Airport gets additional \$1.25 million

Jim Marquez, general counsel for the Department of Transportation, brought some good news to the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport (SBRA) groundbreaking ceremonies and luncheon Friday.

During a luncheon sponsored jointly by the Sierra Blanca Airport Commission (SBAC) and the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce, Marquez announced additional airport funds of \$1.25 million allocated by the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) for the 1987 fiscal year.

Marquez said that new funding brings the FAA commitment to the SBRA to \$6.5 million.

It goes to show with some concerned people in Washington, things can happen out here in "real America," noted Marquez, who credited the combined efforts of local, state and federal officials for obtaining land and funding for a replacement airport for the Ruidoso Municipal Airport, said to be the most dangerous in the Southwest.

Assistant Secretary of the Interior Richard Montoya said there

Warriors win

It was billed as a tough rematch of last year's state AAA-division finalists, but when the smoke cleared, there was little doubt as to who was the better team.

Ruidoso's varsity football team dumped visiting Silver City, 34-5, Friday night to draw nearer to the District 3-AAA title and another berth in the state playoffs.

The defending state champions jumped off to a 14-0 first-quarter lead and let the defense and kicking teams take over from there.

Ruidoso's defense limited the Colts to 131 yards total offense (the Warrior offense only gained 136 yards of its own), and played take-away.

Senior defensive back Toby Rue intercepted two passes (one setting up a touchdown) while Ruidoso stopped another Colt drive with a fumble recovery in the second quarter.

"Our kicking game and the defense playing tough were the difference," said Warrior head coach Cooper Henderson. "This was the first time we had eight players get to the ball 80 percent of the time."

From the start, the Warriors kicking teams did a good job in the game (something that did not happen in the two games with Silver City last season).

On the opening kickoff, Chuck Daniels ran to the Colt 30.

Three plays later, quarterback Jeff Willingham found all-state split end Brian Davis for a touchdown catch behind a Silver City defender.

Garret Henson kicked the extra point and Ruidoso had a 7-0 lead just 1:23 into the contest.

Neither team moved the ball on their next series.

However, following Silver City's second offensive series, Davis took

Airport begins

A long-awaited dream became a reality Friday when Governor Toney Anaya turned the first shovel of earth on Fort Stanton mesa to begin construction of the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport (SBRA).

A chill wind whipped across the broad flat mesa as Governor Anaya, in a hard hat decorated with the SBRA emblem, plunged a silver shovel into the dry earth. He was joined by a group who Sierra Blanca Airport Commission (SBAC) Chairman Ken Nosker said were instrumental in gaining the land and funding for the new regional air field.

"One year from today you'll be seeing the first airplane land here," predicted Governor Anaya. "It would do my heart proud to be in one of those airplanes," he added.

Although Heckman and members of the SBAC stressed Anaya's influence in getting the problem-plagued airport project "off dead center," the governor gave the people of Lincoln County credit for achieving the long-awaited goal.

"It was your persistence that has made this come to pass," noted Anaya.

Anaya said it's going to be tough to come up with the \$8 to \$10 million that will be necessary to complete a badly needed road to the remote airport. He then revealed a five-year highway funding plan he'll leave in the hands of the new administration when he leaves office on December 31.

He said his plan, to raise \$200 million for highways through a "painless" four to five cent gasoline tax, would assure that funds will be available to build the state road.

Fred Heckman, airport administrator and long-time chairman of the SBAC, said a safe air-

port to replace the notoriously unsafe Ruidoso Municipal Airport was a dream that began in the 1960s, languished for a time, was resurrected and finally made major progress when Governor Anaya endorsed the plans in 1983.

"If 15 years is not perseverance for a safe all-weather airport, I don't know what is," remarked Nosker. "This is one of my proudest moments," he added.

Joining in the groundbreaking ceremony were Jim Marquez, general counsel for the Department of Transportation; Richard Montoya, assistant secretary of the Department of the Interior; Bob White of the State Department of Transportation; Patrick Montoya, secretary of the State Department of Transportation; Don Watson, deputy regional director of the southwest region of the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA); and three members of the five-member SBAC.

Commissioner Benny Coker of Capitan was attending a national conference in Nashville, Tennessee, and unable to attend the groundbreaking. Commissioner Wendell Chino, president of the Mescalero Apache Indian Tribe and that group's representative to the SBAC, also was absent.

"It's not because they're not here in spirit," said Nosker.

The Reverend Dan Paxton gave the invocation for the groundbreaking and quoted from the Old Testament prophet Jeremiah. The Paxton children presented Governor Anaya with a bouquet of flowers and distributed a groundbreaking proclamation to members of the audience.

"Let's get on with building this airport," said Anaya as the line of dignitaries dug into the hard earth.

Earthwork on the \$18 million project is scheduled to begin in December.

Candidates spend \$12,500 in election

Candidates for county offices reported spending in excess of \$12,500 as of 10 days before the general election.

With eight of the 19 candidates certifying expenses and contributions less than \$500 rather than itemizing those figures, the total spent could be considerably higher by the time they file final reports for the November 4 election.

Big spenders are Lincoln County Commission District II candidate John A. Hightower, who reported spending \$3,140.35, and Lerry Bond, write-in candidate for Lincoln County Sheriff, who reported expenses of \$1,782.51 as of the 10-day report.

Bond and Hightower also reported receiving the most campaign contributions, with Bond listing contributions of \$2,592, and Hightower reporting donations of \$2,259.36.

Filing affidavits of expenditures and contributions less than \$500 as of 10 days before Tuesday's election were: county commission candidates William Lon Karn and Dennis Nosker, probate judge candidates Lee Jacqueline Martin and John Watt Page, sheriff candidate Jim Nesmith, county clerk candidate Coleta Elliott and two unopposed candidates; J.R. "Jim" Wheeler, running for magistrate judge, Division II, and Marion L. Schlarb, seeking re-election as county tax assessor.

Voters will elect lawmakers Tuesday

Voters in Lincoln County will go to the polls Tuesday to cast their ballots for the candidates of their choice. Voters will select county, state and federal lawmakers.

County offices up for grabs include the Lincoln County Sheriff, all three county commission seats, magistrate judges in Division I and II, county clerk, county treasurer, county assessor and probate judge.

The federal seat to be filled is the U.S. Representative spot.

State races include elections for governor and lieutenant governor, secretary of state, state auditor, state treasurer, attorney general, commissioner of public lands, corporation commissioner, two Supreme Court justices, two Appeals Court judges and a state representative for each district.

In addition, voters will make selections on 11 constitutional

amendments and will decide the fate of the \$35 million Educational Capital Improvements Bond Act.

Polling places in Ruidoso, by precinct, are 11-White Mountain School, 13-Ruidoso Public Library and 14-Ruidoso Middle School.

Voters in Ruidoso Downs will cast ballots at Ruidoso Downs Village Hall. Capitan Precinct 1 voters vote at the fair building. Precinct 2 voters (Nogal) go to the Nogal Fire Station. San Patricio voters vote at the San Patricio School. Hondo

voters cast ballots at Hondo School. Carrizozo voters in Precinct 3 vote at Carrizozo School, those in Precinct 4 vote at the courthouse.

The polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m. Tuesday.

All the land was velvet and the sky silk, with the light purple haze extending up into the light blue. The many-shaded haze deepened in the air so that all the world draws closer in your sight, and the sky is lower down upon the hills and knolls and glens, so that you are in a small enchanted world of your own.

This day of soft glowing colored light and dreamy airy purple hills now speak cheerfully to you in their own rapturous way, bringing a message of fondest cheer to your heart.

All the shadows deepen now as a light cloud drifts overhead.

Past the golden leaves of the small apricot tree you look out to the large apricot tree near the blue bird tree. The large tree, out in full autumn leaf like a giant bouquet of shining gold is the bright centerpiece of a world of shadowy mountains.

All the Indian Summer splendor is a fond farewell from October, and the golden tree is a welcome to us into November, the Thankful Month.

This day on October thirty-one is all in celebration of the ninetieth birthday of our beloved pioneer lady, Edith Coe Riggsby.

Edith was born October thirty-one, 1896, at the Coe Ranch in Glencoe to Frank Benjamin Coe and the former Helena Tully. She is the only survivor of the seven Coe children, the others being Sidney Bonnell, Anne Titsworth, Winnie Hunt, Agnes Bonnell, Wilbur Frank Coe and Helena LeMay.

Edith, as a girl, made a top hand at the ranch, breaking horses, and riding the range. At the Roswell fair she won the horseback relay race.

A Musical Family

In pioneer days when phonograph records had hardly appeared on the scene and when radio and television were yet a long way in the future, folks turned to homemade ways of entertainment. People turned to one another in the lightly settled

communities for help, for companionship, for guidance, and for entertainment. They were like one big happy family.

There was a deep yearning in those days for music. And here the Coe Ranch became a landmark for gatherings of all kinds with the strains of music of all kinds ringing through the adobe halls.

All in the family learned music from their mother, who was accomplished at the organ and piano. And Frank was an expert at the violin. Edith's mother is remembered as having a beautiful singing voice.

Edith remembers playing the piano and organ in accompaniment to her father's fiddle playing.

"If I would hit the wrong chord, Father would poke me with his fiddle bow to get me back on track," Edith remembers.

Hauling The Piano From El Paso

The pride of the Coe household was a piano which Frank Coe hauled from El Paso in an oxcart.

Edith says: "Dad was a guy who tried to bring as many things as he could when he went on a trip. So he

went by Las Cruces and got some beehives. Then he came through the reservation and down Dark Canyon into the valley. The piano was square and flat on top so Dad put the bee hives on top and slept on top some of the nights.

This piano, a great family treasure, is now owned by Paul and Nellie Ruth Jones. It is once more "The pride of the household."

Nellie Ruth tells me:

"The Coes played several instruments apiece. And Edith still has an ancient musical instrument called an autoharp, which was given to Sidney Bonnell by Old Man Goss, famous early day personality. Sidney then gave it to Edith."

Community Leader

Edith was one of the key leaders in the beginning of Ruidoso. She founded the Navajo Lodge in the twenties. And before there was an Episcopal Church in Ruidoso, services were held at the lodge. Edith was instrumental in the establishment of the Church of The Holy Mount in Ruidoso, as well as being a charter member of Saint Anne's Church in Glencoe. In all the work toward progress in Ruidoso, Edith had a great share.

On the occasion of her ninetieth birthday, we send up a prayer of thanks to God for the blessing this beloved lady has been, and is to this very day, in our lives.

County inmate runs, recaptured quickly

A Lincoln County Jail inmate escaped Thursday, but was back in custody within 15 minutes, said undersheriff Charlie Cox.

Cox said Timothy Barela was enroute from the jail to the courtroom with jailer Wayland Hill when he fled on foot. Sheriff's Department deputies located the

escapee hiding in some bushes.

"He's a local boy, we'd had him in custody hundreds of times," said Cox. He said the 18-year-old Carrizozo resident wasn't handcuffed.

Barela was to be scheduled for a preliminary hearing on charges of probation violation, said Cox. He said Barela was on probation after

a municipal court case in which he was found guilty of criminal trespass.

The new charge, stemming from the escape attempt, is a fourth-degree felony which carries a penalty of up to 18 months in jail, said Cox.

Bowington, who also is an accomplished artist and a staff writer for The Ruidoso News, has opted not to place the creations in a retail outlet for now. She said to do so could add unnecessarily to the

price. Instead, her primary marketplace for her Turdles will be at arts and crafts fairs. She is scheduled to attend the Carrizo Lodge Arts and Crafts Show at Thanksgiving.

And from there, who knows where Bowington's Turdles will take her?



The newest chapter of Students Against Driving Drunk (SADD) formed last month after an assembly conducted by Gerald Ames, Ruidoso High School coach and SADD sponsor. Ames has been involved in the successful SADD program in Ruidoso and pointed out to Capitan students, "Friends Don't Let Friends Drive Drunk."

Statistics in the SADD newsletter stated, "The SADD program in New Mexico started two years ago because of a serious youthful drinking/driving problem." In 1984, the state ranked first in the number of DWI fatalities nationally. It was noted that five to seven alcohol related traffic fatalities typically occur at prom/graduation time each year. In 1985, however, no youthful driving while intoxicated (DWI) related fatalities were recorded during the same period. The report points out there are, now, SADD chapters in more than 30 New Mexico schools with widely different race-ethnic and social-economic characteristics.

Capitan students, concerned for their friends and loved ones, decided it was time to become active in the SADD program. Under the direction of teacher Suse Townsend, 35 students have signed contracts joining the chapter.

Officers elected for the Capitan Chapter are president Kateri Sanchez, vice president Fred DeSiena, secretary Robyn Peralta, and treasurer Brenda Griego.

As a group they would like to see more student involvement, hoping, by example, they will get more of their classmates signed up and actively participating.

"Athletes and studs are not into it yet," Sanchez stated. "We started it here because we're all so close, if something happened to one of us we'd all be hurt, so we want to prevent it from happening. We don't want a tragic accident to wake

everyone up, we want them to be aware that it could happen, so it won't."

According to Peralta, they are encouraging the students in Capitan to join or be active so "we can take care of each other."

Ruidoso SADD students gave the newly formed Capitan Chapter SADD bumper stickers, key chains and buttons to use as fund raisers.

There will be a leadership conference November 15 in Albuquerque. Those attending will learn about alternatives to drinking and

how to help their friends. The group will stay at the "Y" in sleeping bags while attending the conference at the Clarion Four Seasons Motel.

They need sponsors and donations to finance the program. The officers all stated their willingness to work at the program and at ways to raise funds to finance the activities needed in the SADD program. Anyone wishing to become a sponsor can contact Townsend, the Capitan SADD advisor, or any SADD officer.

But the Warrior senior broke loose, ran to his right, and raced down the sidelines for a 60-yard touchdown.

Henson again kicked the extra point and Ruidoso led, 14-0, with 4:39 left in the first quarter.

The Colts refused to quit, however, making a game of it in the second quarter.

Following the Warriors' second touchdown, Silver City drove 54 yards for a field goal.

Quarterback Willie Gardner worked the Colt short-passing game well, completing five passes during the drive.

But the Warrior defense stiffened, knocking away a pass on third-and-11.

The Colts' Dick Himmie then kicked a 28-yard field goal to move Silver City within 11 points at 14-3.

After holding the Warriors without a first down on the next series, the Colts got the ball on the Warrior 34 after a poor punt.

Five more plays moved the ball to the four, but then Willingham and Dusty Beavers stripped the ball away and the Warriors took over on their own three.

Misfortune struck the Warriors on the next play, however.

Operating out of the shotgun, the ball was snapped over Will-

ingham's head for a safety and a 14-5 Warrior lead.

Ruidoso got a free kick, and after Colby Day tackled Gardner for a five-yard loss at the Ruidoso 43, the Warriors came up with another big defensive play.

Rue picked off a Gardner pass and the Warriors took over at the Colt 49.

It took Ruidoso just five plays to go 51 yards for the touchdown. Willingham raced up the middle for 10 yards and the score.

Big plays in the drive were a 20-yard pass to tight end Bryan Richardson and a pass interference penalty which put the ball at the 10.

Willingham went in for the score on the next play. Henson's kick was wide but Ruidoso took a 20-5 lead into halftime.

The Warriors wrapped it up in the second half on touchdowns by tailback Kirk Taylor.

Taylor's first score came on a four-yard run after a pitch from Willingham. Henson's kick was good and Ruidoso led, 27-5, with 8:49 left in the third quarter.

The score ended a 43-yard drive in six plays. Taylor set up his own score with a 24-yard dash to the four. He scored on the next play.

Ruidoso scored on its next series after Bubba Miller returned a punt to the Silver City 16.

After an incomplete pass and a one-yard run by Taylor, fullback Billy Harrison blasted 10 yards to

the five.

Taylor went over for the score on the next play. Henson kicked the extra point and Ruidoso finalized the scoring with 5:35 left in the third period.

Taylor led the Warrior rushers with 64 yards in 13 attempts. Willingham added 14 yards in four attempts and Harrison had 10 yards in four attempts. Ruidoso had 83 yards rushing.

Willingham completed three of nine passes for 53 yards, but got his 17th touchdown pass of the season with the scoring toss to Davis.

"We worked real hard for this," a happy Willingham said on the sidelines as the seconds ticked off near the end of the game. "Ever since we were in the eighth grade and saw Silver City beat Ruidoso, 50-0, we've wanted to beat them bad."

Ruidoso, now 3-0 in district play and 9-1 overall, will travel to Deming Friday, November 7, for the district-season finale.

couldn't have been a better Secretary of the Interior than Bill Clark to move forward on getting the land for the SBRA.

"The bottom line was safety," said Montoya. He said Clark, a pilot, had landed at the local air facility. Montoya also recalled a rainy day "white knuckles" landing in a plane piloted by Congressman Joe Skeen.

"And then you all built a school at the end of the runway," noted Montoya.

He said his department is concerned with making the best use of public lands, and found that grazing a few cattle was not the best use of the Fort Stanton mesa. Montoya said the airport will benefit the region immediately by creating jobs.

In Governor Toney Anaya's brief remarks at the luncheon he said he reviewed what has been accomplished in Lincoln County during his administration and was "quite surprised." In a county that has traditionally put more into the state than it has taken out, \$110


million in state-funded projects have begun over the past four years, said Anaya.

Anaya predicted New Mexico will continue to move forward and progress, in spite of adverse economic conditions.

He had special words of thanks for two people at the luncheon, Peggy Bowen and Wilton Howell. Anaya credited Howell with bringing the airport project to his attention in the beginning.

"I don't intend to ride off into the sunset," noted Anaya as he left the luncheon to return to Santa Fe for a news conference.

"In view of what the FAA has done we can all leave here today with a policy of 'adopt the half-percent,'" said Ruidoso Mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr. in his closing remarks, referring to the upcoming December 20 referendum facing Ruidoso voters that will, if passed, raise gross receipts taxes in the village by .05 percent. Funds that would be generated by the increase would go toward meeting Ruidoso's financial obligation to the new airport.



Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE—Governor Anaya poses an interesting question. He wants to know what caused the New Mexico Democratic party, which mounted a classic, textbook political campaign in 1982, to put on the bumbling effort that was all it could come up with this year.

If he digs into that, he's not going to like the answer he finds. He is what caused it.

His description of what went on four years ago is right on the button. Statewide Democratic candidates that year pulled together. They shared the cost of fund-raising, polling, direct-mail efforts and get-out-the-vote campaigns. They pooled their knowledge of the issues and synchronized their schedules. What's even better, they won, across the board.

So impressed was the national establishment of their party that it transported Nick Franklin, then state chairman, and some of those who had masterminded the whole effort back to Washington to lecture seriously on what it took to calling "the New Mexico Plan."

It's only natural to wonder why the same party couldn't recapitulate that effort this year and come up with more winners—which it clearly isn't doing.

But the fact is that it's not the same party. It was Democrats pre-Toney Anaya in 1982, and it's Democrats post-Toney Anaya in 1986, and that is a significant difference.

Since there has never been a statewide office-holder anywhere in the nation who has plummeted from the heights of popularity Governor Anaya himself achieved on election day that year to the ultimate depths he occupies in the hearts of the citizenry today, all Democratic candidates in New Mexico are affected by that fact. Among other things, that causes them to want to run on their own, not with but as far from other Democrats as they can get, because the very title of their party has seemingly been infected by the virus of Anayaism.

Many of that party's candidates, to be offensively frank on the topic, didn't want to hook up with their party's candidate for governor this year in a cooperative effort. They evidently figured whatever Democrat said he wanted to succeed Toney Anaya would simply be reminding the voters by his presence that there is

some necessary connection between the predecessor and the successor.

It's easy to see how advisors to Ray Powell (who was allowed to take the nomination without opposition, which ought to tell us something) have floundered in their efforts to repudiate Anaya without quite repudiating him. They haven't managed to pull that off, which isn't surprising; to achieve it would take a highwire act that would make the Wallendas look like amateurs.

The Governor's also frustrated that nobody wanted him to unleash his supporters into the campaign this year.

Hearing him complain on that point, one insider asked: "What would that accomplish? All the Anaya supporters appear to have achieved for their man is a 12 percent popularity rating."

The Gov is right about one thing, however. No matter how things come out next Tuesday, Powell campaign manager Gene Gallegos and Democratic State Chairman Sam Pick will view it all in reference to Toney Anaya. As he himself put it, "if they win, they did it despite me; and if they lose, it was because of me."

We call the campaign money that comes in during the last week before the election "CY.O.A. money."

Candidates who are suddenly seen as maybe being winners next week usually enjoy a spontaneous light snow of checks, often from donors whose aid they have not even solicited. Such generosity, of course, is not motivated by sheer affection. It comes from shameless folks who want to be able to say when it's all over that they have a piece of the winner. On the other hand, they don't want to make the serious strategic error of donating early to somebody who may go down to defeat.

Some folks call it "insurance money," and consider those who give at this point in the campaign morally superior at least to those who wait till the votes have actually been counted before coming around to express their support in tangible fashion.

No matter how hard we try, we simply can't make everything about politics ever look dignified and classy. Always, at the edges, there will be a bit of sleaze.






