



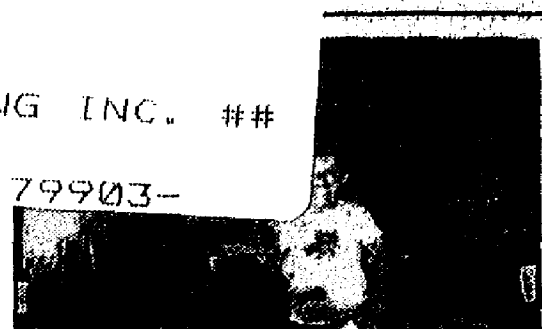

Broader support for MainStreet is sought

Ruidoso MainStreet Task Force members are asking citizens to invest in the future of the village.

The eight-member group organized recently to come up with pledges of funds and in-kind services to support an application for a Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) enabling the village to become a part of the state and federal MainStreet programs.

The grant, besides paying the first \$12,000 annual salary of a project director, would fund three-year contracts with the state and with the National Heritage Trust. Those programs, already working with hundreds of towns in the nation, offer a variety of resources to participants.

But to obtain a MainStreet CDBG, the village must show a commitment to support the program financially and otherwise. Members of the task force are gathering pledges of funds and support to accompany the application due in Santa Fe on December 1.

MainStreet is described as a self-help partnership between government and the private sector. Key elements include promotions, design and economic restructuring of downtown areas.

"We are confident that this program will make a difference for all of us in Ruidoso," says a letter soliciting pledges. Besides money, the group is asking for letters of support from citizens to show a broad-based commitment.

Task force members have volunteered to present details of the MainStreet program to their neighbors. To learn more contact one of the following:

Economic impact debated in Mescalero water case

Ruidoso officials are keeping close watch on a water rights court case under way in federal court in Roswell.

Village manager Frank Potter and Infra-structure Division head Becky Durham took turns last week listening to testimony presented by expert witnesses hired by the Village of Ruidoso to present evidence in the ongoing trial involving water users in the Pecos River Basin. By Friday afternoon the village's case was finished, and the torch was passed to the Water Defense Association (WDA). That group will begin presenting its case at 10 a.m. Monday, November 30, since the court will be in recess this week. WDA is an organization of water rights owners represented by Richard Simms of Santa Fe.

In the ongoing water case, the United States and the Mescalero Apache Indian Tribe are claiming the tribe has the right to 17,931 acre feet of water to be used in irrigation and recreational projects on the Mescalero Indian Reservation.

Village water attorney Neil Stillinger, and his associate Kay Marr, put a string of witnesses on the stand last week, all testifying that the economic feasibility study for the tribe's proposed projects didn't address the question of "economic opportunity cost."

U.S. attorney Herb Becker and tribal attorney Leslie Seckler, after successfully persuading Judge LaFel Oman in pre-trial hearings to

limit testimony by the Village of Ruidoso over the "dollars and cents" impact, objected to testimony by economists last week. Seckler said since the village does not claim any agricultural water rights, it cannot present evidence over loss of fishing, tourism and property values. She reminded the court that any testimony over the increased cost of water to the municipality would be within the limitations already set.

"The tribe's claim to additional water rights is based on economic feasibility... we want to show that the study is flawed," said Marr.

On Thursday Judge Oman, overruling objection after objection by Becker and Seckler, allowed much of the testimony by economists from the University of Wyoming. Some of the testimony was "tendered," with the judge noting he won't consider "dollars and cents" in his decision, but allowing the evidence to be placed in the record.

The two economists, Gary Watts and David Brookshire, after being qualified by the judge as expert witnesses, faulted the tribe's feasibility study for neglecting to compute the effects of moving resources from one place to another. One of the projects proposed by the Mescalero Indian tribe includes moving water through a pipeline to irrigate high-yield crops.

Watts and Brookshire testified that losses to fishing and property values are primary, while Becker and Seckler claim any such benefits or costs are secondary, and inap-

propriate to be considered in the water rights dispute.

Brookshire placed a dollar loss to property values on the Rio Ruidoso at between \$3.2 million and \$9.4 million. He called those losses primary, noting the figure would be increased if his calculations were extended beyond the 196 properties above State Highway 37 located on the river.

Village water engineer Jack Atkins, qualified by the judge as an expert witness on hydrology, testified on Wednesday and Thursday, and his figures were used again by the economists in calculating the probable effects on the Village of Ruidoso if as much as 91 percent of the Rio Ruidoso is diverted as it leaves the reservation. Watts, using a 20-year flow study, said flow reductions caused by the Indian project would range from 33 percent to 93 percent in a dry year.

"The way we measure economic feasibility is how it affects the consumer," said Watts, who was asked over and over by Becker and Seckler if his calculations are for effects on or off the reservation. "Tourism and economic growth are interrelated between the village and reservation," said Watts.

In testimony over effects to fishing on the Rio Ruidoso, it was noted that Ruidoso ranks sixth among trout fisheries. Miles McInnis of the New Mexico Game and Fish Department offered testimony of that department's stocking prac-

District Attorney names assistant

Twelfth Judicial District Attorney James Weldon (DA) announced Thursday the appointment of Bob Laughlin as his assistant for the Carrizozo office.

"He's had a lot of experience," said Weldon. "He's been in practice for 10 years," he added.

Laughlin is in private practice in Carlsbad, and has had experience working as an assistant to the Fifth Judicial District Attorney, said Weldon.

The new appointee will succeed Harry Wilcox Jr. who was terminated last week after he refused to

dismiss a case on the orders of the DA. A factor in Wilcox's dismissal was a vision he revealed in a telephone interview with The News, but the main reason he was fired was his failure to obey an order, according to Weldon. Wilcox said he would ask Weldon to reconsider.

"I just advised him I'd made my decision, and that was it," said Weldon.

Wilcox will leave office on December 11, and Laughlin is slated to take over on December 14.

tices and the possible impact of reduced flow. Describing the requirements of water temperature and chemical properties, McInnis said fishing in the area is "put and take," so if stocking is curtailed "there simply wouldn't be any fish there to catch."

To questions by Becker over whether the stocking and catching of the fish take place below the reservation line, McInnis responded, "fish have a tendency to go upstream." He said he couldn't say whether the fish are caught on or off the reservation.

Testimony was presented late Thursday and again Friday by Ron Greene, who was qualified by the judge as an agricultural expert.

Stillinger and Marr have said they'll continue to press to have the economic impacts considered by the judge, but Judge Oman turned down their third such motion on Thursday.

"The Village of Ruidoso has been very imaginative in how to get economic impact into this case," said Seckler. "It has no relevance," she added.

But witnesses for the Village of Ruidoso painted a bleak picture of the possible effects on the area if the tribe is successful in diverting the river before it makes its way through the Village of Ruidoso and on through the Hondo Valley.

Testimony is scheduled to continue later this month on the third floor of the federal courthouse in Roswell.

A verdict isn't expected in the case until all the parties present their testimony.

Priority dates in question

A motions hearing on the Mescalero water case scheduled for Tuesday, November 24, in Santa Fe, will deal partly with the question of water rights priority dates.

"The tribe is trying to leapfrog over all your priorities," said Water Defense Association executive director Hubert Quintana during a public meeting Sunday. Quintana said the tribe has filed a motion asking that all stream system priority dates earlier than 1873 be denied.

If attorneys for the tribe are successful in their efforts, then every water right holder with a priority date of 1872 and earlier would still own the water right, but the date would be moved to 1873.

"Mechanically, I don't know how

that would work," said village water attorney Neil Stillinger. He said both village priorities on the Rio Ruidoso are earlier than 1873, and could be impacted by the judge's decision.

Stillinger said one village water right is acknowledged as 1866, while the other is in dispute. "We're claiming 1866," said Stillinger.

One motion scheduled for the Tuesday hearing will be entered by the City of Alamogordo, claiming that all Indian claims were extinguished the date that Fort Stanton was established. Stillinger said a number of other motions will be entered on Tuesday.

The water case will be in regular session in Roswell on Monday, November 30.

Locals attend conservation district meeting

Area soil and water conservation district representatives attended the 41st annual meeting of the New Mexico Association of Conservation Districts in Las Cruces November 4.

Howard Shanks and Greg Haussler, Capitan, Clem Weindorf, Hondo, and Sue Stearns, Nogal, were among 115 conservationists, mostly officials representing the

state's 47 soil and water conservation districts, attending the three-day meeting.

Keynote speaker was Dr. Thomas Bahr, cabinet secretary of the New Mexico Energy, Minerals, and Natural Resources Department. During his address, Bahr announced that the state is saving \$1.5 million through reorganization of the Energy, Minerals, and Natural

Resources Department.

"These savings, mostly in administrative services, are the result of merging the two departments under one cabinet secretary," said Bahr. The reorganization provides for more efficient operation within the department. The former Soil and Water Conservation Division has merged with the Division of State Forestry.

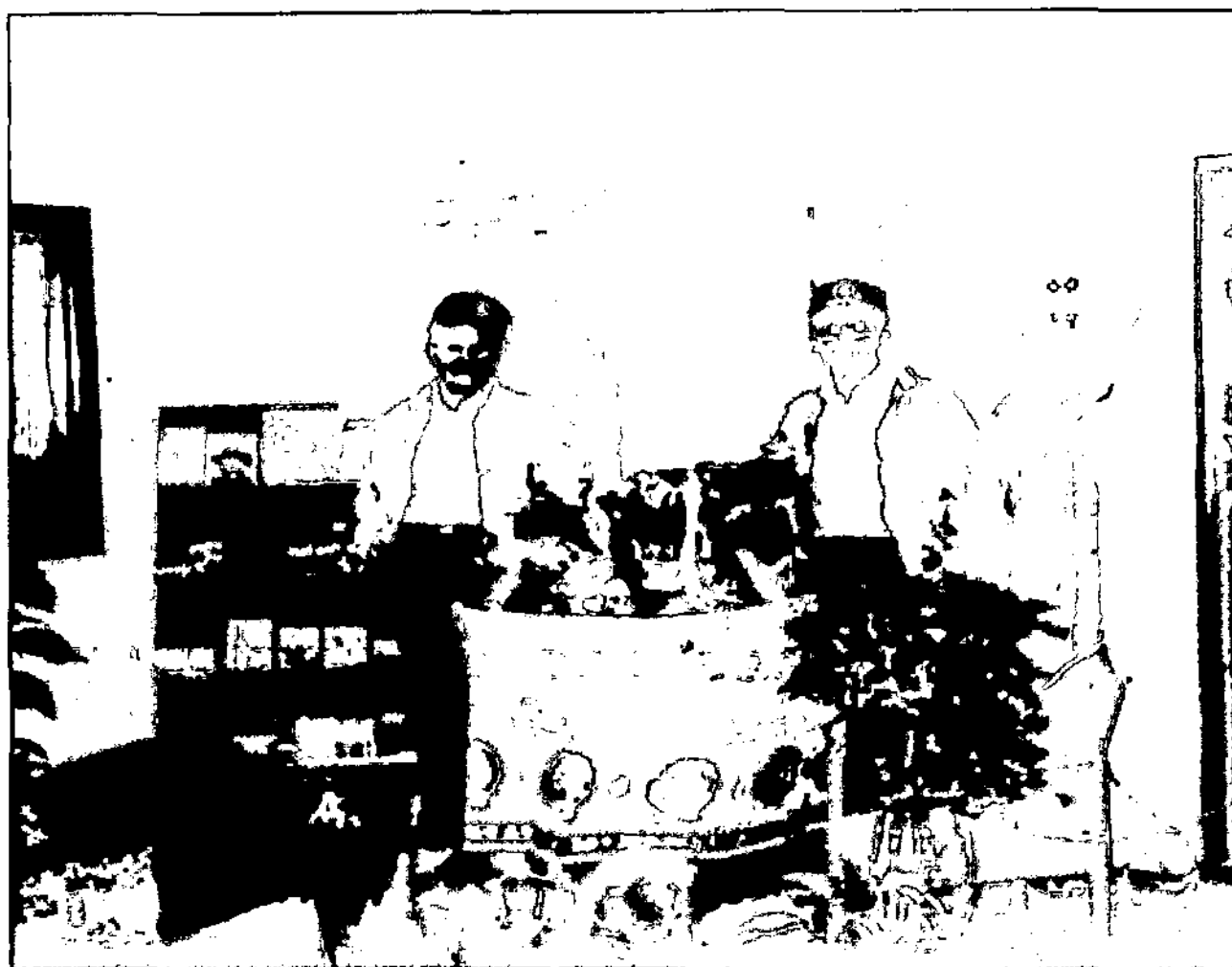

"We dominated the selections," said Tiger head coach Blane Miller. "Most of our guys are returning next year."

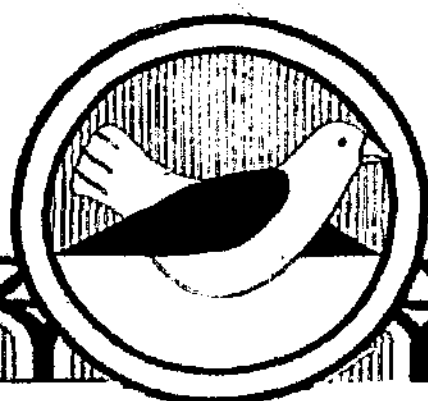
"Next year's programs (Capitan's) should be darn good for both boys and girls."

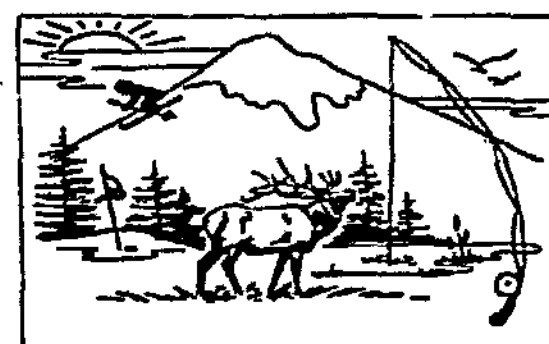

Local runners enjoyed competing in recent New York Marathon

Running in the New York Marathon November 1 was quite an experience for three local runners. Dr. Paul Whitwam, Dr. Savero Sava and Bob Clarke all competed in the 26-mile, 385-yard race. About 22,500 runners competed in the event, with more than 21,000 finishing it. The race was run in all five boroughs of New York City. Sava was timed in 3:39 (hours and minutes), Whitwam was timed in 4:10 and Clarke was timed in 4:28.

It was Whitwam's third marathon and the first for Clark and Sava.

Ibrahim Hussein, a Kenyan who has lived in New Mexico recently, won the race.

"It's sort of the granddaddy of all marathons," Whitwam said about the New York competition. "It's the largest of all the marathons."

The race began in Staten Island, then went into Brooklyn, Queens,

Manhattan, the Bronx and back into Manhattan again for the finish.

The runners went across five bridges during the race and the race was run in front of hundreds of thousands of people (the main estimate had as many as two million people watching the race).

The three local runners were especially impressed with the crowds.

"There was a tremendous outpouring of support by the people in New York City," said Clarke. "Their spirit really buoyed you up."

"There was a lot of enthusiasm among the people running and the people watching," Sava said.

"We found New York people were very pleasant," said Whitwam. "Another thing was that 6,000 or 7,000 of the runners were from other countries."

The three local runners each have different amounts of experience running.

Whitwam has been running competitively for two and one-half years, starting in the summer of 1985.

He has competed in such local events as the Ruidoso Runners'

Classic, the Smokey Bear Run in Capitan (sponsored by Whitwam's Ruidoso Athletic Club), and others.

Clarke, an insurance adjuster, has been running for three years, mostly fun runs around Ruidoso.

Sava, a Mescalero doctor, is a native of New York City so the race was sort of a homecoming for him.

He was a competitive runner for two years in high school.

Now that the big marathon is over, the three runners have other goals on their minds.

Whitwam, Clarke and their wives plan to compete in the Reindeer Run Saturday, December 12, in Roswell.

The race will consist of a 10-kilometer run and a two-mile.

Whitwam and Sava then will compete in the difficult Winter Quadrathlon at Mt. Taylor February 13.

The race is about 50 miles long. That competition will go up and down the mountain and will be in four parts; bicycling, running, cross-country skiing and snowshoe racing.

But a race that will stick out in the three runners' minds will always be the New York Marathon.

Ruidoso Lodge retains historical charm

Ruidoso Lodge: "A new homelike hotel on the scenic Ruidoso amid the tall pines of the White Mountains.

This is the text of an ad dated May 20, 1924, for the Ruidoso Lodge, located in the Upper Canyon.

"The prices have changed," laughs owner Bill Rawlins. "But the panorama remains."

The old lodge, with its cabins hand-built by pioneer Lynn Sylvester Croissant, are gone now, torn down about 10 years ago. Now there are eight new cabins.

Rawlins and his wife, Jackie, claim to be "native New Mexicans," although Jackie was born in Kansas. "She was already on the way by the time her folks moved to Kansas from New Mexico," Bill explains.

Both are graduates of the former State A and M in Las Cruces (now New Mexico State University), Bill

in animal and range science and Jackie in music education. They met and married while still in college, and then moved to Texas, where Bill worked as a scientist on a ranch and Jackie worked for the Texas Department of Human Resources.

They moved to Ruidoso in December 1980. "We do like it here," Jackie states. "But it's hard to be an innkeeper these days. For one thing, our insurance rates have increased three times since we bought the place. We do all our own work, but we have a hard time com-

peting with those time-share condos."

"We're beginning to be old-timers already, so many have left," says Bill.

"You know," says Jackie, "the innkeeper is usually the first person a tourist makes contact with. They count on us to steer them to places to eat, places to see. 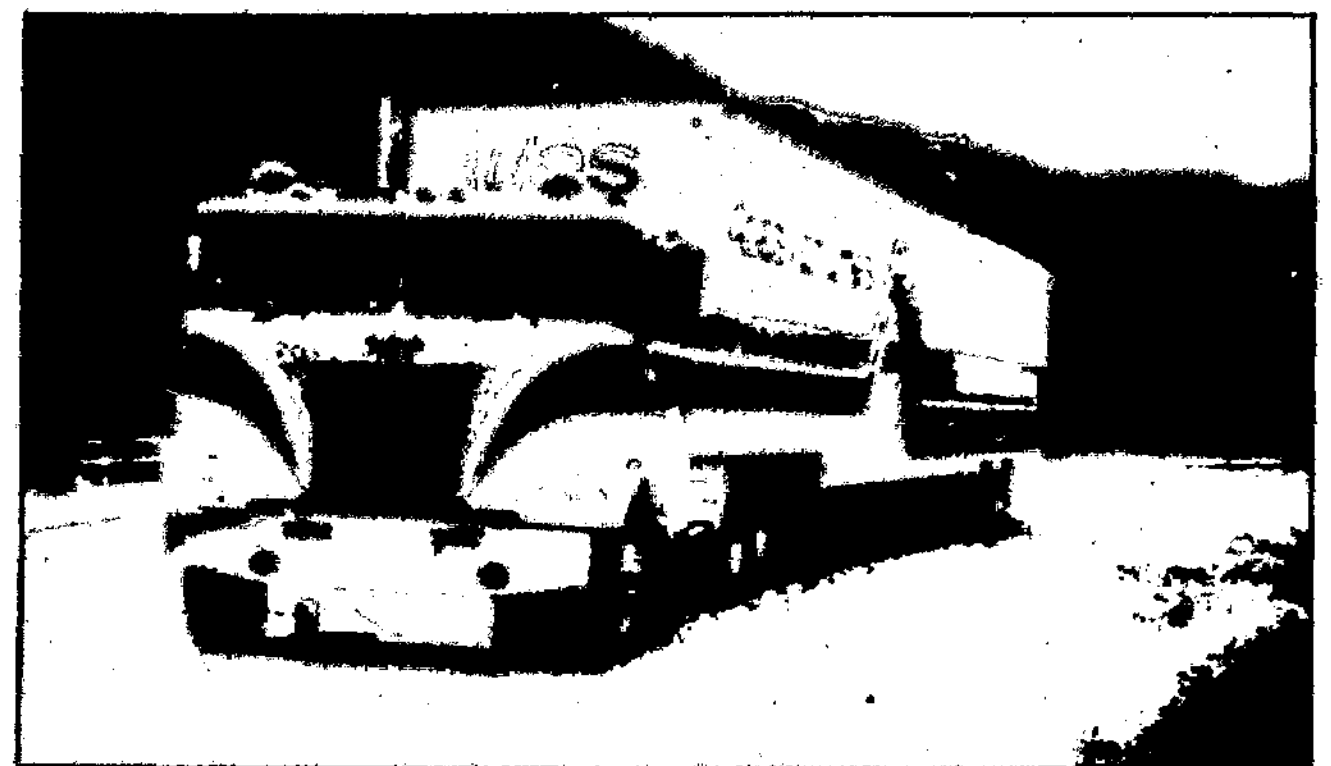

According to Radziewicz, her group will be representing Ruidoso at 10 trade shows, not at two as were discussed at the meeting.

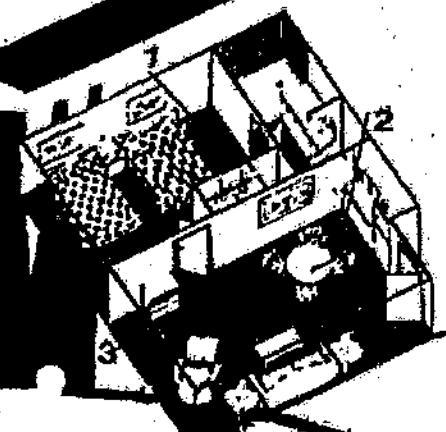

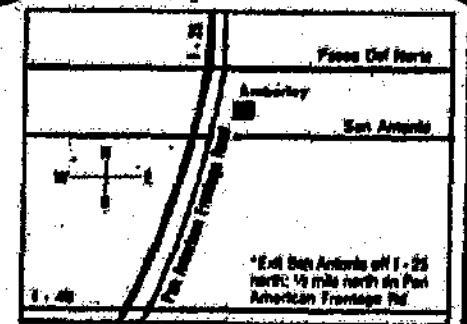

September up, October down in building permits

A small decrease in village building for October, following a substantial increase in September, seems to indicate a stabilizing trend in local construction.

The Village of Ruidoso issued 27 building permits, totaling \$544,435, for all categories in October, down slightly from September's 31 permits worth \$728,021. But September's total reflected a hefty increase over August's 22 permits with a valuation of \$340,993.

October's total trails October 1986, when 44 permits worth \$1,234,506, were issued; but new construction starts in September have a slightly higher value than the 42 permits listed for September 1986, valued at just \$706,304.

Year-to-date totals are lagging behind 1986 end-of-October figures by \$4,831,789. In 1986 the village had issued 310 permits valued at \$11,036,102 by the end of October, while this year those figures are at 245 permits worth \$6,204,313.

This year permits were issued in October for six new single family residences, valued at \$395,165, down from September's nine new home starts with a value of \$580,933. In August permits were issued for just two new residences, valued at \$169,844. In October 1986, the village saw seven single family residence starts totaling \$735,818; and in September 1986, five such permits were issued for new homes valued at \$410,831.

Residential addition and alteration permits continue to outstrip new home starts by three to one, with 18 such permits, valued at \$127,032, issued in October; and 19 residential fix-up permits with a value of \$106,288 issued in September. Remodeling permits were at 17 totaling \$152,934 in August. The trend to redo continues from last year when, in October 1986, 29 residential fix-up permits valued at \$225,017 were issued. September of 1986 saw 29 residential addition/alteration permits issued for \$252,431.

This year the village has issued 155 residential remodeling permits valued at \$1,145,860.

New commercial building is at a standstill in the village with no permits issued in that category over the past three months. Just two new commercial building permits have been issued in 1987, with a total value of \$468,028. In 1986 the village had issued nine new commercial

permits, valued at \$1,452,440, by the end of October, but no such permits were issued in either September or October, 1986.

Commercial redo permits numbered three at \$22,219 for October, bringing the year-to-date in that category to 30 permits worth \$291,670. In September three commercial remodeling permits, valued at \$40,800, were issued. Commercial addition/alteration permits numbered five at \$189,567 in October 1986, and six at \$33,192 in September 1986.

No permits were issued in any other categories in either September or October. Last year the village saw one new condominium project, valued at \$82,104, started in October; and five new apartment/condo projects, worth \$2,487,252, started in September.

Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE—Aspiring Democrats are beginning to line up again to vie for the challenge of facing U. S. Rep. Manuel Lujan in the Congressional District I race.

At least three Democrats are talking seriously about the race. Last year's sacrificial lamb Manny Garcia has not regained sufficient good sense to keep him out of the race. Garcia has reportedly said he will keep running until he makes it.

That sort of campaign strategy is not one which tends to attract large sums of campaign funds or campaign workers. He must have found the secret to growing the proverbial money tree.

In 1986 Garcia garnered 29 percent of the vote, which is only a percent or two over what the political pros will tell you a Democrat can expect to poll even if he hides in a closet the entire campaign.

The only way Garcia can expect to win the primary again next year is if the other two candidates, both University of New Mexico faculty members, draw from exactly the same constituencies and knock each other off.

Professor Alan Reed is the only announced candidate so far. He teaches in the Public Administration Department at UNM.

Reed is distributing an impressive two pages of accomplishments to potential supporters. The list includes a term on the Albuquerque City Council in the mid 1970s. He did not seek reelection.

He has also been quite active in leading several legislative initiatives for education, arts and election law reform.

Like most university types, Reed is heavy into consultant and business enterprises. One pretentious-sounding business name caught my eye—he is president of Space Research Associates. I was about to decide this sounded like the short-lived take-off on James Bond movies, in which the hero was not only a secret agent but also an astronaut and a brain surgeon. Then I learned it has something to do with providing education and communications services to the research industry.

Reed has served some time in our nation's capital. He was employed by the Library of Congress in the Congressional Research Service. As such, he wrote speeches and performed special studies for members of the House and Senate.

He already has a campaign office and one of those impressive telephone numbers that end in 1988. But

it doesn't appear his early entry into the race is going to scare out anyone else.

So far unannounced, but working the hardest of any candidate, to date, is Professor Steven Kramer. He teaches contemporary European history and some Latin American history at UNM.

Kramer jumped into the 1986 Demo primary race at the last minute and lost by 700 votes to Garcia. Reed had talked about getting into that race but decided against it in favor of pointing toward 1988.

Kramer is taking a very studied approach to this campaign. He spent several months working in Washington, D.C. last year learning the ropes and making many contacts. His campaign slogan is, "Steven Kramer listens to New Mexicans; Washington listens to Steven Kramer."

It sounds as though we have two pretentious professors on our hands. But then, aren't they all?

As a result of his experiences as a candidate last year, Kramer is doing a lot of things right this time around. He has lined up an impressive staff, including a full-time campaign manager, and can claim the support of some major elected officials.

He is busy raising some early money from the Washington contacts he has made and he has commissioned a baseline poll, to be done later this month, by a recognized Washington, D.C. pollster.

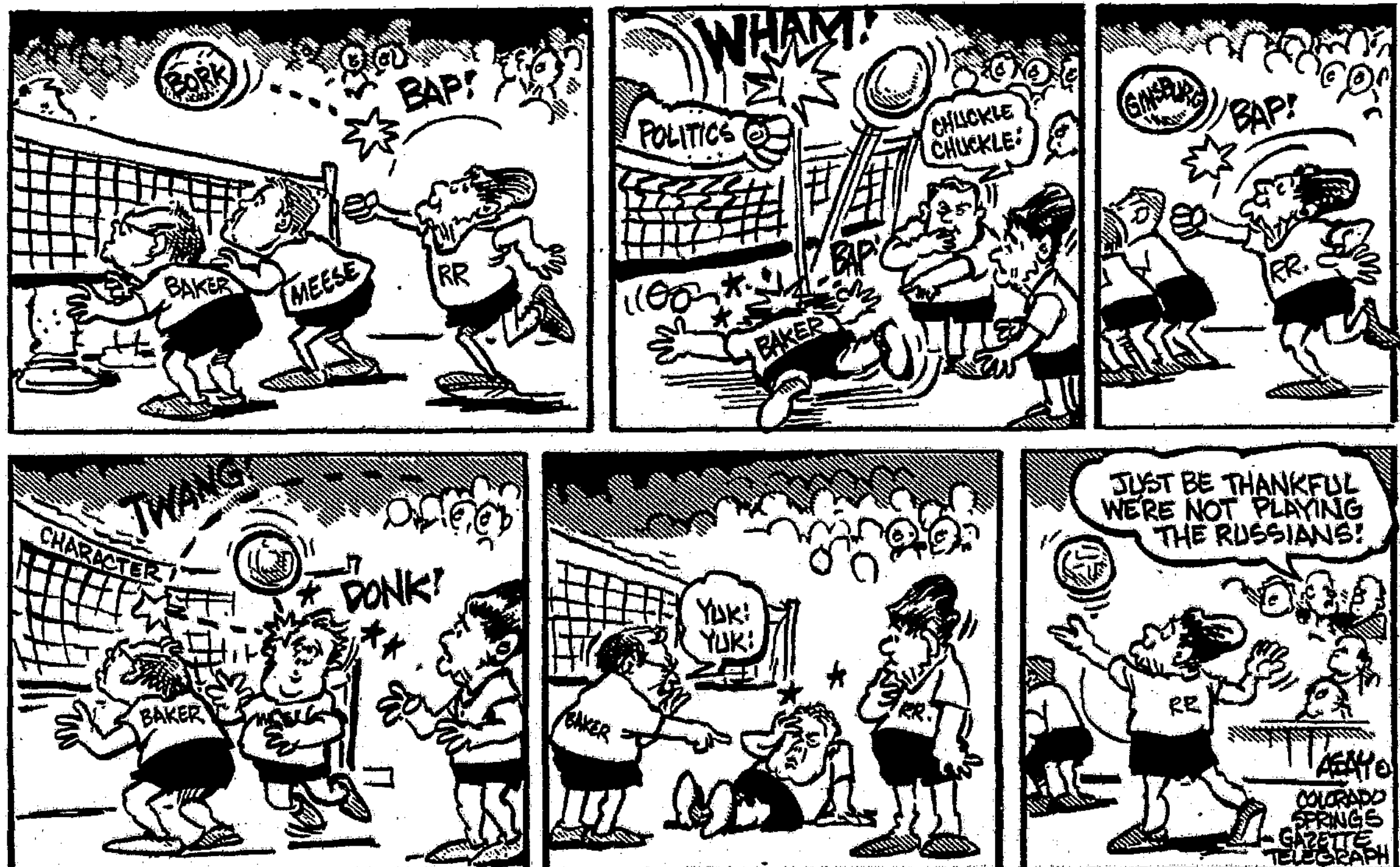
These are the type of things a serious candidate must do in order to attract the attention of the major political action committees—those with the big dough—and the Democratic Congressional Campaign Committee.

During his short campaign last year, Kramer put together an array of long-time party faithfuls. He says he can keep them in the fold this year despite the entry of Reed, who has long worked side by side with many of these people over the years.

Kramer is a good tactician and organizer. He has organized his petition signature gathering, for instance, on a precinct-by-precinct basis so that he has a ready-made list of contacts and possible campaign supporters already broken down by precinct.

Kramer is proving he knows how to put a good campaign organization together. Now, he needs to show that he can go out and excite some people as a candidate. It takes both.

We've seen the professor put together a textbook campaign. Now, we'll see if he can carry it out.

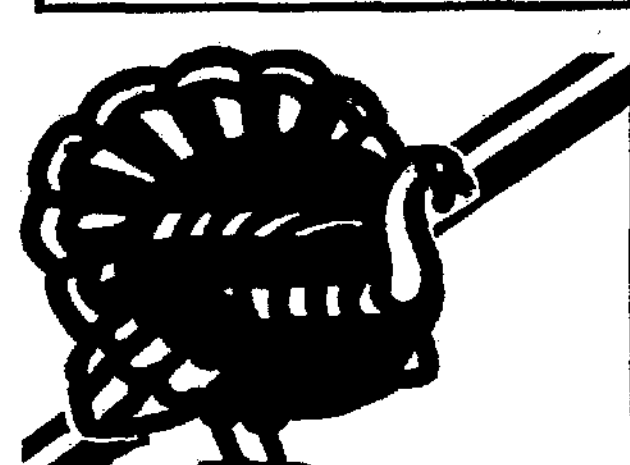


