## Warriors muzzle Bulldogs

Ruidoso High School's varsity football team survived four turnovers in taking a 24-21 win over host Artesia in the first round of the state AAA-division playoffs Friday night.

The Warriors lost the ball three times on interceptions and once on a fumble, but used a crushing ground game and some excellent kicking by Garret Henson to come out on top.

Ruidoso's defending state champions will now host Belen (a 36-0 winner over Kirkland Central Saturday), at 7:30 Friday night, November 28, in a state semi-final contest.

The other semi-final game will pit Bloomfield at undefeated Lovington Saturday afternoon. The top-ranked Wildcats crushed St. Pius, 42-6, and Bloomfield beat Raton, 28-14, in games last Saturday.

For a while Friday night, it looked like the Warriors would not be defending their state title this season.

Artesia played much better than it did in the season-opening 43-23 loss to Ruidoso.

The Bulldogs took the lead three times against the Warriors before Billy Harrison ran seven yards for the winning touchdown with 10:25 left in the contest.

After Henson kicked the extra point, Ruidoso had its final 24-21 margin.

Harrison's touchdown finished a 48-yard drive by Ruidoso in eight plays.

The Warriors ran the ball on seven of the plays, with Kirk Taylor's 15-yard blast to the Artesia 30 the biggest play.

Three straight running plays netted 14 yards to the 16.

Quarterback Jeff Willingham then hit Henson for nine yards to the Bulldog seven. Two plays later, Harrison banged up the middle for the winning score.

But the Warriors still had a struggle on their hands.

Artesia failed to move the ball on two more series and Ruidoso failed to move the ball once.

With time running out, the Warriors had a third-and-six situation on their own 23.

Willingham found tight end Bryan Richardson over the middle for 12 yards and a first down at the 35.

Harrison, who ran for 123 yards in 13 plays on the night, then belted 18 yards to the Bulldog 47 and the War-

riors ran the clock out.

Artesia started the game out like it was going to knock the Warriors out of the playoffs early.

After Ruidoso failed to move the ball on the opening series of the game, Artesia took over on its 23.

Little running back Robert Boyce then dashed 77 yards down the left sidelines for a touchdown, giving Artesia a 6-0 lead.

The extra point kick was good and Artesia led, 7-0.

Both teams had the ball for one more series before the Warriors struck paydirt for the first time.

The Warriors drove 83 yards in nine plays for their first touchdown.

On a fake field goal attempt from the six, Willingham found all-state split end Brian Davis in the left side of the end zone for the touchdown.

Henson kicked the extra point and the game was tied, 7-7, with 1:40 left in the first quarter.

The big play in the drive was a 40-yard run by Harrison to the Artesia seven.

Taylor got one yard on a run and a pass was incomplete, making it third down. Another pass fell incomplete and that set up the fake field goal attempt.

The Warriors took the lead on their next series, driving 52 yards in eight plays.

Taylor went over from the one for the touchdown and Henson kicked the extra point for a 14-7 Warrior edge with 8:32 left in the first half.

## Pros and cons of proposed tax hike are discussed

While refusing to call their oral confrontation a debate, Al Junge and Don Shaw Thursday discussed the merits of increasing village gross receipts tax by a half cent.

Ruidoso Village Council's passage of the tax was followed by a negative referendum calling for an election, which has been scheduled for Thursday, December 18. The tax, if passed, is dedicated to purchase the site of the Ruidoso Municipal Airport by investing its value of \$2,676,000 into the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport.

Friends of the Library, sponsors of the forum, scheduled Shaw for half an hour then Junge for half an

hour, allowing each an additional 15 minutes for rebuttal.

But as Shaw began his presentation Mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr. interrupted from the back of the room, suggesting that since the forum was started by Friends of the Library for Junge, then Junge should lead off.

Junge disagreed.

"I had nothing to do with this thing being set up tonight," he said.

The moderator said Friends of the Library chairman Cal Cowden, who wasn't present, gave him the format and that would stand.

Throughout his speech Shaw stressed the importance of supporting the tax increase so that the unsafe Ruidoso Municipal Airport can be replaced by the regional facility

on Fort Stanton Mesa.

He reminded the audience of Ruidoso's long-standing obligation to invest the fair market value of the current airport, which will be closed, into the replacement airport.

Shaw said the only funding lacking to meet a schedule calling for an operational air field by November 1987 is the Ruidoso share.

"The airport is not going to be operational until we come up with that money," said Shaw. He said the only way to come up with those funds by April 1, 1987, thus keeping the project on schedule, is by a municipal bond issue.

Shaw presented figures showing that a .25 cent tax, originally considered but rejected, would result

in a 28-year payoff. He said any cut in the village budget would result in a cut in services.

"You start cutting down on services...it's going to have an effect on our tourism," said Shaw.

The proposed increase will cost the average citizen about \$50 a year, said Shaw, noting the burden will be shared by the tourists who visit the village.

Shaw said other resort towns charge gross receipts taxes that are nearly as high or higher than the 6.5 percent that will result if Ruidoso implements the additional tax. He listed several:

—Vail, Colorado.....8.1%

## Settlement reached on ruined Hollywood well

Village attorney John Underwood announced Thursday an agreement had been reached between the Village of Ruidoso and McCarty Construction Co. on the alleged contamination of the Hollywood well.

"They've agreed to replace the Hollywood well with a well of equal quantity and quality," said Underwood. He said the Hollywood well provided water at a rate of 800 gallons per minute before it became contaminated.

Underwood said McCarty has agreed to drill the new well, run pipelines to the distribution station and clean the equipment involved in the contamination.

Once the new well is operational, Underwood said various tests will be performed to determine if quantity and quality are like that of the

well that was lost. If the tests prove that the new well does that, then the Village of Ruidoso will release McCarty Construction from any further liability, said Underwood.

The three councillors present for the special meeting unanimously approved Underwood's recommendation.

"We were able to create a win-win situation," said Underwood, adding the negotiations that led to the settlement provided the "highest and best results" he has seen in such a case in a long time.

Underwood said assistant village manager Frank Potter and village engineer Mike Davalos were also involved in work that resulted in having the supplemental water supply replaced.

Potter gave the Denver-based hydrologist hired by the insurance company credit for the smooth settlement.

"He was really sharp," he noted, and Mayor Lloyd L. Davis asked if the man had been approved by the "local clearinghouse."

"How do you dare say he's a hydrologist?" laughingly asked the mayor.

The contamination was discovered when the Hollywood well was turned on July 29, 1985, to provide supplemental water for the overworked municipal system. About 16,000 gallons of contaminated water was pumped into the distribution system before the well was shut down at noon that day.

Potter was assigned to the water crisis, and concentrated on water

problems until it was resolved. He coordinated workers who put one of the new Eagle Creek wells in service to avoid water rationing when the Hollywood water was unpotable.

Village water engineers soon pinpointed diesel fuel as the contaminant.

On Monday August 16, 1985, Gary McCaslin of the state Environmental Improvement Division, after extensive investigations and testing, announced that underground tanks belonging to McCarty Construction Company were the source of the contamination.

Testing and negotiations have continued, culminating in the agreement approved Thursday.

# Airport Commission plans first bid opening

The Sierra Blanca Airport Commission (SBAC) Thursday discussed finances, heard the engineer's report and discussed the Ruidoso negative referendum before going into executive session to discuss litigation.

During the regular meeting commissioners approved paying New Mexico State University \$999,999 for the Fort Stanton Mesa airport site, since the federal government sent the commission a check for exactly that amount. Members wondered why the payment received wasn't for the \$1 million named in congressional action approving the land sale.

Project engineer Earl Cook said bids on PAC 1, the first portion of Phase 1, will be opened on Wednesday, December 3, and Commissioner Tim Morris recommended calling a special meeting for the bid opening. Members agreed.

Cook said the over \$6 million project gained a great deal of attention from bidders, but he estimated only about nine firms will be qualified. He said some large out-of-state firms, well-qualified to complete PAC1, were ineligible because they lack a New Mexico license.

The engineer recommended making water available for construction from the on-site well for 50 cents per 1,000 gallons. He said the Village of Ruidoso charges \$1.75 per 1,000 on construction water, but the commission will not be providing a power supply. He estimated it will cost a contractor about \$1.35 per 1,000 to get the water from the well.

Commission attorney Steve Sanders said the bid documents allow the commission up to 30 days to name the successful bidder. Cook said he can review the bids and present a tabulated report at the Thursday, December 18, meeting. "You're limited to the lowest bidder," reminded Sanders.

Morris revealed giving permis-

sion to Robert Richardson of Leedshill-Herkenhoff, Inc. to use the official Sierra Blanca Regional Airport logo. Commission Chairman Ken Nosker suggested if one person is allowed to use the logo, perhaps anyone who asks should be.

Morris then unveiled the draft of a document he, airport administrator Fred Heckman and Ruidoso assistant manager Frank Potter prepared on the proposed .50 cent gross receipts tax to be considered by voters on December 18.

Although the document was the subject of discussion during the open meetings, Morris refused to release a copy to The News.

However, Potter provided a copy of the draft—an information statement on the .50 cent gross receipts tax increase referendum of December 18, 1986. The paper is entitled, "Vote for the .50 Cent Sales Tax," and endeavors to sell the tax hike through assorted facts and figures.

Members discussed a public meeting dealing with the tax issue scheduled for Thursday night.

After the executive session the commission voted to lease water rights for \$1,000 from owner Betty Schrecengost until litigation over those rights is completed.





## School Board

### Parents protest religious classroom teaching

The Capitan Board of Education received threats of action by the American Civil Liberties Union from disgruntled Capitan parents at their meeting Tuesday.

Joe Salazar, chairman of the board of the Sacred Heart Catholic Church Council, told board members a Capitan teacher was teaching religion in the classroom and the council wanted it to stop.

"If the school board won't do it, we will go to the American Civil Liberties Union," Salazar warned, "but, one way or the other we will get it stopped!"

Salazar's wife, Colleen, added the instruction was disrupting the church and their homes. "To us, our religious education belongs in our church," she said, "not in our school."

Following executive session, board president James McDaniel reported that the individual in question had been called into Principal Jay Dark's office and questioned about the complaints. The individual denied the statements were said in class.

"We have to treat both parties fairly," McDaniel stated, addressing Salazar. "Bring in signed statements that this action occurred in class. It has to have occurred

in class this year and the instruction must deviate from the curriculum. There are times in the history curriculum when a teacher can use the Bible."

Superintendent Leonard Hays will receive the statements. He stressed all statements would be strictly confidential.

In other business, board members Tom Trost, Tim Worrell, Isidro Peralta and Preston Stone:

Shaw said tourists pay for a lot of expenditures in a resort town, listing differences in gross receipts taxes from March's \$270,000 through August's \$410,000 to illustrate his point.

Since the tax question ended up in a negative referendum, the 25 percent increase is no longer an option, said Shaw, explaining the Village Council is constrained by law from raising sales taxes for a full year after the election.

Shaw assured those he had heard say the tax, if passed, would be in place "for infinity," that the tax would be tied to land acquisition and will expire when the bonding for that purpose is paid off.

"Ruidoso has a history of not investing in the future," said Shaw, adding the new airport is desperately needed for both safety and economic reasons.

"I urge you to support this 50 percent increase. Failure to do so will delay this airport for at least a year, perhaps forever," said Shaw in closing.

Junge said he agreed 100 percent with his opponent except for his

final plea to support the tax. He complimented Shaw on his well-prepared presentation.

"I'm just an old country boy who represents some of the poor people in town," said Junge, calling himself the Don Quixote of Ruidoso. He said he didn't recall any taxes, once imposed, being stopped, and referred to the problems that plagued Grindstone Canyon Dam.

Junge questioned Ruidoso having to give "Uncle Sam" money for an airport that doesn't even bear the name of Ruidoso, and named the four other members of the SBAC.

"What do they share in this ... nothing," said Junge, noting that at one time a member of the airport commission was considerably behind on its \$500 yearly dues.

Junge bemoaned the failure of the Village Council to pass a 25 percent increase that was proposed the night the 50 percent sales tax hike was approved.

He said he was asked by a member of the Village Council how to do a negative referendum and suddenly became chairman. Junge said he and others who circulated the negative referendum petition stopped with 342 signatures after needing only 135.

"I think we could have gotten 1,000," he said.

"I frankly don't think that we need any additional taxes," said

Junge, who spent much of his half hour talking of increased property taxes.

He criticized the Village Council, saying had its members "done their work in a responsible way" in handling the tax question "we wouldn't be here tonight."

Shaw reminded Junge that any plan the council would formulate would involve increasing taxes, and reiterated that the tax will expire when the land is paid for.

Shaw continued to tie the tax question to the need for a new airport, and Junge said he agreed that the new airport is needed.

But Junge continued in his 15-minute rebuttal to rehash problems with Grindstone Canyon Dam and misinformation he said was presented on property taxes.

Had the two been debating, Shaw would have been the audience's choice as his presentations were greeted with applause from the 30 people at the forum. Junge finally asked for a round of applause, and congratulated Shaw.

The questions and answer period was dominated by audience-member Jack Koch, who had a lot to say about funding and safety. He suggested selling the municipal airport to pay for the new facility.

"You don't need two airports," said Koch. He suggested that tourists eventually might fly in on

the weekend, take a train up to the ski area, "give the Indians a bunch of money," and spend just the cost of a couple of meals in town.

John Jeffers, director of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Com-

merce, disagreed with Junge's inference that the tax would be an unfair burden on retired persons and wage earners.

"Isn't it incumbent on a healthy economy to keep the wage earners

employed?" asked Jeffers. He said Ruidoso can't afford not to support the 50 percent tax increase.

"I wish to heck I'd never got involved in this," remarked Junge.

# Murder victim's son recalls days after tragedy

Within hours after Randy Rickley learned of his mother's murder, he said he was questioned by New Mexico State Police for more than four hours.

Rickley is the 20-year-old son of Judy McKnight, who was murdered November 13, 1984, along with her husband, Thomas "Cotton" McKnight. Rickley was an only child.

He remembers that time he spent with State Police investigators, from 9:30 p.m. until 2 a.m. Thursday, November 15, as an ordeal. While they didn't tell him he was a suspect, he said their questions indicated he was.

"They took me away from my family, the people I wanted to be with, and asked me over and over if I killed them," said Rickley.

In Lincoln County last week to testify before a special grand jury hearing evidence in the brutal double slaying, young Rickley recalled those unhappy days after he lost his mother.

The tall slender blond was an 18-year-old college student then, sharing an apartment in Roswell with his cousin Jamie Bussey. They

both were attending Eastern New Mexico University at Roswell, but the tragedy cut short their educational plans.

"It was hard," said Rickley, who said he wanted to spend as much time as possible with his aunts, uncle and cousins after he got the devastating news.

As close as Judy and her young son were to her sisters and their families, family members look back on Judy and Randy as a team, sharing the good and the bad times together over the years.

Rickley was born in California where he and his mother lived until he was six years old and they moved to Lincoln County to be near Judy's sister, Terri Bussey, and her family.

In the years that followed, Judy, an outgoing blonde whose smiling pictures bear a striking resemblance to her son, met and married Cotton McKnight.

Wedding pictures show the new family with young Rickley beside his mother and Cotton's young son standing beside him. They had their ups and downs, but Rickley and other family members recall happy times on the Picacho ranch.

"There was always trouble over child support," said Rickley.

He explained that young Judson McKnight, Cotton's son, lived and still lives in Roswell with his mother, Vikki Baiers, and her husband, Philip Baiers. Child support was often a bone of contention between Cotton and the Baiers, explained Rickley.

He said Judson's stepfather, State Police Officer Baiers, was among those who questioned him about the brutal double slaying.

Rickley was among a whole list of friends and relatives who submitted to hair and blood tests as well as fingerprint examinations. He said he also took two separate polygraph tests, and the Lincoln County Sheriff's Office revealed some time ago that those tests completely cleared Rickley.

When questioned on his whereabouts the night of the murders, Rickley has told investigators that he was at his apartment with his cousin Jamie. He said the two were trying to call Cotton and Judy, but had been unable to find them at home all week.

"But it wasn't unusual for them to just take off and go somewhere," said Rickley.

Jamie Bussey has confirmed that the two were together, and Rickley said his car was broken down so he

couldn't have traveled to the ranch and back to Roswell if he had wanted to.

And still, Rickley said he has felt that the State Police continued to suspect him of the vicious crime.

Rickley now lives and works as a painter in Seattle, Washington, with another of his mother's sisters.

"I just realized I had to go on with my life," he noted, adding that putting the horror behind him and starting over in Lincoln County or Roswell would have been very difficult.

But the awful event is not to be left behind, and Rickley said State Police visited him in Seattle about three months ago.

"They followed me around for two or three days, then finally came to the door," said Rickley. He said he answered their questions the first day they visited him, but when they came back the next day he asked them if he was again a suspect.

"They said no," said Rickley. He said family members advised him not to undergo repeated questioning by State Police investigators without having a lawyer present.

Although Rickley said he can't point a finger at anybody, he does have an idea who murdered his

mother and stepfather.

"I've had two years to think about it," he said.

When he testified before the grand jury, Rickley said jurors went over his statements as to his whereabouts the night of the murders. He said they listened

carefully as he talked about the case for an hour and a half.

He's hoping the grand jury will act on the evidence that's been presented in the case.

"I guess we'll just have to wait till the 26th (the date the grand jury disbands)," said Rickley.

# Hospital Board hears of renovation, upgrade plan

The Lincoln County Medical Center (formerly Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Hospital) board of directors heard reports from the new administrator and the new chief of staff at their meeting Thursday.

New administrator Steven Keller told the board members that the new lab equipment has been arriving and is being set up. The new equipment will update the hospital lab bringing it up to modern standards. Two laboratory technicians will be going to school to learn how to use the new equipment efficiently.

The renovation project, Keller stated, needs to start with the structure of the hospital.

"We need to look at roofs, electrical power coming in and out," Keller said, "and other structural problems before we begin to plaster and paint."

Keller believes the Southwest Health Services appraisers can come in to look at the structure and give estimates. His first renovation report should be ready by the next board meeting, he said.

Two new signs will take the place of old signs, with the new name change. The board will let bids, welcoming bids and presentations from local sign painters.

"In a short period of time," new chief of staff Dr. Lance Kirkegaard said, "we've taken great strides in

bringing this facility up to big city standards. The expertise available at this hospital is excellent, most of these physicians were in the top 10 percent of their classes."

Kirkegaard would like to see the "good nursing staff" get more relief, so they won't "burn out."

In other business, the board:

- Will have prepared a cost benefit analysis comparing the Ruidoso Ambulance service with the county Emergency Medical System, comparing cost factor between paramedics and emergency medical technicians.
- Will inquire into the possibility of beginning a Candy Striper program for young people. Minimum age would be 14.
- Heard a report of two doctors who may begin practice in Ruidoso. One is an obstetrician and one a plastic surgeon.
- Received the hospital auxiliary report from president Sue Avery. The Pink Ladies have donated an external pace maker, a pneumatic air compressor, a fully equipped video camera, a radiant warmer for the birthing room and two infant scales to the hospital. During the recent blood drive, 82 units of blood were received. In October there were 2,048 volunteer hours worked.
- Board members will make rounds of the hospital once a month to become better aware of the hospital departments and what happens in those departments.

# Grand jury responsibilities are outlined

Investigations by grand juries have been a practice for more than 200 years. Secrecy is the vital requisite of grand jury procedure.

When called into being, from the beginning, the purpose of the grand jury was to ensure the safety of jurors, who could, otherwise, be threatened or detained in carrying out justice.

Over the years the rules for grand juries have evolved into our present system.

Activity with Lincoln County grand juries has increased in the last year, the most recent example being the special grand jury meeting to inquire and inspect all the evidence and information in the McKnight murders.

But what powers, duties and responsibilities do grand juries have?

According to New Mexico state statutes, the grand jury is restricted to the investigation of criminal offenses committed or triable within the county in which the panel is sitting or within the jurisdiction of the court through which it was formed.

Jurors are selected by the clerk from the master jury wheel (from not less than 150 names).

The grand jury is convened and discharged at such time as the court determines the business of the grand jury is completed, New Mexico statutes state, but not later

than three months after it was convened. At the end of three months, or after dismissal, the information that grand jury reviewed cannot be reviewed by another jury at a later date, unless the grand jury issues an indictment.

The district judge may convene one or more grand juries at any time, without regard to court terms. The district judge shall summon and qualify as a panel for grand jury service such number of jurors as deemed necessary. Each grand jury shall be composed of 12 regular jurors and a sufficient number of alternates to ensure the continuity of the inquiry and the taking of testimony. New Mexico state statutes stipulate no more than 12 jurors may deliberate. No juror may vote on an indictment unless the juror has heard all evidence presented on the charge. The district judge may discharge or excuse members of a grand jury and substitute alternate jurors as necessary.

The district judge is also required to direct the grand jury in any special inquiry into violations of law which he wishes them to make.

New Mexico state statutes advise that the duty of the district attorney is to attend the grand jury. The district attorney will answer, on the record, any questions which the grand jury may have. The district attorney will not, however, guide or otherwise influence the grand jury. The prosecutor has a statutory duty to conduct himself in a fair and im-

partial manner.

Evidence before the grand jury includes the oral testimony of witnesses and documentary or physical evidence. The grand jury has the duty to order that evidence be produced if it believes there is competent direct evidence available.

To return an indictment, the jury must find probable cause. "Probable cause" means the evidence presented would cause a reasonable person to believe that an offense has been committed and that the accused committed the offense. Probable cause does not require proof beyond a reasonable doubt.

All proceedings in the grand jury room, with the exception of the deliberations of the grand jury, shall be reported verbatim and the notes or transcriptions thereof certified by the court reporter or stenographer making them, with the notes or transcriptions then deposited with the clerk or other officer of the district court as directed by the district judge. Copies of documentary evidence or a summary thereof, if directed by the district court to be exhibited to the grand jury, shall be made a part of the record. In cases where an indictment is not returned, the notes or transcriptions shall be destroyed unless ordered by the district judge to be preserved for good cause shown.

The law protects the fairness and impartiality of the grand jury hear-

ing. Not only must there be no improper influence exercised, according to New Mexico statutes, there must be no opportunity for improper influence on the grand jury.

The presence of an unauthorized person before the grand jury requires dismissal of the indictment.

If the grand jury is dismissed for this, or any other reason, then the information will be sealed or destroyed by the district judge, with no information, to the public, as to why the jury was dismissed or what their findings were, according to local attorneys.

The law requires all that the grand jury hears, sees, says or votes upon shall be kept secret and shall not be revealed to anyone outside of the grand jury room except in official reports, indictments or no-bills.

No grand juror shall, except in the performance of his official duty, disclose the fact that an indictment has been found against any person for any offense. They can allow no one in the grand jury room during deliberations nor can they consult with anyone other than members of the grand jury as to how they will vote on any matter.

No one should have any advance information of the activities of the grand jury or of any activities which are planned by the grand jury.

The law prohibits the grand jury from making reports, except those specifically provided by statute, to recommend removal or to indict.

Bowers had practiced real estate in Ruidoso for many years.



## Inside the Capitol

**SANTA FE**—Will our state's new governor and the members of our Legislature meet head-on in a great crash shortly after New Year's in 1987? After all, the top man is from a breed rarely elected to his office, called New Mexico Republicans, and the leadership among lawmakers is from the opposition party.

Keep your fingers crossed. At this moment, it doesn't look like a collision's going to happen—and we'll all be a lot better off if it doesn't.

We've got no form book on Garrey Carruthers as chief executive, of course, because he's never held that job—or anything remotely like it—before. He certainly showed he's not afraid of going head-to-head with opponents in both the primary and the general elections this year, but he doesn't appear to be the kind of guy who is spilling to get into a shouting match.

That opinion is subject to revision as the cares of office, of which there will be many between now and the time the Legislature convenes, get to him and shorten his temper. Still, it may hold at least for the early weeks of 1987, during which, if he is smart, he will be doing all he can to make a good impression on us all and earn our respect.

Barring the unforeseen, the leader who will set the tone in the House of Representatives is Raymond Sanchez, a Democrat from Albuquerque's North Valley. He's been Speaker of the House before, so he knows about how much pressure must be applied to the members there to keep them in line.

In his early years in the Legislature (he's starting his 17th year there), Sanchez was a hot pistol. He often seemed spilling for a fight in those days, but he has since grown two ways—older, and up.

The Speaker has already met with the Governor, and the two seemed to hit it off. Though their party politics differ, both, they tell us, want to start the new session in the spirit of what Carruthers has been promising us—a new beginning.

On the Senate side, the President Pro Tem is most likely to be the man who holds the job now, Senator Ike

Smalley of Deming, that body's most senior member. His years and wisdom long ago taught him the wastefulness of fighting over turf. Ike has always tended to settle things in the most expeditious manner possible, usually without even allowing unpleasantness to make their way to the Senate floor. Even without his making a public statement on the matter, we can count on him to dedicate himself to solving the serious problems New Mexico faces.

Other legislators by and large, are not likely to come here for the new session feeling feisty or in a mood for troublemaking. Most of them know the state is in too tight a spot for any of that kind of thing to be acceptable.

If they're smart, they also realize Carruthers will be, on this matter, in a win/win situation.

Clearly, the public wants the new boss to have a fair chance at doing a good job. If the Legislature gums that up for him, he will get nothing but sympathy from the general public—which means he'll be the winner.

If, on the other hand, the lawmakers and the Governor pull together, the chief executive is still the winner, because he gets to start his term in a healthy fashion. In that case, however, both the public and the legislators join him in the win.

The betting here is that this is the way the Legislature will choose to approach things, at least during 1987's 60-day session.

Carruthers is in an enviable position. There is so much honest desire in all parts of the state to see realism and rationality returned to the governor's office that support and hope for him are widespread. He can even expect something of a honeymoon from the most captious of critics, including those of us in the media.

But he won't get to keep that good feeling unearned. He's going to have to start producing almost as soon as he lowers his arm from taking his inaugural oath. If he hesitates, or starts off with leaden feet, he's in for serious trouble.

In that instance, the disappointment of the voters will be in proportion to their hope. Let them down, and he'll never be allowed to forget it.

## Editorial

It may seem like a joke at the time, but stealing village hazard markers could be tragically unfunny.

The Ruidoso Street, Water and Sewer departments place hazard markers and barricades around the village whenever construction is taking place on and around village streets. The markers indicate open manholes, ditches and other dangerous conditions you'd probably rather not encounter while driving.

But a few Ruidosoans have been taking the markers home for themselves, leaving dangerous hazards unmarked. Last year, a police vehicle was the victim of a road hazard that had been marked, then "unmarked" by some thief. Someday, someone will get hurt.

In addition, the theft is a blow to taxpayers themselves. The Sewer and Street departments report about \$1,500 a year in hazard markers and barricades are taken. The Water Department suffers similarly. It adds up to thousands in taxpayers' dollars wasted every year.

If you have taken a hazard marker or barricade, or know someone who has, now's the time to "come clean."

A hazard marker and barricade "amnesty" is in effect. Anyone who returns the markers and barricades to the Ruidoso Police Department parking lot or Ruidoso Village Hall parking lot won't be prosecuted. The village just wants them back.

In this case, it's only ourselves we're hurting. Let's do what we can to correct the situation—before someone gets hurt.—DJP
