## Councillor Holt resigns; job conflict

Village Councillor William A. "Dub" Holt Tuesday submitted a letter of resignation to Mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr.

Holt, appointed in June 1985 by Mayor George White to fill the council seat vacated by the resignation of village attorney John Underwood, was elected last March to a four-year term.

"I have truly, truly enjoyed serving on the council," said Holt Wednesday. He said he gained a new insight into the workings of village government.

After accepting a full-time job at the Fort Stanton Hospital and Training School, Holt said he learned that the attorney general has ruled a state employee cannot also serve as an elected official.

"This is one of the most difficult decisions I've had to make in my life," said Holt. But he explained that he had to weigh his enjoyment in serving on the council versus the benefits to himself and his family of accepting the position in his field of education and expertise, speech and language therapy.

"Life's full of decisions," noted Holt, adding that he had to think about his family.

Holt said he didn't know when he sought the position on the council that a position in his field might be available at Fort Stanton.

His regret at leaving office includes some regret that the state won't allow his continued service.

"I understand the ruling, but it doesn't seem appropriate in this case," said Holt. He said he could see no time when the two positions would cause a conflict.

While admitting that he hasn't had all the answers, Holt said he feels that he always listened to the people who elected him.

Holt and his wife, Margaret, own and operate Playland Daycare. As a small business owner, Holt said he felt that he voted the way most business people would have voted.

"I feel like I stood by my campaign," said Holt who has consistently opposed new or increased taxes as well as increases in the cost of village government.

"If the occasion ever arises again I would gladly serve," said Holt.

## Airport design detailed at pre-bid conference

The \$6 million-plus Sierra Blanca Regional Airport (SBRA) project has aroused the interest of more than 50 contractors from New Mexico, Texas, Colorado, Arkansas and Illinois, said engineer Earl Cook Wednesday.

Cook explained special requirements and bidding details during a pre-bid conference on Phase 1 of the project Wednesday at Ruidoso Village Hall and then led a tour of the SBRA site.

He said the purpose of the project is to replace the Ruidoso Municipal Airport as quickly as possible thus "relieving the existing aviation hazard." Project plans call for completing Phase 1 in 150 calendar days.

"It is our intention to have airplanes landing at the new airport by this time next year," said Cook. He told contractors that pre-qualification statements are due Monday, November 24, and bids will be opened at an open meeting on December 3.

Cook told contractors of haul route limitations on Fort Stanton Road. He said the road is not suitable for hauling heavy equipment or supplies, and contractors will be required to use State Road 214 (Devil's Canyon Road).

Lou Medrano, District II engineer with the State Highway Department, said the current roadway (214) is scheduled for minor improvements.

"It will be a suitable haul route when we get through," said Medrano.

Cook said the successful bidder will be responsible for providing a detour for the existing county road that cuts through the airport site on Fort Stanton mesa.

Another provision of the contract calls for hiring area workers whenever possible.

Airport administrator Fred Heckman said two agencies are available to help the contractor locate qualified area residents.

Heckman said the New Mexico Employment Security Commission in Alamogordo and the Mescalero Employment Service provide that service.

Fern Blaylock, director of the tribal employment office, said her federally funded office will assist in the placement of both Indian and non-Indian applicants.

"We would like to assist you with employment," said Blaylock. "We can't refuse service to anyone," she added.

Blaylock said the office provides a skills bank, and will compile applicant folders. It is located in the Community Center in Mescalero. Blaylock encouraged contractors to call her for more information at 671-4495 extension 202.

Cook told interested contractors that water for the construction phase may be available from a well on the airport land. But Sierra Blanca Airport Commission (SBAC) attorney Steve Sanders cautioned that the water rights the group has purchased have been disputed by the State Engineer's Office.

"We cannot guarantee at this time we will have the water in January," said Sanders. He said a hearing is scheduled in January.

Alternate sources of water include Rancho Ruidoso and two subdivision wells owned by a group represented by Roswell engineer Jackie Atkins, said Cook.

The first phase of construction includes earthwork, drainage, and an access road on the airport property. An 8,100-foot runway is planned as part of the second phase.

Cook said that runway will be capable of handling DC-9 and Boeing 737 aircraft.

Funding for Phase 1 is in place, but Phase 2 funding is dependent upon Ruidoso's \$2,676,000 obligation, said Heckman.

The state has allocated \$733,800 for the project this fiscal year and the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) has authorized \$8,598,620 for the first phase, said Heckman.

He said Phase 2 is expected to require \$6,626,500 and the final phase, including a terminal building, is estimated at \$3,509,740.

The completed facility will cost about \$17,468,040.

According to a funding report provided by Heckman, local governments will be expected to provide \$300,000 to pay for items not eligible for reimbursement from the FAA.

## P & Z members talk of changes they'd like to make

The Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) Monday wrestled with recurring problems they encounter with village setbacks and then approved two requests for variances to those setbacks.

"I just hate to be telling people what they can do with their own place," said Commissioner Eddie Nichols during the workshop preceding the regular meeting. "We've got too damn many rules already," he added.

The six members present agreed that the 20-foot front and back, and the 10-foot side property line setbacks are far too restrictive for much of Ruidoso.

Nichols said if neighbors on both sides don't object to structures built into those setbacks, P&Z should approve a request for a variance.

While most commissioners agreed, Commissioner Ken Carr cautioned the group to look at the reasons the 20-foot setbacks were

originally established. He said the view and the size of the lot should be considered.

Further discussions on variances centered on a \$100 attorney's fee that property owners granted variances must pay to the village attorney.

Commissioners wondered why the fee is paid to the attorney, and enforcement officer Sandy Hall explained that the village lawyer does four pages of paperwork and files the legal documents for variances.

"That sounds like an unnecessary hardship," said Commissioner John White of the fee. He wondered when the attorney's contract comes up for review. "That's absurd to charge a property owner that," he added.

"If you want to get around the law you've got to pay for it," noted Nichols.

In discussions on a provision in the zoning ordinance allowing the enforcement officer to grant variances administratively on property built before 1976, White ques-

tioned if that is too much authority for that position.

When Carr explained the provision is one the Ruidoso Village Council recommended, White said he didn't understand why P&Z needs to go along with the council.

During the regular meeting Commissioner Jess Stinson pushed for a change to the sign ordinance that would allow neon signs.

"Neons are coming back," said Stinson, adding he wanted to put the question to a vote Monday because he felt he had enough votes to get his proposal passed.

But Commissioner J.D. James suggested that neon signs be the subject of a workshop preceding the next regular meeting.

"This is a serious subject," cautioned James.

Village attorney John Underwood, on hand for the meeting but not the workshop, suggested the idea be "run by" the council.

Underwood. In regular business the commission:

—Approved a request by agent Joyce McMath for a 1.2', 6.6' front property line variance for new construction on Lot 2, Block 7, Wingfield Homestead 2nd Addition for owners James R. and Dorothy Singleton.

—Approved a request by Robert P. Donaldson for a .04' north side property line variance for existing structure and a 7.64' front property line variance for new construction on Lot 8, Block 1, Country Club Estates.

—Advised Sharon and Bob McIntire to continue with the established non-conforming use rather than request a rezone on a duplex they have purchased in a single-family residential neighborhood. The McIntires said the house has been used as a duplex since 1947.

Chairman David Smith, Vice-chairman Pete Thompson and Commissioner Ellen Miller were absent from Monday's meeting.

## Indian water claim opposition grows

More than 500 individuals have filed intents to enter a water case involving the United States government, the Mescalero Apache Indian Tribe and water users in the Pecos river system, according to District Court records in Chaves County.

District Court clerk Trudy Hale said she had entered the names of 532 people as of Monday, November 17, but had received more names on Tuesday that were not yet recorded.

Hale said she'll continue to accept notices from individuals wanting to participate in the case until

Friday. She said retired Supreme Court Justice LaFel Oman, presiding in the water trial, will determine whether the late notices will be entered officially.

Doug Perrin, attorney for the Water Defense Association (WDA), entered the names of more than 450 individuals in that case, according to a member of his Roswell office staff.

Anyone owning water rights that could be impacted by Mescalero Apache tribal claims to nearly 18,000 acre-feet per year off the Rio Ruidoso was eligible to enter the

water dispute, but the intents were due in District Court on Monday.

A pre-trial conference is scheduled at 9 a.m. Monday, November 24, at the Federal Building in Roswell. Perrin told the WDA at a meeting in Hondo that individuals who entered intents in their own names, rather than through an attorney, must be at the pre-trial conference in order to be a party in the case.

Members of the association are encouraging all area residents to be on hand for the meeting, whether they are water right owners or simply water users.

### Hospital's name change becomes official


The name of Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Hospital has been changed in an action initiated by the hospital's board of trustees and approved October 21 by the Lincoln County Commission.

The new name is Lincoln County

Medical Center, a name that, according to board chairman Roy L. (Pinky) Jones, "was selected to show that our hospital serves all of Lincoln County. It also is a name that is indicative of the depth and breath of our programs and

services."

The 42-bed facility is owned by the county and leased to Southwest Community Health Services, a multi-state healthcare system headquartered in Albuquerque.

## Charges may be brought in shoplifting incident

Two female Ruidoso High School students have been arrested and their case turned over to the juvenile probation officer on shoplifting charges, according to Ruidoso Police reports.

The students were charged with shoplifting on November 13, after Sandy Dacy, manager of the Treehouse in Sierra Mall, reported a pink St. Michel's sweat shirt was missing after five students were in the store, police said.



### Overnight Cranberry Salad

This salad is a family requirement at our house each year for Thanksgiving. It just would not seem like Thanksgiving without this traditional treat. This is one of the many ways I utilize cranberries during the Holidays. Cranberries are truly a favorite of mine. They have everything going for them! They are tasty, tart, gloriously colored and extremely versatile. New England sea captains early on knew of the cranberry's worth as a preventative for scurvy. Cranberries are packed with vitamin C and retain a high degree of nutritive value even after extended lengths of storage. Even the canned versions are packed with vitamin C as they have probably been processed very soon after picking.

### Overnight Cranberry Salad (serves 8)

- 1 pkg. fresh cranberries
- 1 cup sugar
- 2 cups miniature marshmallows
- ½ pint whipping cream
- 1 can of pineapple chunks

Sort and wash cranberries. Grind or thinly slice cranberries and add sugar to them. Let stand for at least 2 hours. Whip cream. Add cream, marshmallows and pineapple to cranberry mixture. Mix well and spoon into a pretty glass serving bowl. Cover with plastic wrap. Refrigerate overnight; remove plastic wrap and serve.





## Members discuss lunches, snow days

The Ruidoso Board of Education handled a varied agenda during their regular meeting Wednesday. The board decided to end the pursuit for a cafeteria management firm. According to school superintendent Sid Miller, the lunch program has had an increase in participation. Miller complimented the cooks on their meal planning and preparation which has encouraged more students to buy lunches at the cafeterias. If the present trend continues there won't be a further need to employ a cafeteria management firm. But, the board has reserved the right to consider this again at a future date.

The snow day procedure will remain as it has been in the past. When snow or ice creates hazardous driving conditions in Ruidoso, the following procedure will be in effect: "If weather conditions

develop to require an early dismissal from school, KREE and KOAW radio stations will broadcast the bulletin as soon as a decision has been made. In order to eliminate telephone calls to your child's school, please listen for information on the radio. KREE and KOAW will begin broadcasting any changes from the regular school day at 6:30 a.m. At that time, it will have been determined (by bus coordinator Don Weems and Rick Simpson) whether school will be cancelled or have a delayed start. If a particular bus cannot run its route, that will be announced at this time. When a bus does not run its route in the morning, it will run in the afternoon only after assurance that roads are safe and the afternoon trip is warranted. All cancelled snow days must be rescheduled according to state law."

In other business, the board: —Approved a salary increase for

substitute teachers from \$30 to \$32 per day for college degree certified teachers and from \$26 to \$28 for non-degree substitutes. If a substitute teaches more than 10 days in a month they will receive an additional \$6 per day retroactive. —Granted replacement of a 1976 school bus.

—Accepted a Resolution and Notice of the School Board election. Board members with expiring terms are Don Swalander and Mike Morris.

—Accepted the report of enrollment. There is one student more than the projected number for the 40th day.

—Approved the P.L. 81-874 Application and Assurances.

—Agreed to enter into the water rights suit involving the Mescalero Apache Tribe.

—Agreed "with reluctance" to drop the Baccalaureate Ceremony for 1987.

## Warriors hope to take bite out of Bulldogs Friday

Now the "second season" begins for the defending state AAA-division champion Ruidoso High School varsity football team.

The "second season" is the state playoffs, and the Warriors will start off Friday, November 21, with the same team they opened the regular season against: Artesia.

Artesia will host the Warriors in a 7:30 p.m. game. Ruidoso hammered the Bulldogs, 43-23, in the season-opener in Ruidoso almost three months ago.

Since then, the 10-1 Warriors have reached even higher levels except for a 28-19 loss to top-ranked Lovington in the second game of the season.

Ruidoso won the District 3-AAA title, crushing Silver City, 34-5, and dumping Deming, 56-14, in the final two games.

Artesia, on the other hand, finished second in District 4-AAA behind Lovington. The 4-4 Bulldogs had to struggle to beat West Las Vegas, 6-0, in a pre-playoff game last Saturday.

But Artesia has blanked its last two opponents and the Warrior coaches think the Bulldogs have improved.

"They're (Artesia) playing better defensively," said Warrior head coach Cooper Henderson. "They've got four or five different defensive starters than they had the first time we've played them, mainly up front."

Ruidoso had little trouble passing

against the Bulldogs in the first meeting between the two teams.

Warrior quarterback Jeff Willingham connected with all-state split end Brian Davis for three touchdowns.

Willingham completed 11 of 21 passes for 287 yards. He also scored two touchdowns and intercepted two passes on defense.

Davis grabbed eight passes for 241 yards.

On the season, Willingham has thrown 22 touchdown passes and run for eight more. Davis has caught 17 touchdown passes and scored six touch-down punt returns, kickoff returns and rushing.

But the biggest improvement in the Warrior game is the rushing attack.

Fullback Billy Harrison has been one of the state's leading rushers most of the season. Tailbacks Kirk Taylor and Chuck Daniels have done a good job. Taylor has scored seven touchdowns, including five in the second half of the season.

Wingback Bubba Miller is a threat to run and catch the ball, while tight end Bryan Richardson and split end Garret Henson are good receivers.

Ruidoso's offensive line averages 199 pounds per player with tackle Gene Mowdy and guard Carl Bowden the biggest at 230 pounds apiece.

On defense, Willingham at safety, Matt Evans at end, Colby Day at tackle and Daniels at middle linebacker lead a solid group. Willingham made all-state defensive back last season.

Artesia does not have the Warriors' statistics on either offense or defense, but appears to have improved over the course of the season.

The Bulldogs generally have run out of the Wing-T (same as Ruidoso), but have used a lot of unbalanced stuff recently.

"I think they've run about one third of their plays from that," Henderson said.

Junior running back Mike McPherson has been the Bulldogs' biggest offensive threat most of the season, but 125-pound Robert Boyce also has run well.

Alvino Lopez is the starting quarterback and Joe Rivera is the other member of the backfield.

Todd Kernal at 205 pounds and Brent Karr at 202 pounds are the biggest Bulldog offensive linemen.

On defense, Richard Donaghe (211 pounds) is the biggest starter.

If the contest is decided via the kicking game, Ruidoso could have an advantage.

Henson is an excellent field goal kicker and place kicker. The Warrior kickoff and punt return and coverage teams have been excellent this season.

But the game could all come down to the basics.

"The key should be if we follow our game plan well," Henderson said.

The clinic will last from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m.

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

The Lincoln County Lodgers' Tax Committee concentrated on county advertising at their meeting Monday.

# County Lodgers' Tax Committee hears promo proposal

In a regular monthly meeting of the Lodgers' Tax Committee, Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce representative Nancy Radziewicz asked for funds to send two representatives to the "31st San Antonio Sport, Boat and RV Show," January 13-16, 1987. Radziewicz expressed gratitude for the \$600 already promised for the event—\$100 from Ski Apache, and \$500 from the county Lodgers' Tax Committee. An additional \$1,616 was requested from the Lodgers' Tax Committee to cover the projected expenditures.

Purposes in attending the show were listed as follows:

The treasurer's report was reviewed and termed "confusing." Approval of the report is pending Bill Rawlins' review of it with clerk Leon Eggleston, who was absent from the meeting. Radziewicz reported on the Ruidoso Lodger's Association visit to Ski Apache, stating that the approximately 100 people were "well-informed" and that she felt it was "informative," "positive," and had "opened up doors of communication."

Before the meeting was adjourned, Phil Hamilton recounted a quote in the November 13 edition of The Ruidoso News of Ruidoso Mayor Lloyd L. Davis, in which Davis stated that lodgers "hate" the Inn of the Mountain Gods and "we all hate each other."

Hamilton stated, "I wish to go on record that I don't know of any lodger that hates the Inn, and we certainly don't hate each other. I don't appreciate his comment." All present voiced their agreement with Hamilton.

"Cree is vital to Ruidoso and has to have the support of village residents," said LeCrone, adding the club still has 4,000 shareholder memberships available. "We feel it is a good investment," she added.

Clubs and service organizations will still be welcome to conduct meetings and special events at Cree Meadows, said LeCrone. Since the club has become a "hub" of village activity, LeCrone said the board is working to come up with a variety of memberships so that everyone can continue to use the facility.

LeCrone said the board had a cocktail party for lodgers Wednesday to explain the new policies. She said each lodging establishment is encouraged to purchase a shareholder membership so that their guests may use the club facilities, including the golf course, on a guest card.

SANTA FE—The Anaya team has only a few weeks left in office; but it can still do a lot to screw up the machinery here.

You couldn't find a better example of that fact than the most recent reorganization of the Department of Health and Environment. That rearrangement of this much-put-upon agency took place at the start of the business day last Friday, when the Anaya clock had just a little over six weeks to run. There may be more efforts of the same kind in other parts of state government in the days ahead.

What is especially bad about this latest reshuffling of a part of the system the Anaya people cannot seem to keep their hands off is that it was almost certainly done for purely political reasons.

The "politics" in this instance have nothing to do with major political parties—either the one Anaya belongs to or the other one. They have to do with the internal politics of the Anaya office, where, we cannot help but observe, Shirley Scarafioti, whose daughter has been a frequently disturbing presence at Health and Environment for so long now, continues to reign.

The latest change will be viewed, despite all protests from mother and daughter and from mother's boss, as just another attempt to give the younger member of the Scarafioti duo her way.

Needless to say, executive powers were not bestowed on the man at the top so they could be used in this manner or for this purpose.

Maybe we should be grateful that this change did not go as far as it first looked like it would. There is evidence that at least at one point in this latest shift the Anaya office was considering asking Jerry Manzogol, present boss at HED, to resign so he could be replaced by Joe Johnson. That, you may remember, is exactly what happened previously to Fitzhugh Mullen, who was pushed out of office before he had time to get his feet wet so Joe could replace him.

In the previous instance, as well as now, the main recommendation in Johnson's favor was seen to be his ability to give the Scarafioti women what they wanted.

There are other evidences that

everything is not going smoothly behind the double doors that separate the governor's office from the general public. Despite Anaya's public appearance, especially when he is seen with Garrey Carruthers, of serenity and grace at the time of departure, reality does not appear to be that pleasant. The Governor appears to brood still on the matter of possible further action by the federal government looking into his private affairs.

Some say he seems downright paranoid.

Certain law-enforcement officers report he has considered asking all those who filled high posts in the Anaya administration to provide him with an unusual document before they depart their present offices. That paper, which some may actually have signed, is said to assert that they were never asked to perform any shady acts while in office and that they know of nothing of the kind being done by Anaya himself.

That is a mite unusual in its approach to public morality, and might be seen by some observers as falling into the area of protesting too much.

To illustrate the fact that there is still brooding going on over what the Anayas see as persecution of themselves from the federal government, some who get inside the double doors say an exceptional outburst resulted from the suggestion that the Governor's adversary, federal DA Bill Lutz, might be advanced to a federal judgeship, with his present job being taken over by a close associate of apparent Attorney General-elect Hal Stratton. From the firestorm that reportedly caused, it is clear the Governor takes with deep seriousness Lutz's promise that there will continue to be digging into Anaya's financial arrangements after he departs his present office.

The incoming Carruthers administration did a good thing when it decided to shut down that Washington office the state has been paying to maintain. It hasn't contributed anything measurable to the citizens of the state since Virginia Sears stopped running it, back when Bruce King was still our governor.

They all deserve a big pat on the back and a word of praise. I don't know what I'd do without them!

The Cree Meadows Country Club member meeting Saturday, November 15, was most informative and indicative of a hard working Board of Directors.

The entire community has been given the facts in the news media and a prospectus which was far from complete as far as actualities were concerned with relation to the value of physical properties. With over two million dollars (conservatively speaking) of assets involved for an investment of \$4,000 as a 1/500th owner, how could anyone deny that this is one of the greatest opportunities for future benefits? It develops that the general business community is not aware of the importance of the Cree Meadows Country Club or its value to the community.

The prime item is that no membership, as such, is worth \$4,000 when the facilities are available to anyone who wishes to avail themselves of the operation. The \$4,000 is an investment in a two million dollar facility that has tremendous potential and a show of support for the future of Ruidoso.

The Bank of Ruidoso and the Ruidoso State Bank are to be commended on their willingness to process loans for the \$4,000 on the basis of approximately \$90 per month to help secure share holders who otherwise could not afford that large an outlay of cash but who still want to show their interest in an investment that is sure-fire!

Those who withdrew their memberships to take advantage of the \$400 interest were not, in my estimation, true believers in their community. As examples of this, only two City Council members stayed with the program and the Chamber of Commerce only has one person who is supportive. What does that tell you?

Members of the Lodgers Association have an opportunity to give their patrons a special guest card which could build untold revenue for themselves. Real Estate people could give their clients a guest card to enjoy a day of golf at a most pleasant and beautiful facility for a nominal sum, thus building prestige for their profession. The reciprocal arrangements with

other Country Clubs, of which 75 have already applied with enthusiasm, is also encouraging.

Along with all of this, the minute the 500 memberships are sold (which will clear all debts) the dividends will be so lucrative that those with more than one share (should they ever choose to sell) will be in a position to collect a tremendous premium.

Cree Meadows Country Club owns 55 water rights, and possibly more. The Ruidoso area will be clamoring for a piece of the action if the State of New Mexico is not successful in the present suit on the docket.

There is no way anyone can justify a refusal to face facts and all businesses in the area should realize the importance of making this their prime investment for the future of Ruidoso and their own income potential.

Over and above the \$4,000 stock investment, there are two classes of membership available: Associate, with full rights the same as share holders except they cannot vote or serve on the Board of Directors, and Social, which entitles one to use the restaurant, lounge and swimming pool. Here again, consider what your guest cards can accomplish with business associates, customers and friends in town for a visit.

Also, to clarify some of the rumors, this does not change the present arrangements of the Service Clubs and other organizations who are on the agenda for monthly and/or weekly meetings, or special groups who need available space for their party functions.

## Heisabigboy is top Derby qualifier

Osvaldo Rodriguez, owner and publisher of the largest morning newspaper in Juarez, found himself in the winner's circle Saturday afternoon at Sunland Park Racetrack after Heisabigboy turned in the fastest qualifying time in trials for the \$30,000 Fall Quarter Horse Derby.

"I was sure he was going to qualify," said Rodriguez, who heads the operations of El Diario de Juarez. "I figured he could finish second or third. I knew he was in the fastest heat and 440 yards is his distance."

Heisabigboy was one of 25 sophomore quarter horses who faced off in three quarter-mile heats on Saturday's card. He'll head the

field for the renewal of the Derby on Nov. 30, where the winner earns \$15,000.

Jockey Jerry Rodriguez piloted Heisabigboy to a narrow neck decision in the final Derby division, stopping the timer in 21.915 with a light tailwind. Reinsman Rodriguez appeared to be out of contention when the field left the gates, but made up considerable ground in the final 100 yards to nip Cola Diabla at the wire.

"This is the first time I have qualified a horse for a stakes race," owner Rodriguez explained at his table in the Sunland Park Clubhouse. "I only began racing horses in the United States last spring at Sunland Park."

Rodriguez, who has made front-page headlines recently over an employee dispute at El Diario de Juarez, got involved with racing at his ranch in Casas Grandes where he would match horses with other ranchers in the area. Trainer Albert Pino took over the conditioning chores for Rodriguez' stable only two weeks ago.

Here's the complete qualifying field for the \$30,000 Fall Quarter Horse Derby: Heisabigboy, 21.915; Cola Diabla, 21.960; Timeto Get Tuff, 22.060; Miss Featurette, 22.095; Real Moody, 22.135; Jetatta, 22.200; Sea Six, 22.240; Doc Scott Jay, 22.240; Princess Lady Bugs, 22.250; and Easily An Angel, 22.270.

## Senor Gris is winner in Friday race

El Pasoan Sue Vargas' Senor Gris raced to a widening 3-length victory in Friday's feature at Sunland Park Racetrack, equalling the season's fastest clocking for the mile distance.

Addendum, the speedy thoroughbred owned by El Pasoans John and Carol Tisdale, went postward as the odds-on choice to win Saturday's mile headliner with Glenn Lowry taking the riding assignment for trainer Albert Dominguez.

Senor Gris was second in the wagering with veteran reinsman

Joe Martinez piloting the son of Poly's Blade from the far outside post.

Addendum took command of the route at the half-mile marker, overtaking 22-1 outsider Sailing Master as the seven-horse field rounded the final turn.

Martinez moved within striking distance on the bend, passing Addendum near the top of the lane to take a half-length advantage in deep stretch.

Senor Gris continued to draw away through the final furlong, holding a 3-length advantage at the

wire. The final time of 1:40.4 equaled the season's best clocking for a mile. Dr. Vargas earned \$1,400 for the effort. Larae Lovell saddled the winner.

Addendum held on for a distant second-place finish banking \$500 for the Tisdales. K. Jack checked in third under red-hot rider Salustio Burgos. Sailing Master faded to fourth after setting all of the early fractions with Kenneth Lewis aboard.

Chasing the top four across the wire were Hail Eagle, Prince B. Jae and Baran.

## Four fans collect \$10,000 each in Trifecta Sunday

Sunday was a big day for hefty payoffs at Sunland Park Racetrack as four fans took home more than \$10,000 each, while Texas horseman Ronald Orr banked \$59,000 for Raise A Count's victory in the All American Sale Futurity.

The wagering action kicked off early in the afternoon racing program when two handicappers pegged Sunland's Twin Trifecta to each collect \$10,082. American Sale Futurity.

"I knew the race was won when they kicked the latches on the gates," Charles commented leaning on the counter of the kitchen in the jockey's quarters after the race. "He left there smokin' and held the lead all the way."

The performance came as a surprise to the young reinsman who added that Raise A Count "hasn't been doing too good" since opening his racing career this spring at Val Verde Downs in Del Rio, Texas.

After qualifying for the Firecracker Futurity at Delta Downs in Louisiana last June, Charles said the chestnut colt lost all chances for his first stakes win by flipping in the gates.

Trainer Benton Zwerschke found himself with a sore horse after shipping to Sunland Park for the Sale Futurity trials earlier this month, Charles explained.

"He had abscesses in his feet," the Gollad, Texas, native said. "He couldn't even walk yesterday. We didn't have shoes on him till a couple days ago. But he was much better today."

Zwerschke was joined in the winner's circle of the Sale Futurity by owner Ronald Orr of Irref, Texas, who turned a tidy profit after purchasing Raise A Count for \$7,700 in the Select Quarter Horse Sale at Ruidoso Downs last year. The winner's share of the Sale Futurity's

### Traditional Carving Method for Roast Turkey

Let turkey stand for 20 or 30 minutes after roasting — then try this easy carving method.

1. Remove drumstick and thigh — To remove drumstick and thigh, press leg backbone will oftentimes snap free or with knife point. Cut dark meat completely from body by following body contour carefully with knife.



2. Slicing dark meat — Place drumstick and thigh on separate plate and cut through connecting joint. Both pieces may be individually sliced. Tilt drumstick to convenient angle, slicing towards plate as shown in illustration.



3. Slicing thigh — To slice thigh meat, hold firmly on plate with fork. Cut even slices parallel to the bone.



4. Preparing breast — In preparing breast for easy slicing, place knife parallel and as close to wing as possible. Make deep cut into breast, cutting right to the bone. This is your base cut. All breast slices will stop at this vertical cut.



5. Carving breasts — After base cut, begin to slice breast. Carve downward, ending at base cut. Start each new slice slightly up on breast. Keep slices thin and even.
