm are now being considered. The present cafeteria staff would be retained with the firm's manager overseeing them.

Hiring a firm would not raise the cost of lunches, school officials said.

Plans are still in the process and the school would have to go out for bids on the management position. Miller said it could take all spring to come to a decision.

A presentation on the "Quest" program was given by Texie Cole. The program is designed specifically for grades six, seven and eight, with emphasis on developing a close relationship between the school, family and

students, she said. "Skills for Adolescence" requires students to practice a wide variety of basic academic skills. The program also helps young people to acquire important social and coping skills. Cole said these are divided into five dimensions of skills that are critically important of adolescents to learn—thinking, feeling, decision making, communication and action.

"Killer Statements" and "Happy Grams" have been two parts of the program to achieve wide acceptance by the students. Anyone who uses a "Killer Statement" against someone must immediately think of two positive statements to counteract the negative.

"Happy Grams" are pats on the back for something accomplished, or love and admiration—very positive statements.

Students have and will be initiating service learning projects.

Cole thanked the Lion's Club for raising over \$6,000 to fund the project.

In other business, the board:

-Hired bus driver Olga Villarreal.

-Accepted Virginia Crawley's resignation.

-Hired Lillian Miranda.

-Agreed to change the board's meeting place to the Administration Office for the remainder of the year.

-Agreed to have an informal get together at each school during the day.

The first visit will be at noon Wednesday, November 12, at the

middle school. -Received an enrollment update from Mike Gladden. Enrollment at 20 days is three students short of projection. The usual trend in Ruidoso is to have an increase of students in the first 40 days of school.

-Received school audit approval.

-Authorized the superintendent or associate superintendent as official representative for the filing of Public Law 81-374 application. This authorizes application for funds that take the place of taxes for students living on non-taxable property.

-Announced the school board election is in February. There will be a two mill levy question at the same time.

-A discussion took place about baccalaureate services. Raymona McAdams recommended the services be dropped due to lack of interest and participation. She recommended discussions be opened with each church in the community to encourage them to hold their own services.

The board was hesitant to make a decision, and asked for input and ideas from the community on this, stressing that they will welcome comments on this subject before the next meeting November 12.

-Were reminded today (Monday) through Friday, October 13 to 17, is Drug Awareness Week. Programs have been planned, which will take place in the public meeting room at the high school.

Jeffers also reported that several travel editors and reporters will be in this area to investigate what Ruidoso and Lincoln County has to offer most tourists.



Chalk one up for freedom of information.

U.S. District Court Judge LaFel Oman denied a request by the Mescalero Apache Tribe for a gag order against the State Engineer's Office.

The request attempted to keep State Engineer's Office spokespeople from discussing a claim the tribe has made to divert 91 percent of the Rio Ruidoso.

Of course, the tribe has the right to make the claim, and the validity of the claim will be decided in court.

The gag order request said the tribe's "recreation and tourist enterprises" would suffer "immediate and irreparable harm" if the state officials are not restrained from making statements to the press.

That's probably true, but you can't have your cake and eat it, too. If you're going to make claims on water people are using, they have a right to know about it.

The water case is far from resolved, and we can expect a lot of legal maneuvering before all is said and done. Thank's to Judge Oman's ruling, those who will be affected at least will have a better chance of knowing what's going on.

The principle of freedom of information has been upheld.—DJP

Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE—Peter Schrag wrote a book called *The Decline of the WASP*. It isn't about the breeding habits of a tribe of insects.

For the purposes of the book, WASP is defined as "a person of Caucasoid, northern European, largely Protestant stock whose members are held by some to constitute the most privileged and influential group in U. S. society; broadly, a white U. S. citizen of non-specific ethnic or religious identity. W(hite) A(nglo)-S(axon) P(rotestant)."

Schrag, of course, wrote his book in 1970, so he was only discussing a theory—that those who had run this country for so long were in process of losing control. What he talked about theoretically then has become reality today, though lots of the coupon-clippers of impeccable lineage haven't yet caught on to the idea.

And what applies to the nation as whole, counts, in this part of the world, almost double.

When Harold Hodgkinson of the Institute for Educational Leadership did some demographic studies recently, he came up with facts like these:

"Differential fertility" today shapes the world of tomorrow.

What that sociologist's phrase means is that some groups of people have lots more babies than others do.

Just to stay even, any society has to average out at 2.1 children per family unit (or whatever kind of grouping happens to replace the family in the society of the moment). Those WASPs we spoke of aren't delivering their quota. The average Hispanic family, on the other hand, has 2.9 children per family unit, and the average Black family has 2.4.

You can see how that works out. As Hodgkinson puts it, "All these young people have to do is grow older, and we have the future."

—The age of various groups in the United States grows increasingly various. The average Anglo (as we call such people here) is 31 years old, the average Black 25, and the average Hispanic only 22.

As the author of this study points out, in case anybody is inclined to miss the point: "Age produces population momentum for minorities, as the typical Hispanic female is just moving into peak childbearing years, while the average white female is moving out of them."

That's why, by the year 2020, we will be a nation of 44 million Blacks (compared to 26.5 million today) and 47 million Hispanics, at least (compared to 14.6 million Hispanics today).

—All these facts will be dramatically increased in the Sunbelt states, to which we belong. Because the numbers cited are national averages, they must be adjusted upward sharply in this part of the world to make up for their relatively low application to the rest of the nation.

If you don't think that will affect local politics, the subject to which this column normally addresses itself, you fail to appreciate the fact that the essence of democracy is purely numerical. WASPs hold the good elective jobs where there are more of them; where there aren't, they have lost them, or eventually will.

At the moment, according to the Southwest Voter Registration Education Project, there are 586 elected officials in our state who

are of Hispanic heritage. That ranks us first in the nation in this regard. And that number has been increasing, in a period when Hispanics have declined as a percentage of our total population from 40.06 percent to 36.6 percent. As that decline reverses itself, the increase should start to increase at an increasing rate. That probably won't manifest itself dramatically in the northern counties, where Hispanics already make up 80 to 90 percent of registered voters, but it should begin to show itself quickly in the southern tier of New Mexico, where Hispanic registration ranges from a low of 16.5 percent to a high of 54 percent.

These facts are not likely to be graciously received by the kind of Good Old Boys who say, as they pop the top on another beer during the closing months of the Anaya era, "At least we won't have another one of them in the governor's chair for a damn long time."

Still, they are facts, whether any particular group resents them or not.

Besides, these persons with the red necks might remember they were making that same boast at just this point in the Jerry Apodaca term. So who was elected four years later? Man named Toney Anaya, of clear Hispanic extraction.

Reporter's Round

Our lifestyles change many times in our lives, usually they change slowly and we hardly notice as one slips away. Only by looking back, comparing what was, with what is or has become our life, do we see the change.

Sometimes the change is quick. Immediately you know nothing is going to be as it was before.

The changing seasons always make me aware of the changes that have occurred in my life. Now, as fall settles around us, part of me is acutely aware of the activity fall brings to the ranchers in Lincoln County.

For the past few weeks the ranchers have been calling and receiving calls from livestock buyers, talking about weight, volume, shrink, trucking and trying to make the best possible deal for the only marketable product they have. Livestock.

If they're raising calves, this will be their yearly income, one check to pay a year's worth of payments, one check to base next year's loans on.

Raising sheep will bring in two checks a year, one check for the wool, sheared in the spring and one check when the lambs are sold in the fall.

One sentence has been included in every conversation I've had with my ranching friends in the past month—"we're shipping" or "we're getting ready to ship." They know I understand what it means. Nothing is more important than getting the stock shipped with as little trauma as possible. Paid by the pound, a two-pound loss per animal could mean a loss of several thousand dollars as the animals cross the scales.

Preparations for shipping have been going on for weeks. Working pens and corrals have been checked and repairs made, negotiations with buyers and truckers have been entered into, hired "hands" have been located to help with the extra work (most "hands" are day workers, working from sunup to sundown, furnishing their own

horses for a set amount per day. Ranchers and ranchhands don't work for an hourly wage, they get a day wage. Nobody quits until the day's work is done, the livestock scales have been inspected by a state inspector and sealed to guarantee accuracy, and, of course, the stock has been looked after, tended, cared for, fed, doctored and nurtured for a year.

This was, once, a very big part of my life. The nippy, fall mornings flood my senses with memories of cowboys grabbing that last, hot cup of coffee before saddling their horses for the day's work.

Pulling on enough clothes to keep your ears, hands and toes warm, knowing those are the parts of you that will suffer the cold the most ... setting, with little protection, on your horse. My ears still ache when the weather turns, because of a time when they got too cold, gathering cattle.

Most of modern ranching is done in pickup trucks now, but working the stock still requires a horse, there are just some places only a horse can go.

Everyone works, from the smallest child to the old timers, no one is exempt, everyone is capable of doing a job, of some kind, with the expected result being self worth and feeling a part of the unity that holds families together.

It would be a sad thing to lose this facet of American life. Not only because it is a heritage our country was built on, but because, if we lose our ranchers and farmers where will OUR food come from. Will we import? If so, from where? Or, will our amber waves of grain be owned by foreign companies who will set prices higher than we can imagine.

Have our values shifted so drastically that we have lost all track of what the American Dream started out to be, a land of plenty, with enough food for all. The most advanced technology will not feed us if the ranchers and farmers move to town. That is becoming a reality.






