Stabbings kill two

Two Ruidoso residents were fatally stabbed Friday during an argument in front of Something Special, 2204 Sudderth Drive, according to official reports.

Ruidoso Police responded to a call at 7:10 p.m. Friday, and found Jose S. Jiminez, 41, and Constance J. Schiller, 43, lying on the ground in front of Something Special, according to police reports.

Deputy Chief J.R. Alston said witnesses at the scene reported that Jiminez went into Something Special where Schiller was employed. The two reportedly came out front and an argument and "scuffle" followed that resulted in "multiple stab wounds" for both victims, according to police reports.

Ruidoso Police officer Kent Berkedal, the first officer at the scene, said the two subjects were lying on the lawn when he arrived. He said a black-handled knife with a six-inch blade, a pair of scissors and a comb were on the ground between the heads of the two victims. Berkedal reported that the male subject was still moving and was handcuffed by Ruidoso Police Officer Oscar Villado.

Alston said Schiller and Jiminez were transported to Lincoln County Medical Center (LCMC).

Schiller was pronounced dead at 7:29 p.m. and Jiminez was declared dead at 8:55 p.m. by Deputy Medical Examiner Jim Stover, said Alston.

Stover said the manner of death was stab wounds, but a cause of death will be determined by a pathologist in the state Office of the Medical Investigator in Albuquerque. The bodies were transported to Albuquerque for autopsies, said Alston.

Photos of possible murder weapons recovered at the scene were also sent to the state office, said Stover.

"We don't know who stabbed who first," noted Stover.

The Lincoln County Sheriff's Office (LCSO), the official agency handling the case, is continuing its investigation, said LCSO Sergeant Mike Chapel Sunday. He said he expects to obtain the autopsy results today (Monday).

Chapel said he arrived at the scene after the victims were taken to LCMC. He said Schiller and Jiminez are believed at one time to have been partners in Mr. Joseph's Hair Styling Salon.

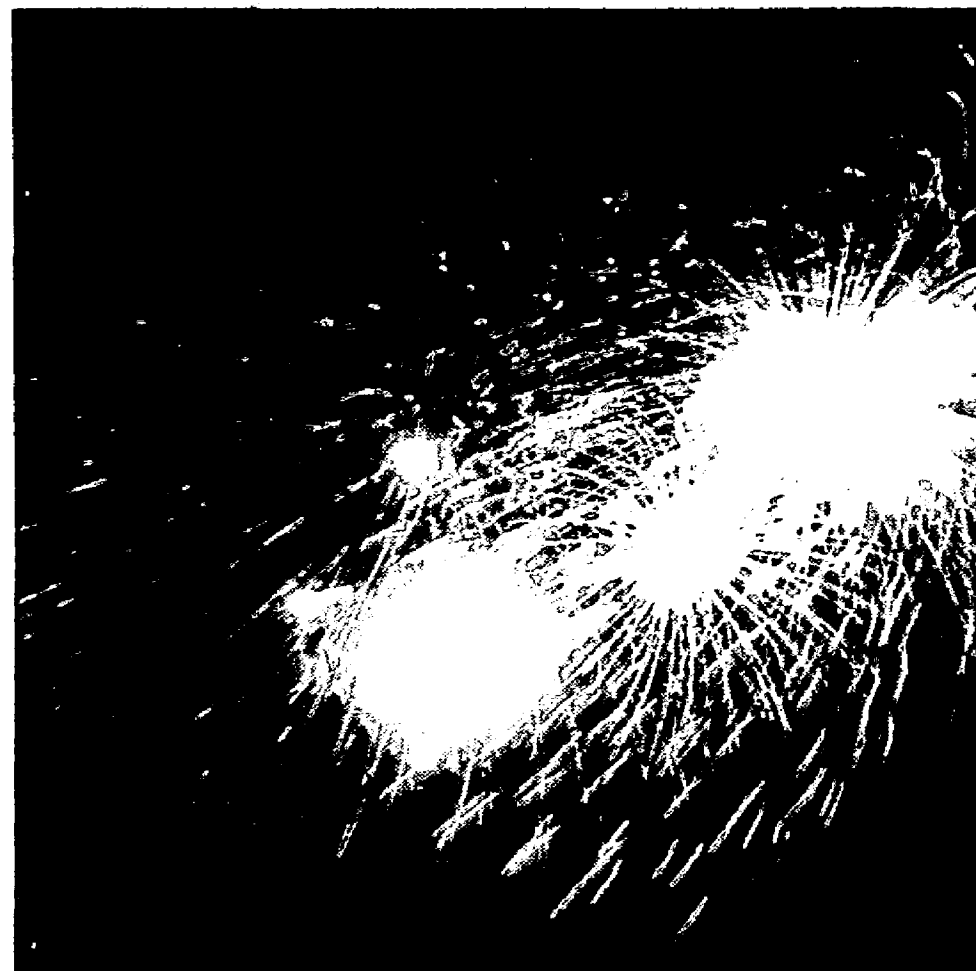
"We have witnesses that saw an argument," said Chapel.

Alston said Schiller is survived by a son, Mike Shane Schiller, 15, of the family home in Cherokee Mobile Village.

Officials show concern on airport land sale plan

Even as survey crews stake out a three-acre slice of the Ruidoso Municipal Airport land as a possible site for a new main post office, an Albuquerque-based planning firm continues work on a master plan for the entire 160-acre airport tract.

Village manager Frank Potter confirmed last month that postal officials have contracted for a survey and an appraisal on part of the airport land located on Cree Meadows Drive.

The U.S. Postal Service, through a real estate agent, contacted Village of Ruidoso officials about locating a postal facility on land near Ruidoso Municipal Administrative Center after the Ruidoso Village Council contracted with Architectural Research Consultants, Inc. (ARC) to master plan the prime property.

Mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr. told the Village Council last week that master planner John Petronis, ARC president, has said he has no problem with using part of the airport tract for a post office.

But some members of the council and business community, recalling a plan to use the airport land in an overall economic development plan, have voiced concern over disposing of any of the land—particularly before a master plan is completed.

"There is no deal with the post office right now," said Village Councillor Ray Dean Carpenter Sunday. "We still have to agree on the appraisal," he added.

"In a sense we agreed we'll sell it for the appraised value," noted Councillor Elmer Pirelli, who has since changed his mind and opposes selling the land.

Pirelli recalled the council establishing a policy to keep the airport land when a gross receipts tax increase was implemented last year.

"It was my understanding the resolution the council passed was to hold all of that land for economic development ... bringing more jobs into the area," said Barbara DiPaolo, a member of the Economic Development Corporation board and president of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce.

Downs officials resign; mayor calls for audit

Ruidoso Downs Mayor J.C. "Jake" Harris said Sunday he'll request an audit of village books, a move that comes close on the heels of the surprise resignations of clerk JoAnn Jenkins and administrator Charles Robinson.

Harris said he has letters in which the two list "personal" reasons for their sudden resignations last Thursday.

"I was surprised," said Harris, who was out of town Thursday. Village offices were closed Friday.

Neither Jenkins nor Robinson could be reached for comment this weekend.

It was learned that Robinson was scheduled to testify on behalf of the Village of Ruidoso Downs in a court case in Roswell on Thursday. Village officials, in Roswell for the case involving a disputed bill, said they were concerned when their administrator wasn't on hand.

Harris said he'll have to appoint a clerk right away, adding he has a candidate in mind for that job. He said he isn't so sure he'll fill the administrator's slot.

"I'll just have to sit on that one a while," said Harris.

Two Ruidoso women were treated and released at Lincoln County Medical Center Wednesday after their vehicle was involved in a two-car collision on Sudderth Drive and El Paso Road, according to official reports.

Police said Liz Shirley, the 28-year-old driver of a 1979 Subaru station wagon, and Georgann Shirley, a passenger in that car, were injured when their car collided with a 1985 Pontiac driven by

merce. The Economic Development Corporation recently presented plans for using the airport land as an enticement for new business and employment.

DiPaolo and other members of the board thought the group had the council's stamp of approval on retaining the valuable land to help diversify the village economy.

DiPaolo said she understood the master plan would be completed and public hearings conducted before any further development would be authorized for the airport land.

"To piecemeal it would be disastrous," noted DiPaolo.

A separate concern voiced by DiPaolo and others in the real estate business is one of competition between the Village of Ruidoso and others selling commercial property.

Pirelli said he's concerned that selling the land to the postal service could hurt the value of surrounding land, and could establish a precedent.

But Carpenter said he doesn't feel selling a portion of the land is competing with the real estate organizations.

"I don't think we're going to sell enough to hurt the real estate business," said Carpenter.

DiPaolo disagreed, noting that other land is available and the post office received several bids from private enterprise.

A further issue surfaced during last week's council meeting. Potter said the postal service survey identified a slightly different piece of land than the one originally discussed. He told councillors Tuesday he wants to discuss the proposed site with postal service officials.

Potter said the postal service plan reserves a great deal of village-owned land as a buffer zone around the three acres to be included in sale negotiations. Pirelli said the buffer includes almost half as much land as the amount the postal service proposes to purchase.

Voters were told before last year's negative referendum, on a .50 cent tax hike, that a vote for the tax increase was a vote to retain the airport land.

Pirelli said voters "could raise some heat" if councillors move to sell part of the land.

Economic development group schedules public meeting

The Economic Development Corporation of Lincoln County will have a public presentation at 7 p.m. Thursday, July 16, in the North Forty Room of Cree Meadows Country Club.

The public is invited. David Henkel, New Mexico Director for Economic Development; Bob Allgood, senior program officer; and Barbara Sategna, Southeast coordinator with the State of New Mexico Economic Development Department, will attend. The Economic Development Corporation of Lincoln County (EDC) will present their new non-profit corporation to the public at the meeting.

The group has formed a non-profit corporation now approved by the state Corporation Commission. EDC was a result of the area's concern to diversify the economy by attracting revenue generating en-

titles that can create more jobs and help stabilize the economy year-round, according to a press release from the group. The original task force consists of representatives from many civic organizations, bankers, retail merchants, churches, schools, utility companies, real estate community, Chamber of Commerce, village and county government representatives and others.

EDC has been endorsed by the Village of Ruidoso, Village of Ruidoso Downs, Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce and Lincoln County Commissioners.

The citizens of Lincoln County who own property or a business in the county are invited to become certificate holders in EDC and the public is invited to attend this celebration, considered to be a milestone in our area's future, the press release concludes.

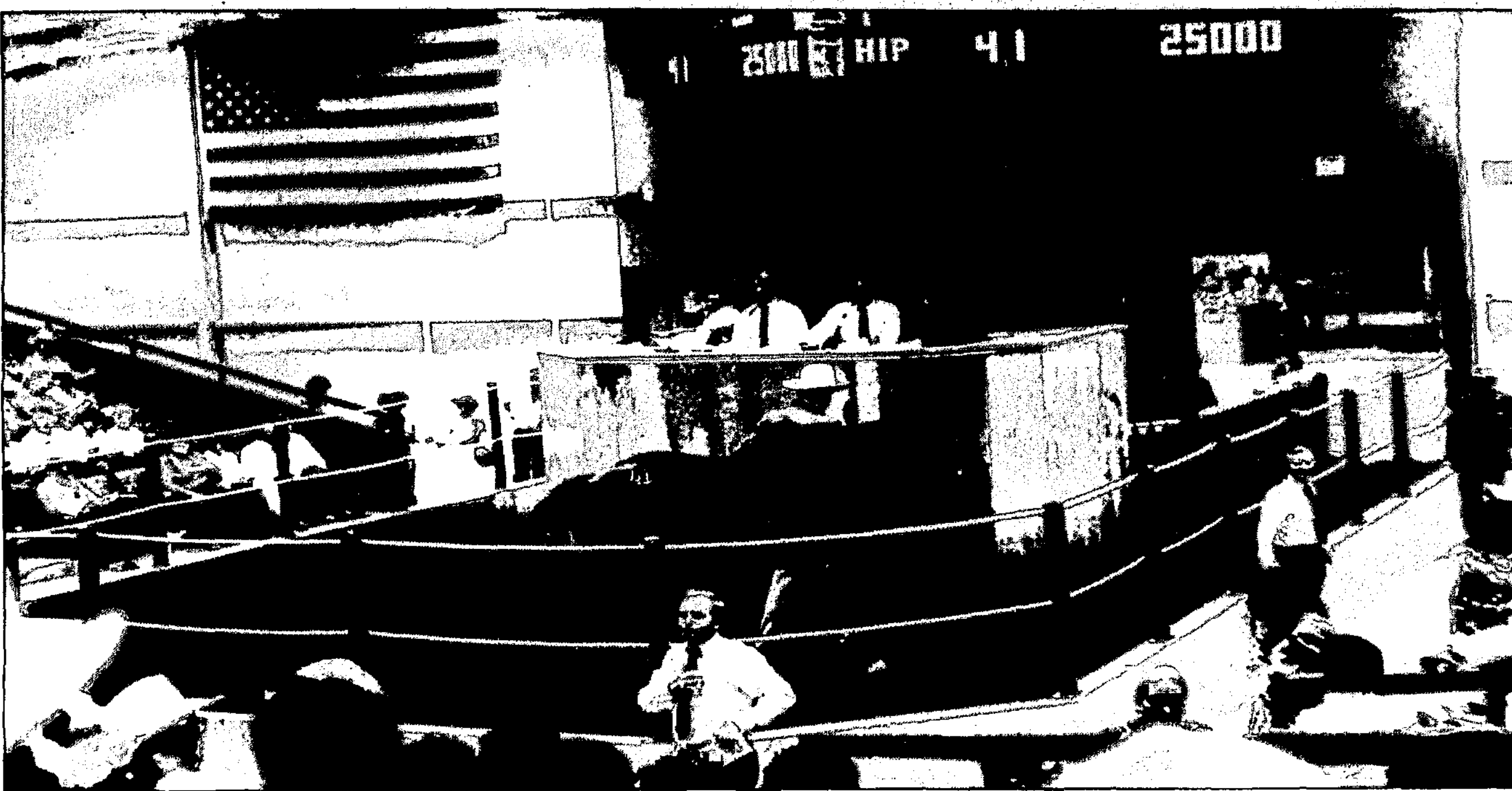

Track to drop Big Q

Ruidoso Downs president Ferd Slocum announced Sunday that the track will discontinue the Big Q bet and introduce a new wagering format when racing resumes on Thursday at the mountain course.

"The Big Q has been poorly received since being re-introduced for the 1987 season," Slocum said. "Our premier exotic wager will be the Twin Trifecta, which has been very popular with the racing fans." The Twin Trifecta will return to

the 3rd and 4th races on Ruidoso's programs, while Exacta wagering replaces the Big Q in the 11th-race feature.

The complete format for each 12-race program includes Daily Double wagering on the first two races; Quinela on the 2nd, 4th, 5th, 7th and 9th races; Exacta betting on the 6th, 10th and 11th races; Trifecta on the 8th and 12th races; and Twin Trifecta wagering on the 3rd and 4th races.

Thats Incredible beats all-stars in Gov's Cup

Lewie Germany won the third stakes race of his young career with a picture-perfect performance aboard Thats Incredible in Saturday's Governor's Handicap at Ruidoso Downs.

Saturday's \$23,000 Governor's Handicap figured to be a tough matchup between Curriobot, Big Bold Boz and Forever A Ruler - three horses with combined earnings of more than \$800,000.

Big Bold Boz went postward as the slight 8-5 favorite of 7,300 fans attending the Fourth of July program. Forever A Ruler, fresh off a narrow victory in the Las Colinas Handicap at the Downs at Santa Fe, was the second choice to win the 7 1/2-furlong sprint. The 10-year-old Curriobot was let loose at 2-1 odds.

Dewan Who, a 45-1 longshot, set all of the early fractions with Thats Incredible and Big Bold Boz racing about five lengths off the leader. Germany cut Thats Incredible loose as the field approached the final turn.

"I knew Dewan Who would go out there, but I knew I could catch him," the 17-year-old El Pasoan said. "I was worried about Big Bold Boz, but he didn't go with me when I went by him ... and I just went on with it."

Germany took the lead near the eighth pole and was never headed in the final drive for a \$14,000 first-place check. Casey Lambert got Curriobot rolling from dead last at

the head of the stretch to finish a neck behind in second. The longtime favorite of Southwest racing fans made up four lengths with his patented stretch kick in the final furlong.

Thats Incredible was making his second trip to the winner's circle of a stakes event this year for trainer Coy Hendrix and owner Forrest McAden of Millsap, Texas. The 5-year-old New Mexico-bred lined up for the Governor's Cup with \$13,000 in earnings from eight appearances this year. He captured a handicap event at Sunland Park this spring and finished third to Curriobot in the Sunland Park Handicap.

Curriobot bumped his career bankroll over the \$400,000 mark earning \$5,000 for his second-place effort. Doyal Roberts saddled the Pennsylvania-bred for owner Juliana Winters of Oklahoma City. Lord Rubic checked in a half-length behind Curriobot to pocket \$2,300. Glen Murphy, who was injured in a riding accident three weeks ago, took the assignment aboard Lord Rubic for Charles Allison, who owns and trains the horse.

K. Jack was fourth, followed by Forever A Ruler, Dewan Who and Big Bold Boz. Forever A Ruler, who had won four of his five starts prior to the Governor's, appeared to be in need of a race since winning the Gollinas on May 31. Big Bold Boz was taking his first trip past the 6-furlong marker.

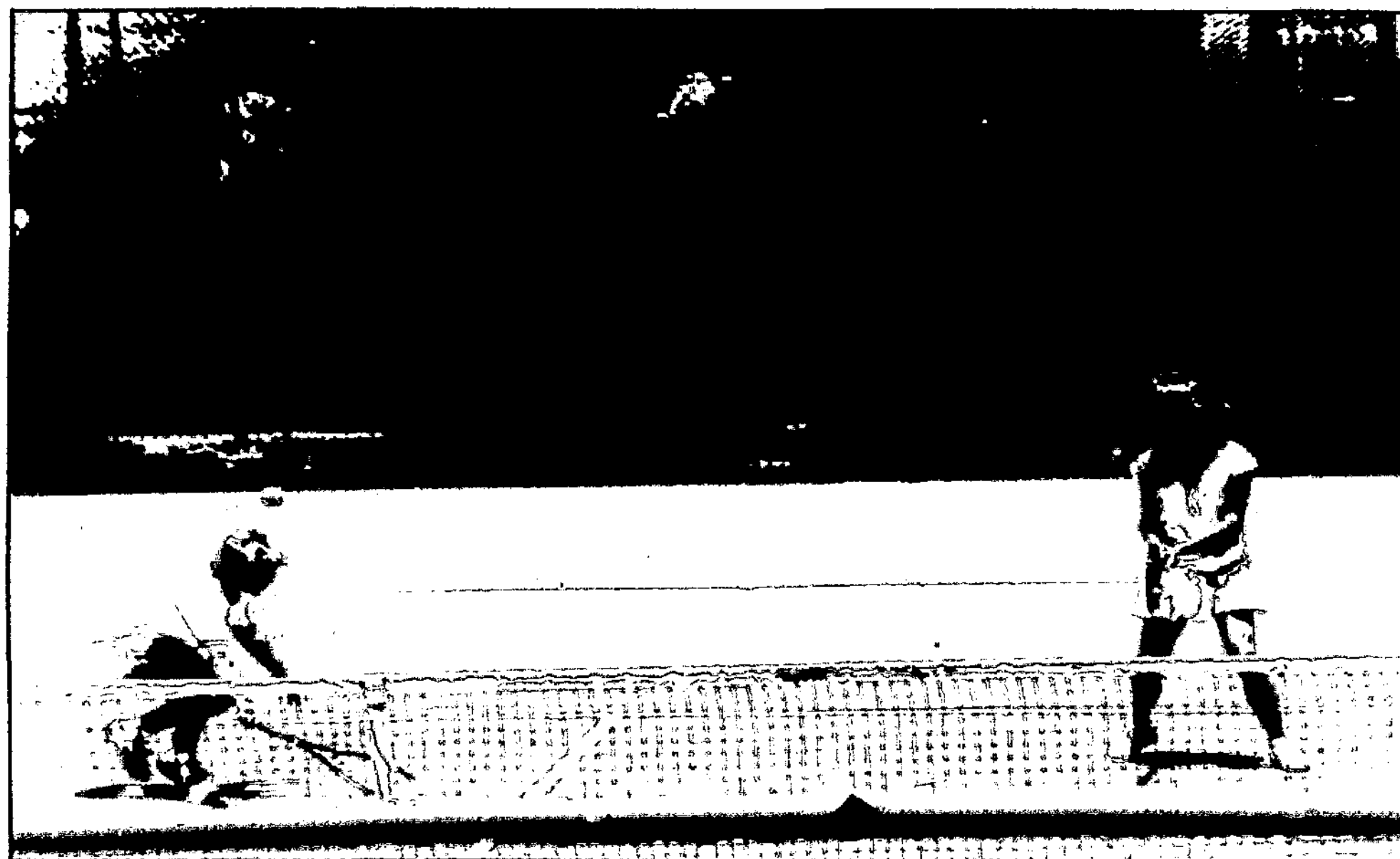

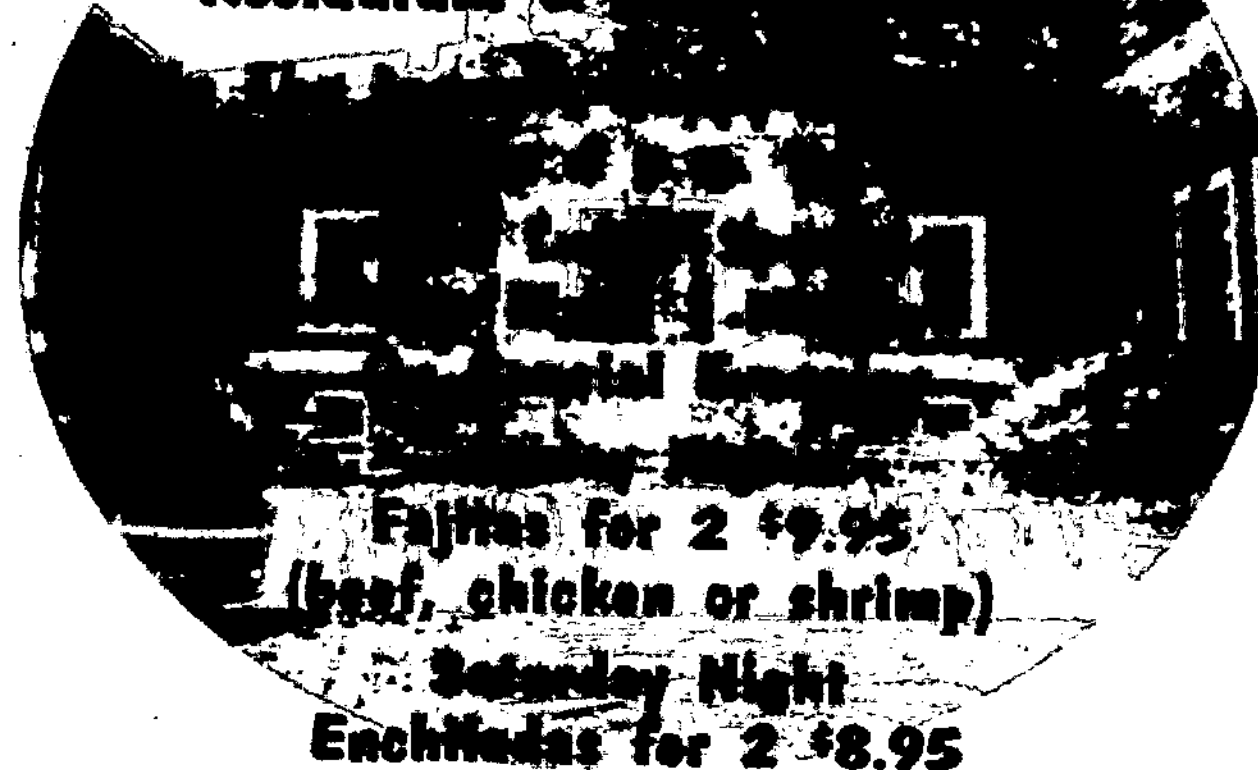

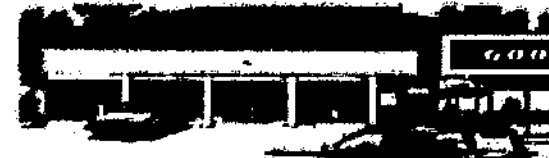

The softball season is whipping into high gear now.

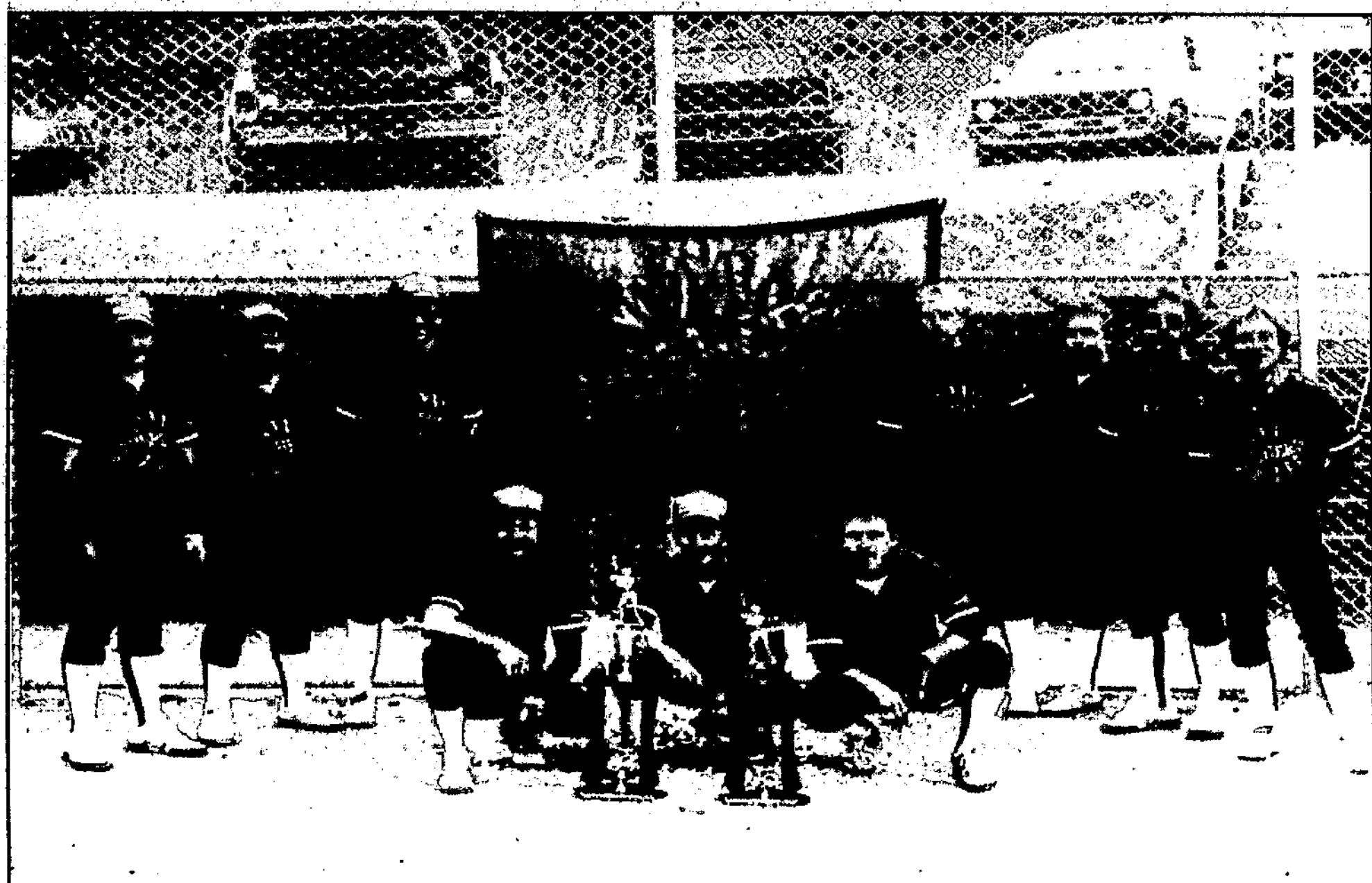
There's lots of exciting action in both the Lincoln County Men's Slo-Pitch Softball League and the Lincoln County Women's Slo-Pitch Softball League.

Merchant Milestones: C&L Lumber & Supply marks 30 years

A trip to the lumber yard need not be uneventful, especially if you're visiting C & L Lumber, East Highway 70, Ruidoso Downs. Talk to C.L. "Bones" Wright and you may take home a history lesson along with the hardware.

Tucked away in the heart of the store is Bones' office, a veritable museum of antique guns, photos, and memorabilia that has been collected over the years.

Along the walls are commemorative editions of the famous Winchester repeating rifle, scores of antique shotguns and many different types of rifles.

A glass case standing to one side of the room contains a variety of handguns including the Colt .45

revolver that won the west and everything from derringers to odd caliber pistols and the equipment to load them.

Of special interest is the collection of home defense and trap guns. One wedge shaped piece, about the size of a butane lighter, can be inserted under a window or door and fires a blank or .22 caliber round when the window or door is opened. Another gun was designed to foil poachers and graverobbers, the English Flintlock Trap Gun, resembles a small cannon and has rings attached to the trigger through which trip wires would pull the gun toward the victim and discharge the round.

"I have been collecting guns for 30 years," Bones said. That's also how long Bones has been selling lumber and hardware at his present

location.

Bones and his wife, Joelyne, started the company in the late 50s and now leave the day-to-day operation to Carolyn and Steve Phelps.

"I got to get out of the business so I can collect my Social Security," Bones said. "I want to get back some of all that money I put in."

Bones came from a large El Paso family which did its duty during World War II.

"All five of my brothers and I joined the Navy during WWII," Bones said. "I had heard it was the cleanest branch of the service and soon found out why."

Bones grew up during the depression years and learned the value of money and a job.

"I learned what work was," Bones said. "When you had a job

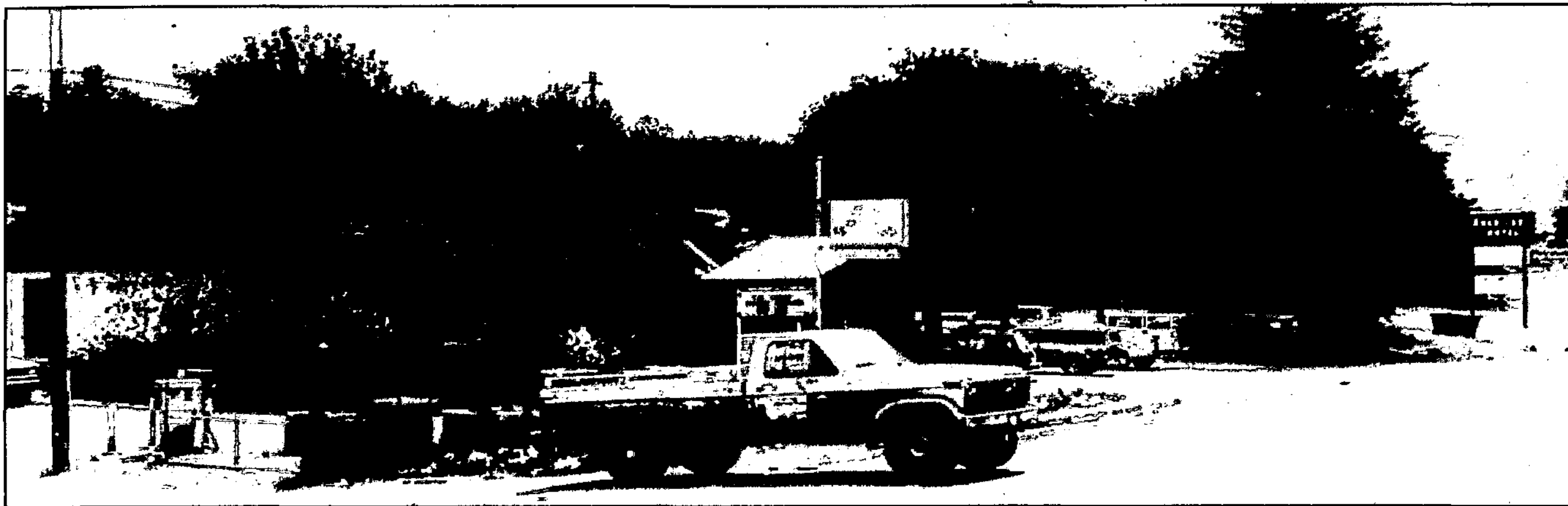
you worked hard because there were 10 other guys waiting for your job. Things were bad but we never went hungry."

Today Bones is classified a modest philanthropist by some members of the Ruidoso Downs Volunteer Fire Department, which he helped start and has been involved with since its beginning.

"They got a damn good fire department and a hard working bunch of kids," Bones said.

Behind all the wood-steel and hardware at C & L Lumber is another guy who adds to the living history of the Ruidoso area.

Special Service At Saint Anne's Chapel

On the first of July a special service was held at three o'clock in the afternoon to bless and commemorate two memorial plaques installed the day before on the west wall of the little historic church by Paul Jones and his grandson, Jim Paul Whipple.

The copper plaques, eight by sixteen, were placed in loving memory of two of the daughters of Frank and Helena Coe, who, with other Lincoln County pioneers founded the church in 1934.

The daughters are Winifred Coe Hunt, April 11, 1887-January 13, 1986.

And Edith Coe Rigsby, October 31, 1896-November thirty, 1986. These memorial plaques joined others on the inside of the wall including the other Frank Coe children: Sidney Bonnell, Annie Tittsworth, Agnes Bonnell, Wilbur Coe and Helena Coe Le May, mother of Nellie Rutledge Jones.

Father Burdette Stampley, in charge of services, read from the Episcopal prayer book:

"Oh God, you will keep in perfect peace those whose minds are on you; for in returning and rest we shall be saved; in quietness and trust shall be our strength."

Father Stampley said that both Edith and Winnie had lived out the spirit of this reading—that in all the trials and hardships of pioneer life they had always maintained unshakable faith and "the Peace of God that passeth all understanding."

Special prayers were offered by those attending the service.

In blessing the plaques Father Stampley said:

"Lord bless these plaques that they may be a blessing to all who enter this church, which is a memorial to these great Christian ladies."

Father Stampley added:

"We praise you, Lord, for all your servants who, having lived their life in faith, now live eternally with you."

Those present included: Jennie Hunt Baldwin, daughter of Winifred Coe Hunt and her husband, Bill, who stopped by for the ceremonies on their way to a family reunion in Colorado. Bill and Jennie will then

return to Houston to celebrate their fiftieth wedding anniversary.

The Spirit Of The Fourth

During the morning and most of the day I was over here across the river dreaming of Fourth of July's going back seventy-seven years beginning in Alaska and being remembered and celebrated in Mexico and across the Pacific Ocean in Australia and the Philippine Islands.

Before the clear-seeing eye of memory passed parades, picnics, fireworks displays, patriotic speeches, and many other things including rodeos. Certain rodeos in particular—one in which brother Mark won the bronc riding in the Fort Stanton Rodeo. Today I am known by the older Mesqueros as "White Mule Rider." Late in the evening I was down at the bit corral feeding a cow and her calf, Gentle Tiny, a little heifer who has had a rough start in life and has been under the care of Dr. Lynn Willard.

Pretty soon who should show up but Dr. Lynn himself and his father-in-law, Mr. Ross Clopton.

"I saw your pickup from the highway, and thought I would come over and see how the little calf is doing," said Dr. Lynn.

Dr. Willard has been a staunch friend of many years of all the creatures of the Storm Ranch, going back to the little Spirit Dog, Shady Logan and before. Dr. Lynn arranged for the little calf to get more of her mother's milk, so that everybody in the corral was happier.

As Dr. Willard and Mr. Compton drove away I felt a special rejoicing, as if a special longing I had felt all day had been answered.

Celebration At The Lone Pine Ranch

A few days before the fourth, George Lore, my neighbor just up the way met me at the front gate with his two boys, John and Robert, and said that he and his wife were going to be hosts at a little

neighborhood gathering at his home on the fourth and to spread the word.

Late in the evening I started up the old road and passed the art gallery home of Tom and Dorothy Knapp. Here were several motor homes and cars and pickups. Folks young and old out under the trees waved and smiled as I drove by. On farther up other gatherings of folks waved and called, "Happy Fourth."

Then at a wide green field just east of the Lore houses and barns, the neighborhood gathering turned out to be more than three hundred people, visiting in the shade of the trees, eating wonderful grub on tables under a large circus-like tent. Some were playing horseshoes, and setting off fireworks. It seemed all the people in Lincoln County were there.

I knew almost every one there and met many new friends including Mr. and Mrs. Russ Moore of Albuquerque, Jane Callahan of Alto; Danny Austin and his two-year-old son, Danny Patrick and Richard Chaves, Jr.

I have never felt a more sincere and happy outpouring of friendliness—and all of a sudden the certain feeling I had all day became clear.

During the Fourth of July there is a feeling that has abided deep within us all year that comes into new life on this day. There is a yearning to reach out and touch another American in fond appreciation and deep friendship—including loved ones, friends, neighbors and strangers. We draw closer together somehow, as Americans all, on this special American Day.

A great flood of gratefulness well-ed up within me in being an American, thankfulness in sharing the pride of our country with all these good folks.

One of the highlights of the evening was the reading of The Declaration of Independence by Mel O'Reilly. Mel made Jefferson's immortal document come to life for all of us by his eloquent reading.

The fireworks lit up the night sky in great splendor and the huge bonfire did away with "Mr. Hard Times."

All in all the Fourth of July celebration was a bit of America—a part of the pride and gratefulness—being felt all over America and the entire world. We extend our thanks to Mr. and Mrs. George Lore and all who helped to make this celebration long to be remembered.

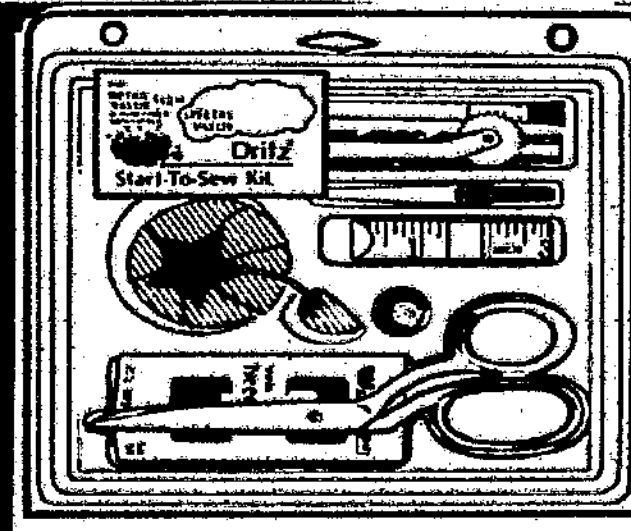

Inside the Capitol by Jay Miller

SANTA FE—Fred McCaffrey was a fraud. That's right, a fraud.

It all became evident last weekend when a group of legislators, lobbyists, media personalities and friends threw Fred a Bon Voyage party. Tickets were sold at a rather hefty price and all the food and refreshments were donated so there would be a nice, tidy sum to present to Fred and Jan to help them further enjoy their escape to paradise in the Caribbean.

Guess what they announced they are going to do with all that money? Fred and Jan are going to start a scholarship fund on the island of Montserrat in the name of the people of New Mexico as a gesture of good will from our state to that British island in the West Indies. Now, does that sound like the Fred McCaffrey we had all grown to despise?

Fred always liked to call himself a curmudgeon—a crusty, ill-tempered, old man. This had led some of us to believe that Montserrat would greet Fred with about the same enthusiasm as it would an outbreak of the Black Plague. We thought it wouldn't be long before we would be reading in the papers that Fred had started a political column on that tranquil island and had ended up fomenting a revolution.

Could it be that Fred was living a lie all these years? Was he forcing himself to be a vicious, mean person? Maybe that is why he is having to go so far, far away. Maybe he is going to take a long time to recover from being such a bearer of bad tidings.

Let's examine three unrelated situations.

—Staffmembers and executives (perhaps as many as several hundred in number) of four major U.S. firms and five European firms will be in or near Lincoln County until October in connection with weapons tests on White Sands Missile Range.

—Suggested uses of the present airport land, when Sierra Blanca Airport is built, have ranged from community colleges to go-cart raceways, but a suggestion for part of the land to be used as a corporate training center has gained momentum.

—Tourism here is having its ups and downs, and many have suggested we need exposure to new groups of people from places different than traditional eastern New Mexico and West Texas markets.

Is one of these companies seeking a new location for a corporate training center? We may have what they need. Would these executives and their families consider Lincoln County as a vacation spot? Family recreation is our middle name. Some companies organize retreats and workshops for their employees in resort areas. Could they come here?

Perhaps a reception or tours for the executives could be arranged to better acquaint these people with what Ruidoso and Lincoln County have to offer.

There is great potential here that we should not let pass. Let's take advantage of this situation.—DJP
