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## United Tote takes over at Sunland

United Tote Inc., a leading national supplier of parimutuel wagering equipment, has taken over operation of Sunland Park Race Track, officials of the Montana-based firm announced Sunday.

The transfer of management from Ruidoso-Sunland Inc. to United Tote was effective midnight Sunday, United Tote president Lloyd Shelhamer said. The transfer marks the near completion of a \$3.5 million purchase agreement reached last month between United Tote and Ruidoso-Sunland Inc., former owner of Sunland Park.

"We are extremely pleased to be in the El Paso market," Shelhamer said. "Sunland Park is a beautiful facility with enormous potential."


The racing executive said United Tote is "planning some capital improvements to Sunland as soon as possible."

"Our first priority is to make it a more fun, attractive place to visit. We want to make Sunland Park the winter capital of horse racing."

Shelhamer said Sunland Park will be operated by a wholly owned subsidiary called Nuevo Sol Turf Club Inc. A new general manager will be named within the week, he said.

Sunland Park is located in New Mexico just outside the city limits of El Paso. The track, which opened for its 28th season on October 11, features quarter horse and thoroughbred racing.

United Tote provides computerized cash-sell totalisator wagering systems under long-term service contracts to 87 pari-mutuel facilities in the United States and Canada. Sunland Park is the only racing facility owned by United Tote.

## Warriors are No. 1 in district

This time there was no doubt about it.

Last year Ruidoso High School's varsity football team tied for the District 3-AAA title with Silver City.

This year Ruidoso won it outright, the Warriors clinching the title with a 56-14 romp over host Deming Friday night.

Thus, the defending state champion Warriors will sit out the first round of the playoffs as second-place Silver City plays this weekend.

Ruidoso will enter the playoffs with a 4-0 district record and a 10-1 overall mark.

The Warriors could have left after the first quarter and still beaten Deming.

Jeff Willingham connected with

split end Brian Davis three times for touchdowns in the period, giving Ruidoso a 21-0 lead.

Just 1:24 into the contest, Willingham found Davis in single coverage for a 51-yard touchdown pass.

Garret Henson kicked the extra point and Ruidoso led, 7-0.

On Deming's first play from scrimmage, Willingham made a leaping interception and Ruidoso took over on the Wildcat 37.

After two incomplete passes and a five-yard run by Billy Harrison, Willingham again connected with Davis, this time for 32 yards and a score.

Henson's kick again was good and Ruidoso led, 14-0, with 8:50 left in the opening quarter.

On the Warriors' next series, Willingham threw a 75-yard pass to

## Water users unite in stand against suit

Valley water users learned Sunday they'll need at least \$150,000 to present a "bare-bones case" to protect water rights from claims by the Mescalero Apache Indian Tribe.

Doug Perrin, a Roswell attorney hired by the Water Defense Association (WDA), told a group of about 150 people gathered in the Hondo High School gymnasium that he presented the board with a budget for \$150,000.

"It takes a lot of money to present a case like this right," said Perrin, adding that most of the funds will go to expert witnesses—not lawyers.

With promises of funds from the utilities commission in Roswell and the Lincoln County Commission and prospects of some private, federal and state funds, the association hopes to raise more than \$43,000 from its membership, said Mike Hurd, WDA co-chairman.

In contrast to the \$150,000 the WDA hopes to raise, Perrin said the United States government has put "in excess of \$2 million" into the tribe's case.

"History is going to be made in this case—the small guys banding together to fight the giant," noted an unidentified member of the audience. He predicted the case will go all the way to the Supreme Court.

Hurd said owners of irrigation water rights have been encouraged to contribute \$10 per acre-foot, and others may also donate funds. He said anyone "who recognizes the river as an irreplaceable asset," should have an interest in the outcome of the case.

"All us little guys will make a difference in this case," said Hurd.

Association secretary Gail Hopkins said Friends of the Rivers has been formed and is accepting donations to help protect area waters. Since only water right owners may become a party to the upcoming court case, she said Friends of the Rivers offers an opportunity for others to get involved.

Besides water right owners, Hurd said anyone in the tourist industry, or anyone dependent on the area economy for a living has a "direct stake in the outcome of this case."

He encouraged WDA members to discuss the possible impacts with local bankers, who could be adversely affected by falling property values.

Hurd said the WDA board is hoping to have funds intact by the end of the year, noting if enough funds are not available the defense efforts will have to be scaled down.

"I would hesitate to tell Doug (Perrin) on a beer salary to develop a champagne case," said Hurd.

Hurd and Perrin stressed the importance of every water right holder signing the documents to enter the case.

Perrin said even rights with a priority date earlier than 1873 could be attacked in the case, since the Indians are claiming a priority date of 1852 for their water. That date is an item of contention in the suit, with the State claiming the reservation was formed in 1873, giving the tribe a priority date of that year.

Perrin said if the tribe is successful in having the 1852 priority established, that will be the earliest date on the Rio Ruidoso and Rio Hondo.

At risk with dates prior to 1873, according to Perrin, are 2,164 ir-

rigated acre-feet on the Rio Ruidoso and 2,300 irrigated acre-feet on the Rio Hondo. He said those rights are in the hands of 195 irrigators on the Rio Ruidoso and 22 irrigators on the Rio Hondo.

Perrin encouraged everyone to be present for the hearing set for 9 a.m. Monday, November 24, in federal court in Roswell.

"Show that you are not going to roll over and play dead," advised Perrin.

Former State Supreme Court Justice LaFel Omer has been appointed to hear the water case. Perrin said Judge Oman will establish a schedule for the case during the hearing November 24.

The upcoming hearing is a continuation of a case that began last spring when the Mescalero Apache Indian Tribe presented plans to divert as much as 91 percent of the flow of the Rio Ruidoso as it leaves the reservation and transport some of the water through a pipeline for an irrigation project.

The tribe also revealed plans to drill deep wells for irrigation as well as expand some recreational projects on the reservation.

The State Engineer presented the opposition during the five weeks of testimony, but Judge Oman didn't make a final ruling on the case.

Perrin said the WDA has a unique opportunity to enter the case where the lawyers for the state left off, raising new legal, hydrological and environmental issues.

"I'm going to file the largest entry of appearance ever known in the western world," said Perrin, who will represent all members of the WDA.

# Mayor protests as councillors award bridge bid

In spite of strong objections from Mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr., the Ruidoso Village Council Thursday voted unanimously to award the contract on rebuilding three bridges and repairing Center Street.

Mayor Davis lashed out at engineers and lawyers during the special council meeting, calling engineering fees municipalities pay "ridiculous."

Although Mike Davalos, village

engineer, negotiated with the low bidder, Hesse Contracting Inc., their bid of \$419,540 was still nearly \$100,000 over the design engineers' estimate.

Davalos recommended accepting the bid, adding he didn't feel he could persuade the company to reduce their price any further. His negotiations resulted in a \$28,000 reduction from the original bid submitted.

He said the money from state direct appropriations will cover the project with enough left over to rebuild one of two Upper Canyon

river crossings.

Davis recommended turning the bid down adding he hopes "all engineers and lawyers starve to death."

"They have raped the public," said Davis, adding if "the lawyers and engineers were killed we'd be better off."

Mayor Davis also noted he has heard nothing from the firm that is designing the bridges for a \$112,000 engineering fee.

"They haven't said kiss my --- or go to hell," said Davis. "I hope that that firm never does a bit of

business with anyone else in the state or in the world," he added.

Councillor Victor Alonso questioned Davalos as to whether the firm had designed the bridges and submitted plans, and the engineer answered yes.

Councillor Jerry Shaw, recalling efforts by a previous council to obtain the \$583,000 in direct appropriations, worried that the funds will be lost if a contract isn't awarded soon.

"If we would be the first to turn it down then engineering fees would go down," said Davis.

Village manager Jim Hine reminded the council that the engineering fees are owed even if the bridge project is aborted.

Although Davalos said funds will be available to complete one of two Upper Canyon river crossings that were included in the original project, the bid was awarded without either.

Objections from a handful of Upper Canyon residents who were unhappy with the bridge designs resulted in putting the entire project on hold.

Al Junge, one of two visitors on hand for Thursday's meeting, said he was pleased the Upper Canyon crossings were omitted, and Councillor Alonso asked Junge who he represents besides himself.

Davalos, when contacted after the meeting, said the bid documents must now be approved by the State Highway Department. He said the contractor will probably be given a notice to proceed within two weeks and the clock will start running on the 120-day contract.

Davis. Henson's kick was good and Ruidoso had a 21-0 advantage with 3:35 still left in the opening period.

Ruidoso had another apparent touchdown called back in the last seconds of the quarter when Alan Kirgan intercepted a pass and ran 29 yards for the score.

But a roughing-the-passer penalty nullified the score and Deming kept possession.

The Wildcats drove 52 yards for their first score early in the second quarter.

Tim Smyle banged three yards for the touchdown. However, the extra-point kick was blocked and Ruidoso led, 20-6, with 11:09 left in the first half.

The Warriors came right back and drove 73 yards in 12 plays for another touchdown.

Sophomore Michael Swanner ran 17 yards on a fake punt to keep the drive alive.

Two plays later, Willingham ran 11 yards for the touchdown. The senior quarterback also ran in for

the two-point conversion and Ruidoso took a 29-6 lead into halftime.

Ruidoso struck again 2:30 into the second half on a 42-yard punt return by Bubba Miller. Henson's kick was good and Ruidoso had a 36-6 lead.

The Warriors' final touchdowns came on an 11-yard pass from Willingham to Miller, a beautiful 59-yard reverse by Davis and a two-yard run by reserve quarterback Rod Wright.

Willingham's touchdown pass to Miller was his 22nd of the season, believed to be a school record.

Miller's uncle, Blane Miller, is believed to have held the former mark with 21 touchdown passes.

The Warriors had 152 yards rushing and 217 passing for a 369-yard total. Deming had 157 yards rushing and 76 yards passing for a 233-yard total.

Davis had six receptions for 190 yards, one of his better performances of the season.

"I didn't think it would be this easy," said Warrior head coach

Cooper Henderson. "They had Brian (Davis) in single coverage early in the game and nobody can do that against him."

"I'm proud of our players for not letting down after a big win over Silver City (34-5 last week)."

This weekend, district runner-ups will play, while the district champions will have byes.

The Warriors will play in two weeks against the winner of the Saturday, November 15, game between Artesia and West Las Vegas on the latter's field.

Silver City will play at St. Pius Friday, November 14, in another contest.

Ruidoso will have films, weight work and running today (Monday, November 10). The Warriors will work on fundamentals the rest of the week.

### 'Woody' Erwin

Former Ruidoso-Sunland general manager Ralph "Woody" Erwin died November 5 after a long illness. He was 71.

Erwin helped found La Mesa

Park in 1944 and for the next 21 years was secretary-treasurer and general manager. He also helped the founders of Ruidoso-Sunland get started.

In 1966, Erwin became general manager at Centennial Park in Denver, Colorado, for two years,

and was a steward for seven years. In 1977, he became general manager of The Downs at Santa Fe for two years. Later, he was general manager for Ruidoso-Sunland.

Funeral services were last week in Raton.

## Village's hold on new wells tightens

A proposed order offering the Village of Ruidoso rights to 5,648 acre-feet per annum from the Eagle Creek well field has been submitted to the court by the State Engineer's Office.

In a letter to presiding Judge LaFel Oman, special assistant attorney general Ann Finley Wright proposed an amended offer of judgment approved recently by the Ruidoso Village Council.

According to that offer the village has the right to withdraw 5,648

acre-feet per annum with priorities of September, October and November 1984.

"The priority dates of these water rights needs not be finally adjudicated unless and until there is a priority call against these water rights..." states the amended offer.

Also left open in the offer is the question of hydrological connection to the surface waters of Eagle Creek or any other tributary of the Rio Hondo, and whether any of the

rights can be tied to Intercommunity Water Users Association rights having a priority date of 1913.

"The total is subject to proof of beneficial use to be filed with the State Engineer on or before November 1, 1990," according to the offer.

The offer is for 60 percent of the total output of the Eagle Creek fields, according to 24-hour tests supervised by water engineers.

## Judge allows Downs Trustees a week to decide fate of trustee increase

Ruidoso Downs residents got their request for a special election granted, but the apparent target of the "recall" election will not be included.

District Judge George Zimmerman ruled Thursday that a group of Downs citizens who petitioned to increase the size of the Ruidoso Downs Board of Trustees from four members to six members have a week to decide if they still want a special election to let voters decide the question. The judge also ruled that Mayor J.C. "Jake" Harris will

not be included in the election.

The petition was brought by residents who were discontent when Harris eventually was named the winner in the March municipal elections in the Downs after a lengthy court squabble. The election initially went to Harris' opponent, C.L. "Bones" Wright, who held office for more than two months before District Judge Richard A. Parsons threw out seven votes, giving the office to Harris.

If petitioners request an election, the village will have 90 days to

schedule a vote in which voters will decide whether to increase the size of the board of trustees. If the change is approved, present trustees' terms will expire in 120 days and the village must schedule a special election to elect a new board of trustees. Present trustees will be eligible for re-election.

Retired Judge Zimmerman was appointed to the case after three judges had been disqualified by the petitioners and the village.

## Grand jury hands down indictments; Reeves is charged with embezzlement

Raymond Reeves, 51, of Ruidoso was one of four people indicted Friday by a grand jury meeting in Ruidoso, according to Assistant District Attorney Harry Wilcox Jr.

Wilcox said the grand jury indicted Reeves on three counts of embezzlement; two third degree felonies with possible sentences of three years and \$5,000, and one fourth degree felony with a possible sentence of 18 months and \$5,000.

Reeves was accused by the Ruidoso Police Department in September of embezzling \$13,700

from a trust fund he set up to benefit injured jockey Steve Harris.

Wilcox said the grand jury also returned the following indictments:

- Leo Charles Plumbo, 30, of the Southern New Mexico Corrections Facility in Las Cruces; charged with escape from the penitentiary—a second degree felony.
- Glen Bornsen, 38, of El Paso, Texas; charged with possession of marijuana with intent to distribute—a fourth degree felony.
- Pamela Zander Day, 31, of Ruidoso; charged with trafficking

in cocaine (possession with intent to distribute)—a second degree felony.

—A fifth case was presented by special prosecutor Frank Selph of Alamogordo and an indictment was returned in that case against Robert Allen Wetzel, 22, of Carrizozo; charged with two counts of criminal sexual penetration in the first degree, a first degree felony; and four counts of criminal sexual contact of a minor, a third degree felony.

The basic objectives of RC&D, according to Anderson as set forth in their constitution, are to provide for "the orderly development, improvement, conservation and utilization of natural resources of the Area, thereby increasing income and expanding the employment and economic opportunities for the people." The major categories of activities the Council provides assistance on are: (1) Human Resources, Educa-

tion and Economic Development, (2) Recreation, Tourism and Historical Preservation, (3) Land and Water, (4) Agriculture and Forestry and (5) Transportation and Communications. Requests for assistance on these or other resource-related projects and activities can be made at anytime by contacting the sponsoring Organizations, USDA and County Extension personnel, or the RC&D offices in Carrizozo or Tucumcari. The RC&D Council will provide free assistance in evaluating adopted project measures, identifying sources of possible technical and financial assistance and in planning and implementation thereof. In some cases, the federal RC&D Program can provide financial assistance, both as cost-share grants and as loans, for planning and installation of land and water related activities.

## Child care aid available

Babysitters who care for children every day in their homes may be eligible for assistance from COMIDA. COMIDA, a sponsor of the Child Care Food Program, can help provide quality child care. The COMIDA Program gives monthly cash reimbursements for meals and snacks served to the children. Licensed homes that can care for six children and registered homes that can care for four children are eligible to participate. For more information, call Debbie Jeter, a licensed Ruidoso provider, at 257-7836.

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

## Commission hears audit of eventful year

Lincoln County Commissioners received the county audit report from auditor Don Wingfield at their meeting Friday.

In his report to commissioners Bill Elliott, Kenneth Nosker and A.W. "Gnat" Gnatkowski, Wingfield stated the audit for 1985-86 had a "clean opinion" and all problems had been resolved. The audit was more thorough than usual because of several factors.

"During August 1985 the troubled First National Bank of Lincoln County pledged 100 percent security for county deposits up to a maximum of \$2.7 million dollars," Wingfield said. "This security was pledged because the county had bid their checking account and (the bank) wanted to keep the funds in their bank to avoid such a major withdrawal," Wingfield said.

"Based on our review of the account, the \$2.7 million dollars in security was sufficient until sometime in late November 1985. The commission, however, had directed the county treasurer in August to remove the certificates of

deposit from (the bank) to reduce the balance remaining. We reviewed the certificate of deposit activity from August through December 13, noting that three certificates totaling approximately \$880,000 were continually renewed each month up to December 13, the date of the bank failure," he said.

As of the date the bank failed there were the following funds deposited at First National Bank of Lincoln County:

—Cash in checking.....\$2,142,970.  
—Certificates.....1,004,748  
—Outstanding checks.....1,256,379 (written December 12)  
for a total of \$4,404,097

—Security.....2,700,000  
This balance left unsecured deposits in the amount of \$1,704,097.

"We have been informed," Wingfield continued, "that an officer of the bank notified the county on or about December 4 that the bank would not be able to secure any deposits above the \$2.7 million in security and the county deposits should be lowered to that level. According to county officials, the county manager informed the treasurer the commissioners wanted to reduce the deposits. In

addition, the treasurer was contacted directly by the bank and informed of the problem. In the meantime, \$400,000 in certificates were renewed on December 6.

"On or about December 6, the treasurer informed the commission through the county manager she would make distributions the following week and thereby reduce the balances.

Bank officials again called the treasurer's office on Monday and Tuesday, December 9 and 10, asking them to reduce their balances. The distributions were made on Thursday, December 12, leaving a total balance in the bank of \$3,147,714, which left \$447,714 in unsecured funds, according to Wingfield. The bank failed on Friday, December 13. The major problem was that the \$1,256,397 in distributions were at Ruidoso State Bank and had not cleared First National Bank of Lincoln County, creating a potential cash loss of \$1,704,097, according to Wingfield.

"The series of events appear to be a combination of weak cash management and circumstances beyond the control of county officials, i.e. the bank failure on

December 13, and the distribution checks not clearing by that date," said Wingfield.

"Subsequent to the bank failure, the commissioners, acting as investment council, have directed the county manager to monitor the cash balances, securities pledged and equity ratio at each bank in which the county has funds. The county manager then directs the treasurer where and when to make investment. This system appears to be functioning well and adds a dual control to the investment transactions of the county," Wingfield said.

The auditor recommended the policy be continued as the commission, as investment council, is ultimately responsible for all county funds.

Wingfield requested a dating system be used on all checks received by the county treasurer. At the present time dating is done only on the deposit of received checks.

In conclusion of his report, Wingfield stated, "It was a good audit and we found nothing wrong."

In other business, the commissioners:

—Agreed to contact congress-

sional leaders to consider using the Stallion Site for the proposed "Star War" base. Using this site would bring additional revenues into Lincoln County.

—Awarded the base course contract to Beavers Sand and Gravel as low bidders.

—Received no bids on a used grid roller and will relet bids.

—Awarded a contract to Ingram Trucking for truck and labor to haul base course.

—Approved a budget increase to enter into the water dispute against Mescalero Apache Tribe.

—Approved the transfer of funds for the Sierra Blanca Airport Road access study. This was financed totally by the state.

—Granted an extension for filing the plat on Monjeau Estates subdivision.

—Approved a request from sheriff-elect Don Samuels for funds so Samuels can attend a two week Sheriff's Academy, sponsored by the FBI, in Virginia.

—Approved an increase in payment for the treasurer's office, for overtime.


—Approved an increase in salary for Dr. Goad's dental assistant.

—Approved a wage increase for the janitorial staff.

—Heard property owners confront tax assessor Marian Schlarb about tax increases above the promised five percent limit. Schlarb explained the taxes had been raised because of a reclassification of land usage from grazing land to residential. Inquiry cards requesting number of animals grazing on land had been sent from Schlarb's office to each person. If those cards were not filled out and returned, Schlarb explained, then the land was reclassified.



"You have to report livestock numbers," Schlarb said, "otherwise we don't know the land is being used for grazing and we have to change the classification."

Reclassifications can be changed next year, but there is no appeal for the current evaluation, she indicated.

# The Dreamer by Dan Storm



Happy Birthday To Lula Runnels  
In thinking over the many things for which we have to be thankful during the Thankful Month, there comes before our mind a vast parade stretching back through the years to our infancy, of the friends who have meant so much to us. Here lately I have been remembering one of our dearest friends, Lula Runnels, who celebrated her ninety-third birthday Sunday the ninth of November.  
Time has been fleeting by so fast that Lula's birthday got past me before I knew it. This happens often, and good wishes are appreciated even if sent within a few days or even within many days.  
Lula was born November nine, 1893, in Cowboy, Texas, (now faded from the map) to Craddock Gober and the former Nancy Kurkendall. In 1909, the family set out in two covered wagons heading west. Beside Lula came her sister Eula, and brothers Tom, Bob and Fred.  
Lula remembers that she celebrated her sixteenth birthday on the way out; and after about three weeks they arrived on the Bonito below Angus, and here her father took up a homestead. This was in mid to late November of 1909; and Lula has lived close by the original homestead ever since that time.  
In 1913, Lula was married to Mr. A. N. Runnels in Nogal, the ceremony being performed by Uncle Tom Henley. Five children were born to this couple: Lois, Arvel, Bonnie and twins Robert and Rayford. Arvel, Bonnie and Robert survive.  
For many years Mr. A. N. Runnels worked for the Southern Pacific Railroad as caretaker of Nogal Lake, and the Bonito Dam.  
For a while some of the Runnels children went to a small school which used to be just below where the dam now stands.

The war had been going on so long for my young life, and I began to regard it as something that would keep on indefinitely, when all at once in mid-morning of November eleven, 1918, the great steam whistle, sounding from down in the railroad yards like a giant automobile horn, shattered the quiet of the little town of Ashland, Oregon.  
The town came alive with shouting, cheering, laughing, crying. Bells began ringing all over town. Our mother came to the front door, her blue eyes shining with tears of joy shouting:  
"The war is over. The war is over."  
We had play-like trenches on a vacant lot in front of the house where we played at war. Boys came running from all over the neighborhood with shovels and we covered up our trenches. This was all a surprise to my nine-year-old mind, and after all these years it is as vivid as on that very day.  
I really believed that this was the last war; that humanity had learned its lesson.  
A Veteran Of World War I  
Not long ago I was talking to one of the few veterans of World War I still here with us, Mr. Al E. Hunt. He is still his cheerful upbeat self as always; and will celebrate his ninetieth birthday, I think he said on December seventeen, we wish this fine friend all congratulations.

There will be an open house sponsored by the local American Legion and Veterans of Foreign Wars at the Legion Hall in Ruidoso Downs. Everyone is invited.  
Indian Summer Tries to Stay  
The three days of winter weather followed by another brief blast of snow on the mountain, came in all of a sudden and shouldered Indian Summer out of the picture.  
Today, November eight, the sky is blue and the sun bright upon the meadows, and hillsides, here in the vale. The large apricot tree is clinging to what leaves are left by the west wind, flashing them in a lonely display of autumn gold, while down along the creek, the last of the oak, walnut, and box elder leaves are being blown into the river to go sailing down the stream—tiny crimson and golden boats tossing on the crystal waves.  
The wind singing down the valley carries only a faint coolness from the snow on the mountain, as Indian Summer abides with us yet a while.

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

# Editorial



If you think the Mescalero Apache Tribe's water suit is no big deal, you better think again.

The tribe has made claims that could divert 91 percent of the Rio Ruidoso from its natural course. The tribe has said they'll use the water for several projects—irrigation of new farming projects, irrigation of the present golf course and a new one, development of 13 new recreational sites and meeting domestic needs.

How will that affect us?

The farming projects will hurt worst. Through direct diversion and deep wells, the tribe will transfer most of the water from the river to two areas—one on the Tularosa side of the mountain, the other far southeast of Ruidoso. The river will be left dry.

If the river dries, so will many groundwater wells in this area. The Village of Ruidoso gets about 30 percent of its water from the river, Ruidoso Downs also relies heavily on the river. Many homeowners rely on wells for their water, businesses, too. No more.

And what will the absence of water do to property values and the prospect of new development in this area. Well ... you can guess.

But what's this?

"The downstream water users should be glad that they have used, for years and years, **unrented** water rightfully and legally belonging to the tribe since 1852," said Tribal President Wendell Chino in a statement late last month.

Wait a minute! What can that mean?

If you were faced with the prospect of spending millions to divert water to untried fields in an attempt to raise crops, in this time of economic Dark Ages in agriculture, or take all this water you have won rights to and **rent** it to a desperate market of people who have used it for so many years downstream, what would you do? (We all know what a great tradition the Mescalero Apache have as farmers.)

Unless you cherish the idea of going to Mescalero each day and paying \$1 a jug for water at Wendell's Water Warehouse, maybe it's time to get involved. Fight back.

A public forum on water rights is set for 7 p.m. today at Cree Meadows Country Club. A water expert, a U.S. attorney representing the tribe and an attorney representing the Water Defense Association (a group formed to fight the claims) will speak. At 7 p.m. Wednesday, in the Ruidoso Middle School gymnasium, the association will meet to inform the public of the tribe's claims and possible impacts we will suffer. Attend these.

This claim threatens our water, and in the Southwest, water is life itself. It is a big deal. It will affect you.—DJP

**SANTA FE**—Isn't it a pleasure to be able to watch television again with no interruption while somebody tries to tell us whom to vote for?  
One more of those shots of President Reagan notifying the populace that if they wanted to vote for him they could do it by voting for somebody else and some of us would have blown our tops.  
This, the year of the negative commercial, we will do well to put behind us for good.

The notion that our state government is now in transition has the effect of cheering many of us up. "To transit," after all, means to go away from a previously occupied spot—and in the case of New Mexico at the present, that is a very welcome picture.

It isn't at all clear what we are transitioning toward, but one senses a kind of general feeling that it sure can't be any worse than where we've been.

Governor Anaya will do all he can to make this period of change go smoothly. The fact is, however, that there isn't much he can do.

The incoming crowd is so busy with its own thoughts and concerns during the period between now and the start of the new year that it's very hard to reach them.

Bruce King, who departed the governor's chair to allow Toney Anaya to take it, had a massive office manual prepared for his successor, in the hope that it would help make sure nothing important got forgotten during the interim. The Anaya people admit they never so much as looked closely at it.  
Actually, almost everything in it is

as operative today as when it was first prepared, but this new crowd isn't likely to want to glance at it either.  
Watching the self-assurance of those who are now on the way in is very interesting—especially to those of us who have some experience on which to base our estimates of how much humbler they are going to be four years from today.

This year's election ends the third decade in which this writer has been involved in statewide politics, most of the time as an official of one kind or another in somebody's campaign. It's only for the last ten years of that time that we have sat on the sidelines and given off comments of all kinds about the campaigners' procedures.

It would be hard to think of a campaign previous to this one which began to resemble it in any important detail. There have been those in which emotions have run higher, but hardly any that were as mixed up as this one.

It is not in an attempt to affix any blame but merely as an observation that one adds that Toney Anaya has been a truly unique phenomenon in New Mexico politics, and his presence in office was the major factor in this year's races, though he was unavailable to succeed himself.

Some who will now take office will find that, like one who has been pushing against a great weight for a protracted period and suddenly finds it removed, Toney will be missed in ways still to be discovered.

Many have been able to be quite clear in telling us what it is they are against. Now they face the much more difficult task of making clear to us what it is they are for.

## Reporter's Round By Shirley Bowington



There is often a stigma, shame and contempt connected with the term "alcoholic." For many, the term conjurs up the image of a filthy bum, panhandling, scavenging through garbage cans, or passed out on the street, curled up with an empty bottle—like a lost child with his teddy bear. For others, an alcoholic is one who is weak-minded, or too selfish to quit drinking.  
Alcoholism is in fact a treatable disease—declared so by the American Medical Association in 1956; and, less than five percent of the 10-20 million alcoholics in this country fit the "bum" description.  
Alcoholics have many different drinking patterns, some are episodic, some binge between long intervals of sobriety, some drink enormous amounts of alcohol, some drink little. Some drink only beer, some wine, some whiskey, and some, a wide variety of alcoholic beverages. Some are alcoholics from the first drink, others take years to cross over the "invisible line" that separates the social

drinker from the alcoholic.  
Dr. Claudia Black, in her book "It Will Never Happen to Me," states that alcoholics are people who:  
—in drinking, have developed a psychological dependence, and a PHYSIOLOGICAL ADDICTION to the drug alcohol.  
—have experienced a tolerance change to alcohol and need to drink more to acquire the desired effect.  
—neither have the ability to control their drinking, nor to predict their behavior once they start drinking.  
—have a need to drink which becomes progressively a greater and greater preoccupation in their lives.  
—at one time, made a decision to drink, just as every social drinker does—however for them drinking became not a choice, but a compulsion.  
Dr. Black summarizes alcoholics as those persons who "are unable with any predictability to control their drinking, and/or whose drinking causes problems in major areas

of their lives."  
In his book "Under the Influence," Dr. James R. Milam states, "Physiology, not psychology, determines whether one drinker will become addicted to alcohol and another will not. The alcoholic's enzymes, hormones, genes, and brain chemistry work together to create his abnormal and unfortunate reaction to alcohol."  
Dr. Milam describes the three stages of alcoholism. In the Early, Adaptive (hidden) Stage the alcoholic seems blessed with an abnormal ability to tolerate large amounts of alcohol, and in fact experiences improved performance while drinking, and a deterioration of performance when he stops drinking.  
As they progressively need more and more alcohol to function normally, the alcoholic begins "maintenance drinking."  
As the disease crosses into the middle stage of alcoholism, the alcoholic drinks to prevent the pain of withdrawal. "Organs and systems that once welcomed the large doses of alcohol and tolerated its toxin aftereffects are being damaged," states Dr. Milam. "Now when the alcoholic stops drinking, his suffering is more severe and prolonged."  
In the booklet "Let's All Work to Fight Drug Abuse" is listed characteristic actions during this middle stage: "The person drinks alone and frequently in the morn-

ing, tries to conceal his/her drinking habit, tries to cut down on consumption but can't, and begins having difficulty with job, family, and others, and denies he/she has a drinking problem."  
In the late, deteriorative stage of alcoholism, according to the booklet: "The person places liquor before everything else in his/her life, neglects eating, has anxiety attacks, constant tremors which are relieved only by drinking, severe depression, and family, work and other relationships are completely destroyed."  
What has happened, at this point, states Dr. Milam, is that "damage to vital organs saps the alcoholic's physical strength; resistance to disease and infection is lowered, and mental stability is shaken and precarious." The alcohol that is his necessary medicine, has become "deadly poison."  
By accepting alcoholism as a treatable disease, rather than a psychological weakness, there is hope that some of the shocking statistics related to alcohol may be decreased. Did you know that:  
—Alcohol related accidents and diseases are the number two cause of death in the United States.  
—3.3 million teen-agers are alcoholics.  
—The number one cause of death in persons under 25 are alcohol-related traffic accidents.  
—The average age of alcohol use in the U.S. among our youth is 12%.

—Over 50 percent (of the 25 million) known incest victims lived in homes where alcohol abuse was a major problem.  
—Up to 80 percent of women treated for alcoholism were once incest victims.  
—Over half of the successfully treated alcoholics were forced into treatment against their will.  
"Early- and middle-stage alcoholics have been pushed into treatment by spouses planning divorce, employers threatening loss of jobs, judges offering the choice of treatment or jail, landlords threatening eviction, and doctors warning of fatal consequences if drinking continues," states Dr. Milam.  
The important thing to remember is although alcoholism is not curable, it is treatable. Don't wait until there is permanent brain or liver damage.  
Dr. Milam lists five "Guidelines for Helping":  
—LEARN ABOUT THE DISEASE. Learn why the alcoholic needs to drink, why he becomes irritable, frustrated, and depressed when he is not drinking, and why his sincere promises to stop drinking are washed away like writing on sand.  
—AVOID MORAL JUDGMENT. The alcoholic is a sick person, not a bad person. He needs compassion and understanding, not anger and indifference.  
—DEVELOP AN EMOTIONAL

DETACHMENT. Remember the alcoholic's behavior is governed by his addiction. If the alcoholic's family become emotionally embroiled in the alcoholic's excuses or denial, or somehow assume responsibility for the problem they will become sidetracked. The first priority is to get the alcoholic into treatment.  
—PICK A SPECIFIC TREATMENT PROGRAM. The alcoholic will have the best chance of recovering if he is treated in a comprehensive, disciplined program that includes the following:  
—In-patient medical detoxification;  
—A 4-week minimum of in-patient care;  
—Educational programs which stress the physical basis of the disease and its role in causing psychological and social symptoms;  
—Intensive nutritional therapy and education;  
—Strong emphasis on A.A. for long-term sobriety;  
—Thorough follow-up care; and,  
—Involvement of the family in treatment and follow-up care.  
Hopefully, the presentation here will provide valuable insight into the disease of alcoholism, for those who have previously condemned the alcoholic. The Ruidoso High and Middle schools have an extensive library available on all forms of chemical dependency.



And who hasn't enjoyed the story of the "Three Little Pigs" with its strong moral message that decries laziness and promises a reward for hard work.

E.D. White gave porcupines one of the world's best-loved pigs in Wilbur's "Charlotte's Web." As Wilbur's friend Charlotte said, he's "SOME PIG."

"All animals are equal but some animals are more equal than others," said the intelligent pig, Napoleon, in "Animal Farm."

Portly, Petunia and Arnold have won the hearts of kids, moms and dads.

But the pig who has made pig-loving respectable is Miss Piggy. She sings, she dances and she makes us laugh with her vanity, egotism and love of Kermit.

As for me, though, I prefer the real thing to these animated, cartoon swine facemasks. Give me a Hampshire, a Berkshire, a Yorkshire or a Poland China. I love pigs—the real ones.

Like the pet pig in Houston, Texas, that saved a child from drowning.

### Reporter's Round

It was dark and cold when the alarm went off at 4 a.m. My car spluttered and complained on the drive to the Lincoln County Sub-office, seeming to know that 4:30 is too early to go to work.

I was too excited to worry about the dark or the cold or the time—it's not everyday that I get invited to a drug bust. I reminded myself to act cool—just another day in the life of a reporter.

But excitement is the order of the day at a drug bust!

Law officers from all over the county were gathered at the Lincoln County Sub-office that Saturday morning—they were as excited as I was. There was a party atmosphere with coffee, donuts and lots of laughter.

When the sheriff was ready to instruct the law officers, all were suddenly silent.

Time to get down to business.

Gathered in the small meeting room, besides law enforcement officers, were television, radio and newspaper reporters. Cameras rolled and flashes clicked as those gathered heard of a special grand jury that indicted 20 suspects on 92 charges.

It was a carefully orchestrated media event.

Officers, divided into teams of three each, were given packets con-

taining the sealed indictments on the subjects. Inside the sealed envelopes were detailed instructions, pictures and maps on the locations for the bust.

Lincoln County Sheriff Tom Sullivan, undersheriff Charles Cox and Assistant District Attorney Harry Wilcox Jr. talked to the assemblage—they talked of search warrants, probable cause, evidence and the like.

"We don't want anybody shot," cautioned Cox. A reminder to the observers of the very seriousness of the whole thing. It might be dangerous to awaken some people with the words, "You're under arrest."

"We need to hit the streets," said Cox. (Is that what they say on "Hell Street Blues"? I wondered.) "We'll hit at the same time—hit it, secure it," he said seriously.

Before the sun even hinted at peeking over the mountain top, 13 sheriff's units headed in as many directions. All cars remained on one frequency to maintain contact with Cox at the base station.

My arrest team—Chuck Flanagan of the Sheriff's Department, Lanny Maddox of the Ruidoso Police Department and Bart Skelton of the New Mexico State Police—expected to arrest three suspects in one location.

"These guys used to keep a gun," said one officer, as the team made plans to cover both entrances of the

trailer house.

"There it is..." We drove by, turned around and came back.

"What's going on... there's some activity outside the house... maybe they're leaving."

"Lincoln 13 to base, suspects may be leaving."

"Okay, hit it," came the reply, and we did.

Flanagan drove down the driveway, cutting off the only means of escape. All was quiet at our destination—the activity observed apparently was a neighbor.

"Let's go..."

Knock. Knock.

"It's the police, open up."

I was expecting some tough-looking "mobster-type."

But that was not the case, the suspect—looking like anybody's next door neighbor awakened from a sound sleep—opened the door to handcuffs and "you're under arrest."

He's just a kid that's got to feel like a kick in the stomach, I thought.

"You have the right to..."

The skinny suspect, after pulling on jeans, signed a form confirming that he was read his rights, and refused to sign a "consent to search" form. He said he didn't know where the other two suspects were.

Putting on shoes and shirt while handcuffed looks a little difficult.

The arrest site offered probable cause for a search warrant since drug paraphernalia and suspected drugs were in plain sight, to the scene was "frozen," with two officers remaining there while the third transported the subject to the Sub-office.

What will those guys do while waiting for the search warrant? It's going to be hard not to take a look around.

Heading back to the Sub-office, we listened as other teams made

hits and searched for locations.

Back at headquarters, a big yellow schoolbus served double duty as a paddy wagon.

"We've got an assembly line all set up in here," said one officer.

He was right—suspects waited their turns to be booked, photographed, fingerprinted and questioned before boarding the bus to the Lincoln County Jail. And off they went—what a morning, they must have thought—straight from bed to behind bars.

Reporters learned that all the suspects were accused of selling drugs to an undercover agent and that bail was set at from \$50,000 to \$100,000 with no 10 percent.

And as the prisoners traveled to Carrizozo to jail, investigators were congratulating each other on removing the accused drug dealers from the streets.

Sheriff Sullivan noted that he was especially pleased to have arrested a suspect he said was the major supplier to Ruidoso High School.

If selling drugs is so lucrative, how come these kids all look so poor? Maybe they aren't really the big-shot dealers... maybe there's some big guy somewhere who's behind the whole thing.

Reporters snapped a last picture or two, some suspects covered their faces (just like on TV) and it was all over.

As the sun came up on just another day, law enforcement officers headed back out to arrest the remainder of the accused. Although the operation wasn't over, the excitement was.

Home for breakfast, and just another day.

By Monday night, before the police were quite through rounding up the suspects and patting one another on the back, the group picked up on Saturday was back out on the streets—released on their own recognizance according to one official.
