Fire safety

Simple precautions can prevent a blaze of trouble later on

Don't let a quiet winter evening in front of a warm fire turn into a nightmare with a raging chimney or fireplace fire.

Ruidoso Fire Chief Virgil Reynolds said his department gets its highest number of calls in cold winter months—November, December and January.

Most of those calls are dumpster fires, caused in most cases by dumping hot ashes, but some are fires caused by faulty fireplaces and woodburning stoves. Reynolds wants area residents to beware of the dangers that accompany the comfort of a fireplace or woodstove.

"Ashes are the big deal," said Reynolds. He said people don't always realize how long ashes remain hot and flammable. The Fire Department answered 20 dumpster fire calls in November, December and through the first week in January, and 99% of those fires were caused by people dumping hot ashes in a dumpster, said the fire chief.

Reynolds said ashes should be stored in a metal container until they are "dead out." He said many people don't realize that ashes can be cool on the top and still smoldering in the center for days after the original fire has gone out.

Proper installation and maintenance are the keys to safe fireplaces and woodburning stoves. The Consumer Product Safety Commission urges fireplace users

to exercise care and common sense.

Installation problems listed by the commission include installing a chimney too close to wood framing, installing thermal insulation too close to the chimney or improperly passing the stovepipe or chimney through a ceiling or wall.

Village building inspector Jimmy Neeley recommends following the manufacturer's instructions exactly when installing fire appliances.

Proper maintenance includes regular cleaning to avoid a soot or creosote buildup inside the chimney. When creosote builds up in a chimney it is easily ignited and burns like charcoal.

Reynolds said soot buildup is easily seen by looking up the chimney with a flashlight and a mirror to see past the flue. He recommends regular professional cleaning or "do-it-yourself" cleaning with a special brush on a very long handle.

A major contributor to creosote build-up is burning green wood. A release from High County Agency, Inc. says the easiest way to prevent chimney fires is to stop burning soot-producing materials, such as slow-burning, sap-producing green wood.

When building a fire, Reynolds warns against using lighter fluid. He recommends using good kindling and paper.

Reynolds also warns against overloading a fire with too many logs. A safety brochure from the Ruidoso Lodgers Association recommends using only three logs

at a time.

Other safety recommendations from the lodgers include keeping a fire securely screened, not removing burning logs and, of course, safe disposal of ashes.

A village ordinance provides for up to \$300 in fines for a fire caused by negligence.

"We haven't had that many fireplace fires this winter," said Reynolds.

"I really think the fire prevention program is working," he added. Fire prevention officer Kortney Hall, for the past two years, has presented programs in the kindergarten through third grades during Fire Prevention Week.

Reynolds said youngsters apparently are listening to fire safety rules and taking that information home to their parents. He said Hall also has presented other safety programs in schools and businesses, including a fire extinguisher program for commercial operations.

"We've been lucky that people are paying attention to the programs," said Reynolds. He said Hall will set up fire prevention programs for any group or business.

Reynolds said his department has answered 1,838 calls from 1980-1986, including 277 dumpsters, 208 smoke calls, 176 accidents with injuries, 176 structure fires and 169 grass fires.

Many of those calls could have been avoided, according to the fire chief. He cautions fire appliance users to abide by fire safety rules when enjoying a warm winter fire.

Ticket sparks trucker, officer fight

A routine traffic stop Saturday afternoon resulted in the arrest of an Effingham, Illinois, truckdriver.

Jeffrey E. Gemmell, 30, remains in jail with bond set at \$3,740 after he was arrested Saturday for resisting an officer and speeding, according to Magistrate Court reports.

New Mexico State Police Officer Steve Standridge reported that he clocked Gemmell's International truck traveling 70 miles per hour in

a 55 zone on U.S. Highway 70 near Kountry Kwik. He said the driver was "very upset" about being stopped.

"The subject became very irate and began making vulgar statements toward me," said Standridge. He reported advising the subject that he had the option of appearing in Magistrate Court or mailing in the \$25 fine, but he said Gemmell then refused to sign the citation.

Standridge said he placed Gemmell under arrest and a fight ensued that began in the truck cab and continued in the street. Standridge reported being kicked and hit before he was able to place the subject in handcuffs.

Ruidoso Police were called to the scene to assist.

Gemmell is scheduled to appear today (Monday) before Magistrate Judge J.R. "Jim" Wheeler.



Racetrack financial picture 'best in years'

A series of financial transactions completed in December will give Ruidoso Downs a rosy future, track officials say.

In December, the owners of Ruidoso Downs finalized the sale of their companion track, Sunland Park, near El Paso, to United Tote, Inc. for \$3.5 million. At the same time, a new financial package was secured for Ruidoso Downs, allowing a complete payoff to Fortuna Properties, who held the note on both tracks.

In outlining the recent transactions, Ferd Slocum, president of Ruidoso Downs, said "Ruidoso Downs officials are most enthused about the economic outlook for the track in coming years.

"We are delighted," said Slocum, a rancher from Nogal. "The sale of Sunland Park to United Tote will be beneficial to racing because they are good people who will do great things for New Mexico horse racing.

The new financial position for Ruidoso Downs is the best it has been in years. We are delighted to be able to assure people that the great races we run here are going to continue and that the future of Ruidoso Downs looks very bright."

Ruidoso Downs' new financial backing includes a \$9 million commitment from banks in Ruidoso, El Paso and Las Cruces, officials said. It also allowed final payments on the track's construction project which enlarged the race track's oval from five to seven furlongs.

"With a new airport under construction, a revitalized race track distinguished by being the only track in existence with separate racing surfaces for thoroughbreds and quarter horses, and the sheer beauty of the surrounding area, the future does indeed look rosy and bright for Ruidoso Downs," Slocum concluded.

Blaze at restaurant causes \$25,000 damage

Ruidoso firefighters took just 10 minutes to extinguish an early morning fire at a barbecue restaurant on U.S. Highway 70 across from The Barn.

Kortney Hall of the Ruidoso Fire Department said the alarm was sounded at 1:53 a.m. Thursday on the commercial structure fire. She said 21 firefighters and three units responded to the alarm.

Fire Department personnel remained at the scene for about three hours, said Hall. She said Thursday the owner of the property and the cause of the fire were still unknown. When contacted today (Monday) Fire Department personnel still had not determined the owner of the building or the cause of the fire.

Damage was estimated at about \$25,000 said Hall.

SBAC joins in push for weather system funding

The Sierra Blanca Airport Commission (SBAC) may not be able to do anything about the weather, but members recently joined others working for better weather reporting in the state.

SBAC will ask state legislators to provide funding for the Automated Weather Observation Station (AWOS) system in New Mexico. And members are encouraging other New Mexicans to join in the campaign.

Bob White, director of the Aviation Division for the State Transportation Department, asked the commission to support a bill being proposed to authorize \$2.8 million from severance tax bonds to fund the AWOS system.

"No other activity is affected by

weather to quite the extent as aviation," reads a report that White submitted with his request.

"Weather is a factor in over half of the fatal aircraft accidents and, by federal regulation, a pilot is required to obtain weather reports and forecasts for any flight away from the immediate vicinity of the airport," continues the report.

With federal budget cuts, federally funded manned weather observation stations have been reduced nationwide, and particularly in New Mexico. According to the report, 12 federally funded AWOS sites are planned for New Mexico with another seven sites eligible for federal grant participation.

White's division in 1985 formulated the New Mexico AWOS

System Plan to assess the need for the system, determine what type system would meet the needs and formulate a plan on how those needs can be met.

That plan determined that 48 AWOS stations are needed to adequately serve New Mexico, at a total system cost of \$5.6 million. With federal participation the Aviation Division found that the state's share to have an operational system within three years will be the \$2.8 million being requested.

White said implementation of the AWOS system is "extremely important to the economy of the state, not only because of its value to aviation, but for its broader benefits to commerce in general."

Ruidosoan charged with forging prescriptions

Robert Glenn Vines, 34, arrested Tuesday in Ruidoso, was arraigned before Magistrate Judge Gerald Dean who set his bond at \$25,000.

Vines was charged with 18 counts of obtaining narcotics with a forged prescription, according to Lincoln County deputy sheriff Byron Baker. He said the charges are fourth degree felonies with possible penalties of 18 months in jail and/or a \$10,000 fine.

"It came down from the State

Board of Pharmacy," said Baker. Sheriff's deputy Ray Garner said a local pharmacist apparently became concerned about the kinds of prescriptions the accused was bringing in to be filled. Upon checking with the doctor whose signature was on the prescriptions, the pharmacist "found the instruments to be forged," said Garner.

When the Sheriff's Office entered the investigation, at the request of the State Board of Pharmacy,

Garner said an outstanding Texas warrant naming Vines was picked up through the National Crime Information Center (NCIC), a nationwide computer network.

Baker said the Texas warrant charged Vines with fraud and parole violation. Bond on that charge was set at \$25,000 with no 10 percent, noted Baker.

Vines is free after posting bond, said Baker.

State employment agency keeps office hours here

State Employment Security Department staff members work in Ruidoso the second and last Tuesdays of each month.

Carlos Beltran, area director for Otero and Lincoln counties, wants area residents to know that Employment Security Department services are available from 9 a.m. until 3 p.m. the second and last Tuesdays at the Lincoln County Sub-office in Ruidoso.

Although staff members spend most of their time taking claims for unemployment insurance, Beltran said his office still has contacts in the area to help people searching for employment. Beltran said he also can offer job leads for people willing to relocate.

Beltran said Lincoln County statistics show an unemployment rate of 7.8%, indicating that at least 500 area residents are out of work.

Job seekers may fill out employment applications when the department staff is in Ruidoso or at the Alamogordo office, said Beltran. Employment Security personnel then match up workers with needed job skills with employers seeking employees, said Beltran.



Warrior girl cagers lose to Artesia; will play against Lovington Saturday

A late rally by the Ruidoso High School girl varsity basketball team fell short as the Warriors lost, 48-40, to host Artesia Thursday night. Ruidoso, now 1-7 on the season, trailed, 35-29, at the end of the third quarter.

However, the Warriors fought back to tie the score at 37-37 midway through the final period.

But the Bulldogs then outscored Ruidoso, 11-3, for the victory.

Ruidoso got good scoring from junior Amy Osborne. Osborne scored 19 points and played a fine all-around game.

The game was close most of the way.

Artesia took a 15-12 first-quarter lead, but the Warriors came back to close the gap to 25-24 at halftime.

Ruidoso had a sluggish offense in the third period as Artesia outscored the Warriors, 10-5, for the 35-29 advantage.

But the Warriors came back,

largely on the scoring of Osborne and the fine defensive play and playmaking of Veralyn Platta.

Ruidoso tied the score at 37-37, before the host pulled away for the victory.

Dena Shell scored 13 points and Amy Norton tallied 12 for the Bulldogs. Except for Osborne, no Warrior player scored in double figures.

"We played better than we did Tuesday night (a 61-33 loss to Goddard)," said Warrior head coach Sergio Castanon. "However, we didn't have balanced scoring and we didn't have enough intensity or aggressiveness to score."

Ruidoso's junior varsity took a 40-34 victory over Artesia for the Warriors' second win of the season.

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
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

Artist paints on porcelain


"I can paint on anything that can be fired," said Paul White, "Lamps, vases, dishes, atomizers—any number of useful things that make lovely customized gifts."



CowBelles cancel 1987 ranch tour

Corriente CowBelles agreed to cancel the 1987 Lincoln County Ranch Tour at their meeting Thursday.

A ranch tour committee was formed three months ago to plan the 1987 ranch tour. The committee's main objective was to obtain transportation, to contact area ranchers for programs and to plan the agenda for the ranch tour.

Transportation became an immediate problem for the committee. It was learned transportation used in previous years couldn't be used this year due to the escalating cost of liability insurance. Because of the insurance costs many school bus contractors are not carrying insurance through the summer months.

The committee also was instructed to investigate property liability insurance for the ranches that would be used for the one-day

tour. The cost was much higher than original estimates.

Due to the insurance problems, the committee suggested the 1987 Ranch Tour be cancelled. Members expressed their hope that this would not be the end of what has become "a very successful publicity program for both agriculture and Lincoln County."

The ranch tour has been an annual event, moving around the county. Carrizozo, Corona, Capitan and Hondo have alternately hosted the tour. There are four guests who have been on every ranch tour, planning their vacations to coincide with the tour date which has been the second Saturday in June since its beginning in Carrizozo eight years ago.

Also during the meeting, the 1987 New Mexico State Beef Cook-off rules were explained to members. The cook-off recipes can be made with beef chuck, round, rump, fresh brisket, plate, shank or ground beef. The recipe must contain a

minimum of one pound of beef and not more than five. The recipe must be specific, with no brand names and must state the number of servings and approximate preparation time. All entries will become the property of the New Mexico State CowBelles.

Seven finalists will be chosen to compete at the Beef Cook-off May 23. Recipes are judged, ease of appearance, originality, ease of preparation and practicality. The first place winner will go to the National Beef Cook-off in Idaho in September 1987.

Contestants must be at least 18, with non-professional food status. Entry forms can be picked up at Cummins Store in Capitan, Safeway or Bennett's in Ruidoso.



Editorial

The people of Ruidoso Downs have circulated a petition for an election to increase the size of the Ruidoso Downs Trustees to seven from four members, and the present trustees must honor that wish.

If the petition is valid—meeting the requirements for number of signatures, residency of signers, etc.—the trustees are supposed to call for an election in which Downs voters would decide whether to have a special election to increase the number of trustees. If voters approve it, an election would take place about 120 days later in which seven trustees would be elected.

But the trustees could resist the petition.

Downs residents gathered names for a petition once before. That petition attempted to include the office of the mayor in the "recall" attempt, but the trustees maintained the document was invalid. A judge later ruled that the petition could not include the mayor's office and still be valid. The petitioners decided to push forward with the petition without the mayor's office included.

But the trustees were quick to appeal the judge's ruling, rejecting the patchwork petition, and rightly so. After all, was an increase in the size of the governing body the petitioners' true intent, or was its original intent the only avenue they could take to "recall" Mayor J.C. "Jake" Harris?

Whatever the answer, the intent of the second petition seems clear—to increase the number of trustees.

The people are exercising their right. We believe the Downs Trustees have only one course to take. Call for a special election.—DJP

Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE—Our new governor is correct when he says the five appointments he will make to the state school board may be the most important during his first year in office.

Especially since we have never previously had any appointed members on this group, these first-timers will set a tone that may be carried over into the future.

If someone were to ask this writer his opinion on what kind of people should be given those posts (which isn't likely to happen), he'd have one warning: This isn't a place to put retired school personnel, despite the fact that this kind of appointment seems logical to some. After all, such people ask, who knows more about the educational process?

That can be one of the problems. Those who have been educators up till a short while before they begin to serve on such a board bring with them all their predispositions and their old feelings about relationships inside the educational community. That's not what we need more of, here at the top of the heap in the state's educational establishment. We need new ideas, not retreats, and that means we need people new to education.

Another reason Carruthers will be happier if the five people he names are not those about whom the school folks already have firm opinions is that business people or others who have not been on the edges of this profession will have more credibility with such important citizens as those who serve in the Legislature. That's a group that is going to be keeping a very close eye on what happens during this first year of the new arrangement in the school

board. Their views should be kept in mind from the very beginning.

Besides, we already have too many former teachers and administrators among the ten members of this operation who are elected by the citizens at large.

Republicans, presently riding high in the state, are reportedly considering hiring a full-time person to run things in their party, instead of having to depend on a non-paid state chairman.

Edward Lujan has filled that post with considerable distinction in recent years, but he probably did that to the detriment of the family business he runs. Maybe, after their recent successes at the polls, the GOP should try electing somebody to that job as a paid position.

Best candidate known to this department for such a post is Almagordo's Helen Cameron, who has trained with the big boys and girls on the Potomac and learned about all they have to teach her.

If it would help her get this job, this column would even be willing to come out against her.

One capitol-watcher says he looks to see something on the order of 1,500 bills introduced into the coming legislative session.

We think that number's too high, but not by much.

If there was an office pool being made up, we'd choose a number between 1,200 and 1,300 as what we think the total will be.

Either way, that's many too many, but there's nothing one can do to keep the total down. Even those lawmakers who agree that there

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should be fewer, rather than more, bills throw into the hopper this year always seem to feel their bills are exceptions to such a rule. "Let the other guys hold off" is how they think of it. "My bills are really essential ones, and theirs aren't."

There is much to be said for that resolution Governor Carruthers has adopted that all budgets to be submitted to him must cover the next five years, not just the upcoming fiscal year. That's a very sensible way to budget—and Franklin Jones,

once the state's top tax-collector, has been trying for something like two decades to find a governor who would switch to this system. Maybe now he's got one.

Carruthers will learn, however, how tough it is to do that without verging on the purely fictional when it comes to estimating what things are going to cost a few years down the line. If such budgets are to mean anything, they shouldn't be approached as exercises performed only to make the chief executive feel good.
