## Councillors exchange words over groups' joining

Ruidoso Village Councillor Jerry Shaw lashed out at fellow council members during Tuesday's meeting of the Ruidoso Village Council.

The council approved, in a four-to-two vote, combining the Adult Recreation Advisory Board (ARAB) and the Parks and Recreation Committee, before Shaw criticized one or more councillors.

Councillors Ray Dean Carpenter and Elmer Pirelli opposed joining the two groups, as did Mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr.

"The votes that don't get made on this are from people or councillors who have never attended a Parks and Recreation meeting or an Adult Recreation meeting. They simply sit there and make their decisions—it's the same as being accus-

ed on P&Z of never going out to the site," said Shaw.

"I have seen councillors sit right here that have never attended one of those meetings and yet they've made their decision based on wherever they come from," added Shaw in a raised voice.

"I've been to both those committees many, many times," noted Shaw.

"Well, it's fortunate that some of us have a lot of time; some of us do have to make a living," retorted Carpenter.

"Some of us make time," responded Shaw.

Although the council approved the consolidation, members didn't go along with all the recommendations presented by Parks and Recreation Chairman L. Ray Nunley.

The committee recommended a joint group to be composed of seven

members and presented a list of proposed members to include the heads of the two village departments advised by the groups. Nunley said ARAB hasn't met for several months.

Carpenter said appointments should come through the mayor's office, and disagreed with abolishing a committee just because it doesn't meet.

"I don't like the consolidation because I don't see them working hand in hand," said Mayor Davis before the votes were cast. He said he won't put any village employee on a village committee.

Councillor Shaw disagreed with having councillors serve on village boards, and was reminded by Mayor Davis that she chairs the Economic Development Board.

"That is a screwed up thing that we created by ordinance," said Shaw, adding that it should be

abolished.

Councillor Rick Davis, secretary of the Parks and Recreation Committee, said he wants to remain a member of that group. Councillor Davis said it is helpful to have councillors on committees to "keep up with what's going on."

Village clerk Leon Eggleston was asked to draft a proposed ordinance on the new committee for council approval.

In other business Tuesday, the council:

—Approved a beer and wine liquor license for Grandfathers Pizza Inc., a corporation owned by Councillor Victor Alonso and his wife, to be located at 2911 Suddeth Drive.

—Overturned a Planning and Zoning Commission denial on a request for property line setback variance on Lot 3, Block 13, Town and Country North Unit 1. Councillor Victor Alonso opposed the ac-

tion, but recalled a similar case in the same subdivision where the council approved a variance over his dissenting vote.

Alonso said he hoped other councillors, too, would remain consistent in their votes.

—Discussed briefly a six-month financial report presented by village manager Jim Hine, and agreed to have a workshop within 10 days on the report and other budgetary considerations.

—Heard Shaw report on a New Mexico Municipal League board meeting in Santa Fe.

—Approved conducting public hearings on a petition for annexation approved in 1976, but never officially annexed.

—Agreed to notify Consolidated Energy Systems that the village will not be accepting its proposal to build a cogeneration system.

## Low interest loans talk draws crowd in Downs

Ruidoso Downs businesspeople crowded the Downs Village Hall to hear discussion of a program that could grant low interest loans to qualifying Ruidoso Downs businesses.

With every seat in the meeting room taken, and some standing while others kneeled and squatted in the aisle, audience members listened intently to the presentation on the Community Development Block Grant (CBDG) program given by Steve Massey.

Massey, of the Southeastern New Mexico Economic Development District, noted that the program is funded by federal CBDG dollars administered by the state. He said in 1987, \$1.3 million has been allocated for the Economic Development Setaside program.

That money will be divvied up among projects across the state that are chosen for participation. Massey said specific projects, proposed to municipalities by small for-profit or non-profit businesses in their communities (new or existing businesses may apply), are presented to the state Community Development Council each quarter. He predicted that group will meet next in about three months.

The council evaluates each request, then funds those it chooses. Money goes to the municipality, then is administered to the business as a loan. Terms of the loans are up to each municipality, but Massey estimated loans would probably be made at five to seven percent.

After repayment, each municipality can then reloan, then reloan again. After the final repayment, the money reverts to the municipality as a grant. It can then use the money for some project of its own.

A key purpose of the program is

to create jobs and benefit low to moderate income individuals, Massey reported. The program, which has a ceiling of \$500,000 per municipality, requires the creation of one job per \$10,000 loaned.

Among the complex list of eligibility requirements listed in the 15-page booklet distributed during the meeting, a 3-1 private investment dollar to loan dollar match is required, keeping with the "gap" financing philosophy of the program.

Massey explained the program is geared to bridge the gap between what level a bank will finance a project and what it takes to get such a "greater risk" business under way.

Trustee Conrad Buchanan, who "discovered" the project while searching for financing for his own business, reported that he has since

found out he is not eligible for the program since he is an elected official. But he encouraged the gathering of merchants and merchant hopefuls to pursue the project with perseverance.

"The first hog to the trough is going to get the food," he remarked.

Audience members and Massey then verbally volleyed questions and answers across the room for an hour, finally setting a workshop date and forming a strategy of multiple small loan requests lumped together.

"We're going to go with, I think, a shotgun blast approach," Trustee J.L. Wilson concluded.

The group agreed to set the workshop for 7:30 p.m. Thursday, January 22, at Ruidoso Downs Village Hall. Massey will go into greater detail on loan application

procedures at that workshop.

In other business, the trustees:

—Presented a community service award to Mike Tellez, of Michael's Mex-Sea Restaurant, for his part in serving free meals to the needy and lonely during the holidays.

—Voted to advertise a public hearing for a proposed ordinance that would raise building permit fees.

—Indicated support of having a building inspector work part-time for the village for a percentage of the building permit fee.

—Expressed a desire that Municipal Judge Martin Valenzuela attend some future meeting during which trustees will discuss the community service program.

—Conducted an executive session.

# Lodgers hear speakers protest Indian water claims

"If we don't have any water we're not going to have any tourists up here," said Bill Rawlins, president of the Ruidoso Lodgers Association (RLA), during an association meeting Tuesday.

The Lodgers Association has joined the Water Defense Association (WDA) in its fight against claims by the Mescalero Apache Indian Tribe to nearly 18,000 acre feet of additional water rights.

"Their demand for water is absolutely glutinous," said Dan Swearingin during a presentation at RLA's regular monthly meeting. Swearingin gave a brief rundown on water law and various court cases before addressing the Mescalero claims.

"We are not trying to take anything away from the Mescalero Apache Indians," noted WDA co-

chairman Ken Nosker. He said he and his neighbors will fight to keep the tribe from taking what isn't theirs.

Swearingin said the Mescalero Apache claim, filed with the State Engineer's Office, is under the Winters Doctrine, a federal reserve water rights concept that assumes the federal government owned all land before anyone else came along and further assumes the federal government intended to reserve some water rights for the aboriginal inhabitants of that land. That doctrine was first applied in an area where a lot of water was still unappropriated.

"That is not true with the Rio Ruidoso," said Swearingin.

Nosker said the stream was 100 percent appropriated in 1873 when the Mescalero Apache Reservation was established. He disagreed with tribal claims that the reservation was established in 1852.

"They signed a peace treaty that they didn't keep in 1852 and they finally corralled them in 1873," said Nosker.

Swearingin said the tribe is asking for 17,941.7 acre feet of additional water rights—11 times the Village of Ruidoso's average annual consumption of 1,560 acre feet. He read from a Boyle Engineering report that indicates an average annual flow of 3,700 acre feet at the point where the Rio Ruidoso leaves reservation land in the Upper Canyon.

"They are proposing to divert 4,634 acre feet," said Swearingin, noting that such a diversion would be impossible even during times of high flow.

"I don't see how you can do anything but dry up the Rio Ruidoso," remarked Swearingin.

Calvin Wesch of the WDA said the Village of Ruidoso would probably be the most seriously impacted if

the Mescalero Apache Tribe is successful in its claims.

"I keep reading in the paper that Ruidoso has no problem," said Nosker, adding he would not believe the tribe's claims won't impact the village unless he had a signed document to that effect. Nosker predicted the tribe, if it gains the right to all it claims, will be selling water to the Village of Ruidoso.

"If they have the legal right to that water they're going to sell it to the highest bidder," said Nosker.

"Is the Village Council behind us on this?" asked Rawlins, and Nosker questioned statements he has read in the newspaper that indicate some village officials are unconcerned about the case.

Swearingin said the village has entered the case, and noted that statements quoted in *The News* that the village has "no problem" with the case came from paid employees

rather than council members.

"The Village Council has been very complacent," said Wesch. He said the village water attorney, Neil Stillinger, is aware of the danger, but hasn't had clear instructions from the village.

"We need to present a consolidated front to the claims of the Mescalero Apache Tribe," said Nosker, wondering why Ruidoso is less concerned about the case than Ruidoso Downs and Capitan.

WDA treasurer Gail Hopkins told RLA members that anyone can contribute to the cause by donating to Friends of the River, a vehicle for non-water rights owners to help protect the Rio Ruidoso from Indian claims.

Nosker said funds will be used to hire expert witnesses to present evidence, and assured the group of a "strict accounting of every dollar."

WDA members stressed the

urgency of the case.

"This is it," said Wesch. He said evidence will be presented as soon as three months from now, and funds must be available for experts and attorneys.

While the entire case may drag on for years before ending up in the Supreme Court, the evidence must be gathered and prepared for the upcoming trial, he explained.

"This costs a bunch of money," said Swearingin.

Also during Tuesday's RLA meeting, Rawlins announced that the board voted to increase membership dues to \$20 next year.

He distributed copies of a mail-out listing RLA members and the type, size, price range and other details of their lodgings. Rawlins said 5,000 copies were printed.

## Downs 'recall' petition judged invalid

A petition that calls for an increase in the size of the governing body in Ruidoso Downs has been declared invalid.

Downs residents turned in a petition Monday that contained about 70 signatures. The petition sought an election polling voters whether to increase the size of the Ruidoso Downs Trustees to seven from four members.

But Ruidoso Downs village clerk

Jo Ann Jenkins said New Mexico Statute 3-1-5 requires petitioners to have the original petition approved by the clerk before it is circulated. In this case, that did not happen, she said.

Jenkins said she researched the statute and consulted with other area clerks and the New Mexico Municipal League before coming to the decision that the petition was invalid. She said that decision was

reached reluctantly.

"I really wanted to get it over with and done," she said. "I was ready to go with it."

Wednesday, petitioner Albert Richardson said he is circulating a new petition that has been approved by Jenkins. He reported 13 residents so far have signed the document.

"I've already started on it," he said. He hopes to have enough

signatures to turn in the petition by the time of the next trustees' meeting, set for Monday, January 26.

Officials reported the petition must contain a total of about 30-35 signatures to have enough to be valid. That total must be at least equal to five percent of the number of residents who voted in the last election in the Downs.

## Crisis

Family Crisis Center board chairman Arlene Brown tells the Kiwanis Club Tuesday that services to victims of domestic violence in the area continue to be on hold while the board attempts to obtain liability insurance. Meanwhile the problem continues with 10 or more victims treated in the hospital emergency room each month, said Brown. She asked club members to contact friends in the insurance industry and help identify a company willing to write crisis center liability coverage.

## Mitchell reflects on Racing Commission record

Former State Racing Commissioner Gary Mitchell said Wednesday that he regrets Governor Garrey Carruthers' failure to appoint anyone from Lincoln County to the all-new five-member commission.

Mitchell, appointed by former Governor Toney Anaya, said his term expired December 31, 1986, and he was not reappointed by Carruthers.

"I'm not angry about it," said Mitchell. "He has every right to bring

in the people that supported him."

But Mitchell said he is "sad" that Lincoln County will no longer be represented on the commission. He noted that county voters strongly supported Carruthers.

"When it comes to racing we are the leader in this state," said Mitchell. "It's a shame that the flagship doesn't at least have a representative on the commission," he added.

In spite of published reports that Carruthers was critical of the racing commission, Mitchell said he was pleased to have served and felt that the commission served the state well.

"We did more to improve racing than any commission in the past," said Mitchell.

Carruthers was quoted as saying the basic rules governing horse racing in New Mexico were sound, but

had not been adequately enforced in recent years.

Mitchell said he submitted the names of some Lincoln County residents as possible commissioners, and has offered his assistance to the new members.

"I'll help whoever is appointed," said Mitchell. "I hope everyone enjoys serving as much as I did," he added.

## Police officers take on new duties

Three Ruidoso Police corporals have new job duties after a department reorganization was implemented January 3.

Police Chief Richard Swenor said corporals Roxanne Pfeffer, Robert Achterberg and Oscar Villado have been removed from shift patrol. Pfeffer will now serve as combination station and training officer, Achterberg as primary traffic investigator and Villado as a detective in the criminal investigation division (CID).

"Basically this is a reassignment of personnel where we needed help," said Swenor.

"I have to look at fiscal considerations," said Swenor, adding that the three already were drawing corporal pay before their duties

were changed.

Pfeffer will be responsible for ongoing training as well as the volumes of records required to substantiate certification and training requirements. She also will be assigned to public relations and crime prevention programs and fleet maintenance.

"Anything that doesn't fit neatly into any other niche will fall to her," said deputy chief Jim Alston.

"There are many services to the community that have been kind of neglected—they will fall to Roxanne," said Alston.

He said Pfeffer was assigned to her new duties on the basis of her experience, personality and rank.

"She was the best one for the job since she already served as field

training officer," said Swenor. He said Pfeffer will continue bank training and a shut-in program that she initiated while a patrol officer.

Achterberg is now assigned to full-time traffic investigation.

"This is an area of expertise that you really need to stay current in," said Alston. He said Achterberg will review all accident reports and try to make some determination.

Swenor said Achterberg also will complete the Emergency Medical Technician (EMT) training and eventually become a certified EMT instructor.

"This is something I've been trying to do for a long time," said Swenor. He said it will be a big help for the department to have its own

EMT instructor.

Swenor said Achterberg is fully trained for his new traffic assignment.

Villado was assigned to CID in efforts to get the crime resolution rate back up, said Swenor. He said embezzlement and forgeries, crimes that can't be easily deterred by patrol officers, were on the increase last year. Since such crimes take a great deal of time to investigate, he determined that an additional detective was needed.

Swenor said the department size remains at 33, since the reorganization entailed moving current staff and didn't increase the overall number.

# Attorney general sues Triple Crown

Developers and promoters of Triple Crown Condominiums in Ruidoso Downs are charged with violations of the state's Unfair Practices Act, according to published reports.

The reports say Attorney General (AG) Hal Stratton said his Consumer Protection Division has filed a lawsuit in 12th District Court in Carrizozo alleging numerous viola-

tions of the Unfair Practices Act in the sale and promotion of time-share interests in the resort.

Triple Crown promoters are accused in the suit of using deceptive practices to lure potential customers to sales presentations and purchase time-share interests between April 1985 and May 1986, according to the report.

Named in the suit are former Texas governor John B. Connally and former Texas lieutenant governor Ben Barnes.

Stratton was quoted as saying the AG's office has received a "wide variety of complaints" from purchasers and non-purchasers over the past year and a half.

The state will ask for restitution

from Triple Crown for purchasers whose transactions involved "any unfair or unconscionable practice or whose ownership of a time-share interest has been affected by Triple Crown's failure to deliver promised services and amenities," according to the reports. Penalties of \$5,000 for each willful violation of the Unfair Practices Act are claimed in the civil suit.

### Buttermilk Dressing

Have you ever read the ingredients on a bottle of commercial salad dressing? You would expect to see nomenclature such as oil, buttermilk, vinegar, garlic, etc. Right? Wrong. The labels on commercial salad dressings read like a chemical inventory. I like to know what I'm eating, I get a bit uneasy about it. The real clincher for me with salad dressings was the expiration date business. I mean some of these concoctions have a year or longer until they expire. Maybe I'm a cynic, but anything that contains egg yolks and claims freshness for a year must be at least half preservatives. I won't, however, argue that some of them are pretty tasty. I just don't buy them as a rule because I'd really rather not be preserved before my time. If you know what I mean.

In the coming months I'll be sharing with you some very simple salad dressings that are really easy to whip up and they contain fresh, quality ingredients. Salads made with fresh vegetables are some of the most healthful things we eat and salad dressings should be light and used sparingly to highlight the fresh, wonderful flavor of these vegetables.

### Buttermilk Dressing

- 1 Tbsp. fresh minced onion
- ½ tsp. salt
- ¼ tsp. garlic powder
- 1 Tbsp. parsley flakes
- 1 cup real mayonnaise
- 1 cup buttermilk

In a small bowl mix all ingredients thoroughly. Store in an airtight container overnight so that the flavors can mingle. A small covered pitcher-type container is ideal for dressings such as this. But if you don't have one, a clean pint jar like mayonnaise comes in works great.

# Cablevision plans new format to start by February

Ruidoso cable television viewers may enjoy 30 new channels as of January 30.

Five of the channels will be offered at no extra charge. One—the Disney Channel—will be available for an additional monthly charge of \$6.95, if you currently have Home Box Office (HBO), or \$8.95 without HBO.

The additions and deletions in

current programming are the result of a random survey included in the October 1 Lincoln Cablevision billing. According to Paul Crown, manager, the surveys were sent to every fifth subscriber on the billing processor. Of the 1,200 sent there were 265 responses.

The survey consisted of the following questions: —“Please choose your favorite seven broadcast channels by placing an X in the box beside your choice.” (11 currently available

channels were listed.) —“Please choose your favorite 10 cable channels by placing an X in the box beside your choice.” (four currently available, and 17 new cable channels were listed.)

—“Please choose your favorite two premium channels by placing an X in the box beside your choice.” (HBO, The Disney Channel, Cinemax, Showtime and Other, were listed.)

According to the survey results, the local viewing public preferred:

—PBS Station KENW, Channel 3 (149 votes) over KNMR, Channel 18 (77 votes).

—ABC Station KOAT, Channel 9 (251 votes) over KAVE, Channel 19 (36 votes).

—CBS station KBIM, Channel 10 (236 votes) over KGGM, Channel 13 (150 votes).

Consequently, the less popular stations were deleted to provide air space for the new programming. WOR-TV, out of New York, will

move from Channel 7 to Channel 18. Local viewers' survey preferences have resulted in the following new channels:

—THE DISCOVERY CHANNEL (13)—Features science, nature, history, adventure and travel programs.

—AMERICAN MOVIE CLASSICS (7)—Features up to 50 prime time pre-1970 films, with no commercial interruptions.

—CNN HEADLINE NEWS (16)—Features 24 hour headline news.

—THE NASHVILLE NETWORK (14)—Features country music, concerts, sports, comedy and entertainment.

—HOME SHOPPING NETWORK (21)—Features a variety of items, which may be purchased from the convenience of your home.

—THE WEATHER CHANNEL (19)—Features the latest local and national weather forecasts.

—THE DISNEY CHANNEL

(22)—Features Disney film and cartoon classics, as well as a variety of special entertainment.

“As a Christmas present to our viewers,” said Crown, “I was going to provide two free weeks of Disney Channel programming on Channel 13, for the kids who were out of school.” Due to objections from people missing the daytime version of “The Price Is Right,” Crown removed the free channel. The first two weeks of February, The Disney Channel will preview free on Channel 12, before moving to its permanent home on Channel 22.

“I honestly feel we are giving the consumer what they want, according to our survey,” said Crown. In an effort to insure continuing customer satisfaction, another survey will be conducted in October of this year.

The Ruidoso Village Council recently voted to extend the Lincoln Cablevision franchise for another 15 years.

Ruidoso is 0-3-1 on the dual-match season. The Warriors tied Roswell, 33-33, in a dual match last month in Ruidoso.





"They're so powerful and they've got so much momentum. I like the Broncos because they're so much like the Cowboys and I'm a big Cowboy fan."



# Drug labs raise big stink

A methamphetamine laboratory, such as the one shut down last week by Ruidoso Police, causes a pervasive and unpleasant odor within the surrounding area, said Detective Mike Lovelace Monday.

"Neighbors smelled something, but they didn't report it," said Lovelace. He hopes in the future citizens will be aware of what to look for, and report suspected drug manufacturing in neighborhoods.

The travel trailer, confiscated at 214 Convair Drive on January 3, is parked outside the Police Department, and the chemical smell is very evident through the open

windows. The smell, very strong and very unpleasant, is difficult to describe. Lovelace said chemists describe it as an "acid, sour, vinegary odor," but Detective Lanny Maddox called it a "sweet, sweet putrefying smell."

"If you're downwind while they're doing it (manufacturing methamphetamines) you can smell it for a long way off," said Lovelace.

He said placing an illegal methamphetamine laboratory in some sort of travel trailer or mobile unit is not uncommon because operators want to be able to move quickly.

Drug Enforcement Administra-

tion (DEA) special agent James Bell of Las Cruces and forensic chemist Dan Prall of Dallas, Texas, were in Ruidoso Wednesday to investigate the suspected methamphetamine laboratory.

Contents of the trailer were removed and cataloged, and samples of the various substances will be sent to the DEA laboratory in Dallas for tests.

Since the presence of such an operation is unsafe, as well as illegal, the Ruidoso Police Department wants the help of citizens who suspect a methamphetamine laboratory is located in their neighborhoods.

Chemicals used in methamphetamine are toxic and explosive,

said Lovelace. He said chemists have warned members of the police investigating team to keep exposure to a minimum.

Some substances known to be used in the manufacture of methamphetamines are phenylacetic acid, sodium acetate, acetic anhydride, mercury chloride, hydrochloric acid and sulfuric acid.

"Some of those chemicals are very toxic," noted Lovelace.

"Call us," he added, urging anyone smelling the strange chemical smell peculiar to methamphetamine operations to report its presence to the police at 257-7365.





## Editorial

Will this Santa Fe administration remember those of us way down here in Lincoln County?

During a visit to Ruidoso during the recent gubernatorial campaign, then-governor Garrey Carruthers indicated he would, as candidate, give Lincoln County and the rest of Southern New Mexico their share of attention.

A good measure of our representation in Santa Fe is the number of Lincoln County people who are appointed to various government positions.

At latest count, we've stayed even in that regard. Ruidosoan Kerry Boyd was named director of Resource Development and Management in the state Department of Energy. Meanwhile, Gary Mitchell, also of Ruidoso, was replaced as a member of the State Racing Commission.

On the surface, it looks like we're holding our own. But taking into account a significant under-representation in Santa Fe we've experienced in past administrations, we have a ways to go.

We believe Governor Carruthers knows all too well the problem of being in Southern New Mexico. After all, he is from Las Cruces, another community far south of I-40 that often has gotten the short end of the representation stick.

We hope Carruthers will keep Lincoln County in mind as he goes about making future appointments. Perhaps it will be during the Carruthers administration that the mention up north of "Ruidoso" will be followed by something other than "Where's that?"—DJP

## Inside the Capitol

**SANTA FE**—America's presidents appear to be obsessed with foreign policy. There are reasons for that fact other than the importance of the topic.

One of the things almost every man who occupies the nation's top job finds is that he is going to have lots more trouble than he originally thought—getting anything accomplished in the area of domestic policy. That's because he has to move through the bureaucracy when he wants things changed in this part of government, and the bureaucracy has grown unwieldy to a degree that earlier presidents would not be able to credit. (George Washington used personally to open all the mail addressed to his new government every morning.)

So, suffering from understandable frustration, chief executives turn to that other outlet for their energies, foreign policy. Here, they believe, they can at least affect something—and maybe leave a record of the kind they hunger to see in the history books.

And what do they find when they make their moves in this direction? Why, that standing across their path is the Department of State, which is bureaucracy doubled and redoubled in spades.

That's one reason presidents—and Reagan is certainly not the first—cause the National Security Council, down there in the basement of the White House, to get into operational matters with which they were not supposed to be concerned. These are people to whom the boss can give an order, in so many words or by irridication, and then get some action. With the striped-pants set, you wait till you're an old man for change to take place.

Stating those facts is not to imply that this is the wise way for a man at the top to operate. Certainly it isn't, especially in cases that involve winking at the law or violating it—and even more, getting caught at it. But there is some reason for this to happen, and most of that is the fact that bureaucrats can freeze almost any impetus toward action if they put their collective minds on it.

Something like that happens right here at home, as any newcomer finds out during his first weeks in the governor's residence. While the new

men and women he has put into the top slots are getting their hats and coats off and finding out where the facilities are located, the bureaucrats who were in place when the new folks got here can be locking their wheels preparatory to resisting changes of every sort.

Least popular changes, of course, are those which look like they will make bureaucracies have to work harder. Next most resented are those which will make them work in different ways than those to which they are accustomed.

And a governor doesn't have foreign policy to play around with when the frustrations start getting to him.

That's one reason why our state's chief executives seem to go so overboard about all that variety of governors' conferences that are held in our nation every year. There are some of those to which any governor can go, some to which only members of one or the other political party are welcome, and some for only those who run things in a particular part of the country. With all of these groups in place, a governor frequently has a good excuse for getting out of town, forgetting his own cares for a little while, and maybe—just maybe—learning how certain vexing problems may be solved.

Clearly, that isn't a solution to the problem; it's only a rather complicated avoidance mechanism. What we need, in Washington and at home, is changes of the kind that will end logjams and make those on the civil service rolls into a responsive mechanism again.

Can that be done in a nation that is, as no one can deny, over-governed? Could we really change what is in place at this moment without dismantling everything and starting again from scratch?

Maybe not, but if we don't start trying to do that, our respective governments are going to collapse of their own weight.

If a state adopts a lottery as a way to solve its money problems, who gets the blame for the effect that has on the lives of the compulsive gamblers who now have one more outlet for their self-destruction?

## Jockey/Trainer Standings Trifecta pool may reach \$100,000

Despite a winless weekend, jockey Danny Sorenson continues to hold his No. 1 ranking at Sunland Park, while Fred Danley clings to a comfortable lead in the trainer standings.

Rider Salustio Burgos trimmed Sorenson's advantage to a single win over the weekend as he booted home four winners. Pedro Benitez climbed to the No. 3 spot on the list, passing injured Mike Lidberg, who was forced to take off his mounts for the second straight week.

Joe Martinez took the weekly

riding honors making five trips to the winner's circle, but could not break out of the fifth slot - four wins behind Lidberg.

Rounding out the top five reinsman are Darrell Blevins, Glen Murphy, David Lidberg, Leroy Coombs and Duane Sterling.

In the training colony, Danley (25 wins) and Doyal Roberts (22) continue to dominate the standings. Lewis Germany held on to his distant third, with Cliff Lambert taking a narrow verdict over Paul Smith for the No. 4 spot.

More than 18,000 fans have bet \$172,000 the past two weekends trying to bust Sunland Park's record Twin Trifecta carryover pool. The wager eluded handicappers again on Sunday, however, and track officials expect the jackpot to reach \$100,000 when racing resumes this Friday.

The large Twin Trifecta carryover was credited with Sunland recording its two highest handles of the season over the weekend. Fans

wagered \$322,000 on Saturday's card and \$308,000 on Sunday's program.

In Sunday's feature race, 30-1 longshot Moolah Smoke went unchallenged over Sunland's 5 1/2-furlong course with jockey Victor Escobar aboard. Escobar and Moolah Smoke were never headed in the sprint, racing to a 3 1/2-length winning margin in 1:05.4. The dark horse returned more than \$64 on a two-dollar ticket, earning \$7,000 for

Regal Manor Stud. Jerry Farmer conditions the 4-year-old colt.

Will Cut closed strongly in the final stages to steal runner-up money from favorite Scouts Partner. Joe Martinez rode Will Cut for trainer Stewart Welch. Frank Capellucci gave the leg-up to Darrell Blevins aboard Scouts Partner.

Sunday's headliner was Moolah Smoke's first appearance in the 4-year-old ranks. He was winless

from seven starts during his sophomore campaign, but won the Premier Challenge Futurity at Blue Ribbon Downs in 1985.

Racing resumes next weekend at Sunland Park with 11-race programs scheduled Friday, Saturday and Sunday beginning at 12:30 p.m. each day. Friday's program marks the return of the Big Q wager to Sunland after a six-year absence. A winning Big Q ticket correctly picks the first- and second-place finishers in the last two races.

## Hoofbeats

Sunland Park's Twin Trifecta climbs to an all-time high for the Friday, Jan. 16 program. Bettors have failed to peg the Twin Tri in seven consecutive programs resulting in a \$68,039 carryover. The entire carryover pool will go into the second half of Friday's Twin Tri with the daily pool being split to pay the first-half winners.

Sunland Park's Mutuels Manager Lynn Bouchard estimates that Friday's total Twin Trifecta pool will reach the \$100,000 level. His other estimates have been very close to the mark as he put last Friday's pool at \$30,000 with the actual amount at \$34,152; Saturday's at \$50,000-\$49,857 was bet; and Sunday's at \$70,000 with \$68,309 wagered.

More than 18,000 fans have bet \$172,000 during the past two weekends trying to break the Twin Trifecta. The sudden interest in the bet has helped Sunland Park's handle to its two best days of the current season. Last Saturday's handle was \$322,521, while Sunday's card generated \$308,614.

Next weekend the Big Q returns to Sunland Park after a six-year absence. The wager is being brought back as the result of a survey that Sunland Park's fans

responded to during the last week of December. The object of the Big Q is to select the top two finishers in either order in consecutive races. There is no carryover.

In conjunction with the Big Q's return Sunland Park will give away \$1,100 in free Big Q wagers in Saturday's action. Every fan who pays full admission will be eligible for the giveaway with drawings held throughout Saturday's racing card.

The Big Q was dropped in 1982 in favor of the Pic-Six which enjoys tremendous success on the West Coast and at other tracks. The object of the Pic-Six is to correctly select six consecutive winners. If no ticket "picks six," then half the pool is carried over to the next day's Pic-Six wagering. The other half is paid to those tickets that have the most winners. Obviously, the more the carryover the more the interest. The Pic-Six was dropped this year in favor of the Twin Trifecta which supposedly creates a larger carryover quicker.

Sunland Park's \$450,000 Clubhouse renovation is coming along nicely. The glass partition that separates the Clubhouse from the Grandstand is installed and the mutuels island and acoustical ceiling are nearing completion. The Grand has been targeted for

February.

There was only one claim last weekend as Donald and Rudy Mosley forked over \$4,500 for Debby Luster. The Texas-bred gelding finished second in 6-furlong sprint as the favorite.

Thoroughbred claiming specialist Stanel fell short in his bid to win all three divisions of the Rio Grande Marathon Series. The 8-year-old veteran won divisions one and two earlier in the meet, but apprentice Lewie Germany could finish no better than second in the 1 1/2-mile division. Germany flew in from Santa Anita for the weekend to handle Stanel and Farmer Brown who won Saturday's co-feature.

Jockey Danny Sorenson remains atop the rider standings although he did not manage a win over the weekend. Salustio Burgos closed to within one win of the leader. Former leaders Pedro Benitez, Mike Lidberg and Ruidoso Downs leading rider Joe Martinez, who won five races during the weekend, round out the top five. Fred Danley and Doyal Roberts continue to dominate the trainer standings as Roberts holds an 8-win margin over third-place holder Lewis Germany. Danley leads Roberts by three tallies with a 25 win total.

## China Lion takes Rio Grande Saturday

A record Twin Trifecta carryover helped Sunland Park post its highest handle of the season on Saturday as 2,850 fans bet more than \$322,000 on the afternoon horse racing program.

Although handicappers wagered nearly \$40,000 trying to hit Saturday's \$34,000 Twin Trifecta carryover, there were no winning tickets.

## Spanish Reb comes from behind to win Friday feature race at Sunland Park

Spanish Reb rallied in the final furlong to win Friday's feature race at Sunland Park as the track's Twin Trifecta carryover climbed to an all-time high of \$34,000.

More than 12,000 handicappers have been unable to peg Sunland's Twin Trifecta events for five consecutive programs. A total of 2,084 fans bet \$28,000 chasing Friday's \$23,000 carryover.

A winning Twin Trifecta ticket correctly picks the top three finishers in two consecutive races.

The front-running thoroughbred China Lion notched his third straight win capturing Saturday's Rio Grande Marathon Series. Jockey Pedro Benitez showed the way through the entire 1 1/2-mile test aboard China Lion to win by more than three lengths. The final time was 1:55 flat.

Stanel, who raced as the 8-5 favorite under rider Lewie Germany, closed to within two lengths

of the winner at the mile marker, but had to settle for a distant second. Starland, a 19-1 outsider ridden by William Trevino, finished third.

China Town's impressive effort earned \$1,800 for owner Howard Sommer. Jose Dominguez trains the 5-year-old gelding bred in Illinois. Lewis Germany conditions Stanel, while Starland races under the direction of owner Harry Griel.

Jockey Juan Arteaga piloted Spanish Reb to a half-length victory in Friday's headliner racing as the even-money favorite. Arteaga pressed the leaders throughout the mile test, but appeared to be out of contention after Spanish Reb trailed by two lengths as the field rounded the final turn.

While Bay City Babe and Follin Round duled stride-for-stride for the winner's share, Arteaga brought Spanish Reb from off the pace to run down the duo a few

strides from the wire. The final time was 1:41.4.

Spanish Reb earned \$1,500 for owners Sam and Donna Pilcher of Moriarty. Johnny Dennis trains the 7-year-old thoroughbred.

Follin Round and rider Salustio Burgos finished second, three-quarter lengths ahead of Bay City Babe and young jockey Glen Murphy. Mickey McMillan saddled Follin Round. Doyal Roberts owns and conditions Bay City Babe.


## Selecting Navel Oranges:



Look for oranges that are heavy for their size, this means they are at their juicy best. Choose oranges that are firm, yet springy. If an orange doesn't give a little when gently squeezed it probably isn't very juicy.

## Storing Oranges:


Oranges will keep at room temperature for a few days. For longer storage, place them in the crisper section (about 45-48°F) of your refrigerator. Oranges can be peeled and sectioned, or cut ahead of time for use. You don't need to worry about the loss of Vitamin C, because the Vitamin C in an orange is very stable and little if any is lost when it is cut and covered overnight in the refrigerator.



## Peeling Navel Oranges:

It's a snap. Just run a sharp knife between the peel and the meat in a spiral fashion as you would an apple. Use a sawing motion. Or, score the outer peel into quarters like a basketball and remove the peel with your fingers.
