## Ruidoso skunks Cobre

Everything seems to be coming together for the Ruidoso High School varsity football team just in time.

The defending state AAA-division champions "warmed up" for the Friday, October 31, game with Silver City by dumping visiting Cobre, 43-0, Friday night in a District 3-AAA game.

"I think it was one of our better overall efforts of the season," said Warrior head coach Cooper Henderson. "We were real pleased with our effort."

Ruidoso rolled up 415 yards total offense, the most the team has had since the opening game of the season against Artesia.

Senior tailback Kirk Taylor got the Warriors winging with three first-half touchdowns. He rushed for 68 yards in 11 carries, most of it coming in the first half. Fullback Billy Harrison also rushed for 68 yards.

Taylor's first touchdown came on a 10-yard run with 8:59 left in the first quarter.

His score culminated a 49-yard drive in four plays.

A 39-yard pass down the left sidelines from quarterback Jeff Willingham to Bubba Miller put the ball on the 10.

On the next play, Taylor ran in

for the score. Garret Henson kicked the extra point and Ruidoso led, 7-0.

Taylor added his second touchdown on a brilliant 45-yard run in which he broke three tackles and raced into the end zone.

Henson again added the extra point and Ruidoso led, 14-0, with 2:30 left in the first quarter.

Ruidoso came right back on its ensuing series to score again.

The Warriors drove 47 yards in five plays with Taylor banging over from the four for the score.

The big play in the drive was a 21-yard pass from Willingham to split end Brian Davis which put the ball on the 11.

Three plays later, Taylor went over for the score.

Willingham scored on a run for the two-point conversion and Ruidoso took a 22-0 lead at halftime.

Ruidoso added its fourth touchdown on a 10-yard option run by Davis with 6:27 left in the third quarter.

As with the first touchdown, Miller set up the score, running 40 yards to the 10.

Henson's extra point kick was good, and Ruidoso had a 29-0 advantage.

Ruidoso struck again two minutes later, as Willingham hit Davis with a 22-yard touchdown pass.

Henson's kick was good and Ruidoso led, 36-0, with 4:14 left in

the third period.

The Warriors' final touchdown came in the fourth quarter on a 31-yard run by Colby Day, better known for his excellent play at defensive tackle.

Jef Sherwood set up the touchdown with an interception.

Henson added the extra point and Ruidoso finalized the score at 43-0.


Of Ruidoso's 415-yard offensive total, 270 were by rushing and 145 were via the air route. Cobre had just 127 total offensive yards.

"It was a hard-hitting game," Henderson commented. "We had a few players bruised up, but I think we may have come out on the better end in that category too."

Now the Warriors will look forward to Friday's game with defending district co-champion Silver City at W.D. Horton Stadium.

It will be a clash of the state's top two teams of last season. Ruidoso won the state championship game, 21-19, but Silver City took the regular-season battle, 17-13.

## Village awaits water word

Village water attorney Neil Stillinger expects a long-awaited answer this week on an amended offer of judgment on the Eagle Creek well fields.

After months of waiting, Stillinger said the State Engineer rejected language stipulated by the Village of Ruidoso when it accepted the state's amended offer. The Ruidoso Village Council, after an executive session two weeks ago, accepted a newly amended offer from the state.

Both amended offers have been for 60 percent of the announced find, or 5,648 acre-feet per year. But disagreements have been over priority dates and whether or not the water basin is self-contained.

## Educators take stands on constitutional amendments

School administrators and members of school boards who are members of the New Mexico School Board Association or the Superintendent's Association have taken stands on proposed constitutional amendments that will affect public education.

The two professional organizations favor Amendment 1, authorizing the state Legislature to establish procedures for the recall of local school board members. The groups support removing the local school superintendent from the process, and placing recall elections in the hands of the county clerk.

The associations also favor proposed Amendment 3, allowing for single-member districts for electing municipal, county and school officials. The amendment would require members of local governing boards to be residents of the district or political subdivision from which they are elected or appointed.

Amendment 4, to allow the state to deposit public monies in credit unions is also favored by the two

groups.

The constitution currently requires that all fines and forfeitures go to the state's current school fund to be used for public education, but the two professional educator organizations favor Amendment 5, allowing law enforcement agencies to keep property confiscated or forfeited as the result of drug busts.

The associations oppose proposed amendments 7 and 8.

Amendment 7, according to information from the groups, provides for changes in the structure and duties of the state Board of Education.

"The board would be increased to 15 members—the 10 members currently elected would be retained but five members appointed by the governor would be added," according to an explanation provided by the organizations.

"The new board would take on the additional responsibility of public school finance, a function now handled by the Department of Finance and Administration's Of-

fice of Education," continued the explanation.

Ruidoso Superintendent of Schools Sid Miller said Friday an article in Thursday's edition of The News contained a misleading description of Amendment 7.

State Representative Ben Hall reportedly said the proposed amendment actually calls for combining the elected 10-member board of education with an appointed five-member Department of Education.

Hall said the elected officials set policy while the appointed group controls school monies.

But Miller said Friday school budgets are handled through the Department of Finance and Administration (DFA) Office of Education. He said the director of the Office of Education reports to the DFA secretary who reports directly to the governor.

Miller said presently there is no appointed five-member Department of Education.

Although Miller said he agrees with combining the management

and financial functions under one board, he, along with members of the two education associations, opposes the provision allowing the governor to appoint five members to the board.

"We don't feel the governor should have any control over it," said Miller.

Amendment 8, the other proposal the administrators oppose, calls for increasing the board of regents for the University of New Mexico from five to seven members.

The groups recommend voting "yes" on amendments 10 and 11.

Amendment 10 would amend the separation of powers clause of the Constitution to allow the Legislature to create an agency within the executive branch of government to handle workmen's compensation claims, according to information from the associations.

Amendment 11 would allow state executive officials to seek reelection to a second four-year term.

**A Few Words About Teddy Roosevelt**  
Last time I told you a little about one of my birthday mates, Judy Beavers. Today let us have a few words about Teddy Roosevelt.

**Teddy Roosevelt**  
Theodore Roosevelt, affectionately known as "Teddy" was born October twenty-seven, 1858, and became our twenty-sixth president. He was a frail child, but by strength of will and faith built himself into a man of such mental and physical energy that the entire world stood in amazement.

As a young man, he went for his health to a ranch in South Dakota. Born an Easterner, he became a westerner, heart and soul. He had a deep fondness for horses once saying:

"Surely the horses will be in Heaven."

His patriotism knew no bounds, and he raised the United States to the position of a world power. One of his accomplishments, which seemed impossible at the time, was the construction of the Panama Canal.

His patriotism inspired the entire nation to "Dream greatly and to make the dreams come true." He became known world wide as "The

Typical American" and he was beloved not only in America but throughout the world.

Teddy was a great favorite among children. I wrote him a letter from Juneau, Alaska, and he sent me an answer. This was in 1917, and I still have the letter.

Let us send up a prayer of thanks for Teddy Roosevelt.

During the days approaching my birthday, I am more and more thankful for God's blessings; and I hope you will celebrate with me.

**Indian Summer Arrives**  
It has been mid-Indian Summer for quite a while now in the higher reaches of our mountain land; and early Indian Summer has arrived here in Stormvale today, October twenty-six.

This morning the sun shone over Sunrise Mountain, turning the pinons, pines and cedars on the hilltop into trees pulsating gold and crimson fire, and the sun's rays into the vale were shafts of rainbow colors. The white frost melted into the air in a light haze through which the sun casts an orange and crimson glow over the hills and vales across the valley. While the hillsides to the south all changed from dark purple to lavender to lilac while you watched, trying not to miss any of this early morning welcome of the awakening world to the day. Through the veils of changing airy hues, now appears a round hilltop of oak brush colors—all velvet soft—cherry red, orange, yellow, amber, purple and bronze—cheer-

ing the early morn with gladsome glow.

Among the countless blessings of my birthday, a special one is that it arrives in that little season-within-a-season that falls all at once after the first solid frost and the earth and sky is transformed into something very close to Heaven.

Every year the Indian Summer rapture holds me stronger in its loving spell, and I remember things farther and farther back in my infancy, until it seems I have memories of before I was born:

Once upon an Indian Summer Day

While in my sacred bed  
I lay a-dreaming  
I dreamt that there beside  
The Valdez Bay  
I would soon behold God's  
Indian Summer colors gleaming.

**Indian Summer Afternoon**  
Now it is one hour after high noon, and suddenly you feel a pleasant change in the day, as the afternoon begins to work its magic on the Indian Summer day.

The haze, which is a mark of this little season, has cast all the knolls, meadows, mesas, hills and mountains to the west into shadowy forms of every shade of purple and lilac—lighter close at hand and darker farther up and away.

All to the east is a different world with the air clear as crystal, and the light blue of the sky stretching on and on to the end of space. Just south of the house, beyond the flag which floats above the hill horizon, the oak brush shines bright as if lit by a special light. Then on up to the east you see a hilltop of oak brush colors, all soft and velvet behind a blue mist, and farther on still up the way, you can barely make out the colors of the oak brush and the shapes of the evergreens all dim upon the mountains all looking to be formed of every shade of purple air.

As if to prove that this shadowy world of hazy mountains to the west is indeed a bit of our mountain land, the tall Lombardy poplars, out in full gold, stand like fiery giant candle flames, growing smaller and smaller higher up and farther west—shining like cheerful guides along the valley way through a hazy purple dusk or early half night in mid-afternoon.

Here you are at the turning point of the bright land to the east and the dreamy world to the west, with "The best of both worlds" of an Indian Summer Day. And your soul is filled with a peace, a contentment and thankfulness that "passes all understanding" and you are close to all your loved ones in Heaven.

## Warrior spikers lose to Tigers; will play SC, Cobre this weekend

Ruidoso High School's varsity volleyball team lost a chance to tie for the District 3-AAA lead when the Warriors fell to visiting Hot Springs in four games Saturday.

Ruidoso won the first game in thrilling fashion, 15-12. However, the Tigers came back to take 15-5, 15-5, and 15-12 victories for the match win.

Ruidoso is now 4-2 in district action and 11-3 overall.

The first game was perhaps the most exciting of the season.

Ruidoso trailed, 3-2, but scored eight straight points for a 10-3 advantage.

Hot Springs refused to quit, however, and rallied to tie the score, 12-12.

However, 5-9 senior Gladden got a spike kill to give Ruidoso a 13-12 advantage and the Warriors put the game away.

Hot Springs came storming back in the second game, overcoming a 3-1 Warrior edge in the early going.

The Tigers scored 11 straight points for a 12-3 lead and took the victory.

It was more of the same in the third game as Hot Springs overcame a 4-3 Warrior edge and went on for the victory.

In the fourth and final game, Hot Springs jumped off to a 10-3 advantage before the Warriors came back and cut the margin to 14-12.

Dari Stierwalt did an excellent job of serving in the Warrior comeback.

# Capitan gridders rally for win over Lions

Mike Lunn's extra-point kick was good, and Capitan led, 21-20, with 2:03 left in the third period.

Santa Rosa came back to go ahead on a 13-yard run by Andrew Sena. The score finished an 80-yard drive in eight plays.

A conversion run was stopped short, but the Lions led, 26-21, with 11:34 remaining in the final quarter.

Then Capitan made its winning drive, going 66 yards in 16 plays.

Padilla found Doug Eckland with a four-yard scoring pass to give the Tigers the lead.

Padilla threw a two-point conversion pass to Shanks and the Tigers had their final 29-26 advantage.

Santa Rosa started out the game

like the fifth-ranked AA-division team was going to roll over the Tigers.

The Lions used their single-wing offense to near perfection in the first half, going on a 70-yard drive which ended in Bruce Lopez's four-yard run for a touchdown.

A pass for the extra point failed, but Santa Rosa had a 6-0 lead with 6:13 left in the first quarter.

Santa Rosa scored again on a 28-yard pass from Bruce Lopez to Herb Tenorio. Lopez ran for the two-point conversion and Santa Rosa had a 14-0 lead with 11:11 left in the first half.

The Tigers hit the scoreboard for the first time on a 46-yard pass from Padilla to Jay Eldridge.

A pass for the two-point conversion failed and Capitan trailed, 14-6, with 8:34 left in the half.

The Lions scored on the opening kickoff of the second half.

Serna took the kick and charged down the center of the field 92 yards

for the touchdown. A run for the conversion failed, but Santa Rosa led, 20-6.

From then on, it was Capitan's game, however.

"Yes, I definitely felt it was one of our best games this season," said Tiger head coach Zale Woodward. "Our passing game worked well and our offensive line did an outstanding job of blocking."

"It was Padilla's best game of the season."

Padilla completed nine of 18 passes for 173 yards, three touchdowns and a two-point conversion.



## School board considers senior trip to Mazatlan

The Capitan Board of Education reviewed a proposed trip by the senior class and dispensed with various business items at their meeting October 16.

Will Griggs, representing the senior class, outlined a plan for the class to go to Mazatlan, Mexico, on their senior class trip. A travel agency has offered a package trip for seniors. An expected 3,000 seniors from several states will be going to Mazatlan on their class trips next spring.

Board members expressed their concern about relations with Mexico and the problems that could arise endangering any U.S. citizens in Mexico.

Five stipulations were added to the tentative approval for the trip. —Approved a fencing bid from R and R Fence Company, Ruidoso Downs, for \$3,106.83.

—Approved trips to Oklahoma and Kansas for Capitan's Future Homemakers of America and Future Farmers of America.

—Heard a review of the yearbook by Sherry Ford.

—Accepted the Teacher's Termination Policy.

—Amended the Bus/Teacher Snow Day Policy to read, "If all buses are running and a teacher is unable to get to school it will be charged as a personal day. Teachers on a route in which buses are unable to run will be excused."

—Denied transportation to non-school-enrolled children, due to insurance.

—Hired Carol Turner as the aid for Special Education classes.

—Adopted the Personnel Handbook.

—Heard a report from Jim French on the property exchange and construction of the proposed athletic field. French stated the state highway commission met on September 18 and approved the cooperative agreement in the amount of \$92,755 or 60 percent of the cost of the work.

village announced the discovery of the Eagle Creek well field, called a "spectacular 100-year water find," a long process was set in motion that has included tests, a claim for 100 percent of the find, extended negotiations surrounding the State Engineer's offer of judgment and protests by some citizens.

Stillinger said he was led to believe by at least one member of the State Engineer's Office staff that the village's stipulation to the amended offer would be accepted. That stipulation was for the judgment to declare that the Eagle Creek wells have no hydrologic connection with the Hondo or Pecos stream systems.

"There was a division of opinion in the State Engineer's Office," said Stillinger. He said after the state rejected the village's stipulation the council accepted the judgment with new language which in effect reserves a final determination on several questions.

Stillinger said the amended offer lists 1984 priority dates for each well, but if, in fact Ruidoso owns part of an old (1913) railroad permit, a much earlier priority could apply to part of the well field.

"It could turn out that some substantial part of that field could have a 1913 priority call," noted

Stillinger.

He said the amended offer allows the village, in case of a priority call, to litigate the question as to whether or not the field is connected to the Hondo Stream System or any of its tributaries.

Final decision on the matter of priority would not be resolved until there is a call on the village's priority rights, said Stillinger. He added the court would then decide if the basin is connected to another stream system or not.

If there never is a priority call or an administration on delivery to Texas, the village can continue to pump up to 5,648 acre-feet of water a year from those wells, said Stillinger.

The question of water to Texas is over a case that is currently in the U.S. Supreme Court. In that case Texas has claimed that New Mexico owes its neighbor 340,100 acre-feet of water.

If the Supreme Court upholds a ruling by the special master in the case, then New Mexico will have to repay the water by delivering 34,100 acre-feet for the next 10 years to the Texas border.

That decision could have an adverse impact on all water rights junior to 1947, the benchmark date in the case, explained Stillinger.

While Stillinger said he would have liked language the village pro-

posed better than what was accepted, the village still has the use of 5,648 acre-feet of water "until such time someone making a priority call can ultimately establish that the wells effect the stream flows in the Hondo River and its tributaries."

Meanwhile, village councillors Tuesday will review plans to equip the second two wells and build a pipeline to get the Eagle Creek water into the village distribution system.

And a group of citizens continue to question hydrologic tests establishing the amount of water in the well field and the contract with the engineers who coordinated the exploration and well drilling.

Atkins and Landfair, the engineers on the project, were paid \$912,929 in March 1985, based on 60 percent of the find as determined by pumping tests.

Even as the village has utilized the water over the past two summers, the citizens group has pushed for an independent hydrologist to confirm the huge water find.

A spokesman for the group said they question part of the contract and the validity of the pump tests. He said they'll continue to push for some answers from the Village Council.

# Hunger Day is a chance to aid Lincoln County's hungry

Hunger—a grave life for millions throughout the world, is an ominous presence right here in Lincoln County.

Lincoln County Food Bank, the Lincoln County Commissioners and local governing bodies in county municipalities have declared Thursday, October 30, as Lincoln County Hunger Day.

Many restaurants and grocery stores will participate in hunger day by donating food or money to the food bank. Donations of food, supplies and money from in-

dividuals are also being encouraged by members of the food bank.

More than 500 county families are needy enough to meet strict federal income guidelines to receive federal commodities distributed free each quarter. These families receive five pounds of flour or two pounds of cheese.

Other area families, in spite of efforts to provide the basic needs of members through jobs and hard work, survive on food stamps, according to information provided by the food bank.

The hungry in Lincoln County have an additional burden, according to food bank chairman Phyllis Boverie.

Since Lincoln County, the poor of this county must travel to Alamogordo, Roswell or Santa Rosa to apply for help, said Boverie.

After learning through her church of a need for transportation to those food stamp offices, Boverie said she then learned that applicants have to wait from three

weeks to a month to get an appointment at those offices. If all paperwork is in order at that appointment, then it takes three more weeks to be certified and receive the desperately needed food stamps, she said.

Presently emergency needs are met through an emergency food closet sponsored by the Ministerial Alliance. The food bank, a non-profit organization, is distributing donations and food gleaned through that closet.

The food bank already has glean-

ed potatoes and apples, and donated several tons of those donated potatoes to the Las Cruces Food Bank for onions. Since the Lincoln County Economic Opportunity Board has told the food bank that the needs of the county increase by as much as a third when the race track is closed, the volunteers are working to get food, cash and supplies stored for the winter ahead.

The food bank also is recruiting volunteers to help gather, sort and distribute food.

"It's not an easy undertaking, but

there are people in this county who, through no fault of their own, need help," said board member Rigo Chavez.

Food bank board members want area citizens to do something to help the needy on Thursday, Lincoln County Hunger Day.

# Council could save \$200,000 through refinancing of bonds

The Ruidoso Village Council, during Tuesday's meeting, will consider refinancing over a million dollars in bonds to save upwards of \$200,000 over the next 10 years.

Councillors will hear a presentation by Harold Kiouss of Kiouss and Company before discussing the possibility of refinancing the \$1,250,000 joint water and sewer bonds.

During a workshop Thursday, village manager Jim Hine said the Farmer's Home Administration (FmHA) bonds were issued at 11.625 percent in 1984-85 for the purpose of installing sanitary sewer in the Ponderosa Heights Subdivision.

Hine said by the time the FmHA loan closed, the interest rate had already dropped to 10 percent, and the village might be able to negotiate a rate as low as 8.5 percent on today's market.

Annual interest at 11.625 percent would be \$145,312.50. At 10 percent the interest would be \$125,000 and at

8.5 percent annual debt service would drop to \$106,250, according to figures presented at the workshop.

Hine said the figures ignore anything the village would pay on the principal. He said generally the principal payments would start at \$1,000 a year for the first five years, and increase over the life of the debt—usually 30 years.

Kiouss told councillors Elmer

Firelli and Larry Simon, the only two councillors on hand for Thursday's workshop, that the refinancing under discussion is much less complicated than the one the council approved to help pay for the Grindstone Canyon dam.

"This one you just call in the old bonds and pay them off," said Kiouss.



## Editorial

Constitutional Amendments 9 and 11 should be supported by voters.

The two amendments take a step in the direction of allowing voters complete power in choosing their leaders. Amendment 9 proposes that county officers be allowed to serve four consecutive two-year terms, rather than just two. Amendment 11 proposes that state executive officers elected in 1990 and thereafter be allowed to serve two consecutive four-year terms, rather than just one, and be allowed to hold another state office immediately after the term of the original office has expired.

The two amendments suggest changes that would be a first step in the climb to allowing candidates unlimited terms in office, and allowing voters to elect those they choose, with no hint of constitutional interference.

What valid argument can be made to limit candidates to one or two or 10 terms in office? At every election, voters must choose who is to hold office. If an incumbent is the better choice, why should a law keep the voters from returning that person to office?

Amendments 9 and 11 suggest sensible changes to our State Constitution. Vote for them November 4—you'll be increasing your power as a voter.—DJP

## Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE—Sometimes it's tough to watch realization dawn.

Often these days, the eyes of the state's highest-ranking bureaucrats give the show away. They are thinking the unthinkable—that the Republicans could very well be on the point of adding their particular and specific names to the rolls of the unemployed.

The thought has brought a lump to certain throats in this town, where the main aim for many families has always been to bring up their kids in such fashion that they could get on to the state payroll and stay there till retirement time rolled around.

Ironically, it is those who were most successful at that effort who are most threatened if a total and drastic change is in the offing. It's those who came up through the ranks to reach high pay as so-called "exempt" employees who are available for immediate discharge when a new administration takes over.

Among those are many of the state's professional bureaucrats—the kind who can work in a top job for one agency today and move to another important post in an entirely different one tomorrow.

The last time there was a Republican governor in this state, of course, was from 1967 to 1970, when David F. Cargo held the post. In bureaucrats' years, that's almost a full generation back, and most of those now getting their paychecks from the state have never served in any administration except one headed by a Democrat. They have no experience to tell them what a Republican as a boss can be like.

What has traditionally happened during the closing months of every administration since Cargo's time is that those whose jobs were likely to be taken away from them—for instance, most of those on the governor's personal staff—went through the regular routine. That included licking envelopes and manning phones in some more or less routine fashion for that year's Democratic candidate for governor. That wasn't always done with any depth of conviction that this man was the perfect candidate; it was simply expected, so one did it dutifully.

Now those same old faces are back doing the same old jobs in this campaign, except that they tend, this year, not to be nearly so cocky. Their guts are telling them they may be

performing for a loser. Maybe they'll start 1987 in a new way: by having to go out and really look for new work. Horrors! That could even mean searching for a non-political job, where whom you know and whom you have worked for isn't what's important.

They never expected to see that kind of cold day, and the closer it comes to becoming a likelihood, the more fearful they become.

These words are not meant to be unsympathetic to the problems a total shift in administrations may bring into some people's lives. It does, however, seem ironic that certain individuals who have apparently been well satisfied to accept the advantages of the political system as long as those accrued to them apparently never bothered to prepare their souls for the possibility that someday the tide might run in the opposite direction.

...

A phrase not much used in this context till now has begun to recur with considerable frequency in the language of government. It is "the private sector," and its occurrence suggests a new-found respect for the ordinary citizen and his pocketbook that owes its growth almost solely to governmental deficits. A couple of examples have recently come across our desk.

Here is the Museum of New Mexico talking about a "prestigious steering committee" whose membership, it says, "reads like a who's who of the Southwest," all apparently drawn together because the Legislature would fund only \$300,000 of the \$410,000 it's going to cost to build a new Hispanic Heritage wing at the Museum of International Folk Art. The "private sector," as it turns out, will be asked to raise the \$65,000 still needed, so its members are being cherished as perhaps never before.

The same is true of the plan to form a foundation to help support the State Records Center and Archives. Again, we'll be fund-raising in the private sector to finance a good project that once might have been supported with tax money.

All at once the private citizen has come into his own.





### Brown captures top writing awards

The New Mexico Press Association last week honored Ruidoso News sports writer Gary Brown with two first-place awards for his writing.

Competing against writers from other New Mexico newspapers the size of The News, Brown was awarded first place in sports writing and feature writing. The contest was judged by members of the Idaho Press Association.
