Airport Construction is under way

Contractors for the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport (SBRA) got their notice to proceed Thursday during a pre-construction conference.

Project engineer Earl Cook of Leedshill-Herkenhoff warned Bill Thomas of Tricon Kent that no time extensions will be granted for weather or any other cause.

"We are on a fast-track schedule," said Cook.

Thomas said he expects to complete the contract by July 15, well within the time allotted.

Tricon Kent was the successful bidder on Phase I, PAC I of the multi-million dollar airport project. The contract, which includes mostly earthwork, is for \$2,354,964.50, just over half the engineer's estimate.

Thomas said the contractor will have an office trailer at the airport site and will take applications for employment at that office.

"We don't anticipate a great number of hires," said Thomas, explaining that equipment will be moved to the airport project from a job in Lakewood. He said most of the people working with that equipment will also come to work on the SBRA project.

"The newspapers and everyone seems to be having a circus with this," said Thomas of the news that few jobs will be available for the project. He said he has talked with representatives of the state Employment Security Department in Alamogordo and the employment office at the Mescalero Community Center.

A local labor preference provision is included in the contract documents, and Dumas Slade of Leedshill-Herkenhoff called attention to that section during Thursday's meeting.

"This is a large project for this area ... an important construction," noted Slade. He said important construction crews will have to be on the alert for tourists and visitors at and near the site.

Legislator Hall heads for Capitol

The pay isn't great, but State Representative Ben Hall isn't complaining.

Hall, headed for Santa Fe for the legislative session set to begin at noon Tuesday, January 20, is ready to get back to work for the people of his district.

Not everybody knows, said Hall, that New Mexico legislators receive no salaries. Members of the Legislature receive \$75 a day for room and board when on official business plus mileage to and from Santa Fe once during each session. They are not reimbursed for telephone calls and gasoline, said Hall.

While in Santa Fe, Hall shares an office with another lawmaker, and two secretaries are provided for every 10 representatives.

But Hall is excited about the upcoming legislative session.

"Things will get done," said Hall. He said Governor Garrey Carruthers already has appointed a lot of "good" people to serve with him.

"He's not playing politics," noted Hall. He said Carruthers has appointed the best qualified people of both parties to state jobs.

Carruthers will address the Legislature on opening day and is expected to outline his agenda, said Hall.

"The governor won't get everything he wants," said Hall, predicting a session characterized by negotiation and compromise.

"I know the governor is willing to do some (budget) cutting," said Hall, adding all three bodies have to work together.

"Nobody knows who will rule the Senate," noted Hall. Another unknown is how the governor and State Representative Raymond Sanchez, who will lead the House, will get along.

Hall has two things he particularly wants to get accomplished during this session—an access road for the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport in Lincoln County and a use for the

old Artesia Christian College facility in Eddy County.

While Lincoln County has been hard hit by economic woes, Hall said Eddy County, also in his district, has been hit the hardest by the oil and gas slump. He said he has been working for some time with Artesia residents trying to get the state Law Enforcement Academy to locate in that city.

The academy could be relocated in existing facilities purchased recently by the city of Artesia for less than \$2 million, said Hall.

Hall said he'll continue to work for funding for an access road to the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport.

"I think the airport will generate some improvement in the economy if the citizens will help," said Hall. He said citizens must promote the area and make tourists feel welcome.

"It's going to take a cooperative effort throughout the county," said Hall.

Within the next five years Hall said close to \$50 million in new construction will take place in this county. Besides the multi-million regional airport project, Hall said new roads and bridges will be constructed and State Highway 37 will be widened.

Education, revenues, insurance, banking and workmen's compensation are among topics the Legislature will address, said Hall.

He predicts the education reform bill, Senate Bill 106, passed last year, will be reworked in the upcoming session.

"It's not right for us to mandate to the schools to do things and then not provide the money," said Hall, adding that the money to implement all provisions of SB106 just isn't available.

Attempts will be made this session to change higher education. Hall said a bill will be introduced that sets tuition at different levels for different courses. Under the proposed plan, courses that cost more to teach would entail higher costs to students.

School board hears benefits of proposed mil levy

The Ruidoso Board of Education reviewed the benefits to the Ruidoso schools derived from the two mil levy that has been in effect since 1981.

Continuing the mil levy will be a question on the ballot in the upcoming election Tuesday, February 3.

Associate superintendent Mike Gladden presented the board with a fact sheet concerning the two mil levy during their meeting Wednesday.

Revenues from the two mil levy may only be used for erecting, remodeling, making additions to, providing equipment for or furnishing public school buildings; purchasing or improving public school grounds; and maintenance of public school buildings or public school grounds.

The levy is a continuation of the two mills already in place, it is based on an assessing rate of 33 1/3 percent of the appraised value on the tax rolls.

Gladden reported since 1981 mil levy monies have been used to supplement building programs, to furnish and equip classrooms as addition or replacement is needed, and to supplement the operational budget.

Last year, voters approved a \$2.6 million school bond issue. In an interview Thursday, Superintendent Sid Miller explained the bond issue is completely separate from the mil levy.

"A school district is allowed a maximum six percent of the assessed value of the district in the sale of bonds," Miller said. "A mil levy must be approved by voters every three years in accordance to Senate Bill 9. The present mil levy is running out."

In other business, board members Stormy Edwards, Don Swalander, Mike Morris and Lynn Willard:

—Awarded the sale of bonds to John Ravine and Company with the low bid of 5.2912. Financial advisor Charles Casey, Rilee and Associates, Incorporated of Albuquerque, stated 12 bids were received.

—Approved SunWest Bank of Albuquerque as the paying agent for the bonds as low bidders at \$350 for the set-up fee and an annual fee of \$200.

—Learned the bond rate was so low it reduced the estimated tax from 70 cents to 15 cents.

—Approved substitute bus drivers John Brown, Judy Miller and Katherine Wagnon.

—Accepted resignations from Kathy Garrett and Geri Tully.

—Hired Roseanne Schillies as administration office secretary, Sue Dolgener as gifted education teacher and Kathy Johnson as half-time "C" level special education teacher.

—Transferred Vicki Wright from Nob Hill to the central office.

—Approved ski program dates of January 21 and 28, February 4, 11, 18 and 25.

—Approved Friday, February 13, as an in-service day for teachers.

—Heard a progress report on Nob Hill school from Principal Roger Sowder.

—Approved architect's continued negotiation for the Ruidoso Middle School remodeling project.

—Approved in-service training for the teachers at White Mountain Intermediate School on Tuesday, January 27.

Food bank reports need for more food

The cupboard is bare. Members of the Lincoln County Food Bank board heard Thursday that supplies are nearly depleted at the food pantry located at the Human Services office on Mechem Drive.

The food bank helped fill Happy Holidays baskets, donating food worth about \$650, and then picked up items left in Happy Holidays containers, said Phyllis Boverie, food bank president.

But the need for food has outstripped the supply. Vice-president Betty Seiler said food was provided for

19 families (57 individuals) in December and 15 families (47 individuals) in November.

"That's up two families from October," noted Seiler. She said the pantry needs beans, cereals and canned goods.

Members decided to purchase some foodstuffs and check with the Ministerial Alliance on which church is scheduled to stock the pantry this month. Alliance members donate food on a rotating basis.

Seiler reported the food bank received food donations valued at

\$632.81 in November and \$698.62 in December. That includes about \$275 in food from The Cattle Baron Restaurant.

Cash donations for those months totaled \$412.20, said Seiler.

Vernell Hightower said food and cash donations totaled about \$175 in Carrizozo, where holiday food baskets were delivered to 10 families. Hightower said 22 names were submitted, but food was available for only 10 baskets.

Shop Rite and King's Food both made donations, said Hightower. Circle M continues to donate cooked

meat to the food bank, said Seiler.

Also during Thursday's meeting members of the 15-member board elected officers for 1987 and drew for one, two or three year terms as provided in the by-laws.

Boverie was re-elected president; Seiler, vice-president; Patty White, secretary; and Frankie Jarrell was elected treasurer.

"We have one of the lowest tuition rates in the nation, but it's misleading because of the fees they're tacking on," remarked Hall. He said the Legislature has found that some state universities are teaching things they shouldn't be teaching.

For instance, a legislative committee has determined that community colleges are offering graduate level courses and the University of New Mexico is offering a full-fledged remedial program. Hall said some members of the Legislature want to change that, and limit remedial courses to community and two-year schools and contain graduate programs on the university level.

A funding bill will be introduced requiring cities with community colleges to implement a five mill levy on property taxes. Hall said two communities already have five mill levies dedicated to their community colleges and those two institutions are almost self-supporting.

"If a community has a community college the people have to be willing to pay for it," noted Hall.

"Workmen's compensation costs have gone up so much even cities and counties can't stay in business," said Hall. He said New Mexico is losing businesses because of workmen's compensation and

liability laws. Hall expects the Legislature to take a close look at that problem.

A legislative committee found that a lot of the cost of insurance is because of the insurance companies' bad investments and loss of income from sources unrelated to insurance premiums and payouts, said Hall.

"Why should the rate payers have to pay for an insurance company's loss or gain on something else?" asked Hall. "To me the insurance crisis was created by insurance companies trying to cover their losses in other areas. It's not right."

Hall encourages his constituents to keep up with what's going on in Santa Fe, and contact him with questions or suggestions.

"If you're an elected official working for the public, the public has the right to know what's going on," said Hall. His mailing address in Santa Fe is: State Representative Ben Hall; Executive Capitol Building; Santa Fe, NM 87501. In Ruidoso, Hall's address is P.O. Box 555.

This session Hall will again serve on the Business and Industries Committee and the Agriculture Committee, but with a Democratic majority, Hall, a Republican, won't be vice-chairman this year.

"It's hard to predict what's going to happen," said Hall. "I think this will be an interesting session."

Thomas said an access road will be completed early in the project that should minimize non-construction personnel around the work area.

Fred Gurule of the Federal Aviation Administration wondered if the runway area should be marked with X's to denote that it is closed to aeronautical service. He said if it looks like a runway a pilot might accidentally land at the construction site.

"Everybody will want to be the first one to land on that runway!" remarked Gurule.

Sierra Blanca Airport Commission (SBAC) attorney Steve Sanders reminded the contractor of the close proximity of Camp Sierra Blanca and the Fort Stanton Hospital.

Dumas noted impacts to the surrounding area including increased traffic.

"It's a nice quiet rural area and we'd like to maintain it as much as possible," said Dumas.

Also during Thursday's meeting, Sanders gave a progress report on water rights at the airport site. He said testimony was presented last week in Santa Fe on the commission's request to move its purchased water rights to a well on the airport land.

Sanders said the parties in the case were given until the end of February to complete documentation and briefs with a decision expected in early March.

In the meantime, the commission has the right to pump three acre-feet per year from the well, said Sanders.

The commission also is exploring the possibility of acquiring water from Fort Stanton, said Sanders.

Although the construction contract specifies that the contractor supply water at the site, Sanders said the commission wants to be able to sell water from the on-site well.

Sanders said the commission could benefit greatly by selling the water and investing the proceeds back into the airport construction.

Ruidoso police join search for missing California man

Ruidoso Police have joined the search for a California man who disappeared nearly two years ago in the vicinity of Arcata, California, and Prairie Creek Redwoods State Park, according to Chief Richard Swenor.

John S. Campbell was reported missing February 15, 1985, from Humboldt State University in Arcata. He was 18 years old.

Swenor said he assigned detectives to initiate inquiries after receiving a letter from the missing man's father, George J. Campbell.

"We have reason to believe he may be in the Ruidoso area, or at a

ski resort in your vicinity," wrote Campbell.

After two years with no clues to his son's whereabouts, Campbell said he heard last summer from two independent psychics that John "was alive and located in a high desert plateau area with mountains with a ski resort where he had worked last winter and two part-time summer jobs."

Swenor said his officers failed to turn up anyone fitting the young man's description residing or working in the Ruidoso area. He told Campbell he would distribute copies of a flyer with information on his son.

John Campbell is described as six feet tall, 160 pounds, with medium

length blond hair and blue eyes. When last seen he was wearing an army field jacket or trench coat and a small-brimmed hat.

According to a missing person report, Campbell may have been carrying about \$300 in cash when he disappeared. His 1980 Toyota pickup was found parked and locked in the state park.

Campbell was reportedly upset over a variety of personal problems when he loaded his sleeping bag and camera in his pickup, told friends he was going to camp out on the beach, and disappeared.

A friend told police he took Campbell, who family members said had fought a problem with drugs for several years, to purchase \$60

worth of marijuana. A hardware shop owner reported selling Campbell 100 feet of clothes line that February 15.

In the weeks following his disappearance Humboldt State University police officer Ray Fagot, along with Campbell's girlfriend and brother, toured the bars and beaches of northern Humboldt County in search of the missing man.

They found more questions than answers, and authorities have said they hold little hope that Campbell will ever be found.

But the elder Campbell continues to pursue every clue without much to go on "but a hope and a try."

Despite difficulties, police report good year

In his year-end report, Ruidoso Police Chief Richard S. Swenor called 1986 a year of readjustment.

He reported a stabilized personnel strength with progress in training and certification programs, decreased fleet size, fewer traffic accidents, increases in property crimes and a decline in the department's solve-resolution rate.

"Despite the past year's fiscal and personnel attrition difficulties, the department's efficiency and service levels continue to exceed established standards," reported Swenor.

The village classification-pay plan, adopted in 1986, put a stop to the department's continuing "attrition problems caused by personal financial stress situations," said

Swenor.

The department is authorized 33 staffmembers—22 certified police officers. Swenor reported a staff that includes the chief, deputy chief, a computer operations officer, records custodian, three criminal investigations officers and eight communications-detention officers. A receptionist slot is vacant with those job duties performed by police volunteers.

According to the report a maximum of four patrol officers are available for each eight-hour shift. Ruidoso has 1.5 officers per 1,000 census population, while the nation as a whole averages 2.1 full-time police officers for every 1,000 population.

"Training is the most important aspect of today's police services employee," reports Swenor.

"Because of the complexities of

society and its legal restrictions, today's basic police training is designed to impart only basic knowledge of the law and its applications—a somewhat 'black and white' view—whereas the problems encountered have many side issues—the 'gray area,'" continues the report.

"Continued training is absolutely essential!" stressed Swenor.

Traffic accidents, especially those with injuries, have declined over the past few years, with 328 recorded for 1986. Ruidoso had no traffic fatalities last year, but 129 people were injured in 92 accidents involving injuries. Those accidents resulted in 238 driving while intoxicated (DWI) arrests.

Traffic accidents in 1985 numbered 382, 511 in 1984, 538 in 1983, 506 in 1982 and 449 in 1981.

Ruidoso Police logged 7,665 traf-

fic stops in 1986, an average of 21 stops within a 24-hour period, but issued fewer traffic citations than in years past.

"Of the total of 1,597 citations issued, 156 were of the mandatory type for alcohol related offenses and another 237 for failure to carry mandatory liability insurance," reported the chief. He reported 375 citations for speed violations.

"As an interesting comparison, Ruidoso Downs' five officers issued a total of 1,877 traffic citations in 1986, of which 1,543 were for speed violations and 25 for DWI or alcohol related traffic offenses," reported Swenor.

Criminal activities statistics showed increases in robbery, burglary, vehicle burglary, criminal trespass, forgery, embezzlement, child abuse and threatening/harassing telephone

calls. Other categories, such as murder, manslaughter, suicide, rape, breaking and entering, larceny, shoplifting, possession of stolen property, fraud, assault, arson and narcotics violations remained the same or decreased last year.


"Despite some increases in Ruidoso's 1986 crime statistics, we remain far below the national and state increase, especially in the violent crimes categories," said Swenor. He reported the overall solve-resolution rate decreased 38% from 1985's 55% rate, but was well above the national average of 21%.

Swenor noted that the Police Department and area citizens have benefited from the work of several volunteer groups, including the

Community Service Committee, Ruidoso Crime Stoppers, Neighborhood Watch, the Police Athletic League, the Police Chaplain Program, Topsy Taxi and police volunteers.

"... a community's mandated police services cannot anticipate being effective without the support of programs such as ours and the community support displayed in Ruidoso continues to be the one aspect that sets us above most other communities," continues the report.

Copies of the report were distributed to members of the Ruidoso Village Council Tuesday, and Swenor said copies of previous reports are available upon request. He said questions and comments are solicited.

"They've got a couple of really good wrestlers," Ames remarked. "They'll probably be tough in the


lower and middle weight classes. "We've got to keep from being pinned and win more matches than they do."

Trustees enact curfew

Capitan Village Trustees approved two ordinances and amended an existing ordinance at their meeting Monday.

There was no public opposition to any part of the three ordinances that came before the trustees. In rapid succession approval was given to establish a curfew for minors in Capitan, granting a non-exclusive franchise to Lincoln Cablevision and amending the water ordinance. All ordinances became effective January 17.

The curfew ordinance establishes guidelines for anyone under 18 years old, holding parents or guardians liable for violation of the curfew. Minors are not allowed on any public thoroughfare or in any

public place between the hours of 10 p.m. and 5 a.m. Sunday through Thursday and the hours between midnight and 5 a.m. on Friday and Saturday, unless accompanied by a parent or guardian.

The curfew does not apply if the minor is acting with the authority of the parent or is on an errand of necessity or attending a religious service, or any legitimate show or athletic event.

Amendments to the water ordinance and Cablevision franchise can be obtained from village clerk Janet Keel.

In other business, Mayor Benny Coker and trustees Norm Renfro, David Rouleau and Dave Strickland:

—Approved a three percent cost of living pay increase for all village employees.

—Heard a report from Randy Spear, Village Police Chief, concerning the reduction of overtime for the police department. The sheriff's department is cooperating in the coordination of a work schedule so overtime for the village police can be "cut to a minimum."

—Heard a report from Terry Cox about the one-week school on waste water he has just returned from. The school was sponsored by the New Mexico Water and Waste Water Association.

—Learned that investments made by the village will earn enough interest to make the 1987 bond payment.

—Coker commended village workers on their prompt response to the repair of a water leak after regular hours.

Committee hears video ad campaign

Lincoln County Lodgers' Tax Committee approved expenditures for varied county advertising at their meeting Wednesday.

Bobby Parsons, Lincoln Cablevision, incorporated, presented a video advertising package to the committee.

The chief video will be 10 to 15 minutes in length highlighting interesting sights in the county. Four additional tapes would deal specifically with activities enjoyed each season in the county.

"We feel the most effective advertising could be these seasonal tapes," Parsons said. "These tapes would be played out of season (the winter tape would play in the summer, etc.), showing visitors what goes on here at other times of the year. This would interest them in

coming back during a season when they don't normally visit."

He assured committee members Rich Seeley, Bob Finley, Kay Dennis and Walter Henn that copies of the video would be made available to the committee to "use for promotion as they see fit." In addition, the tapes would be played on Cablevision Channel 11, the "Voice of Lincoln County."

The committee approved a \$500 expenditure for the production of a preliminary tape.

In other business, the committee: —Reviewed the advertising format that will appear in the March-April editions of American West magazine. With one correction the ad will also appear in the May-June issues. It was learned the state will share the expense of this advertising.

—Approved advertising in the May issue of Adventure Road

magazine. —Discussed the continued work on a county brochure with Peter Todd, Epstein Enterprises. A mock-up of the 8 1/2 by 6 inch brochure was inspected. The brochure will emphasize the history and heritage of Lincoln County.

—Heard a report about the San Antonio Trade Show opening. Nancy Radziewicz and Barbara Downs as Smokey Bear and Woodsy Owl officiated at the ribbon cutting opening the trade show.

—Received a letter from Gary Miller, director of the Lincoln County Heritage Trust, about a proposal from Sunwest Airlines. The airlines plan to do an article on the McSween Dig to feature in their Southwest Spirit magazine.

—Appointed Walter Henn to prepare the application for participation in the Bicentennial Celebration of the U.S. Constitution.

The big snows hit

Lincoln County caught the southern corner of a snowstorm that blasted New Mexico over the weekend, leaving up to a foot of snow in the Ruidoso area and 21 inches at Ski Apache. Snow removal efforts began almost immediately. Gene Hoyt (below left) began to clear the parking areas of Hoyt Apartments Saturday even before the snowstorm stopped, while the road to Grindstone Subdivision was disturbed by only a few brave motorists (below). By Sunday, the sun shone and melting had started, forming giant icicles alongside Serenity Plaza (left), but weather reports of another storm promised more snow.



Bad roads spark wrecks

Icy road conditions apparently precipitated a rash of traffic accidents late last week and over the weekend.

Ruidoso Police recorded 11 accidents on Friday, four Saturday and three on Sunday. Just two of those incidents involved physical injuries, according to police reports.

Leslie Ross, 17, of Ruidoso was injured in a one-vehicle mishap about 10:20 a.m. Friday, on Cree Meadows Drive near Kirkman Drive, according to a report filed by Officer Robert Achterberg.

Ross told police the 1984 Jeep CJ7 she was driving started sliding off the roadway and she turned the wheel to stop the vehicle from sliding, reported police. The vehicle went into a culvert and the driver and a passenger, Melissa Henderson, 17, of Ruidoso, hit the windshield, said police.

First aid was rendered by Ruidoso EMS and Ross was transported to Lincoln County Medical Center (LCMC), said police.

Ross was cited for careless driving and failure to show proof of insurance, according to the report.

In a separate one-car accident at 9:57 p.m. Wednesday two Ruidoso men required treatment at LCMC.

Ruidoso Police reported the driver of a 1973 Ford station wagon, Robbie Adams, 23, and a passenger, Ricky Johnson, 23, suffered visible injuries when the driver failed to negotiate a curve on Cree Meadows Drive and went off the roadway.

"The driver stated he lost control because he was driving too fast. He also said that he was intoxicated," reported Ruidoso Police Officer Gonzalo Cordova. He said both occupants of the vehicle were intoxicated.


Adams was cited for driving while intoxicated and reckless driving, reported police.

Foster parents are needed in Lincoln County.

"All you have to do is open your heart and your home to the children," said Abe DeLeon, county office manager for the Human Services Department in Lincoln and Otero counties.

DeLeon said an orientation meeting for prospective foster parents is scheduled at 6:30 p.m. Tuesday, January 20, at the social services office in Alamogordo, 411 10th Street.

Attending an orientation is a good way to find out all about foster parenting, said DeLeon. He said Human Services staff will provide information and training to Ruidoso area residents here if they don't

want to travel to Alamogordo.

"We're willing to offer the orientation program in Ruidoso," noted DeLeon.

Besides a willingness to give, foster parents should be flexible and able to provide a secure environment, said DeLeon. He said single- as well as two-family homes are suitable for the program.

The state pays foster parents just enough to support the child, and provides medical care and some help with daycare costs when needed, said DeLeon.

Snowy Wonderland

This is being sent to you a little after high noon on Sunday, January 18. And after two days and nights of steady snow, sleet and freezing mist, all the mountain world is under a blue sky washed pure by all the frozen moisture from on high.

You always are delighted to see the snow pictures after the storm has cleared and gone on its way. And you never saw the pinons and cedars decorated in more splendid mid-winter glory.

After this much snow, more than a foot, generally you see the cedars bending down under their load of white with tips of branches touching the ground and sometimes

even buried in the snow.

Today all the trees are upright, in their natural position, with the tufts of snow built into forms very rarely seen. The snow was made of the finest particles held together by the cold. Therefore, the snow is very light in weight.

This way the snow formed itself into tall spires, little castles and pointed miniature mountain peaks. I do not remember seeing the snow tufts so tall. Also, from one tip of cedar to the other, the snow on the upper tips of the trees formed one bridge after the other so that out there you see a large cedar covered with a complete umbrella of white.

Now a snowbird flies into one of

the tall little snow spires, fluttering his wings, giving himself a snow bath, scattering the snow like white powder or fine grain sugar.

A blue jay lights atop the canopy of snow on one of the pinons, his blue feathers shining against the sparkling white.

A snowbird lights on the tip top of a pointed snow cone. You wonder how this light delicate snow can hold him up. The cold is what holds these tiny snow particles together, until—the snow tuft flies into white powder almost like smoke, as the snow bird works his little feet and wings. Now he goes drinking the droplets of water forming along the branch beneath.

A warm breeze moves a large cedar tree. The tufts of snow glisten with droplets formed by the sun into rubies, emeralds and diamonds and every kind of rainbow colored snow-magic jewelry. And now you can see how our forefathers decided upon the evergreen for a Christmas tree.

Let us be grateful for the snow

The snow had us slowed down for a few days, and some of us snow-bound. And yet the snow is one of our greatest blessings. It has made us prepare for the winter, it has caused us to be grateful for the simplest blessings, and it has caused us to care for each other and help one another. Let us thank God for the snow.

Editorial

"Executive session."

It's a term that should alarm citizens whenever it is spoken.

Executive sessions are those times that public officials decide it is necessary to discuss the public's business behind closed doors. State law grants officials several excuses to the Open Meetings Act, but those exemptions are so broad that they nearly invite abuse.

Many things can be discussed privately under the umbrella of "license hearings, personnel matters, collective bargaining, certain purchases, real estate or water rights purchases and litigation (actual or threatened)."

Indeed, some governing bodies have developed a habit of citing one or two reasons for an executive session at the end of each of their meetings. Have they so much private discussion to conduct?

Executive sessions seem to become especially numerous when public officials begin to regard the handling of a village, or county, as their business, rather than that of the public.

Sometimes, officials believe they "know what's best for us" and so make decisions without public input or scrutiny.

In any case, it is frightening to think that officials, who we entrust with our affairs when we elect them, later become so untrustworthy as to be afraid to let us know how they're conducting our business.

Public officials should conduct executive sessions rarely, rather than regularly. Officials with integrity, and an alert citizenry, should ensure the public's business is conducted publicly.—DJP

Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE—No governor should be judged solely by the quality of the persons he chooses for his early appointments.

It's easy to do some imaginative things, like picking former astronaut Frank Borman to be a regent at the University of New Mexico, when you're just beginning. What's tough is coming up with more and more of that kind of person.

The talent pool in either major political party is not all that deep, after all, and it's axiomatic that among New Mexico Republicans it's even shallower, simply because there are so many fewer of them. Thus, finding quality people time and after time grows ever harder.

That's part of the reason we saw Lee Atchison told to go out and run the Highway Department for a while, and Judge Bill Riordan sent to Corrections to get things started there. A new administration has a hard time finding personnel for demanding jobs like those.

All in all, it's probably wiser to put in temporary custodians while you hunt for truly qualified permanent appointees than it is to go the other route. We have seen that in New Mexico, when people were named simply so the boss could say he had filled out his Cabinet.

Remember Shirley Hill Witt at the Department of Natural Resources?

All in all, most New Mexicans would rather see a little time taken—though not too much—while shopping goes on to find people who are qualified for the jobs and who will agree to occupy them long enough to get some improvements made.

It is possible to discern the fine Italian hand of New Mexico's senior Senator in many of the decisions coming out of the fourth floor of the Roundhouse these days.

That's only natural. Though Pete Domenici was able to work with surprising unanimity with both Jerry Apodaca and Bruce King, he and Toney Anaya, let's face it, could barely pretend to stomach one another. That meant a long four years in which Domenici's contacts with what was going on at home were minimal and distant.

Now there's a member of Domenici's own party at the top here, and he's a person the Senator chose to support strongly during his run for office. Naturally, Pete's views have been sought and are being heeded.

For Domenici himself, there is also the attraction of efficiency. Though some of us may not have noticed it, state government is so much closer to the people and offers so much shorter a pipeline time that it's very attractive to those who have to put up with the endless clumsiness of the national government. Domenici has never been able to suffer that condition patiently.

Oh, all that national attention important Senators get is pretty heady, but many who know him well think Pete may have been happiest when he was mayor of Albuquerque and could cause things to happen quickly and measurably.

One of the most painful processes at this time of year for those who appreciate the importance of the legislative system is to read, in the various newspapers of the state, the lists of bills that are going to be introduced in the coming session by lawmakers who have not yet seen a single day's service.

What ever happened to that old tradition that said first-termers were to be seen and not heard until they had time to find out where the bathrooms are in the building? Nowadays, they hit town off and running—almost always in every direction but the right one.

If anyone were to ask this reporter what he hoped the television news people would give us less and less of during 1987, he would have to name in first place those inane and meaningless shots of Ronald and Nancy Reagan getting onto and off of that damn helicopter. Surely, after we have all seen this particular footage, shot and reshot for literally thousands of times, it can no longer be seen as news, even by the wildest stretch of the televideo imagination.

We could also do well without any more of Colonel North in his little Marine suit clamping up for the cameras.


