Voters OK tax hike

Ruidoso voters passed a gross receipts tax Thursday that will give the village one of the highest sales tax rates in the state.

In a 435 to 329 vote, nearly a quarter of registered voters opted to increase the tax from 6% to 6.5% effective July 1, 1987.

Proceeds from the tax have been dedicated to the purchase of the Ruidoso Municipal Airport land valued at \$2.7 million. That land will be vacated when the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport (SBRA) on Fort Stanton is completed in late 1987 or early 1988.

The village airport was a joint project of the Village of Ruidoso and the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA), and that agency has told the village repeatedly of Ruidoso's obligation to invest the value of the 160-acre tract into the new regional air facility.

Since the Ruidoso Village Council has indicated a desire to keep the prime land on which the municipal airport is located, it has been faced with raising the funds to pay for it. Last July the council passed a .50 percent tax increase, but a negative referendum petition placed the sales tax hike in the hands of the voters.

And voters upheld the council ac-

tion Thursday.

Before the election, members of the council warned voters that if the tax failed the land would have to be sold to meet the village's obligation toward the SBRA.

Village manager Jim Hine explained last week that councillors will now contract with a bond counsel to prepare a revenue bond issue for \$2.7 million. The .50 percent tax will serve as the revenue to guarantee those bonds.

Hine said the proceeds from the bond sale will be placed in a village fund and released by invoice to the Sierra Blanca Airport Commission (SBAC) for construction on the new airport.

"This is probably one of the best turnouts we've had on a question election," said village clerk Leon Eggleston as the polls closed Thursday. He said the 764 voter total wasn't a record, for 856 citizens voted in an election on a general obligation bond question for the Grindstone Canyon Dam project.

SBAC administrator Fred Heckman, on hand Thursday to hear the election results, was elated.

"It's wonderful," said Heckman, adding he had received calls all day from officials in Washington D.C. Heckman said he was heading home to call several members of the congressional delegation.

Heckman said the village contribution, along with FAA's allocations and grants, will keep the airport project on schedule.

Councillors Ray Dean Carpenter and Jerry Shaw also were pleased with the election.

"I'm sorry we have to raise taxes," noted Shaw. "Now we've got to get busy," she added.

Both Shaw and Carpenter said its time to get to work on a plan for the 160-acre tract.

"Of course we've got a year to do it, but we've got to get started," said Carpenter.

Shaw said she hopes to see part of the land used for a convention center or some kind of events facility. She said she'd like to see part reserved for parks and recreation.

Shaw said she would like to see the village offer some other things to do in Ruidoso—along with skiing and horse racing.

"I really don't have much comment," said Councillor Victor Alonso, one of two councillors who opposed the .50 percent tax increase. He said his comments were not included in news stories before the election. Councillor Elmer Pirelli also opposed the tax hike.

Alonso said the next steps are obvious—issuing bonds, setting up an account and so forth.

"What's not obvious is the plan for the land," said Alonso.

Kidnapping suspects are arrested

Two suspects in a kidnapping and rape incident were apprehended Friday in El Paso, Texas, reported Ruidoso Police detective Lanny Maddox.

Harold Rairdon, 40, and his wife, Bobbie Sue Rairdon, 20, both of Ruidoso were arrested by El Paso Police detective Ed Camacho after he spotted them driving on an El Paso highway in a car police were on the lookout for.

The two are suspected of having kidnapped a young Carlsbad girl, threatening her life, then abducting

her to a Ruidoso Upper Canyon cabin, where she allegedly was held.

The two were expected to waive extradition procedures, but on the way to an extradition hearing Friday, they were recognized by a passerby as being suspects in a rape/kidnap case in El Paso that happened the night before, said Maddox.

Maddox will travel to El Paso Tuesday to conduct an extensive interview. The two are expected to face charges in Carlsbad on kidnap-

ping, robbery, unauthorized taking of a motor vehicle, distribution of marijuana, conspiracy and three counts of criminal sexual contact.

Here, they face charges of three counts of criminal sexual penetration.

Maddox commended Camacho for spotting the two, and praised the Carlsbad Police Department and El Paso Police Department for their cooperation with the Ruidoso Police. Also, he thanked the media for spreading the word of the search for the two suspects.

Slick roads are blamed for several accidents

Icy roads continued to plague area drivers this weekend.

Ruidoso Police recorded a dozen accidents from Friday through Sunday, three involving injuries.

Six people were transported to the Lincoln County Medical Center with injuries they received in an accident at 10:44 p.m. Saturday in the Camelot area, according to police reports.

The report listing details of that accident was not available early today (Monday).

Two Upper Canyon accidents—one at the first bridge on Friday and another on the second bridge Saturday—left several people injured, police reported.

Billy Chadwell, 17, of Ruidoso was transported by ambulance to Lincoln County Medical Center with injuries he received in a one-vehicle accident about 8:24 p.m. Friday, according to police reports. Nursing supervisor Phyllis Gardner said Chadwell was treated and released from the emergency room.

Chadwell was a passenger in a 1984 Chevrolet pickup driven by Vincent L. Tognaci, 17, of Alto, said police.

Tognaci was westbound on Main Road near the first bridge in Upper Canyon when his vehicle slid left after rounding a curve, said police. The report stated that Tognaci applied his brakes, slid across the bridge and collided with a tree.

He was cited for speed too fast for conditions and failure to show proof of insurance, said police.

Two El Paso men were treated and released at the hospital about 9:05 a.m. Saturday after they were

injured in a one-vehicle accident on Main Road at Fox Road, said police.

Police said Jorge Gonzales, 17, was driving a 1986 Ford Bronco at a speed too fast for icy road conditions and was unable to negotiate a left turn to cross the second bridge in Upper Canyon.

His vehicle hit the guardrail, knocking it off the edge, collided with a tree, bounced back and came to rest in the Rio Ruidoso, said police.

A passenger, Greg Conwell, 18, was injured in the wreck, said police. A second passenger, Edward Paez, 17, of El Paso, was unhurt.

Gonzales was cited for careless driving, said police.

The Lincoln County Sheriff's Office and the Bonito Volunteer Fire Department were called Sunday to a one-vehicle incident on El Camino Drive in High Mesa II.

Howard Puckett of the Bonito Fire Department said a large tour bus carrying about 30 visitors from Mexico slid off into a bar ditch on the upper half of the "high-low" road. He said none of the passengers were injured.

Puckett said the fire department volunteers stood by in case the bus slid further causing damage to the gas tank.

He said officers at the scene determined that a wrecker will have to wait until ice and snow are off the road to move the bus.

Sheriff Deputy Larry Brinkley was the investigating officer, however he was unavailable to provide further information early today (Monday).

Apparent suicide is under investigation

A 36-year-old Ruidoso man died Friday, of an apparently self-inflicted gunshot wound, according to a release from the Ruidoso Police Department.

Police said they were summoned about 3:45 p.m. Friday to a Timber Road residence where they discovered the body of Sterling Badger.

During the investigation, a large quantity of what is believed to be marijuana was found in the house and was confiscated, said police.

Ruidoso Police Chief Richard Swenor said Badger's wife, Candace Badger, and his young son were present when he died. He said a neighbor called the police.

Jim Stover, deputy medical examiner, pronounced Badger dead at the scene. Badger's body was taken to LaGrone Funeral Chapel.

"An investigation into the circumstances leading to Mr. Badger's death and of the origin and ownership of the marijuana is continuing," said police.



Warrior boys roll over Portales

Ruidoso High School's boys varsity basketball team is taking a three-game winning streak into the Christmas break.

The Warriors clubbed visiting Portales, 57-37, Friday night to gain a 3-1 record.

Ruidoso will be off until Monday, December 29, when the Warriors compete in the Lovington Tournament.

Against Portales, the Warriors jumped off to a 10-7 first-quarter advantage and increased that to 28-13 at halftime.

The Warriors' fast break worked well, particularly in the second quarter.

In the third quarter, Portales closed the gap somewhat as Ruidoso led, 39-27, at the end of the period.

But Ruidoso broke the game wide open in the final quarter, outscoring the visitors, 20-10, for the final margin.

Junior guard Kirk Ryan led the Warrior scoring with 18 points, 10 in the second half.

Senior Brian Davis added 14 points. Alan Kirgan, Jeff Willingham, Garret Henson and Toby Rue each had six points. John Walker added one point.

"We're getting better with every game," said a happy Warrior head coach Gene Segura. "That's the general idea and if we do that, the better we'll be eventually."

Ruidoso shot 48 percent from the field and made nine of 12 free throw shots. Portales made just five of 10 free throw shots.

The Warriors will open the Lovington Tournament next Monday against Seminole of Texas. Other teams in the tournament will be host Lovington, Pojoaque, Lubbock (Texas), Cooper, Aztec, Artesia and LaMesa.

The Coyotes' got two shots off, both missing. The game ended with Warrior head coach Sergio Castanon and the players mobbing each other at midcourt.

"It was a win we needed to have," Castanon said in a bit of an understatement.

Two of the Warriors' losses this season were by close margins. One of them was a 53-52 loss to Goddard. The game was close most of the way.

The teams were tied, 14-14, at the end of the first quarter, and Ruidoso had a slight 32-31 lead at halftime.

Ruidoso kept a one-point lead (48-47) at the end of the third quarter, and the lead swung back and fourth in the final quarter.

Ruidoso took a 63-61 lead on a bucket by Morris, but Roswell





New police department equipment will record emergency calls

Emergency calls into the Ruidoso Police Department are automatically recorded, thanks to a recently installed recording device. Deputy Chief Jim Alston said the new 20-channel reel-to-reel recorder was purchased and activated to provide an accurate record of emergency calls and

messages that go out over the air. Ruidoso Police Chief Richard Swenor said the system will help when emergency callers get excited and provide garbled or hard to understand information. He said the dispatcher will now be able to play back those messages. "We've been wanting it for

several years," said Alston, adding the whole system cost about \$22,000. He said tapes for the recorder cost \$65 each and will be held for several months and then be reused. Software was an additional cost item.

A part of the system that is currently being installed includes two

"quick-call recorders" with endless loop tapes. Alston said that's the part of the system dispatchers will use to go back over unclear messages to check locations or other information on emergency calls.

He said that capability may be

particularly useful when dispatching emergency vehicles to fires and accidents.

Chief Swenor said \$18,000 from the New Mexico Law Enforcement Protection Fund was used to pay for the equipment. He said the Fire Department and Emergency

Medical Services contributed about \$3,000 each to pay the balance.

Swenor said his department annually receives a specified amount per officer and a \$10,000 grant based on the size of the community from the state fund. He said those monies have to be spent for equipment or training.




mittee, "Every citizen in New Mexico is being asked to be a human candle with the entire state as a birthday cake."

Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE—There is an old Arabic saying that goes like this: "I against my brother; my brother and I against my cousin; my brother, my cousin and I against the world."

What that says, in elliptical fashion, is that each of us may fight with those with whom we share some sort of family relationship, but we will always join together to fight even harder those who attack our family from outside.

It is an observation about human nature that might well be kept in mind when we are considering such essentially Arabic arrangements as the OPEC group, to whom Americans will ever be the outsiders. It might not have been bad for the thought to have been in the minds of Bud McFarlane, Colonel North and General Secord as they sought to buy our way into the family of the Middle East with plane loads of modern weapons.

In dealing with both these current situations, in which people some North Americans may tend to look down upon have tweaked the nose of Uncle Sam, we appear to have proceeded with the same lack of finesse exhibited by the fictional J. R. Ewing.

Those who follow closely the ins and outs of that endless melodrama called "Dallas" know that J.R.'s solution to the present-day oil glut is to hire mercenaries to blow up the Middle Eastern oil fields.

Some might believe that the solution King Fahd of Saudi Arabia came up with, which involved firing Sheik Ahmed Zaki Yamani, who had represented the Saudi interest well, and talking OPEC into decreeing that the price of a barrel of oil shall henceforth rise to \$18 was about as mindless as that of the television tycoon.

To get back to the proverb we quoted to begin this column, even if the will of King Fahd becomes the law of the oil-producing nations, the intention will not be to help those who produce oil within the geographic boundaries of the United States, or more specifically, of New Mexico. Oil at \$18 a barrel won't halt the plunging output of that product that most directly affects us. Even if the Arabic cousins and brothers solve their own problems by cooperation inside their family, those in the oil business in our midst would be

well advised, as one recently remarked, to keep taking lots of calcium so they can continue to hang on by their fingernails.

For those in the business of producing oil in the United States to whom that product at around \$20 a barrel and gas at \$2.25 a thousand cubic feet sound like survival numbers, the fiat by which Fahd expects to boost the price to \$18, even if it works, is no solution.

And we shouldn't forget the nature of the tight in which both our nation and our state have been put by this question of oil prices.

Our country's domestic oil production is down 300,000 barrels a day since the start of 1986, and there is little reason to hope to see that trend reversed. The gap that creates between what our nation produces and what our nation consumes has to be filled with imported oil. What's worse, even as this goes on, America's demand for petroleum products continues to climb.

So we have a hunger for this product here at home, while we cannot afford to pump the oil from our own ground. A \$4 per barrel increase in the cost may help to stem the decline in the industry in the U.S., and specifically in New Mexico, but it will not end it.

It's always tough for Americans to admit conditions that affect and perhaps even control their lives are not directly changeable simply by an act of our national will. In this case, that is clearly and undeniably so. We must learn to live with that fact.

Some of us have learned already the lesson that follows from it. Others have still to comprehend it. But whether we admit it slowly or quickly, the fact is that we are going to have to adjust our standard of living, especially in states like ours, where so much has been staked on the profits made by this single industry that sucks the oil and gas out of the earth below us.

Among those who should take special note of that fact are all those who have for so long depended for their livelihood on state government, which has in turn so long depended on the oil industry. Thanks to those Arabs and their brothers and cousins, it doesn't look like we will see the return of "the old days" for quite some time—if ever.

Editorial

We got ourselves in a tough spot, but we came out smelling like a rose.

Voters Thursday passed the tax increase, allowing the village to keep the present airport land and to produce the village's share of the cost of the new airport on Fort Stanton Mesa.

We are told that will ensure the airport construction is not delayed. An airport will be ready by the close of 1987, say officials.

But what about the present airport site? We have it, sure, but what are we going to do with it?

Some groups have begun addressing this issue. That's good. We said it before—effective use of that land could mean even more to our future than the new airport itself.

The land is an opportunity. A college campus, an outdoor amphitheater, sports facilities, soft industry, a convention facility, a retirement community, additional space for municipal buildings, branch offices for major corporations, corporate training centers—who knows how the land could be used most effectively?

Well, we believe it's the responsibility of the Ruidoso Village Council to find out.

Our present councillors cannot really be blamed for the last-minute, Band-Aid way the airport land was secured. They have been together just nine months as a council. The airport problem is decades old. But for previous councils to have operated on the belief that we'd get a new airport scot-free would have been unrealistic at best. Certainly they foresaw the need to make some plans to pay the price of the new airport.

And perhaps they made some plans. Unfortunately, no plan ever made it to today, when the time has come to pay the tab.

We encourage the present council to formulate a plan for the land, and to begin implementation of that plan during the 15 months that remain of their term. Just as important, we encourage them to take some step to ensure that the plan is passed on to the next council.

Let's not get ourselves in another tough spot. Now is the time to make a plan for the airport land.—DJP

the Bonds to be and remain excluded from gross income for federal income tax purposes, and not to take any actions which would adversely affect such exclusion, under the provisions of federal tax laws that apply to the Bonds, including the provisions of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 (the Code) and any applicable amendments thereto. The District will provide an opinion of Bond Counsel, based upon covenants, representations and certifications of the District, to the effect that under existing law, the interest on the Bonds is excluded from gross income for federal income tax purposes, and that the Bonds are not "private activity bonds" as defined in Section 141(a) of the Code and are "qualified tax-exempt obligations" as defined in Section 265(b) of the Code. Interest on obligations that are not private activity bonds is not treated as an item of tax preference for purposes of the alternative minimum tax on individuals and corporations.

However, under the Code, a provision, applicable to corporations (as defined for federal income tax purposes), that would impose an alternative minimum tax on a portion of the excess of adjusted net book income over pre-book alternative minimum taxable income, could subject part of the interest on the Bonds received by corporations to such corporate alternative minimum tax. For taxable years beginning after 1986, adjusted current earnings and profits would replace

adjusted net book income in the computation. In addition, for taxable years beginning after 1986 and before 1992, interest on the Bonds earned by some corporations could be subject to the environmental tax imposed by Section 59A of the Code enacted by the Superfund Revenue Act of 1986 and, for taxable years beginning after 1986, interest on the Bonds earned by certain foreign corporations doing business in the United States would be subject to a branch profits tax imposed by Section 884 of the Code. Under the Code, the receipt of tax-exempt interest can have other adverse federal income tax consequences for certain taxpayers, including financial institutions, property and casualty insurance companies, recipients of Social Security and Railroad Retirement benefits, and taxpayers who are deemed to incur or continue indebtedness to acquire or carry tax-exempt obligations.

Press Association. The annual competition was judged this year by members of the Idaho Press Association.

Darrell Pehr, editor of The Ruidoso News, was recently awarded first place in editorial writing by the New Mexico Press Association.

Pehr's two submissions were judged first among editorials published in newspapers similar in size and circulation to The News.

"The thing I value most about writing editorials at The Ruidoso News is dealing with local issues," said Pehr. And his prize-winning editorials both spoke to issues of concern to area residents.

Pehr said he finds it very rewarding when his editorials achieve some desired change or result.

Editorial

The people of Lincoln County have exercised their constitutional right in demanding a grand jury, but the judge whose duty it is to call that grand jury has failed to follow the wishes of the people.

A petition signed by the requisite number of citizens in the county requesting a grand jury investigation of the murders of Thomas "Cotton" and Judy McKnight was presented to District Court Judge Richard Parsons early last week.

Instead of calling the grand jury, Parsons wrote the Attorney General's Office, stating his belief that he has no power to appoint a special prosecutor. Parsons said he wouldn't call the grand jury without assurance that the AG will present the case. He said he'll call the grand jury only when informed that someone will present the case with "legal evidence."

But Parsons does have the power to request action by the attorney general. According to the New Mexico Statutes, Section 31-6-7, "the attorney general, when requested by the district court, shall assist the grand jury."

And Parsons has no choice in calling the grand jury. The language of Article II, Section 14 of the New Mexico Constitution is very plain. He shall call the grand jury.

So what's the holdup?

We believe Parsons has two options. Either he changes his mind and calls the grand jury of his own volition, or he faces the embarrassment of having the citizens of Lincoln County obtain a writ of mandamus from the Supreme Court forcing him to call the grand jury.

Either way, the citizen's constitutional right must be upheld, and a grand jury must be called.—DJP

Editorial

News that the New Mexico Racing Commission may begin conducting mandatory drug testing of racehorses jockeys is yet another example of government's athlete-drug hysteria.

Sure some athletes use illegal drugs, and some tragically die from drug abuse.

Others misuse drugs, too. Does that mean because some abuse drugs, we all shall be subject to mandatory drug testing?

Where will the line be drawn? Will each of us be lined up and tested when we arrive at work, as the jockeys may be? Will fans at Ruidoso Downs Race Track also be tested for drug use prior to viewing "drug-free" jockeys racing?

Worse yet, will State Racing Commission members be tested for drugs before convening to discuss the use of drugs by jockeys?

Or will Philadelphia Court of Appeals justices (the court that ruled in favor of such testing) also be required to take breath and urine tests before presiding at court?

Indiscriminate testing of jockeys seems to ignore the principle of probable cause. Or do the Philadelphia judges and the Racing Commission members have reason to believe that all jockeys are drug abusers?

We think not.

Drug abuse should be battled. But to take such an obtuse approach as mandatory drug testing is to create another wrong, rather than right a wrong.—DJP
