Tax hike?

Voters to decide in Thursday election

Ruidoso voters will go to the polls Thursday, December 18, to decide the fate of a one-half of one percent gross receipts tax hike.

The Ruidoso Village Council passed the tax increase on July 29, 1986, but it was halted by a negative referendum petition calling for the upcoming election. The ordinance as passed last July stipulated that all funds derived from the sales tax increase be used to acquire the Ruidoso Municipal Airport land.

The question before voters Thursday will be:

"Shall the Village of Ruidoso adopt a Municipal Gross Receipts Tax Ordinance imposing an additional tax of one-half (1/2), of one (1%) of the gross receipts of all persons doing business in the Village of Ruidoso, New Mexico?"

Voters pulling down the pointer on the left over the word "for" will be casting a vote in favor of the tax increase, and those pulling down the pointer on the right over the word "against" will be casting a vote to stop the tax hike. Village manager Jim Hine said the ordinance passed last July will stand with some slight modifications if voters elect to increase the sales tax. He said the dates will have to be changed because the State of New Mexico allows municipalities to increase the gross receipts tax on January 1 or July 1

after six months notice.

He said the council action would have increased the tax on January 1, 1987, but if the voters give the council the go-ahead then July 1, 1987, is the next opportunity the village will have to implement the higher tax.

Because of the wording of that ordinance the tax will be securely tied to the airport land acquisition, and will automatically be rescinded when any debt incurred to pay for that land is retired, explained Hine.

The land on which the municipal airport, Village Hall and two fire stations sit has been appraised at over \$2.6 million. The village air facility, built with the help of the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA), will be closed when the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport opens in late 1987.

Officials of FAA have said repeatedly that the value of the current airport must be invested in the new airport.

The village governing body has opted to raise funds to purchase that land, and indicated last July that the increased sales tax will net the village enough to secure revenue bonds on the \$2.6 million.

Although other means of financing the multi-million land purchase were discussed last July, Hine said Friday he knows of no other way to secure bonds and pay for the land.

"What the public has got to vote on is whether or not they want to keep this acreage. A yes (vote) will mean yes we want to keep the land," said Hine.

Assuming the voters OK the increase, from 6% to 6.5%, Hine said the next step will be to secure the services of an underwriter, or bond counsel. The underwriter will then present a proposal to the Village Council.

While the length of the bond issue will be decided by the council, Hine said one bond counsel has already suggested a 15-year time-frame.

In earlier discussions, members of the council have indicated plans to pay the bonds off early if the tax increase nets sufficient revenues.

"On retirement of that debt service (the .50% tax) will be taken off the books," said Hine. He said the payment of that last payment will be the key to administrators that the tax should be stopped.

Even if bonds are issued on a 15-year plan, Hine said they could be retired within 12 years.

Hine said the funds for the airport project will be placed in a village savings account to be drawn on by invoice as the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport project progresses. He said the village will oversee that account and make payments much as the FAA pays its 90 percent allocations as the work is completed.

He said the money won't be given to the Sierra Blanca Airport Commission or to the FAA, but invested directly into the new airport.

While the \$2.6 million is in a special account it will be earning interest, said Hine.

Some concern has been voiced as to the fate of the Village Hall and

municipal fire stations if the voters disapprove the tax increase.

Hine said the Village of Ruidoso entered into a lease purchase agreement with FAA in 1979 covering the 3.2-acre Village Hall site. That land was appraised at \$90,000, and the village has been contributing \$600 a month into the airport fund as spelled out by the agreement with FAA.


"By the end of this year we will have retired \$66,000 of that," noted Hine. He said the new fire station is on about one-fourth of an acre and the little station is on about 400-square-feet of land.

If voters do not approve the tax and the land must be sold, Hine believes those two small tracts could be withdrawn from an eventual sale to the public for a small amount.

Road right of way on the tract has already been dedicated, said Hine. As to the impact of the tax on the average consumer, Hine said .50 percent is 50 cents per \$100, or \$5 per \$1,000.

In New Mexico consumers pay gross receipts tax on all goods purchased including food, prescriptions, medical and other services.

Steve Massey of the Southeastern New Mexico Economic Development District in Roswell said the average family income in Lincoln County, as of the 1980 census, was \$15,817. Neither Massey nor the New Mexico Data Bank has figures on how much of that income is spent on taxable goods.

What will happen to airport land if tax passes?

The Ruidoso Village Council has unanimously endorsed keeping the Ruidoso Municipal Airport land when the air facility moves to the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport next year, but voters will apparently decide that question Thursday when they pass or defeat a .50 percent sales tax increase to pay the \$2.6 million value of the land.

Some voters want to know what the council plans to do with the over 150 acres of land.

"I don't have a plan for it," said Village Councillor Larry Simon Friday. He said a plan isn't needed since the village doesn't yet have the land.

"What we do with it is not that important," noted Simon. He said when he campaigned for office early this year the voters were "adamant" in their desire to keep that prime property under municipal ownership.

"I still think we have a moral obligation," added Simon, recalling that the land was donated to the village by a man who is still in business in Ruidoso.

Simon said it would be a shame to put the land up for sale and have it end up in the hands of a competitor of the man who originally gave it to the village.

Councillor Simon, who voted in favor of the tax increase last July, is still strongly in favor of the sales tax hike.

Councillors Simon, Ray Dean Carpenter and Jerry Shaw favored the ordinance that met with a negative referendum. Mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr. broke the tie that resulted when councillors Elmer Pirelli and Victor Alonso, along with former councillor William A. "Dub" Holt, cast dissenting votes.

Councillor Pirelli said Sunday he still opposes the added sales tax. He said a plan should be drafted for the airport tract before citizens are asked to pay a tax to purchase it.

Councillor Rick Davis, sworn in last Tuesday, has indicated he favors keeping the land. Davis has also said he supports the tax increase.

"I'm definitely in favor of that (the tax) rather than having to go to

sale," said Councillor Davis. He said he knows of two buyers just waiting to purchase that land.

The council approved a resolution presented some months ago by the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce authorizing the Economic Development arm of the chamber to investigate and identify uses for the land that would help to diversify the village economy.

That group is still at work seeking out compatible uses for that land.

In the meantime the voters will decide Thursday on the tax that would be used to purchase the land.

"This gives the folks an opportunity to express their opinions," said Simon.

Airport contract goes to Tricon Kent

The Sierra Blanca Airport Commission (SBAC), in a special meeting Friday, awarded the bid for the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport to Tricon Kent Co. of Castle Rock, Colorado.

Although that company's bid of \$2,354,964.50 was just over half the engineer's estimate and \$1 million below the second lowest bid, that award came after an hour-long executive session and lengthy debate.

Commissioners learned Friday of an error in the Tricon Kent bid, and heard Bill Thomas of the engineering firm read an affidavit explaining how the miscalculation occurred.

Thomas explained how a figure was put into the computer that threw one whole line item off substantially, and asked to increase the bid by \$124,737.43.

SBAC attorney Steve Sanders said he, contract administrator Fred Heckman and airport engineer Earl Cook spent about 12

hours going over Tricon Kent documents substantiating the company's claim.

"These people came forward and we were convinced that they did have an error," said Cook.

Sanders told commissioners they could reject all seven bids they received on December 3 and go through the entire bidding process again, they could allow Tricon Kent to withdraw and accept the second lowest bid or they could, if convinced by clear and convincing evidence how the error occurred,

modify the bid as requested.

He said federal procurement law would allow the bid to be modified.

The commission accepted the low bid as modified, but stipulated that Tricon Kent pay the expenses of the three SBAC employees who worked for three days to substantiate the contractor's claims.

"The commission has had convincing evidence that a clerical computer error was made," said Chairman Ken Nosker.

Work starts on village bridges contract

Work will begin this week on contracts to replace three village bridges, according to village engineer Mike Davalos.

Although the original contract called for completing work on Center Street from the river to past the Police Station, the schedule has

been modified to begin work on the bridges before Center Street is completed. That project, where it crosses Sudderth Drive, will be delayed until after the Christmas holidays.

The entire contract with Haase Construction is for 120 days and

\$419,540.05, said Davalos.

A crossing at Hart Avenue off Paradise Canyon Drive is first on the schedule and will include a short detour in the vicinity of the work, explained Davalos.

He said the contractor will then start building the replacement

bridges at Reese and Paradise Canyon drives.

The State Highway Department granted an extension on the Center Street funds, originally due to expire on December 31. That project must now be completed by the end of January, said Davalos.

School board learns tax increase may be avoided

Ruidoso Board of Education members heard some promising tax news during their meeting Wednesday.

During discussion after approving a resolution for the sale of \$1.1 million in bonds (the second set of bonds voters approved in the April \$2.6 million school bond election), investment banker Charles E. Casey reported that due to "very favorable" rates, a slight increase in property taxes promised voters

at the time of the election may not come to pass.

Casey, vice president of Rilee and Associates, told the board members that taxes probably will remain about the same, instead of rising.

The bonds will be sold Wednesday, January 14, he reported.

In other business, the board members:

—Accepted the written resignation of Karen Seitz, teacher of the gifted, effective December 19.

—Accepted the verbal resignation of James Schiller, custodian.

—Approved the hiring of Carl Parsons as custodian.

—Received a card of thanks from the volleyball team.

—Heard School Superintendent Sid Miller report on the upcoming election (see related story).

—Learned the Administration Office will be closed December 24, 25, 26 and 31 and January 1.

—Were informed the State Board of Education has requested that the Ruidoso and Tularosa boards of education formulate a written policy regarding the handling of Apache Summit area students who ride buses.

—Heard Associate Superintendent Mike Gladden report an Open House at the Administration Office is scheduled for 2:30 to 4:30 p.m. Thursday, December 18.

School board candidate sign-up deadline is Tuesday

The deadline to file to be a candidate in the upcoming Ruidoso Board of Education election is 5 p.m. Tuesday, December 16.

Declarations of candidacy must be filed in the Lincoln County Clerk's office between 9 a.m. and 5

p.m. that day.

The terms of present board members Mike Morris and Don Swalander will expire March 1, 1987. Voters will go to the polls to fill two four-year terms.

The election also will poll voters

on the question, "Shall the Board of Education of the Ruidoso Municipal School District ... impose a property tax of two dollars (\$2.00) per one thousand dollars (\$1,000) upon the net taxable value of property allocated to the School District under the Property Tax Code for

the property tax years of 1987, 1988, 1989 ..."

Construction or equipping of school buildings, purchase of school grounds and maintenance of buildings or grounds are listed as allowable uses of the funds.

Four charged after Forest Service investigation

Four people have been cited into Magistrate Court in Alamogordo as a result of an ongoing U.S. Forest Service investigation, according to District Ranger Steve Sams.

Charged with removal of forest products without a permit were Ronald Richard Ash, of Ruidoso Downs. Sams said 105 Christmas trees, 17 cords of juniper fuelwood, a stakeside truck, a chainsaw and a

hydraulic wood splitter were recovered from Ash.

Sams said Randy Joe Nelson, of Ruidoso Downs, also was charged with removal of forest products without a permit. One cord of juniper fuelwood and a chainsaw were recovered from Nelson, according to Sams.

Curry Don Reynolds, of Ruidoso, also was charged with removal of

forest products without a permit, Sams said.

Removal of forest products except as required in a permit was the charge made against John A. Bachelor, of Ruidoso, said Sams. He said Bachelor had a permit but did not comply with the terms of that permit.

The citations were made Thurs-

day and Friday, and the investigation is ongoing, Sams reported. He estimated the value of the forest products confiscated at more than \$3,000.

Sams said such violations in other forest areas have eventually resulted in the public not being able to cut wood or get Christmas trees on Forest Service property.

The White Mountain was early this year in putting on its sparkling white Christmas celebration robe, getting ready for the sacred season.





But the Warriors' defense held NMMI off.

Ruidoso only allowed the Colts 17 shots in the second half, a fact that pleased Warrior head coach Gene Segura.

Offensively, the Warriors made just 29 percent of their field goal shots and three of eight free throws, but the defense was the decisive factor.

Besides Ryan, Kirgan scored 10 points on five field goals. Brian Davis added six points on three field goals and John Walker scored a field goal for two points.

T.J. Kirshbauer led the Colts with 15 points.

In the junior varsity contest, Ruidoso dropped its second game in as many encounters, 51-25.

NMMI only led 10-6 at the end of the first quarter. However, the Colts gradually increased their edge the rest of the game.

The junior varsity competition will start first, followed by the varsity action.


Ruidoso will compete in the Belen Tournament Saturday, December 20.

Capitan gave San Jon a tough


game before losing. The Tigers trailed, 29-25, at halftime and 42-41 at the end of the third quarter.

Trustees hear of dump violations

Trouble with trash kept the Capitan Village Trustees busy during their regular meeting Monday night.

Jim Edwards of the Environmental Protection Agency advised the trustees of two violations at the village landfill. The first violation is blowing debris onto the private land surrounding the landfill. The second problem is the delayed time in covering the refuse, which enhances the blowing problem, said Edwards.

Showing photographs taken of the landfill in August and December, Edwards pointed out the same materials were visible in both pictures, proof there had been no attempt to cover the sight.

"I'm required by law to proceed with enforcement," Edwards stated, "if something isn't done soon. The landfill, by law, has to be

covered once a week from April to October and once every two weeks from November to March."

Mayor Benny Coker apologized about Wayne Hobbs, who has the solid waste contract with the village, not being able to attend the meeting due to a family emergency.

"I feel that Wayne will cooperate with us in every way," Coker said.

A net or wire fence to stop the blowing problem is an immediate solution to most of the problem, according to Edwards. After the fence is in place the other problem can be worked on.

"As long as something is being done," Edwards said, "I'll work with you."

In other business, trustees Kelly Beavers, Norm Renfro, David Rouleau and Dave Strickland:

—Agreed to a public hearing concerning the Cablevision franchise at the next regular meeting in January.

—Approved participation with

the Capitan Chamber of Commerce concerning Christmas decorations for the village. The chamber asked the village to aid in putting up and taking down the decorations, then storing them from year to year.

—Agreed to decorate Village Hall for the holidays, inside and out.

—Approved a public hearing concerning amendments to the old water ordinance at the January meeting.

—Leased the Co-op building to Stan Cox until such time as something else can be done with the building. Rent will be \$75 per month, Cox will furnish utilities and Public and Premises Liability Insurance.

—Heard a report from Jack Atkins. Legal notice for bids on the new well pipeline will appear this week. The bid opening will be at 10 a.m. Monday, December 29, at Village Hall. Atkins has all the permits approved.

—Agreed to reinvest a \$100,000 certificate of deposit.



Editorial

We have fought for a new airport for more than two decades—let's not stop now.

The proposal to increase gross receipts tax by one-half of one percent, while perhaps not absolutely the most efficient nor least burdensome solution, will provide "the village's share" of funds for the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport.

The proposal will be put to the vote Thursday in Ruidoso.

A vote for the tax increase will be a vote for two things.

First, it will be a vote to kick in what FAA has determined as the village's share of the cost of the new airport—\$2.6 million—the appraised value of the present airport land. The tax increase probably is the most expeditious way to raise the funds, and so will not delay construction of the airport. Of course, a safer and larger airport means more visitors coming here, precisely the medicine our ailing economy needs.

Secondly, a positive vote will keep the present airport site in the public's hands. The land, a precious nugget in the pot-of-gold we call Ruidoso, is the last large, level tract of land in the village's interior that remains undeveloped. If developed properly, it could be more valuable to the village's future than the airport itself. It is well worth having in the custody of the people.

"Why doesn't the village come up with the money for the airport from their budget?" one might ask. One would think our elected village leaders would have been saving up all these years, but no such piggy bank seems to exist. Perhaps the money still could come from village coffers, with a penny pinched here and some fat trimmed there. Perhaps, but \$2.6 million is pinching a lot of fat, and a solution is needed now.

"Other funding sources?" They may exist, but once again, nothing is quite as sure and quick as a tax increase.

"How can we even consider a tax increase in these times of economic slowdown?" An improved airport is key to an improved economy. We'll pay now for the benefits the airport will bring.

So, while not absolutely the best solution, the gross receipts tax increase is a good one that is available to us now.

Keep up the fight. For the airport, for the present airport land, and for the future of the village, vote yes on the tax increase.—DJP

Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE—Should state government continue expanding when the economy isn't?

Or better put, can the citizens afford more and more government when the source of funding for that government is at best standing still? That's the issue the new administration that takes over here on January 1 is going to have to face. Legislative committees preparing for the coming session are facing it already.

What those lawmakers are hearing from economists, including those retained specifically to advise legislators on what revenues that state can expect, is that we are in a "no-growth" period that is likely to continue for two to three years. In all candor, to call it "no-growth" is something of an exaggeration; what is actually happening is that the economy of the state is contracting. In some areas, that contraction is very sharp, but it's present everywhere.

Where does that leave state government? The prognosticators say we can expect to take in about \$1.43 billion next year in revenue if we leave the tax laws as they presently are.

That total is about \$47 million more than we will receive during the current fiscal year—which is good, because this year legislators authorized expenditures of about \$50 million more than we will take in. That, of course, ate up the reserves we had held in store for a rainy day.

What that comes down to, put simply, is that we could afford, without making any changes, to spend next year almost exactly what we are spending this year. To accomplish that, we would not have to make any changes at all. But the folks in charge of things in the administration that is now packing up to leave here say we can't accomplish that. We are going to have to spend more money on our prisons almost inevitably, just to comply with what we are under court order to accomplish. We can also expect the costs of Medicaid to climb again. And we did pass that now-famous educational reform act that is going to eat up millions unless something is done to reform its reformation. All in all, Dan Lopez of Finance and Administration says, we'd better be prepared to spend another \$76 million next year just to more or less stand still.

So you know the answer to the dilemma. Those who make our laws are going to have to put together a package of cuts in some parts of state government as presently constituted, and they are going to have to increase our taxes one way or another.

One relatively painless way to accomplish the latter is to keep in place for another year the suspension of rebates normally given us on our income taxes. That could yield around \$52 million to help solve the problem.

Then there's what those in government keep referring to as a "wind-fall" from the federal government. That results from the fact that we in New Mexico tie our income taxes to the federal income tax. Next year, under the fed's new system, the state would end up the lucky winner of about \$59 million in increases citizens will pay in state income tax because of the way such taxes are calculated. That will happen unless the present state laws are changed. That, you will note, is a "windfall" for the state. For the taxpayers, however, it is just the opposite; it becomes a de facto tax increase the Legislature doesn't even have to act to impose.

That little goody could yield an additional \$59 million or so in revenue if no steps are taken. This writer feels in his bones that lawmakers will be inclined to split that with us. We'd bet they vote to give us back 50 percent of that to keep us smiling, and they take the other half to fund state government.

No one—but no one—around here is paying the slightest bit of attention to the wild idea of Toney Anaya that we should spend 16.5 percent more for government in the next year than we are spending in this one. To do that, we'd have to raise an additional \$240 million, and that is patently outlandish. It's easy for Anaya to suggest the nine taxes he thinks we should raise to get that sum, because he won't be around to bear the brunt of the blame if such increases should take place.

Those who will be around are, of course, a new governor, a new House of Representatives and a newly organized Senate. It will be up to them to make the tough decision. As of this moment, it looks as though they will make them thoughtfully and in conservative fashion.





