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Group opts for Downs special vote


A group of Ruidoso Downs residents have decided to push forward with their drive for a special election to increase the size of the Ruidoso Downs Board of Trustees, but the mayor will not be included.

After a judge's ruling replaced apparent March municipal election winner C.L. "Bones" Wright with present Mayor J.C. "Jake" Harris, the residents petitioned the Downs Trustees, seeking a new election to increase the number of the board to six from four. The original petition also sought to have Harris included in the change.

But retired District Judge George Zimmerman ruled last week that the petition cannot include Harris if it is to be valid. He gave the petitioners the choice of dropping the petition altogether, or removing the mayor from the request.

Both sides in water suit are debated in meetings

Speakers at a public information meeting Monday definitely agreed on one thing—the seriousness of issues surrounding a water dispute involving area water users, the State of New Mexico, the United States and the Mescalero Apache Indian Tribe.

But the two attorneys on hand for the meeting, sponsored by the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce, disagreed on most aspects of the complicated water suit they were at Cree Meadows Country Club to describe.

Herb Becker, assistant U.S. attorney representing the Mescalero Apache Tribe, and Richard Simms, a Santa Fe attorney representing the Water Defense Association, presented diverse views of the long drawn-out water suit that has included five weeks of testimony this year and will continue with a

preliminary hearing for the second phase on November 24 in Roswell. Tom Bahr, director of the New Mexico Water Resources Research Institute, joined the panel of speakers as a water expert not involved in the case.

"Maybe I'm one of the good guys," said Bahr, adding he's from out of town, not a lawyer and not a party to the case.

"Within the next 15 years water demands in the state of New Mexico will outstrip the supply," said Bahr. He said for all practical purposes the approximately 1.2 million acre-foot of water available for beneficial use in New Mexico is fully appropriated.

About two-thirds of the 20 billion acre-feet of groundwater in New Mexico is "brackish" and unsuitable for human use, and 90 percent of the balance is in declared water basins, said Bahr.

That leaves New Mexico with few alternatives, including importation

of water, desalting water and weather modification. Bahr said none of those options are likely to happen.

Two basic water doctrines prevail in the United States—(1) the Riparian doctrine giving land owners the automatic right to reasonable use of streamflow adjacent to their land and (2) the doctrine of prior appropriation and beneficial use.

In times of short supply under the Riparian doctrine the available water is divided among all users, but under the prior appropriation doctrine that water is not divided, but junior users give up all rights to senior right holders.

Bahr said the state of New Mexico adopted the prior appropriation and beneficial use doctrine as the Riparian doctrine is not considered

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Council tables chamber promo proposal in lively meeting

Mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr. set the tone for Tuesday night's meeting of the Ruidoso Village Council when he opened the meeting by welcoming himself and Councilor Jerry Shaw "back from alcohol poisoning."

"We were really at the dry-out center and we're so happy that you all stayed with us," said Mayor Davis, apparently alluding to comments by some who attended a recent special meeting. Before the Tuesday meeting, Davis said he and Shaw were accused of being "dead drunk" at that special meeting.

Contacted Thursday, Councilor Shaw denied that she had been to a "dry-out center" and said she assumed the mayor was joking.

"I guess he thought that was funny," said Shaw. "It is not true. He has no right to speak for me," she added.

The first item of regular business was consideration of a beer and wine liquor license request for Bonnie Rye Sanchez to be located at Appletree Terrace Restaurant. It was approved unanimously.

Village Councilor Victor Alonso,

wondering if a liquor license was ever in that location before, recalled having an alcoholic beverage in another restaurant that previously occupied the building.

John Jeffers, executive director of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce, commended Alonso "who can at least remember every place he's had a drink," before presenting the council with a proposal for a joint venture between the village and the chamber.

Jeffers presented a package proposing that the chamber operate a convention/events department in a contractual relationship with the village to actively promote tourism in the area.

But councilors weren't buying, complaining that they had not seen the three-page proposal, including a \$163,600 sample budget, until five minutes before the council meeting. Village funds from the economic development fund and lodgers' tax account for \$148,600 of the proposed budget with \$15,000 from the chamber and \$5,000 from special events.

Although Jeffers emphasized a need for immediate action, the council voted to table the proposal and discuss it at a workshop session before the next regular council

meeting. "It's not time now to sit back and wait and wait and wait," said Jeffers. He said the proposal calls for bringing business into the village to utilize currently available facilities.

But Shaw, who also serves as chairman of the Economic Development Board, said that advisory group already voted to hold economic development funds set aside in an amount to equal lodgers' tax collections until a convention center site is located.

Jeffers questioned Shaw as to whether facilities already in town don't need business, and reminded the council that Roswell has no convention center, but promotes tourism through a bureau similar to the one the chamber is proposing.

"It ain't going to get any better unless we get out and make it better," said Jeffers. He countered complaints that the proposal wasn't presented until nearly 6:30 p.m. Tuesday by reminding the group of announcements in the press last June that such a plan was forthcoming.

As Village Councilor Ray Dean Carpenter suggested tabling the issue, Jeffers interrupted to call for cooperation.

Mayor Davis, noting that lodgers "hate" the Inn of the Mountain Gods and "we all hate each other," wondered where a convention could be conducted.

"We're always asked to contribute to the chamber financially," said Davis, adding if the village doesn't contribute it is accused of being "anti-chamber. He called the sample budget "far excessive."

But Jeffers disagreed, calling the funds requested "contractual services" rather than a contribution, and reminding the mayor they are "public dollars."

"I personally don't hate the Inn," remarked Alonso, calling the facility a "world-class" resort and noting that it benefits the village.

Village Councilor William A. "Dub" Holt said discussions made it appear the village and chamber were "poles apart," but he didn't think that was true.

While agreeing more time was needed, Holt said he hoped the groups could pull together.

"We're all in the same boat here," said Holt.

In presenting another agenda item, Paul Crown of Lincoln Cablevision said he hated to approach the council after what had already taken place.

"I spent last week in every bar in New Orleans and don't remember the name of any of them," he said before presenting an 11-page document calling for the renewal of the cable franchise agreement.

Crown said the agreement includes current rates, but changes the name to that of the new owner and changes the expiration date to coincide with other franchises he holds in the county.

Councilors agreed to advertise for public hearing on the proposed ordinance, but not before the mayor made some comments on utility franchise holders.

"I don't have anything against Lincoln Cablevision because I hardly watch it anyway," said Davis, but added he's noticed franchise holders come forward regularly to have their expiration dates moved "into the future."

Naming the telephone company and Texas-New Mexico Power Company, Davis said the village should not extend their franchises and leave the opportunity open for others to bid on the services they provide.

"They do such a wretched job, and I'm told in town that you (Lincoln Cablevision) do to," said Davis. "Let's let them all run out

and let everybody bid on your assets," he added.

Crown reminded the council that neither his nor the other franchise agreements are exclusive.

Village manager Jim Hine recommended the cable company be required to pay for advertising for public hearing, and Crown said such a requirement is in the current ordinance.

In other regular business Tuesday, the council:

—Authorized Boyle Engineering to enter the Grindstone Canyon dam in an annual contest sponsored by the American Consulting Engineers Council.

—Approved election officials recommended by village clerk Leon Eggleston for the December 18 election on increasing the gross receipts tax by .50 percent.

—Awarded the bid on an ambulance chassis to low bidder, Sierra Blanca Motors, for \$16,999. Eggleston said eight bids were received, the highest for \$18,824.

—Postponed considering bids on an ambulance body/module.

—Heard that the State Engineer has proposed an offer of judgment on the Eagle Creek wet fields.

Building permits

October boost due to increased homebuilding

Village building increased in October with total building valuations up a half million dollars over September.

In October, 44 permits were issued in all categories for a total of \$1,234,506, reflecting a two-month increase with September's 42 permits worth \$706,304 and August's 31 permits at \$572,954.

A year ago, in October 1985, the village issued 53 permits with a total valuation of \$1,337,299.

October's hefty total brought the year-to-date up to 310 permits valued at \$11,036,103, still down slightly from October 1985's year-to-date of 538 permits worth \$18,968,650.

No new commercial buildings were started in October or September, but last year two new commercial projects accounted for \$268,650 of the permits.

Seven permits worth a total of \$735,818 were issued last month for single family dwellings (SFD), up from September's five single family residence permits valued at \$410,831, and comparable with last October's nine permits for single family homes with a valuation of \$601,930.

Residential remodel permits are holding steady with 29 issued in both October and September and 30 issued in October 1985. Last month's residential fix-ups were

valued at \$225,017, down only slightly from September's \$252,431 valuation and October 1985's \$246,265.

Five permits totaling \$189,567 were issued last month for commercial remodeling projects, way up from September when six permits, issued were valued at just \$33,192, and October 1985 when seven permits were issued with a valuation of only \$51,800.

Two permits were issued in October for new apartments or condominium projects. Those two were valued at \$82,104.

One grading permit, valued at \$2,000, was issued in October.

suitable for arid and semi-arid lands.

Since water rights are a property right, they can be separated from the land to be bought, sold or leased, said Bahr. He said owners of water rights do not own the water itself, and under the prior appropriations doctrine, if the owner fails to use the water, that water is forfeited, except for federal or Indian water right owners.

"Once a (water) right is quantified with a priority date, the Indians do not have to use that and put it to beneficial use—they've got it," said Bahr. "This flies in the face of most water law in the West," he added.

Adjudication is the process of determining who has water rights and what is the priority date, said Bahr, comparing the process of water adjudication to a title search.

Bahr said 50 adjudication cases are under way in the western United States, and those cases involve 13 river systems. Of the 33 cases involving Indian nations, 15 are in New Mexico and Arizona, said Bahr.

Some of those cases date back to the 1960s, said Bahr. He said Indian claims often hinge on the amount of practicably irrigable acreage on a given reservation.

In New Mexico, Indian claims amount to 660,000 acre-feet, including the Mescalero Apache's claim of 18,000 acre-feet.

Bahr said, according to published cropland inventory figures, Lincoln County contains 6,300 acres of irrigated land. Using the standard of three acre-feet of water per acre, then roughly 18,000 acre-feet, or the amount the Indians are claiming, is needed to maintain the county's irrigated acreage, explained Bahr.

"Often both sides lose in situations like this," noted Bahr, adding water cases are expensive, drawn-out and emotionally heated.

Becker then spoke, explaining his views are not necessarily those of

the U.S. Attorney's Office. He said gross misunderstandings often cause people to "get bent out of shape."

Becker said an editorial in The News contained "inaccuracies" and called one figure used by an attorney for the State Engineer and quoted in that editorial as "much further from the evidence than I am from the moon."

He was referring to statements that the Mescalero Apache Indians plan to divert as much as 91 percent of the flow of the Rio Ruidoso before it leaves the reservation.

Becker, attempting to put the case in historical perspective, explained Aristotle's theory of subhumanism in which property could be taken from people not considered to be fully human. He said that question remained unanswered as Spain settled the New World and appropriated much of the native tribes' wealth. Although "some obscure king" ruled in 1680 that the natives were human, it was much too late, said Becker, adding the concept has carried over.

In describing the impact to Indians of the western movement, Becker said the tribes were moved farther and farther west until there was no place else to go, and then placed on reservations that have gotten smaller and smaller.

"I'm sure you've been out there—they're not gardens of Eden" noted Becker.

Becker, citing court cases, said the Indians reserved certain implied rights to themselves in treaties. He said those rights, including fishing and water, have been recognized and protected by federal law.

He said the courts have said the tribes are entitled to both surface and groundwater as reserved rights.

"After all, they are human; they are entitled to property; they are entitled to a homeland," noted Becker. He said the Indians are entitled to sufficient water to meet

their needs now and in the future.

Becker disagreed with published reports claiming that \$2 million has been spent on the Mescalero Apache's case, and recalled that both the state and the U.S. probably spent about the same amount to present cases of comparable scope.

Becker said former Supreme Court Justice LaFol Olan, specially appointed for this case, has said he will not allow duplication in upcoming hearings of the five weeks of testimony in which the State of New Mexico presented its case.

Simms pointed out that the previous hearings did not include the water right owners.

"You have not had one minute of trial time so you can start with a clean slate," said Simms.

Simms said the Mescalero Apache Tribe is claiming the right to divert roughly 18,000 acre-feet a year from the Rio Ruidoso. He added the average yearly flow is just 9,600 acre-feet.

"You don't need all the people hired by the U.S. and the state to see that's twice the average flow of the river," said Simms. "There's a very real problem," he added.

In his overview of New Mexico and federal law as it relates to water rights, Simms said the United States gave up in its entirety its control of water law in the West.

Simms said the federal government later discovered it forgot to address water rights of Indian lands or other federal enclaves and created a "legal fiction" stating the Indians have an implicit right to the amount of water needed for the purposes of the reservation.

He said by the time that "legal fiction" was drafted much of the water in the Hondo Valley was already appropriated and the federal government was taking back something already given.

"There was a non-Indian community here when the land was reserved to the Mescaleros," said Simms. He said the Indians claim the reservation was formed by a peace treaty in 1852, but that date is

under dispute since the State claimed in its case the reservation was formed in 1873 when its boundaries were drawn.

With many issues as yet undecided, Simms said water right owners are in "never-never land," awaiting the second phase of the trial.

Simms said issues not yet presented include the feasibility of practicably irrigable acreage as a standard and the economic impact of totally depleting the flow of the Rio Ruidoso.

"The old saw is that nobody really cares until the well goes dry," said Simms. "That moment is here now," he added.

He said the court has given everyone in the stream system until November 17 to enter the case.

As audience members asked questions about the case, Simms and Becker disagreed on point after point including which issues were settled in hearings already com-

pleted and how much water the Indians are claiming from the Rio Ruidoso.

When questioned on who is paying for the Mescalero case, Becker said the tribe is paying its own way while the U.S. has paid for its case. Simms also spoke at a public meeting, sponsored by the Water Defense Association, Wednesday evening at Ruidoso Middle School.

During that meeting Simms said area water users are faced with a problem similar to a candle burning at both ends with challenges to water by the state of Texas as well as the Mescalero Apache Indians.

"Believe me, it's something to get excited about," said Simms. He said the Village of Ruidoso, with very late priority dates on its water rights, could be in a very unsure position.

"If they (Mescalero Apache Indians) wanted to be mean about it they could shut off the town of Ruidoso," remarked Simms.

Ken Nosker, co-chairman of the Water Defense Association, added his warning to citizens of Ruidoso, cautioning them to take the threat seriously.

He added with 65 percent unemployment on the Mescalero Apache Reservation, the tribe is very likely to continue with ambitious plans to transport the water it's claiming as a means of putting tribal members to work.

"Federal dollars will pay for that construction ... you'll be helping," said Nosker.

Gail Hopkins, association secretary, announced a public meeting is planned from 6:45-8:45 p.m. today (Thursday), November 13, in the Bondurant room of the Roswell Public Library.

All the speakers reminded water right owners that Monday, November 17, is the deadline to enter the upcoming case. Information and forms are available by calling Hopkins at 653-4201.

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the Supreme Court in October to preside over the case after attorneys for the petitioners and village disqualified three other judges.

Gary Mitchell, attorney for the petitioners, reported that the group opted to go ahead with the petition without Harris because they feel a

larger board of trustees would make it more difficult for one group to wield too much power in the Downs.

"They just want some fair play down there," Mitchell said.

When Harris was named judge, a rash of firings and demotions rocked the village administration. When the present trustees didn't oppose the reorganization, Mitchell said

many Downs residents felt the trustees had "abandoned them." They believe a greater number of trustees could make it more difficult for a small faction to have such an impact on the municipality.

Mitchell said the revised petition will be presented to Downs attorney Richard Hawthorne and Zimmerman. After Zimmerman signs the order for the special election, the

Downs Trustees must schedule an election within 90 days, in which voters will decide whether to increase the size of the board of trustees.

If they choose to increase the size of the board, the village must set an election within 120 days in which the six new trustees will be elected. Present trustees are eligible to run for re-election.

Drug bust leads to murder conviction

Mitchell L. Hinsz, serving 15 months in the New Mexico State Penitentiary on drug charges, was found guilty last week of murder in a case in Dallas County, Texas, according to Lincoln County undersheriff Charlie Cox.

The 25-year-old Ruidoso Downs man was arrested, charged and

convicted of possession of marijuana with the intent to distribute and conspiracy to distribute marijuana as a result of a Sheriff's Office undercover operation early this year, said Cox.

During the course of that investigation, evidence was obtained linking him with the Texas case in

which a victim was allegedly beaten to death, said Cox. He said the information was sent to Dallas authorities, and Hinsz was later charged and tried in 194th Judicial District Court.

Deputy sheriff Byron Baker and Sheriff's Office investigator Phil Rodriguez testified in the Texas

proceedings that resulted in a life sentence for Hinsz, said Cox.

After Hinsz completes two concurrent 15-month sentences in the New Mexico facility, he'll be transported to Texas to begin serving his life sentence, said Cox.

Art Johnson is named Sunland Park manager

United Tote Inc., the Montana-based firm that has taken over operation of Sunland Park Race Track, announced Monday the appointment of Art Johnson as general manager of the Southern New Mexico racetrack.

Johnson, a graduate of New Mexico Highlands in Las Vegas, New Mexico, returns to Sunland Park after leaving his position as president and general manager of the track in 1972.

In 1973, the 59-year-old executive moved to Santa Fe as general manager of The Downs at Santa Fe. The following year, Johnson was appointed general manager of Pocono Downs in Wilkes-Barre, Pennsylvania - a position he has held for the past 12 years.

Johnson's ties to Sunland Park trace back to the inception of the track in 1959, when he was hired as comptroller. After holding positions in nearly every department at the track, he was appointed assistant general manager in 1967.

Two years later, in July 1969, Johnson assumed the managerial position at Sunland Park. He initiated a strong racing program and an aggressive series of imaginative campaigns which boosted the

track's daily wagering handle to its highest point in five years. Johnson was elected president of Fortuna Corporation shortly before the start of the 1969-70 season.

Johnson and his wife, Shan, will join their son Roy in El Paso. They have another son, Tommy, who resides in Albuquerque and a daughter, Mrs. Shauna Salerno, who lives in Pennsylvania.

"We're extremely pleased to have Mr. Johnson returning to Sunland Park," said Lloyd Shelhamer, president of United Tote Inc. "He is one of the most respected and knowledgeable racing executives in the nation."

United Tote purchased Sunland Park for \$3.5 million and will operate the facility under a wholly owned subsidiary called Nuevo Sol Turf Club Inc.

To prevent pain after root canal work, group at Temple University gave patients tryptophan—a natural amino acid—before and after the procedure. Tryptophan has long been used for mood-change therapy.

A swallowed coin can cause trouble if it lodges in the esophagus and does not pass quickly in—and out—of the stomach. Report in the Annals of Emergency Medicine recommends X-ray even if there is no pain.

Lidocaine nosedrops can ward off cluster headaches, researchers at the University of California/San Diego School of Medicine found. Drops are administered as patients feel the headache coming on; relief can be almost immediate.

Half of the adults over 50 in America are inadequately protected against tetanus, according to the Centers for Disease control. Booster shot should be given every 10 years.

Naproxen, an anti-inflammatory drug, seems to be effective against the painful menstrual periods associated with endometriosis, according to a report in Obstetrics and Gynecology.

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

Ski Apache tour, talk informs business people

Though there was no sign of snow anywhere in Ruidoso, the slopes of Ski Apache glistened their white welcome to the Ruidoso business people who visited the resort last Tuesday.

The visit was in response to a goodwill gesture by Ski Apache general manager Roy Parker and his staff, who invited the Ruidoso Lodgers Association to bring members of the business community to the resort for lunch.

"We want the people of Ruidoso to get a better understanding of what goes on up here," said Parker. "Many of the local residents don't ski and never get up here." Indeed half of the approximately 100 people who attended raised their hands in a show of non-skiers.

Visitors were transported by buses from Ruidoso to the lodge area, where they were served lunch. Parker welcomed all, and gave a question/answer period.

It was learned that:
—Ski Apache will officially open Thanksgiving.

—Although the southern Ruidoso sides of the mountain may be brown, the northern Ski Apache side, which has little direct sun exposure, may offer perfect ski conditions.

—The slopes can comfortably accommodate 5,000 skiers per day, but heavy traffic days often have up to 7,000 people.

—The newest lift, triple Chair 1,

can carry 2,000 passengers per hour. The combined capacity of the eight lifts at the resort are about 12,500 skiers per hour.

—The slopes offer 36 different trails with 1,800 feet in vertical drop.

—The resort employs 40 full-time, and 250 seasonal people.

—Last season, a medical clinic, with a doctor, nurse and X-ray facilities, was added.

—This year, a new trail was added, a popular trail was doubled in width, and parking facilities can accommodate up to 100 more vehicles.

—The snowmaking machine, which can be operated under ideal temperature and humidity conditions between sundown and dawn, can convert 1,000 gallons of water to snow per minute.


—The reason the resort does not take credit cards is that it is time-consuming to process them, and the phone lines are not dependable enough to ensure credit can be checked.

—The "best" year the resort had was two years ago when 274,000 tickets were sold.

After the question/answer period, visitors were invited to watch a \$120,000 Power Tiller groom the slopes. The demonstration was followed by a gondola ride.

As blue shadows reached out across the smooth white slopes, smiling visitors reluctantly boarded their vehicles for the slow descent home.

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
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
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

Teacher and students reunite after 56 years

The Miller brothers hadn't seen or heard from their elementary school teacher, Miss Margaret Marris, for 56 years when they got together last week in Ruidoso.

But the three laughed, talked and reminisced like old friends when they visited The News last Friday.

When Miss Marris took over the fourth, fifth and sixth grade class in Alexander, Texas, in 1928, both Lefty and Russell Miller were among the youngsters she taught.

In carefully preserved photographs from those Erath County days, the stylish young teacher looks very little older than her overall-clad students. After all, she was fresh out of teachers' college and on her first teaching job.

Miss Marris, now white-haired but as fashion-conscious and stylishly dressed as in her 1930 photo, recalls spending just two years in that school. But something special must have happened between the young teacher and her students during that time. For not only is Miss Marris in contact with the Miller brothers, but she has also found many other youngsters from that class, and they are planning a big reunion very soon.

"She had so much love for each of the students—her heart must have been made of 24-karat gold," said Russell Miller, and his brother, Lefty,

agreed.

As planned by the former teacher to be reunited with the Miller brothers, she reminisced both nostalgically and realistically about her dealings with 10- and 12-year-old boys.

"He was a mischievous little bugger," said Miss Marris, referring to Lefty Miller, who was in her class for two years. "Both of them were, though," she added with a smile.

Miss Marris said Friday she taught just seven more years and

went on to work for the U.S. Department of Agriculture as a home economist and later was responsible for public relations for a children's polio hospital in Houston, Texas.

The Millers and Miss Marris said they'll continue locating the youngsters from that long-ago class in Alexander, Texas, and have a big reunion—maybe in Ruidoso.

"You can't get to Ruidoso," noted Miss Marris, adding she hopes the new airport will solve that problem.

When the Salk vaccine was discovered that hospital was closed, and Miss Marris said she settled in Colorado where she worked as a savings counselor for Western Savings until her retirement.

"I'm going to live to be 150," remarked Miss Marris positively.

Capitan Village Trustees talk water, property tax

Capitan Village Trustees heard discussions on the Mescalero Apache water suit and property taxes at their meeting Monday.

Lincoln County Commissioner Ken Nosker appeared before the trustees and a standing room only crowd, to clarify what is and could happen in the water suit.

Nosker emphasized the fact that anyone wishing to participate in the water suit must file an Intent to Participate before Monday, November 17. "If you have not filed by then," Nosker explained, "you no longer have any right to protest, Ever!"

"The Mescalero Apache Tribe has filed a request for 18,000 acre feet of water from the Ruidoso and Eagle Creek. In a year, the Ruidoso only receives 9,000 acre feet, they're asking for twice what it produces!" Nosker said. "The threat of this claim is to everyone in Lincoln County. If the water is depleted at its source, it will deplete all our water, municipal, irrigation and wells. The water levels will drop lower than can be pumped. It will effect the whole watershed for all of southeast New Mexico."

A pretrial conference is scheduled for 9 a.m. Monday, November 24, at the Federal Courthouse in Roswell. Nosker urged everyone to attend. The trial has a tentative

beginning date of March 1, 1987.

The Village of Capitan has filed a notice of intent to participate after agreeing at a previous meeting to do so. Members of the council will be at the pretrial conference, but they urge the people of the county to get involved in this and to attend the pretrial conference.

In another discussion, the audience complained of being taxed above the promised maximum of five percent, stating they had been misled by the media and officials, believing their property tax rates would not be above five percent of last year's.

"What most of us didn't understand," Nosker explained, "was the reclassification being done on the property at the same time. If only the evaluation went up, then your taxes weren't supposed to be raised more than five percent, but if your property was reclassified then the

taxes were raised accordingly. The commissioners or Marian Schlarb (tax assessor) had nothing to do with this. It was state mandated and Marian was bound by state law to do it.

"What started all this is our legislators, get the ear of them and they can change it," Nosker opined. "We can protest and let our legislators know how unhappy we are with this."

Nosker promised to see that copies of the tax bill were posted at the city halls all over the county.

In other business, the trustees:

- Agreed to publish a request for rental/lease on the Co-op building.
- Agreed to publish for public hearing an ordinance for a curfew in Capitan. The first public hearing will be at the next regular meeting.
- Approved temporary winter hours for the Village Municipal office for 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.

Election, water, trash occupy Downs trustees

The Ruidoso Downs Board of Trustees Monday learned of the judge's decision on a petition calling for a special election in the village, voted to participate in the Indian water suit and agreed to begin using the Ruidoso trash compactor for municipal refuse use.

Village attorney Richard Hawthorne reported to the trustees that retired District Judge George Zimmerman had ruled last week that a group who had petitioned the village for a special election increasing the number of the board to six from four members had two choices. He said they can drop the petition or agree to delete the name of Mayor J.C. "Jake" Harris from the petition, thus making the petition valid.

The petitioners this week agreed to go ahead with the petition without Harris included, and affirm their call for the special election. (See related story.)

Downs clerk JoAnn Jenkins reported that the trustees came out of executive session during their meeting and voted to put \$5,000 in participation by the village toward a water rights lawsuit involving the Mescalero Apache Tribe.

Also during the meeting, the trustees voted to begin using the services of the Village of Ruidoso's trash compaction system on a yearly basis.

In other business, the trustees: —Voted to donate \$100, given to the village by Safeway, to the Happy Holidays food and toy drive. —Commended Jenkins on the wording she used in a letter to the president of Texas Monthly Magazine, protesting an article in the October issue which termed Ruidoso Downs as "poor cousin down the mountain from Ruidoso." —Heard a report from Municipal Judge Martin Valenzuela on his plan to use the old Ruidoso State Bank building across from Village Hall as a courtroom. The building, which has been offered to the judge rent-free, is insured by the bank, and no utility deposits will be required, he reported. Valenzuela said the only costs will be monthly utility bills and liability insurance.

Inside the Capitol by Fred McCaffrey

SANTA FE—The wise oldtimers here have nothing but praise for Garrey Carruthers' first appointment.

The choice of Maralyn Budke as his chief of staff, if it sets a tone, could hardly be better. As the longtime director of the Legislative Finance Committee, she proved herself a professional civil servant, in the best sense of those terms. From that vantage point, she also had an unusual opportunity to develop a depth of knowledge of the machinery that actually makes our state government function.

More important, she is extremely intelligent and notably tough-minded—and that latter quality will be essential in the post she holds for the year in which she has committed to hold it.

Maralyn is a functionary in the true sense, which means she has no hidden personal agenda and no apparent desire to manipulate those who employ her to achieve her personal aims.

At this time in any year, the media makes much talk about the state's budgeting process.

At a time of transition, during which there will be both an Anaya and a Carruthers budget in preparation, such talk may logically be expected to double.

We don't do all this stirring on the topic because there is nothing else to write about. Maybe it might be well to pause for a moment and explain why this particular topic so fascinates some of us.

Say "budget" to most people, and they think of some sort of forbidding document drawn up by accountants that has no more to do with life and pleasure than the practice of balan-

cing one's checkbook. In some ways that is true, but a budget for state government does a whole lot more than that mental picture might imply.

Long before it becomes a matter of figures in forbidding columns, a state government budget is a policy document. There is an old saying in government and other areas, "No finance, no romance," that is literally true. So by indicating what functions of the state will be funded, a budget tells us what the chief executive under whose direction it is prepared adopts as his actual policies. Here we get, instead of some gaseous, quasi-philosophical statements, a hard-down look at what the man at the top really intends to try to accomplish.

Secondly, such a budget gives us, in the amount of money it distributes to the various enterprises, something of a work-plan for the year for which it has been prepared.

The physical form of lots of numbers we often think of when we hear the word thus becomes only the third of the functions a budget actually fulfills.

What we have in Santa Fe at the moment is two men who contrast greatly with one another in their approach to government, Toney Anaya and Garrey Carruthers. There will be no place that contrast is expressed more graphically than in the budgets, about which we will be writing so many words in the weeks immediately ahead.

What this state needs is a constitutional amendment that limits the number of constitutional amendments.

As you remember, you spent what

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seemed like an hour in the voting booth last week because, in addition to all the choices we had to express between human candidates, we also had to make selections on eleven such proposed changes to the state constitution.

One reason that happens is that New Mexico—God Be thanked!—does not have provision for adding to our ballot those referenda from the citizens some states allow for. The only way to refer a decision to the whole electorate here is to cast it into the form of an amendment to the constitution.

Now we often have in legislative office some who don't really believe in representational government, and so want to refer every important decision back to the voters; and some who haven't the courage to adopt sweeping change on their own say-so, and so seek the "ayes" and "nays" directly from us.

To keep such impulses from running wild, we should limit the number of such endeavors that may be attempted in any election year.

Three might be a satisfactory maximum to allow for.

Reporter's Round

Since the 1956 declaration that alcoholism is a disease (by the American Medical Association), many alcoholics have received treatment. Through their interactions with the alcoholic's families, professionals discovered that as the alcoholic's disease progresses, the spouses become increasingly preoccupied with the alcoholic's behavior—this behavior is called co-alcoholism or co-dependency.

For children of these parents, life can indeed be a lonely and frightening place, as neither parent is consistently responsive or available—thus are abnormal family dynamics created by the alcoholism. Studies by Dr. Claudia Black indicate that 60 percent of all alcoholics had at least one alcoholic parent, and that children of alcoholics often marry alcoholics or people with other compulsive lifestyles.

Dr. Black, in her book "It Will Never Happen To Me," states that 28 to 34 million people in America

are being reared or were reared in alcoholic homes—homes in which inconsistency and unpredictability is the norm. Unlike healthy families in which children are nurtured, and taught to openly express feelings, in an alcoholic home, feelings are repressed.

When the alcoholic ceases to function productively, the other family members must take on added responsibility. Children in these families often become locked into roles they perceive necessary for their survival. Dr. Black found that these children often adopted one or a combination of the following roles:

—THE RESPONSIBLE ONE, the 10 going on 30-year-old, is usually an only or oldest child. He/she seldom misbehaves, rather takes on many of the household and parenting responsibilities for the other siblings and, very possibly, for the parents.

—THE ADJUSTER, finds it easier to simply follow directions, handle

whatever has to be handled, and adjust to the circumstances of whatever has to be handled. This coping pattern allows the child to appear more flexible, more spontaneous and, possibly, more selfish than others in the home.

—THE FLACATER, or family comforter, feels responsible for whatever pain the family is experiencing. This youngster is much more sensitive to other people's feelings and is a good listener, taking away mom's sadness, brother's fear, sister's embarrassment and dad's anger.

Dr. Black lists certain family "laws" that these children learn:

—DON'T TALK, about the real issues—that of the alcoholism, instead focus is placed on the results. A tremendous system of minimizing, denying and rationalizing exists with the belief "if you just ignore it, maybe it will not hurt; if you ignore it, maybe it will go away."

—DON'T TRUST. Children raised in alcoholic family structures have learned how not to trust others in talking about the real issues. They have also learned it is simply best not to trust that others will be there for them, emotionally, physically, and possibly even psychologically.

—DON'T FEEL. The laws "don't

talk" and "don't trust" teach children it isn't safe to share feelings either. Children learn not to share their feelings and, inevitably, learn to deny feeling because they don't trust these feelings will be validated by family members or friends. They don't trust their feelings will get the necessary nurturing. Children of alcoholics don't perceive others as resources, therefore, they live their lives alone, with feelings of isolation, fear, worry, embarrassment, guilt, anger, loneliness etc.

As children of alcoholics mature into adult children of alcoholics, these family laws have produced certain lifestyle patterns. Sharon Wegscheider-Cruse, author, therapist, and Founding Board Chairperson of the National Association for Children of Alcoholics, lists these common patterns in "Choice-making." Adult children of alcoholics lead lives characterized by:

—AN INABILITY TO HAVE SPONTANEOUS FUN, an inability to let go. ("Life is serious, spontaneity cannot be trusted, because it means I'm not in full control.")

—PROBLEMS WITH INTIMACY. ("I don't trust...ANYONE, for that way lies betrayal and disappointment and pain.")

Have you been to Cree Meadows Country Club this year?

"Well, of course," you may have answered, "everything happens at Cree."

That's probably true, but maybe not for long.

The club membership's board of directors will meet Saturday to determine the future of the club. One option they'll consider is whether to close the club to the public.

If the club had been completely closed to the public last year, the effect would have been far-reaching. These events and organizations would have had to find some other, possibly much less suitable, place to gather:

Sierra Blanca Airport Groundbreaking luncheon; Rotary Club; Sertoma Club; Kiwanis Club charter banquet; Homebuilders; Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce Watch Party; Ruidoso Little Theatre productions; Republican Women; Democratic Women; Lincoln County Bar Association; Ruidoso Shrine Club Potentate banquet; Spirit of Ruidoso; Ruidoso High School student council meeting, booster club meeting, school board spaghetti dinner; Cancer Society; Ruidoso Valley Greeters; Ruidoso Library Board; Friends of the Library; Ducks Unlimited; Ruidoso-Sunland All American Party; Horsemen's Hospitality Party; the Lincoln County Show of Art; Contel; Texas-New Mexico Power Company; Ruidoso State Bank; Amway; politician parties; proms; wedding receptions; etc.

Any of those events sound familiar? Locals, as well as a huge number of out-of-towners, were attracted to the club to participate in those events and meetings.

Perhaps you played a few holes of golf there this year. So did a lot of other people.

The club hosted seven major tournaments during the year. The largest were the match-play invitational in August and the Johnny Williams Memorial Partnership Tournament in September, both of which attracted more than 100 golfers.

In addition, there have been eight scrambles, and heavy regular use play. A pro shop spokesman estimates half of the regular players and a greater percentage of tournament players are from out-of-town.

So, last year, nearly everyone in town and a crowd of out-of-towners made use of the club. Cree general manager Marian Black calls the club the "hub" of the community. We agree that it plays a vital role.

But more memberships must be sold to keep the club open to the public. The board has offered several membership options, from full to social. Consider them.

We have relied on Cree to be our community center. Now it must rely on us. Support it.—DJP

—INABILITY TO KNOW WHAT NORMAL BEHAVIOR IS. ("The way I feel...I wonder if I'm crazy?")

—AN EXAGGERATED NEED FOR THE APPROVAL OF OTHERS. ("I must always be on guard to keep from offending others. I must please them, always please them. Then they'll like me.")

—CONFUSION ABOUT MAKING DECISIONS. ("I can't decide—it's too complicated, I might make a wrong decision and it would destroy me.")

—BLACK AND WHITE JUDGMENTS. ("I don't see any room for compromise. There are no shades of gray in this matter!")

—FEAR AND DENIAL OF ANGER. ("Anger makes me feel like I might explode, and it frightens me because I don't know what I might do—but I get angry anyway.")

—LIES AND EXAGGERATION, when it would be easy to tell the truth. ("I never lie. There's nothing wrong. I'm not angry.")

—FEAR OF ABANDONMENT. ("I'm no clinging vine, but I couldn't live without you!")

—TENDENCY TO LOOK FOR PEOPLE TO TAKE CARE OF. ("It's wonderful to be needed by others.")

—NEED TO CONTROL SELF AND OTHERS. ("I can't let my guard down—life's a serious business." Or: "I'll show him—I just won't talk to him anymore!")

These problems exist with adult children of alcoholics, as well as children from other dysfunctional homes—homes in which their emotional needs are not met. There is help available, through counseling, Alanon and Alateen programs, and through the many enlightening self-help books available.

The most effective books I've found in dealing with these issues are:

—"It Will Never Happen To Me" and "My Dad Loves Me, My Dad Has a Disease" by Claudia Black, PhD, MSW.

—"Adult Children of Alcoholics" and "Struggle for Intimacy" by Janet Geringer Woititz, EdD.

—"Women Who Love Too Much" by Robin Norwood.

—"Choice-Making" and "Another Chance" by Sharon Wegscheider-Cruse.

—"Love is Letting Go of Fear" by Gerald Jampolsky, M.D.

There is also a new Adult Children of Alcoholics and Other Dysfunctional Families group which meets for an hour every Friday at noon at Spango (next door to the Lincoln Cablevision.) For information call Roe Barrett at 256-3566.

Multiple stakes winner Dance Trainer, hero of the Albuquerque Handicap at the State Fair and the Roadrunner Handicap at Ruidoso, won his first stakes event at the local meeting on Nov 8. The game gelding took the \$9,500 Cutarusty Handicap in impressive fashion after being passed at mid-stretch by Tilt The Odds. Under urging from veteran pilot Jim Powell, Dancer Trainer came back near the wire to record a half-length decision in good time.

Veteran rider George Fryday took advantage of a heads-up break in Sunday's running of the Savannah Swinger Series 2 as Keene Jet held off hard-charging foes Sitting On Go, Copper Bugs, Up Front Runner and Leading Jet. A head separated each horse through fifth place. Game Doll, the favorite in the Savannah, finished eighth, beaten by 3 lengths.

Keene Jet rockets to win Sunday in Swinger

It took the photo-finish camera to separate the top four horses in Sunday's Savannah Swinger Series at Sunland Park with Keene Jet getting the nod in a close victory over a good field of quarter horses.

The second leg of the Savannah featured a full field of short-course specialists that included multiple stakes winner Leading Jet; Up Front Runner, winner of the first race in the series; Canterbury Championship winner Copper Bugs; and Keene Jet, no worse than second in 10 of 11 races this year.

Contested at 400 yards, the Savannah Swinger No. 2 offered a gross

purse of \$9,800.

Veteran reinsman George Fryday took the riding assignment aboard Keene Jet breaking from the rail post position for owner/trainer Duane Weber. Three doors down, Sitting On Go loaded into the four hole under Mike Lidberg.

Copper Bugs made his bid from the No. 6 post off a two-month layoff with Darrell Blevins in the irons. Up Front Runner was going after his fifth straight win, breaking from the nine hole with Jerry Rodriguez aboard.

When the bell sounded, Keene Jet rocketed to an early lead a few strides down the lane. Fryday held the Jet Dane gelding on a straight course as Sitting On Go and Copper Bugs gained steadily on the leader. From the outside, Rodriguez was making up considerable ground off a poor break aboard Up Front Runner.

Keene Jet and Fryday held their lead, with no more than a head separating the four horses at the wire. The victory earned \$5,900 for Weber, who resides in Milliken, Colorado. It was Keene Jet's seventh win this year. The final time was 20.23 seconds over a fast track.

Dance Trainer went postward as the 6-5 favorite off four consecutive victories that included three stakes wins at Ruidoso Downs and the New Mexico State Fair. Regular rider Jim Powell was aboard the

Powell took Dance Trainer to an early lead through the backstretch with 10-1 outsider Medieval pressing the pace around the far turn. Dance Trainer held the advantage on the rail as the two-horses neared the top of the stretch. Burgos moved Tilt The Odds within striking distance on the bend and drew

alongside the two frontrunners near the eighth pole.

With Medieval racing between the two favorites, Dance Trainer and Tilt The Odds traded the lead through the final furlong. Powell got Dance Trainer up in the final strides to pull away for a half-length win in a very good time of 1:19.4. Owner Billy Moore of Denver City, Texas, pocketed \$5,700 for the effort. Dance Trainer now holds earnings of more than \$52,000.

Tilt The Odds held off Medieval by a neck for second-place money of \$2,090. Fred Danley trains the Tilt Up colt for El Pasoans Tom Dawson, Don Luciano, Steve Jay and Leo Villareal, Jr.

Medieval checked in a half-length in front of Mr. Nicholas to bank \$1,140. Betty Harless rode the colt for trainer Coy Hendrix. Duck Stuffed was fifth, while Ruffetta finished sixth. Dimmitt County was seventh and Golden Special eighth.

Jockey/Trainer Standings

Red-hot rider Salustio Burgos and trainer Fred Danley continued to dominate the standings at Sunland Park, earning honors in their respective ranks for the second consecutive week.

Burgos made five trips to the winner's circle over the weekend, moving from third to the top spot in the season standings. It remains a close battle for leading jockey with no more than a win separating Burgos from Pedro Benitez (13), Danny Sorenson (12) and defending champion Mike Lidberg (11).

Rounding out the rider list are Jerry Rodriguez with nine wins; Joe Martinez and Leroy Coombs with seven each; and Carlos Rivas, apprentice Lewie Germany and Glenn Lowry with six wins for the season.

Fred Danley, last season's leading trainer, drew off to a six-win lead after saddling another four winners over the three-day weekend to boost his season total to 13. Lewis Germany held on to his second-place slot tying Jake Cascio and Doyal Roberts with seven wins each.

Cliff Lambert Sr. capped the top five on the trainer's list, with his son Cliff Jr. checking in sixth after tallying five in the win column. Cliff Jr. is pressed by Gerald Marr and Paul Smith with the same number of winners.

BASIC PREPARATION PERSIMMONS and POMEGRANATES

Be sure to permit either variety to ripen at room temperature before serving. To serve soft persimmons, place stem end down on individual plate, cut gashes through the top and spoon out the fruit.

Serve slices on cereal or combine with other fruits.

If you are unfamiliar with pomegranates, look at the color and you will see the brilliant beauty of this fruit. The tiny seeds are covered with ruby-red, juicy flesh. The seeds are edible, as they are very small and usually tender.


The connecting pulp is slightly bitter and should be separated from the seeds, or arils, and discarded.

To remove the arils [the fleshy coated seeds], cut pomegranates in quarters, and remove from shell with a spoon. Remove the connecting pulp and discard.


Use in fruit salads, in seafood salads and fruit cocktails.

Garnish puddings and desserts with sparkling pomegranate arils. The color contrast of a few jewel-colored pomegranates sprinkled on whipped cream is quite startling.
