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## Warriors tie up Tigers

Ruidoso High School's varsity football team found its first meeting against an AAAA-division team profitable as the Warriors crushed visiting Los Lunas, 34-12, Friday night in the Homecoming game.

Ruidoso, now 7-1 on the overall season, showed a potent offense and defense against the pass-happy Tigers. The Warriors led, 20-6, at halftime, and both of Los Lunas' scores came after turnovers.

But Warrior head coach Cooper Henderson was not completely pleased with his team's performance.

"Our pass defense was pretty good," he said, "both in sacking the quarterback and covering their receivers. Our kicking game was better with both punt returns and kickoff returns showing improvement."

"But we weren't happy with the number of turnovers (five fumbles and two interceptions) and penalties we had."

Ruidoso scored on its first possession of the game.

After Los Lunas failed to make a first down on the opening series, the Tigers punted.

Ruidoso's Brian Davis caught the ball and sprinted down the left sidelines 60 yards for the touchdown.

Garret Henson's extra-point kick was good and Ruidoso had a 7-0 advantage with 10:17 left in the opening quarter.

After Los Lunas again failed to move the ball, the Warriors took over on their own 33.

However, a Los Lunas player intercepted Jeff Willingham's pass and the Tigers took over on the Ruidoso 44.

From there, Jay Nunn broke through on a counter play and rambled 44 yards for the touchdown.

The extra-point kick was blocked and Ruidoso still led, 7-6.

However, the Warriors came right back and scored on the ensuing series.

Ruidoso drove 65 yards in six plays for its second touchdown.

Fullback Billy Harrison blasted 18 yards up the middle for the

score. Henson's extra-point kick was again good and Ruidoso led, 14-6, with 5:57 left in the opening quarter.

Ruidoso added its third touchdown after defensive tackle Colby Day blocked a Tiger punt at the Los Lunas 19.

Harrison got two yards, and then junior Matt Griego raced 12 yards to the five.

From there Griego carried the ball three straight times, going over from the one for the touchdown.

Ruidoso took a 20-6 lead into the lockerroom at halftime.

The Warriors drove 48 yards in six plays for their fourth touchdown in the third quarter.

Willingham found Davis for 20 yards and a touchdown to finish the drive with 3:48 left in the third quarter.

It was Willingham's 15th touchdown pass of the season.

Willingham completed two passes to Henson during the drive and Harrison ran well.

But another turnover led to the

## Airport construction gets go-ahead

A replacement airport for the Ruidoso Municipal Airport is one giant step closer with Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) funding assured through the first phase.

"There should be ringing of bells, tooting of horns and we should set off a cannon," said Sierra Blanca Airport Commission Chairman Ken Nosker Thursday as that body authorized airport engineers to advertise for bids to begin construction on the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport (SBRA).

"It appears that we can see the light at the end of the tunnel," remarked airport engineer Earl Cook of Leedshill-Herkenhoff, Inc.

Cook said the FAA is presently completing a review of design plans and bid documents, the last step before soliciting bids on the earthwork portion of the project.

Contract administrator Fred Heckman detailed a schedule calling for earthwork to begin on January 26, 1987, and be completed by July 16, and accepted by August 1. He said it is imperative that PAC 2 funding be secured by March 15, 1987.

Heckman said if all goes as scheduled the Ruidoso Municipal Airport, said to be the most dangerous in the Southwest, can be closed on November 30 or December 1, 1987. He added by that time planes should be able to land at the SBRA on Fort Stanton mesa during daylight hours.

By February 15, 1988, the SBRA should be completely operational, said Heckman. He added Ruidoso's investment of the over \$2.6 million

value of the current airport will be needed for PAC 2.

"Mayor (Lloyd L.) Davis made a commitment to Melugin (of the FAA) that the \$2.676 million will be forthcoming after the first of the year," said Heckman.

The commission announced Thursday that Roma Eckland has been selected winner of a contest to design a logo and signage for the SBRA. Eckland will be awarded the \$500 prize at a later meeting.

"All the presentations were beautifully done," said Jeanie Morriss, one of the judges for the contest. She displayed Eckland's designs which feature pine trees, mountains and a setting sun encircled by the words Sierra Blanca Regional Airport.

Eckland designed signage using native rock and redwood with the logo to be sandblasted into the dry wood.

"We're real happy that you've chosen a local citizen," remarked Nosker.

In other regular business Thursday, the commission:

—Discussed where advertisements for bids should be placed, and heard a report from the commission attorney, Steve Sanders, as to how bidders can be prequalified.

—Authorized Cook to proceed with equipping the well at the airport site. Cook said contractors will be required to furnish their own water, but will have the option of purchasing water from SBAC.

—Instructed Sanders to include a clause in the construction contract giving preference to area residents for possible jobs on the \$6 million project. "I want to try to put the people here to work," said Commis-

sioner Conrad Buchanan.

—Approved paying five purchase orders:

—Authorized water engineers to file a permit for temporary water use during construction.

—Authorized Heckman to request reimbursement from the FAA for monies already spent and about to be expended that are eligible for the 90 percent grant.

—Went into executive session to discuss water rights.

## Ruidoso News captures writing, design awards

The Ruidoso News gathered five awards and James K. Green, owner of the Artesia Daily Press, was inducted into the New Mexico Press Association Hall of Fame during the association's annual convention.

Green, father of Ruidoso News publisher Ken Green, was named the 1986 inductee during a luncheon Saturday at the Press Association convention in Santa Fe. Green's newspaper career stretched some 50 years with West Texas, Colorado and New Mexico newspapers. His career was highlighted in 1970 when he became owner of the Artesia Daily Press. He acquired the Deming Headlight (which his son, Walt, publishes) and the Deming Graphic at the same time.

The Ruidoso News staff received four first-place awards and the newspaper was awarded a second-place award for Creative Design and Typography among weekly newspapers of its size.

News Sports Writer Gary Brown captured two first-place awards—for Sports Writing and Feature Writing. News Reporter Frankie Jarrell was awarded a first-place award for Column Writing.

News Editor Darrell J. Pehr captured first place in Editorial Writing.

The competition takes place each year among New Mexico newspapers. Other papers in The News' category competing included The Taos News, Rio Grande Sun, Quay County Sun, Santa Fe Reporter, Las Cruces Bulletin and Valencia County News-Bulletin. Entries this year were judged by members of the Idaho Press Association.

# Personnel plan to save village \$ and employees

A personnel reorganization plan recently implemented by the Village of Ruidoso will result in fewer employees and savings to the village of \$160,391 a year, according to information assistant village manager Frank Potter distributed to village councilors last Tuesday.

Although 139 of the village's 141 employees netted "upward pay adjustments" in the new plan, the overall annual payroll is down from \$2,627,380 in October 1985 to \$2,466,889 this October, according to Potter's report.

Potter said the plan, drafted over a year's period, is working really well, even better than he expected. He said the village will save from \$3,000 to \$4,000 on new hires since they will all be hired at entry level.

Ruidoso employed 115 people in 1980-81 (see box), and that number hit a high of 155 in October 1985. Municipal employees number 141 today. Potter expects to reduce the size of village staff even more through attrition.

Many departments will remain the same size. Following are those sections with the number of employees listed:

Departments with changes in the number of employees include Financial Administration up from seven to seven and a half, the Police down from 35 to 33, Planning and Zoning down from two and a half to one and a half, Building Inspection down from one and a half to one, Street down from 24 to 19, Engineering up from one to two, Senior Citizens down from two to one, Building Maintenance down from two to one, Cemetery up from none to one, Solid Water down from 13 to 11, Water down from 18 to 15 and Wastewater down from eight to seven.

The Police Department remains the largest village department in spite of cutting out one lieutenant position and one communications-dispatch officer position. The annual Police Department budget in 1985 was \$580,308, and is now at \$546,072.

The second largest of the village's 20 departments is the Street Department, down to 19 employees from last year's 24. The Street Department has an annual payroll of \$360,688, down from October 1985's yearly payroll total of \$391,008.

Besides the positions eliminated in the Police Department, Potter said a secretary, field officer, sign officer, senior citizens assistant, carpenter, truck driver, service technician, architectural technician and three laborer positions have been cut.

The law also takes away incentives of teachers to remain in the profession or become career teachers because it allows a teacher to be fired even when his performance is SATISFACTORY or BETTER THAN SATISFACTORY, if the administration wants a teacher with a "DIFFERENT" background. The background does not have to be better, just different. Thus a teacher with a masters degree and 15 years' experience could be fired to get a teacher with either more or LESS education or experience. This is wrong.

Good teachers provide our children with the opportunity for a good education which provides our children with the tools necessary to secure a good job.

**STATE GOVERNMENT:** We must make state government more responsive to business, farms and ranches. To do this we must first reduce and eliminate unnecessary paperwork, regulations and unfair taxes.

**TAXES:** We cannot expect economic growth when the legislature's current approach is to try and tax our people and our businesses out of existence. Now the Warriors will have the week off before hosting defending district and state AAA-division champion Hot Springs Saturday, October 25.



"Our defense played real well. It kept us in the ballgame in the first half."


In volleyball action, Capitan's varsity lost to Estancia in four games on the winners' court.

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





## Capitan gets \$25,000 for plans from Community Development Grant

Capitan Village Trustees heard reports on the Village Master Plan and water plan at their meeting Monday.

Mayor Benny Coker announced a Community Development Block Grant for \$25,000 has been awarded to Capitan.

The grant monies will be used for a Village Master Plan incorporating a Water Master Plan. Both master plans are currently being prepared. Aerial photos have been slowed down because of weather conditions, it was learned.

Jack Atkins, Atkins Engineering, told trustees Kelly Beavers, Dave Strickland and Norm Renfro the final engineering plans for the new well, east of town, are nearly complete and will be sent to the State

Granting Agency within the week. Upon approval from that agency, the proposal for bids can be let, with an expected acceptance date around December 1.

"If everything goes along, weather permitting, the well could be ready by May of 1987," Atkins said.

—Approved a Resolution of Consent for transfer of liabilities and assets for Paul Crown, Cablevision.

—Agreed to apply for "recreational money" for a new ball park. Application must be made before October 17. The former Little League park will not be available now because of a change of ownership on the land.

—Agreed to file a notice of intent to participate in the water suit involving the United States (representing the Mescalero Apache Tribe) versus the State of New Mexico.

The board discussed selling advance tickets at a discounted price for the Stampede's Saturday performances and the barbecue. This will be finalized at the February meeting.


August 11 to 15 were the dates chosen for the Lincoln County Fair.

# Water use priority dates could be crucial in Mescalero water rights suit

The priority date on water claimed by the Mescalero Apache Indian Tribe could hinge on the date the Mescalero Apache Reservation was established.

In litigation involving the United States on behalf of the Mescalero Apache Indians versus the State of New Mexico, the tribe is claiming more than 13,600 acre-feet of water that the State says amounts to 91 percent of the Rio Ruidoso as it leaves reservation land.

Tribal President Wendell Chino testified during five weeks of hearings last spring that the reservation was established on the aboriginal homeland and territory of the Mescalero Apache Tribe. He said his people were nomadic, living off the land from the Gulf of Mexico to Tucson, Arizona, in pre-reservation

days. Claims by the tribe to aboriginal or immemorial rights to water on the reservation land were not recognized by the court, and the tribe has thus claimed a priority date of 1852.

President Chino, who could not be reached for further comment, testified to a change in lifestyle for his people that accompanied the Treaty of 1852 between the United States and the Mescalero Apache Indians.

"We have had to adapt and adopt new living patterns, such as subsistence farming, rather than depending upon the natural fruits and berries of the land," said Chino.

Attorneys for the tribe presented evidence to show the reservation was established, reserving all rights to the tribe, with the Treaty

of 1852. Chino noted the treaty was between equals "if not sovereign nations."

"This treaty confirmed federal control over the Mescalero Apache, pledged the federal government to survey the boundaries of a reservation, and promised a permanent homeland to the Mescalero Apache Tribe," testified experts for the tribe.

The State claims in pre-trial documents that the reservation was not established until the boundaries were set by various executive orders from 1873 to 1883.

That document also disputes the Indian's homeland claims which they say gives them dominion over all natural resources occurring on the reservation. The State claims that historically the rights reserved to the tribe were very limited.

"The unpleasant historical fact is that the reservation was established far less with the Indians' in-

terests in mind than those of the surrounding non-Indian settlers," according to the State's pre-trial brief.

Attorneys for the Indians relate how federal policy was implemented in 1852 to restrict New Mexico Indian tribes to reserved areas and encourage members to a more sedentary lifestyle. Plans to settle Mescalero Apaches around Fort Stanton were disrupted by the Civil War and settlement around the Fort Stanton area by non-Indians.

When reservation boundaries were finally established from 1873 to 1883 it was "consistent with Federal Indian policy and the parties' intentions in 1852," claim attorneys for the Indians.

They further claim that "Indian treaties must be broadly interpreted in the Indians' favor," and in the sense they would have been understood by the Indians

themselves. The State claims the Treaty of 1852 was a peace treaty, not a treaty reserving any rights to the tribe.

"In fact, at that time and for years afterward, the Mescaleros ranged from Chihuahua in the south to the Canadian River in the north. There was no manifestation in 1853 of any intent, either by the federal government or the Mescaleros that the Mescaleros had, from that date, exclusive rights within any ascertainable boundaries," claim attorneys for the State.

They further claim that any reserved water rights "must be limited by a tribe's needs."

The State describes the Mescalero Apache Reservation as blessed with lush alpine forests, meadows, and rich, rolling grasslands, all of which support abundant populations of big game and livestock.

Attorneys for the State find

claims by the Indians to water for recreation use to be consistent with the tribe's "demonstrated needs," citing a growing dependence on recreation.

Both sides in the case cite case after case to prove points raised in the pre-trial document and the 22 volumes of testimony.

Vickie Gabin, assistant attorney general for the State Engineer's Office, told a group of Hondo Valley residents that Judge Oman has said he'll make a determination after hearing testimony early next year. Gabin said the State of New Mexico presented its case last spring, and water users will have their chance to speak during the upcoming trial.

A pre-trial hearing is set for November 24, in Roswell, and any user may enter the case by filing necessary documents before that hearing. The governing bodies of Ruidoso and Capitan have voted to enter the case.

# School 'sniff dog' program unveiled

"The students here in Ruidoso are really concerned about drugs in the schools," Ed Britt, of Britt Detective Agency, told concerned parents and faculty at the Ruidoso Schools' Drug Awareness Program Thursday.

Britt and his assistant, Al Wiley, had spent two days in the Ruidoso Schools with their narcotic detection dogs, T.J. and Goldie.

The time had been used to introduce the students to the dogs and the narcotic detection program beginning in all the schools. Also, it provided an opportunity for Britt to meet with students and discuss

drug problems in the schools.

"The kids feel good about being actively involved in anti-drug programs," Britt continued. "They know who's on drugs and they're concerned about their friends. It is a serious problem in all the schools."

After meeting with students and inspecting the schools, Britt estimated that 10 to 25 percent of the students in Ruidoso are involved with drugs, in one form or another.

Britt has no doubt he and his dogs will remove drugs from this community, stressing that students will need to be offered alternatives, such as drug- and alcohol-free dances, parties and sports ac-

tivities. He believes school recreational areas should remain open in the summer months, to give students a place to go and things to do. He offers numerous drug programs to assist the young people in getting off drugs and remaining drug free.

"It isn't enough to find drugs and throw them away, they'll just get some more," he said. "We need to put some bite into it. Dealers need to be convicted. Students that persist in using and refuse drug programs need to be dealt with sternly. Adults who buy alcohol for minors need to be convicted. You have to let them know you're serious."

Drugs can be hidden almost anywhere, Britt reported. Drugs

have been found in ink pens, doorknobs and markers, he said. School inspections will be done from once a month to 12 times a month. Students and faculty will never know when they are coming. Everything from lockers to cars will be inspected. Home inspections will be made "free of charge" if a parent requests it.

Britt is a former narcotics law enforcement officer. After seeing more and more young people on drugs he decided to try to do something "really positive" about getting them off drugs and into drug free programs. His agency now has five "sniff" dogs traveling all over New Mexico with "excellent results" in each area.

# Is Ruidoso down?

## Statistics show town's pulse is still strong

"Ruidoso seems to be faring better than some other communities," said assistant village manager Frank Potter Friday.

Potter, who is feeling particularly optimistic about Ruidoso, distributed a report (see box) to village councillors Tuesday that contained some good news about the size and cost of village government, as well as figures on fiscal growth that indicate village revenues may be "leveling off" rather than falling drastically.

"It looks good to me," noted Potter, adding he hopes the statistics will help lift the air of gloom that he's noticed among some village residents.

"It (the report) shows that there were more people here this summer than last, but they spent a little less money," remarked Potter. He said gross receipts tax figures indicate spending was down only about five percent, while some New Mexico towns are experiencing sales tax declines as high as 23 percent.

The number of water connections have increased steadily from 4,855 in 1980-81 to the 1985-86 total of 6,683, indicating a steady growth in the number of occupied residences.

Sewer connections, too, have shown a year-by-year increase from 2,372 in 1980-81 to 3,704 in 1985-86. But those numbers could indicate sewer services are becoming available to more residences, rather than an increase in occupancy.

Sales tax figures have fluctuated from a low of \$848,628 in 1980-81 to a high of \$1,692,860 in 1983-84, and dropped in 1984-85 to \$1,658,941, and again in 1985-86 to \$1,575,977.

Village Manager Jim Hine explained that the amounts listed are for the village's share of sales tax, not the total amount collected by merchants and remitted to the state. He said in 1980-81 the municipal share was one percent, or one cent on the dollar, but that was raised in 1981-82 to 1.35 percent where it has remained.

Franchise tax collections, at \$105,460 in 1980-81, hit a high of \$238,615 in 1984-85, and declined to \$225,205 in the fiscal year that end-

ed June 30, 1986. Hine said that tax has remained at two percent, except for the cable company which pays a three percent franchise tax.

Gasoline tax, which has risen steadily from 1980-81's \$79,034 to the past year's \$126,094, is collected at a rate of one cent per gallon, said Hine.

He noted that lodgers' tax collections, at \$83,500 in 1980-81, and up to \$110,659 in 1984-85, had a change in rate last year from two to three percent. Lodgers' taxes collected in 1985-86, the first year at the new three percent rate, were \$145,239.

Some indicators fluctuated over the past years hitting highs in 1983-84 for sales and cigarette taxes, building valuations and building permit fees, court fines, water sales receipts and number of gallons of water pumped.

In his compilation of statistics Potter related growth figures in revenues to growth in the size of village government (see related story). "It really looks like we are kind of leveling off," stressed Potter Friday.

## Inside the Capitol

**SANTA FE**—Don't look on that sale of Sunland Park racetrack as a done deal.

The media were right to note that it requires the approval of the board of directors of United 1bte, Inc., the would-be buyer; of Ruidoso-Sunland, Inc., the would-be seller; and of the New Mexico Racing Commission. They failed to mention, however, that it will also take the blessing of the Alessio family, doing business as Fortuna Corporation, who still hold \$7 million worth of paper on the deal, not to mention a series of banks whom Ruidoso-Sunland is into for something on the order of an additional \$6 million, give or take a buck or two. All those folks, you might say, have a decided interest in this matter.

Others who are also intrigued by the potential sale, though more or less from the sidelines, include the holders of something like \$6 million in debentures and those entitled to something like \$6 million in deferred stock.

Add it all up, and Ruidoso-Sunland is on the hook for around \$19 million—which is a lot more than the cost of the oats and hay needed to fuel the racehorses.

And nowhere in the deal with Fortuna is there a clause requiring that seller to accept prepayment on the note, if the selling corporation decides that is not in its best interest.

It's just possible that could be the decision, since Fortuna and Ruidoso-Sunland are engaged in a matter of arbitration, not to be decided till almost the end of this year, over the fact that a sales barn on the property was destroyed without the approval of the ultimate owners. That hearing could possibly result in the whole operation being turned back to the Alessios.

It's relatively easy to borrow money when times are good. Trouble is, however, that lenders always

seem to want you to pay the money back, even when it may turn out to be remarkably inconvenient for the payer.

Someone asked if Jack Stahl, Republican candidate for lieutenant governor, wasn't a part of that whole big racetrack maneuvering.

The answer would have to be "yes and no."

He doesn't appear to be or to have been on the board of Ruidoso-Sunland, which is a party to all this coming and going, but he has at least been a member of the board of directors of the Jockey Club, which is pretty much responsible for naming those who are on the board of Ruidoso-Sunland.

It's safe to say he's probably more than a disinterested observer.

Sometimes it's tough to understand the folks in state government.

The 1986 Legislature, after hearing evidence that the Corrections Department needed a highly qualified individual who could program and monitor the sophisticated computerized system that controls much of the penitentiary at Santa Fe, voted to provide funding to hire such a person. That Legislature went home somewhere around the middle of February, but no such person was on the payroll as of last week.

Why not? That's what the Legislative Finance Committee tried to find out when it wrote to the boss of the state's personnel system to say that it is a waste of time to try to hire somebody with fewer qualifications than the job calls for, who will work for less money than the Legislature authorized.

How special a person is required? Well, according to those who are thoroughly conversant with this whole mix-up from the very beginning, no other prison in the nation has a computer which is entrusted with

## Editorial

What a fall we've had!

From the mule races to last weekend's Wurstfest, and everything between, fall in Ruidoso is an action-packed time of year.

The action started less than two weeks after the end of the Ruidoso Downs Race Track's summer season. The Ruidoso Muleskinners' racing mules came, raced, then headed out of town only to be replaced two weeks later by the Golden Aspen Rally motorcycle festival.

A thousand or more motorcyclists and their machines toured the area, did things motorcyclists do, paraded down Sudderth Drive, then left with a rumble and a roar.

The roar had not completely faded when Aspenfest weekend was upon us, with a spectacular parade, event-filled Street Festival, rhythmic bluegrass festival and hot Chili Cookoff. The weekend was capped by the Sunday morning running of the first annual White Mountain Challenge Cup bicycle race up Ski Run Road to Ski Apache Resort.

The very next weekend saw barbershop quartets and choruses from several towns visit Ruidoso, and lend their voices in a melody of music in the Ruidoso Harmony Festival. The "sound of music" in Ruidoso continued last weekend with the lively sounds of polka and "oompah" bands during the Wurstfest.

And the fall activity will continue. The Aspenfest Square Dance Jamboree swings into the Carrizo Lodge Saturday, October 25. Dancing begins at 7:30 p.m. The next weekend will see the Halloween Carnival, October 31, sponsored by the Spirit of Ruidoso.

Later, in November, the Inn of the Mountain Gods will be the site of the drama and excitement of the Miss New Mexico USA Pageant November 18-22.

So fall events will just keep on coming, making 1986 one of the most event-filled falls on record. Many events are scheduled to repeat yearly, so it looks like fall will become nearly as event-filled a time in these mountains as winter and summer.

Fall in Ruidoso. It's a great time to enjoy our village, and getting even better.—DJP

I first had the opportunity to visit Ruidoso four years ago and immediately fell in love with the friendly people, the climate, and all that makes your community such a wonderful resort.

Since I am a college history professor, I was particularly intrigued with the history of your native Americans and the Lincoln County War. My first visit just whetted my appetite, and I bought several books about the local area and people to enjoy back in Alabama. Fortunately one was by your local author, Eve Ball.

In the *Days of Victoria* I found one of the best accounts of the Indians' side of history that I had ever read. When my wife and I returned to your city the following year, I was determined to meet this lady. Therefore, without any invitation or appointment, I knocked on her front door. After my brief introduction, Mrs. Ball invited us into her home and entertained us for hours that day as well as the next.

I left her home with memories and stories that I will always cherish. As we left the last time, Mrs. Ball asked me to bring my children to see her the next time we all came to New Mexico.

When I learned of her death, I had not been able to keep my promise. But I faithfully retold my sons her narratives, and we had all enjoyed her work, *indeh*. Therefore, when we finally were able to return to Ruidoso this summer, I wanted to take my children by the Ball house so that I could show them where this wonderful lady had allowed the Mescalero Apaches drink from her well and where Dakiugle had planted her willow tree.

But to my utter surprise and shock, I found her house gone, and the town had done, as far as I could see, nothing to commemorate this extraordinary lady.

I feel that this a horrible oversight that needs to be corrected. For years you had a treasure in your town. Eve Ball's works are known throughout the United States not only by academicians but also by anyone interested in the history of our native Americans. The Ball house would have been a wonderful place for a museum, and it is shameful that the town allowed it to be destroyed.

During our visit this summer, we were constantly reminded of Ruidoso's future plans—a larger airport, more condominiums, etc. As you look toward these goals, do not forget to remember your past. Most towns would appreciate your opportunity. I hope and pray you will.




