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Council grants cable 15-year franchise

After heated debates in two previous meetings, the Ruidoso Village Council Tuesday easily passed an ordinance extending the Lincoln Cablevision franchise to 15 years.

Mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr. warned that he would cast a nay vote if the four councillors present split the vote, but the motion to amend the ordinance with its 13 amendments passed unanimously.

Before the measure was passed, Mayor Davis restated his adamant opposition to extending any franchise.

Davis told Paul Lincoln Cablevision that he did not say, as he claimed he was quoted as saying in a previous meeting, that he didn't like Crown.

"I said I didn't like the programming," said Davis.

The mayor was critical of a customer poll that Crown conducted, and said he received many calls from cable customers wanting input into programming changes.

"You have really stirred up a hornet's nest," said Councillor Jerry Shaw. She said she, too, had received many calls from dissatisfied cable viewers.

Crown said he plans to conduct a customer survey in October.

Also Tuesday the council gave the go-ahead for the Sober Ride program to use a village-owned vehicle.

Laura Ashley of the Sober Ride

group told the council that her committee is ready to provide free rides to anyone calling the Topsy Taxi line during its limited hours of operation. She said the line, telephone and some funding already have been donated.

The council, upon the advice of village attorney John Underwood, stipulated that additional insurance be obtained for the 1978 Mercury the program will use.

Ashley said the line will be open from 9 p.m. until 3 a.m. weekdays and holidays since those are "the most prevalent hours for people driving while intoxicated."

"I think it's a marvelous concept," said Davis. He said he would not be adverse to the village paying for the added vehicle insurance.

Davis said such a program is particularly needed in a tourist town, and thanked Ashley and her committee for their efforts.

In other regular business the council:

Approved a dispensers license for Robert R. Woodward, to be used as 1202 Mechem Drive, Ruidoso Bowling Center.

Heard Sierra Blanca Airport Commission member Tim Morris report that the airport project is on schedule.

Directed the attorney to review the security alarm and the one-call ordinances.

Postponed discussions on combining the Parks and Recreation Commission and the Adult Recreation Advisory Board.

Voted to revise the lodgers' tax

ordinance to match the state statute on occupancy tax.

Awarded the bid on repairing the D8 Caterpillar to the only bidder, Industrial Parts Depot, at \$13,500. Village manager Jim Hine said funds allocated for a new truck could be transferred to pay the repairs.

Awarded the bid on aluminum benches and bleachers at the Eagle Creek Sports Complex to low bidder Rio Grande Park Association, at \$6,927. Purchasing agent Terri Deason said two bids were received.

Approved an underwriting agreement with Rilee and Associates.

Heard Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce executive director John Jeffers wish the council a happy new year.

Heard Al Junge talk about the recent tax election and predict that future tax increases will be harder to pass.


Heard Village Councillor Ray Dean Carpenter thank the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce, and particularly Don Shaw, for helping get the .50 tax increase passed.

Received an invitation from Underwood to join him and millions of people who will pray for world peace at 5 a.m. Wednesday.

Exchanged new year's wishes.

Went into executive session to discuss contracts and threatened litigation.

Councillors Victor Alonso and Rick Davis were absent from Tuesday's meeting.

Center Street

Officials pass the buck as businesses suffer

Work that is disrupting traffic and business at the intersection of Sudderth Drive and Center Street should already be finished, according to Lou Medrano, State Highway Department District II Engineer.

"It could have been done quite a long time ago," said Medrano Tuesday.

Both Medrano and village engineer Mike Davalos, in separate telephone conversations, recalled events that have happened since the state authorized funds in September 1985 to construct a drainage system on Center Street.

Medrano said the initial concept was for the Village of Ruidoso and the State Highway Department to cooperate on the installation of two traffic signals and the repair of Center Street. But when funds became available for the state to pay 100 percent of the cost to design and install the signal at the "Y," that portion of the proposed project was removed from the co-op plans.

He said the village has known for at least six months of its part in the co-op project.

"We didn't know where we stood with the entire project," said Davalos, recalling a chain of events clouded by uncertainty of which parts of the project were to be designed, engineered and constructed by the village and which by the state.

"There was a year lost trying to figure out who was going to do what," noted Davalos.

Finally, the village did award a contract on the traffic light on Sudderth Drive by the skating rink and

the Highway Department began installing the signal at the "Y," said Davalos. He said the Center Street drainage repair didn't seem appropriate to include in the traffic light contract, so it was lumped in with a bridge project funded

through direct appropriations.

Davalos said the bridges and Center Street were designed and ready to go to bid by September 1, but the entire project became embroiled in disagreements over two Upper Canyon crossings scheduled

for replacement.

"The fatal mistake was tying it (Center Street) to the bigger project," said Medrano. He said the

street repair had nothing to do with the bridge replacements.

Medrano said Ruidoso's \$72,000 for the Center Street project was just one of 14 co-op agreements signed in late 1985. He said those agreements with various municipalities were from \$9,500 to \$150,000.

"The only ones unfinished at this time are Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs," said Medrano, adding that the rest of those co-op projects have been completed for some time.

Davalos said the contractor was given a notice to proceed on December 1, and estimated the entire Center Street job should have taken no more than 10 days had it not been for weather problems.

When Midtown merchants complained of disrupting holiday traffic during the busiest shopping season of the year, the village was able to extend the December 31 project deadline for 30 days.

Davalos said the contractor then

agreed to complete work on each side of Sudderth Drive before crossing that busy intersection and congesting the Midtown area. He said plans are being made to open one lane of traffic on Center Street today (Wednesday) and work will begin Monday, January 5, on the Sudderth and Center intersection.

Meanwhile, several Midtown merchants report the messy road project is hurting business.

"I would like to see the Village Council resign or see that this would never happen again at such an important time to merchants," said Budgie Green, owner of The Wild Snail. Green's business is on the corner where work is under way, and said his customers have been unable to use his parking lot since the construction began.

Green estimates the inconvenience has probably caused his business to decline by as much as 25 percent.

He said Midtown pedestrians must walk through mud to cross the street, and are likely to get splash-

ed with mud from passing motorists. He said the mud then is tracked into his and other shops.

"It's sloppy and nasty," said Bob Arnett of The Hock Shop which is located on another corner adjacent to the work. He said his customers are "hollering about the mud."

Arnett said he and other Midtown merchants have had a lot of foot traffic in spite of the road work.

Barbara Kizer of Sierra Cleaners, located on Center Street, said her business has definitely fallen off while the street has been closed. Her customers must park on Sudderth and walk around the corner to reach the cleaners.

Kizer, who is looking forward to the improvement in Center Street once the project is complete, wishes the work could progress a little faster.

"I know it takes time," noted Kizer. She said having just one Center Street lane open will help.

"I think the Village Council should be much more responsive to Midtown merchants," said Green.

Embezzling suspect to face Feb. trial

A trial date of February 16 has been set for Raymond Reeves, accused of embezzling \$13,700 from a fund established at Ruidoso State Bank to benefit injured jockey Steve Harris, according to records in the District Attorney's Carrizozo office.

Reeves, indicted by the grand jury, will be tried in Judge Sandra Gresham's court, said Margo Lindsey, District Court clerk.

The 51-year-old Reeves has remained free on \$25,000 bond since he was arrested by Ruidoso Police September 22. Magistrate Judge J.R. "Jim" Wheeler conducted a first appearance hearing September 23.

Wheeler said Reeves, represented by public defender Gary Mitchell, faces two third-degree felony charges, with possible penalties of three years in jail and a \$5,000 fine and one fourth-degree felony charge with a possible penalty of 18 months in jail and a \$5,000 fine.

Ruidoso Police gathered information on funds missing from the Steve Harris Trust Fund after Harris' attorney, Charles Hawthorne, filed a complaint on his client's behalf September 19.

Police reported that detective Lanny Maddox "was advised by

Ruidoso State Bank Executive Vice President Preston Isaacs that \$13,700 was withdrawn from account #8056080, a trust fund in the name of Steve Harris, without Steve Harris' knowledge."

Withdrawals were reported on July 22, August 7 and August 14.

The affidavit for arrest stated that Reeves made the withdrawals "without written or verbal permission of Steve Harris and did convert this money to his own use with the fraudulent attempt to deprive Steve Harris."

The Steve Harris Trust Fund was established last June after Reeves, then manager of The Barn, and others organized a benefit to help Harris with expenses he's incurred since he was paralyzed in a riding accident.

Hawthorne said bank records indicated the trust fund totaled \$24,181.50 at one time, but had dwindled to about \$10,000 when Harris contacted the bank in September.

He said Reeves and Erik Satie, then an employee of The Barn, were listed as account trustees. Satie moved to Denver, Colorado, on July 5, and when contacted by telephone in September he said he knew nothing of any withdrawals.

Hawthorne said in September that Harris had requested the balance of the account and was asked by the bank to sign an indemnity agreement before the funds were released.

Neither Hawthorne nor Harris were available for comment Tuesday.

Fireplace fire damages home

A fire Tuesday evening at the Jim Olson residence, 120 Tomahawk Drive, was caused by a faulty fireplace, according to a Fire Department report.

Fire Chief Virgil Reynolds said the alarm was sounded about 8 p.m. and 10 firefighters responded, quen-

ching the fire in a matter of minutes. He said the crews remained on the scene for about 20 minutes.

Reynolds said the fire was contained in the fireplace area. He estimated damage at about \$2,000.

Commission awards airport bid to Tricon Kent .. again

The Sierra Blanca Airport Commission (SBAC), in a special meeting Tuesday, talked of bids, finances, water, weather and employment opportunities.

Early in December the commission awarded the contract to low bidder Tricon Kent, in spite of a miscalculation that increased the \$2,354,064.50 total by \$124,737.43. The motion to award the bid stipulated that Tricon Kent pay the expenses of three SBAC employees who worked for several days to substantiate the contractor's claims.

But Tuesday, Chairman Ken Nosker asked for a new motion to

award the bid after hearing that District Judge Sandra Grisham had upheld the commission's right to modify the bid. And so the successful bidder, Tricon Kent, was again the successful bidder on Phase I, PAC I of the multi-million project.

"We let the bid contingent on the court's decision," said Nosker.

Also Tuesday the commission heard that Tricon Kent has indicated no new employees will be hired to complete the contract.

Carlos Beltran, area director for Otero and Lincoln counties Employment Security Department, said his office is receiving 10 to 15 calls a week inquiring about jobs on the airport project. He said he contacted Tricon Kent and was told

that the company now has crews on the Mesalero Apache Indian Reservation and on a job in Carrizozo. Beltran said he was told those crews will make up the airport work force.

Nosker said he had received complaints from people who called the Employment Security Department in Alamogordo only to be told they were not taking applications for work on the airport.

He said the airport commission has stressed all along a commitment to encourage employment opportunities for area residents.

Beltran said his office takes applications on a daily basis, but has not been contacted by Tricon Kent. "We'll be glad to work with them," said Beltran. He said Lin-

coln County unemployment is at 7.8 percent, indicating that more than 500 people are out of work. Beltran said most of that number is in Ruidoso and the Hondo Valley.

"We want to put all these people to work," said Beltran. He said his office has taken the names of people interested in applying for work on the airport project.

A representative from Tricon Kent could not be reached for comment.

In other business Tuesday the commission:

—Awarded the pump equipment bid to low bidder, Smith Machinery Co. of Roswell, at \$21,773.99. Four bids were received on the equipment estimated at \$28,000 by the engineers.

—Heard the attorney report that a water hearing is scheduled for Thursday, January 8, but the site has not been named.

—Heard contract administrator Fred Heckman report on funding and construction schedules. Heckman revealed that airport engineers, Leadhill-Herkenhoff, have been paid to date \$399,356.02 of a \$800,000 basic contract and \$206,986.55 of a \$400,000 special services contract.

—Voted to support efforts by the state aviation director to obtain funding for a state-wide Automatic Weather Observation System. Heckman said the state has just one manned weather station.

—Authorized the payment of the following bills:

—Met Sheldon Turner, a resident of Alto and Dallas, Texas, who offered to do all he can to help the commission obtain commercial airline service. Heckman said Turner already had aided the SBAC with contacts in Dallas.

With the frigid weather of January upon us, what could be nicer than a tasty cup of warming brew? I always stir up a batch of each of these beverage mixes during the harsh winter months. Whenever someone drops in, I have them ready to serve. It's a small but friendly and hospitable gesture that visitors to your home will recall with fond memories. Members of your family will also enjoy these special warming drinks on frosty winter days.

Country Gourmet Special Tea

1½ cups Tang
1 cup instant tea
1½ cups sugar
1 tsp. nutmeg
1 tsp. cinnamon
½ tsp. cloves
2 peppermint sticks (crushed)
2 Tbsp. lemon drops (crushed) or 3 scoops of lemonade mix

Mix all ingredients together and store in an attractive glass jar. Stir well before using. To serve, mix with hot water, to taste.

Country Gourmet Mocha Mix

2 cups sweet cocoa mix (Nestle's, Hersheys, etc.)
1 cup powdered coffee creamer
½ cup instant coffee crystals
1 tsp. cinnamon

Stir all ingredients until well blended. Store in a pretty glass jar. To serve, combine two to four Tbsp. mix per cup of boiling water.

Capitan awards bid on water system

Capitan Village Board of Trustees awarded the bid for the municipal groundwater supply system to JJ's Companies, Incorporated, at a special meeting Monday.

Six bids were received for the water system construction, ranging in price from the low bid of \$498,382.92 from JJ's Companies, Incorporated of Ruidoso, to the high bid of \$1,100,760.79 from Bill Stuckman Construction, Incorporated.

Engineer Jack Atkins advised trustees that JJ's Companies met all bid requirements and licensing obligations. Atkins recommended the trustees accept the low bid from JJ's, with the stipulation all bids and bid bonds will be retained until the low bidder has fulfilled all insurance and bonding requirements prior to job construction.

The contract has a 180-day construction time with a weather clause. A requirement for the quality of materials to be used was also in the bid. The 180-day construction time will begin 15 days after the contract is let.

Mayor Benny Coker introduced

Fred Heckman, acting on behalf of the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport. Heckman presented a new joint powers agreement to the trustees for approval.

The original joint powers agreement was drawn up 10 years ago. According to Heckman, the original agreement had several flaws in it and it was "lacking in restraint." The original document was "good at that time, to begin plans for the airport. Now that things are happening we need this new agreement."

Village attorney John Underwood assured trustees he had assisted in the preparation of the new joint powers agreement and he recommended it be accepted.

When questioned about financial obligations Heckman stated, "our (Sierra Blanca Airport Commission) intention, from the beginning, was for this airport to be built with funds outside of this community. It is our commitment to make this airport self-supporting through every phase of building and operation."

In other business, Coker and trustees Kelly Beavers, Norm Reno, David Rouleau, and Dave Strickland:

—Welcomed new village billing clerk, Debra Cummins.

—Ordered a public hearing, January 12, on three proposed ordinances. One ordinance concerns the village water ordinance. The proposed ordinance provides that the owners of the property will be responsible for water used. If a renter is living on the property and does not pay the water bill, fines or delinquent charges, the owner of the property is responsible for payment. A permanent mailing address for the property owner must be on file with the village clerk. Owner must notify the village clerk, in writing, of any change of address and must notify the village clerk of permanent mailing address if that information is not on file at the time this article is adopted by the village. A complete ordinance is posted at the Capitan Village Hall.

The second ordinance is for a curfew to be imposed on minors under the age of 18 years old. The curfew would be in effect between the hours of 10 p.m. to 5 a.m. Sunday through Thursday and from midnight to 5 a.m. on Friday and Saturday.

The final ordinance will be amendments to the Cablevision franchise.



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Outstanding citizens accomplish much in 1986

Swenor makes the extra effort

Don't tell Ruidoso Police Chief Richard S. Swenor he "can't" do something. For Swenor learned the rewards of perseverance and hard work the hard way.

The Detroit, Michigan, native was one of nine youngsters in his neighborhood stricken with polio in the late 1940s, and one of just two of the nine who survived.

But Swenor doesn't dwell on those two years in a hospital and the additional time he spent quarantined at home. Rather he recalls the therapy and hard work that followed.

"From that point on people couldn't tell me you can't do it," noted Swenor seriously.

In fact, he overcame the effects of polio so completely that he was surprised when he had trouble joining the service after graduating from high school. He was determined to prove he was physically able to serve, and that's just what he did. The chief joined the Ruidoso Police Department

in 1979, but his law enforcement career has spanned 28 years. While in the United States Air Force (USAF) he served in the Military Police before graduating from the Office of Special Investigation (OSI) Academy in Washington D.C.

Assigned to OSI, Swenor was stationed in California, Nevada, Minnesota, Mississippi, France and Italy.

Those years were filled with a variety of experiences and adventures. Swenor laughingly recalled his part in stopping a highjacking attempt in Italy. Intelligence forces, posing as an ambassador and his staff, successfully thwarted the terrorists in that incident.

But Swenor laughs remembering how a terrorist deplaning tossed a cigar box thought to contain a bomb to an OSI member, who immediately passed the suspect package to Swenor.

"I ran as far from the plane as I could and then threw that box as hard as I could into a field," said Swenor. He said everybody hit the dirt and braced for an explosion—one that didn't happen.

"It was really a box of cigars," said Swenor.

Just before his retirement, Swenor was transferred to New Mexico and has made Ruidoso his home. "I moved around and lived out of a suitcase for years," said Swenor, who has never regretted his decision to settle in this mountain village.

Within two years after joining the local police force, Swenor had the opportunity to apply for his present post and became chief of police.

Swenor has led the department through its biggest growth period, with the staff growing from 14 or 15 officers in 1981 to its present 33 members.

"The community's growth caused us to grow—we just grew along with it," explained Swenor. He said the current department facility was built during his time as chief.

"We've probably got one of the finest small police departments in the Southwest," noted Chief Swenor. He has addressed the continuing problems of turnover, training and officer stress.

Recent changes in municipal pay plans have apparently alleviated the turnover problem, for Swenor said he hasn't had an officer resign since the

new pay plan went into effect. With fewer resources having to be committed to new officer training, Swenor said he'll now be able to concentrate on programs for supervisors and continuing education for patrol officers.

"In this day and age managing your personnel is the biggest problem," said Swenor. He said the department is lucky to have two internationally certified chaplains working with its personnel.

"It's very unusual for a department this size to have two certified chaplains," said Swenor, who is sold on that program. He said the chaplains are used both for internal and external problems.

"It really works," he noted.

Swenor is philosophical about the role of the police in an ever-changing and complex society.

"Sometimes we get to thinking that all the ills of society get dumped on our heads," said Swenor, adding that the police are often the first called because they are available 24 hours a day seven days a week every week of the year.

"A police officer is the only government employee that is given the responsibility of deadly force," said Swenor. "You hope like hell you never have to use it," he added.

To officers facing danger in the line of duty everyday the chief preaches "Swenor's Law: nobody can hurt you if you can see their hands."

But his law didn't hold true when Swenor was shot several years ago.

"The guy shot me through his jacket—and he was smiling," said Swenor. Over the years Swenor has been stabbed several times while stopping fights.

"And I got my hair parted," said Swenor. He said a man shot his hat off and the bullet barely missed his head.

Swenor is grateful he has never been in a position where he has had to kill anyone.

A self-confessed "work-a-holic," Swenor spends an average of 60 hours a week on the job. While he enjoys hiking and reading, much of his spare time is spent in police-related activities.

Swenor is past president of New Mexico Police Chiefs' Association and while president he was a representative to the national chiefs' organization. He has served as a director of New Mexico Municipal League, a member of the Governor's "blue ribbon" Crossroads Commission on prisons, a consultant for the New Mexico Law Enforcement Academy and commissioner on the New Mexico

Traffic Safety Commission. He holds the state's highest level police chief certification, and is nationally accredited through the National Commission on Professional Law Enforcement Standards.

Swenor was awarded the 1985 New Mexico Legislature's Award for outstanding achievement and exceptional accomplishment in law enforcement and corrections related legislative activity.

The chief, whose undergraduate degree is in political science, also has studied criminology at George Washington University. He wrote his master's thesis on demographics, an area he is particularly interested in.

"I tend to be very community-oriented," said Swenor. Besides the chaplains' program, he has helped start Neighborhood Watch, Police Athletics League and Ruidoso Crime Stoppers.

He trains his officers to be community-minded, and expects them to take time to communicate with members of the public—even in times of stress.

Swenor is enthusiastic about an evaluation system called the assessment center concept, and travels throughout the United States to participate on assessment teams in evaluating candidates for various jobs or promotions.

"It's an opportunity for personal growth," said Swenor, explaining that the evaluation process "points out your own weaknesses and keeps you on your toes."

Swenor is active in Rotary International and is a big booster of the international exchange student program.

"Having worked all over the world I can definitely see the value of it," said Swenor. He fears that Americans have many misconceptions about foreign countries, and feels the exchange program helps to enlighten citizens.

He is naturally supportive of an international Rotary program to combat polio, for the disease is on the rise in Third World nations.

Chief Swenor is married to Bonnie Swenor, and the father of two sons and a daughter. The older two, Shawn and Michele, live and work in Florida, and the youngest, Mashon, is an eighth grader at Ruidoso Middle School.

And Swenor's next big project? He said with a great many day-to-day problems of the Police Department under control, he hopes to have time to sit back and do some long-range planning.

Radziewicz achieves her goals

By her own admission, Nancy Radziewicz is a controversial personality. She is intense, energetic, enthusiastic and determined to the point of sometimes being abrupt—but one thing is sure, if there is a job to be done, this lady can be counted on to plan it, organize it and see it completed.

She was interviewed because of her involvement with the Aspen Festival. For the last two years, she has chaired the committee in charge of the event. Familiar with the "public" person, this reporter wanted a sense of the more private person. All questions asked were answered openly, without hesitation.

Q—You seem to be actively involved in various community projects. What organizations are you associated with?

A—Service Club Council, Altrusa, Beta Sigma Phi, The Chamber Board, The Chamber Greeters, Lodger's Association ... I also worked the Motorcy-



cle Festival, and two years in a row was chairperson for the Aspenfest. I've also been actively involved with the schools, ever since we moved here. Right now we're trying to raise money for a week-long field trip for the Marine Biology class.

Q—Where did you come from and how long have you been in Ruidoso?

A—We moved here from New Jersey in June of 1978. Michael (her husband, Michael Radziewicz) and I wanted a different way of life. We bought the motel (West Winds Lodge) with no previous experience. I remember my son Gregory was six and Nicole was still a nursing baby ... that didn't last long. We had no idea of the time and energy that is involved in running a motel.

Q—What did you do in New Jersey?

A—I taught school, Health and P.E. When we moved here, there was no P.E. being taught at Nob Hill, so as a volunteer, I planned and taught a P.E. program for two and a half years. Of course, I didn't get paid, but it was lots of fun. I met a lot of good people, some long-lasting relationships.

Q—What to you constitutes a friend?

A—Sincerity and trustworthiness. There are very few real friends.

Q—Who, in Ruidoso, are you closest to, and why?

A—Barbara Downs—she's a real special lady. She would put herself second if you were in trouble. She's always been there for me.

Q—Are you a member of a local church?

A—No, I feel you can be a Christian without going to church every Sunday to prove this.

Q—Why are you so involved in community activities?

A—I enjoy serving. I came from a family that serves. You gain far more out of life when you give. My mother was actively involved with the handicapped. Father was extremely active with the Lions Club. If you live in a community, you need to be in it. Work to constructively change it rather than sit around and complain.

Q—As a child, what did you want to be when you grew up?

A—A nurse, probably from the background, with the idea of giving and helping that I grew up with.

Q—Of all the activities you been involved with, which one is your favorite?

Q—Since you are from the East Coast, do you find that people here have had problems adjusting to

your personality?

A—My persistence, drive and determination get me in trouble all the time. They misunderstand. Maybe it's part of being a Scorpio. I'm sorry, that's me. I can't change—I have had to alter some things. My energy needs to be channeled, but, in the long run you can only be happy being yourself.

Q—Is there anything you would change? Would you make the move again?

A—We would have sold the motel sooner. It's too confining. It did us well and we did it justice, and we've met a lot of wonderful people. But, it's very hard on a family and marriage. The customers have to come first. If your children are still breathing and not bleeding to death, they have to wait. Meals are always interrupted. It undermines the family unit. I think it made us strong. All and all, I think it was a healthy move. We've done well financially.

Q—What are you going to do now?

A—We're building a home, and Michael is talking about maybe buying an ice cream store in Las Cruces and commuting. I'm not an ice cream dipper. I want to be more involved. I have the time and flexibility and I want to make a significant contribution.

Many feel Radziewicz, through her time, energy and dedication, has already made many significant contributions.

In the county, Marrs is involved

Inez Marrs is a woman who gets things done. She is involved in the community and in the county. If she agrees to do a job, she does it to the best of her abilities.

She moved to Lincoln County in 1983, with her husband, Bob, who had accepted a job as warden of Camp Sierra Blanca, and their two sons, Robert and Charlie.

Immediately after getting moved and settled, Inez called the county extension office inquiring about extension clubs and 4-H clubs in the area. She joined the Capitan Extension Club that winter.

For the past two years she has served as the Lincoln County Extension Homemakers Chairperson, while at the same time, she has been the Capitan Club's president.

She feels one of her most trying and interesting jobs as the County Chairperson was hosting the District meeting last year.

"It was a challenge to get everything arranged and organized," Marrs stated. "I was responsible, also, for introducing all the guests and speakers during the meeting, in addition to seeing that things ran smoothly backstage."

Plans for the district meeting began a year prior to the meeting. Due to Marrs' leadership and organizational skills, the district meeting was termed a "huge success" from those involved in it and the more than 200 women that attended.

"Extension Homemakers has done more for me than anything else," Marrs reflected. "It was something I got into for myself, everything else was for my kids and family."

She believes another important facet of her life has been involvement in the Family Community Leadership programs. She began in the program in 1982 and has just finished extensive training this year.

"Something people need to be more aware of," Marrs said, "is the leadership program. People need to be more informed on decision making and public policy, especially women."

Her involvement with the Lincoln County Fair Board is a family event. She is the third woman to be voted a directorship on the board.

She feels her involvement was something she really wanted to do for the community and the kids. Her boys showed livestock and she believes that has helped them even today, because of the responsibility and dedication it takes for young people to raise and show animals.

Her boys have always been active in raising livestock, starting in 4-H, then going on to join the Future Farmers of America (FFA).

Both Robert and Charlie were presidents of the Capitan FFA, remaining active participants in the

Capitan Chapter until they graduated from high school.

"When Robert first went to Fairchild (Air Force Base, Washington) he was Airman of the Month and he felt like it was because of the skills he had learned in FFA," Marrs said.

A more recent interest for Marrs has been with the Future Homemakers of America (FHA). Nationally, according to Marrs, they are trying to project a better image for FHA, not just little "Susie Homemaker" any more. This year's national president is a man.

The Capitan FHA will be working on their Star Events this year, a fact that Marrs is very proud of, since most chapters don't achieve this degree.

She accompanied the Capitan Chapter to a National Cluster meeting in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, and was made an honorary member last year.

Lincoln County Home Economist Charolette Hill appreciates Marrs' loyalty.

"She's always very warm and very honest," Hill stated. "If you ask her to do something, she will either do it or discuss a better way of doing it. She's kind of a philanthropist, she doesn't do anything for the glory, but rather for the betterment of the community. She believes in what she's involved in."

Marrs' other activities include being secretary to the Sacred Heart Church Council, membership in the Sacred Heart Guild, a member of the Lincoln County Democratic Women and a Corriente CowBelle. In 1986 she was named Corriente's CowBelle of the Year. Bob was honored as Corriente's Father of the Year in 1986.

"One of my ambitions," said Marrs with a grin, "is to be an Extension Homemaker District or State Officer, I think I can do that."

And she probably will.



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willing to make themselves available for appointment to that body want power as badly as some others in the educational establishment. Isn't it likely, given the fact that they now have a degree of power over the individual school districts, that they will begin to marshal and utilize that power carefully? In short, aren't we about to see that famous "local control" getting itself moved more and more towards Santa Fe, rather than the other way round?

And won't such trends, if they do occur, be encouraged while they are here in the capitol by some of the members of the Legislature, no mat-

ter how much they give the impression while at home that they want to see things done in the opposite fashion?

Whenever the state provides most of the support for an enterprise, no matter what its nature, you can be relatively sure those who control the state will want also to control the enterprise.

Passing that constitutional amendment may have opened an educational Pandora's box that, like the original, will not easily allow itself to be restuffed with the problems that come out of it.

SANTA FE—Someday, the battle over who is to control the schools is going to come to a head. It will be a humdinger, with blood in the streets, when it gets started.

Because of the way education is run in our state, New Mexico could very likely be the place where the first artillery rounds in this particular war are fired; and recent changes, made possible by our voters in what may not have been their most thoughtful hour, probably moved us closer to that happening.

Certain educationalists—that is, school board members and administrators particularly—come all over reverent when they make their high preachments about the principle of "local control." From the way their eyes roll up in their heads when they discuss this topic, one might be led to conclude this was one of the absolute commandments engraven on tablets of stone on Mount Sinai.

Listen closely, however, and what you will discern is that all such folks really want is the right to control the disbursement of those educational funds, not the raising of them, at their local level. They want the state to keep maling the checks, but they want to run the spending of the money.

Watching certain school boards in action could easily lead even the most charitable of observers to conclude that the real reason their members offer themselves for this service is not so much a deep interest in the intellectual life of students as it is the question of who controls the selection of personnel in the district and the awarding of contracts through the purchasing office. To control the best source of jobs and bucks in any community is to have

raw power, and that's something certain kinds of individuals always lust after, even if they have to hide that lust behind flowery language.

But the \$735 million we will spend on public education in New Mexico this year comes out of the general fund of the state of New Mexico. Because, in any average year, it amounts to about as large a share of that general fund expenditure as it does this year, when it is 52 percent of that money, there is always pressure here in Santa Fe to tell the schools state government is going to take a much bigger piece of the say about how those bucks are spent.

Whenever such thoughts are publicly expressed here, that sacred principle of "local control" gets trotted out, accompanied by organ music, and lawmakers and citizens alike are expected to bow down before it.

But when the voters passed Constitutional Amendment Number 7 last November 4, they may have caused a significant change in the relationship between the state and the individual school districts. They created a most peculiar state Board of Education, partly elected and partly appointed, and gave it very sweeping powers.

As long as the governor's office alone had the power of the pursestrings over schools and somebody else had the say over content of education, local boards and administrators who were skillful enough could play those two separate entities off against one another to some degree. Now, however, all that power is in one place.

Let's say, just for a hypothesis, that those who run for election to the state Board of Education and those

Dr. Lahey and Ron did what he called the first set and put a temporary cast on the arm. The doctor requested that we stay at least two more days so he could observe the arm. He also advised us not to plan

to continue our trip to Mexico, another 1,200 miles—but to head back to Mississippi and see our orthopaedic doctor who could continue treatment on the arm.

Don Mason came in to tell us our car had been towed back to the "Inn", that it had been locked and the keys put at the desk. We were also advised the we should go back to the "Inn" where we could stay until Friday so we could see Dr. Lahey again. Since you have no taxis in your town, the police were called to take us back to the Inn.

Due to the bad weather and amount of accidents, they were unable to come. Seeing our dilemma, Donald Mason, called his boss, James Stover and he came at once to drive us to the Inn. We were given the same room we had just checked out of, at a reduced rate, and all of the employees there were very good to us.

We saw Dr. Lahey on Friday—due to the swelling he was unable to put the arm in a permanent cast and we knew we must head home.

Then, we met another Ruidoso "Good Samaritan" in the person of "Toby", who owns the Kirby Vacuum Cleaner Shop. He helped me unload all the Christmas presents we were taking to our daughter and grand children. He provided the boxes (five large ones) the tape and packing and did

a super job.

United Parcel Service is fortunate to have a man like this to be their representative. When I arrived at our home, there was already a note from Andy Griffith, sales manager, at the Inn, to inquire about the trip home, J.C.'s arm and to wish us a Merry Christmas.

I realize this is a long letter, but I do want to thank all of the above mentioned persons who touched our lives during this time, and to tell you, the people of Ruidoso, how lucky you are to have people of this caliber. I am sure there are many more of you and we want to come back again under different circumstances.

Until my retirement, I was a Chamber of Commerce Executive for thirty years, a member of the American Chamber of Commerce Executives Association and many others. You can be sure I will let this organization and others know of the splendid beauty of the "Inn of the Mountain Gods" and the great hospitality extended to us by their employees and the people of Ruidoso.

Multiple stakes winner Copper Bugs retired Friday after an impressive win in the final leg of the Savannah Swinger Series. The son of Bugs Alive In 75 finished third in the All American Futurity as a 2-year-old and returned last summer to gain a berth in the All American Gold Cup. Prior to his Savannah win, Copper Bugs last visited the winner's circle at Canterbury Downs where he won the Canterbury championship.

She did it! After three straight second-place finishes, Chuck Hawthorne's NM Bugs finally visited the Sunland Park winner's circle. The 3-year-old miss bested a group of maidens on Friday in impressive fashion winning by a length.

Last Saturday's Sunland Fall Futurity was supposed to boil down

to a battle between Land Of Enchantment Futurity winner Court Shot, Sunland Thoroughbred Sale Futurity hero Two Edged Sword and Ruidoso Thoroughbred Futurity heroine Draconic Code ... and it did ... Court Shot broke alertly and was near the lead from the outset ... Two Edged Sword (usually a front-runner) was in the middle of the pack ... and Draconic Code was far back and looked to be out of it ... So much for looks - With jockey Danny Sorenson in the irons, Draconic Code launched a devastating run in the stretch to win the \$60,000 dash by three-quarters after passing eight horses down the lane. Court Shot, after giving a 2-length lead in the stretch, faded to third, while Two Edged Sword finished a disappointing eighth.

Mr. Greek, an 8-year-old veteran, won Sunday's El Paso Chamber Of Commerce Handicap in impressive fashion. The Greek Answer stallion was held near the lead throughout the 5-furlong sprint before jockey Carlos Rivas cut the stakes winner loose at the sixteenth-pole. The winning margin was two lengths and the winning time was 59 seconds flat.

The Twin Twifecta will start Friday, Jan. 2 with a carryover. No one successfully selected the Twin Tri's second half last Sunday leaving \$4,837 for Friday's pool.

Mr. Greek takes home \$5,000 in Handicap Sunday at Sunland

Dallas horseman Hugh Moore came up a grand short, but he couldn't fault the grand performance of his horse Mr. Greek in Sunday's El Paso Chamber Of Commerce Handicap at Sunland Park Racetrack.

Mr. Greek rallied in the final furlong to post a two-length winning margin after being backed down to the odds-on favorite of more than 2,800 fans. The victory boosted his lifetime earnings to \$199,414 - just short of Moore's goal for the Pennsylvania-bred sprinter.

"We've been trying to get his earnings over \$200,000," Moore said after the race, adding that he plans

to bring Mr. Greek back to New Mexico this spring to break the two-hundred grand barrier.

Mr. Greek resumed his racing career two weeks ago at Sunland Park after an injury sidelined the 8-year-old veteran for nearly a year. "We ran him in the Speed Handicap at Ak-Sar-Ben in Nebraska last year," Moore said. "The jockey pulled him off stride and he fractured a splint bone." Before that accident, Mr. Greek had won nearly half of his races competing at such prestigious tracks as Churchill Downs in Kentucky, Suffolk Downs in Boston, Oaklawn Park in

Arkansas and Louisiana Downs. Moore trilled Mr. Greek to Arlington, Texas, where he underwent surgery to correct the injury. He returned to training last August under the direction of Marvin Grisham from Weatherford, Texas.

"He came back off the surgery well," Grisham said. "He's been a dream to train. You can almost sit down and have a cup of coffee with him and he'll tell you what to do." Jockey Carlos Rivas had no trouble piloting the son of Greek Answer to a daylight win in Sunday's Chamber Handicap. After racing with the leaders around the

far turn, Mr. Greek ran down Poly's Director in deep stretch and cruised to the wire. The final time for the 5 furlongs was 59 seconds flat. The effort earned \$5,000 for Moore.

Flemish Slipper also closed strongly to nip Poly's Director on the final jump for second-place money of \$1,800. James Hambrick of Canutillo, Texas, owns and trains the homebred Jerim Johnson colt with his wife Ellen. Poly's Director checked in a head behind Flemish Slipper to bank \$1,000 for El Pasoan Sidney Zargas. LaRae Lovell conditions Poly's Director.

Copper Bugs captures Savannah Swinger in Friday feature at Sunland Park

Trainer Steve Curtiss was a bit saddened following Copper Bugs' victory in Friday's Savannah Swinger Series at Sunland Park Racetrack.

"That will probably be his last race before retiring to stud in Nebraska," Curtiss said after accepting the Savannah trophy. "He's been a great horse to train ... I'm kind of sad to see him quit. He's the best horse I've ever had."

"Up Front Runner left there good," Blevins recalled. "I was third and he had me by about half a length." Copper Bugs got into stride a short distance down the lane and began to trim Up Front Runner's lead with each stride.

American Moon Fun, ridden by Lyndell Rutherford, checked in a length behind Chargin Ace for third. Up Front Runner held on to finish fourth under Rick Thedford.

Owner Dwuyne Pfeifle of Dannebrog, Nebraska, collected \$8,000 for Copper Bugs' effort. The gray son of 1975 All American Futurity winner Bugs Alive In 75 will retire to stud at Pfeifle's DJ Racing Stables in Dannebrog, Curtiss said.

Copper Bugs campaigned this fall at Canterbury Downs in Nebraska, where he won the Canterbury Downs Championship. A winner of more than \$140,000 during his three years on the track, Copper Bugs gained national recognition as a 2-year-old, when he finished third in the 1984 All American Futurity at Ruidoso Downs.

Jockey/Trainer Standings

Danny Sorenson edged to the top of the rider standings this weekend at Sunland Park, while Fred Danley and Doyal Roberts continued their battle for leading trainer honors at the Southern New Mexico track.

Sorenson took the weekly riding crown booting home four winners over the weekend, including a stunning effort aboard Fall Thoroughbred Futurity champion

Draconic Code. The three-day's work vaulted the 28-year-old rider four spots to the No. 1 position. Sorenson now has 31 winners for the season.

Defending champion Mike Lidberg (30) slipped to the No. 2 slot, with Salustio Burgos (28) checking in third. Pedro Benitez (27) and Joe Martinez (21) round out the top five riders.

Glen Murphy (14) held on to his sixth ranking, while Darrell Blevins, Glen Lowry and Duane Sterling share 13 wins each. Conspicuously absent from the list was apprentice rider Lewie Germany, who has been among the leading

riders since Sunland's season opened last October. Germany left two weeks ago to try his luck at Santa Anita Park in California.

Earns \$30,000 Draconic Code wins Futurity Saturday

Draconic Code boosted her earnings over the \$100,000 mark with a remarkable come-from-behind victory in Saturday's Fall Thoroughbred Futurity at Sunland Park Racetrack.

Saturday's Fall Thoroughbred Futurity offered a \$60,000 jackpot with Draconic Code racing as the slight second choice behind even-money favorite Court Shot.

Jockey Richard Bickel took Court Shot to the lead through the backstretch of the 6-furlong contest, while Danny Sorenson raced well off the pace aboard Draconic Code.

"I got shut off a couple of times and ran into a lot of trouble through the backstretch," Sorenson recalled after the race. "My agent thought I needed to be within two lengths of the leader at the quarter pole to win. I figured I could get there if I stayed within six lengths."

As the 12-horse field rounded the final turn, Draconic Code appeared to be out of contention as Sorenson found himself trailing the leader by more than 10 lengths.

"I wasn't worried," the 28-year-

old reinsman said. "I know that mare can run and I didn't mind being back that far."

Racing ninth at the head of the stretch, Sorenson was forced to check his mount and maneuvered Draconic Code to the outside while Court Shot held a two-length lead with less than a furlong remaining.

Draconic Code cut loose in the final 100 yards to run down the leader and win by three-quarters of a length. The final time was 1:13.1 seconds.

Trainer Terry Walker, who owns Draconic Code in partnership with Neal Musgrove, earned \$30,000 for the victory. It was the filly's second stakes win this year after accounting for the Ruidoso Thoroughbred Futurity this summer at Ruidoso Downs.

Sonic Shecky closed strongly in the final going to collect runner-up money under Salustio Burgos. The second-place finish earned \$13,000 for Morris Cannan. Court Shot held on for third to earn \$7,000 for El Pasoans Margaret DuPont and Margaret Bloss.
